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



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STEM AWARDS CELEBRATE LOCAL EDUCATORS

The Dart Minds Inspired Award for Excellence in Teaching STEM was held on May 2 at the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands to recognise outstanding educators in the subjects of science, technology, engineering and mathematics – collectively known as STEM.

Dart Education Programmes Senior Manager Glenda McTaggart says the Award for Excellence in Teaching STEM is Dart's way of celebrating educators who have made a significant, positive difference in their students' lives through STEM teaching.

"It recognises superior teaching, innovative instructional practice, high educational standards, creation of productive learning environments, and the ability to inspire and motivate students," she says.

St. Ignatius Catholic School teacher Von Ryan Abrantes received the High School Award, Island Montessori teacher Lune Vermeire the Elementary School

Prison Service (HMCIPS) to increase their educational portfolio

Her Majesty's Cayman Islands Prison Service (HMCIPS) is set to increase the educational portfolio offered to incarcerated persons in 2019.

In the months ahead the HMCIPS will build on its already wide catalogue of existing courses offered through the rehabilitation unit, with new programmes that expand its focus on vocational training and preparation for re-entry.

HMCIPS Director Steven Barrett says the prison will introduce a number of new workshops including plumbing, electrical training, auto mechanic repairs and appliance repairs.

"We are keen to ensure that these work opportunities are integrated with our education portfolio.

It is less about the nature of the work, although that is important, but it is more about the competencies that will be developed for those who participate in these programmes; competencies that will be industry transferrable," Mr. Barrett comments.

Training will be provided by prison officers who are trained and certified to deliver these vocational courses, in conjunction with the University College of the Cayman Islands using City & Guilds and the Institute of the Motor Industry curriculum and certification.

In recent years, the unity of Cayman's carnival scene has seen three distinct festivals populating the social calendar during the month of May: Batabano, Braccanal, and more recently, CayMas.

Revelers were given a choice of which of these carnivals to attend. Sponsors, too, were torn. And two consecutive weekends of jamming along West Bay Road, which meant roadblocks and diversions for the rest of the community trying to avoid the revelry.

Health Services Authority achieves major milestone – a Clean Audit

The Cayman Islands Health Services Authority ("HSA") announced they have received an unmodified/unqualified (clean) audit opinion from the Auditor General for the HSA's 2018 financial statements.

A clean audit opinion means financial statements are free from material misstatements (an unmodified audit opinion) with no material adverse findings regarding financial operations or non-compliance with legislation. A clean audit opinion is the best outcome that can be obtained.

This goal was one of the HSA Board's main strategic priorities for 2018, and follows the HSA's public commitment to the Legislative Assembly and Public Accounts Committee that it would achieve this standard for the 2018 fiscal year.

In pursuing this commitment, the Board and management deployed sustained initiatives to improve the quality and reliability of the HSA's financial information. Major contributors to the HSA's improved financial health include (and are not limited to) strengthening of, and ongoing training around, our policies and procedures; improved processes around collections; and ongoing monitoring of accounts receivable balances.

Financial managers, physicians, clinical professionals and staff at all levels worked collaboratively to implement various recommendations from Deloitte and the Auditor General. Areas of focus included: finance and supply chain management; revenue and budget management; asset management; and general control programmes. Implementation of those recommendations was a key factor in realizing this outcome.

HSA Chairman, Jonathan Tibbetts, says the achievement was driven by strong leadership commitment at the Board and management level, and commended the staff for reaching this milestone.

"The achievement of this first unmodified audit opinion is a major accomplishment for the HSA and a testament of our commitment to accountability and reform which has been reflected in other areas of improvement since this Board was appointed. This includes reaching and sustaining a 90-day cash reserve as mandated in the HSA Law for the first time since the inception of the HSA; improvements in clinical outcomes and performance metrics; and providing better access to timely health-

care through facility improvements and expansion."

"We appreciate the diligent work done by every single employee," Mr. Tibbetts added. "The organisation recruited the right people, put together strong teams and designated 'champions' to lead various tasks, groups and initiatives to achieve this outcome. This helped to inspire everyone around the shared goal and the importance of achieving an unmodified audit opinion".

