A boom for whom?

As you make your way across Grand Cayman, there seems to be a construction boom, with development taking place across the island.

Whenever ground is broken on one of these projects, there's often the talk about the stimulus to the economy and how many jobs will be created.

There's no denying that there is benefit to the economy. But the question begs: who are those who feel the real benefits?

Often times, developers get concessions that include government waiving fees that they would have collected, as an incentive to those financing the project to ensure shovels go into the ground.

"X number of jobs will be created over x years" is often the proclamation by developer and politician. Are these new jobs of just providing continuity of work for those in the construction sector? There's nothing wrong with that but is it fair to say that jobs are being "created"?

Also, despite the warning signs about threats to Cayman's top economic sector, tonnes of cement are being poured as projects across the island continue to move in sync with government's desire for population growth toward 100,000 residents.

Who will occupy these places? Many of the units in some of these residential properties carry price tags of seven figures, leaving the average Caymanian knowing that they're unlikely ever to set foot inside unless as a guest or a service provider.

Development is a plus in any economy, but many are left to wonder if with this boom that's underway, if they'll ever feel the real benefits or be priced out of their own paradise. ③

Batabano is a disgrace and should be changed with immediate effect. I am surprised and disappointed that the Rotary Club would want their name associated with such a spectacle of nudity, vulgarity, and revelry. I can only imagine the liquor, drugs, and unacceptable conduct on the weekend that followed this spectacle.

As responsible citizens we should be doing everything to raise the social stature of our people. We wonder why domestic abuse is on the rise, why crime is on the rise, why drug use is on the rise, why many students are unmotivated, unsuccessful, and dabbling in crime even in their teenage years. We adults are responsible; The example that adults are setting is poor, is degrading, and is ruining our island.

I recall a visitor to the island commenting to me that she thought public parades were for families to enjoy, but Batabano was anything but family oriented. I implore parents, don't take your children to the Adult Batabano parade. I didn't observe the behaviour, but I am told that not only is there nudity, but the dancing is disgraceful. 

Clash of the Legends raises funds for Hope for Today

It was a legendary night up at West Bay's Ed Bush stadium when the Legends team from West Bay beat the Legends from East End, three goals to two, at the Clash of the Legends, a fund raiser for the Hope For Today Foundation. It was very special too, because Cayman National Bank presented a check for five hundred Cayman dollars to support the foundation, which operates programs and runs a halfway house for people struggling with substance abuse.

But there wasn't only a football match; people came out to listen to the cool sounds from DJ Danny Jah Rover, who was giving up his time, as he always does, to help the foundation. Then there was a bouncy castle, too, and plenty of mouthwatering food, cooked by hardworking volunteers to make it a very special occasion.

Hope for Today Operations Manager, Brent Hydes, said: "Today we are having another game of the Clash of the Legends East End versus West Bay. Both districts recognize the fact that Cayman is home to many people struggling with substance abuse issues and we believe we can make a difference in the lives of those individuals. At the moment there are seven residents at the halfway

house and I can honestly say that there are people in this community now who have better children, and better families, better friends. Since the halfway house has been opened the last several years we have had about 32 people that have actually engaged in the program. I can tell you that most of them successfully completed the program, and most of them today continue to stay engaged in recovery. I believe that the Hope Foundation is making a difference in the lives of many people in this community."

"The Hope foundation is in operation through contributions through some corporate sponsors, and through through our annual fundraising events particularly the Clash of the Leg-





ends and our Walk for Recovery. Many companies that have contributed to the welfare of these individuals once they are at that halfway house which provides food, and a place to sleep. We operate a twelve-step based recovery program. The twelve steps of recovery gives an individual an opportunity to look at himself, and we have people who come at the house who are helping the residents also, for example, to get more advanced in their computer skills. So there are a number of volunteers that come by the house for the benefit of the residents."

Mr. Hydes is actually one of the West Bay legends too, although he doesn't brag about it. "Today we're playing for the Marcus Cumber Community Cup, and the McKeeva Bush Community

Shield. The legends are football players from the 80s and 90s. These names were really popular back in 80s and 90s. We are talking about Antonio Smith, Brent McLean from East End, we've got Joelle McCrae, He's an old West Bay legend," Mr. Hydes said. East End's Brent Mclean said: "We're here to 'represent,' we always come to support it because we believe that this is vital in our community for people who are struggling with drug dependency."

