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EDITORIAL

Protecting our turtles

Those tasked with protecting our natural environment have signalled that the turtle nesting season is underway.

From now until around November turtles will be nesting and hatching on beaches across the Cayman Islands. The Department of Environment is urging the public not to interfere with wild turtles, especially adult females, if they are spotted on the beaches, and also not to rake or cover turtle tracks, or tamper with turtle eggs in the nests.

We hope the public heeds this advice, as it is an offence to crush or excavate a nest with a vehicle or machinery, and any vehicle or machinery to be used on the beach must first obtain planning permission.

If anyone finds a turtle nest or track, we encourage you to report it to the DOE's 24-hour hotline 938-NEST (938-6378). This number is used in all three islands.

As they make their way to shore and back out to sea, they can fall victim to poachers looking to make a quick buck on the local delicacy. We remind our



readers that poaching sea turtles is a crime under the National Conservation Law. If anyone becomes aware of such illegal activity, they are asked to please immediately contact 911 or call the DoE's Chief Conservation Officer Mark Orr at 916-4271.

Turtle meat can only be legally purchased from the Cayman Turtle Centre, formerly the Turtle Farm. Doing otherwise would be supporting criminal activity and working counter to measures implemented decades ago to stem the decline of turtles in the wild.

Turtle stew is a local delicacy enjoyed across the Cayman Islands but we encourage our readers to do the right thing and not only say no to poached turtle meat but to report those breaking the law to the DOW hotline we listed above. 😚

Turtle nesting season begins

The Cayman Islands Department of Environment (DoE) is reminding residents and visitors to watch out for sea turtles nesting on our beaches over the next several months.

Although it's only April, DoE scientists have already recorded one nest along Grand Cayman's south coast. The busiest part of turtle nesting season typically runs from May through November each year, with the large adult females clambering

up the beach to lay their eggs between now and September, and hatchlings emerging between July and November.

Members of the public are asked not to interfere with turtles in the wild, especially adult female turtles if they are spotted on the beaches, and also not to rake or cover turtle tracks, or tamper with turtle eggs in the nests. It is an offence to crush or excavate a nest with a vehicle or machinery, and any vehicle or machinery to be used on the beach must first obtain planning permission. Residents should always check with the DoE's Environmental Management Unit (EMU.doe@gov.ky) to clarify if any permissions are required for certain beaches, and whether any nests might be impacted by works on the beach in the turtle nesting season.

"Everyone must do their part in trying to ensure that nesting mother turtles and the baby turtles are not harmed during the nesting season" said Minister for Environment Hon. Dwayne Seymour, as he urged the public to be respectful

and vigilant during the turtle nesting season.

"Baby turtles usually take 50-60 days to hatch from their eggs, so it's important those nesting areas are not disturbed while they are preparing to emerge and that the baby turtles are protected while they make their way to the sea," said Dr. Janice Blumenthal, DoE's research officer in charge of the turtle nesting programme. "While sea turtle nesting numbers have increased, the overall number of female turtles in the population is still extremely low and threats to the population have worsened. The most critical threats are poaching of nesting female turtles and bright lights on the beach that disorient turtles."

The ongoing development of DoE's turtle-friendly lighting programme aims to help reduce turtle disorientations. In recent months, DoE scientists have met with a number of beachfront property owners who are implementing softer, amber-coloured outdoor lighting schemes that do not confuse or draw tur-

> tles away from the beach where they face danger from predation, vehicular traffic and exhaustion.

If anyone finds a turtle nest or track, please report it to the DoE's 24hour hotline 938-NEST (938-6378). This number is also used to report nests to DoE volunteers and staff in Cayman Brac and Little Cayman.

In addition to reporting nests, beachfront property owners and residents can assist by following the DoE's guidelines for making beaches safe for turtles: • Reduce beach lighting: turn off, redirect, or shield any lights that can be seen from the beach during the turtle nesting season (contact DoE for more information). Lights near the beach can lead baby turtles away from the sea and result in their death. Lighting may also deter nesting females from coming ashore.

fore using beach cleaning machines or heavy equipment.

