Richard Simms is the | Registration for new DFH Director

A familiar face is heading up the Department of Environmental Health (DEH), the Ministry of Health announced today (Tuesday, 4 June 2019).

Newly confirmed DEH Director Richard Simms. whose appointment took effect on 1 June, has been serving in the role since he was seconded to the agency last summer from his previous position as Director of the Department of Vehicle and Equipment Services.

Minister of Health, Hon. Dwayne Seymour, says he is pleased that the key leadership position will be permanently filled by someone known to the team and already conversant with Government's policy direction for the department.

"Our objective is to provide an international standard of waste and sanitation services to the people of the Cayman Islands. Mr Simms has already demonstrated an ability to deliver results and we are happy to have him on board", the Minister remarks.

Asked what achievements he is most proud of over the last several months at DEH, Mr Simms cites the significant reduction in the Department's overtime spending by 80 percent over 2017 levels.

He is also happy he says that he has been able to keep garbage collection on schedule, and was also pleased with the results of a memorandum of understanding, signed with Her Majesty's Cayman Islands Prisons Service, that allowed prisoners to assist with garbage collection.

As he transitions into the permanent position his personal goals will be to continue to strengthen services across all areas of DEH, and, as part of this to increase staff and improve equipment.

The Department is responsible for the collection and disposal of solid waste and as such manages landfills across all three Cayman Islands. Around

half of the department's approximately 140 employees work for the solid waste section.

Other duties assessing the compliance with the Public Health Law of some 400 premises; maintaining and landscaping beaches and cemeteries; providing analytical and microbiology laboratory services to test water, air and industrial discharge; food hygiene surveillance.

EDITORIAL

Voters may soon have their say. Are you ready?

It is now clear that registered voters in the Cayman Islands may have a chance to have an official say on the divisive topic on whether government should move ahead with its plans for the cruise berthing project in George Town

However, there have been those who have expressed unease at the need for the Supervisor of Elections to verify each signature on the petition. Some have indicated a fear of victimisation but it is understood the process is to ensure everything is legally sound heading into the vote.

Getting the required number of signatures does not automatically mean campaigners have stopped government from moving forward. What happens now is that there will likely be a vote on whether the project should advance. Government, however, will be the ones setting the tone for any such vote. They will determine the exact

wording of the question to be posed at a referendum.

With that explainer out of the way, we return to the right to vote. In prior editorials, we have stressed the importance of registering to have your name on the electoral register. A case like this shows that there is the potential to be called upon to have a say on matters of national importance aside from the four-year election cycle.

The referendum will not only be for those who oppose the project in its current form but for those who are also in support. Both sides have the right to let their vote be counted. Staying away because you don't agree with the campaigners is the coward's way out and cheapens the process.

We continue to watch developments and encourage everyone eligible to vote to turn out on Referendum Day and let their voices be heard. Democracy is, after all, not a spectator sport.

Health Screening Required for New Students

All students entering government or private schools in the Cayman Islands for the first time are required to have health screenings this summer.

The screening includes a growth and development assessment, screening for vision and hearing, a dental assessment, the administration of necessary immunisations and obtaining a student's personal medical history.

Noting that this includes students entering reception programmes, School Health Coordinator Nurse Carvell Bailey adds: "The Education Department mandates that these screenings must be completed before the new school year begins in September."

Public Health Department staff will conduct the screenings which are free to all students. For those entering schools in West Bay and the Eastern districts, health screenings will take place at the district health centres from 3 to 28 June 2010.

For all other students, health screenings will take place at John Gray High School Medical Centre (nurse's office) from 4 July to 16 August 2019.

Appointments can be made at the school the child will be attending. Nurse Bailey reminds parents and guardians that they need to accompany their children to the health screening. They should also bring the child's immunisation record.

"Vaccines will be offered to children whose immunisations are not up-to-date. A health screening certificate will then be issued, which is to be taken to the child's school," she explained.

Parents may have their child's health screenings done by a private doctor, as long as that doctor completes the school health screening forms provided by the Public Health Department.

