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Then and Now: From the sea to offshore

Living on a tiny island in the middle of the Western Caribbean Sea, the only way Cayman's early settlers could envision their fortunes being made was by sea. According to records, Caymanians began building boats for both trading and fishing as Cayman headed into the 19th Century. Mahogany was prolific on the island so boat builders turned to that medium for boat building. The first ship commercially built on Grand Cayman was the 'Hennen' built by James Page around 1860. Cayman-built boats were renowned for their quality throughout the region and were used for carrying cargo, mail and pleasure, but the majority were used as turtling schooners. The industry died in the late 1940s when Caymanians went to sea with big shipping companies that paid much more. According to various records, famous local ship building family names included Bodden, Arch, McTaggart, Foster, Ritch, Kirkconnell and Miller and in Cayman Brac the Scotts and Tibbets.

Cayman was also renowned for the strong rope it was able to make from the Silver Thatch tree that grew here (and is Cayman's National Tree). Caymanians exported the rope to Jamaica in particular and according to Cayman Islands National Archives' records, in 1907 515,000 fathoms were exported at five pounds a hundred fathoms, going up to 15 pounds per hundred fathoms

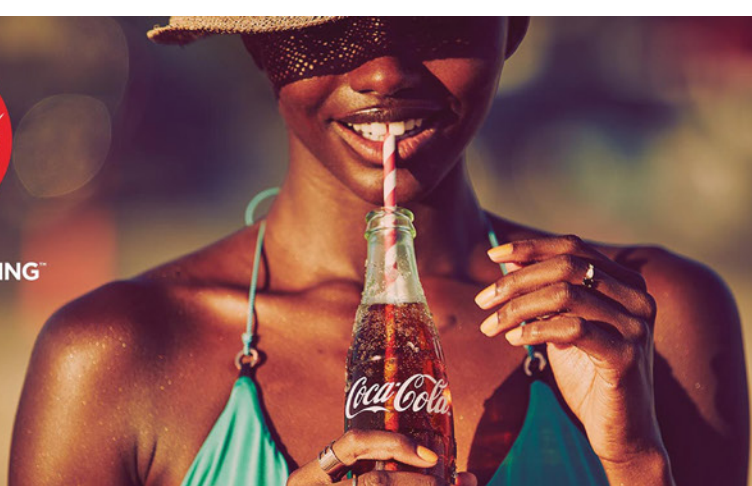

HSA urges public to refrain from using e-cigarettes and vaping products

The United States Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is currently investigating 380 possible cases of severe lung injury believed to be caused by e-cigarette use in 33 states and one US territory, with six deaths also involving cannabis vapes.

Symptoms of severe lung injury associated with vaping may include coughing, shortness of breath, chest pain, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, fatigue, fever and abdominal pain. These symptoms may develop within days or weeks after use.

The CDC recommends that persons consider refraining from using e-cig-



arette or vaping products until the investigation is complete.

The Cayman Islands Health Services Authority is therefore urging ALL persons in the Cayman Islands to adhere to the recommendation of the CDC.

Three Vehicle Collision with serious injury in Bodden Town

Just after 8:30PM on Saturday night, 14 September police and other emergency services were dispatched to a report of a motor vehicle collision involving three vehicles. The incident took place on Shamrock Road in the vicinity of Brightview Drive, Bodden Town.

One man was trapped inside his vehicle and had to be extricated by the Cayman Islands Fire Service. He received serious and possibly life-threatening-injuries and was transported to the hospital by the

ambulance where he is currently being treated. He is believed to be in critical condition.

Another man age 31, was arrested on suspicion of DUI and later bailed as the investigation continues.

Shamrock Road was closed over night to preserve the scene for accident reconstruction to take place. The roadway has now been cleared and opened to the public.

The matter is under investigation.



RCIPS FCU Warns Retailers of Potential Credit Card Fraud

The RCIPS Financial Crime Unit is warning the public and local retailers about an attempted fraud scheme being conducted using potentially stolen credit card info.

Several local liquor outlets have recently received separate requests to place a large order of wine, spirits, and champagne, to be shipped to the USA, with payment to be made by credit card.

One of the outlets had suspicions about the order and declined it, informing the FCU. Once it was established that

other outlets had received the same order, and upon receiving advice from the RCIPS FCU, two other outlets have also stopped the order.

The request originates from an individual at the email address jamesbarry1970@gmail.com, who claims to represent James Walker Oil & Gas Co. California. It was also stated that they would be arranging local shipping.

It is strongly believed that payment for the order would have been made by use of compromised or stolen credit

card information. However, at this stage no payments have been accepted or received.

