Batabano grows to biggest parade in Cayman

The Cayman Carnival Batabano Committee is thrilled to announce that there will be FIFTEEN (15) masquerade bands, groups, and floats in the Batabano parade this Saturday, May 4, 2019, with up to 4,000 masqueraders anticipated this year.

The Batabano Committee said four new mas bands joined the national carnival this year, including a new Latin group called Mas Azucar, Kaotic Mas Band, Local Carnival, and Fenomenal Mas Band. Also new to the parade this year is a cultural dance group called Feria Juniana from Honduras doing traditional Honduran dances wearing traditional Honduran dresses. There is also a new corporate float by Canterbury this year, and a new group of local and international beauty queens called Stush Mas. Cayman Aids Foundation will have a king costume in the parade again this year, and there will also be costumes by Cayman's longest-serving costume designer, Reba Dilbert. The 2018 Batabano Band of the Year, Tribal Carnival, said they have doubled in size this year, with more than 400 masqueraders expected in their band for Batabano 2019.

"We couldn't be more elated with the tremendous support that Batabano con-

tinues to receive from local Mas Bands and masqueraders, as well as from local and international groups who are eager to be part of this 36-year carnival tradition in the Cayman Islands," said Batabano Chairperson Donna Myrie-Stephen. "This year's parade will be one of the biggest in the history of carnival in Cayman, and we invite all residents and visitors on the island to come out and experience it."

The Batabano Committee also this week released the line-up of the masquerade bands in order of their appearance in the parade. Leading the parade of mas bands will be Fenomenal Mas Band followed by Canterbury Float, Feria Juniana, Reba Dilbert Creations, Local Mas Band, Cayman Aids Foundation, Illusions Mas Band, Stush Mas, Mas Azucar, Kaotic Mas Band, Revel Unit, Tribal Carnival, Renegade Mas, Fresh Carnival, and Party Animals.

Per tradition, the Batabano parade starts at the Seven Mile Public Beach at 1pm and ends on Harbour Drive in the heart of George Town. The parade will take its usual route down Fort Street and pass the final judging station in front of the

Crime Statistics

The RCIPS issued its crime statistics report, comparing 2018's crime stats with 2017. Burglaries have fallen dramatically, but robberies especially of individuals have risen. Sometimes an apparent increase in crime is actually because the crime is being reported more, which might actually show an increased level of confidence in the police service. That may be the case especially in domestic violence situations, indicated Detective Superintendent Peter Landsdown: "We have better recording structures in place, so we tend to have better statistics," he said.

Commissioner of Police Derek Byrne shared some good-news trends, saying that the new

Community Policing, although still a work-in-progress and developing as it receives all-important feedback, had made some very significant impacts: "We are doing a lot with young people in the community," he said, adding that early intervention in the community was helping to prevent crime, rather than simply detecting and enforcing the law. "Child intervention is at the apex of our strategy," Commissioner Byrne said. Good news was also that: 'Serious crimes are relatively small in number, and, "the figures are quite manageable

Four sharks found dead in Cayman waters

Four sharks have been found dead in Cayman Islands waters since 27 February, according to reports investigated and confirmed by the Department of Environment's

(DoE) shark research team, Shark Conservation Cayman. The circumstances involved in the demise of the four marine predators vary in each case. In one incident from late February on Grand Cayman, a small silky shark became entangled in an abandoned fishing net. Another unidentified shark in Cayman Brac was found on 15 March having been cut by a sharp instrument. Two sharks were found dead in Cayman Brac waters in April – both were lemon sharks. One suffered severe head trauma while another apparently died after being fished from the water and then kicked back into it from the dock.

Two nurse sharks were injured on Grand Cayman during the same period; one was trapped in a fish pot and the other suffered a cut to its side. A blacktip shark that the DoE was tracking in Little Cayman using an acoustic monitor was also injured and its fate remains uncertain at present.

"That blacktip shark was the first shark I tagged when I got to Cayman," said Shark Research Officer Johanna

DCI to Help Real Estate Agents, Dealers, with Mandatory Registration

Real estate agents and brokers, and dealers in precious metals and stones, will be assisted with Government's mandatory registration process during half-day workshops organised by the Department of Commerce and Investment (DCI)'s regulatory staff.

DCI will send invitations for the workshops, both of which will be held on 9 May, directly to agents, brokers, and dealers; also, persons who believe they are eligible for the workshops are asked to contact DCI (mail to SSuckoo@dci.gov. ky). Speakers will include Minister of Commerce the Hon. Joey Hew, Cayman Islands Compliance Association President Sandra Edun-Watler, and DCI's Compliance and Enforcement team.

"These workshops are important, because registration will allow these persons to continue operating their businesses in Cayman," said DCI Director Ryan Rajkumarsingh. "The Anti-Money Laundering Regulations (2018 Revision), which were amended in March 2018, require them to register as part of Cayman's compliance regime, in line with global standards that are assessed by the Caribbean Financial Action Task Force (CFATF)."

All real estate agents and brokers, and precious metals and stone dealers, must be registered as DNFBPs by Wednesday, 29 May. Failure to comply may result in administrative penalties being applied, Mr Rajkumarsingh said.

