Historic Role of Town Hall Recognised

The Town Hall, which is still in use today, was the venue where the Cayman Islands first constitution was signed.

Members of the public joined elected leaders, senior officials and interna-

tional guests at the special event on the public holiday morning to celebrate the significance of this historic building. Special guest Arley James "AJ" Miller was also in attendance. Mr. Miller is the last living 1959 Vestryman.

The guests then moved outside the Town Hall for the unveiling of the com-

MRCU Enhances Mosquito Management

The Mosquito Research and Control Unit (MRCU) recently announced an overhaul of its mosquito management programme across Cayman Brac and Little Cayman. Changes are designed to bring the islands in line with operations in Grand Cayman and with scientific best practice.

The Minister for Health, Environment, Culture and Housing, Hon. Dwayne Seymour explains that "the MRCU has taken these steps to ensure the highest standards of mosquito management are met across for communities across all three islands"

The unit's plan for Cayman Brac and Little Cayman includes moving away from acting on ad hoc spray requests from the public, towards a sustained approach of surveillance based control, which has been proven to be most effective at tackling mosquito populations.

Such surveillance techniques, which include bite counts and portable and baited traps, are new to Cayman Brac and Little Cayman, though they are regularly used successfully in Grand Cayman. This practice helps to determine

A different kind of same

A year ago, the Governor's Office was playing defence. Questions swirled around the sudden removal of Anwar Choudhury, the then representative of the Queen in the Cayman Islands.

Mr Choudhury was recalled to London with very little being said at the time and concerns being raised that the saga was shrouded in secrecy. Prior to that, he was busy integrating into island life and made waves as he cleaned fish at the fish market in George Town. Eventually, he was removed, and details emerged over what led to his demise.

His successor, Martyn Roper, has settled in comfortably in the role and has gone about his business - at least in public – in very much the same way that Mr Choudhury did, embracing his role in the Cayman Islands and appearing to love every minute of his time in the sunshine.

Like Mr Choudhury, Governor Roper got active in touring the Islands and integrating with locals. He's upped the social media game with his regular posts and, in very much the same way that Mr Choudhury created a buzz for his fish market theatrics, Mr Roper has embraced another Caribbean tradition - playing the steel pan. He even performed on the pan during the recent Queen's Birthday celebrations.

And while the path is similar, one cannot help but feel differently about how Mr Roper has conducted himself on island. After all, he was saddled with the burden of replacing a postholder who was accused of not being as nice as he portrayed himself publicly.

The current governor has come across as a friend of the Cayman Islands, and if we take him at his word, is an advocate for this British Overseas Territory, particularly on matters of the environment and financial services. We wish him the best as he goes about his duties. As long as he remains as warm as he comes across when one meets him, he'll have fond memories of his time living on arguably the world's most beautiful beach before moving on to represent the UK's interests somewhere else in the former British Empire. 🏵

Q: You said you want to be an Accountant. Can you say why?



The Counselling Centre Provides DUI Workshop on Cayman Brac

The Counselling Centre (TCC), in partnership with the Department of Community Rehabilitation (DCR), hosted its first-ever DUI workshop on Cayman Brac earlier this month.

Five participants attended the workshop, which included educational and non-judgmental presentations by TCC staffers, Dr. Katheryn Whittaker and Sarah Dewson on Friday, 7 and Saturday, 8 June 2019.

The Minister for Health, Environment, Culture & Housing, Hon. Dwayne Seymour said: "Such DUI workshops are an invaluable tool in our mission to educate the public about the possible personal and communal repercussions of driving under the influence."

"They also represent another example of cross-governmental collaboration," he added.

The five-hour course covered a number of topics, including the human and economic impact of drinking under the influence, the legal consequences of DUI (including fines and ultimately the revocation of the offender's driving license), and where to seek professional help for alcohol misuse issues.

Participants were encouraged to discuss the reasons why they were referred and how their DUI conviction had negatively impacted on their personal and professional lives. Attendees were subsequently given avoidance and prevention strategies and how to identify their triggers. They were also advised how alcohol is processed in the body and the interaction of it with other substances including medications.

Psychologist Dr. Whittaker said: "This was such a fulfilling experience; to see these men engage in such thoughtful and honest discussions around the impact of driving under the influence".

Probation Officer, Sue Morrison said: "The Brac is a unique and wonderful community which unfortunately also faces issues regarding alcohol misuse. The presentation provided helpful information that I feel certain will have an impact on participants."

