EDITORIAL

The importance of celebrating our Coat of Arms

An important symbol of the Cayman Islands and the people who live here, the Coat of Arms celebrated 60 years since first being established on 14 May and a gathering of government officials were in the UK on that special day to commemorate this important symbol's diamond jubilee.

Alfonso Wright is the Executive Chairman of the Celebrate Cayman team tasked with ensuring that everybody (whether in the Cayman Islands or in the UK) is able to appreciate the importance of the Coat of Arms and was in the UK, along with Premier Alden McLaughlin, Governor Anwar Choudhury and other government officials, to celebrate the day.

Mr Wright said in addition to participating in celebrations held at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office organised by the Cayman Islands government's London office, he had used his time in the UK to research archives to find out more about the history of the Coat of Arms, which was ordered by the Queen Elizabeth on 14 May 1958.

Understanding identity

He felt that now was a good time to properly show the UK what the Coat of Arms stood for, in terms of understanding Cayman's identity.

"We are more than just a financial district of a tourist destination," he explained. "We are a country with a lot of heart and soul and we are proud of our heritage and the things we have accomplished over the years."

In order to reinforce an understanding of Caymanian heritage, Mr Wright said that the London office had brought up a display that had been in the National Museum that would take viewers back in time to 1958 when the Coat of Arms was first established.

Back home, Mr Wright said that the Celebrate Cayman team would be leading a year-long celebration, during which time they would be visiting all of Grand Cayman's districts and



also the sister islands of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman to help engage and educate everyone about the importance of the Coat of Arms, which went on to become Cayman's first national

The anniversary day was marked locally with the draping of the Government Admin building on Elgin Avenue followed by other government buildings across all three islands. The dressing features the Coat of Arms as well as the Celebrate Cayman logo.

"When the year is over I don't think there will be anyone who would have lived or visited the Cayman Islands who would have not have heard something about the Coat of Arms and what it means to its people," Mr Wright confirmed.

Celebrations in Cayman will officially begin on Monday 28 May. The launch event, which is open to the public, will take place on the Glass House green and will feature local food and musical performances.

Recent Outages Explained-An Update

Work on the upgrades to the Bodden Town substation is near completion. That means that customers east of Prospect, excluding North Side, who, within the past month experienced above normal levels of outages, will see an improvement in the reliability of service.

The Bodden Town substation is currently being refurbished and it is anticipated that the substation will be fully back in service by the end of this month. While the substation is out of service, customers who would normally be supplied from the Bodden Town substation are being supplied from the Frank Sound or Prospect substations and are therefore exposed to a greater risk of

CUC has been going through a very active period of substation upgrades. These upgrades will increase capacity and reliability to customers in the affected districts, but in the interim, the necessary configuration to facilitate these upgrades reduces system redundancy and increases the vulnerability to outages.

CUC has begun the construction of a new Prospect Substation with completion expected in 2020. CUC is able to complete the construction with minimal exposure to outages, as the existing substation will remain in service throughout the construction period.

The Frank Sound substation will be upgraded in 2021.

CUC has already completed upgrades to the South Sound, North Sound Road, and Rum Point Substations in October 2018, March 2019 and April 2019 respectively.

Following this major programme of upgrades and refurbishments to the eastern substations, CUC will be able to meet foreseeable load growth with increased reliability for its customers. As the Cayman Islands continue to grow and our population increases, CUC continues to invest in our country and our people, consistently striving to achieve our vision of empowering Cayman to be a global leader. 😚

parks and cemeteries, beach clean-ups, clearing beach access, garbage collection; as well as cleaning roadside verges and general bush clearance.

"While the Government is encouraged that at 2.8% unemployment is now at its lowest in more than a decade, we are still keen to help those who are experiencing difficulties finding full-time work," said Minister of Commerce, Planning and Infrastructure, Hon. Joey Hew.

"This Summer's NiCE Project has been brought forward to assist in addressing the issue of sargassum on the beaches and coastline of Grand Cayman. A similar project will be conducted on the Sister Islands by the Ministry of District Administration," he concluded.

NiCE applicants will need to bring a completed application form and supporting documentation to prove immigration status on registration day.

Rigorous vetting will take place to ensure that only those who are eligible are

accepted onto the programme. Those accepted onto the programme will be required to attend work daily from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Contracted workers will be paid \$10 per hour; foremen will receive \$12 per hour.

Application forms can be picked up at all District Libraries in Grand Cayman, as well as from District MLA Offices, the Needs Assessment Unit, Workforce Opportunities Residency Cayman (WORC) formerly known as the National Workforce Development Agency and from the Government Administration Building's reception.

Government agencies working together to organise this summer's project are the Public Works Department (PWD), the National Roads Authority (NRA), the Department of Environmental Health (DEH) and (WORC).

The Government intends to undertake another NICE project in November 2019 to provide temporary seasonal employment in the run up to the holiday season.

Cayman Fertility Clinic officially opens at East End

Although it has already begun helping couples in Cayman to achieve their dream of becoming parents, Cayman Fertility Clinic officially opened for business this week at its Heron Place location situated by the Health City hospital complex at East End.

The clinic's Medical Director, Dr Joseph Davis, is a US board certified Reproductive Endocrinologist. He explained that the services they could offer couples here in Cayman were all-encompassing and that a positive patient experience was at the core of what they do.

"We are a full-service fertility clinic, treating all aspects of male and female infertility, including IVF treatment and thereby meeting the needs of people on island who traditionally had to seek such services overseas," he advised.