In addition to being able to register with DCI's assistance, workshop participants will learn:

• The key issues and challenges for agents and dealers, as outlined in the



CFATF's Mutual Evaluation Report on Cayman's regime for anti-money laundering, countering the financing of terrorism, and proliferation financing (AML/CFT/PF). The CFATF report was published in March 2019.

- The sector's risk assessment.
- How to set up a compliance regime. At the conclusion of this workshop, participants should:
- Know and understand the Mutual Evaluation Report's recommendations.
- Understand the registration requirements and what will follow.
- Understand the results of non-compliance.

Mr Rajkumarsingh explained that the CFATF classifies agents and dealers as "Designated Non-Financial Businesses and Professions," or DNFBPs. This classification acknowledges that these persons, while not operating directly in financial services, are regulated because of the global risk of money laundering, the financing of terrorism, and proliferation financing in these sectors.

Throughout May, the Department will host the following information booths and sessions, where the public will have the opportunity to put their questions



Community focuses on unity after Vandalism at Webster's Estate

"This collectively presents us with an opportunity to announce how a community that works together in tandem with police can solve issues," said Carol Hay, one of the residents.

The residents of Webster's Estate have mixed feelings about Friday morning's incident but personally she feel these boys should not be jailed.

"They are mere children. Apparently, the youngsters involved were both 13 years old. In a perfect world, they should be shamed, made to apologize to every one of us and, where appropriate, forced to clean up the mess that they've caused," she added.

Just before 7.30 AM on Friday 26 April, Police responded to the area of where it was reported that several properties were vandalized. Vandalism included damage to vehicles, walls, road signs, street lights and other private property. The next day police arrested two male juveniles on suspicion of burglary and damage to property. They were subsequently interviewed

by police and granted bail, and are in custody of their parents pending further investigation.

Carol Hay, one of the residents of the estate said: "various car windows were smashed and spray painted in red. Street signs were painted, walls graphited, and wall lights smashed. The damage was quite extensive and appeared to be random.

"I do not know if we shall ever learn the identity of these wayward youth. I do not know the history of these boys but that aside, prison will solve nothing and teach them less. As a parent, that's just how I feel. As a matter a fact, it was the mother of one of the apprehended boys that turned him in. I applaud this

"Kudos to our MLA Barbara Conolly who was on the scene shortly after the report was made and visited many of us that were directly affected by the vandalism. However, I do have reservations that a publicity overkill may start a rash of copy-cat behavior with other delinguents who may seek similar media coverage. Therefore, I was quick to paint my front wall that was defaced with offensive and what appeared to be gang related graffiti.

"Another concerned resident opined, 'this should not go unnoticed by the rest of Cayman's community. We can work with the Press to assure that appropriate press coverage be given – not one that simply announces the vandalism, but one that tells the entire story as to the effectiveness of a watchful and cooperative community. The focus should be on the affected residents, the police and our MLA for South Sound coming together to resolve this incident in such a short space of time. At the very least, it will be a warning to others that Webster's is a poor choice to commit a crime of any kind. But, as a greater value, it may inspire others in Cayman to pull together when crimes occur.'"

Latest crime stats: Burglaries tumble but robberies up

and consistent with this sort of jurisdiction."

Although there had been three firearms murders, and one domestic murder, "they are not gang-related, which is pretty important," Commissioner Byrne said, comparing the situation with several years ago when there was a high incidence of gang-related firearms murders which was notable improvement.

"When comparing 2018 with 2017 across these categories of crime, the total number of all crimes (inclusive of drug enforcement) has decreased by 3% (126). While the numbers of certain crimes have varied notably between 2018 and 2017 (e.g., burglaries, robberies, assault ABH), the overall cumulative incidence of crime across general categories has dropped somewhat, as such: Serious Crimes (-150, about -10%) and the Overall Total (-147, -4%), or stayed the same: Other Crimes (+ 3, or .1%)," the report stated.

Serious crimes account for 38.6% (1335) of all crimes in the Cayman Islands, and somecrimes within this category had no notable fluctuation across 2017 and 2018. Those crimes are manslaughter, rape and assault GBH," the report said.

Those crimes which registered notable decreases in 2018 were burglary-related crimes (burglary, attempted burglary and criminal trespass), firearmincidents and indecent assaults. About 61% of all crimes committed in the Cayman Islands fall into the less serious. These statistics indicate notable increases in the number ofincidents of common assault (+42%) and of motor vehicle thefts (+33%),but a decrease in theft reports overall.

In 2018 the total number of burglaries was 324, and the total number of other burglary-related offences was 181. In comparison with 2017, Burglary and related offences fellnotably in 2018, as follows: Burglary (-36.5%), Attempted Burglary (-22%), Criminal Trespass (-25.5%). Residential burglary decreased by 36% and commercial burglary decreased by 31% in 2018. Burglaries affect all districts throughout the islands, and the decline in burglaries in 2018 was shared across all districts, with Bodden Town experiencing the steepest decline of 57% over last year.