The completed forms should be handed in at the John Gray High School Medical Centre (nurse's office) between 4 July and 16 August, from 8.30 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. Outside of these dates, the forms can be taken to the Cayman Islands Hospital's Public Health Clinic.

Once the record has been received, a health screening certificate will be issued which must then be taken to the school that the child will be entering in September.

In Cayman Brac and Little Cayman, appointments for school entry screenings can be made by contacting Public Health Nurse Kedine Hyde at Faith Hospital on 948-2243/244-7643.

Governor calls for anti-corruption law's "urgent" implementation

As the Cayman Islands hosts members of the Commonwealth Caribbean's anti-corruption agencies this week at the 5th Annual CCAICACB Conference, Governor Martyn Roper used his opening address at the conference to call for the urgent implementation of this jurisdiction's own anti-corruption law, the Standards in Public Life. This law, intended to "to preserve and promote the integrity of public officials and institutions; and for incidental and connected purposes", was first passed in 2014 and then amended in 2016, but has not yet been implemented.

Specifically, the law deals with how members of the Legislative Assembly. Chief Officers and members of Statutory bodies should act with selflessness and act solely in terms of the public interest, not doing so in order to gain financial or other consideration for themselves, their immediate family or their friends. They should act with integrity and not

place themselves under any financial or other obligation to individuals or organisations outside the relevant civil service entity that might seek to influence them in the performance of their official duties. They should also act with objectivity, be accountable, act openly, honestly and show good leadership skills.

The Governor was speaking at the three-day conference being held at the Grand Cayman Marriott Beach Resort this week. He outlined the "great strides" the Cayman Islands had taken towards developing and implementing policies within the civil service and strengthening its integrity oversight bodies over the last few years.

But while he believed Cayman had "a good story to tell", he said there was much more to be done.

"I attach the greatest importance to the law, the Standards in Public Life, to be implemented as soon as possible. The Premier assured me he is committed to doing so," Mr Roper said. "Consultations are currently underway to understand some concerns by chairs and members of some of our statutory boards, people who serve voluntarily with little remuneration whose contribution is essential in a small jurisdiction like ours."

The Governor said that the conference came at an opportune time for the Cayman Islands to intensify its enhancement of the ethical integrity of its public

He confirmed that while they waited for the law to be implemented, the body entrusted with overseeing the law, the Commission for Standards in Public Life, did not sit idle.

"Spearheaded by the Chair, Mrs. Rosie Whittaker-Myles, and current members Ms. Sheenah Hislop and Ms. Isatou Smith, the Commission continues to seek ways to carry out its constitutional remit of preventing conflicts of interest and corruption in the public service," he stated. "Outside of this conference the Commission's latest initiative involves the dissemination of a United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime educational programme - Education 4 Justice. This programme seeks to promote a culture of lawfulness, with modules specifically addressing corruption and integrity, amongst our primary, secondary and tertiary students at local private and public educational institutions."

The Governor said that the Anti-Corruption Commission, a sibling to the Commission for Standards in Public Life, also remained a strong and active oversight body, having received 166 reports since its inception with numerous arrests, convictions and ongoing investigations.

He also mentioned the Whistleblower Policy which was affected for the civil service in 2017, which supports the confidential reporting of wrong-doing by public officials, and the Whistleblower Protection Law that came into effect in 2018

"The civil service now also has the ability to utilize a whistleblower hotline staffed by an overseas office, empowering civil servants to confidentially and safely report suspected fraudulent activity," he said, adding that the civil service policies were all a part of the Deputy Governor's comprehensive Anti-Fraud Policy from 2017, which included other provisions for codes of ethics and conduct, offering and receiving gifts, and information management. ③



Commonwealth Sec Gen says fighting corruption creates a level playing field

The Cayman Islands has long felt that the playing field has not been even when it comes to regulations and legislation heaped upon it from offshore countries, but Commonwealth Secretary-General Rt. Hon. Patricia Scotland, QC said that if corruption was fought jointly by Caribbean Commonwealth countries and a global standard found, then a common understanding could be agreed upon that could benefit not only the Caribbean, but the world as a whole.