HSA CEO Lizzette Yearwood paid tribute to the exceptional work of the staff who embraced the challenges and worked collaboratively in making this historic achievement possible. "Our talented and dedicated workforce came together in implementing strong internal policies and business practices to resolve complicated financial management issues leading to the achievement of this unmodified audit opinion," Ms. Yearwood said.

Ms. Yearwood expressed her appreciation to the Minister, Ministry, and Board for their vision and support, in addition to all of HSA's staff, past and present, for their hard work and dedication to achieve this goal.

Recording the transactions for over 1,000 daily patient encounters facilitated by almost 900 staff across all three Islands, delivering diagnostics, therapy and pharmaceutical supplies creates a complex business environment for the HSA. However, Ms. Yearwood pointed to the implementation of strong, effective internal control measures, development of comprehensive policies and the commitment of staff as the critical pieces that led to the outcome.

"We are very conscious that the hard work is far from over and this achievement poses an even greater responsibility upon us all to maintain our financial integrity with unmodified audit opinions in future years," she said.

"As always, we continue to focus on delivering the best quality care to our patients, from reduced error rates to shorter wait times and improved patient satisfaction."

Health Minister, Hon. Dwayne Seymour congratulated the tremendous work of the Board and the HSA management and staff in achieving this milestone.

Auditor General, Sue Winspear confirmed the unmodified/unqualified audit opinion and congratulated the HSA on this achievement.

Award, and Cayman International School teachers Jeff Szeryk and Krista Finch received Merit Awards.

The teachers were nominated by their peers and evaluated through a blind selection process. The selection panel consisted of a representative from the Dart Scholar Selection Committee, a Ph.D. level industry professional in

a STEM field, a member of the US National Science Teachers Association and retired principals from Cayman and overseas.

As the recipients of the 2019 Excellence in Teaching STEM awards, Abrantes and Vermeire will attend a STEM educators conference compliments of Minds Inspired and receive a cash award of US\$1,000. The award also included a US\$3,000 grant for each

school to enhance its STEM educational resources.

Minds Inspired's focus on STEM is grounded in the Dart family's belief that these subjects are essential for success in and beyond the classroom. Dart Executive Vice President with responsibility for community development Pilar Bush says teachers are fundamental to inspiring and nurturing students' passion for STEM learning.

"Teachers play a pivotal role in developing a passion for STEM subjects," she says. "It matters to us that students are inspired and prepared, and we know that teachers are the epicenter of students' learning. Excellence in teaching is critical to their engagement and willingness to pursue challenging STEM subjects."

The full suite of programmes is scheduled to commence in June 2019 and run on a six-month cyclical basis. Inmates will complete all of the core competencies such as basic math and English for the workplace, employability skills training, life skills, interpersonal skills, emotional intelligence as well as the programmes which they are assessed to need as per the psychological assessments.

Current vocational programmes already underway include the woodwork shop, the agricultural project and the Fresh Start construction industry training programme.

The Fresh Start construction industry training programme is run in collaboration with private sector partners Phoenix, Clan Construction and Encompass. The programme is ongoing with 14 men currently enrolled.

In 2018, 16 inmates enrolled in the Fresh Start rehabilitation programme, four of whom participated in the Release on Temporary License (ROTL) programme, which allowed them to be released into the community with certain restrictions once they secured employment with one of the Fresh Start companies.

The woodwork shop project trains inmates in health and safety, hand and power tools operations and the construction of many items including picnic tables, garbage can holders, park benches, swings, etc. HMCIPS is also piloting a new course in barbering which will provide inmates with the opportunity to gain a certification in barbering.

The prison farm provides another training environment and 15 inmates are currently receiving formal instruction in agricultural science. In 2018, crops from the farm earned \$16,000 from sales to supermarkets and other local vendors. Focus is also placed on the cultivation of creative talents, and over the course of the last year male and female inmates submitted 150 pieces of art and craft work to three different shows.

Deputy Director of Rehabilitation, Ms. Aduke Joseph-Caesar, says the overall goal of vocational training is to reduce inmates' risk of recidivating by teaching them marketable skills they can use to find and retain employment following release from prison.