Lori Ebanks, Senior Customer Support Representative with the Cayman National Bank said: "Cayman National continues to sponsor the Hope for Today foundation. It is our way of giving back to the community and to the people that are struggling to give them a second chance."

uting about 15,000 single-use bags per week, but now we are done with plastic and will now only offer reusable bags."

The environmental impact of single-use plastic bags has taken center stage around the world, with nations and several US states banning or limiting distribution of plastic bags. Single-use plastic bags take many years to biodegrade, while Hurley's new paper bags will biodegrade in as little as a month.

Additionally, the effect of plastics on the ocean and marine animals has become evident in recent years. The US Environmental Protection Agency estimates that 80 percent of the plastic found in oceans originates from land and that by 2050 there will be more plastic by weight in our oceans than fish. Thousands of seabirds and sea turtles, whales and other marine life are killed

each year after ingesting plastic or getting entangled in it.


"We all love and enjoy our Cayman waters," continued Ms. Merren. "It is estimated that five or six million single-use bags are distributed annually in the Cayman Islands. If Hurley's alone can cut this number by 800,000 bags a year, we are pleased to take that first step in protecting our greatest natural resource."

Roy Bodden's – From Guard House to the Glass House: A Preliminary Discussion

Roy Bodden, now Emeritus President of the University College, recently launched the latest of his academic work, From Guard House to the Glass House: One Man's Journey through the Maze of Caymanian Politics.

Bodden is also the author of The Cayman Islands in Transition: The Politics, History and Sociology of the Cayman Islands; Politics, Personalities and Parties: Caymanian Politics from 1950- 2000; Reflections from a Broken Window and A Gathering of Old Men: A Collection of Short

By any account, this is quite an impressive body of work on the Cayman Islands told from the perspective of the Cayman Islands, even if from one person's point of view. The act of writing can be a tedious task, especially for those who take it seriously. The actual writing itself is preceded by research, organization of thought, the sifting and interrogation of materials, and the exercise of critical judgement. Writing requires discipline, not to men-

tion cogency and clarity of mind. American writer, Harlan Ellison, once said that 'People on the outside think there's something magical about writing, that you go up in the attic at midnight and cast the bones and come down in the morning with a story, but it isn't like that. You sit behind the typewriter and you work, and that is all there is to it.' Writing is hard work and the two hundred and sixty four pages, the size of Bodden's recent book, is quite an accomplishment.

In writing about writing, Arthur Homes, the author of the famous book: **The Idea of a Christian College**, says that to write is to become articulate, to express what one feels, to explain why one feels that way, to expound, to argue, to offer good reasons, to explore relationships, to have a sense of the whole, and so on.

One should never underestimate the power of the pen, the power of the book, the power of ideas. And, certainly, the writing of history must never by underestimated. Even if one believes Churchill's famous

quip: 'History will be kind to me. because I intend to write it' and proceeded to write history, this kind of enterprise must be celebrated. Marcus Garvey did say that 'A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots'. There is the famous saying that 'No one can tell your story, so tell it yourself, no one can write your story, so write it yourself.'

Bodden took the latter saying seriously. I believe that there are many other stories not yet written, and that should be. Others must be encouraged to write their story as Bodden has done. The devel-

opment of a society is not confined to the building of businesses, physical edifices and landmarks and such things. The role of the writer, the thinker, the historian, is vital. The past must be documented and told and the more the voices, the more interesting the record.

How does one make sense of the current issues and their impacts without having some understanding of the historical context that gave rise to them?

A study and knowledge of local history is indispensable to a real understanding of the society itself. How can a country can understand its own character or fully appreciate its unique identity without an accurate knowledge of its past? How can the young of a society properly appreciate other cultures, without being immersed in their own? How can a multicultural society forge bonds of cohesion without having strong ties, understanding and appre-

ciation of the culture of local society itself?