Her remarks were made at the opening ceremony of the fifth Commonwealth meeting of heads of anti-corruption agencies in the Caribbean, held this week at the Grand Cayman Marriott Beach Resort.

Sec-Gen Scotland said it had been "absolutely critical" that all these anti-corruption agencies come together.

"Unfortunately, when you look at the level of corruption globally, the World Bank and the IMF have made it clear the difference between the money to implement sustainable development goals and the money we have is the sum equivalent that's syphoned off by corruption<' she stated.

Underscoring the importance of stamping out corruption, Ms Scotland said that so many people thought that corruption was a victimless crime but she said it was the money needed for roads, schools and our hospitals.

"We understand this scourge of corruption cannot be dealt with by us individually, it can only be dealt with by us working together because the crooks work together collectively. They don't respect boundaries, so what the Commonwealth has done is to bring together all the agencies within our commonwealth countries so that we can work and fight corruption more successfully," she advised, adding that records had proven that Commonwealth countries were doing better than the non-commonwealth Caribbean countries.

Ms Scotland anticipated that the Cayman Islands would be leading the charge against corruption.

"I'm really proud of what Cayman is doing today, bringing out the Commonwealth best practice benchmarks for anti-corruption and I really hope that since Cayman has been at the forefront of a lot of these issues it will help by taking up the benchmarks and by helping us to implement them in a way that gives a really good standard. I know that the Attorney General Sam Bulgin and the agencies here have shown such commitment traditionally that I'm pretty confident that Cayman will be ahead of the pack along with other jurisdictions trying to make this the cleanest jurisdiction in the world and there is a lot of competition," she stated.

Ms Scotland outlined that the Commonwealth Caribbean Association of Integrity Commissions and Anti-Corruption Bodies (CCAICACB) who were represented at the three-day conference had created 22 benchmarks which cross anti-corruption issues in relation to both the public and private sector.

She said that the issues these benchmarks addressed were "difficult, complex and challenging issues", particularly in small jurisdictions where countries were reliant on many people undertaking pro bono work who want to make a contribution to their society but who also had to abide by good public standards.

Ms Scotland said the Commonwealth wanted global standards.

"We want benchmarks which everyone will see are fair, are implementable
and then we audit who is implementing
them and how," she said. "So, if for example, 22 anti-corruption benchmarks
are endorsed by our 53 countries and
then adopted next year in the Commonwealth heads of government meeting as
the global standard and there is then the
benchmark by which we all judge our
performance, we then have a fair playing field."


She said that she understood that many countries had objected to the fact that there was an unfair playing field and that people changed the goal posts normally after the play has started.

"This is a common complaint what the Commonwealth is trying to do is bring everyone together to help us to come to a common understanding of what is transparent, what is effective, what

works and what is the most cost efficient and then deliver it," she stated. "By pooling these efforts, we believe we won't just be helping the Commonwealth 53, we will be helping the whole world."

- 3. Commit fully to your new habit, in a public way. This could mean posting it on social media, or simply announcing it at the dinner table. Put yourself in a position where you'll be embarrassed to give up on your new habit.
- 4. Keep track of your progress. You could keep a detailed journal or simply make a check mark on each calendar day that you successfully exercise your new habit.

Once your new habit becomes second nature, usually in about 30 days, feel free to add a second habit by going through the same steps.

MRCU and Cayman Prep Partner for Math Class

A Mosquito Research and Control Unit (MRCU) employee, listening to the radio on her way in to work, was thrilled to hear a student at a school she had recently visited get all the questions right in a quiz on mosquitoes.

Earlier in May MRCU's new junior entomologist Whitney Ebanks joined outreach volunteer Florence (Flo) McNelly to introduce MRCU's work to some 150 years five and six maths students at Cayman Prep School.

