

Sighs of relief continue to ripple across the UK Overseas Territories(OTs) after news came through at midnight Sunday that the British government had rejected key recommendations in a landmark report on the OTs by the parliamentary Foreign Affairs Select Committee(FAC).

Those key, but controversial, recommendations were; to force the territories to recognise same-sex marriages, to grant voting and elected rights to British citizens, and bring forward to next year the deadline to implement a public registry of beneficial owners of offshore companies.

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
Editorial Discovery day

Discovery Day will be celebrated on Monday May 20th in the Cayman Islands and even though the main focus will be the 60th Year Coat of Arms celebration, we must pause to remember a bit of our history. Our future is orchestrated by our past and the seeds we sow today will eventually bear fruit.

This holiday commemorates the 'discovery' of the islands of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman

by Christopher Columbus in 1503.

"Some historians question whether Columbus was really the first person to set eyes on the Cayman Islands; a full year prior to Columbus' journey, the three islands appeared on the 1502 Cantino map. Moreover, Queen Isabella of Spain authorized four other voyages to the New World in 1499. Aside from these facts, even if Columbus was the first European explorer to set foot in Cayman, at the time of his visit there were as many as a million Carib, Taino and Arawak Indians living in the adjacent coastal areas around the Islands. Archival research suggests that Cayman is a word of Carib-Indian



origin (meaning crocodile). The Caribs and Taino were proficient mariners, and they were known to make ocean journeys in canoes up to 80ft in length. (The New Resident)"

The picture in this article is a replica of the Carib Indian's canoe and was taken from the book "A Voyage out of Time" by Mike Grudowski. The close resemblance to the "Cat Boat" is truly amazing and caused me to ponder our true origins.

In addition, we encourage our readers to develop an interest in history, particularly Cayman history, as history sometimes has a tendency to repeat itself. P

National Conservation Law Review Committee Meets

The National Conservation Law Review Committee, led by chair the Premier, Hon. Alden McLaughlin, met for the first time last week at the Government Administration Building.

At the start of the meeting, the Department of the Environment provided a presentation on the law and answered questions from committee members.

Members discussed the need for a review of the law and agreed that the Terms of Reference (ToR) should be sufficiently broad to allow for wide ranging discussion as the committee does its work. The ToR will be settled at the next meeting.

Premier McLaughlin noted that while Government has its own concerns with certain aspects of the law, the expectation is that the committee would discuss these alongside any public concerns. As part of the review process the committee will invite feedback from the public on any concerns or suggestions that they have on improving the law or the processes guided by it.

In addition its deliberations will consider, the impact of international conventions to which the Cayman Islands is a party, as well as regional and international best practice, among other things.

Decisions by the Committee will guide the development of drafting instructions for revisions to the law that would help address these concerns. The Committee will meet every two weeks and must submit a report of its findings to Cabinet within a month of the review process ending.

The Committee comprises a number of individuals with expertise across a range of sectors, such as environment, tourism, legal and development.

The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) reminds residents of the proper ways to dispose of household garbage.

Dos

- All garbage must be bagged
- Garbage bags must weigh less than 40 lbs
- Use easy to grip, tightly covered garbage bins
- Garbage bins must have a capacity of 33 gallons or less
- Secure bins inside an enclosure
- Place bags/bins/enclosures at the front/side of the property by 11:30pm on the eve of your scheduled collection day

Dont's

- No loose garbage
- No grease/coals/landscaping vegetation/bulk waste*/hazardous items (bleach, paint, cleaning supplies)**
- No sharp/broken objects in garbage bags
- No oversized garbage containers
- No overweight garbage (max weight of 40 lbs)
- Garbage containers must not block traffic
- * Bulk waste includes old furniture, appliances, tyres and metal items. DEH provides free bulk waste pick-up once per year. However, you may hire the DEH to pick up bulk waste throughout the year at the cost of \$75 per load.
- ** Take these items to the nearest landfill. Deposit small quantities of garbage at the 24-hr drop-off site located at the entrance of the George Town Landfill. Take large quantities of household garbage, commercial garbage (landscaping, construction) and large metals to the main drop off area within the landfill.