"This type of hands-on training can make a huge impact as it enables inmates to participate in apprenticeship programmes and connect with prospective employers, giving them access to jobs that provide reasonable salaries that help to stabilise their lives after release," she explains. "In addition, some vocational training programmes include opportunities to put in man hours which count towards industry-recognised credentials and certificates."

The vocational training augments more traditional academic courses. Last year more than 100 inmates completed online courses, 5 passed the Caribbean Examinations Certificate Exam, 3 completed tertiary education degrees in areas ranging from theology to continuing education, while three enrolled in higher learning. An additional 25 inmates completed university and college level certificates.

To facilitate the planned growth in training opportunities for inmates the Prison Service is looking to expand on the number of community partnerships in which it engages Home Affairs Minister Hon. Tara Rivers explains.

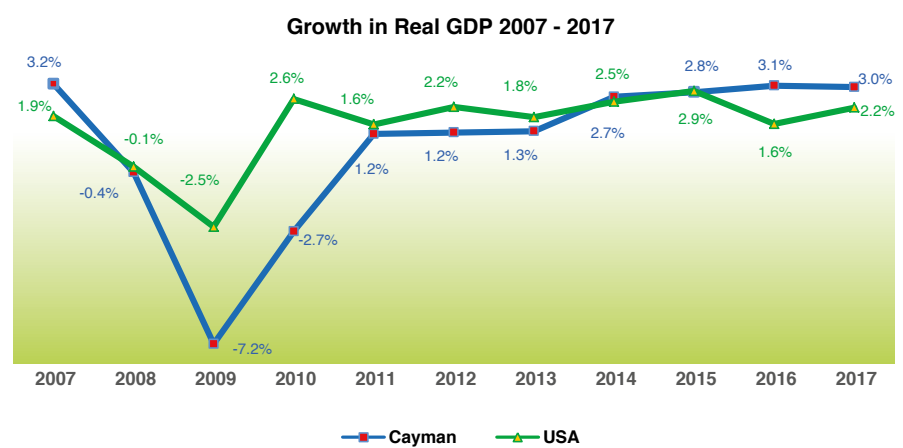
"The more public and private sector partnerships can be developed, the greater the ability to assist inmates with the transition from prison back into the community as fully contributing citizens. The Government is extremely grateful to those who have partnered with the Prison Service, and we look forward to expanding this network so that together we can reduce reoffending and the strain that it places on the criminal justice system, families and the community," Minister Rivers concluded.

The Day Camps provide a safe and well-supervised environment for over 750 kids during summer and school breaks, plus the new Ropes Challenge Course is helping individuals improve critical communication, team-building, trust, planning and problem-solving skills.

One parent who has benefited from the annual campaign donations stated "Financial assistance from the Y has

CMEA's President, Jeán-Eric Smith, attended the event with the Ministry of Community Affairs' Chief Officer, Teresa Echenique, and the DCFS Director.

He confirmed that his association was keen to see the volunteer music therapy programme rolled out across the Cayman Islands.

"CMEA is a non-profit organisation and part of our remit is to provide social outreach of this kind. TURBULENT TIMES FOR LIAT

Reports that British businessman Richard Branson could be on the verge of rescuing the eastern Caribbean government-owned airline LIAT from almost certain financial demise, have set off a wave of speculation about the future of the beleaguered carrier.

LIAT (Leeward Islands Air Transport 1974 Ltd) has, over the sixty-three years of its existence, become synonymous with air travel in the eastern Caribbean.

Love or loathe it, label it 'Leave Island Any Time' or 'Luggage In Another Terminal', one way or another almost everyone who has travelled between the islands has at some point flown on LIAT - or have otherwise had a LIAT experience.

The airline has created its own space in the psyche of the islands. LIAT has become an institution.

Is that now about to change?

LIAT has weathered many storms since it was set up and based in Montserrat in 1956, by the St Kitt's-born aviator Frank Delisle. It no longer flies to the island.

