
Tony's Toys Celebrates 20th Anniversary with Car Giveaway

After graduation, what's next?

The Principal and staff of the Layman Scott High School have just completed their 2019 graduation ceremonies and the Clifton Hunter and John Gray High Schools will hold their ceremonies in six weeks. As usual these events will be well attended and supported by the Community.

It was a very important event for teachers and students as high school graduation is seen as the first major milestone in a person's educational process.

The media will record standing room only attendances at these important events and with full coverage on the local television station others were also be able to support their family and friends in the privacy of their homes.

Some students will attend Colleges and Universities while others will seek employment. Unfortunately, after all the celebration has taken place these inexperienced job seekers will be faced with the task of finding gainful employment in an environment where unemployment among school leavers is at relatively high levels.

In Cayman Brac in the past parents were concerned with this situation and believe that more can be done to assist these school leavers.

"This is tough for our kids as experience is trumping the cause. While they get a bit of internship too many have to move to Grand Cayman after University," said a Cayman Brac Parent.

"I am not sure because employers want experienced workers," says a Cayman Brac graduate.

"There's little scope for work here on the Brac even after attending university and finding a job is tough."

Internship Program

An internship is a method of onthe-job training for college or university students, high school students, or post-graduate adults. These positions may be paid or unpaid and are usually temporary.



Generally, an internship consists of an exchange of services for experience between the student and an organization. Students can also use an internship to determine if they have an interest in a particular career, create a network of contacts or gain school credit. Some interns find permanent, paid employment with the organizations for which they worked. This can be a significant benefit to the employer as experienced interns often need little or no training when they begin regular employment. Unlike a trainee program, employment at the completion of an internship is not guaranteed.

We applaud the Water Authority and other corporations for welcoming a new round of interns participating in the Summer Internship Programme. A total of twenty-one students will participate in their 2019 programme the authority advised.

With over 3,000 registered local businesses in a country with a workforce of approximately 40,000, it is difficult to understand why many graduates still find it difficult to find placement in internship programs.

The Future of the Cayman Islands lie in the hands of our children and their development and placement in the workforce are the responsibilities of all. They deserve full support and if you can't attend these important ceremonies make an attempt to support the employment efforts of these ambitious graduates. 😚

2019 CAYMAN ISLANDS NATIONAL ROBOTICS TEAM ANNOUNCED

In October 2019, 11 students will make the journey of a lifetime to compete in the FIRST Global Challenge as the Cayman Islands National Robotics

Caylem Hill and Jack McGregor (Cayman International School), Pierce Serrant (Cayman Islands Further Education Centre), Xaria Deosaran and Adrian Phillips-Hernáez (Cayman Prep and High School), Craig Maitland and Edmund Pileta (Clifton Hunter High School), Oscar Martinez (Grace Christian Academy), Samuel White (John Gray High School), and Kieran Finch and Nilakni Jayasekera (St. Ignatius Catholic School) will travel to Dubai, UAE, to compete in the international robotics tournament from 24 to 27 October.

The students qualified for nomination to the National Team following their participation in the "Rover Ruckus" FIRST Technical Challenge held in May at the Camana Bay Arts & Recreation Centre. Following the local competition, teachers and teammates were encouraged to nominate students who best exemplified excellence in technical ability, critical thinking, communication, collaboration, and task organisation for consideration.

Dart Senior Manager Education Programmes Glenda McTaggart says the nominated students went through a rigorous selection process.

"Nominees were evaluated for their commitment to their school's robotics programme and the level of teamwork, collaboration, sportsmanship and leadership demonstrated during their participation in the "Rover Ruckus" tournament," she says, explaining that the shortlisted nominees were then interviewed by a panel consisting of two science teachers and two sponsor representatives

"The students chosen to represent Cayman internationally are passionate about STEM and they convinced the selection committee that they will make the most of this opportunity to work as team to build an amazing robot and represent their country on the world's stage," McTaggart says.