Some were the colors of Cayman's sandy beaches. Then it was time to line up. The parade was all set for their turtle-trek down Elgin Avenue to the Waterfront, and along Fort Street. There was a huge turtle in the truck in front, waving to everyone with its flippers. Behind came a groups of little beauty queens, from some of the Islands' children's pageants, and behind them, row after row of children, looking like a children's dream of the sea. They danced and swirled like wave after wave gently breaking on the seashore.

Batabano is an old word for the turtle tracks left in the sand. Donna Myrie-Stephenson, Chairperson of the Cayman Carnival Batabano Committee, said: "With the turtle nesting season being all about the emergence of turtle hatchlings, it was only fitting that we launch this new initiative with the juniors."


Cayman International School had the theme, "Sailing in Las Tortugas," reflecting the time when Christopher Columbus named the Cayman Islands after the thousands of turtles he could see all around him. Since those days, overfishing of turtles all across the region, as well as habitat loss, meant that turtles which were so plentiful nearly got wiped out altogether from Cayman's waters. But the good news is they are making a comeback, thanks to conservation efforts stretching over many decades. Recent figures released show that there are at least 100 females making nests around Cayman's shores, and now snorkelers and divers regularly see turtles on their dives.

Motor Vehicle Collision with Injury, Esterly Tibbetts Highway

Roy Bodden's – From Guard House to the Glass House: A Preliminary Discussion

Roy Bodden, now Emeritus President of the University College, recently launched the latest of his academic work, From Guard House to the Glass House: One Man's Journey through the Maze of Caymanian Politics.

Bodden is also the author of The Cayman Islands in Transition: The Politics, History and Sociology of the Cayman Islands; Politics, Personalities and Parties: Caymanian Politics from 1950- 2000; Reflections from a Broken Window and A Gathering of Old Men: A Collection of Short Stories.

By any account, this is quite an impressive body of work on the Cayman Islands told from the perspective of the Cayman Islands, even if from one person's point of view. The act of writing can be a tedious task, especially for those who take it seriously. The actual writing itself is preceded by research, organization of thought, the sifting and interrogation of materials, and the exercise of critical judgement. Writing requires discipline, not to mention cogency and clarity of mind. American writer, Harlan Ellison, once said that 'People on the outside think there's something magical about writing, that you go up in the attic at midnight and cast the bones and come down in the morning with a story, but it isn't like that. You sit behind the typewriter and you work, and that is all there is to it.' Writing is hard work and the two hundred and sixty four pages, the size of Bodden's recent book, is quite an accomplishment.

In writing about writing, Arthur Homes, the author of the famous book: **The Idea of a Christian College**, says that to write is to become articulate, to express what one feels, to explain why one feels that way, to expound, to argue, to offer good reasons, to explore relationships, to have a sense of the whole, and so on.

One should never underestimate the power of the pen, the power of the book, the power of ideas. And, certainly, the writing of history must never by underestimated. Even if one believes Churchill's famous quip: 'History will be kind to me, because I intend to write it' and proceeded to write history, this kind of enterprise must be celebrated. Marcus Garvey did say that 'A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots'. There is the famous saying that ' No one can tell your story, so tell it yourself, no one can write your story, so write it yourself.'

Bodden took the latter saying seriously. I believe that there are many other stories not yet written, and that should be. Others must be encouraged to write their story as Bodden has done. The development of a society is not confined to the building of businesses, physical edifices and landmarks and


such things. The role of the writer, the thinker, the historian, is vital. The past must be documented and told and the more the voices, the more interesting the record.

How does one make sense of the current issues and their impacts without having some understanding of the historical context that gave rise to them?

A study and knowledge of local history is indispensable to a real understanding of the society itself. How can a country can understand its own character or fully appreciate its unique identity without an accurate knowledge of its past? How can the young of a society properly appreciate other cultures, without being immersed in their own? How can a multicultural society forge bonds of cohesion without having strong ties, understanding and appreciation of the culture of local society itself?

