### names confirmed to date

Since the independent verification process on the cruise port referendum petition signatures began, the Elections Office reports 702 petition names have been confirmed to date.

Through the collection of signature verification forms, the Elections Office has approved 12.9% of the 5,438 signatures submitted by the Cruise Port Referendum Cayman group as of Thursday, 4 July 2019.

Elections Office staff rolled out the door-to-door verification method in the districts of North Side

and East End last week and are continuing the process in both areas as well as in Cayman Brac and Little Cayman this week.

Officials said the door-to-door verification in Bodden Town West, Bodden Town East, Newlands and Savannah starts this weekend, along with West Bay North, West Bay Central, West Bay West and West Bay South.

### Editorial When is **Emancipation Day?**

This holiday marks the end of slavery in the British Empire. It is a public holiday in several Caribbean countries and though the holiday commemorates events that took place on 1 August 1834, it may be celebrated in different days in these countries.


#### History of the holiday

The British like other colonial powers had allowed the widespread practice of slavery to take place during the time of expansion to the new world. In 1772, the ruling in the case of the case of Somerset v Stewart determined that slavery was unsupported by the common law in England and Wales. While the ruling was not clear on the situation in other parts of the Empire, this case was seen as a key turning point in the change towards emancipation.

Slavery was finally abolished throughout the British Empire by the Slavery Abolition Act 1833, which came into effect on 1 August 1834. The territories controlled at that time by the East India Company, Ceylon (modern-day Sri Lanka) and St. Helen's were excluded. Slavery was not abolished in these regions until 1843.

### **UCCI Hosts International Business Practicum in Roatan, Honduras**

A total of 43 students, faculty, staff and friends enjoved an immersive overseas learning experience in Roatan, Honduras in May by joining the University College of the Cayman Islands' (UCCI) annual International Business Practicum (IBP). The eighth in the series of travel abroad courses offered by the UCCI Department of Business Studies (DBS), IBP 2019 enabled business students in the associate and bachelor programmes an opportunity to embrace education through experiential learning.

Participants were tasked to evaluate and assess Roatan's economy while making comparisons to the Caymanian structure, enabling them to develop evaluative and analytical skills which will aid in personal, academic, and professional undertakings.

"The goal of this practicum was to identify strategies that would create and maintain a prosperous Caribbean society with a dynamic economy in a globalised world. Students examined ways of protecting the local environment and preserving the culture by appropriately utilising the talents of human capital and respecting the island's values," said Ms. Annette Murphy, IBP Team Coordinator.

In seeking to compare the Caymanian way to Roatan's, Team 43 visited a spectrum of organisations incorporating networking entities, manufacturing companies, the service sector, and several aspects of eco-tourism. The team visited the Chamber of Commerce, the UNAH CURLA University, Zolitur, Max Communications, Tortuga Digital, the Municipalidad of Roatan, Port of Roatan, Roatan Electric Company, and

The Roatan Chocolate Factory. They also a city tour, boat rides and adventures at the Gumbalina Park Canopy. Several media outlets captured the group's activities across the island.

'Team 43 engaged with government officials, prominent business operators, professors, and students in Roatan," said Ms. Murphy. "This allowed them to garner the uncensored data and information that are not available in literature or online."

Some participants also visited the Escuela Grover Vendal Canaveral primary school, the Sandy Bay Ministries local orphanage, and the Cattleya Centre, a special needs school. Ms. Murphy said, "These visits added a new outreach element to the IBP course. We have decided that the inaugural project will be the adoption of the Escuela Grover Vendal Canaveral primary school. The team will be sending toys and other gifts for Christmas, and will keep in touch with the school's activities."

IBP students said their class was a 'once-in-a-lifetime' involvement that left an indelible impact. "It was a great experience and I have learned a lot from this trip. It has provided me with a new perspective and have made me more grateful for the blessings that we have here in the Cayman Islands. I have also realised that there are initiatives that Roatan is engaged in that could be of benefit to us and will help us tackle some of the problems we face. I will forever be thankful to UCCI for facilitating such as an amazing trip," said Jordan Williams, UCCI associate degree student.