The RCIPS FCU is making all retail outlets aware of this possible attempt-

ed fraud. If you are the owner or staff member of any retail outlet and receive such an email, do not engage with the sender. Instead, contact the FCU at 949-8797.

Ganja Recovered During Drug Interdiction by the JMU

Just after 6:20AM on Saturday morning, 14 September, the Joint Marine Unit along with the Air Operations Unit were conducting maritime boarder patrols on the northeast coast of Grand Cayman, on board the Motor Vessel M.Luke when they came across a vessel with two men onboard.

The captain of the vessel caught sight of the MV M.Luke and proceeded to speed off in the opposite direction. This aroused the suspicion of the officer who then followed the vessel with emergency lights and sirens. The vessel was stopped shortly after and searched by the officers present.

During the search of the vessel 8 large bags filled with packages containing ganja were located. The estimated



weight is of over 400lbs which is believed to have a street value of \$400,000 CI.

Both men, age 34 of West Bay and age 35 of George Town were arrested on suspicion of importation of ganja and other related offences.

The men remain police in custody pending further investigations.

Report of Shots Fired in George Town

Just after 9 PM on Friday night, 13 September police were informed of a shooting incident that took place in the vicinity of Sound Way, George Town.

So far, one man has reported injuries as a result of the incident and is currently receiving medical treatment for what is believed to be a gunshot wound.

Sound Way between the Shedden Road junction and Whitman Seymour Road junction was currently closed to the public. Police were currently on scene and are asking members of the public to avoid the area if possible.

just two years later. The sale of rope provided the only income for many families at the time.

A natural progression from the boat building industry, and also as a result of Cayman's plentiful supplies, was the catching of turtles, to be used and consumed locally or to be sold to passing ships. But by the late 19th century Cayman's stock of turtles was depleted and turtlers had to go to the cays and banks of Central America in search of turtles, an often-perilous voyage that was made even more dangerous by the prevalence of hurricanes in the Caribbean.

Industry takes a new route

In 1966 the passing of the Banks and Trust Companies Regulation Law was to make the most profound impact on industry that the islands had ever experienced, and would pave the way, in just a few decades' time, for a massive shift in careers for local people. This law allowed the licensing and supervision of institutions looking to carry out general banking or trust business (Category A licenced) or offshore business only (Category B licenced).

In 1953 the first commercial bank opened its doors in Dr Roy McTaggart's dental parlour on South Church Street, a sub-branch of Barclays Bank of Jamaica.

Cayman has since gone on to develop into one of the world's most successful offshore financial centres, excelling at the establishment of investment funds and captive insurance companies. According to statistics from the Economic and Statistics Office, in 2017 there were 40,856 people in employment in the Cayman Islands, the vast majority (just over 29,000) were employed in some kind of clerical, service or professional capacity and only just over a thousand employed in skilled fishery/agriculture positions.

Tourism in Cayman was tremendously boosted by the development of the Owen Roberts International Airport in 1953 on Grand Cayman. The industry was officially recognised in the Cayman Islands in 1965 with the passing of the Tourist Board Law, creating an entity designed to promote Cayman as a vacation destination. According to CINA records, Commissioner Sir Alan Cardinal who served in Cayman from 1934 to 1941, thought "Grand Cayman has what is probably the most perfect bathing beach in the West Indies", while Commissioner Andrew Morris Gerrard (1952-1956) was recorded as stating that Grand Cayman's greatest asset after its "invisible export of seamen, was the stretch of white sand on Seven Mile Bay".

Cayman's tourism industry has grown tremendously since the early legislation as passed, with Seven Mile Beach being voted one of the best beaches in the world in recent years, proving those early commissioners correct in their assessments. Some of the world's top hotels and resorts have accommodation in Cayman, with both the Hilton and Hyatt brands slated for development here in the near future. The more than two million visitors to Cayman (as at the end of 2017) would most certainly also agree.

In 2017 there were 63,415 residents in Cayman, 35,878 of whom were Caymanian and 27,537 of whom were not, indicating the high level of immigration that has occurred over recent years to accommodate Cayman's growing industries of both financial services and tourism.

Water authority marks Ivan's 15th anniversary

Those who were here will never forget it. It changed our lives and changed the way we looked at nature and her beauty but also her fearsome strength, and it changed the Cayman Islands. Cayman Water Authority held a special exhibition, to commemorate the 15th Anniversary of Hurricane Ivan. It was also a time to reflect and consider the suffering in the Bahamas, in the wake of Hurricane Dorian, and there were Cayman Islands Red Cross staff there, ready to collect donations from people who had stopped by to remember, and share memories as they ate some of the nice buffet food and drank some fruit punch provided.

