

Annual Storyboard Competition Inspires Readers

The annual Storyboard Competition is now open, and organisers are looking forward to seeing the creativity of Cayman's younger readers on display, and inviting the public to come out and support the students. An initiative spearheaded by the Cayman Islands Information Professionals (CIIP) and sponsored by the Cayman Islands Public Library Service and Rotary Sunrise, the competition gives students the opportunity to share their favourite books through a storyboard display. All storyboards must be registered and delivered to George Town Public Library by 2pm on Monday, 18 February 2019, and the exhibition, judging and prize-giving ceremony will take place at George Town Public Library on Saturday, 23 February 2019 starting at 10am.

The storyboards will be judged on guidelines that include plot summary, issues of conflict, the author's purpose, tone and mood and how that information is expressed in terms of clarity, creativity, thoroughness, interest invoked and quality. Winners will

be chosen in six age divisions ranging from five to 18-years old and awarded various prizes.

"Every year we continue to be impressed by the quality of work submitted and the creativity of our exhibitors. It is obvious that the books that they choose to do their storybooks about have impacted them on a deep level, and they are excited about sharing these works with others," said Paul Robinson, CIIP Chairman and Acting Director of the Public Library Service. "I want to encourage members of the public to come out and see these storyboard displays. They will not be disappointed and perhaps they will rediscover some literary classics or be inspired to read some of the books that are being promoted by the students."

All of the schools are invited to participate. Last year there were 49 storyboards from 65 competitors.

The Fuegos' Ashlyn Evans used her experience and speed to keep the Stingrays' defence at bay for much of the game as she scored a hat trick on the way to a comfortable 4-0 win. Rio Windsor grabbed the other goal for the Fuegos.

The Stingrays were physically outmatched but their forwards, led by Olivia Thorpe, caused more than a few concerns for the Fuegos' rear guard. A number of key saves by the Fuegos' goal keeper kept the Stingrays off the score sheet.

Do THIS for Faster results

The time that you spend on exercise can be used even more effectively for faster results.

When you decide which exercises to include in your routine, it is important to consider the type of movement involved. The simpler the movement, the fewer calories you'll burn and the fewer muscles you will strengthen. On the other hand, the more complex the movement, the more calories you will burn and the more muscles you will strengthen.

To put it simply, exercises that use complex movements will deliver better results than exercises that use only simple movements. Complex movements recruit multiple muscles, some to stabilize and others to perform the movement. This process keeps your heart rate higher than a simple exercise would, giving you a more intense workout.

PLYOMETRICS

It's been around for a long time. Users have seen marvellous benefits but is only now getting to the forefront of healthy living. You don't need to be a professional athlete or collegiate to experience the fantastic benefits of this powerhouse activity. Anyone can perform these exercises in order to obtain the benefits they provide. A plyometric workout is for everyone and so are the benefits.

Enhances strength and speed -Plyo greatly enhances your strength and speed for daily living. It helps with muscle power in the arms and legs. This is due to the higher rate of force development. The activity spurs a physical response from the neurological system that changes the elastic capability of the muscles. As a result your muscles are able to expand and contract rapidly. Applying the proper force occurs with bursting movements as pushing and jumping. **Increases endurance** - Apart from the muscular benefits, plyometrics have a great impact on your endurance. This teaches the body to produce more force while spending less energy to do so. This saved energy can be spent at the end of the performance increase its longevity.

Burns calories - here you are weight watchers. Your ability to burn calories increases as your strength and endurance increase as well. With this increase comes and upward burning of calories. Your metabolism also increases and you will be wiping out calories even in a resting position. I love this don't you?

Stronger bones - New research is discovering that plyo does not only affect strength but also bone endurance. They are being rebuilt constantly in order to maintain their density. Bones begin to lose its density by your thirties and will decrease 1-2 % each year thereafter. Plyo will greatly help lower the risk of osteoporosis. So, for your overall health a few days of plyo can make a life time of difference.

What is a complex movement?

A complex movement is a multi-joint movement that recruits large portions of the body to complete the exercise. Let's compare a simple movement leg exercise with a complex movement leg exercise:

The leg extension machine uses a simple, isolated movement to work the quadriceps. You're in a seated position moving only your knee joint. There isn't much involvement, if any, from other muscles and it doesn't burn very many calories.

Now let's look at a free weight walking lunge. You start by standing with your feet together and a dumbbell in each hand at your sides (or a barbell across your shoulders, or a medicine ball held at your chest, or even with no weight at all). You take a large step forward and lower your back knee, keeping your front knee at a 90-degree angle. Now you push off your front foot and pull your back leg forward, repeating the movement.

How many muscles did you utilize while performing the lunge? Probably too many to count.

You certainly worked your quadriceps, gluteus, hamstrings, calves, abdominals, supporting muscles in your shoulders, arms and back—just to name a few. You also raised your heart rate and really kicked your metabolism into high gear. That's what I call a great exercise.