Alongside McTaggart, technical mentors supporting the team as they build their robot and compete in Dubai include: Von Ryan Abrantes (St. Ignatius Catholic School), Allison Smith (Cayman Prep and High School) and Namitha Abraham (Caribbean Utilities Company).

FIRST Things First

FIRST robotics programming was officially introduced to the Cayman Islands earlier this year through a partnership with Aureum Re, Caribbean Utilities Company (CUC), Digicel, and Health City Cayman.

Dart Chief Executive Officer Mark Van-Develde says the five companies share a common goal in ensuring the next generation is prepared to fill the jobs of the future.

"The mission of Minds Inspired is to provide our young people with unique STEM learning experiences that prepare them for the careers of the future and the challenges of tomorrow. This partnership leverages our combined financial resources and diverse areas of expertise to create learning and innovation opportunities for middle and high school students" he says, adding that Dart's focus on STEM is rooted in the Dart family's belief that these subjects are fundamental building blocks for success in school and life.

Each of the sponsoring companies is associated with one of the STEM subjects: Health City Cayman Islands represents science, Digicel represents technology, CUC represents engineering, and Aureum Re represents mathematics.

"As Cayman's economy continues to evolve, the local demand for STEM jobs – and to be more specific for jobs which use robotics and artificial intelligence – will continue to increase," VanDevelde says. "Our organisations share a common goal in ensuring our young people are prepared to fill those roles."

Let the Games Begin

Considered the Olympics of robotics, the FIRST Global Challenge is themed around the 14 Grand Challenges of Engineering identified by the National Academy of Engineering and empowers young people to use STEM to solve global problems like access to clean water and sustainable energy resources.

McTaggart says this year's theme – "Ocean Opportunities" – is particularly relevant to the Cayman team.

"This year's game brings attention to the global challenge of ocean pollution," she explains. "The robot the team designs will need to be able to remove 30 micro pollutants and 50 macro pollutants, represented by small and large foam balls, from the playing field."

The team will score points by transferring the pollutants to two types of processing areas located in the ocean—the processing barge and the reduction processing hub. The teams score points by depositing pollutants on the three levels – recover, recycle, reuse – each representing different degrees of processing.

In keeping with the collaborative spirit of FIRST, while each team is responsible for keeping its own shoreline clear of pollutants, they must join forces to protect the ocean. Just as in the FIRST Technical Challenge, the Cayman team will have the opportunity to work as part of alliances with teams representing more than 175 nations.

"FIRST is guided by the philosophies of 'Gracious Professionalism' and 'Coopertition' which teach students that fierce competition and mutual gain are not separate notions, and that teams can and should help each other even as they compete,' McTaggart says. "FIRST is more than robots, it's about transforming lives through STEM."



Seven Mile Public Beach Enhancement Project

Work on the final phase of a \$3 million project undertaken by Dart in collaboration with the Cayman Islands Government, to enhance the recreational areas at Seven Mile Public Beach, is scheduled to begin 1 August.

The enhancement project was included in the Third Amendment to the National Roads Authority Agreement between the Cayman Islands Government and Dart.

Earlier this year, Dart completed the surrender of its leasehold interests in the parcels of land to the east of Seven Mile Public Beach to the Government.

The third and final phase of the on-going project will focus on upgrades to the existing parking areas, including the addition of designated food vendor parking spots. During this time, temporary parking will be made available on the empty lot to the east of the existing parking lot.

With the completion of the third phase, private vehicles will no longer be able to drive directly on to the beach. This decision was made to ensure the safety of all beach users going forward and prevent future instances of reckless driving near the cabanas and soccer pitch.

The on-going works include the addition of new walking paths around the existing children's playground, improvements to the volleyball courts, and the construction of a new vendor area and restroom block.

Public Lands Commission Chief Inspector Winsome Prendergast says the new vendor area will allow the regulatory body to better manage commercial activity on Public Beach.

