Residents of Cuba were in a state of shock after a deadly tornado ripped through the eastern part of the capital Havana on Sunday night, killing at least three people and injuring over 170 others.

Casualty numbers were likely to increase as several persons were still unaccounted for on Monday.

Property damage is extensive especially in the poor areas of Havana which bore the brunt of the tornado.

It barreled through the eastern borough of Guanabacoa with winds

Cayman Drone offers a new perspective

Cayman Drone Company started in business in January 2018, the brainchild of Omari J. Rankine, who is the company's CEO. An innovative business, it provides aerial photography and videography services throughout the Cayman Islands, for both commercial, residential and recreational purposes.

In particular, their drone services have been particularly useful for the real estate industry, offering a unique perspective of both residential houses or commercial buildings, as well as project documentation, providing digital step-by-step documentation of a building or landscaping project from a top down perspective, with ground level photography included also.

People looking to purchase land can now get a bird's eye view of the plot of land in question, even if the land is not accessible from the ground. The service has also given inspectors added information, providing a visual inspection of difficult to reach high-altitude structures such as roofs, towers and poles. perspective of outdoor events. From outdoor food festivals to sports events and charity fun runs, there's always a drone overhead to capture the spirit of the occasion. On a more serious note, Cayman Drones also provides assistance for search and rescue operations, to help find anything or anyone that may have gone missing in an inaccessible area.

Omari said he has always had a love for photography and thought to combine this with his technical background, having been an engineer for 14 years.

"So, when drones started to retail to consumers, and I could basically buy a flying camera, I immediately fell in love," he confirmed. "Drones now enable the everyday photographer to capture a bird's eye view through their lens without requiring the use of planes or helicopters. The applications of this technology are endless."

Omari runs the entire business, with a few part-time associates who help him from time to time with bigger projects. He said one of the challenges he has faced, is that, like any other product being sold, there are those who misuse it,

which has given some people a bad perception of drones.

"I have been approached on a few occasions and questioned, usually in regards to the invasion of privacy laws. But once I provide them with my business information and explain to them the services that I offer, they become more comfortable with it," he stated.

That said, Omari feels there still seems to be a large percentage of the population that have little knowledge of drones, and exactly what it is that they do or can do.

"As people become more familiar with drones and their applications, I think the market and the demand for the services will also grow, Omari said. "I hope one day that as the awareness of drones increases, I can expand and acquire a few permanent employees and a few more drones, to help grow my business and offer more services."

There are some exciting prospects ahead for Cayman Drones, as Omari re-

vealed he is currently in negotiations with two US-based companies that each offer a unique large-scale service using drones that is currently not offered in the Cayman Islands. If all goes well, he said, he can hopefully partner with them and bring those services to the island.

Omari also said that his love for photography has also inspired him to create a subsidiary branch of the company, called Viewz.ky.

"Through here I offer aerial 'Viewz' of the Cayman Islands, most never before seen, which I provide on canvas, acrylic or metal displays. I'm hoping to market these to the larger local businesses, such as hotels, banks and law firms, to display on their walls and in their offices, to help them create a local Cayman ambiance," he confirmed.

Drivers Leave the Scenes of Accidents in Two Separate Incidents, 25 & 26 January; Both Arrested

On Friday and Saturday nights, 25 and 26 January, collisions occurred in which both drivers left the scene. In one of the collisions, a police car was substantially damaged. Arrests have been made in connection with both incidents.

On Friday, 25 January, around 10:30PM, police responded to a report of a collision in the parking lot of a restaurant on South Church Street in which a blue Suzuki Swift had reversed into a Mitsubishi Navita. The driver of the Suzuki reportedly spoke to the owner of the other vehicle, who was on site, but then left the area without providing any contact details. Police responded, obtained descriptions of the car and driver, and then located a man and vehicle down the street clearly fitting those descriptions. Based on this and other observations, police arrested the man on suspicion of driving under the influence of alcohol and leaving the scene of the accent. The man, age 35 of Bodden Town, was taken into custody and provided a breath sample with a reading of .210%. He is currently on Police bail.