Thinkers like Caribbean intellectual icon Rex Nettleford and Michel Foucault, French philosopher and historian of ideas, have always pointed to the importance of history for self -knowledge and self –empowerment. As Foucault reminds us, correctly used, history is a form of critical self-knowledge that promises a certain freedom.

In the next article, we will open Bodden's book. P





Breaking the stigma of cancer surveillance in the Caribbean

The Cayman Islands Cancer Registry has identified stigma as a major obstacle of cancer surveillance in the Cayman Islands and a contributing factor to the lack of cancer data and registries in the Caribbean.

May is Cancer Research Month (CRM) and one of the goals of the global awareness campaign is to reduce the stigma surrounding cancer and thereby open up channels for public discussion and the sharing of information. "Stigma surrounding cancer, in my opinion, is one of the biggest barriers we face in cancer surveillance at the Cancer Registry," noted the Cayman Islands Cancer Registrar Amanda Nicholson.

"I think sometimes people in the Cayman Islands choose not to join a registry because cancer is something very personal and they still don't feel comfortable talking about it with others," said Ms Nicholson. "Yet, stigma around this disease hinders the process of monitoring cancer trends, advancing cancer treatments, conducting research and improving cancer prevention and screening programmes. In order to combat the stigma surrounding cancer, we must first break the cycle of misinformation and fear. We must be able to have informed, intelligent conversations about how this disease impacts our population."

Presently, little information exists regarding cancer trends in the Caribbean. A research study, Advancing Cancer Control Through Research and Cancer Registry Collaborations in the Caribbean, co-authored by the Health Services Authority Pathologist Dr. Shravana Jyoti states that, "Few national registries exist in the Caribbean, resulting in limited cancer statistics being available for the region. Therefore, estimates are frequently based on the extrapolation of mortality data submitted to the World Health Organization." Results from the study showed that "twelve of 30 Caribbean nations have cancer registries. Four of these nations provide high-quality incidence data, thus covering 14.4% of the population; therefore, regional estimates are challenging."

Despite the challenges, local and regional efforts towards change are underway. In June of 2018, the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA), and the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC), officially launched the first IARC Caribbean Regional Hub for Cancer Registration. "Cancer registration is limited in the Caribbean and the Caribbean Cancer Registry Hub will seek to strengthen cancer surveillance by building capacity for cancer registration in the region. The availability of cancer surveillance data is critical to enable evidence-informed decision making in support of wider national and regional cancer control and prevention programmes," stated Dr James Hospedales, executive director of CARPHA.

The efforts of the Caribbean Regional Hub can already be seen with the launch of Jamaica's first population-based national cancer registry last December. The Jamaican registry will collect information on all new cancer cases and cover the entire population of the island.

The Cayman Islands continues to advance towards the development of a more comprehensive cancer registry. On review of data collected for the 2018 year, Ms Nicholson confirmed a 20% increase in registration rates when compared with 2017. "For a number of reasons including greater media exposure and regular referrals from medical professionals and cancer organisations, more people are choosing to participate in the cancer registry. We now have 443 registrants," she stated.

Ms Nicholson further shared that the top five most commonly reported cancers to date are breast cancer (with

infiltrating duct carcinoma being most prevalent), colon cancer, cancers of the blood, prostate cancer and ovarian cancer.

"Cancer survivors in the Cayman Islands have the unique opportunity to actively join the fight against cancer. Whenever someone joins the registry they are providing valuable information which can be used in cancer prevention," she stated. 10 Ways to Burn a 100 Calories FAST

4. Work on the lawn. Pull weeds for 17 minutes, rake leaves for 20 minutes, or dig dirt for 16 minutes.

5. Calisthenics. Spending 15 minutes doing some light body weight squats, lunges, jumping jacks, get-ups and kneeins will burn about 137 calories.

6. Go for a walk. A 150 pound person will burn approximately 117 calories by walking at a 4 mph speed for 20 minutes. Walk in place if you do not have a good area to walk in outdoors. Try walking in place while you watch your favorite television show!

