RCIPS issues warning on Mystery Shopper Scams



The RCIPS Financial Crime Investigation Unit is issuing a warning to the public regarding scams being run under the guise of mystery shopping promotions.

What is Mystery Shopping?

Retailers (primarily in the USA and other jurisdictions) hire third-party companies to evaluate the quality of service in their stores. This is often done using mystery shoppers. Mystery shoppers are persons who are instructed to make a particular purchase or use a particular service in a store or restaurant and then report on the experience. Typically the mystery shopper is either reimbursed for the purchase or can keep the items purchased, and also receives a small additional payment.

Mystery Shopper Scams Locally

The current scams involve residents being targeted via social media by dishonest promoters who create the im-

Cayman's first Governor passes


Veteran resident and Cayman's first former Governor Mr Athelstan Charles Ethelwulf Long, CBE, passed away at the end of July, an individual who made a significant contribution to the islands during his long life time.

Mr Long served as Administrator from 1968 until 1971. That title then changed to Governor, which Mr Long held until 1972. Once he left the position of Governor, Mr Long chose to keep his close ties with the Cayman Islands, serving as chairman of International Management Group, chairman of the Public Service Commission and deputy chairman of the Public Service Pension Board.

Premier Alden McLaughlin described Mr Long as "a dear friend to the people of the Cayman Islands" and said he served these islands well.

Acting Governor Franz Manderson advised that as a sign of respect for Mr Long's passing and his distinguished service to both the UK and the Cayman Islands, the flags of both countries would be flown at half-mast on all Government buildings for the day following his passing.

Prior to holding his prestigious position in the Cayman Islands, Mr Long had held a distinguished former military officer, spending three years as a prisoner



of war during World War II. He turned then diplomat after hostilities ended. In this capacity he served as the last Administrator of the Cayman Islands from 1968. Shortly before his departure three years later the title changed to Governor.

Mr Manderson confirmed: "With his passing the Cayman Islands has lost a friend and advocate of many decades. Mr Long's abiding love for these Islands and their people led him to return to the Cayman Islands five years after his tenure ended. Here he has remained ever since taking an active role in the community, in particular in the Veterans Association."

During these years he also served as an invaluable resource for his successors in the position of Governor, Mr Manderson said.

To commemorate the life and achievements of Mr Long, the UK and Cayman flags will fly at half-mast again from two days before his funeral (the date of which is still to be confirmed).

Mr Long was 100 years old.

CAYMAN ISLANDS TRAUMA TEAM SAVES IMPALED CAR ACCIDENT VICTIM

Injured man walks out of the hospital just one week after a fence pole went through his chest

Not many people can say they saw a pole go through their chest and lived to tell the tale. Nicholas Connor, age 30, was gravely injured when the car he was driving ran into a chain link fence, thrusting a steel pole through his body. A call to 911 from a chance passerby, and the subsequent response by emergency services personnel and world-class surgeons at Health City Cayman Islands saved his lifeon that early morning.

With every second vital for his survival due to the severe trauma and blood loss, and with the pole still in his chest and protruding through his back, Connor was freed from his vehicle by the fire brigade then taken for initial assessment at the Cayman Islands Health Services Authority's (HSA) George Town

With his injuries deemed immediately life-threatening by the Emergency Room doctors at the HSA, Connor was then rushed to Health City, the Cayman Islands' sole local tertiary care facility. As a super-specialty tertiary care hospital and trauma center, Health City had a multi-disciplinary team of surgeons assembled in minutes to await the patient's arrival.

Dr. Binoy Chattuparambil, Health City's Clinical Director and Chief Cardiac Surgeon, got the early morning call: "I was at home sleeping. At 2:30am I got a call from the government hospital that there was an urgent case. Somebody got into an accident and an iron pipe had gone through the chest - through and through."

Dr. Chattuparambil described Connor's condition upon arriving at the hospital's new 24-hour Level 3 Trauma Center: "He was lying on one side with a very big iron pipe through the chest and coming out of his back and he could not lie down. He was awake and it was very scary for him and his parents, who were there with his brother."

Connor's injury was so serious and unusual that despite many years of collective experience, this was the first time the surgical team at Health City had seen such a complicated case.

"I realized we didn't havemuch time to waste. Immediately, we had to do a CT scan - at least to know what structures were pierced while the pipe had gone through. The problem was, this pipe was projecting [out of his body] on both sides. He will not go through the CT scan," Dr. Chattuparambil described.

In order to assess the injuries Dr. Chattuparambil had to request the help of the fire brigade to trim the pole still stuck in Connor's chest so he could fit inside the Computerized Tomography (CT) scan machine.