The IBP 2019 in Roatan forged meaningful bonds and relationships among the participants. Amory Smith from the Civil Service College said, "We left as strangers and returned as family." 😚

### **Interim Fire Chief Appointed**

As a critical part of its plan to become a world-class uniformed service, the Ministry of Financial Services and Home Affairs announces the appointment of an interim Chief Fire Officer for the Cayman Islands Fire Service (CIFS).

Mr. Paul Walker, a senior manager with 30 years of fire and rescue experience, has been appointed to serve a one year interim appointment with the department.

He is currently finishing a five-year tour as the Chief Fire Officer for the Cornwall Fire and Rescue Service in the United Kingdom, and will begin employment with the CIFS by the middle of Q4. Ministry leaders explained that during the interim period, a recruitment exercise will be carried out to permanently fill the substantive role.

The Chief Officer for the Ministry, Dr. Dax Basdeo, explained: "A one-year interim appointment is necessary to allow the three recently promoted Deputy Chief Fire Officers adequate time to pursue further professional development and qualifications that will enable them to meet the requirements of the role of Chief Fire Officer. Without an interim chief, it is difficult for the deputies to manage their current job responsibilities, cover the responsibilities of a Chief



Fire Officer, and pursue their own professional development."

Within the last year the Ministry has placed a significant emphasis on succession planning, with the introduction of coaching for senior management positions to ensure that interested officers are better prepared for advancement to positions of leadership.

It has also invested considerable effort in the comprehensive revision of the organisational chart and job descriptions for personnel within the Fire Service, which now reflect the United Kingdom National Occupational Standards (UKNOS) for all fire officers so that each post has a clear indication of the requirements. This enhanced clarity also supports officers in their pursuit of promotions within the Fire Service.

Acting Chief Fire Officer, Brevon Elliot, said the department is committed to using these standards to build on its capability as a critical emergency response agency.

"The mission of the CIFS is to ensure the safety of the people of the Cayman Islands and its infrastructure," he explained. "We are dedicated to developing and promoting the highest quality of fire officers, and we will continue to invest in on-going professional development opportunities that will take our first responder capabilities to the next level."

This is directly aligned with the Ministry's on-going mission to foster an inter-

nal culture of leadership development within the service.

In-keeping with this, Acting Chief Elliott will accompany members of his senior team to Fire Rescue International (FRI) in Atlanta, Georgia, a conference and expo hosted annually by the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC), which is attended by thousands of the most prominent fire and emergency service leaders from across North America and around the globe, for high-calibre learning, collaboration and networking.

### Speaker Bush is Guest at Isle of Man Tynwald Day

Legislative Assembly Speaker, Hon. McKeeva Bush, OBE, JP is representing the Cayman Islands at Tynwald Day 2019, the ongoing Isle of Man national day celebrations.

Mr. Bush was invited, along with his wife, Mrs. Kerri Bush, by Hon. Stephen Rodan President of Tynwald, the Isle of Man Parliament, to attend the annual celebrations that run from today (Thursday, 4 July 2019) to Sunday, 7 July 2019.

With a "shipping" theme this year to reflect the island's rich history and maritime heritage, the celebrations pay tribute to a tough yet successful sea journey 40 years ago to the Isle of Man from Norway.

That journey in 1979, accomplished aboard the replica of a ninth century Viking ship found

in Norway, was crewed by Manx and Norwegian sailors, according to the Tynwald office.

Celebrations will include unveiling of a plaque to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the landing.

The Isle of Man is a self-governing British Crown Dependency located in the Irish Sea between Great Britain and Ireland. The island's rich and diverse history goes back to before 6,500 BC when it was first inhabited by hunter-gatherers and fishermen. Artefacts from this era are among those preserved in the Manx Museum.

Established in 1765, the island' bicameral legislature Tynwald claims to be the "oldest continuous parliamentary body in the world".

### **Government needs to make better** use of its collective buying power when outsourcing services

The report "Government's use of Outsourced Services," issued by the Office of the Auditor General (OAG) today reviewed how effectively the Government uses outsourced services and ensures that it is obtaining value for money.