Thinkers like Caribbean intellectual icon Rex Nettleford and Michel Foucault, French philosopher and historian of ideas, have always pointed to the importance of history for self-knowledge and self-empowerment. As Foucault reminds us, correctly used, history is a form of critical self-knowledge that promises a certain freedom.

In the next article, we will open Bodden's book.

And forget that those things ever existed. And live and be free like you deserve to.



John had retired as the personnel manager (long before people were "human resources") from one of the area's biggest companies. By his own admission, he had struggled with an alcohol problem for many years, but you would've never suspected. When John came to have a living faith in Jesus, he had a desire to know more about God and so he started trying to read the bible on a consistent basis.

As a new Christian, his reasoning about studying the bible was simple. It was all the word of God so it all must be for you on any given day. So, every morning John would sit down for his quiet time. He would say a short prayer, then close his eyes with bible in hand and flip through the pages before putting his finger somewhere on a page to find his lesson for the day. He never shared with me what had broken him of this approach, but it rattled him. Couldn't help but wonder if he'd landed on something like Ezekiel 16:17, 23:19-20, or 2nd Kings 18:27. Nevertheless, he soon saw the wisdom of a different, more methodical way of studying the bible and became well versed. He always had an answer for why he believed, and his living hope radiated from his presence.

So how should we study the bible? All of it is good...but start at the beginning, not in the middle...whether it be of Genesis or in reading the entire bible. If a book, read through to the end before trying to dig in. Notice to whom it is addressed. Determine the context in which it is written. There is benefit in reading any book of the bible but the OT historical books, the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles are generally written to everyone, whilst the Psalms, prophetic books, and apostolic letters are written specifically to the people of God. They won't make much sense to non-Christians because the things they address are spiritually discerned and those without the Spirit of God cannot understand their impor-

Just remember the Apostle Paul's words in 2nd Timothy 3:16 & 17: "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works."

Jamaican Doctor Recognized as Health Leader by World Health Organization

Jamaican doctor and professor, Peter Figueroa, has been recognized at the World Health Assembly as a health leader for his substantial contribution to public health in Jamaica, the Caribbean, the Americas and the world, over the past four decades.

Dr Figueroa, a Professor of Public Health, Epidemiology and HIV-AIDS at the University of the West Indies in Jamaica, received a plaque from the Director General of the World Health Organization, Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus yesterday.

"This recognition means a lot to me. It is a true honour. I've been working in public health for 40 years and believe that I am an example, like many other health workers, of someone who commits their life to trying to help others," he said. "I've enjoyed working in public health and it is an honor for me to make a contribution."

After gaining his medical degree, Dr Figueroa worked in Public Health in Jamaica during the 1970s, contributing to the movement that developed Primary Health Care in Jamaica including the introduction of community health aides, in advance of the 1978 Alma Ata Declaration. He was awarded a PhD in 1996 by the School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, University of London and has since written or co-authored more than 150 published papers and co-edited three books on a range of public health topics.

As a young doctor, Dr Figueroa organized his colleagues in the Government

service to form the Junior Doctors' Association (JDA), now the Jamaica Medical Doctors Association (JMDA). As President of the JDA he led doctors to improve health services and their conditions of work. He was also a founding member of the Caribbean Public Health Association and the Caribbean College of Family Practitioners. In 1986 he earned a United Nations Peace Medal for his service as Vice-chair of the National Committee for the commemoration of the International Year of Peace.

Dr Figueroa's roles over the years have included: Principal Medical Officer – Epidemiology in the Ministry of Health; Chief Medical Officer; Director of the National HIV-STI Programme; Scientific Secretary and Chair of the Caribbean Health Research Council (CHRC); and temporary advisor to WHO on a range of public health topics.

He has been instrumental in the HIV response in Jamaica, leading the response from its outset in 1986 until 2008 and transforming it into a highly successful multi-sectoral programme. He led the development of a national surveillance system and the investigation of disease outbreaks, and established the Epidemiology Research and Training Unit, where numerous research studies were conducted including an HIV vaccine trial.

