School starts in 2 weeks

The Department of Education Services, under the Ministry of Education, Youth, Sports, Agriculture and Lands have released a schedule of dates and important activities for the upcoming start of the new school term. These dates mark key activities such as the dates when each school will reopen for regular students, dates when Year 11 and 12 students can collect their final exam results and the orientation days for all new and transfer students. These dates are relevant to all government schools and institutions including the University College of the

Cayman Islands, primary and secondary level schools located on all three islands. Orientation Days are scheduled to provide new students and their parents with essential information for successful integration into the new learning environment. Parents are required to accompany their children to Orientation Day, which is mandatory to attend by any student entering a government school for the very first time.

Admirable Cayman performances at Pan American Games



The Cayman Islands had six athletes at the just concluded 2019 Pan American Games and they all gave admirable performances against world class opposition.

The 18th Pan Ams was a massive multi-sport event featuring close to 7,000 athletes from 41 countries competing in 39 sports with golden tickets to Tokyo 2020 available in 22 Olympic qualifiers. Bodybuilding and surfing made their Pan American Games debut.

Brett Fraser achieved the result he hoped for and qualified for his third Olympic Games. Fraser, the only gold medalist in Cayman's history at the Pan Am Games, finished his qualifying heat in the 100 metres freestyle with a time of 49.68 seconds. That meets the B-cut qualifying standard for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. Fraser's time was seventh-fastest out of 29 competitors. The 29 year-old Caymanian whose brother Shaun is also an Olympian, earned a gold medal in the 200m freestyle at the 2011 Pan Am Games. Brett competed in the 2008 and 2012 Summer Olympics.

Fraser made it into the B Final for the men's 50 metres freestyle in 22.74 seconds, a season's-best time. He just missed qualifying for the A Final by 0.04 seconds. In the final, Fraser's time of 23.42 seconds placed him eighth.

Fraser said: "It was good to be in the B Final race against some fast guys. It's strength training now and focusing on speed events and attention to details in and out of the water start almost immediately. I'm pretty happy with my performances and where I hoped I would be." He is now aiming to qualify for A standard races in Tokyo.

John Bodden was in the 400m freestyle. Bodden won his heat and set a personal best time of 4 minutes 04.34 seconds. In the 200m fly, Bodden also set a personal best time of 2:08.22. He was also in the 1500m free.

Lauren Hew was the third Cayman swimmer. She failed to qualify for the finals in the women's 200m free with a time of 2:14.50 and in the 100m freestyle her time was 1:01.38. Hew also

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EDITORIAL

Courtesy on the Road

The number one rule in driving is safety, but a very close second and mother to safety in many cases, is Courtesy. Be Courteous. This does not mean, give up your rights in all situations, that is not always safe. But it does mean that in many situations you should give up your right to be where you are, to the person trying to be there.

Courtesy, in driving, is not just letting someone in front of you or moving out of the way so they can pass. Sometimes it's NOT letting them do what they want. How is this a courtesy to them? It's not, directly anyway, but it could be very courteous to the other drivers which would be affected by your actions, and therefore courteous by forcing a safer behavior on first driver.

Let me explain these seemingly contradictory statements with a few examples.

You are cruising along in the number one lane (which is not a good practice) going faster than the traffic in the other lanes. You notice someone catching up from behind you. Courtesy demands that you move over, when possible, and let them pass. This is not a case where you should be forcing them to slow, "For their own safety". It is much safer for both you and the drivers in the other lanes, to safely move out of the way, than for you to force the obviously-in-a-hurry driver to weave through traffic to get by you.

If you are driving in any lane and are passed on the right (I'm in the US) then you are driving too slowly for the lane and courtesy demands you safely change lanes to the right. Now I shouldn't need to say this but it seems to be another common issue so, be intelligent. If the lane to your right does not continue in the direction you want to go then, obviously, don't change lanes. If your lane is stopped (i.e. traffic, accident) you are not required to



move over, although in this case you probably want to.