Other ways to increase intensity

Using complex movements are just one of many ways to kick your workout intensity up a notch. Try incorporating a Super Set into your routine. To do so simply perform two or more exercises in a row and then take a short rest.



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

Tertiary Education and the Development of Critical Thinking Skills

The benefits of University education are well known and governments across the region must aim to dramatically increase the percentage of their citizens who study at this level. A little over half of the population of Singapore are university graduates and this must be the aim of our governments in the region.

For example, some 15% percent of the Jamaican workforce has tertiary level training and so has some way to go. Though Barbados spends six percent of its GDP on education and has attained a literacy rate of 98%, one of the highest in the world, it has some way to go, from its current 25%, to have half of its population university level trained. Some 23% of Caymanians have college degrees.

A World Bank Report on the subject says that Higher education fosters growth, reduces poverty and boosts prosperity.

The report says that 'a highly skilled workforce, with a solid post-secondary education, is a prerequisite for innovation and growth: well- educated people are more employable, earn higher wages. and cope with economic shocks better.' It continues- 'Higher education benefits not just the individual, but society as well. Graduates of higher education are more environmentally conscious, have healthier habits, and have a higher level of civic participation.'

'Also, increased tax revenues from higher earnings, healthier children, and reduced family size all build stronger nations. In short, higher education institutions prepare individuals not only by providing them with adequate and relevant job skills, but also by preparing them to be active members of their communities and societies'.

In addition to these benefits is the fact that tertiary education, more than any other level, must teach and develop the skills of critical thinking. These skills are vital for the sustenance of our democratic practices and for the further evolution and maturity of our societies. The examined life, to borrow from Socrates, is thus a requirement for national development.

Critical Thinking Skills

Writing on the subject in the European Journal of Educational Practice, Vol. 1, No. 2, Sunday Adevemi, outlines the nature of these skills and why they are needed by society. She rightly explains that 'One, who cannot think, may not be able to solve even the minutest problem. We now live in a world of problems - social problem, economic problem, political problem, ethnic problem, religious problem, educational problem, Science and technologically related problems to mention a few. It only takes a sound mind, a mind imbued with reflective thinking, which can engage in deep analysis, to come up with causes of the problem at hand and generate possible solutions or options to arrive at a decision; to solve a or get out of the problem.'

She explains further that critical thinking involves 'delving into context, asking for and examining the evidence, the context of judgement, and the relevant criteria for making the judgment well and so on. It employs not only logic but broad intellectual criteria such as clarity, credibility, accuracy, precision, relevance, depth, breath, fairness and significance.'

It is the critical thinker who is more likely to live rationally, reasonably and empathically because, as Adeyemi points out 'they are keenly aware of the inherent flawed nature of human thinking when left unguided. They work diligently to develop the intellectual virtues of intellectual integrity, intellectual humility, intellectual civility, intellectual empathy, intellectual sense of justice and confidence in reason. They realized that no matter how skilled they are as thinkers, they can always improve their reasoning abilities and that they can at times fall prey to mistakes in reasoning, human irrationality, prejudices, biases, distortions, uncritical accepted social rules and taboos, self-interest and vested-interest.'

Again, Adeyemi has it all right when she says that 'People who think critically strive to improve the world in whatever ways they can and contribute to a more rational and civilized society. Even at that, they recognize the complexities that are inherent in doing so.'

She concludes that 'Most of our thinking if left to itself is biased, distorted,

partial, uninformed or downright prejudiced. Yet the quality of our lives and that of what we produce, make or build depends precisely on the quality of our thought. Shoddy thinking is costly, both in money and in quality of life. This fact underpins the importance of critical thinking in the life of a nation and that of the individual.'

These are fundamentally important points and requires stage of our education system, especially at the University level, to rise to this challenge. 😚

KAABOO Traffic Guide

The RCIPS has been coordinating the policing response and facilitation of the KAABOO Festival for several weeks in consultation with the organizers and other partners, including the NRA.

There are two main aspects to the police's role in this event, one is **ensuring the security and safety** of those attending, while **enforcing the law**, and the second is **traffic coordination and management**.

There will be a **noticeable police presence outside and inside the event**, in addition to the private security personnel that have been hired for the event. Police at the event will be responsible for enforcing the law and addressing breaches of the peace.

While we will be deploying significant police resources to Festival, and are being **reimbursed for these extra police resources**, this will **not impact on normal policing elsewhere on the islands**. Our regular shifts are normally staffed, and those deployed to the event are being brought in on overtime.

Road Closures and Traffic Diversions for KAABOO Festival

The following road closures and traffic diversions will be in place along West Bay Road and the Esterley Tibbetts Highway in order to facilitate the KAABOO Music & Arts Festival. The closures will be in place from 12:00PM on Thursday, 14 February, to 6:00AM on Sunday, 17 February.

Members of the public should **plan their route in advance** in order to avoid additional delays.

There will be additional signage along these roadways during this time and road users travelling on West Bay Road and the Esterley Tibbetts Highway are advised to pay attention to all road signs and to follow all traffic directions given by police officers.