The report specifically looked at how well the Government planned the use of outsourced services, how well it procured these services and then managed contracts and engagements to ensure that it was receiving value for money.

"The main types of services that the Government outsources to private sector contractors are school buses, security services, janitorial and gardening services and some IT-related services" says Ms. Winspear. "It is important that the Government obtains value for money for the \$10 million a year it spends on these services."

The report states that many of the findings were similar to those in the OAG's report 'Government's use of Consultants and Temporary Staff'. However, the report identifies some additional areas where procurement and contract management practices could be improved to better demonstrate value for money.

The Auditor General adds, "Ministries are independently buying services, often the same services from the same suppliers and there is limited competition for many services. Government needs to make better use of its collective buying power to achieve greater benefits and efficiencies from outsourced services."

The report also highlights that Government needs to improve its contracts to ensure that it can effectively monitor and manage suppliers' performance.

"Most contracts we looked at specified the services to be delivered but none had clear success measures that would enable the Government to effectively monitor and manage performance," Ms. Winspear adds. "In addition, we found only a few examples of ongoing contract management. The Government continues to be responsible for these services, even where delivered by the private sector. It therefore needs to embed effective contract management of outsourced services into its day-to-day operations to ensure that it is obtaining high quality services and value for money."

### **Civil Service Continues Steady Progress on Procurement**

New procurement legislation and guidance, a recently completed procurement manual and the training of more than 600 public servants are just some of the ways that Government is working to ensure that the public receive value for money when it comes to procurement

Officials outlined some of the improvements that have been made to the procurement process over the last two years, following the release today (Wednesday, 3 July), of a report on the procurement of services outsourced by Government between 2012 and 2017.

Director of Procurement Tarag Bashir noted that since 2017 the Central Procurement Office (CPO) has made significant progress towards developing a centralised pool of tools and templates that Government agencies are using to implement standardised services and

than planned in the response to the OAG, are available from the website procure. gov.ky which was launched last year. The comprehensive site, Mr Bashir says, aims to make the procurement process more efficient and consistent for civil servants and vendors alike.

With this objective in mind, CPO also worked with Government to acquire and implement a new online procurement portal known as Bonfire, making the Cayman Islands one of the first countries in the region to embrace such a system.

To further support the procurement process the Strategic Reforms Implementation Unit (SRIU) in the Office of the Deputy Governor has further developed standard business case templates to help public servants meet the legal requirement to provide robust justifications for procurement.

These resources, including a new procurement manual, completed earlier



Furthermore CPO and SRIU have also been working in tandem to provide the public service with a wide range of

training.

The procurement office itself has offered specialised and technical training in procurement and the new legislation.

Meanwhile in 2018, through the SRIU's Professional Development Programme, 34 civil servants earned the APMG better business cases foundation level professional qualification. Also that year 17 senior leaders attended a master class for reviewing and approving business cases.

In 2019 the SRIU is facilitating additional business case certification courses, as well as master classes for senior leaders and technical leads that cover topics such as the role of the project sponsor, reviewing and approving business cases and benefits management.

"The civil service has greatly improved our procurement regime in recent years and this is in main part thanks to the Central Procurement Office and also the contributions of the SRIU team", Deputy Governor Hon Franz Manderson says.

The Deputy Governor adds: "Chief Officers and their teams will continue to take full advantage of the available training, guidance and support within the context of the Auditor General's findings with regards to their agencies. This will help them to address any specific issues identified for their ministries with current outsourced services, and to improve the way they plan and manage these services in the future".

The Central Procurement Office began work in 2015, while the Procurement Law and Regulations, took effect in May 2018. This legislation applies to the procurement of all goods, works and services, including outsourced non-core services such as those covered in the audit report.

The law and regulations also specifically address a number of recommendations contained in the Auditor General's report such as when business cases must be used, what should be in them, requirements for requests for proposal and invitations to tender, and how single source procurement should be justified. 😚

The RCIPS would like to make the following clarifying statement regarding its actions in the context of an ongoing land dispute in West Bay, which has gained media attention in recent days.