7. Grab the vacuum. Vacuuming your home or office for 28 minutes will burn 100 calories. This is a great way to sneak in some exercise at work and get on the good list of your coworkers!

8. Chop fire wood. It is hot now, but winter is coming! Spend 5 minutes chopping fire wood and you will burn 100 calories.

9. Swim laps. It only takes 12 minutes to burn off 100 calories while swimming.

10. Mow the lawn with a push mower. 14 minutes is all it takes to zap 100 calories.



UK/OTs: The future...for now

While the first two have now been taken off the table, the third is still in a process of consultations over its implementation.

Those three 'hot topics' might have taken centre stage but there are other issues equally worthy of attention.

Some have been kicked into the proverbial 'long grass of consultations, some status quo, others less so, while there are at least encouraging signs of movement on the rest.

FCO ALTERNATIVE: No deal

The FAC had called for a broad review of the relationship between the Foreign and Commonwealth Office(FCO) and the OTs.

The FCO functions as a go-between and oversight agency between the territories and the British government.

Several OT leaders and representatives had voiced concerns about a growing disconnect with the FCO, a point also made in various written submissions to the inquiry conducted in 2018.

The very label 'foreign' was also considered objectionable by some.

The FAC had proposed looking into alternatives to the FCO as the point of contact between the OTs and HMG (Her Majesty's Government), or reforms within.

However, while it politely noted the concerns expressed, it's clear that the British government does not plan to shift the OTs away from the FCO.

It said "the FCO is open to ideas of how this structure could evolve to support the modern, 21st-century relationship to which both the OT and the UK Governments aspire.

"The Foreign Secretary has committed to considering this and other longerterm issues, including the possibility of an independent review, through an inter-Ministerial group that will meet in the summer."

Another recommendation to secure further training and development of OT public servants via the FCO - the much-lauded 'capacity building' through staff secondments especially, wasn't quite embraced either.

Arguing that existing processes are adequate, the UK government ruled out creating "any other mechanisms for seconding staff at present", limiting itself to "discuss(ing) the core issues identified and see how we can address them further"

cially of governors (mainly career British civil servants in the diplomatic services), HMG restricts itself to detailing the systems it has in place.

It could be that the FAC itself was rather vague on this point.

THE BREXIT REMIT

With some OTs particularly reliant on UK aid, especially for disaster relief, and more so considering the implications of Brexit, the government has given an assurance that the territories will not be left in limbo.

The FAC was particularly strident on this point.

It had stressed in its report that: "There must be scope to ask hard questions about the long-term sustainability and viability of individual OTs without further significant levels of UK capital investment.

It also insisted that "if the Government does not think significant capital investment is possible, then it must be frank about what it will spend and towards what end."

The government's response is to assure that "future funding arrangements for the OTs will be considered as part of the next Spending Review, which will conclude at the budget.

"The Government is establishing an Inter-Ministerial Group to meet to examine the issue of whether to develop a dedicated OT fund, including ODA(Overseas Development Administration) assistance, together with other longerterm issues, including those raised in the Committee's report."

Specifically regarding post-Brexit fund

Union, the tone adopted by Whitehall is noteworthy for its cautiousness...almost as of not to unduly raise expectations.

"When reviewing future options careful consideration will be given to any loss of EU funding the OTs may experience as a result of the UK leaving the EU.

Any future funding arrangements will need to demonstrate value for money and adopt a consistent approach across all government departments that manage such funds.

No decisions have yet been taken on this matter. The OTs will be fully consulted in the process," it states.

The government further reminds the FAC that "some of the report's recommendations and conclusions are wide-ranging and significant in scope. They will require careful analysis and consultation across a range of government departments."

CITIZENSHIP BY DESCENT

Two other pressing issues addressed by the FAC are the thorny issue of citizenship by descent and the question of access by OT citizens to healthcare under the UK's National Health Service(N-HS).

On the cumbersome and complex citizenship by descent issue, the FAC had called on the government to "urgently address concerns in the OTs about the issue of citizenship by descent and anomalies in the British Nationality Act that have taken too long to resolve."