In 2018, there were 10 confirmed firearm crimes recorded, which was a decrease of 62% (16) compared to 2017. There were 3 murders in 2018 with the use of a firearm, in comparison to 1 in 2017 and 2 in 2016. However, in 2018, one person was shot and injured with a

firearm, in comparison with 5 in 2017 and 3 in 2016.

Across the Cayman Islands in 2018, while attempted robberies nearly doubled. Combined robbery and attempted robbery figures of commercial premises remained about the same as last year; In contrast to commercial robberies,

robberies of individuals spiked in 2018, with both minor and serious injuries reported. Overall there were 26 incidents of this type of robbery, nearly double the number in 2017. In contrast to commercial robberies. Injuries were reported in 30% (8) of these incidents, three (3) of which were categorized as serious.

Cruise Port Referendum Petition Reaches 90%

Campaigners for Cruise Port Referendum (CPR) Cayman have announced that they have reviewed and verified over 90% of the petition signatures required to a trigger a people's initiated referendum under section 70 of the constitution.

With just 500 signatures to go, the grassroots campaign aims to give the voting public the right to make a fully informed decision as to whether or not the Cayman Islands proceeds with the controversial cruise berthing facility that would be Cayman's largest capital project to date.

Since the project was announced in 2015, the matter has been a sensitive topic with people voicing their support and opposition to the project based on a wide range of environmental, economic and social considerations.

Campaigners are optimistic, noting that they have had a number of persons who have registered to vote for the first time just to be able to participate in the initiative which they see as an encouraging sign that more Caymanians are paying attention to current

issues and willing to participate in national decision-making as involved citizens.

In addition to those voters, there has been an outpouring of support to the referendum campaign from those residing in Cayman and overseas who are not able to vote, but have expressed their deep concern and love for Cayman.

Campaigners are amping up door to door efforts to collect the final signatures and make final appeals to the public about the importance of the proposed referendum and project. There will be a petition table at Hurley's this Saturday from 10am to 2pm and campaigners will continue door to door efforts with MLA Kenneth Bryan on Sunday in George Town Central.

"Given that to date we have yet to see finalised plans, costings, and that the documents government is basing its proposal on themselves raise severe environmental and socio-economic concerns about the project, we urge those in the community that have not yet signed to reach out to us. Our community deserves to decide on this project as it


will have long lasting repercussions on everyone," campaigners said.

Both Nature and Scripture Agree as to What Makes a Family

Article 16(1) of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states that "Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family." Article 16(3) gives further clarity by stating that "the family is the natural and foundational group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State." The structure and context of these statements—in particular the use of the conjunction "and" in 16(1)--constrain us to conclude that marrying and founding a family are organically related, the latter being the consequence of the former. At this juncture we need to recognize that although not all families are based on this ideal of "marry and found a family," the ideal is at the core of what the UDHR advocates. It is therefore severely unhelpful to make the point that there are single parent families, or families where the parents have not been married, because the real issue is that "the family is the natural...unit of society."

When we are thinking of the human family, then, what cannot and must not be disregarded is the word "natural".

The concept of "natural" has always been used to appeal to that which is derived from and evident in the physical and biological realms of creation. Appealing to nature as a basis for understanding the source of family is very logical, whether we are referring to the human family, or a family of lower primates, or even a family of some species of birds, such as geese, which mate for life. In other words, even before society imposed its rituals and other trappings around the human family, what made a family possible was the biological reality of heterosexuality. Reproduction of the species is the basis for family. And, of course, the concept of reproduction extends beyond the actual process of conception and birth, or conception and hatching (as the case may be). The family's task, in reality, has to do with the survival of the species; therefore, even among lower life forms there is evidence of parental care by either or both "parents" (those who contributed the genetic material that produced the offspring).

Persons who appeal to the Bible to defend their views on marriage, family and sexuality are often rebuked for bringing religion into a legal debate. However, one could state with reasonable accuracy that the statement in Genesis 1:27-28 is as much a naturalistic statement as it is a religious one. There is no question that human beings exist and reproduce on the basis of their heterosexuality. The command to "be fruitful and multiply" was based on the fact that "male and female created he them." Consequently, the human family is a natural phenomenon, not a social construct or a religious expression. Various societies may have various concepts about the rights, duties, roles and functions of persons within the human family, but these social constructs are not in fact the family. The family is a natural and biological phenomenon. It is totally unscientific and therefore unreasonable to ignore the naturalistic basis for family and expect that the human family will either survive or thrive. The concept of same-sex marriage is naturalistically and scientifically a functional oxymoron. This is a social construct, rooted in human dysfunctionality and expressed as a declaration of moral autonomy, i.e.,

man is the final arbiter of what is right and wrong because there is no God.