Although you may think it is courteous it allow people out of a parking lot, gas station, or side street, into the very busy street on which you are traveling, this is not always the case. You must check your surroundings, the other drivers on the road, and the traffic that will be affected. In other words, don't stop the flow of traffic, just to be nice. If letting a car in front of you when traffic is stopped causes the blockage of a right turn lane, you are actually causing more problems than you are solving. The driver waiting to turn into your lane was already waiting, all the traffic that was about to move off of the road (by making a right turn) now has to stop, which in turn causes more traffic, and more delays for everyone. Of course, the courteous driver waiting to turn, wouldn't take the half lane you provided and would continue waiting for a clear opening before pulling out.

There are many more examples that could be included. But we need to get to the rule.

The rule and the overall message here is: **Be courteous while driving.**

It's safer for everyone, even the ones in too big of a hurry to be courteous to you. 🌐

Government finances still going strong

Recently released figures show that Government's finances are still firmly in the black, due mainly to higher than forecast revenues from duties, fees and Government charges. For the six months ending 30 June 2019, the entire public sector (that is, core Government and statutory authorities and Government-owned companies) achieved a surplus of \$201 million, versus the budgeted amount of \$122 million, which equals to a 65 per cent higher than expected budget surplus.

In a statement, Government said that revenue from levies, duties, fees and government charges were recorded at \$499 million, which is \$51 million more than budgeted expectations.

One revenue stream that continues to provide a steady strong income for Government is that of levies on goods and services, including bank and

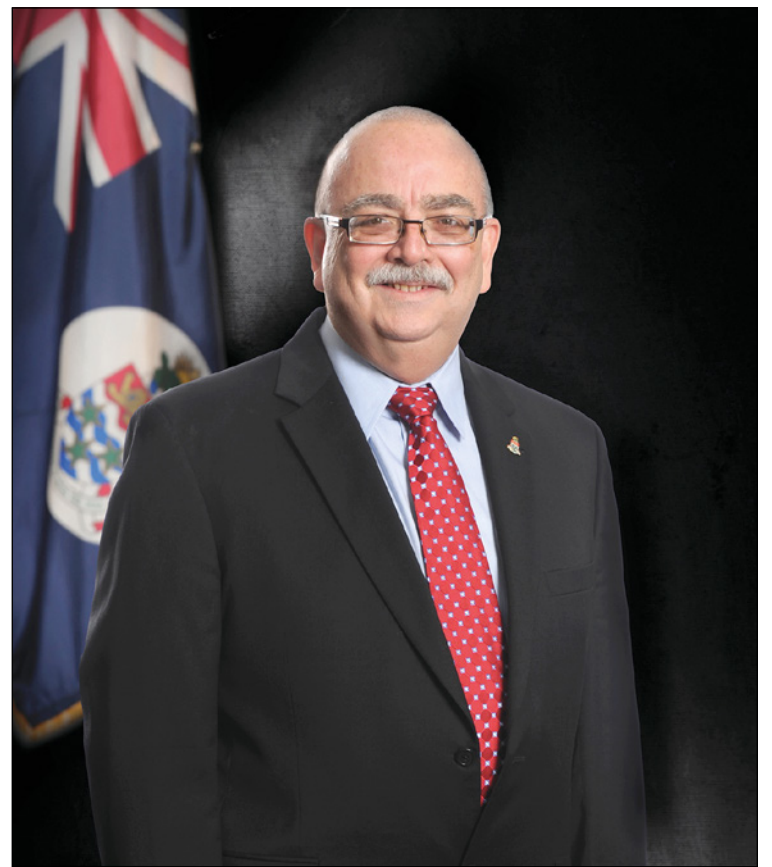
trust licences and tourist accommodation charges, which came in at \$20 million. In particular, tourism levies were up because of the continuation of record high visitor arrivals by air, which has played a significant part in pumping up Government revenue streams with stayover visitors paying Government taxes on their hotel stays. In addition, import duties reached \$18 million, and levies on property, primarily stamp duties on land transfers, stood at \$13 million.