Nobody was prepared for the 150 mile-an-hour winds, sometimes rising to 220 miles an hour. Nobody was prepared for the 12 inches of rain that fell. But most of all, nobody was prepared for the terrible storm surge, in places as high as 10 feet, which devastated many homes across the island, and made families panic as the water level rose higher and higher.

Water Authority Corporate Communications Officer Edlyn, Ruiz who was just a teenager at the time, was lucky because she managed to get to safety. "I got on one of the last planes out and I was able to meet up with my mother in Miami. Our family was incredibly lucky

because there was minimum damage to our home.

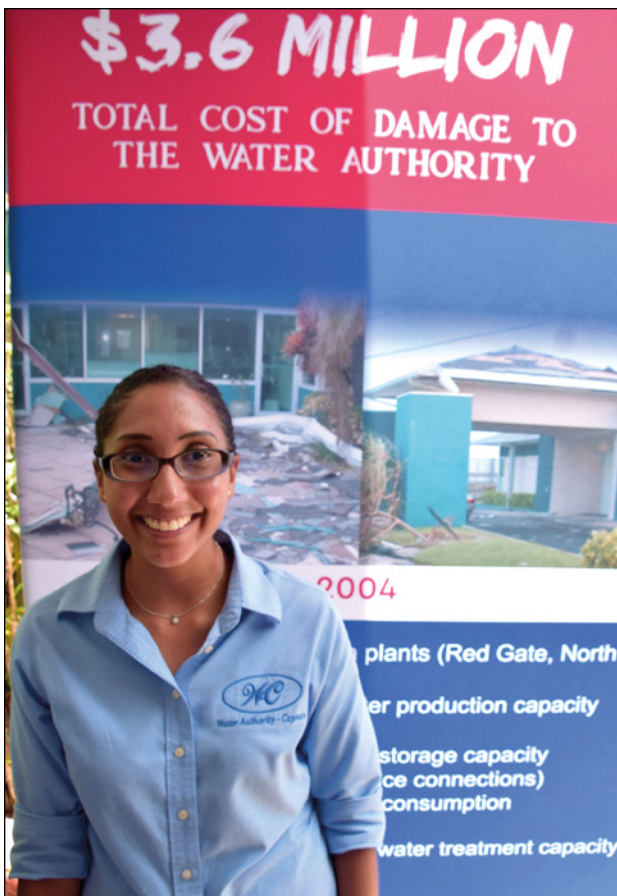
"Like a lot of other people and organisations, Hurricane Ivan really changed our perspective on what it means to be prepared, and what it means to be resilient. In the Water Authority our equipment was damaged and we had to invest in making sure that our equipment was there, and also that our network is more resilient. But we didn't think it was right to let this 15th anniversary go by without taking a moment to really reflect on what happened to us as an organisation and what happened to us as an island," she said, "and we thought it was a good opportunity to push that message of preparedness, because that is really an

important message for us, and is something that we focus on all the time. We try to make sure we are prepared and also help our customers in the community be prepared."

One of the people who was here during Fred Moncrieffe, was talking over some Ivan-memories with some friends: "The house that I was raised up in it survived all the other hurricanes, but that morning I couldn't believe. And when I came out of Belford I couldn't believe what I saw. I had major damage, but the neighbours around me didn't have any house. What saved me was my house was on a higher foundation," he said. He said he felt sympathy with the people of Abaco Island.

Moni Guemnin said: "I wasn't actually here for Hurricane Ivan, but I've lived through different hurricanes. I have lived through Matthew, I lived through Andrew, Maria and Irma. I'm from the Bahamas, and I actually work in Disaster-response."