"The Counselling Centre has been providing the DUI workshop in Grand Cayman for more than 18 years, and recently had to make several changes to the programme format in order to meet the increased demand for placements," said TCC Director Judith Sey-

"These changes, in conjunction with our collaboration with the staff from the Department of Community Rehabilitation in Cayman Brac, have now allowed us to more easily offer the group to residents there charged with DUI offences," she concluded.

Lord Ahmad discusses "Partnership" with OTs

Three key words, "Partnership," "Respect," and "Family" characterized all of Lord Ahmad of Wimbledon's descriptions of the evolving relationships between the Overseas Territories (OTs) and the UK, in a press Q & A session during his recent three-day visit to the Cayman Islands.

Lord Ahmad began by paying tribute to the Cayman Islands for taking a key role in organizing a trade summit, which took place at the Kimpton hotel, with senior delegations from across the OTs. The Minister also attended a Joint Ministerial Council Meeting on Brexit, and bilateral talks with the Jamaican Prime Minister.

About the trade summit, he said: "I very much hope there will be momentum from this particular event so we can build on the important issues that matter to the overseas territories particular on the agenda of prosperity because prosperity builds progress.

"I am also delighted to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the Constitution," he said, before speaking about how the UK has been working with the OTs and other countries across the region to strengthen the region's resilience against hurricanes and other disasters. "We can learn from Cayman's experiences and how we can build on its assets to ensure there is a collective response to any future challenge we may face. We are committed to the region, and that is why RFA Mounts Bay will remain in the region."

On the issue of Beneficial Ownership, Lord Ahmad said: "I am also conscious that the last couple of years have been years of challenge in the area of financial services, I will defend the principles of ensuring transparency. We need, as our parliament decided, public registers which are an important step forward for the whole British family including our Overseas Territories, but we do so in a practical and pragmatic way.

"I welcome the positive exchange we have had with the Cayman Island Government on the technical working conditions we are setting up to ensure that the challenges but also the priorities of Cayman can be recognized in our approach to these important issues.

"There is the issue of Brexit: Yes we are committed to fulfilling our mandate to the British people on leaving the European Union on the target date which is the 31st of October, but in doing so I have directly set up engagement with our British Overseas Territories to ensure that in our negotiations with the European Union on our important future partnership, the priorities, as the British overseas territories see them, are also reflected."

In response to a question concerning the continuity between commitments to the Cayman Islands made between the last UK Prime Minister and the next one, Lord Ahmad said:

"The requirement of the British Government is at the end of 2020 is that any territory that has not yet announced its intention to create a public register, we are obligated now through Parliament to issue an Order in Council. However, in essence we are looking at is building on the positive relationship we have with the OT's to ensure that can be done in a very constructive way.

I know both the individuals who (are likely to be) the next Prime Minister; former Foreign Secretary Mr. Johnson, and Current Foreign Secretary Mr. Hunt, Mr. Johnson's views reflect the views I have already articulated, and the current Foreign Secretary Mr. Hunt) also has the same views.

"There will be challenges; and we have to ensure that, working with the Overseas Territories, we present a robust case to our parliamentary colleagues to ensure that the essence of the ability of the Overseas Territories working forward on these important issues is not just sustained but strengthened."


There was a medley of popular Jamaican dances, performed by a group of young Caymanian dancers. It was fast paced, high energy and funny too.



Reflections on the Constitution and the Rule of Law

On Monday of this week, we celebrated Constitution Day that is meant to celebrate the adoption of the 1959 Constitution. This celebration of a country's constitution must be regarded as a most significant event when one considers how crucial a constitution is for making a political community possible in the first place.

Broadly speaking, British civil servants at Whitehall, with little input from Caribbean publics, primarily produced the constitutions of Caribbean independent states. At independence, Commonwealth Caribbean countries adopted the parliamentary system known for the rule of the party which gets the majority of seats in an election. It is also known for its dual executive power structure in which the head of state, the Governor General, represents the British monarch and the Prime Minister is the head of government.

Political scientist Anthony Payne, specialist on this region, has observed that the Commonwealth Caribbean's legacy of liberal, representative institutions is a "political order based on the working of practices and commitments that have as their inspiration the Westminster system". According to Payne, this legacy includes, among its core elements, the convention of constitutionalism, the doctrine of civilian supremacy, the custom of competitive elections, the practice of pluralist representation and the 'presumption' of bureaucratic and police neutrality.

'The convention of constitutionalism' as Payne calls it, really means that all persons in the country are required to abide by the provisions of the constitution. This makes for what is called the 'rule of law'. This idea that each person is equally under the law and that the law is applied equally is a cardinal requirement for the operation of modern civilized societies. This is so irrespective of the fact that it does not happen in this way for all cases.