• **Remove obstacles** such as beach chairs and recreational equipment from the beach at night.

• Remain quiet and stay at a distance if you see a nesting turtle. Flashlights, loud noises, or getting too close

• Protect beach vegetation. Vegetation blocks light from buildings, stabilizes the beach, and encourages turtles to nest.

• Do not have bonfires on the beach in the summer — use a designated BBQ pit.

• Do not rake or cover turtle tracks. Department of Environment staff and volunteers use the tracks to find and protect nests.

• Call DoE's Turtle Hotline if you find a turtle track, nest, or baby turtle.

• Remember that sea turtles are protected under Cayman Islands Law and turtle poachers face steep fines and imprisonment. If you see persons harming or taking sea turtles or their eggs call DoE Enforcement (916-4271) or the police (911). 😚

The Cayman Islands Volleyball Federation (CIVF) are gearing up to the NORCECA Beach Volleyball Tournament this week end.

The competition returns to Cayman after a break in 2018, and will take place from 26 to 28 April at Seven Mile Public Beach.

Cayman will be one of the first stops on the 2019 NORCECA tour, and teams

from the USA, Canada and around the region will start their bid to accumulate points in order to qualify for the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo.

"We are so excited to have Cayman back on the NORCECA circuit. This sporting event is popular among the locals and very well attended," said CIVF President Kennedy McGowan. "This is CIVF's 10th year hosting which is a testament to the quality of the event here in Cayman, how well organised it is and the confidence NORCECA has that we will put on a good show. The players and officials know that they will be treated to the Caymankind hospitality for which we're world renown, and that the competition will be fierce, fair and fun. We look forward to welcoming the athletes to our island."

In 2017, the tournament attracted elite athletes from Puerto Rico, Cuba, Guatemala, Trinidad, Nicaragua, United States, Canada, St Kitts and Nevis, Virgin Islands and El Salvador. Cayman entered two female teams and a male team.

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Cayman Athletes: Measured Success at CARIFTA 2019

Now that CARIFTA 2019 has come and gone, the process of evaluation has begun. Already, there are opinions formed in people's minds as to how the games were, and how well our national athletes performed. Most people who attended came away with a positive image of the games themselves. It was exciting action, in a well-organized competition. As for the athletes who represented our beloved isles, it seems that people are putting more thought into their analysis. Although, the prevailing has also been positive, there appears to



be a little more reluctance to declare our team as "successful."

While some people might think that success in track and field is an easily quantifiable figure, I am here to assure you that it is not. In athletics, there are numerous ways to gauge success. Of course, the most commonly used way, especially by individuals from outside the athletics arena looking in, is to look at the number of medals won by each country's team in a competition of this magnitude. For this CARIFTA Games, Jamaica ran away with the most medals as

it has done forty-one times previously. Meanwhile, Cayman ended the three-day competition with a single medal to its credit. To be fair, there was another third-place finish by Cayman (Aijah Lewis in the Under-20 high jump), but that did not count toward the official medal count, because there were only three athletes in the event. However, those facts do not necessarily mean that Cayman had a bad competition.

In track and field, as in swimming, some common measuring sticks are personal times or distances, level of improvement, perfection of technique, and especially personal bests set by individual athletes. For Caymanian athletes, there were quite a number of those markers achieved during these games. Some people would even say that, with the interruption of track usage during the buildup to CARIFTA, for our athletes to even come close to a personal best is admirable. Tyrone Yen, one of our National coaches, said that he was very proud of the athletes. "I think they did their best, and under the circumstances, that is all we could ask of them," he asserted.