Cayman Prep Primary Maths Leader Julie Cheriton made contact with Ms McNelly, when she reached out to MRCU in mid-March to request a mosquito programme with a maths theme for the age group.

"I was so excited to meet with Flo, as she was keen and willing to work with us. We thoroughly enjoyed this first of hopefully many outreach projects with MRCU. The children also benefited from wonderful opportunities to research and have a contextual experience of maths in the real world", Ms Cheriton says.

To celebrate Maths Week she and Ms McNelly developed a five-day programme that gave the MRCU team rough-

ly two hours with the students each day, to teach them about the relationship between mosquitoes and maths.

During this time the young people aged nine to 11 were able to count mosquito eggs and watch the insects develop from the egg stage to adult mosquitoes.

In addition Ms McNelly taught them how containers around homes and businesses can create a breeding ground for potential disease vectors (insects that transmit disease), like the Aedes aegypti mosquito and Aedes albopictus.

They also learned about diseases that mosquitoes carry such as chikungunya, dengue, malaria and heartworm.

From Whitney, a young Caymanian recently employed by MRCU, they heard about the five most abundant mosquito species in the Islands and the habitats in which they live.

As part of the outreach the students were challenged to inspect their residences/property for containers that mosquitoes might use as breeding sites.

Three Men Arrested for Drug Related Offenses in George Town

Just after 1:30AM on Monday 3rd June, police had cause to speak with and search three (3) men and the vehicle they were travelling in, at a parking lot off Shedden Road, George Town. The men

Motor Vehicle Collision Involving a Motorcycle on **Shamrock Road**

The driver of the motorcycles was immediately transported to the hospital with serious injuries. After further enquires it is now believed that he

sustained serious but non-life-threatening-injuries. There were no other reported injuries in this matter.

The driver of the motorcycle, a 27-year-old-man of George Town, was arrested on suspicion of dangerous driving and other traffic related violations.

The roadway was closed for a short time as debris was cleared and a traffic investigation was carried out. The matter is currently under investigation by the police.

The Bodden Town man had attended the Bodden Town Police Station when another member of the public entered the police station shortly after. The man attacked the other man in the view of the officers and other persons present at the time, causing injury to the other party involved.

Both parties were separated by the officers and the aggressor in the incident was arrested and the injured party sought medical assistance.

When Doubts Arise

Time has a way of affecting our memories. Things that we once believed unquestioningly can fade. Something that we were sure about can become an uncertainty. So, it is with many aspects of our lives...but Satan wants this to be so about the most important things in our lives...particularly about our relationship with Jesus. Do I really have saving faith? Is my faith for real or is it just a cultural affectation? Now, I write and speak as a Christian clergyman. I truly believe all that the bible teaches and those words will be meaningless to someone who does not believe thus.

Some might even make fun of such a statement because they do not believe that Satan is real. That's ok. Many with your current persuasion have come to believe exactly like me.

So, how does one deal with those doubts as they arise? As time goes by, do you waffle or do you remember that God is not like us and that where we are changeable, he is utterly unchanging? Where that we are sometimes like a weather vane, he is the same yesterday, today, and forever.


God is not like the taciturn husband who told his wife that he loved her twice; the day he proposed and the day of their wedding and not since. No, God tells us throughout his word that he loves us repeatedly. He loved us so much that he gave his only son to die in order to satisfy our sin debt. Sadly, many people do not read their bibles enough or get to church enough for that truth to get into their bones where it belongs. Because of this, they become vulnerable to doubt and thus a target for the purveyors of the "Did God really say?" line of reasoning.

How then are we to guard ourselves in this regard? My advice to you is to do it this way: 1.) remember that God's word is always objectively true, and 2.) that your subjective understanding and doubts do not overrule God's objective

Here's a prima facie example for the subject. The Apostle Paul as he wrote to the Church at Rome and writing as

the Holy Ghost gave him utterance, taught: "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the scripture saith, whosoever believeth on him shall not be ashamed. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Romans 10:9-13

There are two ways to take those words. 1.) that they are utterly true, or 2.) that they are not. If you believe they are, stop worrying because you are believing the objectively stated truth of God. Don't let Satan rob you of your peace or joy and live with the assurance that comes by faith. ③



Canada accused of 'race genocide'

Canada's human rights record is under scrutiny after a government inquiry found that it is complicit in "race-based genocide" against indigenous women.