Government said it was also sticking to its fiscal policy that has meant maintaining high cash and deposit balances held by core government. To this effect, operating cash and deposits were \$522 million at the end of the second quarter, while reserves and restricted deposits were \$168 million, resulting in a total cash and deposits balance of a healthy \$690 million. At the same time,

Government said it was keeping tight fiscal management of its prior borrowings so its debt position continues to be favourably impacted. There have been no new borrowings since 2011, they advised, and borrowings were being paid off, with \$13 million in debt principal repayments being made during the six-month period, \$10 million of which was repaid in the 1 April to 30 June period.

Finance and Economic Development Minister, Roy McTaggart, said he was pleased to see the continuing positive performance of the Entire Public Sector's finances.

"We will maintain prudent fiscal management and stewardship throughout the year to ensure that we generate a substantial surplus in government's finances at year-end, so that we can continue to pay off our debts and invest in government's priorities," he stated.

Young Men attend Risk Workshop

Globally, three times as many men as women commit suicide. Locally, 2007 data indicated that 19% of students had considered attempting suicide. Locally too, the majority of suicides are men, sometimes very young men or boys, and there is evidence that the number of suicides in the youth and young men category are on the increase.

Recently, the Alex Panton Foundation held a Young Men At Risk Workshop at South Sound Community Centre. It was facilitated by Dr. Erica Lam, a consultant clinical psychologist and volunteer with the Foundation. The presentation stimulated discussion and thought about the root causes of young men being so sad in our society. The Alex Panton foundation is a not-for-profit organisation with the primary objective of raising awareness of mental illnesses affecting children and young adults in the Cayman Islands with a particular focus on anxiety and depression. The Alex Panton Foundation aims to provide hope and resources to friends, family, teachers, classmates and careers to help save the lives of children and young adults struggling with mental illness.

The evening began with a video featuring local men talking frankly about issues which focused on male mental

health. Among them was Hon. MLA for Bodden Town, Dwayne Seymour who spoke about the challenges he had faced in his own life: "I tried doing the best that I could as a father, knowing that I didn't have a father, and I didn't know what to do; how to communicate with my son about X Y and Y. I didn't want to have to ask somebody, because that is embarrassing, But It's OK to reach out," he said.

As the evening unfolded, there was a lot of discussion from the dozen or so people who had come to the meeting at South Sound Community Centre about the issues being faced by young people, and young men in particular. Some people said that it was because men feel

that they have to be "Tough," and not show their feelings, whereas women generally are more able to tell someone. The statistics showed that, although women were more likely to seek some kind of help, it was men who were more successful in their suicide attempts. Reasons put forward for this included that men tended to act more impulsively, and more likely to follow through with action.

There was lots of talk too about role models for young men. Young boys have been brought up with the belief that to be a "real" man you have to be tough, one of the slides said. Throughout history, the male persona has been the epitome

of stoicism, strength and courage. Male heroes from childhood stories instill it in our culture, we were told, which means that men cannot show how they really feel.

After the discussion, there were some more slides, showing some of the possible practical solutions that may be able to help: It is OK for a dad to show emotions, both positive and negative, and to relate experiences of things they have been through, and how they managed to cope. It is important that from a young age we support boys to feel comfortable with expressing themselves and developing their mental resilience, we were told.

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THEN & NOW

This week the Caymanian Times launches a brand-new series taking a look at all aspects of life here in Cayman now, and as it was decades ago. Having recently celebrated the 60th anniversary of our Coat of Arms, we thought this a fitting exploration of how far we have come as a small nation.

An ever-evolving police service

One hundred and twelve years ago, ground-breaking legislation was enacted that would formally establish a police force in the Cayman Islands. In 1907 the first ever officers to police in Cayman were supervised by a British inspector, who oversaw four local constables. Their work was to keep the peace among the 5,000 or so inhabitants who lived in the islands, as well as oversee postal and customs duties and guarding short-term prisoners. Their daily demands included hoisting the Cayman Islands flag over government buildings every morning.

In 1925 Major Rodriguez (Roddy) Watler became known as Cayman's head of police. Mr Roddy knew everyone in Cayman and held down a multitude of jobs as well as the islands' top police officer, including lighthouse keeper, foreman of public works, head of immigration and warehouse keeper. He also ran the Home Guard in Cayman from 1942 to 1945. His bravery in saving lives during the hurricane of 1932 earned him the King George Silver Medal.