Parking

There will be no parking for KAABOO guests on the site. KAABOO guests will have to park off-site and walk to one of the main entrances on site, or take available public transportation at one of three pickup points. (?)

ROAD INFORMATION

The RCIPS has designed the KAABOO traffic plan to minimize congestion as much as possible while ensuring the safety of all road users. Nevertheless, road users travelling towards West Bay during peak hours should expect some delays and should **know their route in advance** in order to avoid additional delays.

There will be additional signage along these roadways during this time and road users are advised to pay attention to all road signs and to follow all traffic directions given by police officers.

Northbound public traffic travelling toward West Bay via the Esterley Tibbets Highway will be forced to merge into the right northbound lane once past the Kimpton Resort. These road users will need to continue along the Esterley Tibbetts Highway to enter West Bay (no access to West Bay Road).

There will be no private vehicle access to the KAABOO site and no general parking at the site. The use of shuttles and taxis is strongly recommended.



Cayman Representative in London to Head New Ministry

Deputy Governor Franz Manderson recently appointed Eric Bush to lead the soon to be operational Ministry of International Trade, Investment, Aviation and Maritime Affairs.

While Mr Bush's appointment took effect on Monday, 4 February, 2019, he will continue to perform his duties as the Cayman Islands' Representative in the UK and Europe, returning home in late July.

Of his new role he says: "The Ministry will focus on capitalising on our current successes whilst identifying new opportunities to secure the future of the Cayman Islands. We will aim to broaden and enhance our international image and to ensure that Government's interactions across the globe, in areas like financial services, tourism or our aviation and maritime registries, are conducted with one voice."

Achievements during his time in London thus far include coordinating the recent constitutional discussions, as well as the Celebrate Cayman launch event in May 2018.

Early in his tenure he revived the All Party Parliamentary Group for the Cayman Islands, a group of legislators across the United Kingdom (UK) political spectrum. He has also travelled frequently throughout the UK, in places like Cornwall and Wales, to promote the Cayman Islands.

Currently the Chairperson of the United Kingdom Overseas Territories Association (UKOTA), he has served as the Cayman Islands liaison to the European Union, attending meetings of the Overseas Countries and Territories in Brussels.

Explaining the importance of the appointment Mr. Manderson remarks, 'It was vital that the new Ministry have a Chief Officer as soon as possible, to finalise its development, appoint staff and arrange a budget. I congratulate Mr Bush on this new role and look forward to his return to the Civil Service leadership team.'

The Deputy Governor adds that Mr. Bush was the only current Chief Officer to express interest in a transfer to the Ministry. Mr Manderson made the transfer following consultation with Premier Alden McLaughlin, who will serve as Minister for the new ministry.

The Premier says Mr. Bush's past experience as a Chief Officer and the diplomatic skills that he displayed during his time in the UK make him the perfect choice for the new role.

"Over the last few years Eric has helped to raise Cayman's profile in the political, private and other sectors of United Kingdom society. This new Ministry will give his skills even wider scope and help the Cayman Islands stand strong in the world as we move forward into the 21st Century.

Priorities for the new ministry include the opening of the Cayman Islands Government Office for Asia in Hong Kong, as well as recruiting a small core team, and creating strategic plans in global communication and international trade and investment.

At the moment Government has no plans to recruit staff outside of the civil service. Secondment opportunities will be available to existing civil servants until the needs of the new Ministry are better defined.

Mr. Bush was seconded as the Cayman Islands Representative for the UK and Europe for three years in July 2016. He was previously responsible for strategic policy and oversight of the office from 2013-2015, during his time as Chief Officer with responsibility for the Ministry of Home Affairs.

Prior to 2012 he served as Deputy Chief Officer responsible for the Prison, Police and Immigration, in what was

ALL EYES ON GUYANA

Guyana is on the threshold of a major economic transformation as new oil discoveries continue to be made in its waters with startling regularity.

Explorations led by the American conglomerate ExxonMobil are projecting Guyana as a potential major player in the global oil industry given the vast quantities of oil deposits being located in its coastal waters.

Already its projected that in the coming years Guyana could become second



to neighbouring Brazil in oil production in Latin America, displacing its other neighbour Venezuela with whom it has a contentious relationship.

Venezuela, irrespective of which government is in power in Caracas, has had a long-standing claim to almost twothirds of Guyana including some of the areas now being explored as lucrative oil fields.

The dispute is being arbitrated at the International Court of Justice via the

United Nations.

Venezuela which has the world's largest oil reserves has been unable to reap the economic benefits due to internal political strife which has just about crippled its economy.

Guyana would be mindful of that.

While its oil reserves are estimated in the region of 13 million barrels and Venezuela's at 300 million barrels, Guyana's reserves still put it in the top 20 and just about tied with Brazil ranked at 14th.

But as seen with Venezuela and some other countries with considerable oil reserves, converting that into actual lucrative production and then reaping the economic



and social benefits, sometimes tend not to go hand in hand.