In his early career he was one of the few clinicians willing to provide medical care to HIV patients, and he still provides medical care for scores of people living with HIV at his medical practice.

"Many people were afraid back then, but we had a responsibility. We had to deal with it, so I lead the response in HIV for many years", he said.

Figueora mobilized considerable funding, established condom usage as a norm nationally and established the public access anti-retroviral treatment programme. He also expanded

STI services, leading outreach for HIV testing and prevention, resulting in a reduction of HIV prevalence among sex workers from 12 to under 4 per cent. Professor Figueroa has been a member of the UNAIDS scientific expert panel since 2014.

"Health is more than health. It is having a just society. It is having the social conditions in place where persons, special the most vulnerable are not left behind", he said.

But his contribution to public health in the Caribbean goes well beyond his work in HIV. He has provided technical advice to many Caribbean countries and to the CARICOM Council on Human and Social Development on a variety of public health issues since the 1980s. He served on the Scientific Advisory Council of the Caribbean Epidemiology Centre and since 1989 has been the Chair of the Caribbean Immunization Managers'

Annual Meeting. He is currently part of the Technical Advisory Group for immunizations conveyed by the Pan American Health Organization.

Professor Figueroa currently serves as the chair of the Caribbean Immunization Technical Advisory Group, which advises Caribbean Ministers of Health, and as chair of the Caribbean Certification Committee for Eradication of Poliovirus. Dr Figueroa has also made significant contributions to public health research, with a body of research on a wide range of public health and infectious disease topics.

He has received many awards in his country, with accolades such as the Medical Association of Jamaica President's Award, the Jamaica Public Health Hero Award, the Caribbean Health Research Council Award for outstanding contribution to Public Health and Research in the Caribbean, and the Order of Jamaica.

First Named System of Atlantic Hurricane Season Forms, But Forecast to Dissipate Soon

Ten days before the official start of the 2019 hurricane season, a subtropical storm formed in the Atlantic but is not expected to be around for much longer.

Subtropical Storm Andrea came to life over the Western Atlantic, about 335 miles southwest of Bermuda, yesterday evening.

Its maximum sustained winds remained at about 40 miles per hour until late this morning when the National Hurricane Centre (NHC) in Miami said in an 11 a.m. advisory that they had decreased to 35 miles per hour.

Andrea is now a subtropical depression. "Continued weakening is forecast, and Andrea is expected to


degenerate into a remnant low by this evening," the NHC said.

At the time, Andrea was about 280 miles west southwest of Bermuda and moving northward at eight miles per hour, with a turn toward the northeast and east expected tonight.

There are no coastal watches or warnings in effect but the NHC advised that interests in Bermuda should still monitor the progress of the system.

This is the fifth consecutive year with a named storm in the Atlantic before the official start of the season.

The next tropical storm that develops in the Atlantic will be called Barry.



Barbados Scraps Visa Requirements for Several African, Asian and Gulf States

Barbados has removed visa requirements for several countries as the government seeks to increase the number of tourist arrivals, and make it easier for investors to do business with the island.

Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade Senator Dr Jerome Walcott, who made the disclosure during a post-Cabinet press conference, said visas will no longer be

required for nationals of the following African countries to enter Barbados: Cameroon, Ethiopia, Ghana, Liberia, Morocco, Senegal, Rwanda, and Burkina Faso.

Visa waivers have also been granted to the Gulf States of Bahrain, Jordan, Oman and Qatar as well as the Asian countries of Indonesia, Vietnam, Thailand and India.

In addition, Barbados has an honorary consul present in Monaco and visa requirements have also been lifted for that nation.

Minister Walcott explained that it was important for Barbados to strengthen relations with countries within the global sphere, make new friends and attract more opportunities.

"We depend on tourism, investment and opportunities for business. We recognize in terms of travel that the stipulations for visas are sometimes a deterrent for tourists and those seeking to establish business with the country,



they find it fairly complicated. In this regard, the Cabinet of Barbados agreed to remove the visa requirements for several countries in different parts of the world," he said.

"We recognize that Africa, a continent of 54 countries, many of them showing growth rates of five, six, and seven per cent, in terms of Rwanda, it is time for us to look more closely at that continent. We have made a pledge, and we are moving towards establishing a mission in Accra, Ghana before the end of this year."