Getting pregnant via IVF has been an onerous task for women on island up until now, with frequent visits to their fertility clinic overseas required in the space of a few weeks a necessary part of the procedure. With a full-service provider on island, patients now can undergo the procedure without the expense of travel costs and without the inconvenience of missing work.

Dr Davis brings with him a wealth of experience and knowledge, having been the Medical Director at the prestigious Reproductive Medical Associates in New York, SoHo. Local business partner Mark Scotland joined forces with Barbados Fertility Clinic (BFC) to bring the Cayman practice here and they have been working hard since late last year to get Cayman Fertility Clinic up and running. Dr Davis said the clinic employed best practices from his former practice as well as the standards of the JCI accredited BFC.

"The key to successful IVF is employing the right technology which greatly enhances not only the success rate but also reduces the chances of multiple births that have been associated with IVF in the past," Dr David explained. "Preimplantation Genetic Testing is a new approach that we use to ensure that only the strongest embryos are used in the IVF process, which increases the chances of the pregnancy running to full term. Using this technology means a success rate of around 75 per cent per embryo."

Barbados Fertility Clinic serves that country and the wider south Caribbean. Dr Davis said he envisaged that

the Cayman clinic would not only serve local patients but also the northern Caribbean and the United States as well. Their lab director is currently splitting their time between the two jurisdictions, but it is anticipated that as the business grows, a full-time lab director will be employed in each location.

"While we expect a strong client base locally, we anticipate that our clinic will attract patients from overseas as well, which will be a boost to Cayman as

a healthcare destination and to the island in general,"

Dr. Davis said

Dr Davis concluded: "In New York we focused on delivering a high-quality patience experience and that is what we bring to our patients here. I want our patients to understand that we are on a journey together and that they are part of the decision-making process at every step of the way. Transparency and education are at the cornerstone of what we do."

Cayman Finance pleased to have FBI acknowledge Cayman's "immense value" in combatting financial crime

A senior official from the United States Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) has commented on the positive role that jurisdictions like the Cayman Islands play in combatting financial crime.

Appearing before the US Senate Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs Committee in May 2019, FBI Acting Deputy Assistant Director (Criminal Investigative Division), Steven M. D'Antuono, spoke about the "immense value" of beneficial ownership information shared by United Kingdom Overseas Territories and Crown Dependencies, including the Cayman Islands, that law enforcement has continually praised in their investigations.

Mr D'Antuono noted that bilateral agreements with the UK and its Crown Dependencies and Overseas Territories related to the sharing of beneficial ownership information went into effect in July 2017.

"Under the terms of these agreements, UK law enforcement has access to company beneficial ownership information in support of investigations. This information must be made available within 24 hours of a request. Our colleagues at the UK's National Crime Agency have continually noted the immense value of such information in their investigations," he said.

"These frameworks can provide valuable insight into the critical aspects of a successful system for maintaining, accessing, and sharing accurate beneficial ownership information."

Mr D'Antuono gave credit to countries like the Cayman Islands that have robust anti-money laundering and counter terrorism financing regulations for their requirements of documentation [and verification] of beneficial owners for "legal persons". As this information is available to regulators and law enforcement, it allows them to more vigorously be able to identify and mitigate illegal actors and protect financial systems.

Cayman Finance Chief Executive Officer, Jude Scott, welcomed the acknowledgement from the US official about the important role the Cayman Islands play in preventing financial crime.

"Our world class verified ownership regime has been in place for over 15 years. We are pleased to see our international partners continue to recognise our leadership in this area as a transparent jurisdiction that adheres to the highest international standards," said Mr Scott.

The information Cayman requires to be collected is available to the authorities making proper requests to Cayman Islands authorities through existing information sharing channels between the Cayman Islands government and the UK as well as other countries.

"What distinguishes the Cayman Islands regime apart from most others around the world is that the information in our system is collected and verified by licensed Cayman Islands corporate service providers under existing anti-money laundering and know-your-customer laws," said Mr Scott.

"Those same licensed corporate service providers are responsible for submission of beneficial ownership registry information to the Cayman Islands

Government, and that information forms part of the Cayman Islands' current enhanced information exchange arrangements with the UK and shared with other countries, including the US," he added.

A Tufts University study even found that participants in a strength training program were able to see a marked reduction in arthritis pain. In fact, the study found that the end result was better than that received from medications.

Strength training can also improve a person's mental health, reducing depression and improving sleep quality.


Strength Training and **Insulin Sensitivity**

Finally, the last nice thing about strength training that you must note is its impact on insulin sensitivity.

Your insulin sensitivity level is one of the key factors determining your risk of diabetes and metabolic syndrome, a condition that's starting to impact more and more females.

A regular strength training workout routine will help to keep your tissue cells more responsive to insulin, so should you consume carbohydrates in your diet, your body will be able to better utilize those carbohydrates, directing them towards the muscle cells rather than the body fat cells, as was noted in a study published in the Medicine and Science in Sports and Exercise journal.

This helps keep you leaner as well since you'll have a reduced rate of converting those carbohydrates into body fat stores.

It appears the primary reason for this is due to the increased lean muscle tissue development, which then increases the insulin sensitivity level.



Wage survey report highlights best and worst paid jobs

The Economics and Statistics Office has just released their Occupational Wage Survey 2017 Report and it may come as no surprise that the best paid people in the Cayman Islands are for managing directors and those work in accounting, law and dentistry, while the lowest paid are musicians, cleaners and labourers.