In further explaining what is meant by 'the rule of law', The World Justice Project says that it comprises four principles. It is a system of self-government in which all persons, including those in government, are accountable under the law. It also implies a system based on fair, publicized, broadly understood and stable laws. The 'rule of law' also implies that there is a fair, robust, and accessible legal process in which rights and responsibilities based in law are evenly enforced and also that there exists 'a diverse, competent, and independent lawyers and judges.'

The idea, if not the practice, of the rule of law, goes way back in British history to the declaration of the Magna Carta or Great Charter that was signed by King John of England in 1215. A group of barons or powerful noblemen, who supported the king in exchange for estates of land, demanded that the king sign the charter to recognize their rights. The Magna Carta, imposed on King John by his subjects, was sealed by him on the banks of the River Thames, June 15, 1215.

The framers of this document understood that law had to be binding on all, including the Monarch, or else one would not have 'the rule of law' but instead a situation where the Monarch could do as he pleased. In fact, in the case of England, as in other European countries, before the Monarchs were gradually stripped of their powers, there was a history of them being the very epitome of tyranny being able to make, interpret and enforce the law. The Monarch was for a long time 'above the law.'

By its insistence that the life, liberty, or property of free subjects of the king could not be arbitrarily taken away and that the law of the land had to be followed in the making of judgments against a person, the Magna Carter planted the seeds for the concept of due process as it developed first in England, and then in the United States. Due process means that everyone is entitled to a fair and impartial hearing to determine his or her legal rights.

Senior Lecturer in Law, University of Chicago Law School, and U.S. Court of Appeals Judge Diane Wood, in her paper "The Rule of Law in Times of Stress" (2003) explains that the rule of law requires an open and transparent system of making laws and laws that are applied predictably and uniformly. People need to know and understand what the law is and why they are required to follow it, she writes.

In addition, she continues, the rule of law also requires that people can expect predictable results from the legal system; this is that people who act in the same way can expect the law to treat them in the same way. If similar actions do not produce similar legal outcomes, people cannot use the law to guide their actions, and a "rule of law" does not exist, the judge explains.

But the rule of law, the cornerstone of a modern society, is made possible by the constitution. This explains why when a society thinks it necessary to reform or to "modernize" its constitution, each citizen should stand up, pay attention and participate. This is so as the constitution is a sacred covenant between leaders and citizens. It lavs down the ground rules for living together in society and protects the possibility of community in which individual citizens can live their full lives. It addresses the questions of who are to be included as members of the political community, the kinds of rights and liberties to which they are entitled and the concomitant responsibilities.

A constitution limits the arbitrary actions of government, guarantees the rights of the governed and defines the sovereign power. This binding document, both conceptually and practically, reaches into the lives of citizens, as it is both concerned with the structure of power, that is, the way government can treat its citizens and also the ways citizens may treat each other.

The constitution is superior to all other laws. It sketches the fundamental modes of legitimate government operations, guards the fundamental rights of citizens, and is a symbol of the kind of culture, norms, and values, which a

society subscribes to. The constitution embodies the normative attitudes held by people towards government, their conception of how power ought to be regulated, of what it is proper to do and not to do. Because of these reasons, the constitution matters for social and political outcomes.

For example, in the Cayman Constitution, the inclusion of a Bill of Rights is of major significance. It asserts the concept of human dignity, affirming that on the basis of the dignity and worth of the human person, and for no other reason, each person is entitled to certain minimum rights and standards of living conditions essential for the maintenance of self-respect. These rights and standards are to apply regardless of intelligence, skill, wealth, background, race, religion, sex, creed and political opinion.

Off course, as Martin Luther King writing from his 'Letter from Birmingham Jail' in 1963 notes, law is one thing, but justice is quite another. The real challenge is to align laws to requirements of Justice.

CBC Nets Three in Sting Drug Operation

Customs and Border Control (CBC) arrested three persons on Tuesday, 25 June 2019 for various drug offences including importation of ganja.

On Monday, 24 June 2019 CBC officers at the department's Courier Section were scrutinising numerous international packages that had arrived in Grand Cayman. During this clearance process, several packages were selected for inspection, one of which was described as containing clothing and originating from the United States.

Deputy Director of CBC Jeff Jackson, who has responsibility and oversight of the enforcement portfolio, said approximately 11 pounds of ganja was discovered concealed therein.

The CBC Narcotics Enforcement Team was alerted to investigate the matter and carried out a sting operation along with the RCIPS Drugs and Serious Crime Task Force (DSCTF) officers to track the delivery of the package.

On Tuesday, 25 June 2019 during the joint CBC and RCIPS operation, a 35 year-old Jamaican man employed as a security officer was arrested for importation of ganja. During the joint operation, the officers also arrested a 45 year-old Jamaican woman and a 23 year-old Jamaican man for possession and being concerned in the importation of ganja.