Fourteen-year-old Rachel Pascal, competing in the Under-17 Javelin, did win the only official medal for Cayman; a bronze medal in her first CARIFTA Games appearance. Her performance projects a bright future for herself, and for our country. That, along with some of



the other near-misses by Caymanian athletes suggests that athletics in Cayman has a good foundation on which to build; for years to come. With continued hardwork and dedication; and with the strong support from the community; we should see many more medals draped around the necks of our young athletes. 😚

ance, she came up with a personal best throw to garner a bronze medal in the same event that her hero competes in. Her hero is a previous medal winner of CARIFTA hardware, and has since gone on to compete in university, and in the highest-level competitions in the world. He is the Cayman Islands most decorated and successful javelin thrower ever, and the holder of the national record. He is also Rachel's older brother, Alex Pascal.

The future is bright for Rachel and it is evident that the hard work and dedication she has put forth, is starting to pay dividends. She describes it this way, "I feel excited winning my first medal at the CARIFTA games for Cayman. It took a lot of patience, work and pain as most of my training was mainly focused on getting strong and explosive at the gym and in my backyard. The days on the track when I was working on my technique and speed with my brother; coach Williams; Coach Paul when he was here; and coach Tyrone as well; were hard, too." The effort was not just limited to the sport specific aspects of her craft. She adds, "I had to make a lot of sacrifices like spending less time with friends, less entertainment, and eating more healthily. Even my grades at school this term were great as I got a 3.09 GPA."

Although Alex is currently leading the way in the javelin arena, he has never stopped being a strong positive role model, and a great big brother to Rachel. He says, "I am so proud of where my little sister Rachel has come from, as I have been supporting her in every sport since she has been competing at a very young age, like myself. I feel even more proud that she has settled in to do the same sport as me; the javelin throw. It makes me so happy when we are able to train together every day." Of course, he was there when Rachel was called to stand on the podium. "When she won her CARIFTA medal, I was the proudest brother in the world that day."

Behind both siblings, there is also strong familial support. Their father, Richard, himself an internationally experienced and Olympic cyclist, is always there to lend a hand. "I make sure that they keep their self-esteem up and that they love what they do," he says. However, he does much more than that. He serves as a coach, trainer, and motivator for both kids, in addition to his role as a father. He also says, "I don't get upset when they have a bad performance or if they lose. I teach them about failing; and that they should be willing to take risks and to use their failures in a positive way. I try to teach them how to view any setbacks in a positive way as failure is a stepping stone to success, and it depends on how badly you want it."

Now that CARIFTA is over, Rachel has reached an important milestone in her athletic journey. The process will continue, for sure. However, Rachel says that she will take some time to enjoy it. "I will take a short break and try to spend time with my friends and family and do some fun stuff again before something else comes up again lol." Granted, two hours prior to writing this article, I noticed her hard at work at the track, perfecting her javelin technique.

In Cayman, the Pascal family has two star-javelin throwers. The youngest of them, Rachel, is the one who is now stepping onto the scene, and she is poised to follow in her brother's footsteps. The future is bright for her, and by extension, the Cayman Islands. Undoubtedly, we will see more success achieved by her in the international arena. After all, as Alex says, "We both want to take javelin to a different level in Cayman." What a glorious sight that will be to behold. **•**

Carifta: Day 3

It was a thrilling final night of the Carifta 2019 games at the Truman Bodden Sports Complex, with lots of loud cheering, colorful flags waving, and plent of excitement all round as the 600+ athletes from across the region got ready to say goodbye to the Cayman Islands which had been their home for several days.

Cayman's official medal tally for the Carifta games was one bronze medal. It came on Sunday when fourteen-yearold Rachell Pascall won a bronze in the Javelin. She also won a personal best – with a really great throw of 35.5 meters. Cayman's Aijah Lewis took a bronze in the Girls' High Jump event, but later it was ruled by officials that there had not been enough competitors to make it a to the official final medal table.

But there were some near-misses too. On Monday night Cayman's hurdling star, Rasheem Brown narrowly missed getting a bronze in the 110m hurdles. It was a truly thrilling finish, and impossi-

ble to tell the outcome by the unaided eye alone. "I am really pleased," he said.

