Smiths Cove cleaned on Earth Day

Earth Day every year is Monday 22 April and, to mark this special day, scores of environmentally-minded residents take to the streets of the Cayman Islands to collect up the litter and make our community a better place in which to live. At the same time, dive operators take to our oceans to clean up the reefs. This year was no exception, as people gathered bright and early last Saturday in spots such as the South Sound coastline, Smith Cove and Walkers Road, to collect any rubbish they could find into blue bags ready for garbage collection.

Organised by the Cayman Islands Chamber of Commerce, the annual Earth Day Clean Up has taken place for more than 20 years, with the Chamber urging their members, as well as the rest of the community, to don a pair of gloves, pick up a trash bag, and head out to local parks, beaches, beauty spots and roads and pick up any unsightly and unhygienic rubbish.

Tiger roars again

Tiger Woods winning his fifth Masters is being hailed as the greatest comeback of any sportsman. It puts him ahead of Muhammad Ali's sensational knockout of George Foreman in 1974, Michael Jordan's basketball return after a stint in baseball and Niki Lauda's return to Formula 1 after a horrific fireball crash.

Woods produced a scintillating finish to win the Masters on Sunday and end an 11-year wait to claim a 15th major.

There were raucous celebrations around the 18th green as Woods finished with a two-under-par 70 to win on 13 under, one clear of fellow Americans Dustin Johnson, Xander Schauffele and Brooks Koepka.

Overnight leader Francesco Molinari's hopes sunk with two double bogeys on the back nine and he had to settle for a share of fifth on 11 under.

Woods, written off by many so often as he battled back problems and poor form in recent years, punched the air in delight, a wide smile across his face, before celebrating with his children at the back of the green.

He is now just one behind Jack Nicklaus' record of six wins at Augusta National and three behind his fellow American's overall major tally of 18. When he turned pro, Woods declared he was intent on beating Nicklaus' record and as Woods

Government's finances strong but healthcare costs loom large

Roy McTaggart, Minister of Finance and Economic Development, outlined the Cayman Islands Government's current financial position and its forecasts for the next three years in its 2020 Strategic Policy Statement (SPS), that was tabled in the Legislative Assembly last Friday.

Minister McTaggart said that Government was compliant with the principles of responsible financial management and was achieving substantial surpluses each year. In addition, he said there would be no new fees or taxes levied on the public and Government would not be undertaking any new borrowings during the next three years.

"As with the last SPS, the Government has made the decision not to seek to introduce any new coercive revenue measures in the medium term in an effort to keep the tax

EDITORIAL

Is it Full Steam ahead, Mr Premier?

If anyone thought that Premier Alden McLaughlin was winding down during his last two years in office, they would be mistaken.

In his delivery of his Strategic Policy Statement on Friday afternoon, the leader of the Unity Government made it clear that rather than winding down, he will be ramping-up delivery as the Government looks to push on further to achieve even more for the people.

Known for his aggressive nature towards the delivery and execution of Capital projects, we envision a leader who means what he says and says what he means.

"The new cruise and enhanced cargo port when built – and it will be built," says the Premier, "Will secure our vital cruise industry for decades and create jobs and business opportunities for Caymanians. It will also enable the country to develop needed cargo handling capacity that means we can import the goods we need to serve an increasing population; potentially at lower prices".

It is clear that the Premier and the Government are passionate about moving ahead with the Port Project and we expect to see the plans in the near future.

We encourage the Premier and Government to also stick by their promise to achieve full Caymanian employment. We remember, not so long ago in the 1980's when there was zero Caymanian unemployment, even though a considerable number of expatriate workers arrived to fill the employment gaps in an evolving Financial Industry.

"The facts tell us that we are well on our way to delivering on that key pledge," the Premier added. "As I stated earlier, Caymanian unemployment has better than halved from its peak and now stands at 4.6% and we will

continue to work to create more opportunities."

"Behind that headline statistic, Mr. Speaker," he stated, "lies increased prosperity for a huge number of Caymanians and their families. Overall, some 3,300 more Caymanians are employed now than prior to my Government taking office in 2013. For those who persist in doubting whether this Government's economic strategy is really benefitting Caymanians, I will just repeat that Mr. Speaker - 3,300 more Caymanians are in work now than when my Government took office in 2013."