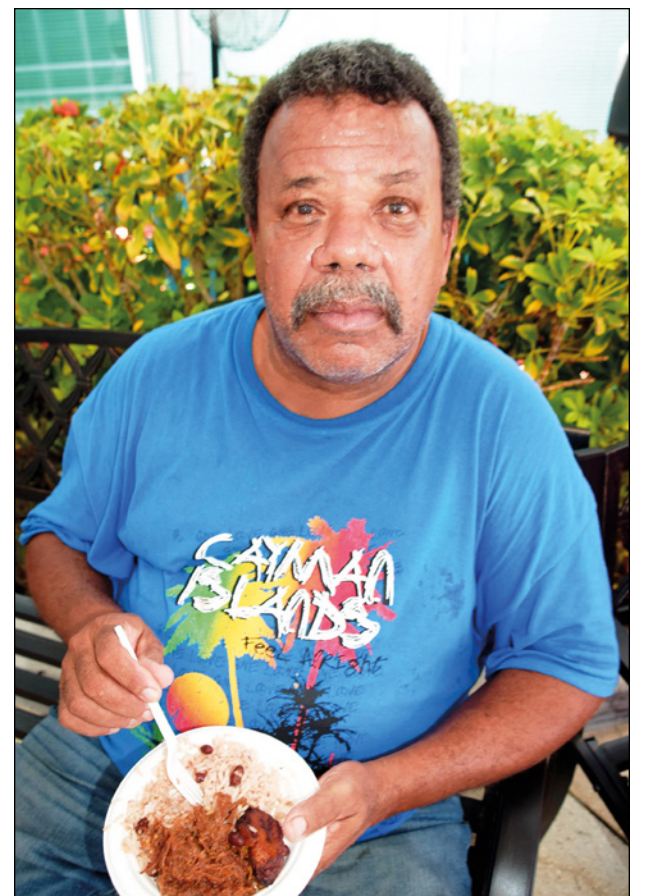
15 years later the islands have changed, and now we are much better prepared. One of the big display panels listed some of the changes, including the establishment of Hazard Management Cayman Islands in 2007, the development of a National Hurricane Plan, the development of a storm-surge atlas, and the establishment of the Community Emergency Response Team network. 🌐

20-MEGAWATT ENERGY STORAGE PROJECT TO DELIVER FOR CONSUMERS AND THE ENVIRONMENT

OfReg has today announced that it has approved a 20-Megawatt (MW) utility-scale battery energy storage project for CUC, paving the way for annual consumer savings of approximately C\$5 million.

The Office authorised CUC to issue a solicitation for the energy storage project to be implemented in 2020/21. The project will deliver benefits for consumers, and helps the Cayman Islands to meet its clean energy goals. Notable benefits include the following:

- Provision of more economic and reliable spinning reserves;
- Reduction of Grand Cayman's diesel fuel consumption by approximately 5% - 6% per annum (more than 2 million imperial gallons per year);
- Provision of annual fuel savings of approximately C\$5M per year which accrue to consumers;

- Creation of operating reserves, for an additional 12MW of Distributed Renewable Energy Resources, to be interconnected to the CUC grid;

- The additional 12MW capacity will allow OfReg to review and approve new Distributable Renewable Energy programmes;

- Increases the current renewable energy infusion quota to 29MW, which is approximately 25% of Grand Cayman's peak electricity load;

- Reduction of the average cost of solar on Grand Cayman, in line with the National Energy Policy (NEP) goal of reducing future costs of energy in the Cayman Islands;

- Provision of net combined reductions in CO2 emissions of approximately 8% on Grand Cayman;

- Additional contribution to meeting the CUC Integrated Resource Plan; and

- Provision of more certainty to the distributed renewable energy sector, on Grand Cayman.

Commenting on the announcement, Gregg Anderson, Executive Director of Energy and Utilities, said: "The 20MW of energy storage will help improve grid reliability and integrate more re-

newables; creating a cleaner, healthier, and more sustainable future. Energy storage is expected to play a key role in OfReg's commitment, to ensure utilities' deliver clean, safe, reliable and cost-effective energy in keeping with the goals of the National Energy Policy." 🌐

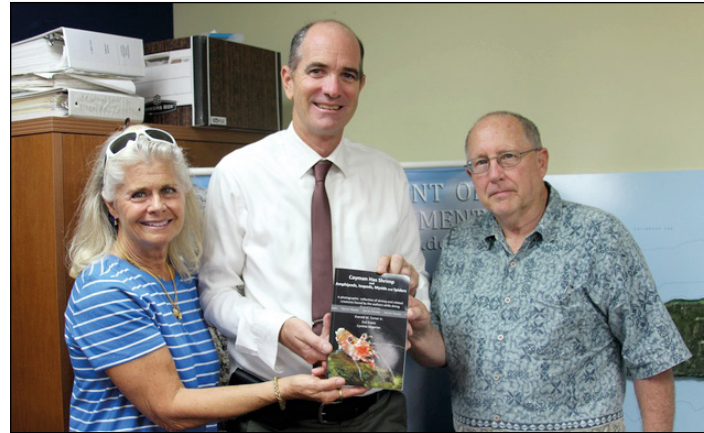
CAST YOUR VOTE FOR CCMI'S PEOPLE'S CHOICE AWARD

She added, "Cancer has touched everyone whether it be through a family member, colleague, friend or even their self. Together, we are all making a difference."