"The redevelopment of the Seven Mile Beach Park will better facilitate public use of the beach for recreational purposes as intended," Prendergast says.



"All approved vendors will, where practical, be relocated and restricted to the

purpose-built Vendor Village designated area or the car park, to the benefit of beach goers."


The plan also includes the removal of invasive species and replacement with 13 species of native and indigenous plant species including: mahogany (Swietenia mahogany), sea grape (Coccoloba uvifera), plop nut (Thespesia populnea), cocoplum (Chrysobalanus icaco), sea lavender (Argusia gnaphalodes), and bay candlewood (Borrichia arborescens).

Currently, the new southern pathway is open and the Mobi-mat has been temporarily relocated to ensure continued beach access for persons with disabilities. Throughout the project, the public is still able to access and book the beach cabanas.



Minister Rivers Discusses Tax and Regulation with US Lawmakers

Financial Services Minister Tara Rivers visited the US Capitol in Washington, DC last week, where she described the Cayman Islands' financial services industry and emphasised Cayman's leadership role in combatting money laundering and ensuring tax transparency in meetings with Justin Muzinich, the Deputy Secretary of the United States Treasury, US Senators, Members of Congress, senior Congressional staff, and other federal agency officials.

This trip followed her visit to Washington last year, when Minister Rivers attended similar meetings on Capitol Hill, and with the US Treasury and State departments. The meetings are part of the Government's ongoing engagement efforts in the US, intended to ensure that decision-makers in the US Congress are aware of the longstanding beneficial relationship in financial services between the US and Cavman.

In addition to continuing the discussions about Cayman's culture of transparency and regulatory compliance, Minister Rivers provided valuable information to US lawmakers regarding Cayman's strong beneficial ownership identification regime. Members of Congress and staff are considering legislation that would establish new beneficial ownership collection requirements for the US similar to those already in place in Cavman.

'These meetings are critical in explaining to US lawmakers the facts about Cayman's financial services industry, and the significant and effective role Cayman plays in the fight against money laundering and other financial crimes', Minister Rivers said.

'We also offered the US Congress and US Treasury the benefit of our experience in implementing beneficial ownership laws, should they take the next step in corporate compliance by making disclosure of company ownership to the US government mandatory', she said.

Minister Rivers and her delegation met with Senator Tim Scott, Chairman of the Senate Banking Committee's Financial Institutions Subcommittee, and member of the Senate Finance Committee. Minister Rivers briefed Senator Scott on Cayman's strong record in adopting and enforcing international standards for both tax transparency and anti-money laundering.

Meeks have responsibility for drafting and enacting laws that regulate US banks, investment firms, and credit

The Cayman delegation also met with Rep. Yvette Clarke, Co-Chair of the Congressional Caucus on the Caribbean, and senior staff members of Rep. Maxine Waters, Chairwoman for the House Financial Services Committee, senior Democratic and Republican staff members of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Senate Finance Commit-

'For many years, the Cayman Islands has worked closely with the United States to share critical information to prevent tax evasion, money laundering, and terrorist financing. We cooperate with the US Treasury and Internal Revenue Service, to ensure that companies and US persons doing business in Cayman are compliant with their home country's laws', Minister Rivers said.

In addition to congressional outreach, the Cayman delegation also participated in meetings with high-ranking officials from the U.S. Department of State and the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, the primary regulator for nationally chartered US banks.

Through these meetings, we have taken significant steps to dispel harmful myths about the Cayman Islands', Minister Rivers stated. 'Key legislators, congressional staff, and senior agency officials now have the information they need to combat persistent inaccurate stereotypes about our country. We plan on continuing to share this information as part of our ongoing education campaign to spread the word that Cayman is a leader in implementing global compliance standards; and thus, it is no coincidence that we are also a leader among international financial centres', she said. 😚

Griffiths makes us boogie

Marcia Griffiths is probably best known as one of Bob Marley's backing singers The I Threes, yet she is an accomplished performer in her own right and since his passing in 1981 she has been touring the world to appreciative packed houses. Anyone who has partied to the hit 'Electric Boogie' has danced to a Griffiths classic, a biggest single in a long, distinguished career that started in her teens.