The report showed that the average monthly total compensation in the Cayman Islands was \$4,550, with men receiving higher than the average monthly total compensation, at \$4,707, compared with women who received less, at \$4,396. However, when the median salary was examined (i.e. the middle value in the list of salaries), this figure was found to be considerably lower, at \$3,667. This is lower than the average monthly compensation, meaning the majority of employees (64.6 per cent) earned less than the average salary. When averaged out, it was found that Caymanian employees earned \$4,696 per month, slightly more than non-Caymanian employees, who were earning \$4,379 per month.

The highest paid salaries overall were in the professional, scientific and technical sectors (mainly legal and accounting), where people earned on average \$7,231 per month, while those in finance and insurance earned \$6,555 per month. Employees working for households earned the lowest on average, at \$1,058 per month, and those in agriculture, forestry and fishing earned \$1,736 per month.

While somewhat out-of-date now, the report is extensive, representing some 19,215 employees and was conducted across all types of businesses from October 2017 to February 2018, and among a sample of households with employees from November 2017 to April 2018.

Best paid jobs for Caymanians

The highest paid jobs for Caymanians mirrored the best paid jobs overall, with Caymanians earning an average of CI\$70,764 per year in the professional, scientific and technical sector (legal and accounting), and CI\$66,492 per year in the financial and insurance sector. Caymanians working in the utilities sector were earning on average CI\$57,312 per year and the real estate industry was also well paid, at on average CI\$54,468 per year. Human health and social work also were well-paid areas for Caymanians, at CI\$54,204 a year.

The report also showed other areas where non-Caymanians were earning considerable salaries. Non-Caymanian were earning the most in the financial and insurance sectors, at CI\$86,820 per year, followed by professional, scientific and technical jobs (legal and accounting) earning on average CI\$86,268 per year, and human health and social work jobs at CI\$56,028. One sector that does not appear in the Caymanian best paid jobs, but does in the non-Caymanian sector is jobs in the information and communication sector, with non-Caymanians earning CI\$53,856 on average per year.

Most of the jobs surveyed were food and beverage servers/waiters (694), followed by cleaners and helpers in offices, hotels and other establishments, (641), general office clerks (559), finance managers (509), and then accountants, auditors, financial controllers (506).


Finance Minister, Roy McTaggart, said the report was designed to an interna-


tionally comparable standard, and brought together, for the first time, information about the local labour market that would help inform government policy and future legislation.





Cayman Marathon Gives Back To Community and Helps Participants Reach Goals

Participants in last year's Intertrust Cayman Islands Marathon raised over USD9,000 online for several local charities, and organisers hope that more people will use the event – scheduled for Sunday, 8 December this year - to bring awareness and support to the many non-profit and charity organisations in the community. The lion's share of funds raised was for Jasmine (formerly Cayman HospiceCare), which received almost USD5500. Cayman Islands Red Cross also received almost USD1500 in online donations thanks to local runner Oddy Grullon who 'ran for red' and a little over USD1000 was raised for ALS Canada by Cayman resident Kristina Wight. Other organisations for whom money was raised include the Cancer Society, Feed Our Future, Special Needs Foundation and Youth Anti-Crime Trust.

"Increasingly we are seeing more participants looking to run or walk for a purpose beyond their own personal enjoyment or improvement of their health," said Rhonda Kelly, Co-Race Director for the Marathon. "Committing to run/walk to raise funds for a charity is a great motivator; knowing that someone else's life can be positively impacted by your efforts gives you another reason to put in the hours of training and sacrifice necessary to get across that finish line."

Ms. Kelly said participants can create a fundraising page when they register online for the full marathon, half marathon or four-person relay, set their goal, and then send out a link to family, friends and supporters which will allow them to donate from anywhere in the world.

One 2019 participant - Patrice Donalds-Morgan - will be running with a purpose in December as she tackles her first full marathon (26.2 miles) and aims to raise \$10,000 for the Estella Scott-Roberts Foundation (ESRF).

Perhaps best known in the community as a dancer who has represented the Cayman Islands on both local and international stages, Donalds-Morgan, 46, also competed in various track and field events when she was younger (100m, 200m, long jump, triple jump, 400m, 800m and cross-country). However, in her teen years she had to make the decision to focus on dance once she realised the training for both disciplines was incompatible, evidenced by the amount of injuries she was sustaining. Since then she has participated in some of the 5K running events that take place on the island and in the Cayman Islands Half Marathon (2012, 2015) and Four-Person Relay (2016). Now she says she is ready to take on the longer distance.

"I participated in my second half marathon and the team event to raise funds for the Estella Scott-Roberts Foundation because of my own experience of being in an abusive relationship. Completing the race and raising funds served the dual purpose of proving that I could do it and helping someone else at the same time. I was a few years into my healing journey and dealing with deep-seated confidence issues so I needed to know that I could accomplish something, anything," said Donalds-Morgan.

"Now that I have done 6 miles and 13.1 miles, I need to challenge myself again. Plus, I am in a better place now; I am much stronger, more healed and less fearful of being in the public eye again. For a while, I had difficulty being in large crowds and spent about two years staying away from most social situations. Highlighting my own journey will inspire others at whatever point they are in their healing process. I needed to see that when I was in the early stages, and I just could not get anyone to give me a straight answer, so I am becoming the reference manual I needed back then. I hope it helps someone, even if it is just one!'