The 16,000-word presentation has painted a glowing picture for the Cayman Islands, and we wish the Premier well with his aspirations.

However, we will remind him to listen to the local community to ascertain whether they are sailing on the same ship which will experience rough seas in the next 2 years as the world navigates its many challenges.

The Cayman Islands do not exist in a vacuum and we are certain that our relationship with the United Kingdom and close financial ties to the United States of America will place cross winds in the sails of the good ship Cayman as we steam ahead. 🌊

CPR Cayman receives 82% of required signatures

Cruise Port Referendum Cayman ('CPR Cayman') has announced that 82% of the required signatures for the people-initiated referendum on the proposed cruise berthing facility have been collected and internally verified. In accordance with Section 70 of the Constitution, the '25% of the electorate' threshold is to ensure that referendums are not called for spurious reasons or those with interest to only a small number of people, which is evidently not the case in this instance. They fully expect the petition to exceed the number required, 5,288 verified signatures, in a matter of weeks. Volunteers remain dedicated to the collection of signatures on the class 2 petition and giving the opportunity for the public to make an informed decision.

Verified signature numbers, along with polling conducted by some politicians to survey their constituencies, should be sufficient to cause the government to question their continued course of action. They indicated that Government too should be cautious in signing any binding contracts or contracts with penalty, until after the referendum result so as to prevent misrepresentation to international corporations as well as

avoiding paying contract breach penalties with public funds.

They are encouraging those who have not yet signed the petition to come out this week to petition signings at Four Winds Esso on Wednesday from 4 to 7pm and on Saturday from 10am to 12pm at Hurley's. Petition booklets are also available at the following businesses around Cayman: Rubis Savannah, Four Winds Esso & Hell Gas Station in West Bay, Foster's Food Fair Strand, Silhouette in Camana Bay and Pure Art and Cathy Church Photo Centre in George Town. Registered voters who wish to have the petition brought to them, at home or at work, can call 327-5411.

Those wishing to assist petition efforts as 'Ambassadors' are asked to call 328-8187 or email cprcayman@gmail.com for a petition sheet and FAQ Summary.

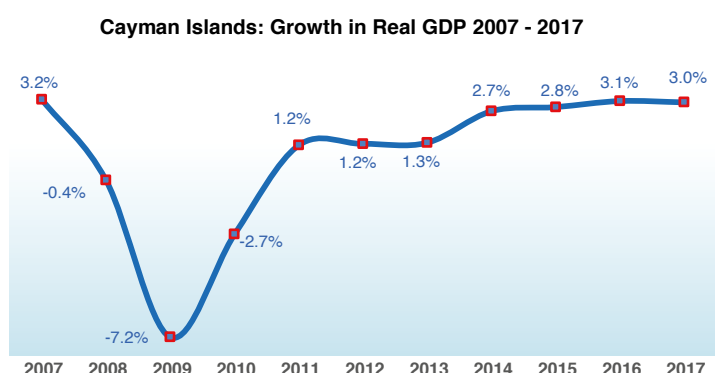

burden, cost of living and the cost of doing business as low as possible," he confirmed. "This will build confidence and give certainty to the private sector to continue making investments that will stimulate economic activity and employment opportunities."

It is expected that economic growth (Gross Domestic Product - GDP) will have peaked in 2018 and it's expected to grow by 2.2% in 2020; 2.1% in 2021; and 2.0% in 2022.

"These forecasts are underpinned by the assumption that the three key sectors of the Cayman Islands economy: Financial Services; Tourism; and Business Services will all continue to evolve and maintain their global competitiveness," the Minister said.

Duty reductions stay

To help manage the impact of inflation, Government had decided to leave in place import duty reductions implemented in the last administration, including reduced import duty of 25 cents per gallon on fuel used by CUC for electricity generation; 20 per cent import duty for licensed traders on consumer goods for retail sale; and 15 per cent import duty on building materials.

The SPS forecast that the Government's revenues would be approximately \$829.1 million in 2020; \$851.0 million in 2021 and \$836.9 million in 2022. Core Government Operating Expenses were forecast to be \$734.2 mil-

lion in 2020; \$741.7 million in 2021; and \$746.8 million in 2022.