Deputy Director Jackson said this is the eighth arrest in the past few weeks in relation to contraband detected at the Parcel Post and Courier Section and it clearly demonstrates that officers are doing their jobs effectively when processing parcels and mail at these facilities. "With faster shipping times and the increased volume of packages being shipped each year using these services, dealers attempt to circumvent our controls by using creative methods of concealment to facilitate their illegal shipments," he said.

Deputy Director of CBC Kevin Walton who has responsibility and oversight of the Trade and Revenue Portfolio, which includes the Courier and Parcel Post sections said, "It has become a popular trend among

dealers to use the postal and courier services to transport contraband which are concealed in cards and harmless-looking packages. Through our proactive efforts we are working very closely on the ground with partner agencies to put additional layers of security in place and we are seeing the results of these increased measures."

Deputy Director Jackson said investigations are ongoing in relation to this matter.

Two men charged following recovery of Drug Canoe

The men, age 25 of Jamaica, and 39 of Bodden Town, who were arrested in relation to the incident where a Drug Canoe was found onshore in Prospect Point, have been formally charged with Importation of Ganja and Possession of Ganja with Intent to Supply. The 25-year-old has also been charged with Illegal Landing.

Just after 12:00AM on Friday morning, officers on patrol noted suspicious activity onshore in Prospect Point. Two men were observed in the vicinity of a beached white canoe with several bags scattered onshore. The men were detained and a search of the area was conducted, during which several parcels containing what appeared to be ganja were found.

The police have now disclosed that the total weight of the drugs was over 550lbs.

Other officers responding to the area noted a suspicious vehicle nearby and stopped the driver. Further enquiries led to all three men being arrested on suspicion of importation of ganja. Two of the men, ages 37 and 39, are from Bodden Town, and a third man, age 25, is from Jamaica. The Jamaican national was also arrested for Illegal Landing.

MRCU Enhances Mosquito Management

not only whether mosquitos are in fact present but also to better target mosquito population control efforts where needed.

The MRCU uses a range of control strategies in its arsenal, in addition to spraying. Water management and control of the aquatic stages of mosquito development are techniques most often used by the unit as prevention measures.

When truck or aerial spraying is required to suppress biting, the MRCU has pledged to continue its environmental commitment to avoid disturbing local bee populations in the islands. Cayman Brac will now also be used as a base for aerial operations and the jump off point for such work carried out in Little Cay-

To assist with the programme's overhaul, MRCU has made substantial investments in order to standardise equipment used across the islands and to improve operations. New surveillance

traps have been deployed and a forklift, trailer and \$90,000 loader truck arrived in Cayman Brac at the start of this month to facilitate loading spray planes.

Three full time Disease Prevention Officers were recently hired to assist with increased efforts. Little Cayman has received a new Disease Prevention Officer as part of the improvements made by MRCU.

Kemarley Maxam began work on Little Cayman on 13th May. He is the MR-CU's first full time Disease Prevention Officer on that island. The 22 year old Caymanian joined the team with prior experience working in tourism in the Cayman Islands.

Meanwhile, on Grand Cayman, MR-CU's increased ground control measures successfully contended with a mosquito outbreak over the past two weeks. An aerial spraying operation on Tuesday, 25 June 2019, using a recently procured chemical that targets adult mosquitoes, helped to mop up nearly 7,000 acres in the Frank Sound/North Side area.

MRCU hopes the public is experiencing less mosquito discomfort and continues to invite requests for service at 949-2557 or through the MRCU website at MRCU.ky. (*)

No one likes rough spots, well at least bad ones. Unrelenting anguish, whether it be physical or mental is not enjoyable. We've all probably known someone who makes a mountain out of their molehill of minor ailments or afflictions.

Betty and George were a true love match, and both were silly about one another. Their lives had not been easy and both suffered a lot, but their love shone brightly. George had a carotid artery stroke and suddenly the 6 ft strapping, strong man was put permanently in a wheelchair. Betty was as small as George was large. She might have been 5'2" and 115lbs. Every day for 14+ years she got him up out of his bed and where he needed to go and attended to all his needs. He could not communicate more than a few words. She never knew if he'd make it through a night. Betty never slightly considered put-

During that time, their only son's marriage fell apart and he became involved with drugs. Their only daughter was diagnosed with the autoimmune disease. Lupus. Her baby sister. whom she was like a mom to, was constantly in turmoil and was finally killed by a boyfriend. One of her parents, who had been very cruel to her in her youth showed up and moved in. Through all those things and multitudes more, I never heard Betty complain. Never once. I'd seen her at wits' end but nary a complaint. She had the ability to look beyond her circumstances and trust that Jesus would work things out.