In 2016 Donalds-Morgan set a \$5000 fundraising goal for the ESRF but did not achieve it. This year she said she wants the push to be bigger and better which is why she started in January and set such an ambitious goal.

"I will not fail this time! I needed a larger goal to push me and the more money I raise, the more there is to share with the community."

Donations have been slow in coming which Donalds-Morgan attributes to people thinking it's too early to commit but she hopes that they will see that she means business and will cross the finish line even if she has to crawl over it.

The money that is raised will help the ESRF with its plans to take the next stage of its advocacy to another level, explained Donalds-Morgan. The organisation will add to what she raises and disseminate the monies to several key Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs) that are helping the community with programmes which directly impact women and families.

With just about 24 weeks to go before race day, Donalds-Morgan says her training so far has consisted of "amazing highs and soul crushing lows" as she battles pain from previous injuries but she just gives herself the rest and rehabilitation that she needs and gets back out on the road. Her advice to anyone who is thinking about running a full or half marathon and/or using the race to fundraise is to start early.

"Start training and fundraising very early and get a team of supporters, encouragers and training partners together. I have the Daylight Warriors team from the 2016 4-person relay as my champions, and new ones who encourage me at every event I participate in. It makes a huge difference when you are in pain and very tempted to just stop, quit, give up," she stated. "Celebrate all the wins, no matter how small. I did some of the races while in severe pain, and I took it easy, but I made it to the end! That sense of accomplishment is amazing and can be a source of encouragement for you for weeks, months even."

Volunteerism: The Moral Element

Handy and Wadsworth in their paper, 'Defining who is a Volunteer', say that volunteers are commonly considered as "unpaid help provided in an organized manner to parties to whom the worker has no obligations."

Volunteers generally work within a formal program with an overarching mission that subdivides into goals, plans, job positions, and tasks. The intended beneficiaries of a volunteer's efforts should be strangers, not friends or relatives.

The literature on the subject says that volunteerism refers to a wide range of activities, including traditional forms of mutual aid and self-help, formal service delivery and other forms of civic participation, undertaken of free will for the general public good and where monetary reward is not the principal motivating factor (Halski-Leventhal, 2011). At least four different types of volunteer activity can be identified within this conceptual framework: mutual aid or self-help; service to others; participation or civic engagement; and advocacy or campaigning.

Professor Don Robotham, in his 1998 Grace Kennedy Foundation Lecture,' Vision and Volunteerism, Reviving Volunteerism in Jamaica', argues that volunteerism can be defined as any action or course of action, usually of a social or civic nature. This course of action is

prompted primarily by altruistic motives, from which the actor does not obtain wages, salary or profit and in which the beneficiaries are people who are not normally the volunteer's direct responsibility.

Robotham in his definition also gives recognition to the critical importance of the moral element in volunteerism. The moral element must be the heart of volunteerism.

He insists that volunteerism is an expression of the degree of moral and civic unity of a society. It is a measure of its state of spiritual integrity. 'Total strangers' in a society take steps to assist others in that society without seeking reward because they have a sense of common feeling and duty to each other. They do not, in fact, regard others as 'total strangers'. They recognize that they have moral claims on one another. That is what a real society is like, says Robotham.

The literature on volunteerism says that it involves much more than working without pay and that it is where people make choices to do so things to help society that go beyond their basic obligations. Volunteerism strengthens civic engagement; safeguards social inclusion, deepens solidarity and solidifies ownership of development results. Volunteerism has a ripple effect in that it inspires others and advances the trans-

formations required for any positive change to take root in communities.

The United Nations highlights four key areas in which volunteering has been transformational: These are in the areas of peacebuilding, environmental sustainability, social inclusion and basic services.

In peacebuilding, volunteerism, says the UN, is known to help regenerate certain fractured or absent dynamics that are crucial to reconciliation and reconstruction. In the area of environmental sustainability, volunteerism has been key in mobilizing communities globally to address environmental degradation.

In speaking to social inclusion and volunteerism, The United Nations says that 'the values inherent in volunteerism opens up diverse pathways for marginalized groups to overcome social exclusion, while enabling them to become drivers of development action'.

In terms of basic services and volunteerism, The United Nations also explains that 'Volunteer action, when well facilitated, can be a particularly effective mechanism to foster support and complement the state provision of essential services across a number of sectors.' The sectors, it continues, include the provision of basic services such as clean water and sanitation, health care and primary and secondary education. These are key ingredients of human development and wellbeing.

The mission of DCR is to provide community based supervision and rehabilitative services to adult offenders, primarily upon the instruction of the Courts and Conditional Release Board.

While studying at the University of South Florida to earn a bachelor's in social work and a minor in sociology, Ms. Malice said it was an internship opportunity with a local jail that sparked her passion to work with offenders.

"I wanted to better understand offending behaviour, why people make some of the choices that they make and be a part of helping them make positive changes in their lives," she explained.

Immediately upon finishing her degree, Ms. Malice was presented with the opportunity to work with DCR.

"DCR has further cemented my passion to be an agent of change in the lives of vulnerable individuals, and has provided me with the opportunity to truly make a difference in my community," she said.

Ms. Malice began her quest to reduce re-offending and contribute to the public safety of the Cayman Islands almost 15 years ago.

"When I joined DCR in 2004, we had not long become our own unit within Government, having been separated from the Department of Children and Family Services to focus on the delivery of services for adult offenders," she said. "At that time we were a small team of Probation Officers and Community Service Coordinators, and within a few years the unit became a department and has since grown significantly to a team of almost 50 staff members."