The Foreign Affairs Minister said government was also hoping to attract more tourists and investors from the Gulf States and Asian nations.

"We are recognizing and certainly hoping that the removal of these visa requirements would encourage a number of persons from these countries, not only in terms of tourism, but for investment and business," he said.

Cannabis Authority in Jamaica Taking Steps to Meet Growing Demand

Minister of State in the Ministry of Industry, Commerce, Agriculture and Fisheries Floyd Green says the Cannabis Licensing Authority (CLA) is taking steps to respond more efficiently to the growing demand within the industry.

He said the entity has embarked on a review of its application process, which should be completed over the next six weeks.

"We want to ensure there isn't too much bureaucracy in the system while still ensuring the safeguards," Green said

He informed that the CLA will also be improving site inspection through engagement of two additional officers.

"We are going to be strengthening our human resource framework by bringing in a senior director of operations. This is important because my goal is to reduce the time it takes for someone to get into the legal industry," he noted.

Meanwhile, Green said that the Government is in the process of developing the regulatory framework to enable the country to capitalise on the US\$100-billion global medical marijuana industry

He said that internationally, there is a steady movement towards scientific exploration, testing and acceptance of the many health benefits of cannabis, and Jamaica sees those areas as highly beneficial and of top priority.

The Minister noted, however, that proper regulations must be in place to enable access to export markets.

"Jamaica has a unique brand appeal in the cannabis world, and that gives us an edge. We also know that we need to take a part of the international market, and we can only do that if we put together export regulations that will make companies like Epican, able to export," he said.

"We want the entire country to understand the possibilities that await us, especially when we... show that our industry has structures and standards in place and is regulated to meet international guidelines and standards."

Green was speaking at the official opening of Epican Montego Bay, Jamaica's new medical cannabis dispensary. The company has a second store in Kingston and is looking to open three additional dispensaries in short order.

He noted that Epican is "uniquely Jamaican", with the company cultivating certified-organic cannabis at its Blue Mountain farm where the conditions produce the highest-quality product.

Canada vaccine research makes progress

Canadian scientists may have developed a new method of transporting life-saving vaccines to remote and impoverished regions of the world at only a fraction of the cost of current techniques.


The research team from McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, has found a way to eliminate current costly refrigeration methods or "cold-chain constant storage," which stores

vaccines at a temperature between 2 and 8 Centigrade to keep them viable.

"One of the biggest problems is the need for refrigeration or what we call the cold-chain," lead author Vincent Leung, an assistant professor of chemical engineering at McMaster University, said. "Right now, almost all vaccines on the market are required to be refrigerated from manufacturing all the way to the end user."

The cold-chain method is considered a significant barrier to inoculating people in remote or poor regions of the world where they don't always have the means or infrastructure to refrigerate and transport fragile vaccines.

"You can spend all kinds of money developing a vaccine, but if it is deactivated

by high temperature an hour before you can give it to someone, it doesn't matter," co-author Ali Ashkar, a professor of pathology and molecular medicine specialising in immunology, said.

Mr Leung said the new method they've developed could have the potential to save the lives of millions of people around the world who currently don't have access to life-saving vac-

"Right now, there's like 18.5 million children under the age of one that do not have access vaccines," Mr Leung said. "Every year, there's about one and half million people that die from preventable diseases because they don't have access to vaccines, so this is a huge global health issue."

Philippines row grows over garbage

The Philippines has recalled its ambassador to Canada in an escalating row after Ottawa missed a deadline and failed to reclaim garbage shipped to Manila around six years ago.

More than 100 containers filled with household waste believed to be recyclable plastic arrived in the Port of Manila between 2013-2014. It was non-recyclable plastic, household waste, and diapers.

Private Canadian company Chronic Inc. and its Philippine-based consignees transported 103 container vans of waste from Canada to the Philippines. according to the legal non-profit Pacific Centre for Environmental Law and Litigation.

In an April assessment, CELL said that Canada had violated the Basel Convention - an international treatv designed to reduce the movements of hazardous waste between nations during those years.