Overall, Jamaica dominated the games, with more than thirty gold medals and more than 80 in total. On Monday night they seemed particularly decisive in the various relay races, but many of Cayman's rising stars put in very respectable performances too.

In the 3000 m Levi Superville ran strongly and came in fifth overall. "At about 1000 meters to go I think I was ceasing up; I was tired," he said. The 5000m saw another one of Cayman's star runners, Victor Magalaes come in eighth. It had clearly been a hard race for him. Although he started running very strongly, and kept it up for most of the race, it was in the last couple of laps that the strain began to show. But he was determined to give it everything he had: "I tried to finish strong," he said, "but the bell came a bit early for me."

Both Kylie Porter, 15, and Hannah Gibson, 16 shone in the Girls' discus, al-

though both of them felt they had not done their best and hoped to do better in future. "I don't think I did my best but I tried the hardest, in the competition, I feel," Ms Gibson said, "I just did an average performance. I am going to train harder and develop myself and learn how to work out."

In the Girls Under 17 100m Hurdle, 16-year old Danielle Bailey finished sixth with a time of 16.37 seconds. Jamaica's Kay-Lagay Clarke won the race, with a time of 13.68 seconds. But Danielle wasn't disappointed: "I feel pretty good that I could make it, overall," she said.

In the Men's 4x100m relay, Cayman's Errol Smith and teammate Neil Brown each felt differently about their race:

Brown said: a "I feel like I could have done better I could have improved a bit," but Smith said, "I feel like we did our best."

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



Prevent Impulse Eating: Helpful Tips

It's happened to all of us. You know the feeling - you are away from home running errands, or you are out late because you had to stay at work longer. And you realize that you are hungry. Not just a little hungry though. You haven't eaten for hours, your head is starting to throb, and you can't even think straight.

Bottom line: you have to eat. Now!


As you survey your options, you realize that getting some-

thing to eat that is even remotely healthy is going to be nearly impossible. But you have little choice, so you grab a burger or a salad with "grilled chicken." (Do you have any idea how much that piece of 'grilled chicken' has been processed and soaked and manipulated and transformed before it arrives in front of you?) Or a small order of fries just to get you through.

And just like that you have put food into your body that will lower your immune response, raise your blood sugar, reduce your energy and contribute to weight gain.

It is a tough situation, and like I said, we've all been there. Sometimes you really do have to eat 'right now.' But over time, these eating emergencies add up and significantly impact your health and fitness achievement.

Emergency Preparedness

• **Boiled eggs.** Do you like cold, salted boiled eggs? They are a powerhouse of protein. Just be sure to get free range eggs.

• **Sardines.** Yes, you read that right. If you like fish, you can buy small packets of wild caught sardines that travel very well.

• Water. You have to drink water.

The second step seems obvious, but it has to happen if you

are going to eliminate impulse eating: *buy the food on your list*. You have to get it in your house, so you have it when you need it.

The third step is to plan your food kit. This food has to travel with you, and you have to decide how you are going to transport it. The secret is convenience. If you only have five minutes to grab your kit on your way out the door before work, it has to be streamlined. Ideally you will leave yourself more than five minutes, but life happens.

Here are some tips to help you set up your food kit for ease and speed.

• **Small cooler.** Purchase a small cooler that will hold an ice pack and several other things. Keep this in your kitchen so you can grab it on the go.

• Plates, utensils, napkins. Whether you use paper/plastic or your everyday items, get a bag and put a couple of plates, some utensils and some napkins in it. You will use this same bag every time you use your kit, so it becomes a habit. It can be a plastic bag, a cloth bag or a paper bag. It doesn't matter. The point is that you can grab this bag on your way out the door and know that it has what you need in it. • Small storage containers or plastic bags. You need individual containers to put your food in. Don't take the whole package of cheese or the whole bag of chocolate chips, because you will end up eating too much. Put one or two pieces of cheese in a container, and put only 7-8 chocolate chips in a bag. Toss some nuts in one container, some cut up fruit in another. Also, you don't have to prepare everything in advance. In a pinch, you can eat a big bell pepper just like an apple! Just have a plan so you can get it fast when needed. Some things don't have to be separately packaged, such as your nut butter. Just toss the whole jar in the cooler...if you can control yourself.

other did the placebo, with both groups on it for 8 weeks. At the end of the study it was found that waist circumference and triglyceride levels had decreased by more in the group using the seeds.