That is the big challenge for Guyana.

Regarded in the 1960s as the 'breadbasket of the Caribbean' due to its then buoyant agriculture sector, Guyana saw that industry, its economy and regional status decline due to a combination of internal ideological shifts, poor economic management - and meddling by external powers.

At present, the country is navigating through a political turmoil that is putting its democratic organs to the test. A controversial motion of no-confidence against the government of President David Granger has been upheld by an appeals court ruling.

Elections expected to be held in March due to the outcome of the no-confidence motion, are now being rescheduled to allow more time for preparation.

The handling of this political crisis up to this point shows that Guyana's democracy is intact and quite capable to respond to such challenges.

But bigger challenges loom.

"Our team was in place before the crack of dawn and so were eagle eyed customers looking to score a deal which in-turn meant helping the Cuban families," said organizers of the event. "We opened at 7:00 AM and by 2:00 PM when we packed up, almost 80 percent of the items were sold," they added. The unsold items will now be donated to the Cayman Islands Red Cross. Passers-by who could not stop to browse our selection were still keen to show support, from pennies to hundred-dollar banknotes and every bill in between, we collected more than a thousand dollars in donations that day.



"Everyone loves a happy ending," said one of the organisers, "but for us the



story behind the success is what's really heart-warming. Tortuga Rum Company opened their warehouses for us to store donations, provided trucks to collect and transport the donations and a place to host the garage sale, free of cost. They then made a financial donation as well. Saxon Motor Insurance stepped up as well and donated CI \$500.

Including the road side collections, a total of USD 6,669.75 was raised during the garage sale. That money will now go towards, assisting victims focusing on elder with no family assistance, single mothers with no alternative resources and the physically or mentally impaired.

"We knew we could count on the generosity of the Cayman Islands community. We put the call out on behalf of our Cuban brothers and sisters in need of help and the true Caymankind spirit of the people who live here rose above and



beyond as they all ways do," said a co-organiser.

"These awards have both been developed to provide much needed grant support for artists at both the established and emerging level," Natalie said. "We hope to see it inspire more such opportunities moving forward."

For a brilliant insight into the creative minds of some of Cayman's most accomplished contemporary artists, this exhibition is well worth a view. Cross Currents runs until 4th May, 2019.



Another Stalwart of Jamaica's Opposition Party is Murdered

The opposition People's National Party (PNP) is grieving the loss of a second member in just a week after a former councillor was killed in her house yesterday, only eight days after one of its Members of Parliament was found dead, also at home.

Marjorie 'Madge' Morris was fatally shot at her residence on Albion Boulevard in Yallahs, St Thomas. Police said neighbours reported hearing explosions around 6:30 a.m., and when lawmen responded to the call, the 67-year-old PNP stalwart was found with multiple gunshot wounds, on her kitchen floor.

Morris, who previously served as councillor for the White Horses Division in the St Thomas Municipal Corporation, was murdered as the PNP still tries to come to grips with the brutal killing of MP for East Portland Dr Lynvale Bloomfield, whose body was found with multiple stab wounds on February 2.

In a statement issued after Morris' killing, PNP General Secretary Julian Robinson said the murder had shocked and saddened the party.

He said it had "compounded the dampened spirit and sorrow among the entire membership of the organization who are preoccupied with the burial arrangement of Dr Bloomfield".

"The killing of the former Councillor and PNP activist continues a catalogue of wanton acts of criminality across the country that leave too many individuals and families in mourning and rob the community and the nation of its best talents," Robinson said.

"The PNP continues to maintain that no Jamaican should have to face this viciousness in their own country. We, therefore, urge the security forces to do what is necessary to bring the perpetrators to justice. However, more importantly, we call upon anyone with information who can assist the police within the investigation, to provide whatever information known so that those responsible for Madge's murder can be apprehended and brought to swift justice."

The PNP also expressed concern that that the Andrew Holness administration has cut back on security assigned to former ministers of government.

"It is particularly troubling that while we are experiencing vicious attacks on our elected or former elected officials, and heightened level of threats, the government has proposed to withdraw or

minimize the security details of former ministers of government," it said.

The PNP has partnered with Crime Stop to offer a J\$500,000 (US\$3,667) award for information leading to the arrest of his killer(s).

Barbados PM: More Public Sector Layoffs Coming

Workers at state-owned enterprises are being put on notice that there are still more layoffs to come as Government seeks to manage a huge wage bill.

"We've sent home so far just about 1,000 [people]," Prime Minister Mia Mottley said yesterday on a radio call-in programme on Starcom Network.

"There are still a few more layoffs, what I call the peak structural layoffs, to come in one or two state-owned enterprises."

The Prime Minister said the additional layoffs will come during Phase three of the Government's restructuring programme for the Barbados economy.

"Phase three starts in April this year and goes to December 2020 to deal with some of those State-owned enterprises that require a greater amount of time and process to go in and do what has to be done so that you don't end up without the services that have to be delivered," Mottley said.