In 1957, while Cayman was still under Jamaica's rule, a contingent from the Jamaican police came to Cayman to restructure the police and create the formal position of Chief of Police. Two years later Cayman recruited its first female police officers, Zeldia Valerie Anderson and Marjorie McField. They were responsible for cases involving women and children.

The 1970s saw a new headquarters in George Town for the police and the next

decade saw even more growth for the organisation, in keeping with the new waves of immigrants moving to Cayman following the previous decade's introduction of key legislation that would form the basis of the islands' financial services industry. In 1983 HM the Queen visited Cayman and the police took on 'Royal' in their title as a result of the royal visit. In 1996 the police's professional code of conduct was written and implemented and the following year the word 'force' was replaced by 'service' to create the Royal

Cayman Islands Police Service or RCIPS. That same year officers' uniforms transitioned from the old khaki uniform to the modern white shirts and black pants with a red stripe with which we are familiar today.

A modern service

In 2000 there were 268 officers and 50 support staff and that year saw a cycle unit out on the beat wearing shorts, a new introduction to the RCIPS uniform. Specialist divisions were introduced to better manage crime, including the Air Operations Unit, the Joint Marine Unit and Uniform Support Group. In 2009 the Joint Marine Unit's fleet was bolstered by the arrival of the Tornado and Niven D boats and in 2010 the Air Operations Unit came into being, bringing a helicopter on board to help combat crime and keep the island safe. Its uses have been numerous and include border pro-

tection, emergency response, air ambulance capabilities support for Fire and Rescue services, firearms operations and disaster response.

In 2016 Police Commissioner Derek Byrne became Cayman's Chief of Police. In 2017, RCIPS officers answered 80 per cent of all emergency calls dispatched by the 9-1-1 Communication Centre, and 31,865 calls for service in total, encompassing both 9-1-1 dispatches and reports received through police stations. Today, officers and personnel work in a variety of roles, including emergency response, road and marine safety and enforcement, child protection, criminal investigation, intelligence, drug and firearm interdiction, border security, community outreach, finance and administration, and many others. Presently there are approximately 70 civilians and 404 police officers in the RCIPS.

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Emancipate Yourself- Remembering Rex Nettleford

'Can the world without anguish accept itself as **part this, part that, part the other** but totally human without one part of it trying to dominate the other? The idea of the **Caribbean** person being part-African, part-European, part-Asian, part-Native American but totally Caribbean is still a mystery to many in the North Atlantic which has been spoiled by the very hegemonic control it has had over empires and far-away real estate for half a millennium - and with the indulgences of a trade in slaves, slavery and colonialism acting in tandem.' Nettleford- Speech to the United Nations, March 26, 2007- on the occasion of the 200th Anniversary of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade.

'For all of us who tenant the Americas are the creatures of that awesome process of *'becoming'* consequent on the historic encounters between diverse cultures from both sides of the Atlantic in circumstances that, for all their negative manifestations, have forged tolerance out of hate and suspicion, unity within diversity, and peace out of conflict and hostility. The ongoing struggle by those who seek recognition and status in human terms demands from all with the gift of knowledge and insight, the commitment of self in the continuing development of humankind. For stronger than war, which dehumanizes, humiliates and destroys, is indeed the love of life.' Nettleford.

The power to create and innovate remains the greatest guarantee of respect and recognition. Nettleford.

The first of August was celebrated as Emancipation Day in many former British colonies. Emancipation day is also celebrated in some areas of the United States though on different dates.

For the more historically conscious Caribbean person it is time of reflection.

Certain historical moments require us to look back in order to look forward, to understand the past in order to shape the future more consciously. And no one knew this more and sought to impress on us all the need to understand historical continuities in order to create a more just and democratic society than Professor Rex Nettleford.