For its part, the government says it "recognises the difficulties which current British nationality law presents for some British Overseas Territory citizen ing to fill the void that will be left when parents who wish to pass on their citithe UK eventually leaves the European zenship to their children and acknowl-

edges the unhappiness that this has caused."

It seeks to reassure those affected and caught up in a veritable state of citizenship limbo that "a consultation process with governors and territory governments (is underway), and will consider what possible legislation might be available in order to make the changes required."

NHS ACCESS

Access to NHS healthcare by the OTs is currently done on a limited quota system. There have numerous repeated calls from the OTs to remove the restrictions.

To this end, a review which started last June to review the current quota system is expected to be completed by this summer.

'This review will consider current needs and requirements for specialist healthcare treatment across the OTs and is expected to be complete in the summer of 2019. DHSC have confirmed that leaving the EU will not have any impact on access to the NHS for British Nationals resident in Gibraltar," the British government said.

ALSO...

On the other issues addressed, the FCO is said to be "exploring with the relevant authorities whether and how OT representatives might be included in Remembrance Sunday ceremonies in the UK" in recognition of their citizens' role on the field of battle for the 'mother country'.

And finally, "there are no plans to

Canada job figures on the rise

Canada's employment figures for April was encouraging, posting the largest one month gain in net jobs on record.

Employment rose by 107,000 in April, with notable gains in Ontario, Quebec, Alberta and Prince Edward Island.

The unexpected jump in employment far surpassed a widely forecasted increase of 10,000 net jobs and helped push Canada's unemployment rate to

5.7 percent, down slightly from 5.8 in March.

Of the net new jobs in April 73,000 were full-time and most of the gains — 84,000 — occurred in the private sector. On a year-over-year basis, employment grew by 426,000, of which 248,000 was full-time.

Statistics Canada reported that employment rose for youths aged 15 to 24, people aged 55 and older, and women in the core working ages of 25 to 54.

The employment increase reflected the fact the Canadian economy is pulling in new workers, namely immigrants and those 24 and younger, rather than falling unemployment.



Canada's employment stats are encouraging

Canada's most populous province, Ontario, posted an employment increase of 47,000 in April, which Statistics Canada said was mainly due to gains in parttime work among people aged 15 to 24.

Employment increased by 38,000 in Quebec and the province's unemployment rate dropped 0.3 percentage points to 4.9 per cent, the lowest rate since Statistics Canada began compiling similar data in 1976.

Alberta also posted an employment increase in April of 21,000.

New Brunswick was the only Canadian province to see employment decrease in April and the remaining Canadian provinces saw little change. 😚

The architect of Duterte's Rodrigo brutal campaign against illegal drugs in the Philippines has won a senate seat in the country's midterm elections, prompting concerns victims'

Dela Rosa is among Mr Duterte's allies who were on track to take nine of 12 open seats in the upper house, with 95 percent of ballots counted at press time. The senate has previously been an opponent of some of the president's

most controversial proposals. "Dela Rosa now has his own influence and clout, independent of the president," said Kristina Conti, a lawyer for the victims' group Rise Up for Life and for Rights, which filed criminal and civil cases against police in relation to Mr Duterte's drug war. "He might use his political clout to whitewash investigations into the human rights violations of the police."

Before the elections, families who lost loved ones in the drug war agreed not to vote for Mr Dela Rosa. "Now that he's going to be a senator, two mothers who filed cases against police told me they're afraid for their security," said Rubilyn Litao, a church worker helping those affected pursue cases against the police.

More than 18,000 positions were at stake in the vote, primarily local posts, but also half the senate and nearly 300 seats in the lower house of representatives.

Mr Duterte's deadly crackdown has drawn international censure, but is central to the populist appeal that has buoyed his remarkable standing among Filipinos since taking the presidency in 2016. Administration loyalist candidates for the senate were heading for a resounding win after Monday's vote. 夺

Honduran divers' health suffering

Honduras is seeing an alarming number of lobster divers suffering injury and death because they are taking chances with their health to earn a living.