Noting that Government's entire wage bill was BDS\$780 million (US\$390 million), she said about 10,000 people would have been placed on the breadline if her administration had not undertaken the Barbados Economic Recovery and Transformation Plan (BERT).

"No wonder you heard the former Governor of the Central Bank talking about sending home about 5,000 or 6,000 people... But imagine what would have happened if we'd sent home five times that [1,000], if you have the kind of crying and dislocation that we've seen, legitimately so, from what we sent home," Mottley said. (*Barbados Today*)



Declining Birth Rate Worrying Health Authorities in Barbados

The Ministry of Health and Wellness has expressed concern about the declining birth rate in Barbados over the last decade.

Acting Chief Medical Officer Dr Kenneth George says that since 2007 Barba-



dos has recorded a 15 per cent decline in births, with a drop from 3,258 births in 2007 to 2,346 births in 2017.

Describing the situation as "worrying", he said: "Declining birth rates, coupled with an ageing population, will

have a significant impact on our ability to project for the future requirements of national development."

Because of this, Dr George said, the Ministry of Health and Wellness would be starting a national dialogue on the issue.

The pursuit of a national solution, he explained, would involve a multi-sectoral approach, including ministries and agencies such as the Ministries of Youth and Community Empowerment, Finance and Economic Affairs, and People Empowerment and Elder Affairs, and the National Insurance and Welfare Departments.

The Chief Medical Officer also revealed that funds had been allocated for the implementation of a national plan of action on neonatal health in Barbados. He said that plan would provide for strengthening and investment in antenatal care, support for safe and incident-free childbirth and quality medical care in the first

four weeks of an infant's life.

"The way forward in improving perinatal and neonatal care in Barbados and the rest of the Caribbean seems to lie in improving the quality of care, which can be achieved by providing training for staff in neonatal intensive care methods," Dr George said.

George Town Man Arrested on Drug Offenses Following Search in Prospect Last Friday

On Friday, 8 February, Joint Task Force officers from the RCIPS and Customs and Border Control conducted a search at an address on Mahogany Way in Prospect under the Misuse of Drugs Law. During the search, a quantity of suspected ganja in plastic bags, drug paraphernalia, and over \$3000 cash were seized. A man, age 37 of George Town, was arrested on suspicion of possession of ganja and possession of criminal property. He is currently on Police bail as investigations continue. 🕥

Woman Charged For Drug Offenses Following Search in East End

On Thursday, 7 February, RCIPS officers executed a search at an address off Sea View Road in East End under the Misuse of Drugs Law. During the search a significant number of parcels of suspected ganja (over 100) were recovered, along with a quantity of cash and drug paraphernalia. A woman, age 24 of East End was taken into custody at the location.

She has now been formally charged with Possession of Ganja with Intent to Supply and Possession of Criminal Property.

Robbery in George Town This Morning

Shortly after 12:30 on Tuesday morning, 12 February, officers responded to a report of a robbery at an address on Greenwood Drive in George Town. It was reported that a man had been outside his home when he was approached by a masked male who appeared to be carrying a gun, and who demanded his phone. The man threw a bag at the culprit and quickly entered his residence. The culprit attempted to follow but was unable to gain access. When the man looked outside again, the culprit had left the location. The bag, which contained personal items, was also missing.

The suspect was wearing a dark, long-sleeved shirt, dark pants, and a mask.

Joint Police and DoA Operation Last Friday Yields Arrest in Connection with Cockfighting

Canada to take Libyan refugees

Canada has announced it will take in 750 refugees from Libya, some rescued from migrant detention centres.

Immigration Minister Ahmed Hussen said that Canada has already resettled more than 150 people, with another 600 anticipated to arrive in the next two years.

Two years ago, CNN revealed video footage that showed migrants being sold into slavery in Libya, some for as little as \$400 each. It caused an international outcry, with the UN Security Council condemning the sale of migrants as "heinous abuses of human rights."

Announcing Canada's move, Mr Hussen said: "In 2017, the world was shocked to see the harrowing images of people being sold into slavery in Libya.

"In response to the situation, Canada was one of the few countries to step up to work with the UNHCR (the UN refugee agency) to resettle these refugees directly from Libya and offer them a new home in Canada."

He added that Canada would also resettle 100 refugees from Niger, rescued from Libyan migrant detention centres, including victims of human smuggling.

Libya is a major transit point for migrants from Africa on their way to Europe. But they are vulnerable to exploitation, and as well as being sold into

slavery some have been abducted and tortured to extort a payment for their release.

There are an estimated 4,900 refugees and migrants still held in Libyan detention centres, including 3,600 in need of international protection, according to UNHCR.


"They're enduring nightmarish conditions," a spokesman for the agency said.

"The use of detention is routine for people intercepted and rescued at sea, but there have been widespread reports of human rights violations, detainees being given insufficient food, insufficient access to healthcare, as well as allegations from former detainees of torture and sexual assault taking place." (?)