The Anglophone Caribbean was merely a small piece of what was later referred to as the 'New World' but was initially tenanted by indigenous peoples dating back to the times of Ancient Egypt in many instances. Later, it became a significant part of the Spanish Empire and an even more important part of the British Empire in the Europeanization project which began in 1492 and culminated with its most consequential event, the some 'four centuries of obscenities perpetrated in the pursuit of material gain, fueled by greed and the lust for power, and often under the guise of carrying out a civilizing mission said to be divinely ordained and even earlier sanctified by Papal edict' to quote Nettleford in his speech to the UN on the 200th anniversary of the ending of the slave trade.

It is difficult to find a person who understood the effects of past obscenities on the Caribbean psyche, the general consequences of the historic encounters between diverse cultures from both sides of the Atlantic, the struggle of Caribbean peoples for intellectual and cultural independence and identity and who has done more about it than Professor Rex Nettleford. The past and the present are always intertwined, the past interfacing with the present in both good and bad ways.

Nettleford, born in February 1933 was educated in British schools in Jamaica, pursued a history degree at the University College of the West Indies (London University) before moving on to post-graduate studies in politics as a Rhodes Scholar. He returned to his country where he launched a public intellectual and artistic career whose effects reverberated throughout the Caribbean and its diasporas' communities. He died in February 2011 of a massive heart attack while in New York in order to participate in a United Nations meeting about the state of global racial discrimination.

Nettleford was a man of big ideas and one who was always rooted in the Caribbean experience and indigenous epistemologies. Because of this, he was able to use his cultural and scholarly achievements to make nonsense of those who harbor the belief that indigenous creative works of art are not the equal of western masterpieces.

His work as a dancer, choreographer and the arts generally were used to promote awareness of self, of social change and to celebrate the African presence in the shaping of the Caribbean ethos.

He always insisted that the 'creative imagination lies beyond the reach of the vilest oppressor.'

Nettleford used the theatre as a tool of empowerment of the cultural expressions of the ordinary people of the Caribbean. He found meaning in the movement, vocabulary and aesthetics of the Afro-Caribbean syncretic religious expression. This explains why the Dance Company he formed, the National Dance Theatre Company of Jamaica, has such worldwide acclaim.

His brilliance was known universally. Oxford University honored him on the Rhodes Centenary in 2003 as one of the four Rhodes Scholars worldwide to be so honored.

The loss, some eight years ago, of this colossal Caribbean cultural icon, genius of a dancer appropriately described as incandescent eagle, orator, critic, intellectual, academic leader, unapologetic regionalist, consultant to Caribbean governments and to numerous international agencies including the World Bank and OAS is no reason for us to forget his stalwart contributions and his lasting, unending legacy.