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Saul Ronaldo Atiliano was diving for lobster in the clear waters off Honduras's Caribbean coast when he felt a pressure, a pain in his body. And he knew he'd gotten the sickness that has killed

or disabled so many of his Miskito comrades.

"The pressure attacked me deep in e water" said Mr Atiliano, a 45-yearold member of the Miskito ethnic group who for 25 years has dived for lobster, most of which is exported to the United States. Thousands of men across the Mosquitia region of Honduras and Nicaragua depend on lobster fishing to eke out a living. And like Mr Atiliano, hundreds have been stricken with the bends — decompression sickness caused when nitrogen bubbles form in divers' bodies. Some are paralyzed. Some are killed.

Honduras is one of the poorest countries in Latin America, and the Mosquitia, in the country's far east, is one of the most impoverished areas.

Cubans gays march in protest

Cuban gay rights activists held an unauthorised independent pride parade in Havana on Saturday despite the Communist government warning against it and calling it subversive, an unprecedented show of civil society in the one-party state.

More than a hundred Cubans chanting "long live a diverse Cuba" and carrying rainbow flags joyfully marched nearly one kilometre from Havana's Central Park down

to the seafront boulevard before being stopped by dozens of security officials.

At least three activists were arrested by plainclothes policemen while others

CENESEX, headed by Mariela Castro, the daughter of Communist Party leader Raul Castro, said in a statement that certain groups were planning to use the event to undermine the government, emboldened by the escalation of aggression by the Trump administration against Cuba and its leftist ally Venezuela. 😚

Venezuela lifts bank controls

Venezuela has lifted foreign exchange controls on banks for the first time in 16 years, but some observers are sceptical that the measure will do much to lift the shrinking economy ad rampant inflation.

Few people lined up at money exchange windows in private banks in Caracas to take advantage of the new policy. One man, Rodolfo Gutiérrez, said Venezuela's hyperinflation is so

severe that many people find it hard to buy dollars and are focused on buying whatever food they can.

Economist Asdrúbal Oliveros said some private institutions struggle to do international transactions because of US sanctions imposed in a campaign aimed at pressuring President Nicolás Maduro out of office.

"An exchange control can't be lifted by decree. There have to be the conditions for it," Mr Oliveros said.

The exchange controls were imposed by Mr Maduro's predecessor, Hugo Chávez, following an attempted coup in 2002.

The Venezuelan government took steps in August to loosen controls, al-

lowing people and companies to buy and sell dollars through exchange houses subject to regulations on the price and amount. But the measure had little success due to the scarcity of foreign currency. For years, Venezuela has had a flourishing black market in which dollars are sold for more than the official rate, currently at 5,200 bolivares to the dollar.

Venezuela's financial problems have intensified because of a sharp reduction in oil exports, a key source of foreign currency. The oil industry is under US sanctions as Washington and its allies try to open the way for opposition leader Juan Guaidó to replace Mr Maduro, who says he is the target of a coup plot. 📀

UK crime figures 'staggering'

Crime figures in the United Kingdom are so high that enforcement forces appear to have lost control.

Organised crime is killing more UK citizens than terrorism, war and natural disasters combined and "significant new investment" is needed to tackle it, the National Crime Agency (NCA) has said.

A comprehensive assessment by the NCA reveals how criminals are exploiting ad-

vances in technology alongside traditional methods to commit crimes.

NCA director general Lynne Owens said: "People should understand that serious and organised crime kills more of our citizens every year than terrorism, war and natural disasters combined.

"It is chronic and corrosive, and the message needs to be heard by everyone.

"Against a backdrop of globalisation, extremism and technological advances, serious and organised crime is changing fast and law enforcement needs significant new investment to help combat it.

'This is the most comprehensive assessment we have ever produced and

describes in detail the growing and ever-changing nature of the threat posed by serious and organised crime - to individuals, to communities and to wider society."

The agency's annual review of organised crime says there are more than 4,500 groups with 37,000 members in the UK.

Ms Owens said the threat from criminal gangs is "staggering" and that the public will "feel the consequences" if the extra funds are not found.