In the few quiet times she had she would write letter or notes to those important to her. They were always a blessing. I received several. She was like an extra mom to me but more so, a living witness to the power of faith more than anyone else I'd known to that point.

in an American infantry unit. The war had been mercifully brief. It was about sunup and the mail came around. I had one letter...from Betty. George had died whilst I was away. In the aftermath, I had written and told her I was getting out of the Army to start training for ministry. The letter was typically her. "I'm glad to know that you're entering the ministry. The Lord sure has gotten me through a few rough spots." I thought, "Rough spots?!! She'd been trying out for the movie version of Job most of my life and she referred to them as, "rough spots" ...like she'd had a cold or a flat tyre. She succumbed to stomach cancer at the very time I was reading her letter. The letter had been sent months before, but it arrived at just the right time.

What got Betty through her trials and tribulations was her deep abiding Christian faith. Almost every Sunday, she had someone stay with her husband long enough that she could make it to worship. She had to forego almost

I'm not ashamed to admit it, I sat and read that letter and cried...thinking of all that she and George had endured and how that bitterness had not overtaken her life and how that she was encouraging me to do what we both knew I was called to do. When she had written, she did not know what lay ahead of her health-wise, but she did know in whom she trusted. It was the one who'd gotten her, like Job, through those "few rough spots."

When I think of her now, I cannot help but remember the words from our order for the Burial of the Dead. From Job 19:25-27, "I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth. And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God: whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another." Jesus, our Redeemer still gets all his sheep over those rough spots and finally home to a place he has lovingly prepared, so that we might be with him. ③

PROTESTORS IN HONG KONG 'FLAG UP' THEIR CONCERNS

It's one of the striking images of the ongoing demonstrations in Hong Kong.

A group of protestors had stormed the Hong Kong legislature and installed a British colonial flag over the emblem of China-ruled Hong Kong.

The significance of that on the 22nd anniversary date of Britain handing back the territory to Chinese rule would not have gone unnoticed.

Hong Kong was ceded to Britain in 1842 by China when Britain defeated it in the First Opium War. It was returned to Chinese rule on July 1st 1997.

However, despite the striking visual impact of protestors covering the Hong Kong city emblem with a flag of the former colonial ruler Britain, and while several were seen waving British flags, there was no immediate suggestion of a demand to return to British rule.

On the same day, there was also a pro-China march and functions elsewhere in the city celebrating Hong Kong-China ties.

But Monday's storming of the Hong Kong legislative assembly hall on the 22nd anniversary of the territory's return under the Chinese flag coincided with wider ongoing demonstrations against a proposed extradition law between Hong and Beijing.

Pro-democracy demonstrators are demanding that a controversial bill that would allow extraditions from Hong Kong to China should be scrapped.

Some protestors have raised fears about China's legal system and have also voiced concerns about the direction Hong Kong could be headed when its 50 year period of autonomy agreed



with Britain in 1997 comes to an end in 2047.

Although back under Chinese authority, Hong Kong, one of the world's leading economies, continues to function largely with a legal system put in place during its period of British rule.

Campaigners say the proposed extradition law violates that principle and there have been a series of mass demonstrations against it since earlier this year.

The Hong Kong government has bowed to pressure and says it will suspend the proposed legislation indefinitely.

That doesn't go far enough for campaigners who want it scrapped altogeth-

er and are also demanding the resignation of current leader, Hong Kong's Chief Executive Carrie Lam.

Elected for a five-year term in 2017 she is regarded as a favourite of the Chinese government but is an unpopular figure in Hong Kong.

It's left to be seen if either will happen.

On paper, Hong Kong has local autonomy as a Special Administrative Region of China, but observers point out that China wields considerable influence behind the scenes.

While Hong Kong police have been criticised in some circles for being heavy-handed against demonstra-

tors, especially during this week's incident, they have been equally chastised for allowing demonstrators to break into and ransack the legislative hall.

Since March this year, millions of people have taken part in the demonstrations against the planned extradition law with hundreds of thousands turning up at individual events.

On one occasion last month it's estimated that around two million people participated in a march described as relatively peaceful.

There are no signs of the demonstrations ending any time soon. •

Canada retrieves dumped garbage

Canada has had to concede to the wishes of the Philippines and retrieved dozens of containers it had dumped in the Philippines. Sixty-nine containers full of garbage have returned to the western shores of Canada after being stranded for years in the Philippines. The matter had sparked a diplomatic row and prompted threats of an armed conflict.