Throughout her time with DCR, Ms. Malice has helped establish a roadmap for the development of prison and community-based rehabilitation programmes that aim not only to reduce recidivism, but also support the social reintegration of prisoners into the community.

services to offenders that help them live a productive and crime free lifestyle. Our team has some of the most professional, talented, committed and passionate individuals in the Civil Service, and I am extremely blessed to be their leader. I look forward to working with our key stakeholders with the continued support of the Chief Officer Dr. Basdeo and his team in

the Ministry of Financial Services and Home Affairs."
In commenting on the appointment, Chief Officer for Financial Services and Home Affairs, Dr. Dax Basdeo, said: "Ms. Malice's passion and dedication is an inspiration, and supported by a team of like-minded individuals. The department is well-poised to pursue its mission to influence positive behavioural change in adult offenders, and the Ministry will continue to support Ms. Malice and her staff as they deliver on its critical mandate for the country."

OFFSHORE COMPANY INSOLVENCY PETITIONS IN DECLINE THROUGH 2018 AND 2019

Cayman breaks trend with increase in filings, with numbers steady or falling in other jurisdictions, Appleby reports

The total number of winding up petition filings in offshore jurisdictions dropped by more than a third in 2018 when compared to the previous year, with early signs indicating that 2019 will continue this trend, according to a report from leading offshore law firm Appleby.

The firm's report, Offshore Corporate Insolvency & Restructuring: Annual Review & Current Trends, examines company petition filings and any resulting court orders in Bermuda, the British Virgin Islands, Cayman Islands, Guernsey, the Isle of Man and Mauritius.

"Last year saw a significant drop in the number of insolvency petitions filed in offshore jurisdictions and 2019 appears to be continuing this easing of filings, despite widespread anticipation of global slow-down during the period," said Tony Heaver-Wren, Partner and Co-Head of Insolvency & Restructuring in Appleby's Cayman office.



In 2018, Bermuda, Isle of Man and Guernsey all showed steady levels of activity in line with previous years, while Mauritius and BVI filings returned to previous years' levels after experiencing a bump in activity in 2017. Cayman

bucked the global trend as petitions rose 50% in 2018, partly as a result of a group of seven companies being liquidated after becoming embroiled in real estate investment fraud in the U.S.

The report examined notices published across four categories: compulsory winding up filings, conversion of voluntary liquidation to court supervised liquidation, schemes of arrangement and capital reduction.

A total of 193 compulsory winding-up petitions were submitted to offshore courts in 2018, down 35% from the previous year, with 105 winding up orders made. Across the offshore region, the average conversion rate of petitions to orders was 62%, with the remainder either failing or being resolved.

The report found that through June 1 of this year, 62 compulsory winding up filings have been recorded across the surveyed jurisdictions, with 26 winding up orders made so far.


"The Trade Summit will explore areas where the UK and the Overseas Territories can work more closely together to





Caribbean Countries Ensure Insurance Coverage for 2019 Hurricane Season

Caribbean members of the Caribbean Catastrophe Risk Insurance Facility Segregated Portfolio Company (CCRIF SPC) have completed the selection of their insurance portfolio for 2019/20, with nine governments increasing their level of coverage for at least one of their policies and one country purchasing cover for an additional peril – tropical cyclone –it did not have last year.

That's according to CCRIF, the world's first multi-country risk pool offering parametric insurance products for hurricanes, earthquakes and excess rainfall in the Caribbean and Central America.

"As the 2019 Atlantic Hurricane Season begins, CCRIF members can be assured that they are covered for another year – against tropical cyclones as well as excess rainfall events, which occur throughout the year and earthquakes, which may occur at any time," it said, adding that it has provided its members with two policy features – the Aggregate Deductible Cover (ADC) and Reinstatement of Sum Insured Cover (RSIC) – at no cost for 2019/20.

These two features for tropical cyclone and earthquake policies were first offered in 2017. The ADC can provide a minimum payment for events that are objectively not sufficient to trigger a CCRIF policy because the modelled loss is below the attachment point (or deductible). The RSIC provides access to coverage during a policy year even after the maximum coverage limit is reached. This prevents the situation where the insurance cover is exhausted early in

the policy year thus leaving a country exposed until the policy renewal date of June 1 the following year.

CCRIF's tropical cyclone and earthquake policies for 2019/20 are based on a new risk model called SPHERA (System for Probabilistic Hazard Evaluation and Risk Assessment), which replaces the MPRES model, which had been the basis for these policies since 2011. SPHERA is a new state-of-theart model, based on the latest scientific findings and the most updated hazard datasets. The new model features new, up-to-date ground motion, wind and storm surge models; a larger and more detailed stochastic catalogue of events; a more detailed exposure database, including infrastructure and facilities; and new, updated vulnerability functions.

Similarly, the current excess rainfall policies are based on the XSR 2.5 model, an upgrade of the XSR 2.1 model used in 2018. The XSR 2.5 model includes new features that reduce basis risk and improve its results. Enhancements to the model include greater consideration and weight given to short intense events; inclusion of soil saturation in the loss estimates; and incorporation of assimilated observed data into the meteorological model.