On Saturday, 26 January, around 3:30AM, officers in a police car in West Bay had just turned from Sticky Toffee Lane onto Batabano Road when a passenger car traveling at a high speed in the opposite direction skidded into their path and collided with the right front section of the police car. The passenger car then hit a fence post before leaving the scene. The police car received extensive damage in the collision and one officer received minor injuries.

Other officers responded to the scene and conducted enquiries; later that day, 26 January, a woman, age 22 of West Bay, was arrested on suspicion of leaving the scene of an accident. She is currently on Police bail.

"Leaving the scene of an accident only compounds the consequences you will face for reckless behavior on the road," said Insp. Yearwood, Head of the Traffic and Roads Policing Unit, "and this is not just about legal consequences, but also about the callousness of failing to show concern for those you have hit. Taking responsibility for your actions is always the better thing to do." (*)

Five Vehicle Break-Ins in the Savannah Area Over the Holiday Weekend

This past Sunday, 27 January, the RCIPS received several reports of thefts from vehicles in the vicinity of Savannah Avenue, in Bodden Town. Five vehicles were reported to have been broken into, and all had last

been seen intact on the evening of Saturday, 26 January. The breakins occurred on Savannah Avenue, Jim Bodden Avenue, Lancelot Drive and Harvest Avenue, with various quantities of cash and personal items taken. Two of the vehicles had a window smashed and the locking mechanism on the door of one of the vehicles was damaged. The other two vehicles had been left unlocked.

The incidents are currently under police investigation and the RCIPS is reminding the public to avoid leaving any valuables in their vehicles, especially over-



night and where they are visible to passersby.

"We have increased our patrols in the area in response to these incidents, which we are actively investigating," said Acting Inspector Fernando Soto, Area Commander for the Eastern Districts. "We ask those in the community to report any suspicious persons or activity, especially during overnight hours."

up winds of over 60mph and torrential rainfall.

Cuban government officials and citizens were trawling through the wreckage on Monday surveying the damage of the unusual weather event, the first "twister" to touch down in Cuba in decades.

The official statement from the Cuba Meteorological Service reads (loosely translated):

"An active line of severe local storms formed in front of a cold front crossed over the provinces from Pinar del Rio to Mayabeque and Havana in the early hours of the night and in its wake pro-





duced severe local storms, with the occurrence of gusts of wind more than 100 kilometers per hour, hail and a strong tornado that affected several municipalities of the capital. In San Juan and Martínez, pinar del Rio there were maximum gusts of up to 115 kilometers per hour."

There have been no official damage estimates yet, but President Miguel Diaz-Canel tweeted that the destruction was "severe".

Cage Being Used by DoA to Trap Dogs

Minister, Department of Agriculture and RCIPS Meet with Residents About Stray Dogs

Hon. Joey Hew, Temporary Minister for Agriculture and elected representative for George Town North, officials from the Department of Agriculture (DoA) and members of the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) met this week with a group of concerned residents to give an update on the situation with a pack of stray dogs that have been attacking people and animals in the George Town North community, and also discuss ways to deal with the problem moving forward.

At the meeting DoA Director Adrian Estwick confirmed that seven members of the pack had been successfully captured in the vicinity of the George Town landfill by traps that were set by the Animal Welfare and Control Unit. An additional wild dog had been caught in a trap at Minister Hew's residence, where a pack of dogs had recently killed the family's cat. The captured dogs were euthanised due to their extremely aggressive behaviour and territorial tendencies. However, at the time of this writing, two dogs remain uncaptured and another has re-

portedly joined the pack so that there are three dogs now roaming in the area which extends from neighbourhoods on West Bay Road through the Camana Bay and Brittania area into Snug Harbour.

Mr. Estwick said the Department will be launching a public awareness cam-

paign to educate pet owners about the Animals Law and their responsibility under the Law. Attendees were given a brochure entitled "Responsible Dog Ownership" which will be distributed in the community and placed in various business establishments. Members from



the RCIPS and DoA will be undertaking joint community operations and using the radio and other media to inform and educate the public.

Currently, anyone who has their dog in public without a leash is committing an offense and subject to a fine or seizure of the animal. However, these cases have to go through the court system which is a costly and lengthy process.