The report found that indigenous women were 12 times more likely to be killed or to disappear than other women in Canada. The inquiry blamed the crisis on deep-rooted colonialism and state inaction.

Among more than 200 recommendations is a call for all Canadians to help end violence, including by learning indigenous history.

The 1,200-page document released Monday is the culmination of almost three years of hearings and research by the inquiry into disproportionate violence faced by indigenous women and girls in Canada.

"Despite their different circumstances and backgrounds, all of the missing and murdered are connected by economic, social, and political marginalisation, racism and misogyny woven into the fabric of Canadian society," said Marion Buller, chief commissioner of the inquiry.

It cost C\$92m (KY\$57m), and heard from more than 2,000 witnesses since 2017, including survivors of horrific violent acts.

In 2015, a landmark Truth and Reconciliation report into the legacy of residential schools in Canada issued a damning verdict - that the policy amounted to "cultural genocide".

Mr Trudeau's government launched the national inquiry in September 2016, after years of calls for one by indigenous and international organisations.

Notable cases of missing or murdered indigenous women and girls had fuelled the call for a national inquiry, including the Vancouver murders by Robert Pickton and the death of schoolgirl Tina Fontaine.

This new document finds that the murder and disappearance of indigenous women and girls in recent decades has amounted to a "race-based genocide of indigenous peoples".

Duterte: I'm 'cured' of being gay

President Rodrigo Duterte of the Philippines has made another outrageous sexual statement, this time claiming that he had "cured" himself of homosexuality with the help of "beautiful women."

Mr. Duterte volunteered the remarks last week at an even in Tokyo in a speech to a Filipino crowd.

In the speech he also appeared to try to insult Antonio Trillanes, a senator who is a prominent critic of Mr Duterte's antidrug crackdown, by saying the lawmaker is gay.

Mr Trillanes responded by saying: "By admitting his gay past, I am beginning to be suspicious of the true nature of Duterte's seeming obsession towards me. It's also entirely possible that his strongman projection is just a front. Whatever, such comments by Duterte show how perverted and sick his mind is."

In his three years as president, Mr Duterte has made many controversial remarks, often casting them as a badtaste joke. He has frequently invoked homosexuality as an insult, using it to describe Communist rebels, Catholic priests and the former United States ambassador to his country. He is also

critical of the country's powerful Roman Catholic Church, saying he was sexually abused by a priest as a teenager.

But Mr Duterte has also expressed other views that have won him support from Filipino gay rights activists. Though he has opposed same-sex unions in the past, he now says he supports them.

Homosexuality is not outlawed in the Philippines. Gay Filipinos have open relationships there, and while the Catholic Church disapproves of gay unions, there is a Christian sect that presides over same-sex marriages. Some Filipino gay rights activists say they have got used to Mr Duterte's public outbursts.

Honduran protests resume

Honduran President Juan Orlando Hernandez's decision to repeal laws that have sparked violent demonstrations against his government recently, failed to stop protesters from returning to the streets on Monday.

On Sunday night, Mr Hernandez pledged to overturn two laws approved last year to restructure the education and health sectors. Critics feared the policies would lead to the privatisation of public services.

The laws were officially revoked on Monday, but Mr Hernandez's opponents said they remained concerned. The government has sought dialogue with unions and trade groups, but the

groups have demanded conditions such as that issues of health and education be tackled together.

As protests continued Monday, demonstrators blocked streets in cities across Honduras and burned tires. The protests began a month ago and have drawn tens of thousands of people as they intensified over the last 10 days.