Marcia Llyneth Griffiths was born on Nov. 23, 1949 in West Kingston, Jamaica. She started her career in 1964, performing on stage with Byron Lee and the Dragonaires at the behest of Phillip James of The Blues Busters, who had heard her singing in her home neighbourhood. Her performance was sufficiently impressive that the following day Ronnie Nasralla and Clement Dodd both offered her recording contracts. She chose Dodd's Studio One label, where she recorded a series of duets with male singers including Bob Marley ('Oh My Darling') and Bob Andy ('Always Together'), with whom she would have a relationship lasting several years. In 1968 she had her first success as a solo artist, with 'Feel Like Jumping', which like her other early Studio One solo hits including 'Truly' and 'Melody Life', were written by Andy.

From 1970 to 1974 she worked together with Bob Andy as a duo Bob and Marcia, on the Harry I label. She also recorded for Lloyd Charmers.

Between 1974 and 1981 she was a member of the I Threes supporting Bob Marley & the Wailers. She continued to record as a solo artist throughout the 1970s, working with producers such as Sonia Pottinger, and Joseph Hoo Kim.

In 1983, she released her re-recording of the Bunny Wailer song 'Electric Boogie', originally recorded and released by Wailer in 1976. Although the 1983 version became a minor hit for Griffiths, the song was remixed in 1989, and it was this version that made the Electric Slide line dance an international dance craze. It reached number 51 on the US Billboard Hot 100, making it her most successful single. It is currently the highest-selling single by a female reggae singer of all time. She has more recently had further hits with producer Donovan

She had two children with JBC disc jockev Errol Thompson, and raised them alone after his death in 1983.

Griffiths was featured on the album True Love by Toots and the Maytals, which won the Grammy Award in 2004 for Best Reggae Album, and showcased

many notable musicians including Willie Nelson, Eric Clapton, Jeff Beck, Gwen Stefani/No Doubt, Keith Richards, Toots Hibbert, Ken Boothe, and The Skatalites.

In January 2014 she announced that as part of her fiftieth year in the music business she would be releasing an album of her favourite songs by other artists, Songs That Inspire Me, Songs I Love to Sing, recorded with Germain.

Such is the respect Griffiths holds in Jamaica, in 2014 she received the Jamaican Order of Distinction (Commander class). At 68 she shows no signs of slowing down and continues to thrill rapturous fans worldwide. 🏵

Banton's star shines brightest

Rastafarians generally don't celebrate their birthdays, but Buju Banton ensured everyone he was grateful to mark his 46th 'earthstrong' on Monday by announcing it on social media. "I give thanks for another year around the sun, and I am grateful to each and every one of you," Buju wrote on his Instagram. It was his first birthday out of prison after serving an eight-year cocaine trafficking sentence in the US.

His 'Long Walk to Freedom' tour began in March in Kingston and he returns to Jamaica this weekend to top the celebrated Sumfest extravaganza. It includes huge names like Bounty Killer, Beenie Man, Chronixx, and newcomer Koffee but collectively they are probably still not more appreciated than Banton.

Two weeks ago Banton made his European return, performing at the 2019 Summer Jam festival in Germany in a well-received set. It was Amsterdam the next day and he has a busy itinerary in coming months. Years of incarceration, legal fees and a huge brood of kids dictate that he generates as much income as possible and the fact that reggae fans generally spend little on listening to even huge stars like him, means that live performances are the most lucrative source of income.

Since his record-breaking curtain-raiser at the National Stadium, the Grammy Award-winning performer has mesmerised adoring fans in Trinidad and Tobago, the Bahamas, Barbados, Suriname, Grenada, Guyana, the British Virgin Islands and St Kitts and Nevis.