Even oil workers fleeing Venezuela

Venezuela's economy is in such a dire state that even workers in its oil-rich industry are emigrating to find a better life.

Venezuela was once one of the world's top five oil exporters, pumping 3.5 million barrels a day in 1998 when President Hugo Chavez was elected and launched Venezuela's



Even worse, production is about to sink even further due to fresh sanctions by the Trump administration targeting PDVSA that have essentially cut off Venezuela from its Houston-based cash-cow, Citgo, with the aim of depriving President Nicolas Maduro of more than \$11 billion in exports this year.

Nieves Ribullen, a Venezuelan oil worker sick of struggling to get by as his country falls apart, is betting it all on Iraq's far-away Kurdish region to give his family a better life.

Over the years he's watched dozens of co-workers abandon poverty wages and dangerous working conditions at the rundown complex of refineries in Punto Fijo on Venezuela's Caribbean coast for jobs in far-flung places like Kuwait, Angola and Chile.

Now it's his turn. Leaving his wife and three children behind, he'll soon ship out to Iraq's semi-autonomous northern Kurdish region, where he expects to earn more than \$3,500 a month — a fortune compared to the less than \$20 he brings home monthly in increasingly unstable Venezuela.

"I only earn enough to buy a kilo of meat and one chicken each month," Ribullen said. "We're in chaos." (*

Former Honduras president 'diverted \$1m'

The latest in a series of investigations involving former Honduras President Porfirio Lobo, his family and associates for corruption and drug trafficking pits the Attorney General's Office directly against Lobo as it investigates him for diverting public funds.

On February 4, the National Anti-Corruption Council submitted accusations against Mr Lobo to the Special Prosecution Unit Against Impunity for Corruption which is part of the Attorney General's Office. He is accused of misappropriating as much as \$1 million in government funds.

The funding was supposed to be used for implementing social programs

managed by the board of directors of the National Children's Trust. However, the former president and former first lady, Rosa Elena Bonilla de Lobo — who is currently in pretrial detention — allegedly diverted the money in a series of withdrawals in June 2013 to pay for "presidential security".

In response, Mr Lobo held a press conference during which he said a journalist friend of his had already informed him of the investigation shortly before the anti-corruption council went public with it. He added that the accusations came from "pressure from above" and that he "would never take a cent from the poor."

Cuba to host British Royals

Cuba is to receive a visit from members of the British Royal Family for the first time in its history.

The Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall are to make a historic visit to Cuba within the next two months.

The couple will visit the Communist state as part of their tour to the Caribbean although it has not been officially confirmed by Prince Charles' office.

President of the Supreme Court, said that she had been speaking to Camilla about the trip.

Lady Hale said: "They are not only going to the Anglo Caribbean, they are going to Cuba as well. She is very much looking forward to going to Cuba. It will be quite an event for members of the Royal Family to visit Cuba."

The forthcoming visit which would have been unthinkable just a few years ago. No British Royal has been to the Communist state before, as it has been considered too politically sensitive. In 2016, Barack Obama became the first US president to visit Cuba since 1928 - ending the official hostility that was US-Cuba relations for more than half a century.

Mr Obama spent three days in the capital Havana, but to date, no British prime minister has ever been there.

Cuba, just 90 miles south of the American coastline in Florida, was run as a dictatorship under the rule of Fidel Castro for nearly five decades.

Castro led a rebel army to victory in 1959 and stood down only in 2008 in favour of his younger brother Raul. (*)

Architect wants black UK museum

Celebrated UK architect Sir David Adjaye has called for a "long overdue" museum celebrating black culture in Britain.

He believes it would help generations of black children to feel part of "the language, DNA and roots" of the UK.

He explained that the contribution of black people to the British Isles was an important talking point.

The British-Ghanaian achieved global fame as the architect of the National Museum of African-American History and Culture in Washington DC.

Sir David said that most people believe black Britain began with the Windrush generation, but it actually started much earlier. The Windrush generation refers to those people who moved to the UK from Caribbean countries between 1948 and 1971.

Records suggest that the reign of Queen Elizabeth I from 1558 to 1603 saw the beginning of Britain's first black community, with black people in Britain as far back as the Roman empire.

The museum that Sir David is proposing would aim to make generations of black children feel like they have a place in the nation's future.

He said: "It is really amazingly important for the representation of people in the sort of cultural tropes of the nation."

Sir David, who found it difficult to get commissions at the beginning of his career, started out designing spaces for old art school friends before coming to public attention with the Idea Store library in east London.

He is currently designing a national Holocaust memorial and learning centre next to the Houses of Parliament in Westminster.

Individual museums around the UK have celebrated black British history and culture over the years with exhibitions of their own.

Philippines remittances drop drastically

The Philippines stands to lose as much as \$1.5 billion worth of remittances due to the decrease in the deployment of overseas Filipino workers, particularly to the Middle East due to declining global oil prices.