Public hospitals and schools have been crippled by strikes. Classes in public primary and secondary schools have been suspended for about three weeks, and consultations in public health centres have also been suspended for a month.

Cuba hit by new Trump travel ban

The Trump administration has imposed heavy new restrictions on travel to Cuba by US citizens, including a ban on cruises, in a bid to further pressure the communist island over its support for Venezuela's president, Nicolás Maduro.

The tightening of the decades-old US embargo on the Caribbean's largest island will further damage its crippled economy as well as hurt

US travel companies that had built up business with Cuba during a brief 2014-2016 detente under Barack Obama.

The state department said the United States would no longer allow "group people-to-people educational travel", one of the most popular exemptions to the overall ban on US tourism to Cuba.

The United States will also no longer permit visits to Cuba via passenger and recreational vessels, including cruise ships and yachts, as well as private and corporate aircraft, it said.

The Trump administration had announced the new restrictions in April.

It also last month allowed US citizens to bring lawsuits against foreign companies for the use of property confiscated after Cuba's 1959 revolution, hurting investment in the island.

"The administration has advanced the president's Cuba policy by ending 'veiled tourism' to Cuba and imposing restrictions on vessels," said a tweet from Trump's national security adviser John Bolton, who has led the US campaign against what he has called the "troika of tyranny" of Cuba, Venezuela and Nicaragua. "We will continue to take actions to restrict the Cuban regime's access to US dollars."

Bruno Rodriguez, Cuba's foreign minister, said on Twitter the move was "an attack on international law" and the embargo was the main obstacle to the country's development, thereby violating Cubans' human rights.

This is the second time the Trump administration has tightened US travel restrictions on Cuba. \cite{line}

Venezuela can't pay Russian arms bill

Venezuela's economy is so bad that Russia has withdrawn most of its military people there because they have not paid their bills.

Russia has informed the US that it has withdrawn "most of their people" from Venezuela, Donald Trump, the US president, said on Twitter.

The remark came after a source close to the Russian Defence Ministry said that Russia's largest weapons exporter, Rostec, had downsized its presence in Caracas over long-outstanding payments for military hardware and services.

It was not immediately clear that Mr Trump's tweet referred to Rostec personnel.

The Wall Street Journal was the first to report on the draw-down, reporting that Rostec's presence in Venezuela was down to a few dozen people after peaking at around 1,000.

The Kremlin has not yet commented, but a spokesperson for Rostec said that the newspaper's numbers were way

above the real figure.

Venezuela's military operates an extensive selection of Russian hardware

and has been one of Moscow's largest customers -- signing more than \$10 billion in contracts for equipment ranging from Kalashnikov to Sukhoi jets and missile systems.

The sales have helped cement political ties between Caracas and Moscow. The arms trade is inherently political, but Russia will generally sell arms to any nation that can afford them - in the past four years, however, Venezuela has struggled to meet its payment obligations.

Moscow rakes in around \$15bn annually from military exports to foreign nations and that money flows through Rostec, a massive state-owned holding company that has grown to control almost two-thirds of Russia's defence industry.

Trump protestors out in force in UK

Donald Trump's official state visit to the United Kingdom this week has seen protestors turn out at every opportunity.

The US president's trip to the UK has been met with widespread protests, and the president has delivered some fiery words of his own.

Anti-Trump protests went ahead on Tuesday in central London, including a robotic

"Trump" sat upon a toilet that was paraded around the city - along with the infamous "Trump baby" balloon.

Mr. Trump's spat with London Mayor Sadiq Khan has played out on Twitter. On Monday, the president compared him to one of his arch rivals, Bill de Blasio, the mayor of New York.

"I don't think much of him," the president said of Khan. "I think that he's the twin of de Blasio, except shorter." Mr Trump called Mr Khan a "stone cold loser." Mr Khan criticised Mr Trump in 2016 for his views on Islam, calling him "ignorant." At the time, Mr Trump responded by questioning Mr Khan's IQ.