Over the years it has seen involvement by the then BWIA (British West Indies Airways) - from 1957 to 1971, followed by a brief courtship with another British carrier, Courtline until that venture folded in 1974 when Courtline went bankrupt.

It was then that eleven Caribbean governments from Jamaica to Guyana

stepped in, the result being LIAT (1974 Ltd).

It took another decade before it realised a profit but since then, despite several cash injections, restructurings, and a virtual management revolving doors, LIAT has been struggling to stay airborne financially.

There were always wrangles over the level of service and whether the investing governments were getting value for their money in their own country's interest.

National priorities and preferences slowly eroded the concept of regional integration with some governments, especially the larger shareholding countries, placing more emphasis on domestic flag carriers.

LIAT is now battling headwinds again, this time possibly its most challenging, which could lead to the vital regional carrier being grounded due to dire financial straits.

The suggestion that it might take a maverick of the global airline industry to rescue LIAT from possibly its most turbulent period in its sixty-three years history, will come as a relief to flyers but most probably a reality check for the current shareholding governments.

Details are not clear of the touted Richard Branson involvement, but a statement from the Office of the Prime Minister of Antigua & Barbuda quotes a senior government official as saying that an option might be to expanding LIAT rather than scaling it down.

LIAT is hardly in a position to negotiate.

A statement on its website quotes current CEO Julie Reifer-Jones, its first female boss, confirming that "despite the challenges facing the airline, it continues operating its daily flight schedule."

She also noted that "there are ongoing discussions with Governments across the LIAT network about the need for all the territories served by LIAT to contribute through a Minimum Revenue Guarantee Model."

But Reifer-Jones, the most recent in a string of CEOs to have attempted to set LIAT on a more profitable financial flight path, admits that "the pace of these discussions has been slower than anticipated but the company remains optimistic that the discussions will be concluded shortly."

That was dated April 29th. The Branson arrived on the scene a few days later.

In recent months there have been repeated calls from the airline for cash injections by the current shareholder governments to keep LIAT flying.

At one stage when it was feared that it would be grounded, pilots took a pay cut.

LIAT's dire financial circumstances are said to be based on a stifling debt of \$US 60 million and there's a demand by management for an urgent \$US 5 million injection to keep it flying.

In the global scheme of things that level of debt for a regional airline should be manageable.

But LIAT seems to have exhausted almost all of its funding options and is now looking to its shareholder governments for a bailout.

That's where the fractures begin to show.

Barbados which currently owns practically half of the airline with 49 per cent of the shares, has warned that it "does not intend to be LIAT's atm" (automatic teller machine).

It has been reported that Barbados has been having private talks with what have been called "European interests" concerning air transportation. Speculation is rife as to where that could be headed.

Just a few days ago, an Antigua and Barbuda government minister has confirmed that his government would buy Barbados's shares in LIAT if that country wanted to divest them.

If that were to go through it would put Antigua in an even more dominant position in LIAT than Barbados currently is, with or without a Branson injection, as it would control over 60% of the shares.

Antigua and Barbuda would also be the biggest player and have the most significant voice in decisions regarding air travel in the eastern Caribbean.

It currently holds 12 per cent of LIAT's shares.

Dominica which holds around nine per cent has warned that while it's prepared to help out, it does not have a "largeesse of funds".

Non-shareholders Grenada and St Kitts & Nevis have offered to put in some money, although act amounts and terms have not been disclosed.

But St Lucia, another non-shareholder which even under several previous administrations has been one of LIAT's biggest critics, maintains that it will not make any funds available without a guarantee of major changes to the airline's structure.

A suggestion from the government of St Vincent and the Grenadines, an 11 per cent shareholder, is for the Caribbean Development Bank(CDB) to sell the three of the LIAT planes it holds as security for a loan it made to LIAT.

LIAT currently operates a fleet of 10 aircraft, down from 18 previously, serving its 15 regional destinations. In the past few years it had cut back on some of its routes and flights.

The CDB, the region's top lending and economics advisory institution, is concerned that LIAT's demise could have a serious knock-on effect for regional economies.

The airline provides a crucial travel link and airlift for business travel, family and cultural ties, but most importantly tourism which underpins the economy of most of the islands.