After Reggae Sumfest he's back to Europe to appear at festivals in Switzerland, Portugal, France, Belgium, and then onto Antigua and Barbuda.

Countries where LGBT activists are most militant, like the US and the UK, are still opposed to Banton's 'Boom Bye Bye' anti-gay song. Although he has renounced it and not performed it since his comeback, it may be difficult for him to be allowed to play in those countries. His prison record also counts against him.

Nevertheless, Banton, born Mark Myrie, remains hugely popular worldwide. His musical genius has brought him crossover appreciation, far transcending reggae music. The fact that he identi-

fies so closely with his poverty-stricken childhood and helps as much as possible the oppressed and disfranchised resonates with people from all walks of life

When he came on stage for his first performance, he ordered security to open the doors to allow those without tickets in. Years of incarceration hadn't affected his humanity.

The youngest of 15 children, he was not surrounded by wealth, but the Myrie family were proud descendants of the Maroons, African warriors who escaped slavery and fought for their freedom, establishing their own 'promised land' in the mountainous areas of Jamaica. His father, an aspiring singer, provided for his family through manual labour, while his mother sold fresh produce in nearby Coronation Market. It was she who gave him the affectionate nickname 'Buju', which means 'breadfruit'. Banton started performing on local sound systems as a child, honing his gravelly voice to perfection. The transition to performing artist was a natural progression and before he was out of his teens Buju was smashing it in Jamaica.

Still close to his roots, he has used his music as a voice for the voiceless and established the Lend a Hand Foundation to make a difference in the lives of atrisk children in Jamaica and all around the world. He has also set up the Buju Banton Foundation.

"Born in abject poverty, I know what it is for a child to go without basic necessities," he said. "I also know what it is to be a youth with big dreams and lots of determination unfortunately daunted and unable to achieve your destiny due to lack of a helping hand. It is not an easy road, my children. However, Jah has blessed me. I have made it my mission, through the Buju Banton Foundation, to

help by giving light to youth living in the darkness of poverty through provision of food, clothing, healthcare and education, thus ensuring they, too, have equal opportunities to succeed. I love to see brothers and sisters looking out for one another. That's the way it should be, not


contrary. Stop tearing down each other." Buju's breakthrough 1992 album, 'Mr Mention', was primarily dancehall-style - hard-edged digital rhythms. As one of those rare artists whose work defined the cutting edge of his chosen genre, Buju set trends with each new release. 'Love Me Browning' caused such a stir that he brought out 'Love Black Woman' immediately after to appease darker skinned women. His music was already internationally known when he signed a recording contract with Mercury Records in New York City and released his major label debut, 'Voice of Jamaica', in

A long list of hit singles and albums followed. Some singles are now anthems, including 'Hills and Valleys', 'Driver', 'Destiny', 'Not An Easy Road', 'Champion', 'Untold Stories' and 'Murderer'. Fabulous albums like "Til Shiloh', 'Inna Heights' and 'Rasta Got Soul' never

In 2011, Buju's album 'Before the Dawn' won the Grammy Award for Best Reggae Album, his first, long overdue, win after four previous nominations. ③

STORMY TIMES FOR PUERTO RICO

Pressure is mounting on Puerto Rico's governor Ricardo Rosselló to step down over a series of leaked lewd texts and persistent allegation of corruption.

Thousands of of Puerto Rican demonstrators have descended on the governor's official residence as calls for his resignation intensify.

As many as a hundred thousand are believed to have taken part in the most recent protests and that number is expected to increase. There have also been violent clashes with police.

All indications are that the demonstrations will intensify in the coming days.

Puerto Ricans are furious at Governor Rosselló not only over the leakage of close to a thousand pages of lewd misogynistic and homophobic text messages but a series of other grievances.