Capital investment

Minister McTaggart outlined planned public sector capital investments that were forecast to total \$383.4 million, spread over the three years, as follows: \$177.7 million in 2020; \$126.4 million in 2021; and \$79.3 million 2022.

Such investments would fund debt servicing obligations and operations of statutory authorities and Government companies as well as the development of key infrastructure, such as: completion of the new John Gray High School and upgrades to other key school infrastructure; addressing major traffic issues from eastern districts by extending the East-West Arterial and other key upgrades to the road network; remediation of the George Town landfill and implementation of the integrated solid waste management system; and construction of a long term residential mental health facility.

The SPS went on to discuss Government's liabilities when it came to the provision of pensions for public servants, as well as post-retirement healthcare costs.

Pensions payable for now

It is a requirement that the Government's pension liabilities be revalued annually in order to present the fair value of the fund balances. Government employed actuaries to do this annual fair value assessment. The SPS showed the result of the 2017 actuarial valuation was a net liability of \$420.3 million. The Government had included \$15.4 million annually throughout the SPS period towards reducing the net liability and presently, the Public Service Pensions Board was able to fund all of the monthly pension benefits from its existing resources, and with the regular receipt of monthly pensions contributions from core Government and other participating public sector entities. This was expected to remain the position over the forecast period, the SPS said.

Healthcare costs huge

As far as post-retirement healthcare liability was concerned, the SPS stated the Government acknowledged its obligations for the future healthcare costs of civil servants (including their dependents) and other parties.

The SPS said the results of healthcare liability actuarial valuation, completed in March 2018, estimated the post-retirement healthcare obligation as at 31 December 2017 to be \$1.6 billion with the post-retirement medical expense totaling \$240.5 million for the 18-month period ended 31 December 2017.

The post-retirement healthcare obligation and related expenditure had not been formally recognised in the Statements of Financial Position and Performance. The Government was on a "pay-as-you-go" plan in respect of post-retirement healthcare liabilities. The SPS said, currently, no long-term assets had been set aside off-balance sheet in respect of the Government's post-retirement healthcare liability.

Two New Puppies as Residents for The Pines Retirement Home

It was National Pets Day in the U.S. 11th April, and The Pines Retirement Home Manager thought it was a good time to introduce their two newest residents to the public, "It shouldn't come as a surprise that dogs offer humans emotional solace. They've been living with humans for centuries and they've developed a deep sense of understanding of human forms of communication.

Approximately 5 years ago, Mrs. Carol Hay and Mrs. Lynda Mitchell thought about emotional support dogs for The Pines residents. Emotional Support Animals (ESA) are animals that provide therapeutic benefits to their owner through affection and companionship. Research shows that such animals have much to offer to humans' mental and emotional wellbeing.

Georgia and Bella Pines are two Shih Tzu non-hypo- allergenic puppies and the residents are thoroughly enjoying them. The McTaggart Family, Roy, Bill, Chris and Arthur, donated the funds to purchase the puppies from a local breeder.

Explaining exactly what happened, Mr. Roy McTaggart said: "A few months ago I was approached by one of the Directors from the Pines Board who said they were looking to add two dogs for the residents here; to raise the funds for them. My mom has been a resident here for two years and she is just absolutely crazy about animals. We always bring our dogs to visit with her when we come. So, when I was asked I didn't hesitate to say: 'Look, I know my brothers and I would love to do this.'" Mrs. McTaggart,

pictured holding Bella, said "I'm thrilled to have the dogs here. Aimee McKie from Must Love Dogs said: "We are offering all the nutrition for Georgie and Bella so they will have all their food for life. We are also providing their beds, their treats, their toys; all the gear that comes with having a puppy."

Mrs. Mitchell said "Animal-Assisted Therapy (AAT) was discovered by Boris Levinson, a psychologist who back in the 1950s discovered purely by accident that his dog Jingles was able to engage an autistic child in a way that humans were not.

Since the late 1970s, the Delta Society, an Australia based charity, has been the most recognized name in the field of AAT, and dogs are the most frequently used therapy animals.