The Richard Branson option looks like LIAT's last chance, but will it fly? 🌐

Woods will roar again at PGA

Masters champion Tiger Woods could have "10 years left" as a competitive player, says Rory McIlroy.

Woods broke an 11-year drought to win his 15th major at Augusta National last month, to edge closer to fellow American Jack Nicklaus' record of 18.

Asked if Woods can match Nicklaus' haul, four-time major winner McIlroy said: "I think so. It rejuvenates and re-energises that narrative. Tiger could be competitive at Augusta for 10 years if his body holds up."

The Northern Irishman added: "A lot of people were comparing it to Jack in 1986 (when he became the oldest Masters winner at the age of 46), everyone knew that was going to be his last major championship."

Woods looks set to continue his recent resurgence though. He challenged for major titles at both the Open Championship and US PGA Championship in 2018 before winning his 80th PGA Tour event - and first in five years - at the Tour Championship last September and then claiming his fifth Masters Green Jacket.

However, former world number one McIlroy, 30, said he believed the

43-year-old American's career was over when the pair had lunch together two years ago.

"It was March 2017, just coming off the back of another surgery, and all he was thinking about was quality of life, watching his kids grow up, being able to play soccer in the back yard," said McIlroy who needs to win the Masters to join an elite group of players that includes Woods, to have won all four of the sport's majors.

"His mind wasn't even on golf, which sort of told me, 'He's thinking this could be it', and from stories that I've heard, at the champions dinner at Augusta that year, he was saying the same things, maybe not playing competitive golf again."

"To think in two years what's happened, it's incredible. It's a big deal to come back from what he has, and I don't think people quite appreciate what has gone into it."

Woods usually plays a smaller tournament between majors, but he does not appear to be doing that this time as the PGA Championship starts on May 16.

He was hitting balls on a driving range in Florida last week, dispelling concern

that he is too injured to play. Moved from August, the PGA Championship has a new calendar position between the Master's and the US Open.

Woods said in an interview with Golf TV last week that he hasn't done much since his historic Master's win.

"I haven't started doing anything," Woods said. "I've just been laying there. And every now and again, I'll look over

there on the couch and there's the jacket. Yeah, I did pull it off."

Teeing up at Bethpage Black in New York, the PGA Championship 2019 will be played at one of the most challenging public golf courses in the country. Bethpage previously hosted the US Open in 2002 and 2009. Despite his reluctance to play before the tournament, Woods is the odds-on favourite to win it at 17-1. 🌐

Windies up to eighth in one-day rankings

West Indies have been handed an unexpected rankings boost ahead of the World Cup, after overhauling Sri Lanka to climb to eighth in the ICC One-Day International charts.

Windies gained four ratings points to move to 80, while Sri Lanka remained on 76, following the annual update which saw the removal of the 2015-16 results and those between 2016 and 2018 computed at 50 percent.

For the Windies, the rise comes on the back of their outstanding performance in the recent five-match series against world number one, England, when they snatched a 2-2 tie.

That series result saw them draw level on 76 points with the Sri Lankans but remain in ninth spot. They can further solidify their new ranking when they face hosts Ireland and Bangladesh in a

Tri-Nations Series in Dublin this week.

Poor results there, however, especially against seventh-placed Bangladesh could see the Windies slip back to ninth again heading into the World Cup, which runs from May 30 to July 14.

West Indies have spent recent years languishing at number nine and it resulted in them missing out on automatic qualification for the World Cup.

England, meanwhile, remain the top-ranked side, but will need to beat Ireland and Pakistan in their upcoming series to enter the World Cup at the summit.

India are second after gaining one ratings point, while South Africa have overtaken New Zealand to claim third place, with the Black Caps dropping to fourth.

In the Test rankings, West Indies are now just behind seventh-placed Pakistan after gaining five points following the annual update.

The Jason Holder-led unit are now on 82 points, but only two behind seventh-placed Pakistan who dropped four ratings points.