"CCRIF is pleased that some member governments have increased their coverage. Increasing the level of coverage is a key component of CCRIF's scaling-up strategy, which also includes increasing membership in both the Caribbean and Central America, as well as offering new

parametric products as a means of helping governments reduce post-disaster resource deficits and budget volatility as well as closing the protection gap," CCRIF said. "Much of this scaling-up strategy is being rolled-out – for example, CCRIF membership now stands at 21 (19 in the Caribbean and 2 in Central America). Also, the Facility is offering new parametric products for drought and fisheries/aquaculture to select countries in 2019/20 and is in the process of developing products for agriculture and public utilities."

CCRIF's scaling-up strategy was launched in early 2018, shortly after the

2017 devastating hurricane season and involved both a technical and financial review of the Facility and incorporated the strategic inputs of stakeholders – its member governments, regional organizations, and development partners.

The US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has predicted a "near-normal" hurricane season this year, which means that there is a likelihood of 9-15 named storms, of which 4-8 could become hurricanes, including 2-4 major hurricanes (category 3, 4 or 5) occurring in the Atlantic this year – any of which could have major impacts in the region.

Death By Drowning: Italian Authorities Say No Foul Play Suspected in Case of Bahamians Pulled From River

Autopsies on two Bahamian men whose bodies were pulled from a river in Turin, Italy earlier this month have concluded that they died from accidental drowning.

But the father of 28-year-old psychology Ph.D. student Blair John – who had met up in the Italian city with his college friend Alrae Ramsey, a Bahamian Foreign Service Officer who was the other man found in the Po River – does not accept his son drowned.

According to Italian news outlets, preliminary results determined the deaths were accidental and no foul play had been uncovered. Additional details in the report indicate that both men had alcohol in their system before somehow falling into the river but the toxicology report indicated that their alcohol levels were not high enough for them to have been drunk.

Investigators suggest that it's possible one of the men slipped or jumped into the water and the other went to save him and they both drowned.

But John's mother Cathleen Rahming told local media after his body was found on June 5, a day after Ramsey's, that he was fit and a strong swimmer. Now the autopsy has been released, his father, Randolph John is adamant his son could not have drowned.

He told the Bahamas Tribune that if the men did drown, it meant they were "incapacitated" before being tossed in the river. He also rejected the idea that his son or Ramsey did drugs.

"If I was born three times again I wouldn't accept that. If it was in fact a drowning then it means that they were incapacitated prior to being thrown in the river. That's what it would mean," he said.

"I know my son and I know his friend. They probably might drink a little bit of alcohol but these are civilized persons with their heads screwed on right. Do you reach that point in your life at that age, if you're not focused?"

John, a St Augustine's College graduate of Class of 2009 who was near completion of his Ph.D. in Psychology at Saint Mary's University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, had travelled to Turin to present an academic paper at a psychology conference.

Ramsey was employed with his country's Ministry of Foreign Affairs from December 2013, and was formerly posted at the Bahamas Embassy in Port-au-Prince, Haiti as third Secretary/ Vice-consul in 2016-2017. Last year, he was granted an In-Service Award to pursue a one-year Postgraduate Diploma programme at the Diplomatic Academy of Vienna in Austria for the September 2018 to June 2019 period. But sometime last week, he went to Turin.

The men both attended the same high school, Saint Augustine's College in New Providence.

Their bodies are to be returned to The Bahamas for burial. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs said it was working assiduously with funeral homes in Turin and Nassau to have the bodies repatriated to The Bahamas as quickly as possible, so that they can be turned over to their families.

Sleepy woman left in plane

A Canadian woman left for hours on an empty plane when she fell asleep has attracted media attention worldwide.

Tiffani O'Brien said she woke up on an empty Air Canada plane, in the dark and "freezing cold," after a short flight from Quebec City to Toronto's Pearson International Airport.

"It's just a sheer sense of helplessness when you feel like you're locked on this aircraft," Ms O'Brien said.

Ms O'Brien "got super comfy reading my book" and fell asleep "probably less than halfway" into the 90-minute flight, she said in a Facebook post, shared with Air Canada by a friend on her behalf.

"I wake up around midnight (few hours after flight landed) freezing cold still strapped in my seat in complete darkness (I'm talking pitch black)," she said in the Facebook post, adding it was "terrifying."

She sent a text to a friend about her predicament. "I just woke up alone in plane," said one text Ms O'Brien showed CTV. "Omg."

Her friend texted back that she called the airport's customer service to let them know about Ms O'Brien

who said her phone died after she communicated with her friend, and she was able to find a flashlight in the cockpit. She managed to get the door of the plane open and was rescued by a ground crew.

The incident happened June 9 and caught the media's attention after the Facebook post 10 days later. Ms O'Brien said in the Facebook post that she has recurring night terrors and is "waking up anxious and afraid I'm alone locked up someplace dark."

A spokesman for Air Canada said: We are still reviewing this matter, so I have no additional details to share, but we have followed up with the customer and remain in contact with her."

Hondurans call for president to go

Thousands of Hondurans continue to take to the streets, calling for President Juan Orlando Hernandez to step down. They are tired of his authoritarian tendencies, austerity measures, and widespread corruption.

The crisis began with two decrees issued by President Hernandez in April, giving the Honduran education and health ministers free reign to implement austerity measures. Since then, the country has been in turmoil, with a wave of protests

putting the president under growing pressure. Analysts doubt the country will stabilize anytime soon and many countries have issued travel warnings.

For weeks, teachers and doctors have expressed their dissent at the government's planned cuts in the education and health care sectors.