Mrs. Mitchell said "We are so grateful to The McTaggart Family (Roy, William, Chris and Arthur) who donated the funds to purchase the puppies as well as Ms. Brenda Bush (Island Veterinary Services), Aimee McKie (Must Love Dogs), Heidi Suarez (Trainer at Must Love Dogs), and Barry Bodden (Animal

House) all of whom will provide goods and services to Georgie and Bella for life. And the George Town Primary School Year 2 Students and their Teachers who named the puppies, and certainly our most humble gratitude to Ms. Carol Hay for her continued support of The Pines Retirement Home and its residents, and Mrs. Elisabeth Roper, wife of His Excellency the Governor." The puppies are very happy here.

Gender Affairs Unit staffer in the Ministry of Community Affairs Karlene Bramwell has been named as the 2019 Wendy Quinland Award recipient.

The award, named in honour of the former East End women's rights activist, is given annually by the Family Resource Centre (FRC).

The Senior Policy Analyst was given the accolade at the Honouring Women Month (HWM) reception at Government House earlier this month, following the success of this year's observance in March.

The Deputy Governor, Hon. Franz Manderson, MBE, was in attendance and expressed how delighted he was to witness this example of cross-departmental fellowship.

On presenting the award, the FRC's Programme Coordinator Charmaine Miller said: "Karlene went over and beyond with assisting on the planning of the Honouring Women Month luncheon by ensuring that the relevant stakeholders who had a vested interest in advancing gender equality shared their input and perspective on this year's observance."

Mrs. Miller added: "She also assisted in participating in various radio interviews and promoting the many events planned through various mediums in order to ensure the events were a success."

Speaking about her award, Ms Bramwell said: "I was shocked and genuinely surprised at being presented with this award; however I am most humbled and honoured to be given this award in this 20th year anniversary of HWM."

"I knew Wendy as a Community Development Officer, and personally," she added.

Portable Generator Safety

Tips to ensure a safe Easter Weekend camping experience



TIP 1 Generators give off deadly carbon monoxide. Place generators at least 15 feet away from tents. Point the exhaust away from tents.



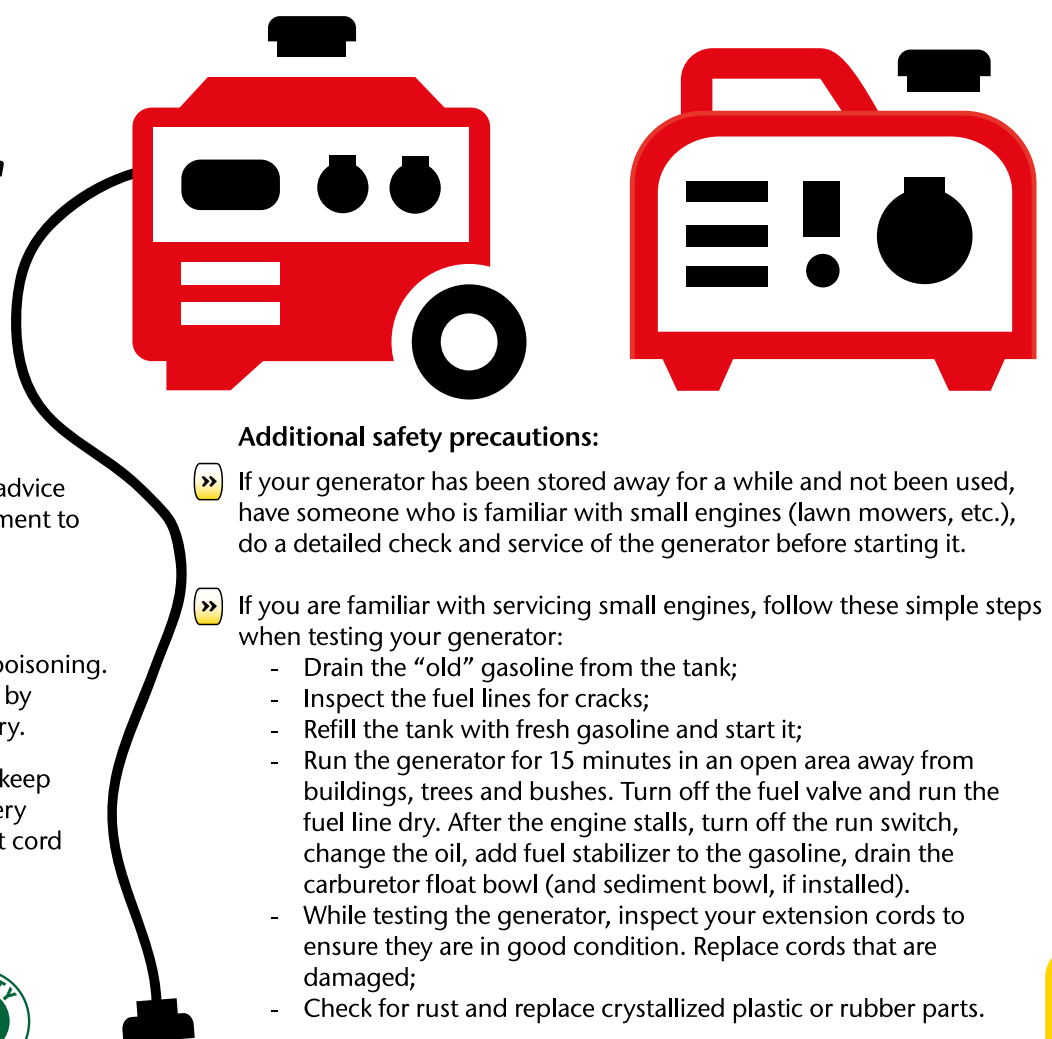
TIP 2 Protect the generator by operating it under an open, canopy-like structure on a dry surface where water cannot form puddles or drain under it.