She said the investment should include more than doubling the NCA's annual budget from roughly KY\$500m to nearly KY\$1.5bn.

The government says it invests in the right tools for law enforcement. ③

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Leonard compares with legends

All coming from playoffs games replete with thrillers and shockers, the final four teams look to ride on the momentum as they slug it out for the NBA conference crowns.

The Golden State Warriors – the defending champions who had to dig deep minus Kevin Durant to get past the Houston Rockets – battle the plucky Portland Trail Blazers in the Western Conference finals.

Although the Blazers are the clear underdogs, there's no dismissing this squad that rallied to shock the No. 2 Denver Nuggets in Game 7 on the road.

The Milwaukee Bucks – the top seeds who needed to regroup after absorbing an early blow against the Boston Celtics in the series opener – also marched to

the Eastern Conference best-of-seven title series as the favourites over the Toronto Raptors.

But after Toronto's historic and heart-stopping Game 7 escape over the Philadelphia 76ers, the Raptors look more than capable of overcoming the improbable.

Kawhi Leonard was the hero for the Raptors with that heart-stopping final second winner. His form has given a strong reason to consider him the NBA's current best.

Yes, Kevin Durant, Steph Curry and Giannis Antetokounmpo are still in these playoffs, and James Harden and LeBron James remain outstanding players, but Leonard has been absolutely brilliant.

The 27-year-old Californian poured in 41 points in the Raptors' Game 7 win, with 15 coming in the fourth quarter when Toronto needed him most. And, of course, there was the ridiculous buzzer-beater to send the Raptors to the Eastern Conference Finals, a shot that is already etched in NBA playoff lore.

Leonard also held Jimmy Butler to 5-of-14 shooting, cutting off the guy who was arguably the 76ers' No. 1 source of offense.

How often does a player dominate on both ends of the floor like Leonard? Legends like Hakeem Olajuwon, Kevin Garnett and Tim Duncan immediately come to mind, but overall, there have not been many.

Durant may be the league's smoothest scorer, but he is not a lockdown defender. Antetokounmpo might be a great

allrounder, but his lack of a consistent jumper is a big hole. As for LeBron? When was the last time he played defence at elite level?

Leonard is top-notch on both ends of the floor, an efficient assassin on offense and an absolute nightmare on defence. He can shoot, dribble, post, rebound and dunk with aplomb. He can also guard any position.

Leonard is obviously a player for the big occasion. He has shown that before.

He won Finals MVP in 2014 when his San Antonio Spurs decimated LeBron's Miami Heat in five games, with Leonard making big play repeatedly on both ends of the court in that series.

Leonard was also brilliant in the 2013 NBA Finals in what ended up being a seven-game loss to the Heat. And how about in 2017 when he led the Spurs to the Western Conference Finals and had his team up by 23 points in Game 1 against the Golden State Warriors before going out with an ankle injury?

There is no flash to Leonard's game, nor showboating. There is just unbelievable skill, will and determination. (*

Atlético Madrid in All-Star game

Soccer fans in America get a chance to see another top European team when La Liga giants Atlético Madrid face the 2019 MLS All-Star Game on July 31 at Orlando City Stadium in Orlando, Florida.

Atlético Madrid is the second Spanish side to play against the top players in the MLS in the league's annual summer exhibition game; Real Madrid won the 2017 MLS All-Star Game 4-2 on penalty kicks in Chicago.

Atlético have won La Liga 10 times, most recently in 2014, and features a squad of stars including World Cup winner Antoine Griezmann, Spanish internationals Alvaro Morata and Diego Costa, and Jan Oblak, named La Liga's top goalkeeper the past three seasons. The club is also a mainstay in European competitions, winning the UEFA Europa League and UEFA Super Cup three times each, and reaching the UEFA Champions League final in 2014 and 2016.

For La Liga, having Atlético come to the United States is another integral part in the league's growth and awareness in North America. Atlético will also play in East Rutherford, New Jersey and Arlington, Texas as part of the 2019 International Champions Cup. •

Boling, 18, almost as fast as Bolt was

An American teenage sprint sensation shattered another national record with a blistering run just fractions of a second slower than Usain Bolt at the same age.