In the meantime, Superintendent Brad Ebanks and Inspector for Community Policing Courtney Myles promised an increased police presence in the public areas where residents walk their dogs unleashed, such as the Britannia Golf Club and Camana Bay, and said that officers will be handing out the brochures and talking to dog owners. Mr. Estwick also emphasised that members of the public need to be careful that they are not contributing to the problem by interfering with the traps that have been set for the wild dogs or feeding the animals. He and Inspector Myles also encouraged everyone to continue to share information of sightings of the pack of dogs, and one resident suggested a WhatsApp chat group that included representatives from DoA and the RCIPS. If any member of the public encounters packs of wild dogs, they can call the Department of Agriculture's Animal Control Unit on 947.3090 or email agriculture@gov.ky. Reports of dog attacks or dogs dangerously out of control can be made to the RCIP by calling 9-1-1 or district police stations.



5 Sneaky Ways to Burn Calories at Work

You may think the 30 minutes you spend every other day in the gym is enough to keep you trim and healthy, but it's not. If you want overall good health, you need to eat well and find windows of exercising opportunity every day-not just during your scheduled workouts.

Destination: Chicago

A long weekend in Chicago can be packed full of excitement from beginning to end, a brilliant city in which to absorb some culture, learn some history, eat some great food and shop til you drop. Just a fourhour flight away on Cayman Airways, Chicago, located on the southwestern shore of Lake Mich-

igan, appeals to anyone who loves big city life, and all the fun and excitement that goes with it.

How to get there

Cayman Airways operates two flights a week (Wednesday and Saturday) until 9th February 2019. From 14th February to 30th May 2019 the two flights a week change to Thursday and Sunday (perfect for a long weekend!). From 2nd June to 18th August 2019 they operate just a weekly flight on Sunday. Flights cost around US\$600 return.

What to do

Hop-on hop-off bus tours are a bit clichéd, but they are helpful if you haven't visited a city before and need to understand the layout. They are a great way to set your own agenda and see things at your own pace, such as Michigan Avenue, the Navy Pier and Millennium Park.

Chicago is famous for its towering and innovative architecture, a relatively new city following the Chicago great fire of 1871 that burnt down most of the city. Even if design isn't your thing, a **cruise** down the Chicago River is a great way to spend an hour or so. Your guide will give you a running commentary of the history of all the fascinating buildings you will see along the way, including the Wrigley Building, a landmark building for the city created by the chewing gum magnate, and the John Hancock Building, with its 360 Chicago observation deck, 1,000 feet up. Most cruises run from Navy Pier and Michigan Avenue.



Take a river cruise down the Chicago River

If you have a head for heights, the **Skydeck**, https://theskydeck.com/ located on the 103rd floor of the Willis Tower (formerly the Sears Tower) is a great way to enjoy panoramic views of the city. You can even walk out on a glass ledge balcony that's 1,353 feet up, which let's you see right out to Navy Pier and beyond.

Navy Pier https://navypier.org/ is a fun day out for the kids, a top attraction in Chicago, with tons of restaurants and shops, an IMAX theatre, lots of great museums, such as the Chicago Children's Museum, a beer garden, Ferris wheel, outdoor art, a theatre, botanic gardens and a whole heap more attractions and fun things to see and do.


Lincoln Park Zoo https://www.lpzoo. org/ is thought to be one of the best zoos in the US and is another fun location for kids. There's all the excitement associated with big cats at the lion house, as well as a primate house, antelope and zebra area and polar bear and penguin habitats. Set in beautiful surroundings, there's plenty of places to eat and lots of other entertainment for kids.

The Museum of Science and Industry https://www.msichicago.org/ is another brilliant attraction, housed in the former Palace of Arts constructed for the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition. It's the largest museum in the western hemisphere and always has a ton of amazing exhibitions to enthrall and inform visitors.

It is always best to book tickets online ahead of your trip to avoid disappointment.