TIP 3 Keep children and pets away from portable generators. Many generator components are hot enough to burn you during operation.

Camping is an Easter Weekend tradition in the Cayman Islands and the use of portable generators to power electronic devices at camp sites has significantly increased over the years. CUC wants to ensure that campers are fully aware of the dangers associated with running portable generators and stresses the importance of taking every precaution when using generators to ensure a safe, fun and memorable camping experience is achieved. Here are some other tips to follow before operating generators:

- » Always read the manufacturer's manual to ensure proper use.
- » If you are using a portable generator for the first time, obtain advice from a qualified electrician on the safe operation of the equipment to prevent fires and electrical shocks.
- » It is recommend that you place the generator *outside* in a well-ventilated area away from your tents to avoid the carbon monoxide fumes from the exhaust, which could cause lethal poisoning. Protect the generator from direct exposure to rain or moisture by placing it under a canopy or makeshift cover. Always keep it dry.
- » Never refuel a generator while it is running or hot and always keep open flames away from the generator. Use a flashlight or battery lantern when refuelling at night. Unplug the generator output cord before starting it.



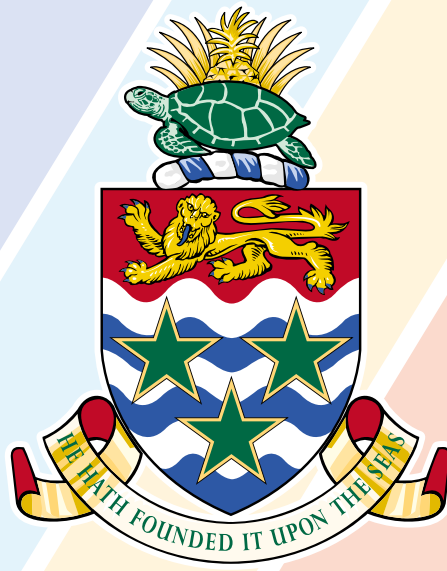
Additional safety precautions:

- » If your generator has been stored away for a while and not been used, have someone who is familiar with small engines (lawn mowers, etc.), do a detailed check and service of the generator before starting it.
- » If you are familiar with servicing small engines, follow these simple steps when testing your generator:
 - Drain the "old" gasoline from the tank;
 - Inspect the fuel lines for cracks;
 - Refill the tank with fresh gasoline and start it;
 - Run the generator for 15 minutes in an open area away from buildings, trees and bushes. Turn off the fuel valve and run the fuel line dry. After the engine stalls, turn off the run switch, change the oil, add fuel stabilizer to the gasoline, drain the carburetor float bowl (and sediment bowl, if installed).
 - While testing the generator, inspect your extension cords to ensure they are in good condition. Replace cords that are damaged;
 - Check for rust and replace crystallized plastic or rubber parts.