The answer is to stop having eating emergencies, and I will show you how to do this. It does take some planning, but it isn't as hard as you might think.

The first step is to make a list of healthy, on-the-go foods that you enjoy eating. Make sure that you include things with healthy fats, protein and carbs (if it's around your workout time). When you are very hungry, you need to

have all the macronutrients covered in order to get quick energy, satisfy your hunger and clear your brain fog. This does not have to be a complete meal, but it needs to be balanced enough to substitute for one if needed.

Here are some ideas to help you get started.

• Unsalted nuts. Walnuts, pecans, hazelnuts, almonds, cashews, Brazil nuts. (These will provide protein and good fat)

• Raw Veggies. They are crisp, juicy, cold and sweet and full of the micronutrients your body craves.

• Cheese. If you eat dairy, having a small slice of your favorite cheese will give you a complete protein, a little fat and be very comforting. Remember: the goal is to tame the beast inside you that is calling out for a hotdog from the nearest drive through window. *This is a mental exercise as well as physical!*

• Nut butters. Cashew, almond, peanut...find your favorite. Almond butter is great on a banana; cashew butter is perfect on whole grain crackers. Go ahead and put 7-8 chocolate chips on top if you want. This is a tiny indulgence that will go far to settle your craving. • A tote bag or duffle bag. This bag will be your "picnic basket," so to speak. Stuff everything into it that does not go into the cooler.

• Water bottle. You need something to store a lot of water in.

Now do it

You've done the hard part. You've figured out what foods will make you happy and help you through the emergency, you've stocked up on them, you have gathered what you need for transport and you have your water situation figured out.

All that is left is making it happen. You have to take the food with you when you leave the house. The first few times you do this, it will seem complicated and tedious. But eventually, you will do it with little thought. It will be habit. That is why using the same cooler, the same bags and the same water container every time is so important. You will likely even find you grab the same foods nearly every time it's just easier. And it has to be easy, or you won't do it.

The happy result is that when you are out and realize you are hungry, you will not have to eat food from a restaurant. You will have an assortment of health and energy promoting foods at your fingertips.





Canadian vets need more support

Canada's war in Afghanistan ended five years ago but the price of that effort continues to grow because the number of veterans from the war there receiving federal support for mental-health conditions nearly doubled between March 2014 and March 2018.

The figures are in a report obtained from Veterans Affairs Canada through access-to-information legislation and underscore the enduring toll the war has taken on the mental health of many military members who served there. They also highlight the importance of adequate mental-health services for veterans, which successive federal governments have sought to address over the years with mixed results.

The report was provided to former attorney general Jody Wilson-Raybould in January upon her appointment as veterans-affairs minister, a post she held for only a few weeks before resigning amid the SNC-Lavalin affair. (The SNC-Lavalin affair is an ongoing political scandal in Canada involving allegations of political interference and of possible obstruction of justice by the Prime Minister's Office.)

More than 6,700 military members who served in Afghanistan received disability benefits for mental-health con-

ditions in March 2018 — an increase of nearly 3,200 from the same month in 2014.

In both cases, the clear majority of those receiving benefits for mental conditions were struggling with post-traumatic stress disorder "directly related to their service in Afghanistan," according to the report.

In fact, PTSD was found to have been the top medical diagnosis for Afghan war veterans applying for assistance, as compared to hearing loss and ringing in the ears for service members who had not deployed to Afghanistan.