'Man, you have seen a great tree put to the flame

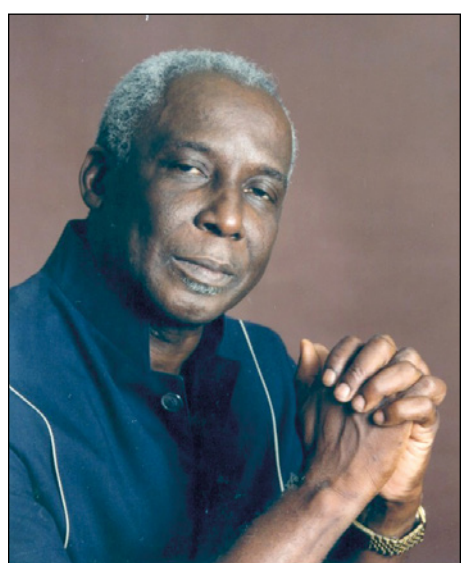

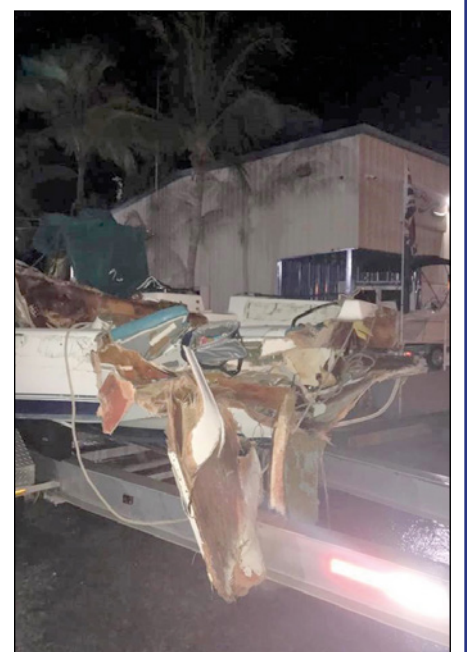

2 fatalities from serious Boating Incident in North Sound

Shortly before 10:00PM on Sunday 11 August, a report was received of a boating incident in the North Sound, off Prospect. It was reported that two vessels collided, causing one of the vessels to capsize. All three occupants of the capsized boat were uninjured and were able to return to shore.

The second vessel was located shortly afterwards and appeared to have sustained significant damage. Two persons, a man and a woman, were located aboard the vessel. The woman was taken to the Cayman Islands Hospital for treatment. The man was unresponsive and was subsequently pronounced dead.

The third occupant of the vessel, a man age 49 of George Town, was reported missing and was later found on Monday deceased.

competed in the 50m freestyle and was seventh in 27.13 seconds.

Sprinter Kemar Hyman was unable to qualify for the men's 100m finals, running 10:44 seconds. He finished third in his semi-final race but just missed out on a place in the finals. Hyman said: "I do feel disappointed about the time and me not qualifying for the finals." He added that he felt a little ill, "flu-ish" but was looking forward to the world championships in Doha at the end of August "to do something amazing for my country".

In sailing, Jesse Jackson after three sails in the dinghy class finished a credible 21st overall. Jackson had a slow start to his Pan American debut after facing multiple challenges on the first two days of the Games due to the wind conditions in Paracas Bay, Peru. He said: "Overall these Games are a big difference in terms of skill level, it was a really tough event. This venue isn't one of the easiest venues, very windy or no wind so it was a tough event."

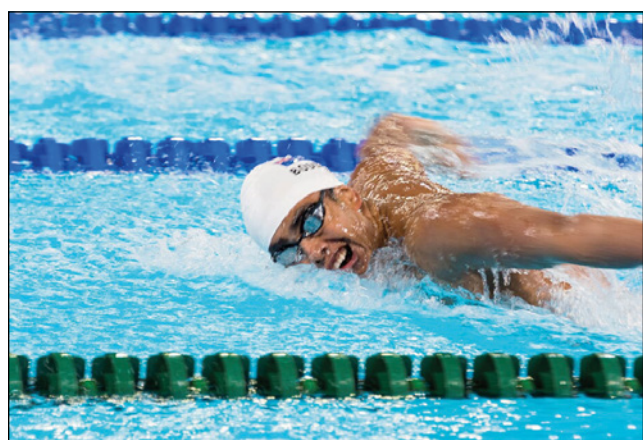
Jackson struggled with emotions during the first days of the races, having to complete at least three sails a day, a total of 10 qualifying races in five days. Jackson tallied 208 total points.

Gymnast Raegan Ruty has already shifted her focus from the 2019 Pan American Games to the upcoming World Artistic Gymnastics Championships in Germany, after she was unable to qualify for the individual apparatus finals two weeks ago.

"Not qualifying for finals was definitely disappointing. I really wanted to qualify and go in front of the audience again to show everyone what Cayman has to offer, but I definitely learned a lot from this competition," Ruty said.

The 17-year-old was the first athlete to compete for the Cayman Islands in Mixed Group 3 for the Artistic Gymnastics Women's Qualification Subdivision 1, alongside three athletes from Jamaica and two from the Dominican Republic.

Ruty needed to score in the top 24 to proceed to the finals, which includes Floor, Vault, Uneven Bars, Balance Beam and Individual All-Around. She placed an overall 38 out of 58 competitors. She was 40th in Vault, 49th in Uneven Bars, 48th in the Balance Beam and 46th in Floor.