"The container vans were falsely declared to contain homogenous plastic scrap material when in fact these shipments contained heterogenous waste including baled household garbage," CELL said.



Chronic's owner in 2014 told the Toronto Star he disputed the allegations, saying no garbage was shipped. The contents were 95 percent plastic, he claimed, and the rest contained materials one would find in a standard household recycling bin.

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said that the government had been working "very closely" with Philippine officials on the issue over the past months, adding that "we very much hope to get to a resolution short-

Philippine presidential spokesperson Salvador Panelo was due to meet Canadian authorities to discuss the issue of waste, but he claims that they did not show up. 🈚

Cuba feeds off tourism dollars

Cuba's economic future is so fragile that at present it all hinges on its tourism revenue. Cuba recently had to introduce food rationing because it cannot meet demands for its population of 11.5 million.

That's why it is relying on visitors to beaches and at its all-inclusive resorts, dive sites and cobblestoned colonial

As most of Cuba's economy stagnates or declines, the country has launched a full-scale effort to turn virtually the only bright industry — tourism — into the source that can pull the rest of the communist island out of its worst economic crisis in two decades.

Across the Florida Straits, the Trump administration is intently focused on scaling back tourism to the island as part of a campaign to smother the Cuban economy and force its government to sever ties with President Nicolas Maduro's government in Venezuela.

President Trump recently activated a section of the 1996 US law known as Helms-Burton, allowing lawsuits

against foreign companies doing business on properties confiscated after the island's socialist revolution.

Cuba began to open the island to tourists after the collapse of the Soviet Union and the subsequent loss of billions of dollars a year in aid. In 1996, Cuba had 30,000 state-owned hotel rooms and about a million tourists a

Last year it had about 70,000 rooms, with an additional 24,000 in privately owned bed-and-breakfasts. In total, Cuba drew 4.7 million tourists in 2018. a 1.3 percent rise over the previous year that puts its latest goal of five million within reach.

Brexit increases racism in UK

Ethnic minorities in Britain are facing rising and increasingly overt racism, with levels of discrimination and abuse continuing to grow in the wake of the Brexit referendum, nationwide research reveals.

Seventy-one percent of people from ethnic minorities now report having faced racial discrimination, compared with 58 percent in January 2016, before the European Union vote

The data comes amid rising concern at the use of divisive rhetoric in public before this week's European parliament elections, where some leading candidates, including Ukip's Carl Benjamin and the independent Tommy Robinson, have records of overt racism.

The survey by Opinium suggests racists are feeling increasingly confident in deploying overt abuse or discrimination. The proportion of people from an ethnic minority who said they had been targeted by a stranger rose from 64 percent in January 2016 to 76 percent in February this year, when the most recent polling was carried out of 1,006 people weighted to be nationally representative.

The trend appears in line with crime figures, which have shown that racially motivated hate crime has increased every year since 2013, doubling to 71,251 incidents in England and Wales in 2018, according to the Home Office.

David Lammy, the Labour Minister of Parliament for Tottenham and a leading anti-racism campaigner, described the findings as "alarming", while Omar Khan, the chief executive of the Runnymede Trust, a race equality thinktank, said it was now clear that Brexit, while not the source of racism, had led to higher levels of racism being expressed and that social media was "normalising hate and increasing division". ③

Honduras strike cancels Cayman flight

Honduran health, education and social service workers have been striking since May 13 which had a knock-on effect in the Cayman Islands on Monday, forcing Cayman Airways to cancel flights to La Ceiba and Roatan.

Around 40 passengers were left stranded at the Owen Roberts International Airport.

Doctors, teachers and other professions in Hon-

duras have been striking and protesting recent legislation that would privatise health and educational services. The first protest was held by workers for the National Institute of Vocational Training, who fear that they will be fired once the institute is privatised.

In an action called by the Platform for the Defence of Health and Education, protesters gathered in Cuba Square in Tegucigalpa, the capital. The protest was supported nationwide by work stoppages and protests in schools and health and medical facilities.