Emmanuel Geslani, a labour and migration expert, said the administrative order issued

by the Department of Labour and Employment to the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration would reduce the number of job orders for household service workers for the Middle East starting this quarter.

Labour Secretary Silvestre Bello last month directed the POEA to reduce by 10 percent the accreditation of foreign recruitment agencies as well as the number of employment contracts especially in Saudi Arabia and Middle East countries.

Mr Geslani said the directive would have a severe impact on the deployment of household service workers to the Middle East by 30,000 workers as recruitment agencies deploy around 300,000 workers annually.

"Around 80,000 to 100,000 jobs for OFWs will be lost due to the precarious financial situation of Saudi Arabia and other Middle East countries due to lower crude oil prices that includes the reduction of household service workers to that country," he said.

Latest data from the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas showed personal remittances consisting of cash and non-cash items that flow through both formal or via electronic wire and informal channels such as money or goods carried across borders rose 2.9 percent to \$29.06 billion from January to November last year. But that figure is expected to decrease drastically in coming months. (?)

Gabriel taints Windies glory

West Indies may have won the Test series 2-1 against England but the biggest talking point is why fast bowler Shannon Gabriel has been charged by the International Cricket Council following an incident with England captain Joe Root.

Gabriel was warned by the umpires for the language he used on day three of the third Test in St Lucia.

Root responded to a comment from the 30-year-old Trinidadian by saying: "Don't use it as an insult. There's nothing wrong with being gay." At least they shook hands after the game.

Former England captain Nasser Hussain and football pundit Ian Wright have led praise for Root. On Tuesday, as he ran in to bowl his first spell, some in the crowd jeered. Now pundits and fans have taken to social media to praise his forward-thinking actions, with Hussain describing Root as a role model.

Hussain said: "I don't know who said what to whom... but boy do I applaud Joe Root's reaction here. For me his twelve words as a role model will be in the end more important than a Test hundred or possible victory."

Former footballer and current BBC pundit Ian Wright said simply: "Joe Root. Well played and well said sir."

Cricket fans also praised Root for his inclusive response, with one calling him a 'top man' and another a 'hero'.

Root has been praised by Stonewall, a leading UK equality charity, for challenging Gabriel.

Kirsty Clarke, director of sport at Stonewall - which campaigns for lesbian, gay, bi and trans equality - said: "Language is really influential and it's great if Joe Root was willing to challenge potentially abusive comments.

"The more players, fans, clubs and organisations that stand up for

equality in sport, the sooner we kick discrimination out and make sport everyone's game.

"Stonewall research shows more than half of British people (58 per cent) believe it's important anti-LGBT language is challenged at live sporting events."

Meanwhile, another talking point was how few supporters were at the Gros Islet ground to watch the West Indies.

"They don't like losers. If you're not winning they're not going to support you." That was the verdict of Lance Gibbs when asked about the lack of local support.

The answer is that West Indies are winning, and came into the third Test with the chance of a whitewash. But the local turnout in St Lucia has probably been the lowest of the series with no more than a few hundred on each day.

Instead, it has felt like a county match with polite ripples of applause greeting the players on the field before the Barmy Army's painful rendition of Jerusalem and the ground DJ spinning cheesy hits to get the Brits singing along. West Indian flavour was confined to the jerk pork.

This England tour does not visit famous venues such as Trinidad, Guyana and Jamaica with their long histories of cricketing excellence. Instead, it is

confined to the tourist holiday islands because the governments of St Lucia, Barbados and Antigua, the three Test venues, helped with staging fees recognising an England tour is worth an estimated \$6 million per day to the local economy.

Guyana, Trinidad and Jamaica opted instead to host matches with India later this year, partly because of their local Indian communities but also because they aim to attract the Indian diaspora in the United States with flights cheaper from America than for British tourists visiting from the UK. 📀

Westbrook is triple-double king

Oklahoma City Thunder's Russell Westbrook braking a 51-year-old NBA record when he achieved a triple-double in 10 consecutive games puts him in the legendary bracket.

Westbrook registered his 10th straight triple-double on Monday. No other human had ever had more than seven straight triple-doubles in the NBA — Michael Jordan did that once. Westbrook now has 23 triple-doubles on the season, with an outside shot at matching his record 42 triple-doubles from 2016-17. After averaging a triple-double in each of the last two seasons, his figures are even better this campaign.

He tied Wilt Chamberlain's run of nine triple-doubles in a row, set in 1968, on Sunday against Houston Rockets.

The 30-year-old point guard broke the record in Thunders' 120-111 win over Portland Trail Blazers with 21 points, 14 rebounds and 11 assists. 📀



UFC legend Anderson "Spider" Silva is still fighting at 43 but is now merely a stepping stone for the young guns to notch his name on their records. A decade ago Silva was peerless in the sport, virtually unbeatable and lauded as the UFC's poster boy. But no longer.

That was evident on Saturday as undefeated middleweight Israel Adesanya stepped into the main event spotlight and claimed the biggest scalp of his mixed martial arts career with a unanimous decision victory over Silva at UFC 234.