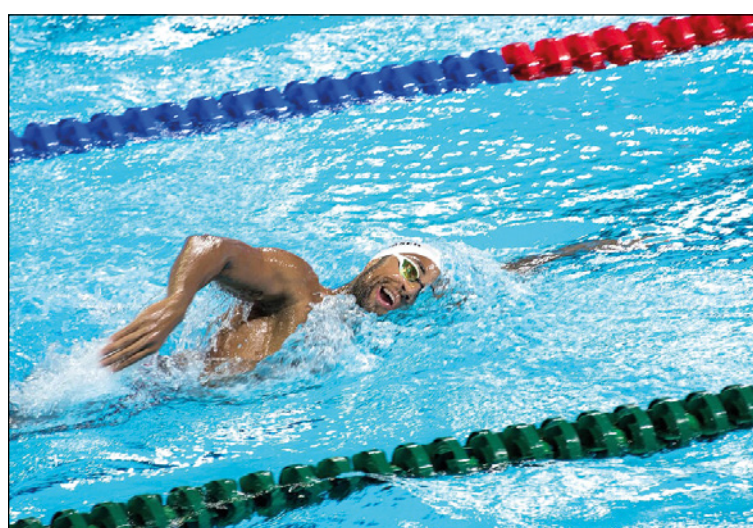

Brady, 42, signs two-year contract

Tom Brady has insisted for some time that he can play into his mid-40s and it appears the New England Patriots agree.

The 42-year-old quarterback has agreed to a two-year contract extension with the Patriots, with whom he has won six Super Bowls. The deal will pay Brady \$70m and will take him through to the end of the 2021 season. His career earnings are \$212m.

It was an open secret that Brady and the Patriots have been negotiating a new deal. The quarterback joked with reporters when he was asked if he deserved an extension recently. "Have I earned an extension? I don't know," he said. "That's up for talk show debate. What do you guys think? Should we take a poll?"

While Brady may not be at his peak anymore, he is still one of the league's best players. He was recently voted the sixth best player in the NFL by his peers and he led the Patriots to the NFL title in February, his second championship in three seasons.

The Patriots owner, Robert Kraft, said before this year's Super Bowl that he expected Brady to be his quarterback for the foreseeable future. "I would be quite surprised if he didn't continue for quite a while as our quarterback," Kraft said.

Such is the magic of Brady, no quarterback in the game's history can match his six championship rings, and despite his advanced age as he enters his 20th professional season, the five-time All-Pro isn't showing many signs of decline.

Brady was solid as ever last season, completing 65.8 percent of his passes for 4,355 yards, 29 touchdowns and 11 interceptions while earning his 10th straight Pro Bowl nod.

He could have gone out on top. But he plans to play until he's 45 and thanks to his intense workout regimen — chronicled in his 2017 book, 'The TB12 Method' the ageing process is not obvious.

"You've got to take care of your body — I wrote a book on it, literally," Brady said. "I live by it and I think it's given me pretty good results. I try to pass it on to the next generation, so they don't have to go on through the same mistakes that I did, but everyone learns different ways. Hopefully, I can be an inspiration. I got a great opportunity to prove to a lot of people that

didn't think I could do it. Hopefully, I can. Well done is better than well said."

Brady is nailing down the inspiration part, as his durability never ceases to amaze those who are around him practically every day. Take Brady's backup, Brian Hoyer, for instance, who at 33 years old is an NFL veteran in his own right. On Brady's birthday a few days ago, Hoyer texted his friend and teammate to wish him a happy birthday.

"I said, 'Hey, other than a few grey hairs, you seem just as young to me now as you were when I met you 11 years ago, and I really mean it,'" Hoyer said. "I think it's a proven fact that he really takes care of himself in every form or fashion ... workouts, preparation, what he eats, all those things." 🌐

Fraser-Pryce rockets to new Pan Am record

Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce looks better than ever after breaking the 40-year-old Pan Am Games 200 metres record in Lima, Peru. The two-time Olympic 100m champion clocked 22.43 seconds.

The 32-year-old Jamaican clipped two-hundredths of a second off American Evelyn Ashford's Games record of 22.45 set at San Juan, Puerto Rico in 1979.

Fraser-Pryce, aka "Pocket Rocket" who won Olympic titles in 2008 and 2012, beat Brazil's Vitoria Cristina Rose by almost two-tenths of a second with Bahamian Tynia Gaither third in 22.76.