Educators and health care workers say the controversial presidential decrees amount to permission to drasti-



cally cut expenditures, privatize their respective industries and fire individuals for holding certain political views. Soon after taking to streets, they were joined by disgruntled farmers, and taxi and truck drivers. And most recently, the Honduran police joined the protests, too, demanding the state provide uniforms, pay for petrol and grant them holidays - things they are officially entitled. 😚

Philippines to be first for 5G

The Philippines is the first country in Southeast Asia offering 5G to its citizens. 5G is said to be the next revolution in wireless connectivity for smart devices. It's faster and has close to no delay when it comes to sending and receiving data.

Countries in Southeast Asia like Malaysia and Singapore have been vocal with their 5G plans. However, Malaysia plans to roll out the network in 2021 or 2022, while Singapore is on track to offer 5G to its citizens in 2020

The Philippines' local internet provider Globe has beaten them to it and announced that it will make 5G

available to its citizens from next month. The coverage will be limited to selected areas with a focus on residential areas. The reason behind the swift deployment is due to the country lacking a good network infrastructure.

Philippines has an average internet speed of 20Mbps, placing them at 107 in the world internet ranking.

In addition to that, placing down fibre wires will require permits from the gov-



ernment which could take up years to complete.

The 5G plans will come with 2TB of quota and will be offered in speeds of 20Mbps, 50Mbps, and 100Mbps which will cost the equivalent of US\$37, \$49 and \$57 respectively a month.

The Philippines 5G network leverages off Huawei equipment, one of the leaders in the 5G market. The country is also in a joint venture with SingTel - one of the largest telecoms in Singapore - to bring the network to the country.

Cuban dissidents under pressure

Cuba's state security is pressuring dissidents to go into exile in its attempt to weaken opposition on the communist-run island, according to a new report by a non-governmental human rights organization.

The Madrid-based Cuban Prisoners Defenders released a 259-page report that named 35 activists, independent journalists and artists authorities whom had forced to leave

the country over the past two years,

telling them never to return. State security threatened them with prison or physical assault if they did not leave and harassed their families, the NGO, which has links to Cuba's largest opposition group, the Patriotic Union of Cuba (Unpacu), said.

Cuba's government, which did not reply to a request for comment, accuses dissidents of being mercenaries paid by its long-time cold war foe, the United States, to undermine it and



typically dismisses such charges as attempts to tarnish its reputation.

Cuban Prisoners Defenders NGO, which formed late last year, said more than a third of the 26 activists who responded to its online survey said they were escorted to the airport by state security and forced into exile.

Some were given boarding passes, typically for flights to Guyana, where Cubans can get a tourist visa on arrival, and money for their first month, it

Venezuela arrests top military

Six members of Venezuela's military and police have been arrested, activists say, weeks after a failed uprising against President Nicolás Maduro.

They include an Air Force brigadier general and former police officers. The government has not yet commented.

Some of the arrests took place as UN human rights chief Michelle Bachelet finished a visit to the country. She called on Mr Maduro to release people arrested for peacefully protesting.

President Maduro has intensified a crackdown

on the opposition since a failed military uprising led by opposition leader Juan Guaidó on 30 April.

More than 700 people have been detained in Venezuela for political reasons, including 100 members of the military, according to local rights group Penal Forum.

Air Force Brig Gen Miguel Sisco Mora was arrested on Friday in a parking lot in the city of Guatire, some 40km (25 miles) east of the capital Caracas, his daughter said on Twitter.

Navy Corvette Capt Rafael Costa was arrested in nearby Guarenas also on Friday, according to his wife, while retired Air Force Col Francisco Torres was arrested by members of the Sebin intelligence agency in his home in Caracas, his daughter said.

The others arrested included retired Air Force Col Miguel Castillo Cedeño, and José Valladares and Miguel Angel Ibarreto, former high-ranking officials at the forensic police agency (CICPC), Penal Forum said. 🏵

Brown fears for UK politics

The former Labour Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, Gordon Brown, has said the unity of the UK has never been at greater risk, faced by the "hijacking of patriotism" by Boris Johnson and Nigel Farage and, what Mr Brown said was a shift by the Scottish National party towards a more extreme nationalism.

Warning against a no-deal Brexit, Mr Brown said the Conservative party had turned what would be an act of economic self-harm into a test of patriotism.

He also became the latest high-profile political figure to advocate the use of citizens' assemblies to overcome the deadlock and confusion around Brexit, calling for the labour movement to take a lead on this if government and other parties failed to do so.

Speaking at an event organised by the anti-racism group Hope Not Hate and the Fabian Society, Mr Brown said: "The country is about to choose the next prime minister but missing so far from the Conservative leadership contest is a serious debate on the biggest existential question of all - the unity of the United Kingdom and the future of the union and how to prevent an even more damaging descent into divisive nationalisms."

Mr Brown warned: "I believe the union is today more at risk than at any time in 300 years – and more in danger

than when we had to fight for it in 2014 during a bitter Scottish referendum."

"In jeopardy are both the unity and integrity of the United Kingdom and the shared values - tolerance, respect for diversity, being outward looking - that underpin what, for all its ups and downs, has been the most successful example of multinational co-operation anywhere in the world."

USA must face hosts France

reaching its final stages and the most anticipated match of the tournament will be played on Friday.

United States midfielder Megan Rapinoe said their quarter-final against hosts France could be "wild and crazy".

Rapinoe scored two penalties in Monday's 2-1 victory over Spain, as the holders set up the tie in Paris.

The two sides were the pre-tournament favourites, and both topped their groups, with a semi-final against England or Norway awaiting the winners.