Caymanian Film Makers' - 'The Great Disconnect' Documentary to Premier in Cayman Theaters

'The Great Disconnect' is the next film by the predominantly Caymanian production team of filmmakers who also produced the 'Bright Spot'; a seemingly unassuming documentary about coconut oil that quickly morphed into something everyone just kind of knew they had to see.

Though the topic this time is somewhat distant from coconut oil, the interest in this group's work is still palpable and folks know they are possibly in for a treat.

The Caymanian Times had an opportunity to speak exclusively with the film's Director, Tamer Soliman who told us more about the creative process and revealed plans for a major premier in Grand Cayman later this year.

The production team includes Rob Tyler (Co-Director, DP), Jeremy Walton (Co-Producer, Executive Producer), Neville Hicks (Executive Producer), Stephen Price (Executive Producer) and Candy Whicker (Associate Producer) all of whom are either from or live in Grand Cayman.

Sarah Douglas (Story Editor and Writer) and Tamer (Producer and director) moved back to Canada about 2 years ago now.

Interview

1. Why did you feel the need to do Disconnected now?

"Before making this film, I had been aware of the concept of community wellbeing, but I never really thought too much about it, and I definitely didn't think it was a key factor in achieving optimal health. Working as a health and wellness professional for over a decade, I advised my clients that health was defined by two things: what we ate and how much we exercised.

But all of that changed after a trip to the Blue Mountains of Jamaica. Rob, my good friend and Director of Photography, and I stayed a few nights in a small mountain camp, outfitted with just the basics for simple village life. The purpose of the trip was to learn from the local population about food, nutrition and sustainable living, but what really overwhelmed us was the profound sense of community. Despite lacking (many possessions and material things), the people of this village seemed happy, healthy and connected to one another. This made me wonder – how do people in North America feel about their sense of community and connectedness? And what, if any, effect does this have on our health and overall wellbeing?

These questions inspired me to direct and produce The Great Disconnect. As I met with experts in economic, social and urban design, I discovered how multifaceted this idea of community wellbeing is, and the ill effects that

happen as a result of community breakdown. These issues not only impact personal health and wellbeing but the health and wellbeing of communities on a much larger scale. Loneliness and social isolation are being labeled as epidemics - epidemics that may become one of society's biggest challenges of the 21st century.

Making this film has changed my definition of what it really means to be healthy - physically, emotionally, and socially. My hope is that by watching this film people will reflect on the idea that to be well, we need to find ways to come together. The health of society as a whole depends on it.

2. Where did you shoot most of the project?

We shot mostly in Vancouver for 3 reasons. The first reason is because most of the interviewees we wanted to interview were located there. Secondly, it's where a lot of the research on loneliness and mental health gets published so interviewees and strangers we came across could speak to it relatively easily. Lastly, we conducted a real life experiment with one of our main characters and she lived in Vancouver as well.

We did however begin filming in Jamaica starting with a community of Rastafarians. As I mentioned in the answer to your previous question, their profound sense of community truly overwhelmed us. After lengthy scripting sessions we realized that we had a really big topic to explore so off we went to interview experts in Toronto, Vancouver and L.A.. What was great about being in big cities was that we could capture cinematic shots that coincide with the main themes expressed by the interviewees of the film.

3. The editing and production are ace. Is this something you do in-house? How do you make this happen?

It was a truly a team effort that required the skills, talents, patience and collaboration of many individuals. Please refer to the creator tab on www.disconnectddoc.com.

4. After Bright Spot, this release shows that these projects are coming from thinking minds and a level of awareness is evident in the topics you are choosing. Do you see film making as a means to change society?

It's without a doubt one of the most powerful mediums to create change.



What happened with Bright Spot is truly magical. We hope that the call to action in The Great Disconnect has the same kind of impact.

7. Is any of the documentary shot in Grand Cayman?

Because the film needed a big city feel we had to stick to big cities. We hope Cayman forgives us for this.

8. How do you plan to distribute the film?

We currently have a distribution contract with an agency called Showcase entertainment <https://www.thescemediagroup.com> out of California. They're extremely credible and love the film's premise. They are currently working on a distribution deal internationally for us. Because of our contract, the film isn't yet available to be shown publicly (other than in Cayman) or through

VOD channels. We are however able to license the film to non-profits, NGO's and educational institutions looking to screen the film at conferences, school assembly's or in their communities. Over the next 3 months there will be close to 30 screenings across Canada in that capacity. We've also received requests from Australia, Sweden, the U.K. and the United-States, which is just amazing! If organizations are interested in licensing the film, they can contact us for details at info@disconnectddoc.com.