Nigeria-born Kiwi Adesanya, 29, and the Brazilian legend were originally scheduled to face off in the night's co-main event contest in Melbourne.

They were promoted to the main event of the show after Australian UFC middleweight champion Robert Whittaker withdrew from his fight.

Whittaker was taken to hospital and had emergency surgery on what UFC officials called a "severe abdominal injury".

It forced the cancellation of Whittaker's scheduled world title defence against American Kelvin Gastelum.

After three rounds of gripping action, Adesanva was unanimously declared the victor with scores of 29-28, 30-27 and 30-27, taking his career record to 16-0.

Adesanya said it was a surreal experience sharing the octagon with one of his idols.

"This is crazy. This is like, for a kid, just to play... If I'm aying basketball, to play against Michael Jordan. This

NFL hypocrisy is lamentable

The NFL is being accused of rank hypocrisy for its treatment of Colin Kaepernick compared to players who have been exposed for domestic violence.

Kaepernick can't get an NFL job after exercising his constitutional right three seasons ago to protest social injustice and police brutality by kneeling during the national anthem, but Kareem Hunt hasn't a problem finding employment within a couple of months despite videos capturing his shoving and kicking a woman on the floor of a hotel hallway.

The NFL's treatment of Kaepernick and Hunt exposes itself again as a benevolent league to those it believes can advance its bottom line.

Take Eric Reid, for instance. The Pro Bowl safety joined Kaepernick during their days with the San Francisco 49ers in 2016 as the original national anthem protestors. While Kaepernick remains jobless, Reid signed a three-year contract Monday with the Carolina Panthers for \$22 million after struggling to find employment.

Reid told the truth when he informed reporters

that his new deal strengthened the collusion grievance he filed against the NFL last May in conjunction with the players association. According to the grievance, league bosses and owners worked to keep Reid jobless after he was not signed by the

49ers following the 2017 season. He only joined the desperate Panthers in late September when they needed somebody as an injury replacement, but the most ironic fact is that although Reid continues to kneel, Panthers officials decided to concentrate more on his brilliant play in the secondary than his protesting.

Just win, baby. The NFL is content to tolerate domes-

tic abuse, it seems. No problem if you're Hunt, and you're 23, and you remain a highly productive running back. That's opposed to Ray Rice, whose skills in an NFL backfield were declining in 2014 when a video surfaced of him punching his then-fiancé in a hotel elevator before he dragged her out to the hallway. The NFL chose not to suspend Rice indefinitely until seven months after the incident, but he was reinstated by the federal courts.

It didn't matter, because Rice was already a physical mess along the way to an early retirement. This league makes about \$14 billion per year not to care. How else can you explain the audacity of the Cleveland Browns signing Hunt Monday to a one-year deal with the option of bringing him back the following season as a restricted free agent? 😚

Venezuela, despite its own problems at home, recently challenged the presence of Exxon Mobil oil research vessels assigned to Guyana, which it claimed were operating within its territorial boundaries.

Guyana rejected that assertion and was adamant that the vessels were in its waters.

The United States chided Venezuela for behaving aggressively, Venezuela in turn accused the US of plotting to destabilise it.

Meanwhile, Venezuela's claim to a large chunk of Guyana - just about the

only thing the opposing political sides in Venezuela seem to agree on - remains unresolved.

Venezuela's domestic political crisis has attracted international attention and the likelihood of involvement - with major global powers sitting on opposite sides of that country's political divide.

Coincidentally, there is a recent suggestion by the British Defence Minister for Guyana to be considered as the location of a possible post-Brexit UK naval base in the Caribbean. The other suggested location was the British overseas territory, Montserrat.

To what extent that is likely to materialise, remains to be seen. Naval bases are not built overnight, nor is oil extraction an overnight process, although oil production could start in Guyana possibly within the next year or two by some schedules.

In addition to ExxonMobil, several other major global players in the oil industry are either already in Guyana, or are planning their entry with the hope of cashing in on the petroleum version of the American gold rush.

Among them are the UK's BP, the American Chevron, France's TOTAL, ENI of Italy, and Exxon's partners Hess Oil and Nexen of China.

With so much at stake, diplomatic and commercial interests must be delicately managed to the benefit of not only the investors but also to the national interest of the government and people of Guyana.

As stated recently by Guyana's Director of Energy, Dr Mark Bynoe:

"The real substance of these finds will come when all Guyanese are able to benefit from these discoveries, whether directly and/or indirectly."

The former breadbasket of the Caribbean seems on its way to reinventing itself as the petrol station of the Caribbean with all which that implies...barring any oil slicks.

Curiously Guyana was one of the Caribbean countries which was a beneficiary of the Venezuelan Chavez-era PetroCaribe oil concessions, a diplomatic outreach oiled by, well...oil.

But with Venezuela tottering precariously on the brink of bankruptcy, Petro-Caribe has quite literally run out of gas.

Might Guyana take up the slack? 📀