More than 40,000 Canadians served in the 13-year Afghanistan mission, which began with fighting the Taliban after the 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States and progressed to trying to stabilize and rebuild the war-torn country.

Cubans under more Trump pressure

Cuba is evidently another target for the Trump administration that is trying to crush it from free markets.

White House National Security advisor John Bolton announced new policies to further restrict US travel to Cuba, allow lawsuits against businesses operating there, and reduce the previously unlimited amount of money that Cuban-Americans can send back to their families on the island to \$1,000 per person every three months.

If fully enacted, the policies will crimp the Cuban government's access to foreign exchange, but it will damage Cuba's nascent private sector far more than a ruling regime that has out-lasted six decades of US embargo. Donald Trump is thwarting Cuba's cuentrapropistas—literally, self-employed eliminating their sources of capital and revenue and reducing their influence during the all-important transition to a post-Castro Cuban government.

If fully enacted, the policies will crimp the Cuban government's access to foreign exchange, but in the process, it will damage Cuba's nascent private sector far more than a ruling regime that has out-lasted six decades of US embargo. Trump is pulling the rug out from Cuba's cuentrapropistas—liter-

ally, self-employed—eliminating their sources of capital and revenue and reducing their influence during the all-important transition to a post-Castro Cuban government.

This generation of entrepreneurs are pushing their government for access to wholesale markets and the creation of new corporate laws, offering an organic Cuban alternative to stagnant state-owned enterprise. Bolton and other American hardliners with Cold War mentalities are taking an all or nothing approach. Any policy that might benefit the Cuban economy will benefit the Cuban regime.

Philippines rocked by earthquakes

The Philippines has suffered a second major earthquake after an earlier 6.1-magnitude earthquake that left 11 people dead and 30 still feared trapped in the rubble.

The magnitude 6.3 earthquake with a depth of 53.6 miles was registered on the island of Sumar in central Philippines local time on Tuesday, according to the United States Geological Survey. There was no tsunami warning and no immediate reports of damage.

Tuesday's earthquake follows a large earthquake the previous day which struck near the town of Bodega on the Philippine island of Luzon.

The death toll from Monday's earthquake climbed to 11 on Tuesday, CNN Philippines reported. Around 30 people are still believed to be trapped after a supermarket collapsed in Porac, Pampanga, a province northwest of the capital Manila.

Authorities have put in place a state of calamity, which results in automatic price controls on necessities, and allows local government units to appropriate

measure. The airline said it would allow passengers on affected flights to get a full refund or re-route their flights via Manila.

The Honduran Armed Forces are continuing their annual civil-military programme which started in February with a series of medical brigades in the country's north, central, and western regions. The objective is to provide medical assistance to more than a million Hondurans in need. In mid-March, almost 200,000 people in Francisco Morazán, Atlántida, Yoro, and Lempira departments benefited from the assistance that will last until yearend. Villagers from rural communities received medical as well as gynaecological, dental, ophthalmological, and paediatric services, among others. "Health services are among the Honduran government's top priorities in strategic planning," Honduran Navy Captain José Domingo Meza, director of the Armed Forces' Public Affairs, said. "The Honduran Armed Forces contribute to achieving national objectives through medical brigades." 😚

Honduras soldiers give medical help

The Honduran Armed Forces is providing medical brigades with military resources from each area to assist more patients. Volunteers, civilian doctors, and Secretary of Health personnel also join the humanitarian mission based on location.

Communities lacking health services look forward to the arrival of medical brigades. Adults, children, and the elderly form long lines beginning early in the morning to access the free services. Some make long journeys from remote communities.

The Armed Forces' brigades enable the population to access medical doctors and health professionals of various specialties. They provide free medicine, psychological assistance, and activities to strengthen spiritual and moral values—for children—and make donations of clothes, food, and school supplies.

"The population also receives audiological care and legal services," said Capt. Meza. "At the same time, the brigades conduct other activities, such as public building repairs, haircuts for men, beauty care for women, and educational talks."