9. Will it be available online as well?

10. Are there any actors Caymanian/Otherwise whom we might know in the film?

I narrate and appear in the film as the guide that threads the different themes of the film. Our most internationally known interviewee is Ron Finley. He's known for starting community garden projects in South Central Los Angeles, a theme we explore in the film. 11. How long did this project take to complete?

The short answer is 2 years and a bit :). The long answer is: Our filming was interspersed and happened between October 2016 until March of 2017. We began editing shortly after and completed our first version at 42 minutes which, some might remember screened at CayFilm in 2017. When we were approached by our distribution agency during the spring of 2017, they advised us that the film would be more appealing if it was lengthened to 60 minutes. This was a challenging endeavor because we truly thought that we had exhausted our footage but it enticed us enough to go back and review the whole footage, which was worth it because we found more and integrated them into the footage. The film was made into a feature length production in November of 2018. We've been slowly rolling out our distribution strategy since.

12. Can you tell us a little about the soundtrack for the film?

It's all licensed music from independent musicians. We mainly used artist io - <https://artist.io> whose songs are really high quality and very reasonably priced.

13. Is there anything else you would like to include that I may not have asked? Please feel free to share anything you wish for the public to know regarding the documentary or about the producers.

The film has an important message that's resonating with so many people. We didn't expect it but it's really amazing to see. We think it'll resonate equally with the people of Cayman and I personally can't wait to be in Cayman on October 11th when we kick off the first screening. What's great is that after the screenings the discussion continues with a Q&A and an after party.

Barbados Prime Minister Says Small States Not Accessing Markets On Fair Terms

Prime Minister Mia Amor Mottley has expressed concerns about small island states failing to access markets on fair terms.

She highlighted correspondent banking services as an example, as she delivered the prestigious 16th Prebisch Lecture at the Palais des Nations, in Geneva, on the topic, 'Invisible Yet Indispensable' on Tuesday.

"It matters not that the absence of that correspondent banking will cause our countries, our regions and our people to be cut off and be quarantined, just as lepers were in centuries past, from a global community, as we seek to buy goods and services from outside our borders," Mottley told her global audience.

"How will our people trade if they don't have access to a banking system that allows them to transmit and to pay for services and goods across the borders? It is pure, unadulterated hypocrisy and at worst, contempt and insensitivity as to what happens to human beings, who happen not to live within the borders of the developed world."

During the near 90-minute address, Prime Minister Mottley said that unless

the fundamental obstacle to our development was addressed, she feared that the imbalance of power and wealth in the global community of nations would remain.

"Let us not be shy to confront it; middle income countries refused today to be allowed access to development aid and assistance, purely on the basis of arbitrary determinations of per capita and GDP formulations that bear no relationship to the reality of our lives.

"And even when money is promised in the midst of disasters, money promised and money delivered are two totally different experiences. We must not be naïve in appreciating that the head start given the developed world to build their countries and to build out their industrial base was done on wealth extracted from millions of people across the developing world. It is a difficult conversation but...you cannot be mature as an adult, or mature as a country and not have difficult conversations," she stressed.

Emphasizing the importance of reforming international institutions, Mottley said this restructuring was overdue, and the task must now be completed.

"The worthiness and pursuit of this reform we all know is unquestionable, but yet it remains, decades after, unresolved. We need to put it to bed...so we can get on to the other issues that are truly confronting us," she stated.

The Prime Minister said countries should not sign up to international treaties, charters, commitments and declarations and then treat them as if they were not meaningful and not apply to them. 🌐

Bahamas PM Announces National Prayer Service; Flags to be Flown at Half Mast as Country Mourns Hurricane Dorian Victims

Prime Minister Dr Hubert Minnis has announced plans for a National Prayer Service to honour the lives lost when Hurricane Dorian slammed into the northwest of the archipelago a week and a half ago.

The Government has invited the Bahamas Christian Council to plan the National Prayer Service, which will take place next Wednesday, marking the culmination of a National Day of Prayer and Fasting.

Flags are also to be flown at half-mast on all public buildings to mourn the dead. The date of a National Day of Mourning will be announced at an appropriate time.

"We are a nation in mourning," said Prime Minister Minnis in a national address. "The grief is unbearable following the devastating impact of Hurricane Dorian, which has left behind death, destruction and despair on Grand Bahama and Abaco, our second and third most populous islands."

The Prime Minister acknowledged that there are many deaths and many still missing. The number of deaths is expected to significantly increase but the confirmed number is currently 50.

"Many are grieving the loss of loved ones. Many are in despair wondering if their loved ones are still alive," said Minnis.