India top the rankings with 113 points, but lost three ratings points to see their gap on second-placed New Zealand shrink to two points after the Black Caps gained three points. 🌐

Gayle to lead Tallawahs at Sabina Park

West Indies batting star Chris Gayle has signed a deal with Jamaica Tallawahs as their marquee player for the 2019 Hero Caribbean Premier League, set to start in September.

Gayle, who will be 39 in September, is the leading T20 batsman of all time with over 10,000 runs. He is also the leading CPL run scorer with 2,111 runs and will return as captain of the Tallawahs, which he led to victory in 2013 and 2016.

The franchise will be playing all their games in Jamaica, after playing three matches in Florida last year which annoyed many Jamaicans who wanted to see their heroes at Sabina Park.

Gayle, a former West Indies Test skipper, is one of the world's best cricketers, especially in the T20 version. He led Jamaica to two titles but has since been representing St Kitts and Nevis Patriots, where he captained them to the play-offs in successive years while making the finals in 2017.

The CPL will not be playing any games in Florida for the 2019 season due to poor attendance. The Tallawahs

2018 matches against Guyana Amazon Warriors and Trinbago Knight Riders drew strong support for the visitors in Florida but not the Tallawahs, which sparked criticism from captain Andre Russell. The third match played by Tallawahs in Florida against Barbados Tridents only drew 700 people compared to sell-out crowds at Sabina Park.

Gayle will be playing the World Cup - after which he is expected to retire from ODIs - having ended the IPL in good form this year. Before the weekend, he had scored 462 runs in 12 innings at a strike rate of 158.76 and average of 42, with four half-centuries, for Kings XI Punjab. 🌐

Alvarez heads for billionaire club

Saul 'Canelo' Alvarez is looking to retrace old ground after unifying the middleweight division with a points victory over Daniel Jacobs in Las Vegas.

The 28-year-old Mexican - now beaten just once in 55 fights - took Jacobs' IBF belt to add to his own WBC and WBA titles.

Boxing fans will now be hoping to see Canelo face another American, WBO middleweight champion Demetrius Andrade, to become the undisputed middleweight king.

"Nobody in Mexico has ever done that, won all four belts in one division, so that's my motivation," Alvarez said.

However, Canelo said he was open to meeting Kazakh fighter Gennedy Golovkin for a third time. The two drew their first bout in 2017, then Canelo took a controversial points victory a

year later. "If he wants to do it again, I'll beat him again," he said.

Alvarez is easily the biggest sports star in Mexico where boxing is only second to football in popularity. His projected career earnings could see him join the billionaire boys club - with sporting members including the only man to ever beat him in the ring, Floyd Mayweather Jr, Tiger Woods and Michael Jordan.

It's no wonder streaming service DAZN signed the father of three, on a multi-fight deal of around \$520 million in 2018, said to be the richest sports contract in history.

While he doesn't have the outrageous personality of Mayweather, or the knockout factor of Muhammad Ali, DAZN felt he was a worthy investment. His next nine fights will be streamed exclusively by them.

The fact that Alvarez pulled in around \$1 million in pay-per-view money for his fight against Golovkin gave him an excellent platform to say he's the biggest draw in boxing today.

Despite his rather bizarre fashion choices, once flying in a private jet in a panda suit, he's a poster boy for advertisers too.

Alongside basketball whizz Steph Curry, Alvarez fronts campaigns for sportswear giant Under Armour, peddling their boxing range.

Alvarez boasts an equally impressive garage full of supercars as Mayweather.

He recently dropped \$4.3 million on a Bugatti Chiron - the world's fastest car on the road.

Only 500 are in existence, and Alvarez joins a select group of owners including Cristiano Ronaldo who can be reassured their investment is well spent, with value in those cars rising yearly.

And that's not all. You will find parked behind the gates of his Guadalajara mansion a Mercedes SLS AMG Black Series, Lamborghini Aventador, Mustang 500 Eleanor, Mercedes-Benz G63 AMG 6x6, Ferrari Testarossa, AMG C64 biTurbo, Rolls Royce Ghost, Ferrari 458 Italia, McLaren P1, Porsche 911 GT3 and a Lamborghini Gallardo (Renazzo Vorsteiner edition).