Matthew Boling, 18, became recognised worldwide only weeks ago after winning a wind-assisted 100m race with a time just 0.4 seconds slower than the Jamaican legend.

But he has since

proved it was no fluke with another stunning performance at the 6A High School Championships in Austin, Texas, US, over the weekend.

Boling, from Strake Jesuit College Prep in Texas, US, ran his 100m final in a wind-legal 10.13 seconds – a time that shattered the previous record at a high school meet.

Boling's new record ups the previous 10.15 seconds record set 29 years ago and is reported to be the fourth fastest wind-legal 100m set by any American high school student in history.

His April dash of 9.98 seconds wasn't considered a record breaker because of the wind factor but there was no denying him this time as he triumphed his previous wind-legal personal best by 0.09 seconds.

"When I looked at the race before us and saw the wind was 1.3 (metres per second), I was like, 'Oh, I'm excited'," Boling said.

"Because after last week everyone was like, 'Oh, the wind was illegal' and stuff like that. So I'm like, 'All right, I'll just drop a fast time today."

Boling's most incredible effort was saved for the 4x400m relay, seeing him pulling out an impressive final leg by coming back from behind and winning.

Despite being 30m behind the leader when he was handed the baton, he stole victory for a seemingly impossible task. He ran his 400m leg in just 44.74 seconds which only seasoned adults can achieve. Boling hopes to be part of the Tokyo 2020 Olympics team.

Brit diving for Jamaican gold

A British-born diver who now represents Jamaica has his sights set on a medal at next year's Tokyo Olympic Games.

Yona Knight-Wisdom was born in Leeds to a Jamaican father and a mother from Barbados. His parents took him to a local swimming club and, although he was only 9 years old, it changed his life. "I was watching the Athens Games in 2004. I had just started diving and I saw Leon Taylor and Peter Waterfield win a silver medal in the men's 10m synchronised diving event. It was after I saw them that I started to say that I could go to the Olympic Games," he said.

Now on his way to becoming an elite athlete, in 2012 he chose to represent his father's country, even though he is still based in Leeds. Diving barely exists as a sport in Jamaica where athletics dominates but Knight-Wisdom, 24, intends to write his own sporting history.

He said: "I am 1.90m tall, I weigh 90kg, I'm a heavy diver, I'm black. If you watch diving competitions, it's not something you'll see very often." During the 2014 Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, he finished fifth in the 1m springboard and eleventh in the 3m men's springboard. They were Jamaica's best results in a discipline that requires power, awareness of one's body in space, extreme precision and timing, and the use of every muscle in the body.

During the FINA Diving World Cup 2016, he finished second in the 3m men's springboard event. It was Jamaica's first medal in a world diving competition. He won his place at the Olympic Games Rio 2016, where the diving events were to be held at the same venue. He had realised his childhood dream by becoming not only the first Jamaican, but also the first diver from a Caribbean island to participate in an Olympic tournament. "Which was already huge in itself," he said. "I was overcome with emotion. I was in tears by the pool and my friends started crying too. That victory was not just for me, it was for all of them too."

In Rio, where he was beginning to attract some attention, he finished 11th in the first heat of the 3m men's springboard, allowing him to progress to the next stage, the semi-finals. But his competition ended there, and he finished 14th. He was only 21 at the time and was already looking ahead to the next Olympic Games, in Tokyo next year. Meanwhile, he was elected sportsman of the year at his university, Leeds Beckett.

At the Commonwealth Games on Australia's Gold Coast last year, Knight-Wisdom had already established a reputation and was competing among the favourites for the podiums in the 1m and 3m men's springboard events. He finished fourth in the 1m. In the 3m springboard he also earned a place in the final and finished in ninth place.

Given that he trains for over 25 hours a week, he has decided to leave Leeds for Scotland, specifically the Royal Commonwealth Pool in Edinburgh, and work with renowned coach Jenny Leeming to better prepare his assault on the Olympic Games.





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