In the final analysis, then, the new sexual ethic which we are all being compelled to honour is neither true to naturalistic materialism-because it dismisses the truths of science-nor true to theism, since it disavows any allegiance to religion-based morality. The only definition of the human family is that which is determined a priori by nature and nature's God. (April 30, Pastor M. Alson Ebanks) 🏵



International Commendation Award for Carolina Ferreira

During the month of March, in celebration of Honoring Women's Day on March 8th, the International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement (IFRC) launched a global competition asking members of its 191 National Societies from around the world to submit nominees to spotlight inspiring women in the areas of leadership and innovation within the Movement. Over 12,500 entries were submitted from across the globe, and 14 women were given a special Commendation Award for their work in their communities. Among them, the Cayman Islands Red Cross' (CIRC) own Deputy Director, Carolina Ferreira, who was the only recipient from the Caribbean Region and one of only two recipients from the entire Americas Region.

"Ms. Ferreira is the true embodiment of the values and principles behind the Red Cross Movement," says CIRC Director Jondo Obi. "She is a relentless advocate for anyone – especially children - who suffer any injustice, and is constantly working towards helping those whose voice needs to be heard. She is a true leader, and one that fights tirelessly for the Cayman Islands community."

While the CIRC coordinated the nomination of Ms. Ferreira, the actual information and support came from outside the organization by members of partner agencies that have worked closely with her over the course of many years.

One such partner is Inspector Kevin Ashworth of the Family Support Unit of the RCIPS and a member of the Protection Starts Here (PSH) group, who characterize Ms. Ferreira as a fearless leader of the group: "She's absolutely relentless in her mission of child protection and advocacy, and in what she's trying to achieve, whether at the Red Cross or as part of the PSH group. She doesn't get put off by any negativity or backs down from a challenge. If she runs into a wall, she'll just climb over it."

Sophia Chandler, Child Psychologist for HSA and a member of the PSH group further details: "Ms. Ferreira has been able to help organize a number of key organizations to come together and do the work that really needs to be done as part of the PSH group. She constantly observes our community – and the world around us, and leading change on a moment by moment basis, to help people and educate the community on important issues".

Other recipients of the IFRC Commendation Awards included volunteers and staff working in war zones, with refugees and orphans, those in countries that have been hit the hardest due to climate change and who are working towards environmental sustainability, and those in some of the most impoverished areas of the world who are providing health and sanitation education to the most vulnerable. Recipients hailed from Yemen, Kenya, Namibia, Pakistan, and South Sudan, among others.

As Deputy Director and Child Protection and Sexuality Education Programme Manager Ms. Ferreira has multiple responsibilities within the CIRC, among them the coordination of the Protection Starts Here (PSH) grassroots multi-agency child abuse prevention project. The PSH project, born out of the HIV and AIDS Peer Education Program which she ran between 2002-2012, has had tremendous impact locally in furthering the

awareness, education, and prevention of child sexual abuse in Cayman.

PSH created a new form of multi-agency partnership as it is prevention focused and NGO led, and its work has been receiving recognition around the world as the group was selected to present at international conferences in Huntsville, Prague and Montego Bay in 2018 alone.

The Cayman Islands Red Cross and the PSH working group have also assisted in furthering child protection measures at other Overseas Territories by helping the Anguilla Red Cross and BVI Red Cross build capacity in the area of awareness and education via the Darkness to Light "Stewards of Children" training

Ms. Ferreira, who celebrated her 20th anniversary with the Cayman Islands Red Cross in 2017, was selected both because of the innovative work that she and the PSH working group have done as well as the leadership qualities that she continues to demonstrate as a coordinator, educator, and advocate for the most vulnerable.

"It is really humbling to receive this type of recognition, especially when you consider the barriers and realities that others in the Movement are facing-like war and starvation- which are so far removed from our reality it is difficult to wrap our heads around it," states Ms. Ferreira. "However, I was truly floored by how much trust and faith the people that I work with have put and continue to put in me. While this isn't comparable to war or other large scale disasters by any means, our work is still difficult work. Dealing with child abuse is heart-breaking, demanding, sensitive and unpopular work, and I'm not even at the frontlines of it. I have been so fortunate on so many fronts: at the CIRC I have a team of people who provide unconditional support and encouragement and with PSH I have found incredible professionals who are equally committed, passionate and far more knowledgeable than me who have come together to work for our children. The work that we have all done and continue to do together, that's what's truly commendable" she adds.

The work and stories of the 14 recipients of the Commendation Awards will be shared by the International Federation of the Red Cross at various events, exhibitions and communications around the world.

Conch/Whelk seasons close on 1 May

The Cayman Islands annual conch and whelk seasons close on Wednesday, 1st May 2019.

Anyone possessing, attempting to sell or attempting to buy locally-caught conch or whelks during the closed seasons, which last from 1 May through to 31 October each year, will face prosecution under the National Conservation Law (NCL).

The open seasons for conch and whelk, which run between 1 November and 30 April, serve as a way for residents and visitors to sustainably harvest them within the limits prescribed in the NCL, and leave enough of both species for future generations to enjoy.

Members of the public are also reminded that lobster season is now closed and will not reopen until 01 December. Anyone caught possessing locally-caught lobster out of season will also face prosecution under the NCL.

"These closed seasons for each species usually coincide with that species annual mating and reproductive season, which is important for us because it gives the species a chance to replen-



ish and increase their numbers," said Environment Minister Hon. Dwayne Seymour.