Sedated, Connor was wheeled outside so the Cayman Islands Fire Services' specialized equipment could be used to cut more of the pole away from his body. He was then whisked back inside for the scan, which revealed that the pole had not damaged any of the major blood vessels. However, it had badly damaged his lung and around six or seven ribs were broken in multiple places. His right elbow was also completely shattered.

Immediately after the scan was done Health City's surgical team jumped into action.

The anesthesia team, led by Medical Director, Senior Consultant and Cardiac Anesthesiologist Dr. Dhruva Krishnan, intubated the patient while he was lying on his side and isolated the injured right lung with a double lumen endotracheal

Dr. Krishnan recognized the urgency: "We were racing against time. He was stable but his oxygen levels could have dropped any time and this injury could have gotten worse. And, there were tubes and lines we had to place when he was in that very precarious position. A special tube called w-mint was used to ventilate the left lung so the injured right lung could be deflated to enable surgical repair."

While the main priority was extracting the pipe from the patient's chest, Dr. Chattuparambil called in orthopedic surgeons - Dr. NiranjanNagaraja and Dr. Ravi Kiran - to treat the shattered ribs.

A long and complicated procedure repaired the lung and the ribs, enabling Connor to eventually breathe without mechanical assistance.

Dr. Krishnan praised the efficiency of the multidisciplinary surgical team and the remarkable efforts of the nurses and physiotherapists who worked overtime to keep Connor alive and stable.

"We needed at least 10 people to mobilize him from the triage to the CT Scan room and to the CT Scan gantry very delicately," he said.

Being able to see and analyse the injuries caused by the pole was key to successful treatment.

Dr. SharathBabu, Consultant Radiologist, said the radiology specialists at Health City were skilled professionals backed by "tremendously experienced technicians who could get the best images making it easier for the surgeons to operate."

The care provided was so efficient that Connor spent only two days in the Intensive Care Unit before being discharged from the hospital just a week later. Amazingly, he was able to walk out of the hospital on his own.

After his incredible recovery, Connor recalled the outcome of that dreadful

day: "The surgeons did a very good job repairing seven ribs that were broken and my lung that was punctured. They told me that I am a lucky man and I give thanks to God. It could have been worse."

Dr. Chattuparambil was delighted by the excellent outcome considering the degree of difficulty and complexity of the case.

"I was really happy that we have a very good team to treat this kind of complex case, because these are the cases nobody will have experienced. [In fact] I'm seeing this for the first time. But as a tertiary care trauma center, our multi-specialty team is available 24/7 to treat this kind of patient. It is a very satisfying case, as it was very difficult and went very well. I am very glad," he said.

As for Connor, this dramatic episode was his first experience at Health City Cayman Islands and he says he will remain grateful to the team there for saving his life.

They encourage you and they show you how lucky you are, and how good God is to you. That's why you're still alive. And you know, they are very nice people. I love them," he said. ③

The midwives at the Woman's Health Centre, West Bay Health Centre and Bodden Town Health Centre offer free postnatal care and home visits for all patients. They can provide general and breastfeeding support as necessary.

Parents can also seek assistance from the Cayman Islands Breastfeeding Support Group, a volunteer organisation that meets regularly to offer free support and education in breastfeeding to expecting and existing mothers. The group

RCIPS Financial Crime Unit Issues Warning on Mystery Shopper Scams

pression that mystery shopping jobs are a gateway to high-paying jobs.

The victims will receive a request from someone they believe to be a friend or person known to them. This is often done using hacked social media accounts.

They will subsequently be contacted by the person via Messenger and then "hired" to be mystery shopper, with their first assignment being to evaluate a money transfer service such as Western Union or MoneyGram.

As part of this process a request will be made for personal details including name, phone number, and address, as well as personal bank account details, in order to receive the funds that the scammer claims will be used to evaluate the transfer service.

The victim will be told to check their account for a transfer of the funds that will then be used to evaluate the money transfer service. These funds are transferred from another account that often has also been hacked.

Alternatively, persons may be given a cheque and instructed to deposit it in their personal bank account. In these cases the cheque is usually fake. Unfortunately, uncovering a fake check can take weeks, and in the meantime it may seem that the check is cleared and the money has been posted to the affected person's account.

Finally, the victim will be told to withdraw the cash and use the money transfer service to send it to a third party, in order to evaluate the quality of the ser-

In either case, the person who deposited the check and/or withdrew funds

that were transferred to their account will be held responsible for reimbursing the bank once the discrepancy is discov-

The FCU Recommends:

In order to protect yourself against these scams, the FCIU is offering the following reminders and recommendations to the public:

- · Keep in mind that becoming a mystery shopper for a legitimate company does not cost anything.
- Don't respond to mystery shopper promoters who advertise for mystery shoppers in local newspaper classifieds, via email, or on social media (Messenger / Facebook).
- · Do not click on any links contained in emails, and never provide your banking or personal details to anyone via social media or over the phone

- · Ignore any request to deposit a cheque or to withdraw funds transferred to your account. Report such requests to your bank immediately.
- Never transfer money to a third party who you do not know.
- Once the scam is discovered, contact your financial institution immediately.
- It is encouraged that you keep all original documents, emails, withdrawal and wire transfer forms and any other logs of communication.