Where to stay

Chicago Marriott Downtown is located on Magnificent Mile in the heart of Chicago's most famous shopping district. At this time of year prices are around a reasonable US\$160 – US\$180 per night for a double room. The Omni Chicago Suites, also on Magnificent Mile are another good option, again centrally located with double suites running at about US\$130 per night. The Hilton Chicago on Michigan Avenue's Cultural Mile is a lovely building and prices are at US\$130 – US\$140 a night.

At this time of year Chicago can be absolutely freezing. They don't call it the windy city for nothing, so wrap up, as average temperatures in January and February are around low to mid 30s F. Rams set to upset Patriots

It's 17 years since the New England Patriots and the Los Angeles Rams last faced off in Super Bowl and in that time their fortunes could not have been more contrasted. The franchises clash in Super Bowl LIII in Atlanta, Georgia on Sunday having had totally different fortunes since their last Super Bowl meeting in 2002.

Rams moved back from St. Louis and have made the playoffs only four times while the Patriots have won four more Super Bowl titles, cementing themselves as one of the greatest sports dynasties of all time.

The two teams' route to the Super Bowl are similar. Both won their respective divisions to secure a bye in the first round of the playoffs. The Patriots, 11-5 in the regular season, beat the Los Angeles Chargers in the divisional round and then the Kansas City Chiefs in the conference championship. The Rams went 13-3 in the regular season. They beat the Dallas Cowboys in the divisional round and the New Orleans Saints in the conference championship due, in part, to a controversial pass interference noncall late in the game.

In terms of yards per game, the teams are evenly matched on both sides of the ball. Los Angeles are led by quarterback Jared Goff and top receiver Robert Woods, whose connections led the Rams to gain 421.1 yards per game, almost 30 more than the Patriots in the regular season. The Rams also scored 32.9 points a game, nearly six more than the Patriots' 27.2. On defense, both sides gave up roughly the same num-

per game compared to the Rams' 24 points against per game, seventh and 20th in the league, respectively. One matchup to watch out for throughout the game will be between the Rams' defensive line, led

by Aaron Donald, against Patriots quarterback Tom Brady. Donald, the 2017-18 NFL Defensive Player of the Year, put up another strong campaign this season, leading the league with 20.5 sacks. Brady is known for his lightning-quick release, giving pass rushers minimal time to sack or pres-

ber of yards per game, but New England held their

opponents to 20.3 points

sure him. If Brady can find his favourite weapons—primarily Julian Edelman, Rob Gronkowski, and James White quickly, then Donald's impact will be limited. If not, Brady will be in for a tough fight.

The Rams have the advantage in the running game with star running back Todd Gurley on their side. Gurley has been in the NFL's top three in rushing yards for the past two seasons, though his recent play is cause for concern. He suffered a slight knee injury in Week 15, which led him to miss the last two weeks of the regular season. Despite returning to rush for over 100 yards in the divisional round, he was limited to just four carries for 10 yards in the conference

championship. Rams head coach Sean McVay has since said that Gurley played less due to poor performance, but the fear of a nagging injury still remains.

As for the Patriots, running back Sony Michel has rushed for over 100 yards in each playoff game. If he can maintain his strong performance, what once seemed like a clear advantage for LA is suddenly far from certain.

Ultimately, Donald and the Rams offense will push the Rams over the Patriots in an exciting affair. Because of Brady, the Patriots are the clear favourites, but he is 41 and must succumb to age some time. The Rams have caused so many surprises this season, they look capable of doing it again this time.

West Indies burdened by glorious past

No cricket team has their own celebrated past used against them quite like the West Indies. The second Test against England started in Antigua on Thursday and despite the fabulous first Test win common debate is still how alarming the decline of the West Indies has been.

They dominated Test cricket for some 15 years from the mid-1970s and, having even before then been viewed as the five-day game's "great entertainers", it has made the Caribbean side's ensuing decline in the format seem even more acute.

Yet, damning the likes of Kemar Roach as "no Malcolm Marshall" misses the point that few cricketers before or since have reached the same standard as the late West Indies fast howler



Davis unlikely to sign \$240m deal

Anthony Davis has told the New Orleans Pelicans that he won't sign a contract extension and wants a trade.