If anyone sees, or becomes aware of, suspected poaching activity they are asked to call 911. They may also contact DoE enforcement officers directly on Grand Cayman (916-4271) or on Little Cayman (925-0185). Kohler. "Shark Conservation Cayman began tracking this shark three years ago and we've followed its movements since. We are working hard to better understand our local shark population and to conserve them, so it is frustrating to see these crucially important predators being killed for sport or out of spite."

Elasmobranchs, the fish subclass that includes sharks, stingrays and skates, are protected at all times in the Cayman Islands. Fishing for sharks, selling their fins or meat, or deliberately harming a shark is punishable under the National Conservation Law by a substantial fine and forfeiture of the vessel and equipment used in the offence.

"Healthy sharks in a marine ecosystem are a positive sign of healthy coral reefs and robust fish populations," said DoE Manager John Bothwell. "In recent years, we've noted more sharks in the waters around Cayman. That is leading to more interactions with fishermen and an increased number of accidental catch incidents that occur when a shark is attracted by a another struggling fish caught on a line."

The DoE urges people who fish to release accidentally caught sharks by removing the hook or cutting the line. Sharks do not diminish fish populations nor compete with fishermen, but keep fish populations in balance by feeding on weaker, less successful marine specimens and thereby removing them from the breeding stock.

"There must always be a balance struck between the needs of fishers to-day and the need to conserve marine life for future generations," said DoE Director Gina Ebanks-Petrie. "But there's no reason for people to abuse and torture sharks or any other animals that play a crucial role in keeping our underwater ecosystem vibrant and healthy."



Scandal-hit St Lucia Government Minister Resigns

A St Lucia Government Minister embroiled in controversy is now out of Prime Minister Allen Chastanet's Cabinet.

Public Service Minister Dr Ubaldus Raymond, who was allegedly involved in a salacious conversation with a woman, a recording of which went viral on social media earlier this month, has stepped down with immediate effect and Chastanet said he had accepted the resignation "in the best interest of the country".

"Dr Raymond has served our country well and in several capacities including Leader of Government Business in the Senate, and previously as the Minister in the Ministry of Finance. I thank him and his family for his years of service to our nation," he said in a brief statement yesterday.

Earlier this month, the government announced that investigations had been

launched into "recent information being circulated in the public domain surrounding the Minister", and that he had proceeded on leave. It said that after an initial probe, more information had come to light which warranted further investigations by the relevant authorities.

In his statement, Prime Minister Chastanet said his acceptance of Raymond's resignation in no way affects the ongoing investigations.

"The Government remains committed to bringing closure to this matter," he said.

This is not the first scandal involving Raymond. In 2017, two 18-year-old women were charged with blackmail following the leak of nude photos online. In October last year, he said the young women had apologized to him and the case had come to conclusion.

LIAT Staying the Course Despite Financial Challenges, Assures CEO

As shareholders of regional airline LIAT meet today amid concerns that its financial situation could force it out of the skies, the company's chief executive officer has sought to allay fears, declaring that the carrier continues to operate its daily flight schedule despite its challenges.

Julie Reifer-Jones said in a statement yesterday that the Antigua-based airline was committed to connecting the region and had operated all its flights over the peak Easter season with an on-time performance of 80 per cent.

LIAT, which currently operates 491 flights weekly, is also looking forward to a good summer period, with many festivals and events scheduled across the region, she said.

"LIAT is committed to fly, and we are flying to the 15 destinations across the network," Reifer-Jones said.

She also noted there are ongoing discussions with governments on the need for all the territories served by LIAT to contribute through a Minimum Revenue Guarantee model.

Reifer-Jones said that while the pace of these discussions was slower than anticipated, LIAT remains optimistic that the discussions would be concluded shortly.

The CEO added that the company continued to update its restructuring plan "so that LIAT can evolve into a more ef-



ficient and sustainable company serving the region".

And she reiterated the company's commitment to the region, adding that

the improved on-time performance and customer service provided are evidence of the changes taking place in the company.

MOUNTING PRESSURE IN VENEZUELA

Tensions and uncertainty continue to rise in - and about - Venezuela as the self-declared interim president Juan Guiado ramps up his moves to force Nicolas Maduro from office.

But Mr Maduro is refusing to give up power, instead claiming that the attempt to oust him has failed.

The coming days will see the extent to which Guiado's ramping up of his moves against Maduro equates to the actual ramping up of pressure.

He says the current developments are not a coup but a peaceful transition of power.

That might very well be his intention and hope, but the live-stream of violent clashes suggests otherwise.

It's also left to be seen if Maduro's adamant stance is just facade behind which he is trying to mask the unravelling of his presidency.

A series of dramatic events in Venezuela starting on Tuesday have signalled a further escalation of tensions in the oil-rich but dirt-poor south American country.

By late Tuesday the anticipated showdown or even overthrow of Maduro

didn't quite materialise. Nor was there a climbdown by Guiado.

In addition to the stand-off between Guiado and Maduro, each now being backed by splits in the Venezuelan military, this is also a global face-off of immense proportions being played out in Venezuela.