Because scams and fraudulent websites can emerge and change very quickly, individuals are encouraged to report any suspicions of possible internet scams by filing a complaint with the police or FCU regardless of whether a loss is suffered.



Jesse Jackson Rigs Up for Pan American Debut

Cayman Islands lone sailor, Jesse Jackson, 20, is preparing for his five days of Laser Standard competition, starting on Saturday, 3 August in Paracas Bay, Peru, a four-hour drive south of the main venues in Lima, Peru.

Jackson and his coach, Raphael Harvey have spent the last few days acclimatizing to the weather and sea conditions in Paracas.

"Overall the training has been going good. Since there is a lack of wind in the morning [...] we go in the water in the afternoon. We tend to work on our own, to fine-tune our boat speed, make sure everything is good, and once we do that, we join the larger group, which consists of all the sailors that are at the [Pan American Games]."

Jackson will be up against 22 athletes from around the Pan Am region in Laser Standard. More than 165 athletes from 26 countries will compete in different sailboat classes at Lima 2019.

"Being with such a large group of international sailors is always great. I get to compare and see where I am currently at, what I have improved on since the last time and what I need to work on to consistently improve, so I can eventually get to the top."

Relatively new to sailing and with only six years under his belt, Jackson is getting ready to sail at his first Pan American Games and his largest Games to date.

"Overall, I have set myself some technical sailing goals I want to achieve in each race and by achieving these goals [...] this will allow me to sail faster and better."

For more than 2,000 competitors, the Pan American Games may come with some added pressure, as it will serve as a qualifying event to the Tokyo 2020 Olympics. Jackson is navigating his course to the Summer Olympic Games, with the Pan American Games as a pit stop.

"These Games are an Olympic qualifier and there is one spot available [in Sailing] for the North American region, but there are nine countries here from the North American Region, who have not qualified for the Olympics. Overall it does add a little bit of pressure, once I stay focused, stay in



tune and try to build on my sailing goals, I believe that anything can happen and I can qualify for the Olympics out here."

Before attending these Games, Jackson had been training intensely for 7 weeks at the Viana Sailing Camp in Portugal, alongside Olympians from Seychelles.

"At the sail base, we typically sail in the mornings due to the lack of wind and in the afternoons if there is [wind] anywhere from 15 to 25 knots we go out sailing, which means great endurance training for the legs and hiking."

Jackson also took part in several international regattas over the past few months, Croatia in December 2018, the USA in January and Peru in March. Jackson has also competed in regattas with his college sailing team at Solent University in Southampton, England.



After the Pan American Games, Jackson is scheduled to travel to Canada to compete in the World Championships in August, in hopes to qualify for the Olympics, if unsuccessful in Peru.

Jackson will be Cayman's second athlete to compete at Lima 2019; swimmers John Bodden, Lauren Hew and Brett Fraser will begin their competitions on Tuesday, 6 August.

Bodden will be the first of the three to compete, slated for the 400m freestyle, 200m butterfly and 1500m freestyle. Hew and Fraser start their events on Wednesday, 7 August, competing in the 200m freestyle and 100m butterfly, respectively, with both also competing in the 100m and 50m freestyle.

Sprinter Kemar Hyman will also be competing on 6 August, in the prelims for the 100m.

Jamaica Ready to Exit IMF Arrangement

International Monetary Fund (IMF) Resident Representative, Dr Constant Lonkeng Ngouana, says Jamaica has made tremendous progress over the last six years and is now ready to exit its current arrangement with the Washington-based financial institution.

"Jamaica has reached a place where we don't need to be here all the time. We are taking the back seat and Jamaica is in the driver's seat....With what Jamaica has achieved over the past six years, we believe Jamaica is ready to exit the IMF and run its own business," he said

Jamaica's current programme with the IMF is scheduled to officially end in November. The country will, however, continue to benefit from technical assistance.

"When Jamaica exits the financial support of the IMF, there will still be that consultation, which we do for the United States, United Kingdom, all our member countries. But it is not going to be the same [arrangement] of setting the targets and monitoring," Dr Ngouana said

"We will offer our advice through technical assistance and so on, but not the heavy monitoring," he continued, adding that this is "a sign of maturity" and



confidence in Jamaica's ability to manage its own affairs

In the meantime, Dr Ngouana praised the efforts of successive administrations, since 2013, in turning the Jamaican economy around, and noted the seamless continuity of the IMF programme across Administrations.