Hondurans have held many protests againstphili the US-backed government

of President Juan Orlando Hernández - whose election many consider the result of fraud and violence - and his plans to privatise public sectors. The government's response has usually included repression.

For example, a month ago, a 10,000-strong protest against government privatisation policies, corruption, human rights abuses, violence and repression was broken up by police who fired tear gas into the crowd. Political assassinations are not uncommon. Honduras is one of the most violent places in the world outside of war zones. 😚

Venezuela petrol in short supply

Venezuelans have been struggling to live with an increasing shortage of food, medicine, electricity and water for the last five years and in recent months the problem has got even more acute.

An unprecedented economic crisis and, more recently, the severe US economic sanctions aimed at

forcing out President Nicolas Maduro have paralysed public service.

With hyperinflation running at over one million percent, feeding a family on an average salary has become almost impossible.

One of the very few things that Venezuelans could afford was petrol because it literally cost nothing. A litre of petrol cost less than one cent. But now, even filling a car with the fuel has suddenly become difficult for millions of Venezuelans.

Motorists are having to queue for hours to fill their vehicles because of the acute shortages.

Harsh US economic sanctions that have specifically targeted Venezuela's vital oil industry are punishing the already decrepit state-owned petroleum and natural petrol company, PDVSA.

"We are refining at only 20 percent of our installed capacity. In other words, our maximum capacity is 1.3 million barrels a day, but we are only managing to refine 260,000 barrels," said Alfredo Quiroz, an oil industry ex-

"That is not enough for Venezuela's five million vehicles. So that means we are having to import gasoline to make up for the shortfall."

Warriors join the legends club

The Golden State Warriors cannot be discounted as one of the greatest teams in NBA history. After an indifferent start to the season and some wobbly moments along the way, their place in basketball's pantheon is now assured after overcoming the Portland Trail Blazers on Monday.

This Warriors side compares with the very best. The 1979-88 Boston Celtics, the 1990-98 Chicago Bulls, and the 1979-91, as well as the 1999-04 Los Angeles Lakers, are undoubtedly the supreme teams and now the Warriors join that elite band.

Three NBA championships – and possibly four by next month - and a Finals appearance in the past five years speaks for itself.

Despite the Warriors looking vulnerable since Kevin Durant's recent injury, they have had to battle player disputes, complacency, and an array of injuries in a rocky season, yet they are in the Finals again thanks to the 119-117 overtime win over the Blazers to win the Western Conference Finals series 4-0.

They will face either the Milwaukee Bucks or Toronto Raptors in the Finals.

Golden State join the Boston Celtics - who made 10 straight NBA Finals between 1957-66, winning nine of them - as the only team ever to reach at least five consecutive NBA Finals.

"I hope it doesn't go unnoticed," said Warriors coach Steve Kerr. "Five straight Finals hasn't been done since the Sixties, hasn't been done for a reason. It's very, very difficult."

Stephen Curry finished with 37 points, 13 rebounds and 11 assists, while Draymond Green chipped in with 18 points, 14 rebounds and 11 assists as the Warriors eased past Portland.

Stephen and younger brother Seth made history in the series, becoming the first brothers to face off in an NBA Conference Final.

While Stephen, 31, has twice been named the NBA's most valuable player (2015, 2016), Seth reached the play-offs for the first time in his career this season.

Despite Stephen coming out on top, becoming the fifth man to score 30 points in every game of a fourgame sweep, he was full of praise for his brother.

He said: "Somebody had to lose, but this is just the beginning for him and his career in terms of being on this stage. He's proved to a lot of people that not only does he belong, but he can play big minutes in play-off games.

The Finals start on May 30 which gives the Warriors ample time to rest and possibly see injured players return.

"Happy to get a little rest before we have to play again," coach Kerr said.

It is much-needed rest, too.

Besides missing Durant, the Warriors clinched the series in Portland without injured DeMarcus Cousins and Andre Iguodala. There's no way of knowing yet if Durant and Cousins will be back in time for the Finals, either. Plenty of other Warriors are dealing with bumps and bruises as well.