In the Guiado camp are most of the western powers with the United States in the forefront, while on the Maduro side are eastern and communist powers led by Russia

and China with Cuba, Iran and others in

Russia, Cuba and China in particular are heavily invested in Venezuela diplomatically, economically and militarily. Venezuela has the world's largest oil

deposits but has been unable to economically benefit from the potential of that vast resource.

Adding to the drama on Tuesday was a claim by US Secretary of State Mike

others in Pompeo that President Maduro was ready to board a Cuban aircraft to head to exile, possibly in Havana, but was per-

But that has been denied by the Russians who accuse the US of fomenting a revolution in Venezuela.

suaded against it by the Russians.

What were said to be Cuba military vehicles were also seen on the streets of Caracas on Tuesday as forces loyal to President Maduro clashed with

pro-Guiado demonstrators.

Meanwhile, US President
Donald Trump threatened to
slap what he called "the highest level" of sanctions on Cuba
if it continued its military support of the Nicolas Maduro
government.

Crucially, Secretary of State Pompeo had also reported on Tuesday that the Trump administration had not removed the military option from the table in what's seen as a direct reference to Cuba's support for Maduro.

So far, not much has been heard from the Chinese, who are no doubt monitoring the current developments closely, as is the rest of the world.

Just a few weeks ago the US and China got into a spat over US accusations that China was propping the Maduro regime.

But China, Venezuela's largest foreign creditor, hit back at the US for what it called "groundless allegations", saying Washington was attempting to slander Beijing and sow discord between it and Latin American countries.

In yet another twist, a former Venezuelan ambassador to the United Nations said he'd been informed that high-profile Venezuelan opposition politician Leopoldo López who was seen with Guiado on Tuesday morning shortly after being released from house arrest, had gone to the Chilean embassy.

Details are unclear but it was speculated that he had gone to seek asylum.

US-backed Chile is one of 50 countries which supports Guiado's claim to the Venezuelan presidency.

A day characterised by a series of rapidly unfolding dramatic developments, some in the full glare of a global audience as events were live-streamed by major international media, might have only marked the beginning of an end or a new beginning for Venezuela.

Against this backdrop, the coming days will be crucial for Venezuela.

Canada floods worsens from climate change

Canada is experiencing a series of floods which has raised alarm over climate change. Thousands have been evacuated from eastern Canada as Prime Minister Justin Trudeau admits urgent action is necessary to improve climate preparedness.

News footage showed people boating where they once walked, homes and cars filled with muddy water, volunteers searching for lost pets. Thou-

sands of people in have been forced from their homes as heavy rains and meltwater cause unprecedented flood evacuations.

One of the worst-hit areas was a suburb of Montreal suburb where more than 6,000 people were evacuated after a dyke burst on Sunday. Another 3,000 people were evacuated in other parts of Quebec, and in Ontario and New Brunswick, hundreds more are waiting out the floods in hotels and shelters.

"This year's flooding is very extreme," said Ursule Boyer-Villemaire, an associate professor at the Université du Québec à Montréal who specialises in disaster management and climate resilience planning.

Climate change means that catastrophic flooding will only become more common, but experts say the

events of the past week highlight the fact that Canada has still not done enough to prepare for such disasters.

The current mass evacuations have forced Canadian politicians at every level to confront this dramatic evidence of climate change in a federal election year. Mr Trudeau suggested that using federal money to help relocate communities affected by flooding was a possibility.

This is not the first time Quebec has seen large-scale flooding: in 2017, Ouebec rivers reached similar levels. but the floods didn't hit the heavily populated Ottawa-Gatineau region, and far fewer people were evacuated.

The fact that two so-called "hundred-year floods" occurred so close together has climate preparedness experts concerned. 🏵

Honduras introduces emergency contraception

In Honduras, a pioneering grassroots campaign to legalise emergency contraception is launched this week amid continual false claims by church leaders, senior doctors and conservative politicians that the medication causes abortions, infertility and

Honduras is the only country in Latin America where emergency contraception is banned, forcing desperate women, including rape

victims, to buy expensive and unregulated contraband pills on the black market.

Emergency contraception was outlawed in 2009 just weeks after a coup d'état backed by a powerful network of religious, economic and military elites ousted the democratically elected president. Since then, the church has played a significant role in the country's politics.

At the time, senior Catholic and evangelical clergy publicly denounced emergency contraception as an "abortion pill".

This falsehood was repeated by the de facto government's health minister - a medical doctor and former president of the College of Medicine - before he authorised the ban.

Since then, teenage pregnancies have risen to one of the highest rates in the

The six-month campaign, Hablemos lo que es (Call it what it is), which launched on social networks on Thursday, focuses on debunking myths about the dangers of emergency contraception.

The ban in Honduras has disproportionately punished the most vulnerable women and girls, according to Paula Avila-Guillen, director of Latin America Initiatives for the New York-based Women's Equality Centre. "The poorest women, in rural areas, and victims of sexual violence are most affected."

Honduras has one of the highest rates of sexual violence in the world outside an official war zone, with an attack reported every three minutes in 2016.