"Up to 2011, Jamaica was in and out of IMF programmes...[and] there wasn't a steady process. Since

2013, which is believed to be the turning point...Jamaica acknowledged the problem and said, 'we need to fix this'," he noted.

Dr Ngouana noted that the turnaround is "huge", citing the reduction in public debt and unemployment, increase in the foreign reserve, rise in business and consumer confidence, and the success of the stock market, which is the "best performing on earth".

He commended the Government for the measures being put in place to ensure that the gains achieved under the economic reform programme (ERP) are preserved.

These include work to establish the proposed independent fiscal council to monitor the Government's economic programme and fiscal rule framework; modernizing the Bank of Jamaica; and putting in place a policy framework for disaster-risk financing and macro-fiscal capacity.

Jamaica's latest relationship with the IMF started in 2013 when the country entered into a four-year US\$932 million Extended Fund Facility (EFF). That ended in 2016 when it was replaced by a US\$1.6-billion Precautionary Stand-By Arrangement.

Qatar Wants in on Guyana Oil and Gas Deal with Total, But the Government has Questions

The Guyana government says it's reviewing an agreement that Qatar's state-owned oil company, Qatar Petroleum (QP) has reached with Total, to acquire a stake in the French energy giant's two oil and gas blocks offshore the CARICOM nation.

QP announced the deal on Monday, saying it would hold 40 per cent of Total's 25 per cent participating interest in the Orinduik block, and 40 per cent of Total's 25 per cent participating interest in the neighbouring Kanuku.

Tullow Oil operates Orinduik and Repsol operates Kanuku.

In making the announcement, CEO of Qatar Petroleum Saad Sherida Al-Kaabi said: "We are pleased to expand our global exploration footprint into Guyana together with our valuable, long-term partner, Total, in these offshore blocks in this prospective basin.

"We hope that the exploration efforts are successful. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our partners and the government of Guyana for their collaboration in this effort, and we look forward to working together in these blocks."

But Director of the Department of Energy in Guyana, Dr Mark Bynoe says the deal is "substantially unclear".

"What we're finding here is Qatar Petroleum seeking to back into the Total agreement. But we can't go further than that because it is still early days," he said, adding that the authorities are in discussion with the co-venturer "so we can have greater clarity".

Bynoe said the Government had received a transaction letter from Total and is studying the document.

"Until such time that we understand the full implications...we're not about to pronounce thereon," he added.

Guyana's Election Body Gets a New Chairman

Justice Claudette Singh has been selected as the new Chairperson of the Guyana Elections Commission, (GECOM), succeeding retired Justice James Patterson, who stepped down from the position last month after the Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) ruled that his appointment was unconstitutional.

Justice Singh was selected from the list of nominees presented to President David Granger by Opposition Leader Bharrat Jagdeo, during what had been termed the 'hammering out' process, instructed by the CCJ during its final consequential ruling.

According to a release from the Ministry of the Presidency, Granger met Jagdeo last Friday to continue meeting to select a final list of six nominees. The statement said the president received and reviewed the list.

"In a bid to bring the selection process to a speedy and favourable conclusion, the process of selection by the president was done swiftly. This is aimed at ensuring that the Elections Commission could resume its normal functions and conduct general and regional elections in the shortest possible time," the statement said.

The Guyana Constitution states that the GECOM Chairman is to be appointed by the President from a list of six persons, not unacceptable to the President, submitted by the Leader of the Opposition

In the process leading up to Justice Patterson's appointment, three lists were submitted for consideration by Jagdeo, but President Granger rejected them all because he did not think the nominees' qualifications and experience conformed to the requirements outlined in the Constitution or that they met the criteria he had set out in a 'Statement of Qualities of the Chairman of the GECOM' submitted to the Leader of the Opposition

The President had advised Jagdeo that he would select a chairman himself, which is provided for by the Constitution if the Leader of the Opposition fails to present a suitable nominee. But the CCJ said stressed that "an onus is placed on the President not to find a nominee unacceptable merely because the nominee is not a choice the President would have himself made; the President should only find a nominee unacceptable for some good reason on objective grounds". It was also found that the President could

not, as a precondition to considering a nominee, include eligibility requirements that were additional, or different, from those stated in the Constitution.

It was on that basis that the CCJ ruled Patterson's appointment was flawed.

His successor, Justice Singh, has over 40 years of experience in the legal field.

She was called to the Bar in London in 1973 and admitted to the Bar in Guyana in 1976. She is among five Guyanese women to have been appointed Senior Counsel. The new GECOM chair has also served as the Deputy Solicitor General, as a Puisne Judge and a Justice of Appeal.