"To those who have lost loved ones, I know there is absolutely nothing we can say that will lessen your pain and your loss. Our sympathies go out to the families of each person who died. Let us pray for them during this time of grief."

The Prime Minister assured that accurate and timely information will be provided on the loss of life as it is available.

"We will first and foremost put the priority on notifying families and giving them the help they need to grieve," he said.

Efforts are ramping up to collect the dead bodies, with the help of international aid agencies.

"We are being transparent and responsible in this process," Minnis said.

The Government is also providing counseling to those who need help to get them through this difficult process.

"We will need as many spiritual resources as we will need physical resources, to rebuild lives and to recover," Minnis said.

"Hurricane Dorian is an historic tragedy," he added, noting a report by the Caribbean Disaster Emergency Management Agency (CDEMA) that described the storm as "the strongest Atlantic hurricane documented to directly impact a land mass

since records began, tying it with the Great Florida Labor Day Hurricane of 1935."

Hurricane Dorian affected the north-western Bahamas for about 68 hours, with the southern eye-wall planted over Grand Bahama, for about 30 hours. 🌐

Hurricane Dorian Body Count in The Bahamas Rising

The death toll from Hurricane Dorian in the Bahamian islands of Abaco and Grand Bahama continues to rise, reaching 45 up to yesterday.

The Royal Bahamas Police Force (RBPF) said that up to yesterday, 37 bodies had been found in Abaco, which Hurricane Dorian hit first, and the other eight in Grand Bahama which would be found by the Category 5 hurricane for more than 30 hours.

"We anticipate the discovery of more bodies as the process of search and recovery progresses," it said in a statement.

"There are many more persons presumed missing and we are appealing to the public to file Missing Persons re-

ports, with the police, of those persons who have not been seen since the passage of Hurricane Dorian. We offer condolences to those families who have had loved ones die during the storm. And every effort is being made along with our local and international law enforcement partners to bring closure," the RBPF added.

The Ministry of Social Services and Urban Development said a dedicated phone line (323-1877) has been established at the Disaster Management Unit, Department of Social Services, for use by those members of the public wishing to register the name(s) of family members whom they have been unable to contact since the passage of Hurricane Dorian. 🌐

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Messi aims to build on Barca tally

The Champions League group stage returns this week as 32 teams involved go in with realistic ambitions of lifting the trophy.

Last year's winners Liverpool, who defeated Premier League rivals Tottenham in June's final, are aiming to win the competition for the seventh time. Pep Guardiola's Manchester City have the most expectation upon them having not reached the semi-finals since 2016, but they'll be up against European royalty in Barcelona, Real Madrid, Bayern Munich and Paris Saint-Germain – all of whom have their own motivations for redemption.

City boss Pep Guardiola is under enormous pressure to win the Champions League with City after winning the Premier League twice. With Liverpool already five points clear in the Prem, securing the Champions League may be his best option.

This year's edition of the Champions League is special for Real Madrid, who participate in their 50th season in Europe's premier competition – more than any other side in the tournament's history.

The La Liga giants with 13 wins, also hold the record for the most Champions League titles. Los Blancos won the first five editions of the tournament between 1955 and 1960, and more recently scooped successive titles from 2016-18 seasons under club legend Zinedine Zidane.

Real Madrid kick off their historic campaign with a difficult trip to PSG on Wednesday, having also been drawn in Group A with Belgium's Club Brugge and Galatasaray of Turkey.

Zidane is himself seeking a record in this season's Champions League. No manager has ever won Europe's premier

club competition four times; the Frenchman is currently tied with Bob Paisley, and former Inter Milan and current Napoli boss Carlo Ancelotti, on three.

Zidane still holds a remarkable record of never being eliminated in the Champions League as Real manager. They were knocked out by Ajax last season in the last 16 but were then managed by Santiago Solari (via Julen Lopetegui) following Zidane's shock resignation last summer. The Frenchman was reinstated days after the shock defeat.

Lionel Messi has scored 112 goals in 15 Champions League seasons and won the competition four times with Barcelona. Few would bet against him building on that total when Barça take on Borussia Dortmund, Inter Milan and Slavia Prague in a tough-looking Group F.

Messi has never scored against Inter and hopes to change that record when

Inter visit the Camp Nou on Oct. 2, while Barcelona visit San Siro on Dec. 10.

Barcelona's home is one of the hardest to visit. They are currently on a 32-game unbeaten run at home in the Champions League, last losing to Bayern Munich 3-0 in the 2013 semi-finals.

Twenty-four different teams have come to the Camp Nou and been unable to claim a win at the 99,000-seater stadium. The record for the longest unbeaten home run in Champions League history is held by Bayern, who didn't suffer home defeat for 43 consecutive games between 1969 and 1991.