The containers arrived at GCT Deltaport, near

Vancouver on Saturday, where the contents are set to be incinerated by next week.

The garbage had prompted Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte to withdraw diplomats from Canada and threaten the country with war after Canada failed to retrieve the waste by a May 15 deadline.

A Philippine court had ordered the repatriation after it emerged that the garbage had been mislabelled as recyclable plastics before it left Canada in 2013 and 2014.

Canada agreed to take the waste back in late May.

Other Southeast Asian countries have also struck out against several developed countries over their waste disposal in recent months.

In May, Malaysia demanded that the United States, Japan, France, Canada, Australia and Britain retrieve 3,000 tons of garbage.

The problem emerged after China stopped accepting waste last year, leading many other countries to take in the redirected rubbish.

Canada changed its rules on garbage disposal in 2016 to avoid future disputes like the one with the Philippines.

Philippines braces for deadly earthquake

The Philippines is on high alert for a major earthquake as the country states it is preparing for 'The Big One'.

The Philippines sits atop the dreaded 'Ring of Fire' and with a population of 108 million, a major quake could be devastating for the southeast Asian nation.

The Ring of Fire is the largest and most active fault line in the world, stretching from New Zealand, all around the east coast of Asia, over to Canada and the USA and all the way down to the southern tip of South America and causes more than 90 percent of the world's earthquakes. The plates which make up the Ring of Fire are so huge even the slightest shift results in massive tremors, volcano activity and tsunamis.

Experts know that the Ring of Fire has the potential to unleash some catastrophic quakes and officials in the Philippines are now recognising that threat.

Recently the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology (PHI-VOLCS) has urged the public to take part in a preparation drill, as it admits 'the Big One' is coming.

The Philippines has always been prone to deadly earthquakes.

The most fatal of them all came in 1976 when a 7.9 magnitude tremor claimed the lives of 4,791 people.

More recently, a tremor registering 7.2 on the Richter scale led to the deaths of 222 people in October 2013.

In April this year, 11 people died as a 6.1 magnitude earthquake devastated Porac, located roughly 67 miles northeast of Manila.

10 years since Honduras coup

Hondurans in their thousands took to the streets Friday in the latest mass demonstration against President Juan Orlando Hernandez, under whose watch gang violence and corruption have made the country the epicentre of Central American migration to the United States.

Officially held to mark the 10th anniversary of the coup which overthrew leftist president Manuel Zelaya, the now-opposition leader called on his supporters to use the occasion to pile pressure on Mr Hernandez.

Honduras has been rocked by weeks of protests, initially by striking doctors and teachers' unions to protest controversial health and education decrees.

When some units of the police joined truckers on strike last week, the government called the army onto the streets.

Mr Zelaya said that 10 years after the June 28, 2009 coup that deposed him, protesters "are on the streets today against privatization" of the health and education sector and to call on Mr Hernandez to resign.

Mr Zelaya's Liberty and Refoundation Party announced that Friday's

commemoration paid tribute to those killed by police repression of the protests amid rising tensions.

The 66-year-old opposition leader said the country was facing its biggest crisis since the coup that deposed him.

Anti-government protests intensified last week when at least three protesters were killed in clashes with security forces.

On Monday, military police opened fire on students at the National Autonomous University in Tegucigalpa who were calling for Mr Hernandez's resignation, wounding at least five.

Mr Hernandez -- who is due to step down at the end of his second fouryear term in January 2022 -- went on television last Tuesday to reject calls for his resignation and insist he would complete his mandate.

'Coup' plotter tortured then murdered

Venezuela's opposition party and the US on Sunday condemned the death under "torture" of a naval officer detained for alleged trying to oust President Nicolas Maduro.

Washington blamed Mr Maduro for the death of Rafael Acosta Arevalo, which came amid a standoff between Venezuela's opposition chief Juan Guaido and the president that's stretched for more than five months.

"The United States condemns the killing and torture of" Acosta, the State Department said in a statement.

The officer "died while in the custody of Maduro's thugs and their Cuban advisers," it added.

National Assembly leader Mr Guaido, recognized as interim president by the United States and about 50 countries, said on that Mr Acosta died "after being tortured."

Mr Acosta was part of a group of 13 people arrested for alleged involvement in a failed "coup d'etat" against Mr Maduro, which the government has tied to Guaido.

Mr Maduro's government has claimed the coup was to have taken place on June 23 and 24 and involved the assassination of the president and several other senior officials.

The Lima Group, made up of a dozen Latin American countries and Canada, condemned the "assassination" of Mr Acosta and called for the intervention of UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Michelle Bachelet.