Even though the 25-year-old power forward is eligible to sign a five-year, \$240 million supermax extension this summer he can become a free agent in 2020 and wants to move on to a join a more successful team. Davis' agent, Rich Paul, did not place pressure on the Pelicans to move Davis prior to next week's trade deadline, sources said.

"Anthony wants to be traded to a team that allows him a chance to win consistently and compete for a championship," Paul told ESPN. "Anthony wanted to be honest and clear with his intentions and that's the reason for informing them of this decision now. That's in the best interests of both Anthony's and the organization's future."

Roach, however, didn't have to be Marshall or Joel Garner as he ripped through England's top order with a return of five for 17 in a first-innings total of 77 all out, which set up Saturday's colossal 381-run win for the West Indies in the first Test at his Kensington Oval home ground in Barbados.

And West Indies captain Jason Holder, one of six Bajans in the side, didn't have to bat like Garfield Sobers, the island's greatest cricketer, as he struck a majestic 202 not out in the same match.

Nor did unheralded spinner Roston Chase have to bowl like celebrated all-rounder Sobers as he took a startling eight for 60 in England's second innings during a match that ended with more than a day to spare.

Admittedly, England began the series third in the world Test rankings compared to West Indies' eighth, a reflection of the Caribbean side's recent struggles in New Zealand and Asia, where they suffered four defeats.

And yet the warning signs were there for Joe Root's men, with the West Indies winning the second Test at the Yorkshireman's Headingley home ground two years ago, albeit losing that series.

The emergence of lucrative Twenty20 franchise events such as the Indian Premier League have proved particularly enticing for players from depressed Caribbean economies.

Meanwhile, a series of high-profile rows involving Cricket West Indies President Dave Cameron and several once-senior if underperforming Test players have exacerbated the problems of inter-island rivalry.

But Holder, thrust into the captaincy four years ago as a novice aged 23, has

made an impressive leader for a youthful side forged in adversity.

Arguably nowhere on earth has produced so many truly great cricketers per head of population as Barbados, with an all-time side from the island a match for any XI.

Many of those stars — Frank Worrell, Everton Weekes, Clyde Walcott, Gordon Greenidge, Desmond Haynes, Marshall and Garner — have parts of the Kensington Oval named after them.

At this rate, Holder, Chase and wicketkeeper Shane Dowrich, who made 116 not out in an unbroken partnership of 295 with his captain last week, will take their place in the fabric of the ground as well. Paul is also LeBron James's agent and the smart money is on him joining The King at LA Lakers. $\textcircled{\begin{subarray}{c} \end{subarray}}$

Venezuela's President Willing to Talk With Opposition to Resolve Political Crisis

Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro says he's open to having talks with his opponents to resolve the political crisis in his country that has deepened since last week when Opposition Leader Juan Guaido declared himself interim leader.

In a speech to members of the Venezuelan diplomatic corps in Caracas yesterday, he said his administration was establishing contact with governments who offered to mediate, and he identified Trinidad and Tobago as one of the locations for talks.

His comments came after he had spoken with Caribbean Community (CARICOM) leaders and diplomats who met with United Nations Secretary General Antonio Guterres yesterday in New York to discuss the situation in Venezuela. During those talks, the UN boss offered to facilitate dialogue and negotiation between the parties.

Maduro told the Venezuelan diplomats—who were recalled from the United States which has recognized Guaido as president of the South American nation that he had informed the Caribbean Prime Ministers he was willing to talk. "I spoke with all of them at length during the afternoon. I spoke with Evo Morales [President of Bolivia]. We are also establishing contact with governments who offered to mediate dialogue and I told them I am ready once again in Venezuela or in Trinidad and Tobago or wherever to begin a round of conversations, dialogue, negotiations, with all of the Venezuelan opposition when and where they want them," he said.

Maduro has so far been adamant that he is the democratically elected president of Venezuela and has remained firm in the face of international pressure to step aside and allow free and fair elections.

He was sworn into office earlier this month for a second consecutive term, following disputed elections last year.

The US has imposed sanctions on Venezuela's stateowned oil firm PDVSA. Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said the proceeds of the purchase of Venezuelan oil would now be withheld from Maduro's government, but the company could avoid sanctions by recognizing Guaido as interim president.