Corruption tops the list, but years of mismanagement, government scandals, and more significantly the painfully slow recovery from recent crippling hurricanes have resulted in Puerto Ricans giving vent to pent up feelings of frustration.

The island, already in serious financial difficulties before 2017's category 5 Hurricane Maria tore through it, is now mired in an even deeper economic crisis

Recovery has been made slower has President Trump ramps up the pressure oh the local over an abiding mistrust in handling the billions of dollars it would take to 'put the island back on its feet'.

With all that hanging over him, the crass nature of the leaked chats might prove to be Governor Rossello's 'coup de grace'.

The powerful labour unions of the US Commonwealth - Puerto Rico is not a state - are now flexing their muscles.

With pressure mounting, the governor has offered an olive branch of sorts, hoping to maintain his tenuous hold on to power.

"I recognize the challenge that I have before me because of the recent controversies, but I firmly believe that it is possible to restore confidence and that we will be able, after this painful process, to achieve reconciliation," he has implored.

Unemployment Down in Jamaica

The Statistical Institute of Jamaica (STATIN) is reporting further reduction in the unemployment rate to a new record low of 7.8 per cent.

STATIN's April 2019 Labour Force Survey said the figure is two percentage points lower than the 9.8 per cent recorded for the corresponding period last year, and 0.2 per cent lower than the out-turn for January.

Director General, Carol Coy, said the number of unemployed persons as at April fell by 25,900 or 19.7 per cent to 105,900, relative to 2018.

She was speaking at STATIN's quarterly briefing yesterday

Coy said the male unemployment rate declined by 1.8 percentage points to 5.5 per cent, while the corresponding figure for females fell by 2.1 percentage points to 10.6 per cent.

"The number of unemployed males decreased by 13,000 to 39,900 in April 2019. Over the same period, the number of unemployed females was 65,600; this was a decline of 12,900," the Director General outlined.

Additionally, she said the unemployment rate for youth, aged 14 to 24, fell by 6.4 percentage points from 25.9 per cent in April 2018, to 19.5 per cent this year.

"The unemployment rate for male youth declined by 6.4 percentage points to 14.5 per cent, while the rate for female youth declined by 6.6 percentage points to 25.8 per cent," Coy said.

She pointed out that the overall employed labour force increased by 29,900 persons or 2.5 per cent to 1,244,500, over the 1,214,600 for April 2018.

Coy further indicated that the number of employed males rose by 18,200 persons to 691,500, while the number of females in jobs increased by 11,700 to 553,000.

The total labour force increased to 1,349,900 persons, which is 4,000 more than 2018.

In addition, the number of males qualifying for jobs rose by 5,200 persons to 731,400, while the corresponding figure for females decreased by 1,200 to 618,500 in April 2019.

Meanwhile, Coy advised that 736,900 persons were classified as being outside the labour force in April 2019.

The number was 4,800 or 0.7 per cent fewer than the outturn in April 2018, and was predominantly males.

Construction of 603-Room Ramada in St Kitts on Schedule for September Opening

Hotel development company Caribbean Galaxy Real Estate Corporation says construction of the second phase of the Ramada Hotel in White Gate is proceeding rapidly and the facility is on track for its September grand opening.

Phase II of the project is increasing the size of the hotel from 273 to 603 rooms.

The completed facility will comprise 19 structures housing a luxury clubhouse, garden villas, spa villas, condos, a swimming pool, a state-of-the-art gym, and a spa. In addition, there will be a restaurant, pavilions and a water park.

Prime Minister Dr Timothy Harris said the number of people employed in

the twin-island federation will significantly increase as the hotel is staffed for its opening.

He said the spin-off activities generated by the new Ramada Hotel are expected to open up opportunities for tour guides, taxi operators, dining establishments, craft vendors and shops.

At the recent Caribbean Investment Summit, the Prime Minister said investment agents from countries around the world were "amazed at the high-quality infrastructure on St. Kitts and Nevis and the progress being made on major projects in the Federation."