Ms Bachelet, a former Chilean president, visited Caracas last month and called for the "release" of imprisoned political opponents in the country, which number close to 800.

On top of the fraught political situation, Venezuela is also grappling with its most-severe economic crisis in recent history, with the country in the grip of power cuts and shortages of basic goods and medicines.

According to the United Nations, more than seven million Venezuelans - a quarter of the country's population - need emergency humanitarian aid.

Cubans to get meagre pay rise

The Cuban government has announced that it is raising state salaries as part of a broader package of economic reforms, but it revealed no details of its larger plan beyond increasing worker compensation.

A salary increase is seen as one of the first steps in the unification of Cuba's unique dual-currency system,

a process that could be a risky gambit in the face of an economic crisis exacerbated by tightened US sanctions.

ed by tightened US sanctions.

For the last quarter-century, Cubans have used one-peso worth about four cents and another worth nearly a dollar. The stronger peso was introduced as a replacement for the dollars traded on the black market during the island's post-Soviet economic crisis in the 1990s. Over time, the two currencies have come to be used by the communist government to set extremely low prices for goods and services considered basic rights and extremely high prices

for others considered luxuries, creating distortions that cripple economic growth.

The collapse of Venezuela's economy has led to a cut in aid to Cuba, and sharp slowdown worsened by a series of Trump administration measures designed to cut off funding to the island's government.

The announcement read on state television said that the minimum salary would be nearly \$17 a month while the average salary would increase from \$32 to \$44. There were also slight rises in state pensions.

First black female bishop in UK

The United Kingdom has appointed its first black female bishop who said leadership of the Church of England needs to better reflect the minorities who make up its congregations.

Jamaica-born Reverend Rose Hudson-Wilkin said her appointment should broadcast how diverse the Church was.

She described being racially abused in the street recently, when a passer-by told her to "go back to Africa".

Currently chaplain to the Queen and Commons speaker, she will become Bishop of Dover in November.

Rev Hudson-Wilkin, 58, said: "It's been a long time coming and we're working at it and we are going to hold the Church to account," she said.

"The reality is minority ethnic membership makes up a significant part of the Church and this must be reflected in its leadership, not just with one person here and another person there.

"It must begin to filter through so that young people in minority ethnic background growing up within the life of the Church, within the life of this country, can see images of themselves reflected throughout."

She added: "Visibility is important because if people can see it, then though know they belong."

Rev Hudson-Wilkin has openly criticised the Church's lack of diversity and has accused it of "institutional racism" in the past.

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Gauff is a future ace

It was fitting that Cori 'Coco' Gauff, only, 15, made tennis history by beating the legendary Venus Williams.

The prodigy conquered the Williams, 6-4 6-4, in a staggering first-round match at Wimbledon and it was if the baton had been passed. Williams, 39, has won Wimbledon championship five times while this was Gauff's debut. She's the youngest to play at the tournament in 28 years.

"This is the first time I ever cried after winning a match," Gauff said "I never thought this would happen. I don't know how to explain it. I'm literally living my dream. Not many people get to say that."

What made the moment so endearing was her utmost respect and admiration for Williams.

"When we shook hands she told me congratulations and to keep going and good luck," Gauff said. "I said 'thank you for everything you've done.' I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for her."

Gauff played Slovakia's Magdalena Rybarikova in the next round, after our press time. She won't get to the second week of Wimbledon but is surely a future multiple winner of the competition that Venus and sister Serena have dominated for the past two decades.

Before becoming the youngest woman to win a Wimbledon match since 1991, Gauff was already the youngest-ever player to qualify there after receiving a wildcard offer. Gauff is currently ranked 272nd in the world while Venus is 44th.

"I have nothing to lose playing against one of the greatest players of all time, and I'm just super honoured I get to share the court with her," the young athlete said in an interview before the history-making match. Though her family is originally from the Georgia capital, Atlanta, they currently live in Delray Beach, Florida. She has two younger brothers, and her supportive parents were athletes themselves. Her father Co-

rey (she's named after him) was a point guard at Georgia State University and her mother Candi was a gymnast and track star at Florida State University.

Corey is also her head coach and has been since she started playing at 8. He not only supports her game but wants her to speak out on issues and moments in the zeitgeist. For example, according to The New York Times, she recently celebrated Juneteenth on her Instagram story, a holiday that honours the emancipation of slaves.

"I've always challenged her, from the beginning of this when we started, telling her that she'll be able to change the world with her racket," Corey said. "So I'm not going to encourage her, when she gets there, to stick her head in the ground and ignore social issues."

Gauff has also made the US Open girls' final when she was 13 — making her the youngest-ever to do so — and later won the French Open girls' singles title.