The RCIPS has sought and received consultative legal advice from the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions on this matter. The ODPP has confirmed that the decision of the Registrar of Lands in this matter is not enforceable by police absent a Court order and penal notice.

The RCIPS continues to urge the parties to seek remedies through the Court, and will continue to intervene only when necessary to ensure no breach of the peace unless other action is directed or authorized by the Court.





### **CPD** launches summer Community Clinics Island-Wide

Recently the West Bay Community Police Officers carried out their community clinics in different locations around the community, with several more anticipated throughout the summer. At these "clinics" community officers set up a stand in a public area, hand out public safety materials, often solicit information from the public through a survey, and generally make themselves available to listen to and interact with residents.

The first clinic of the summer was last Wednesday, 26 June at West Bay Public Beach, where a total of 30 persons attended. The second was on Thursday 27 June at the Plaza Del Sol on Batabano Road, where there were approximately 15 attendees, and the third day was on Friday 28 June where there were approximately 40 persons in attendance.

On all three days the officers discussed safety concerns that citizens had and handed out brochures and contact cards to the public. Specialist officers from the K-9 unit and Mr. Erik Bodden from the DOA also attended to provide information on animal ownership and responsibilities.

Officers also printed and handed out forms for the NICE clean-up program to persons hanging around the areas, and information on the upcoming West Bay Community Meeting was also provided. Generally the residents who visited the clinics in West Bay requested more public activities by officers, more opportunities for communication between police and the public, and better victim updates.

Community Police officers in Bodden Town also held their Community Clinics this past weekend, on Saturday 29 June, at both the Countryside Shopping Village and Coe Wood Beach. The Countryside location had a high volume of traffic throughout the morning and afternoon, and the Coe Wood Location had a smaller crowd that allowed for a more personalized conversations.

The officers set up two booths at each location, one of which offered crime prevention and public awareness tips and information, and the second which provided with displays and demonstrations on home property and security. Officers also administered a community policing survey to 127 people, which asked about the main problems and public safety priorities of residents in the district. Residents in Bodden Town identified road safety concerns as their main priority.

The RCIPS and its Community Policing Department would like to thank the members of the public that came out over the past week and shared their opinions and concerns with officers. "Our officers will be following up on the concerns raised by the community at these clinics," said Superintendent Robbie Graham, Head of Uniform Operation. "Making ourselves as accessible as possible to the public is the point of these clinics, which will continue to take place in other beats and districts throughout the summer."



### Gov't football league kicks-off

The 2019 Government Football League opened Wednesday 26 June at Ed Bush Sports Complex with the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service and Health Services Authority starting their respective campaigns with victories.

### CAYMAN COMMUNITY SET TO UNITE AGAINST CHILDHOOD CANCER ONCE MORE AT 7TH ANNUAL BIG SHAVE

Every September hundreds of supporters come together in Cricket Square to unite as one voice against childhood cancer at The Hannah's Heroes Big Shave. What started in 2013 as a small group of cancer parents with a mission to raise awareness and funds for research has become a crucial milestone event for the St Baldrick's Foundation. the largest non-government funder of childhood cancer research in the US. Fundraising in Cayman has generated US \$2.2 Million and resulted in the naming of 9 separate research grants at the most prestigious institutes across the US, including John Hopkins, Dana Farber and Duke University, where researchers are working on life changing treatments and cures funded by the St Baldricks Foundation, all named in honour of Hannah Meeson. In fact The Big Shave has made it into the Foundation's top ten fundraisers every year since 2014 amidst hundreds of events around the world and is the Foundation's most successful overseas fundraiser.

With just 12 weeks until the seventh Big Shave, organisers are encouraging supporters to forego their Summer haircuts and sign up to shave their heads and and help fund further research grants for all types of childhood cancer research. This year's Big Shave will take place on Friday 20 September at The Wicket in Cricket Square.

"The efforts of the Cayman community have been entirely life changing for children and families facing a cancer diagnosis everywhere. Just 50 years ago all kids diagnosed with cancer died.