LA Highlights - Government Bench

Creative approach needed to deal with traffic

Minister of Commerce, Planning and Infrastructure, Joey Hew, discussed how the National Roads Authority (NRA) had adopted a 'Complete Streets' standard for future roads in Cayman. This means all new roads will be built for all road users, designed for safe access by pedestrians, cyclists, motorists and transit passengers of all ages and abilities.

Minister Hew said Cayman needed to adopt alternative means of mass transportation. Some ideas that Government was considering included: hop on/hop off buses along Seven Mile Beach and into George Town; airport park and rides; downtown park and rides; water taxis and regular airport express buses to and from the airport to hotels. All these and more were being discussed by his Ministry, the Transport Ministry and the Public Transport Unit.



The DCI and Customs were currently cracking down on unlicensed dealers importing such vehicles, the Minister confirmed.

Clamp down on unlicensed car dealers

Minister Hew said that there was currently a clamp down being carried out on the growing trend of people importing second hand cars from Japan and then selling them in Cayman as a business from the side of the road. Government needed to support authorised car dealers in Cayman because they played a vital role in the quality and safety of cars being imported.

The Department of Commerce and Investment (DCI), the Public Lands Commission and the NRA were currently working together to deal with the issue of cars being sold on the side of the road.



Government on target with electric cars target

Discussions are currently underway to offer incentives for people looking to buy electric or hybrid cars and low cc or electric motorbikes, Minister Hew revealed. The National Energy Policy, which runs from 2017 to 2037, has a target of Government converting seven to 10 per cent of its fleet of cars to electric or hybrid within the first five years of the Policy. Minister Hew said that Government was well on the way to reach that target and had begun integrating these types of vehicles into its fleet. Government had also begun installing charging stations for such vehicles around Government buildings.

Minister Hew acknowledged at some point that Cayman would run out of roads and that we were too close to the water table to create underpasses, suggesting that the only alternative was to build overpasses in the future.

Numbers of imported cars need to be cut

Christopher Saunders, Elected Member for Bodden Town West, put some statistics before the House that showed that the number of imported second hand cars had risen disproportionately to the increase in population, from 2010 to 2017. Quoting statistics from the Compendium of Statistics, he said that there were 22,159 vehicles imported from 2010 to 2017, out of which 18,909 were cars. Over the same timeframe, the population grew from 55,036 to 63,415 people. Even though the population only grew by 8,379 people, there were 18,909 second hand cars and that was a problem, he said. In 2010 there were 1,579 cars imported, 54 per cent of which, or 859, were new vehicles. In 2017 there were 3,500 cars imported, of which 710 or 20 per cent were new vehicles. These are serious numbers, he said.

Check out plancayman.ky

In order to see how Government was contemplating dealing with infrastructure development, Mr Saunders encouraged the House and the general public to visit plancayman.ky. At present Government was updating the 1997 Development Plan which was a 108-page document. Acknowledging it was a long read, he never-the-less encouraged all members of the House to take the time to read the Plan and said that he was willing to work with the Director of Planning to see if a presentation could be put together, to give



Members an update on Government's progress. Mr Saunders said development was not an issue with which Government could play politics.

Cutting congestion - politicians need to step up

Looking specifically at the issue of traffic congestion, Mr Saunders said that roads were much quieter when schools were out. Government should therefore assess the times at which schools started and finished to see if this could be a way to ease congestion. He also talked about the possibility of Government departments which were not public facing being located out of George Town to ease pressure on the nation's capital.

Mr Saunders finished his presentation to the House by stating that politicians needed to do a better job in planning and, as political leaders, they ought to care less about whether a move was going to be unpopular and more on whether the move was for the right thing. He said when they knew something was right, they needed to buckle up and sell it to the masses via a roadshow. What they couldn't do was kick the can down the road and that was exactly what they were doing, he said.

With regard to the issue of imported cars, Mr Saunders said he couldn't blame politicians' hesitancy in restricting the numbers of imported cars because of Cayman's inadequate transport system. But he felt that by making it easy for people to import cars, it meant there was less demand for buses. He believed that one solution was to prevent people on six month permits from importing cars, suggesting they might lease them instead. He said Cayman could not continue on its present trend with importing second hand cars, but it was not an easy balance.

Chamber CEO, Wil Pineau, said: "We are incredibly lucky to live in one of the most beautiful places in the world, so it's important that we keep our picturesque landscapes and beaches clean and safe for everyone."