American veteran sprinter Mike Rodgers didn't let the consistently cool weather at the Games slow him down too much in winning the men's 100m final with a time of 10.09 seconds.

Rodgers, 34, went ahead about two-thirds of the way into the race to beat Brazil's Paulo Andre de Oliveira (10.16) and Antigua's Cejhae Greene (10.23) on a chilly, overcast afternoon in Lima. 🌐

Brit makes instant Bills impact

A former British rugby player scored a sensational touchdown in a pre-season NFL match for the Buffalo Bills.

Former Wasps and England winger Christian Wade raced an astonishing 65 yards with his first carry on his Buffalo Bills debut.

Wade, 28, ran through a huge hole in the Indianapolis Colts defence to score in a 24-16 pre-season friendly victory.

The running back quit rugby union in October 2018 to pursue an NFL career, joining the Bills in April.

"I knew where I was going even before the ball came because they overloaded one side," said Wade. "Then as soon as I got the ball, I was off to the races. I was looking up at the screen to see if any of the linebackers or anyone was coming up behind me."

Wade was awarded the game ball by the Bills' head coach Sean McDermott. "Huge congratulations to Christian Wade," said Bills quarterback Josh Allen. "Watching him score that touchdown was one of the coolest experiences of my football career and I wasn't even on the field."

Wade, who was on the 2013 British and Irish Lions tour, said he was "lost for words" when his dream move to the NFL came closer to reality in the spring.

The International Player Pathway allows Wade to train with the Bills during pre-season and enter their practice squad for 2019 with the hope of making the Bills' 53-man regular season roster for this season, which starts in September.

He is third in the all-time rugby Premiership try-scorers list with 82 and has one England cap. 🌐

Joshua rematch in Saudi causes a stir

Britain's Anthony Joshua will face unified world heavyweight champion Andy Ruiz Jr in their rematch in Saudi Arabia on Dec. 7.

The pair fought in New York in June, with Ruiz scoring a shock seventh-round stoppage victory to hand Joshua his first professional loss.

Ruiz, who was knocked down in the third round before recovering, picked up the WBA, IBF, WBO and IBO world titles.

Cardiff's Principality Stadium had been among the options to host the rematch. Joshua, 29, had said his preference was to fight in the Welsh capital, where he has previously fought in front of crowds of more than 70,000.

However, Ruiz, who was born in the United States but has Mexican heritage, refused to fight in the UK.

Human rights campaigners have questioned the choice of venue, citing Saudi Arabia's "abysmal" human rights record.

Amnesty International said Joshua should learn about conditions in the country and "be prepared to speak out" on the issue.

Amnesty UK's head of campaigns Felix Jakens said the heavyweight contest was "likely to be yet another opportu-

nity for the Saudi authorities to try to 'sports wash' their severely tarnished image".

Saudi Arabia hosted British boxer Amir Khan's recent win over Billy Dib and Callum Smith's success over George Groves in the World Boxing Super Series final in September. Khan earned about \$7.5m for facing Dib, at five times more than he would have earned for facing him elsewhere.

The country also hosted the opening race of the Formula E season in December, is in talks to host a Formula 1 race before 2021 and recently announced it will stage the richest race in horse racing history in February.

"Despite some long-overdue reforms on women's rights, Saudi Arabia is currently in the grip of a sweeping human rights crackdown - with women's rights activists, lawyers and members of the Shia minority community all being targeted," Jakens added.

"There's been no justice over the gruesome murder of Jamal Khashoggi, and the Saudi-led military coalition in Yemen is carrying out indiscriminate attacks on homes, hospitals and market-places with horrific consequences for Yemeni civilians.

"As with other sporting stars going to Saudi Arabia, we'd call on Joshua to inform himself of the human rights situation and be prepared to speak out about Saudi Arabia's abysmal human rights record."

As the fighters are sharing a purse of around \$75m, more than twice they

would earn for fighting elsewhere, they are unlikely to voluntarily change venues.

Meanwhile, Joshua has posted images of himself in training and he looks less muscled leading to comments that he looks more like a boxer now than a bodybuilder. 🌐