Messi or Cristiano Ronaldo? It's the boring, unanswerable question which has dominated football for over a decade. Ballon d'Ors have been shared between them, Champions League titles too, while football's longstanding records have tumbled before them both.

Tallawahs draft in new players

The Jamaica Tallawahs have drafted in Jade Dernbach and Dwayne Smith for the remainder of the 2019 Hero Caribbean Premier League.

Dernbach replaces Kennar Lewis who has pulled out over personal reasons. Smith replaces Rovman Powell who is injured himself against Trinbago Knight Riders.

Dernbach has played in 24 ODIs and 34 T20 Internationals for England, claiming 70 international wickets. In the recently concluded T20 Blast he claimed 11 wickets for Surrey at an average of 31.09 and an economy rate of 8.88.

Smith has some serious CPL pedigree, having scored four hundreds in the tournament, the joint highest by any player. He is the fifth highest run scorer in CPL, having scored 1,584 runs in his 58 CPL matches.

They have also added Jermaine Blackwood as temporary cover for Andre Russell while he recovers from the blow he received playing against the Knight Riders. Blackwood has played for the Tallawahs in the past and has appeared in 28 Tests and two ODIs for the West Indies.

Durant: Leaving Thunder made them mad

Kevin Durant, one of the NBA's best – and most polarising – players has spoken about his ambivalent feelings towards the league.

The 30-year-old small forward left the Golden State Warriors this summer after his attempts to lead them to a third successive NBA title ended in a ruptured Achilles that is likely to see him side-lined for the entirety of the new season. But it is the end of his time with the Oklahoma City Thunder that was most on his mind.

Durant spent most of his career with the Thunder and was voted the NBA's MVP there in 2014. He was also active in the community and with charitable organisations in Oklahoma City, which made him incredibly popular. However, he says he was shocked by the vitriol when he left for the Warriors in 2016.

"People coming to my house and spray-painting on the for sale signs around my neighbourhood," Durant said. "People making videos in front of my house and burning my jerseys and calling me all types of crazy names."

He also says he was frozen out by Thunder staff members after leaving the team. "I eventually wanted to come back to that city and be part of that community and organisation, but I don't trust

nobody there," he said. "That s*** must have been fake, what they were doing. The organisation, the GM, I ain't talked to none of those people, even had a nice exchange with those people, since I left."

Durant, who won two NBA titles with the Warriors, said he still loves playing basketball, but finds the "circus" around the league wearing. "Some days I hate that the players let the NBA business, the fame that comes with the business, alter their minds about the game," he said. "Sometimes I don't like being around the executives and politics that come with it. I hate that."

Durant's next destination in New York. He signed a four-year contract with the Brooklyn Nets this summer, and will team up with fellow All-Star Kyrie Irving.

Bahamian stars support Dorian effort

Sportsmen and women with Bahamas connections in the United States and Canada are among those pitching in to help victims of Hurricane Dorian in The Bahamas. Stars from the MLB and the NBA have joined the global outpouring of support with donations and appeals.

Houston Rockets guard Eric Gordon has launched a Hurricane Dorian relief fundraiser to assist recovery efforts. Gordon's mother and her family are descendants of the Abaco Islands in the Bahamas, which was decimated by Dorian.

Gordon, 30, has donated \$50,000 of his own money to the Abaco Outreach powered by SBP Bahamas recovery program. SBP is a non-profit disaster relief organisation started after 2005's Hurricane Katrina.

Deandre Ayton, the Phoenix Suns centre from Nassau, has pledged \$100,000 for relief efforts in a personal statement posted on his Twitter account.

Bahamian Olympian, Shaunae Miller-Uibo says she will contribute \$25,000

to assist two churches, one in Abaco and the other in Grand Bahama. She has also created a GoFundMe page for others to donate.

They join Sacramento Kings' Buddy Hield and Connecticut Sun forward Jonquel Jones, both also Bahamians, who have also donated a total of \$60,000 and launched GoFundMe efforts as well.

Meanwhile, Miami Marlins prospects and Bahamas nationals, Jazz Chisholm, (Miami's No. 4 prospect), and Ian Lewis were at Marlins Park last week for batting practice to assist in a relief drive by the club. Miami Minor Leaguer Anfernee Seymour also is from Bahamas. The club's goal is to "just create as much awareness as we can for our friends in the Bahamas," Marlins president of baseball operations Michael Hill said. "This whole homestead has been a concerted effort to try to bring as many supplies as possible to be able to help a hurricane-ravaged country."