Abortion is also banned in all circumstances, while sex education in schools is optional, and affordable family planning services are limited. ③

Starving Cuba sets up ostrich farms

Cuba's food shortage is so severe that it is creating African ostrich farms to help meet demand for meat. The shortages of basic products, chronic because of the perennial crisis in the Cuban economy, have sharpened recently because of the ongoing political crisis in Venezuela and cooling relations with Brazil, where Cuba bought most of the chicken consumed on the island.

Guillermo García Frías, a 91-yearold comandante of the Cuban Revolution, is promoting African os-

triches. "The ostrich is imported. It's not native to our country. And this ostrich produces more than a cow," Mr García Frías announced on Cuban television.

He said: "An ostrich lays 60 eggs. From those 60 eggs, our experience is that we get 40 chicks. Those 40 chicks provide four tons of meat after one year, while one cow produces one calf and after a year it's only a yearling."

Cuba is developing seven ostrich farms around the island. Some already have been built in the provinces of Holguín, Santiago de Cuba, Guantánamo, Granma and Havana, and another will soon open in the Isle of Youth, he said.

The first ostriches, of the blue, red and black-necked families, were imported from Mexico in 1997 and were later cross-bred.

Mr García Frías, director of the government-owned National Company for Flora and Fauna, also announced plans to develop cattle production. He added that the island is also breeding crocodiles and that Cubans could also start to eat nutria, native rodents also known as cane rats that have "a level of protein superior to all other meats and a high-quality pelt." The ostrich news has met with widespread mockery and condemnation. 😚

Duterte threatens Canada over garbage

The president of the Philippines was threatening "to declare war" on Canada this week if Prime Minister Justin Trudeau doesn't take care of a big pile of garbage.

Following years calls from environmental groups, anger from local politicians and a Filipino court order, dozens of shipping containers full of Vancouver trash are still sitting in the port of Manila.

Duterte said if it's not gone in a week he will "set sail" himself to dump the trash back on Canadian soil. "We'll declare war against them," he said during a news conference on Tuesday. "I will not allow that kind of s***."

More than 100 containers, shipped to Manila by a private Canadian company, were seized by customs officials in 2013 and 2014. They had been labelled "scrap plastic materials for recycling," but contained household waste, including, allegedly, some toxic

For years, the Philippines complained, and in 2016, a court ordered

that Canada should pay to have the Most recently, President Rodrigo garbage shipped back. Meanwhile the company that shipped it in the first place, Chronic Inc., denied it sent anything other than plastic. The government's understanding is the company no longer exists, and the problem is going to be dealt with bilaterally.

Some of the shipping containers' contents ended up in a local landfill, part of an attempt to have the garbage disposed of in a cheaper, more environmentally friendly way, but most of it remains in the containers. For local authorities, allowing a rich country to get away with just dumping the trash does not make for good optics. 🏵

May's leadership in danger again

Grassroots Conservatives have warned the UK Prime Minister Theresa May she will face a challenge to her leadership at an unprecedented summit in June.

Amid fury over delays to Brexit, local constituency chairman have reached enough support to force an emergency general meeting to discuss Mrs May's premiership and her strategy on leaving the European Union.

She was reportedly notified of the news by the head of the National Conservative Convention, Andrew Sharpe, on Monday, after more than 10 percent of local parties signed a petition calling for her to go.

It comes as the Conservatives were braced for a mauling at the local elections amid warnings they would lose more than 800 seats in Thursday's poll.

A meeting of 800 constituency chairmen and women and senior activists is expected to take place in June.

London East Conservatives chairwoman Dinah Glover, who organised

the petition, said: "I am extremely sad that we have had to organise this. Unfortunately, the prime minister is no longer the solution to the problem but is actually the block to Brexit."

The petition said the signatories "no longer feel that Mrs May is the right person to continue as prime minister to lead us forward in the negotiations".

"We therefore with great reluctance ask that she considers her position and resigns," it adds.

The move is said to be unprecedented in the party's 185-year history and would place huge pressure on Mrs May to step down as party leader. •

Venezuela allows Russian missiles in

Venezuela has seen Russian military personnel flying the country in recent weeks, thought to be sent to ensure the nation's sophisticated S-300 surface-to-air missiles remain a credible deterrent to any US military action against the government of socialist President Nicolas Maduro.

Defence analysts say the Russian military contingent, which reportedly arrived in late March, included air defence specialists with the necessary skills to ensure the decade-old missiles can be kept operational despite Venezuela's crumbling infrastructure and frequent power failures.

The Venezuelan government has displayed the S-300 missiles at military parades. US Defence Department officials confirm their presence in the country, as do former Venezuelan military personnel. But few details have been revealed about their operational status or deployment.

According to defence experts in the region and satellite imagery obtained by

the Israeli company Image Sat, at least four mobile batteries of S-300 missiles have been installed in different parts of Venezuela over recent months to protect key military bases and government centres.