Mr Pineau continued that litter had become a major problem for the Islands, and it was only getting worse.

"Last year our volunteers collected thousands of bags of trash, including things like broken glass, syringes, car parts, and much more," he confirmed. "The Department of Environmental Health and various community groups work tirelessly to keep these Islands clean, but there are people living in Cayman that do not respect the environment, and as a result there are still reports of illegal dumpsites scattered across the Islands."

Earth Day came about almost 50 years ago when, on 22 April, 1970, millions of

people took to the streets to protest the negative impacts of 150 years of industrial development. In the United States, they created the Environmental Protection Agency and passed laws such as the Clean Water Act and the Endangered Species Act as a result of the action. The protest turned into an annual event on the 22 April, when as many as a billion people around the world march, sign petitions, meet with their elected officials, plant trees, and clean up their towns and roads.

Earth Day, run by the Earth Day Network, has a theme each year, and for 2019 their theme is Protect Our Species. The Earth Day Network is placing a particular importance on highlighting endangered and threatened species, such as bees, coral reefs, elephants, giraffes, insects and whales. With coral reefs playing such a vital role within Cayman's natural environment, this is a particularly important day for the Cayman Islands. 🌍

Police Issue Advice to the Public After 7 DUI Arrests Made recently

Two weekends ago, 5 - 7 April, RCIPS officers arrested 7 persons on suspicion of DUI as a result of ongoing traffic enforcement efforts. Two of the persons arrested had a blood alcohol content of over twice the legal limit, and all of those arrested, if convicted, face the prospect of losing their license for at least a year.

Five of the arrests followed large events on Saturday night, 6 April, as drivers were stopped and breathalyzed after having left the events.

Acting Inspector Everton Spence, who oversees the Traffic and Roads Policing Unit, stresses that these drivers could have avoided being arrested if they had simply planned ahead.

"It is essential to make arrangements when attending events where you expect to be drinking," said In-

spector Spence, "If you are unable to co-ordinate with others attending the event in order to arrange a designated driver, taxis are also available. Our anti-drunk driving enforcement efforts are ongoing and consistent. So every time you choose to drink without taking the simple step of making a plan for your transportation, you not only run the risk of causing a collision, but of losing your license for a year."

stormed to 14 majors by the age of 32 it looked like a certainty.

But then he hit the skids. A messy divorce, long-term injury and necessity of tweaking his swing to accommodate a now fragile body, meant he struggled for years to even make the cut. But recent form indicated he was back to the formidable champ of old.

It caps a remarkable resurgence for Woods, who missed the 2016 and 2017 Masters with his back problems, finally undergoing back fusion surgery in April of that year.

A superb 2018 followed where he challenged at The Open before finishing joint sixth and pushed eventual champion Koepka close at the US PGA Championship.

He then capped off the season by winning the Tour Championship, his 80th PGA Tour title and this victory puts him one behind the record of 82 held by Sam Snead.

Woods is one of the world's richest sportsmen, worth around \$700 million. For winning the Masters he banked \$1.98m. In contrast, Woods earned \$63,663 for finishing 32nd at Augusta 12 months ago. He has taken home over

\$110m in on-course winnings but most of his earnings have come through commercial deals and endorsements.

The golfing industry talks about the "Tiger effect" which means everyone benefits commercially when he is successful on the course. TV viewing ratings surge exponentially which means adver-

tising rates increase, course attendances escalate, merchandise and memorabilia revenue rockets and even prize money goes up because of all those factors. No wonder his fellow golfers, many of whom dislike Woods intensely because of his lack of humility, aloofness and arrogance in his prime, are waxing lyrical about "how pleased" they are to see him back at the pinnacle.

At his peak in the late 2000s, Woods made \$100m per year away from the course. He has been with Nike since turning professional and in 2013 he signed a \$200m contract to continue his affiliation with the global sports brand. He has a home in Florida and enjoys vacations in the Caribbean on his private yacht and has been known to visit incognito in the Cayman Islands. 🌐

Harden turbo charges Rockets again

James Harden has been in such sensational form in the NBA regular season, he is the outstanding candidate to hold on the MVP which he won last year. He's held the league's scoring title and been the main reason why the Houston Rockets are playing Utah Jazz in the play-offs this week.