"This is the game everyone had circled," said Rapinoe. "This is incredible for the women's game. You have two heavy-hitters meeting. I hope it's wild

The Women's World Cup in France is and crazy. I hope the fans are crazy, there is tons of media around it and it is just a big spectacle."

> Their Britain-born head coach Jill Ellis, who was in charge when they won the World Cup in 2015, added: "It's going to be an amazing game. I'm sure a lot of people would want it later in the tournament.

"It's probably going to be crazy with a lot of intensity, but that's as it should be because I truly think this is the world game for women, so what a showcase piece."

France are bidding to win their first major tournament, while the USA are attempting to lift a record fourth Women's World Cup.

Despite the two teams being the favourites from the outset, neither has appeared invincible so far in the knockout stages.

The day after France needed extra time to overcome Brazil in their last-16 tie, the defending champions were thoroughly tested by Spain in Reims.

Against Spain, Ellis' team conceded a goal for the first time at these finals, and occasionally appeared sloppy at the back, in a game some bookmakers had them down as 1-10 odds-on favourites to win.

Former USA goalkeeper Hope Solo said there were many things to question about her former side's display and said:

"When you have that much attacking prowess, to not get a goal in normal play is concerning.

"People don't bow down to the United States like they used to. They don't come in and put everyone on edge like they used to.

"Many teams have proved they can beat the USA. If you want to beat the USA, you have to press the backline.

"That's where they are truly vulnerable. It's the decision-making, it's the quality of passing - and I think there are nerves back there."

Roger Federer is way past the prime years of a champion tennis player, but he just keeps going. The 37-year-old Swiss got his Wimbledon preparations off to the perfect start by claiming a record-extending 10th title at the Halle grass-court event.

The Swiss 20-time Grand Slam champion beat Belgium's David Goffin 7-6 (7-2) 6-1 to win a 102nd career title.

Federer, chasing a ninth Wimbledon title next month, was made to work in earlier rounds but dominated the

"It's unbelievable. I never thought when I first played here that I would win 10 titles," he said.

It is the first time Federer has reached double figures at one tournament, with eight at the Dubai Open and Wimbledon and nine at his home event in Basel.

Federer is world ranked No.3 behind No.1 Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal who is No.2. 🏈

Hamilton wants end to 'boring' races

Lewis Hamilton insists drivers should not be blamed for "boring" Formula 1 races and warned "serious changes" are needed to the sport's plans to overhaul its rules in

Speaking after he continued Mercedes' streak of winning every race so far this year in a processional French Grand Prix, Hamilton urged the media "don't point the fingers at the drivers because we don't write the rules"

"We have nothing to do with the money and all that kind of stuff. You should put the pressure on the people

at the head who should be doing their job. I think they are trying to but for many, many years they have made bad decisions."

Hamilton and Nico Hulkenberg attended a meeting of Formula 1 Management, the FIA and the team last week to discuss the state of plans to extensively revise the rules in 2021 and introduce new cars which can race together more closely.

"I had nothing to gain by being there but if there's anything I can help," Hamilton said. "They've been making all these decisions and never once had a driver's input in that room. So if that can be the decisive point that can help the fans to get better racing then I would be proud to be a part of that.

"Do I have confidence that it's going to shift massively?" he added. "I have faith that it's going to get better. I real-

The world champion said he was encouraged from the willingness shown to bring drivers into the decision-making process but warned the sport's plans for 2021 need a drastic rethink.

"It was encouraging that they allow us to be there, and they're really welcoming. I hope they will continue to have us there, a couple of us drivers

"I think they've extended their decision on making the rules. I think they need to because they are nowhere near where it should be, in my opinion. They've got to make some serious changes to the decision they have already made of how 2021 should be.

"What I'm encouraged by is that Ross [Brawn, Formula 1 sporting director] and his team are working on for the first time a real aero package that hopefully will have an impact on following (other cars), for example."

Jones expects another routine fight

UFC light heavyweight champion Jon "Bones" Jones says he's "ready to go" for his next title defence at UFC 239 next weekend and wants to fight again before the end of the year.

Jones is one of the most polarising figures in all combat sports - seen by many as the best to ever step in the octagon, the last few years of his career have been plagued with failed drug tests, substance abuse problems, and a hit-andrun incident in 2015 where he fled the scene after an accident with two other vehicles.

After reclaiming the title last December, he successfully defended it in March against American Anthony Smith and is widely expected to do so again against Brazil's Thiago Santos on July 6.

Keen to keep making up for the time lost during his suspensions, Jones is hoping to get through this bout unscathed and fight again in December.

"The fights have been great - as long as I'm not injured and the team's ready to put me back to work, I'll be fighting very frequently," he said.

The Smith fight was Jones at his dominant best - but he nearly lost via disqualification after an illegal knee in the fourth round. His opponent could have declined to continue, and the fight would have been over. However, sportingly Smith got back up, and Jones was deducted two points.

Jones claimed a unanimous victory, winning all five rounds on all three judges' cards - but added he feared the worst at that moment. Against Santos, the 31-year-old New Yorker faces a bruiser who has won eight of his last nine fights, all bar one via a stoppage.

"I expect him to come swinging for the fences," Jones said. When asked what his next opponent will do that separates

him from the rest, Jones gave a wither-

ing response. "Honestly, I'm going to say nothing. I don't think he brings anything different," he said. "I've fought a lot of guys with knockout power, a lot of black belts in jiu jitsu - and I've stood the test of time."