Losing sharpness is always a major concern during these days without games, but the Warriors surely feel the obvious advantage - rest - outweighs any drawbacks, especially after they were stretched to seven games by Houston last year in the conference finals and had only two days off before the NBA Finals.

Gatlin, 37, has not slowed down

Justin Gatlin may be 37 and remains a hate figure for his two drug convictions, but he is still winning 100-metre races at elite level.

Gatlin pipped Japan's Yoshihide Kiryu to win the men's 100m as fellow American Michael Norman fired a World Championship warning with a superb 200m at the Golden Grand Prix in Osaka on Sunday.

Gatlin produced a strong finish to clock 10 seconds flat, the reigning world champion dipping at the line to edge out Kiryu by a hundredth of a second.

Indonesia's world under-20 champion Lalu Muhammad Zohri broke his own national record as he took third in 10.03 — the fastest time ever recorded by an athlete from Southeast Asia.

While Gatlin targets one last hurrah at the World Championships in Doha this summer, Norman laid down a marker by winning the men's 200m in a meet record 19.84 seconds, shaving 0.03 off the mark Namibia's Frankie Fredericks set 20 years ago.

The runaway victor, who last month clocked a personal best of 43.45 in the 400m, left Yang Chun-Han trailing in his wake, the Taiwanese runner-up, in 20.50.

Ominously for his rivals, Norman insisted that he can still get faster.

"I feel as though there are multiple areas I can improve on," said the 21-year-old Californian. "I didn't feel as though the intensity that I usually have during a 200m was there."

Morrison in Jamaica Gold Cup squad

Former Manchester United and England youth international Ravel Morrison has been named in Jamaica's preliminary 40-player squad for this summer's Gold Cup.

As a teenager at United, Sir Alex Ferguson said he was one of the most gifted 14-year-olds he'd ever seen. His future looked assured for greatness and string of England caps. But Morrison lacked discipline and had personal problems which led to him leaving Old Trafford.

The 26-year-old midfielder shone for England youth national teams and was widely lauded as a future star for the Three Lions, but the former West Ham United player struggled to consolidate himself at club level and is currently playing for Ostersunds in Sweden.

Along with time at Lazio and stints at Birmingham City and Queens Park Rangers, Morrison played one year on loan at Liga MX club Atlas.

Morrison travelled to Jamaica for the Reggae Boyz' game against Antigua and Barbuda in March 2018 and has since obtained his Jamaican passport.

Jamaica head coach Theodore Whitmore also called in Bayer Leverkusen's 21-year-old winger Leon Bailey, who has previously been reluctant to accept call-ups and has cast doubts on whether he would represent Jamaica.

Jamaica are in Group C of this summer's Gold Cup alongside El Salvador, Honduras and Curacao. The Reggae Boyz kick off their campaign against Honduras in Kingston on June 17.

Simmons looks set for Windies return

The decision by Phil Simmons to step down as head coach of Afghanistan after the World Cup has opened the possibility of a return to the West Indies team.

Simmons recently announced that he would be leaving the post after achieving his goal of helping Afghanistan qualify for the tournament, which runs in England and Wales from May 30 till July 14.

His contract, although due to expire at the end of the World Cup, would most likely have been extended.

After being West Indies head coach for 18 months, Simmons was controversially fired by the Dave Cameron-led West Indies Cricket Board in 2016.

However, while the 56-year-old Trinidadian challenged the decision in court, one of the first orders of business for new Cricket West Indies president Ricky Skerritt was to apologise to the former West Indies all-rounder and reach an amicable resolution.

It was agreed that the settlement amount would re-

main confidential.

Skerritt then ended the contract of interim coach Richard Pybus and named Floyd Reifer as head coach for the Windies' tour to Ireland to take part in the recently concluded Tri-Nations Series as well as the World Cup.

Meanwhile, after missing out on their 15-man squad for the event, all-rounders Dwayne Bravo and Kieron Pollard are in the West Indies' list of reserve players for the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019.

Bravo's selection in the 10-man list comes despite him having retired from international cricket in October last year, while Pollard has just returned from a successful Indian Premier League season with Mumbai Indians, who lifted the IPL trophy for a record fourth time. The reserves are at a training camp in South-

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