Because of research today about 90% of kids with the most common types of cancer will live but for many other types. progress has been limited and for some there is still little hope for a cure. Currently all childhood cancers combined receive only 4% of US federal funding for cancer research so without vital research funded by organizations like St Baldrick's, Hannah and children like her simply will not survive. All children deserve to grow up and realise their full potential and it's something that most families take for granted, " says Mrs. Gaylene Meeson, founder of Hannah's Heroes and mother of 11 year old Hannah Meeson, who was diagnosed with medulloblastoma, a type of brain cancer, in 2012.

When the crowd gathers in Cricket Square on 20 September they will celebrate and honour Cayman's childhood cancer heroes Matthew Chong Ping (15), Tayden Grant (12) Hannah Meeson (11), Charli Foster (11), Allie Capasso (11), Beau Shields(9), Ava Paige Rico (9), Annabelle Reading (8), Saylor Sperandeo (8) and Mimi Ebank (6) and will remember angels. Dimitrie Connor (forever 15), Caitlin Beverley (forever 8) and Albert Ebanks (forever 16).

Amongst those already signed up to brave the shave is five time shavee Eugene Nolan of Savage Consulting who has raised over \$40,000 for Hannah's Heroes.

"it's an amazing and humbling event and such an important cause. As a parent, I thank God for my healthy daughter and the bright future she has ahead of her. I feel incredibly lucky we can make a difference to kids fighting cancer by doing something so simple. This event inspires everyone and demonstrates how a small community can pull together to make a huge difference and create a future where kids don't die from cancer and can just be kids."

Several teams have already committed their support ahead of this year's event, including teams from Maples, Dart, PwC, KPMG, the Cayman Islands Fire Service and students at Clifton Hunter High School, Cayman Prep and High School and John Gray High School will be hosting satellite shave events for students and staff to raise funds throughout September.



### **CI Coast Guard Deployed in International Joint Operation**

As part of its mission to enhance maritime safety and security, the Cayman Islands Coast Guard (CICG) recently participated in an international joint operation to target illicit maritime activity within the region.

The multi-agency led mission, Operation Rip Tide, also included the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service's (RCIPS) Joint Marine Unit, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) and Jamaica Defense Force (JDF).

This was first time in more than 10 years that Cayman Islands representatives were deployed on foreign military vessels in support of counterdrug operations.

During the operation, CICG Lieutenant Commander, Leo Anglin and RCIPS Police Constable, Adrian Clarke were deployed on-board the Jamaican Defense Force Coast Guard's offshore patrol vessels HMJS Cornwall and HMJS Middlesex, as well as the U.S. Coast Guard's Venturous.

Lieutenant Commander Anglin said: "This type of joint operation lets us leverage inter-agency partnerships to target maritime smuggling organisations responsible for the illicit trafficking of persons, drugs and weapons, within the region."

At its conclusion, Operation Rip Tide resulted in the seizure of two maritime vessels, one pier-side seizure, the apprehension of 14 smugglers, one firearm and 91 rounds of ammunition. Border enforcement officials also confiscated a total of US\$ 9,000 and 5,280lbs of marijuana with a street value of US\$3.7 million.

"It's great to see multiple law enforcement agencies/military forces collaborating to strengthen U.S. and Caribbean national security," Lieutenant Commander Wenk, the USCG Military Attaché in Jamaica, said. "The United States is committed to working with Jamaica and the Cayman Islands to counter transnational criminal organisations that threaten the safety and stability of Caribbean nations. The Cayman Islands have been key contributors in the fight against illicit activity in the maritime domain and remain more than willing to assist Jamaica and the United States in fighting illicit maritime activity in the region."

Commodore Wemyss-Gorman, Officer in charge of the JDF's Maritime, Aviation & Cyber Command added: "Collaborations like this go a long way towards strengthening the network of law enforcement agencies against nefarious actors in our maritime space. The JDF is fully committed to the fight and looks forward to future engagements of this type."

In conclusion CICG Commander, Robert Scotland, said: "We would like to thank the JDF and the USCG for extending the opportunity to us to actively participate in Operation Riptide. The experience that was gained and the exchange of professional knowledge will help us build a professional Coast Guard that is respected within the region. We look forward to further participation in Joint training exercises and operational deployments of this kind as they will only server to help with this objective."