Despite low approval ratings in the UK, the president tweeted that he thought the media would have to work "hard" to find people demonstrating against his presence in the British capital. Only a handful of demonstrators have popped up in London wearing Mr Trump's trademark "MAGA" hats, supporting his visit.

As the rain picked up in London, a handful of pro-Trump demonstrators got into a heated shouting match with hundreds of anti-Trump protesters massed in Trafalgar Square.

There were obscene words and gestures hurled from both sides and police eventually had to separate them as pushing and shoving began.

Reggae Girlz make World Cup debut

The Women's World Cup kicks off in France on Friday and one of the most popular teams will be Jamaica's Reggae Girlz. The USA, France, England, Germany and Brazil are the favourites of the 24 teams.

Jamaica are in Group C with Brazil, Australia and Italy and face Brazil in their first match on Saturday. Jamaica play Italy on June 14 and Australia on

Jamaica are ranked No. 53 in the world so unlikely to reach the latter stages but can boast that they are the first Caribbean team to appear at the finals.

That achievement came by way of their momentous third-place finish in the CONCACAF Championship after a dramatic 4-2 penalty shootout win over Panama in October. The Reggae Girlz lost only two games (2-0 against Canada and 6-0 against the United States) during the entire qualifying period, scoring 53 goals and conceding only 14. They were led by the talismanic striker Khadija "Bunny" Shaw, who scored 19 times in the qualifiers.

The team in France includes several American and English-born players with Jamaican heritage and is virtually the same one that competed in the qualifiers but the coach, Hue Menzies, has been able to unearth some new additions.

Menzies favours the 4-3-3 formation, as they bank on their speed and athleticism to open up opposing defences, particularly from the wide areas. Shaw, as always, will be the focal point in the attacking trio and could make a difference against their more illustrious Group C opponents if is she is able to get on the ball close enough to goal.

The Reggae Girlz appear more effective when playing on the break using

their speed and the return of the forward Trudi Carter from injury should add further impetus. The defence showed its strength in the qualifiers and, while they often play deep against tougher opponents, the centre-backs sometimes step up to pressure the ball high and support the midfield's attempt to gain possession.

Strong performances can be expected from the captain, Konya Plummer, and her fellow defender Allyson Swaby. They are both strong in the air and resolute on the ground.

Without doubt Jamaica are one of the biggest underdogs at the World Cup but they enter the tournament with a positive attitude and will be hard to beat.

Menzies was born in England and grew up in Jamaica before moving to the United States in 1980. He now has more than 30 years of coaching experience and has 15 years of Olympic develop-

ment coaching experience at the national, state and regional levels.

He was introduced to the national women's programme on the recommendation of ambassador for Jamaica's women's football, Cedella Marley, in 2014. Despite the lack of resources, Menzies got his side to the finals.

Shaw is 5ft 11in tall and her physicality and speed of thought has meant success from a young age. In fact, she was so good that she's played for Jamaica's Under-15, Under-17 and Under-20 teams simultaneously since 14. She made her debut for the senior women's national team in 2015, scoring once in a 6-0 win over the Dominican Republic.

Since then, the 22-year-old has been amazing, and she already heads the Reggae Girlz all-time charts with 26 goals in 30 caps. Shaw has studied at Eastern Florida State College and University of Tennessee and is expected to turn professional this summer. 😚



Siakam had three older brothers who played major US college basketball but Pascal's interest in the sport only came in his teens ahead of his big break being discovered in an African Basketball Without Borders camp.

He wound up at New Mexico State when his father died and his mother, Victorie, pushed him not to return home for the funeral but keep working on making his dad's dream a reality.

"In terms of adversity, I went through something that I considered the hardest moment of my life when my dad passed away," Siakam said. "I was in college and just away from my family. Thank God I had the support of my teammates and coaches in college that helped me go through it.

"But it was definitely one of the toughest moments in my life, and not being able to go home for the funeral and all that. So it was definitely a moment where it kind of tested me as a man, just being able to go through that and using that as a motivation, something that's going to push me to do better things for my family, for myself, for my dad.