UN Boss Agrees to Facilitate Dialogue in Venezuela Situation After Meeting with CARICOM Leaders

Following a meeting with a delegation from the Caribbean Community (CAR-ICOM) yesterday, United Nations (UN) Secretary General Antonio Guterres has offered to facilitate discussion to help resolve the ongoing political crisis in Venezuela.

The talks with Guterres at the United Nations came five days after the South American country's Opposition Leader Juan Guaido declared himself interim president and received the backing of several countries, including the United States and Canada, while President Nicolas Maduro remained resolute that he is the rightful leader and resisted international pressure to step down.

Following those developments, CARI-COM heads met among themselves and agreed to seek an urgent audience with Guterres.

In a statement issued last night after yesterday's meeting with him, they said "the United Nations Secretary General extended his offer of good offices, circumstances permitting, to facilitate dialogue and negotiation between the parties".

"The CARICOM delegation indicated its readiness to work assiduously to bring the parties to the negotiating table," it added, noting that the visiting leaders subsequently engaged with the various Permanent Representatives of Canada, Russia, the European Union and the African Union, as well as President Maduro and Mexico's Foreign Minister, with a view to reduce tensions and build a platform for dialogue.

"Further engagements will take place in the next few days as the situation remains fluid," the statement added.

The regional delegation, led by CAR-ICOM Chairman Dr Timothy Harris, Prime Minister of St Kitts and Nevis, also included Barbados' Prime Minister Mia Mottley, Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley of Trinidad and Tobago, Grenada's Foreign Minister Peter David, and CARICOM Secretary-General Ambassador Irwin LaRocque.

In their meeting with Guterres, the CARICOM leaders expressed their "grave concern over the untenable situation in Venezuela".

"The delegation strongly urged that further deterioration would seriously aggravate the plight of Venezuelans. The Caribbean Community is steadfast that

the region must remain a zone of peace," the statement said.

"The CARICOM delegation emphasized its commitment to the tenets of Article 2(4) of the UN Charter which calls on states to refrain from the threat or the use of force. CARICOM has been consistent in the critical importance it accords to the key principles of non-interference and non-intervention." CARICOM reaffirmed the view that there is an urgent need for meaningful dialogue leading to a peaceful internal solution for the Venezuelan people.

"The Caribbean Community is resolute in its belief that it is never too late for dialogue since the consequences of no dialogue will be dire," the statement said. (*)

Bahamas Court Issues Arrest Warrant for Canadian Fashion Mogul

A Supreme Court judge yesterday issued a bench warrant for the immediate arrest of Canadian fashion mogul Peter Nygard after he failed to appear in court for a third time to be sentenced for contempt.

Nygard was last year found guilty of contempt of court, after a judge found that he had dredged the sea floor between March and April 2015, and again in October of 2016, despite a June 2013 injunction prohibiting him from doing so.

After failing to appear last week, despite being so ordered by the court, Justice Cheryl Grant-Thompson gave Nygard one last chance to appear yesterday.

However, he did not show up.

One of Nygard's Canadian lawyers, Jay Prober, told the National Post newspaper that the arrest warrant was "grossly unfair" and "totally unnecessary." He said Nygard was unable to attend yesterday's hearing in person for medical reasons, but had offered to appear by video conference.

According to the newspaper, a Bahamian doctor yesterday filed an affidavit stating that the 77-year-old was unable to travel to The Bahamas due to poor health. According to that affidavit, Nygard flew to Winnipeg last Friday, but upon landing felt very dizzy and thought he was having a stroke.

"I do believe that the preliminary decision of his Canada-based physicians to ground him in Canada is in the best interest of his health," wrote Dr Lynwood Brown. "In particular, I believe that the air-pressure of flying at or over 30,000 feet in order to get to The Bahamas could be fatal."

Nygard has called The Bahamas home for three decades and has property and business interests there.

Save The Bays, a non-profit environmental organization, has brought litigation against him, alleging that he has doubled the size of his property at

to a nearby national park and a popular beach. P