"Serena Williams has always been an idol, and Venus, I mean, they're the reason why I wanted to pick up a tennis racket," she said. "I met them both and they're both super kind people and I'm just super

happy and thankful that they chose to play tennis because I'm sure they'll dominate any sport they wanted to play."

Serena made a surprise visit to one of Gauff's practices last October. Apparently, the star wanted to congratulate the youngster over her recent sponsorship contract with New Balance.

Serena admires Gauff's success, reflecting on her remarkable ability to the New York Times. "I see her out there working, training, her and her dad; it reminds me of the time where I was out there with my dad," Williams said. "I can't help but look inside of myself and be proud and be happy for her."

Forbes estimates that the high schooler is set to make an estimated \$1 million in 2019. The impressive sum is due to an endorsement partnership with Italian pasta company Barilla, and multi-year sponsorship agreements with New Balance and racket-making company Head.

With that in mind, when asked in 2017 what her biggest dream was, she gave ESPN a simple answer: "I want to be the greatest of all time."

Looks like she's headed in that direc-

West Indies may have underperformed at the ICC World Cup in England and Wales but some of their younger players impressed giving them hope for the future. Nicholas Pooran was one. The 23-year-old Trinidadian hit a magnificent debut century, scoring 118 against Sri Lanka as West Indies lost by 23 runs on Monday. They finished at the foot of the 10 teams with no-hopers Afghan-

Pooran's extraordinary talent has already been spotted by English county side Yorkshire who have signed the wicketkeeper-batsman for part of the T20 Blast. He will be available for five games for the Vikings from the start of the competition on 19 July.

He has been ever-present for West Indies in the current World Cup, scoring 63 in their defeat by England at the Hampshire Bowl.

"I'm very excited to be joining Yorkshire," Pooran said. "It will be a new and exciting experience for me." He will return to the West Indies squad in time for their home T20 international series against India, which begins on 3 August in Florida. 🈚

Durant is Brooklyn bound

Kevin Durant was expected to move to New York this summer, but most thought he would join the Knicks. But the two-time NBA champion is set to sign for the Brooklyn Nets, after three seasons with the Golden State Warriors.

The 30-year-old small forward will join the Nets after the free agency period ends on 6 July.

The contract is a four-year deal worth \$164m. Durant won back-to-back championships with the Warriors in 2017 and 2018 and was named as the Finals MVP on both occasions.

In game five of the 2019 NBA Finals against the Toronto Raptors, Durant returned to an injury-riddled Warriors team after a month-long absence.

But his return was marred by a rupture to his right Achilles tendon, which could see him side lined for the entire 2019-20 season.

Durant joined the Warriors from the Oklahoma City Thunder in 2016 and averaged 25.8 points, 7.2 rebounds and 5.4 assists per regular-season game during his three-year stay in Oakland. Kyrie Irving, who played last season with the Boston Celtics, and DeAndre Jordan, who's currently on the New York Knicks' roster, are also expected to sign with the Nets. 🌎

Mané brace puts Senegal through

Sadio Mané scored twice after missing a penalty as Senegal reached the last 16 at the Africans Cup of Nations with a 3-0 win over Kenya in Egypt.

The Liverpool forward bagged a late brace to make up for seeing Patrick Matasi save his first-half spot-kick in Cairo. Ismaila Sarr opened the scoring in the second half while Philemon Otieno was dismissed for Kenya after conceding Senegal's second penalty - which Mane converted.

Senegal finished second in Group C, behind Algeria, but needed to wait until the final 30 minutes to break Kenya down.

Just after the half hour, Abud Omar brought down Saliou Ciss but Mané's penalty was weak and Matasi saved comfortably. Sarr opened the scoring after 63 minutes when he fired in from Lamine Gassama's cross.

Mané then scored his first when he capitalised on an error from Musa Mohammed eight minutes later. Otieno was dismissed for bringing down Sarr with 14 minutes left and Mané scored from the spot.

Algeria's Adam Ounas scored twice, and Islam Slimani also netted in their 3-0 defeat of Tanzania as their second-string side proved far

The goals all came in the last 10 minutes of the first half. The victory meant Algeria matched hosts Egypt and Morocco with a full haul of nine points in the group stage, while Tanzania finished bottom as they returned to the tournament for the first time since 1980. Algeria will face a third-place finisher in the

The Ivory Coast secured their progress from Nations Group D with a 4-1 win over Namibia.

Ivory Coast finished second after South Africa conceded a late winner to group champions Morocco to lose 1-0. Mbark Boussoufa struck in stoppage time in Cairo. 😚