Russia blames US over Venezuela

Venezuela seems to be a political pawn between Russia and the United States after Russia accused the US of deliberately causing a succession of crippling power cuts in Venezuela as part of a plot to topple its president, Nicolás Maduro, dubbed "Operation Blackout".

The crisis-stricken South American country has been rocked by a series of nationwide power outrages since March 7, which Mr Maduro's government has blamed on US-backed saboteurs and snipers but most experts attribute to poor maintenance and a bush fire that destroyed a key section of Venezuela's power grid.

However, Russia's deputy defence minister, Alexander Fomin, backed Mr Maduro's version of events. Mr Fomin claimed Washington felt reluctant to launch an outright military operation against Mr Maduro, fearing it "might rally the nation behind the current government" and anger other Latin American governments.

But the US was not a country to "sit idly by", Mr Fomin added. Instead, it was "employing a broad range of techniques" in its effort to remove Mr Maduro, including a "man-made shutdown of Venezuelan energy facilities".

"Operation Blackout is underway," Mr Fomin said. The Russian report was approvingly reproduced by Telesur, Mr

Maduro's main international propaganda outlet.

Russia's claim contradicts widespread consensus among specialists and Mr Maduro's political rivals that Hugo Chávez's authoritarian heir is in fact responsible for an unprecedented electricity crisis that has deprived millions of citizens of light and water.

Three months after the push to unseat Mr Maduro began he remains in power and retains the support of both Russia and China.

Juan Guaidó, the opposition leader who most western nations have recognised as Venezuela's rightful interim president, last week summoned "the largest march in the history of Venezuela" for May 1 in an bid to keep up the pressure at a time when some fear his campaign is fading.

Sri Lanka bomb victims buried

Sri Lanka held its first mass funeral on Tuesday as the country marked a day of mourning for the victims of Sunday's bomb blasts.

The death toll from the attacks on churches and hotels has risen to at least 321 with about 500 wounded, police said.

The country observed three minutes of silence and a state of emergency is in effect to prevent further attacks.

NTJ, the group named by the government as the main suspect, has no history of large-scale attacks but came to prominence last year when it was blamed for damaging Buddhist statues. However, neither NTJ nor any other group has admitted carrying out the bombings.

Durant keeps future under wraps

When Golden State Warriors forward Kevin Durant decides whether he's going to stay in the Bay Area or sign with a new team this summer, you can expect to hear it from him first.

The former MVP announced his decision to join the Warriors in 2016 by tweeting an article he wrote for the Player's Tribune titled 'My Next Chapter' and Durant will make a similar announcement this time around.

Most player signings and trades are usually reported by members of the media, but Durant is doing it his way.

"They need me," Durant said of the media to NBC Sports Bay Area. "If I wasn't a free agent, none of this stuff would go on, right? None of this speculation about who I am, what's wrong with my mental, why I'm miserable, why I ain't happy with life. Nothing." He has been particularly irked with media coverage of his impending free agency and doubled down on those criticisms.

"That's a hot topic," he said. "But you don't have to talk about it. And then you don't have to get mad when I don't want to talk about it. And then you don't have to get mad when your little brain is roaming around, but you can't find the correct answers. That's bad journalism. That's not doing your job well."

As for his actual free agency plans, Durant insists he doesn't know what he will do yet.

NBA free agency doesn't officially open until July 1, so it will be a while until Durant makes his decision public. But the fact that he is selling his Malibu beach front house means he may be looking for a new suitor despite having

Durant is aware of all the rumours that say he's set on signing with the New York Knicks. Most NBA insiders believe he's going to the Big Apple. That belief was strengthened earlier this season when it was reported that his company is moving to a New York City office.

When the Knicks traded Kristaps Porzingis to the Dallas Mavericks to clear salary cap space, many felt it was a sign that the organisation knows Durant is coming. In his first time speaking with the media after the deal was made a few months ago, the reigning NBA Finals MVP was emphatic in saying he's had no communication with New York.





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