U.S. President Donald Trump has left open the possibility of using force to oust Mr Maduro and has repeatedly called on Venezuela's military to stage a coup in support of US-backed parliamentary leader Juan Guaido. But prospects for an internal army uprising seemed to fade last week when the most senior general to publicly support Mr Guaido, ex-intelligence chief Hugo Carvajal, was arrested on drug charges in Spain where he had gone into hiding. 😚

Durant looks set for Knicks move

Kevin Durant is right now the most outstanding player in the NBA playoffs which is why the Golden State Warriors small forward is gleaning so many

Durant dropped 50 points in the series-clinching game against the Los Angeles Clippers on Friday night and he is averaging 40.2 points. On Sunday, Durant scored 35 points in a 104-100 win over the Houston Rockets, overshadowing the always brilliant James Harden.

The Warriors superstar is looking like he could repeat for a third time as NBA Finals MVP should the Warriors get back there and win. His head coach, Steve Kerr, is already likening his run to that of the best player of all-time.

"There's this guy named Michael something," Kerr joked. "Can't remember his last name. No, but Kevin's run this past week has just been off the charts. I've said it a few times this week. He's the most skilled basketball player on Earth. He's one of the most skilled basketball players to ever play the game. There's never been anybody like him. Six-foot-11, handles the ball, shoots 3s, passes, defends. He's just an unbelievable talent. And I think after we lost Game 2 to the Clippers, I think he just felt like he had to turn it up and lift us up another level. That's exactly what he's done."

Twitter Ads info and privacy Durant explained that he thrives during the playoffs and that he's just doing

everything he can to ensure victory. As for the comparisons, KD doesn't want to focus on that stuff.

"I try not to compare," Durant said. "Each stop along the journey has been -- I've just been tailor-made for the moment, I guess. I learned a lot so far as a player up until this point, so I think I'm starting to put everything together on both sides of the ball. I'm not looking

at points or shots that I get up, just how focused I am for each possession."

Durant's time in Golden State will be interesting over the next few months as expectations are that he'll join the New York Knicks in the offseason.

Basically, people at all levels of the NBA world are convinced that 30-yearold KD is leaving Golden State for Madison Square Garden. The move would fit his psyche as despite his superlative talent, he still feels like a plus-one with the Warriors.

Durant choosing to leave the most accomplished NBA team of the last

decade to play ball for what is arguably the most deeply cursed franchise in sports, especially when there are many better on-court options for him, seems curious. To hear the insiders tell it, it's because the only thing he doesn't have is widespread respect, which he'd theoretically have if he won in front of the scrutiny of the Knicks famously demanding fans.

Durant has neither denied or confirmed the rumours, thanks in part to him appearing to say: "That's why I'm out," after fighting with Draymond Green early in the season. ③

Pollard's exclusion irks Dujon

The West Indies World Cup squad is generating immense debate over who was omitted, particularly Kieron Pollard's exclusion.

Former Windies wicketkeeper Jeffrey Dujon said selectors should have gone with the big-hitting batsman instead of left-handed compatriot Darren Bravo for the upcoming ICC 50over World Cup in England and Wales.

The 31-year-old Trinidadian, who played the most recent of his 101 One-Day International matches

three years ago, has been in good Twenty20 form for Mumbai Indians in the Indian Premier League, smashing 228 runs in his first 12 innings, highest score of 83 and averaging 32.57 with a strike rate of 158.33.ing.

Bravo, 30, who spent two years on the side-lines after disputes with the previous Cricket West Indies administration, only recently returned to the regional team set-up for England's tour of the Caribbean.

During the Test series — which West Indies won 2-1 — the left-hander appeared rusty, averaging only 11.8 in five innings, however, his even 50 on a very challenging pitch was a pivotal knock as the hosts took an unassailable 2-0 lead.

He was more fluent in the ODIs, gathering 133 runs in four innings at 44.33 as West Indies tied the series 2-2.

"I would have gone with Pollard. Based on his form, I don't think Bravo was very convincing the other day — he looked short of cricket," Dujon, 62, said in reference to the West Indies' 15-man

squad for the May 30 to July 14 tournament.

Dujon, a former outstanding wicketkeeper and elegant batsman who played 81 Tests and 169 ODIs between 1981 and 1991, said he would have chosen the control of swing bowler Keemo Paul over the express pace of Oshane Thom-

"Keemo Paul, if fit, should be included. I think Thomas — even though he has pace — for that type of cricket I think he is still a little inexperienced," said Dujon.

Paul, 21, who is also a useful lower-order batsman, was injured during the recent England series, but has since recovered to play in the IPL. In 11 ODIs he has claimed 11 wickets at an average of 45.27 and an economy rate of 5.88.

Thomas, 22, was a standout in the ODI series against the touring Englishmen, snaring nine wickets in four innings, including a career best 5-21. Overall, he has played nine ODIs, accounting for 15 victims at an average of 27.53 and economy rate of 7.22. 😚

Reggae Boyz, warm up with US friendly

Jamaica's Reggae Boyz will have excellent preparation ahead of the 2019 CONCACAF Gold Cup when they meet the United States in what could be called a rematch of the 2017 final in a friendly next month. on June 5 in Washington, DC.

It's at the Audi Field in Washington DC on June 5. Jamaica head coach Theodore Whitmore said: "It's an excellent game to assess the quality of the squad assembled. Further, the timing is good, 12 days before our first game in the tournament and the opponent is perfect. 