The other MVP candidates are Giannis Antetokounmpo (Milwaukee Bucks), Stephen Curry (Golden State Warriors), Paul George (Oklahoma City Thunder) and Nikola Jokic (Denver Nuggets).

Harden's scoring ability is no doubt, but in recent seasons he has become more of a leader. He isn't just a guy who is benefiting from having veteran players around — he is one of those players now and helping his teammates.

He understands the role of every guy on his team now. He says more on the

court and in practices, talks to his teammates. They feed off each other and it shows.

The chemistry is better because the communication is better. When your best player is communicating well, the team is going to be in a good place.

He speaks with authority about his preparation, about his team, about his goals in a way he didn't before. The Rockets have a lot of veterans. They have a lot of guys who have played a lot of playoff series. From Chris Paul to P.J. Tucker to Nenê, the locker room is full of wisdom and experience.

The 29-year-old Californian has a lot to add to that now. "I've learned to be more even-keeled," he said about what the past few years in the postseason have taught him. "We have to be confident, keep that up as we go along." 🌐

10-year-old reaches for the Sky

A 10-year-old girl skateboarder is so good that she hopes to become Britain's youngest ever Olympian at the Tokyo Games next year.

Sky Brown won gold at her first national competition with victory in the women's park at the UK Skateboard Championships in Salford.

Brown scored 308 points to secure the title on Sunday. Amy Ram took silver with 275 and Rebecca Davies won bronze on 260. The event, which features more than 140 of the UK's best skateboarders, counts towards qualification for Tokyo 2020. "I was a little nervous, but it was really fun," Brown said.

"I just wish I could have done even better." She was born on 12 July 2008.

Skateboarding will be included in the Olympic programme in 2020 for the first time.

Brown's father said his daughter, who spends much of the year in the US, will return to the UK in May to compete in the National Surfing Championships in Cornwall.

"I am going to try and do surfing for the Olympics as well because I just love them both so much," little Sky added. "I feel like skateboarding and surfing are my happy place." 🌐

Pollard hopes for recall

West Indies interim head coach Richard Pybus has, as expected, been sacked after only three months in charge and been moved to another role. Pybus has returned to his role as high-performance director.

The 54-year-old Englishman, who was appointed in January, oversaw West In-

dies' 2-1 Test series victory over England in February and was due to lead them at the World Cup in England and Wales.

Former West Indies batsman Floyd Reifer takes over as interim coach for the World Cup starting on May 30. The 46-year-old Barbadian played six Tests between 1997 and 2009. He was ap-

pointed following a Cricket West Indies board meeting.

"It is a true privilege to be appointed to this position," he said. "I want to help restore pride to our fans here in the Caribbean and around the world. We're here to win, not just compete."

The board said Reifer's appointment was part of a "plan to increase the utilisation of regional technical expertise and build international experience for Caribbean coaches".

West Indies start their World Cup campaign against Pakistan at Trent Bridge on May 31.

Director of cricket Jimmy Adams said the board will start a recruitment process "for the best available West Indian head coach" following India's tour of the Caribbean in July and August.

Ricky Skerritt replaced Dave Cameron as CWI president following a vote in March.

Cameron was criticised over his appointment of Pybus in January, with former captain Darren Sammy saying Pybus made a "mess" in his previous role as director of cricket.

West Indies' Test series win was their first over England since 2009. They drew the one-day series 2-2 and lost the Twenty20 series 3-0.

The change of regime means excluded senior player like Kieron Pollard have renewed hope of a recall. He last played a one-day international in October 2016 but may still have hopes of making it to the World Cup squad.

After smashing his highest Indian Premier League score - 83 off 31 balls - to help Mumbai Indians edge Kings XI Punjab in a last-ball finish in Mumbai last week, Pollard was asked if he thought he would be picked in the World Cup squad that will be announced later this month.

"Every time I get the opportunity to play, I want to do my best," Pollard said. "There has been a lot of turmoil in West Indies cricket over the last couple of years. We have seen in the last couple of weeks there's a change. Pollard was one of the guys blacklisted. The most I can do every time I step on the cricket field is to try to put runs on the board. There're people there who have the job to select and whatever and let's see how that goes. I'm 31, Chris Gayle is still playing, he's 39, and he's whacking it all around." 🌐
