# **Grand Court Opening**

The new Governor of the Cayman Islands, His Excellency Martyn Roper was present, along with Deputy Governor Franz Manderson, and various government ministers. The RCIPS officers lined up in formation in front of the Grand Court building, ready for inspection by Chief Justice Anthony Smellie. The Chief Justice came out of the court building with the other court judges, in their formal red gowns and wigs. The barristers and other court officials stood on the steps outside the court to

have their photograph taken behind the judges, before filing back inside the court to listen to, and give the Court Opening speeches.

Pastor Jeff Jefferson opened in prayer. He thanked God for establishing such a sound judiciary and legal system here and he prayed that Justice would continue to be done in the Cayman Islands.

The first speech was by Acting Attornev General Reshma Sharma. She highlighted a number of significant events over the past year, as well as looked forward in anticipation to events taking place in 2019.

She began by noting the passing in November of Mr. Arthur Hunter, OBE, one of the founding members of Hunter & Hunter, now, Appleby (Cayman) Ltd, and founder of the Cayman Islands Law Society.

"On another note, my Lord, it is with sadness that we bid farewell to Justice Quin Q.C, after his many years of distinguished service in the Grand Court. The jury is still out on whether the title of the 'nicest man in the world' or 'nicest judge in the world' should be conferred upon Justice Quin," she said.

"Reflecting on the matters before the Courts over the past year, these ranged from challenges to the constitutionality of various legislative provisions, dis-

crimination under the Bill of Rights, a number of high-profile criminal cases, asylum and complex commercial matters.

"In 2018, a number of Sexual Harm Prevention Orders were issued by the Court, particularly in the cases of minors at risk of sexual harm. In August, the Penal Code was amended to provide for the retrospective application of such orders, further strengthening victim protection.

"Turning to the Summary Court, the Specialist Domestic Violence Court has now been fully implemented, with regular sittings in the Summary Court to deal with matters involving domestic violence and abuse."

Attorney Erik Bodden spoke next, on behalf of the Cayman Islands Legal Practitioners Association. Mr. Bodden spoke about the newly- formed Association, and the advantages of a single, consolidated professional body to represent Islands' legal practitioners.

In the next speech, Colin McKie, Consultant editor of the Cayman Islands Law Reports, spoke about the growing length of the annual law report volumes. This was, he said, due not only to an increasing number of judgements but also the increasing complexity of the cases. He noted the value of such judgements, even though it takes a lot of time to write them, because it helps not only legal professionals, but interested members of the public to understand the reasoning behind judgements. 📀

# Ground breaking for 6 new affordable homes in East End Government Ministers and members

of the National Housing Development Trust broke new ground - for a new development of six homes in East End, which is located behind East End Primary School. The new homes will be two and three bedroomed, with the price of the two-bedroomed homes at 110,000, and 125,000 for the three-bedroomed homes.

It has only been a few weeks since another ribbon-cutting event heralded the completion of 16 new affordable homes in in Bodden Town. In addition to the six new homes in East End there are plans to begin developing substantial areas of land in George Town, West Bay and North Side too.

Minister for Housing, Hon. Dwayne Seymour, said: "I am extremely happy to be here today to mark the National Housing Development Trust's return to East End. Following the successful relaunch of their Affordable Housing Initiative in Bodden Town Last year, it seemed only right for us to turn next to our neighbor in East End. It's been about nine years since the last twelve homes have been built on this site, and we have opted to continue our eastward

lies. We believe that this is an important part of this process, and it is the philosophy which inspired the relaunch of the affordable housing initiative. They also endorse the NHDT method of funding the new development from previous NHDT house sales. There is nothing more satisfying for a Government than being able to support and empower its citizens in this way."

Elected Member for East End Arden McLean got the affordable housing initiative going there a decade ago, by purchasing land. "When I bought this property ten years ago I had this vision, this dream...It is important that we build homes because home ownership is part of nation-building, and I believe it should be done by community ... and I believe that building this community en-

# **Update on Peaceful Protest by Cuban Migrants**

A group of eight Cuban migrants at the Immigration Detention Centre (IDC) refused food on Tuesday January 15, 2019.

This followed a peaceful protest that began a week ago concerning: immigration processing; access to free, bi-lingual attorneys; and a desire to be released into the community.

Acting Chief Immigration Officer Garfield Wong met with the migrants on-Thursday (10 January) and committed to addressing their concerns. Additional meetings with Immigration and other agencies will be planned.

As soon as the migrants refused food Her Majesty's Cayman Islands Prison Service, which is responsible for their care and custody, implemented its protocols for such situations. These include close observations and medical checks by Health Services Authority staff.

Officials also confirm that earlier this week they confiscated five mobile phones, which are prohibited for safety and security reasons, from the same group of migrants. All occupants of the IDC are able to make 10 mins of outgoing phone calls a week on a landline, but can receive incoming calls 24 hours a dav.

Mindful of the peaceful nature of the protest, immigration and prison officers are working closely to de-escalate matters as much as possible.

The group of eight detainees were among 11 who arrived in the Cayman Islands on 28 September 2018, when their boat got into distress in local waters on the way to Central America. Two persons from the group have already been repatriated to Cuba.

In early October 2018 the Immigration Detention Centre re-opened to ac-



commodate the group's arrival, following extensive renovations.

At the same time 10 migrants, who have been on-Island for a considerably longer period of time to accommodate

the Immigration process, remain on release in the community. For security reasons these persons have been subject to electronic monitoring since the release programme began in August 2018. 💎

tatouille-type pasta that helps you through 'Veganuary' (as it's currently trending in the UK) will be a welcome addition to your recipe book.

### Veggie/vegan pasta

Serves 2 (or one if you are really hungry!)



Tomatoes at the market

### <u>Ingredients</u>

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 2 local Japanese eggplants

• 2 local sweet bell peppers (capsicum) – I used one green and one red

- 2 large ripe tomatoes
- 1 small yellow onion,
- 1 clove garlic
- I tablespoon of tomato puree
- Pinch dried chilli
- Pinch dried oregano
- 1 tspn sugar
- Salt and pepperBunch of fresh basil, plus stalks
- 2 cups whole wheat pasta
- Good grating of parmesan or vegan

parmesan cheese (look for little boxes of the vegan variety in the chiller cabinet at Kirk Market)

#### <u>To make</u>

Finely chop onion. Chop eggplant lengthways and then inti 1cm slices. Chop the peppers into 1cm pieces. Grate garlic or finely chop. Finely chop the stalks of the basil. Add all these to a pan with the olive oil. Fry gently until the veg are softened for about 5 minutes. Chop tomatoes into 1cm pieces and add to pan along with a squirt of tomato puree, the chilli, oregano, sugar and a good

grind of salt and pepper. Add about a half cup of water and let simmer gently for about 10 minutes, adding more water to ensure it doesn't dry out.

Cook pasta according to packet instructions. Taste sauce and adjust seasoning (might need more salt/pepper/ sugar). Drain pasta when cooked but reserve about half a cup of the cooking liquid. Add pasta and reserved liquid to sauce. Stir. The sauce will thicken slightly. Serve in a bowl with a good grating of parmesan and finely chopped basil leaves. (?)

# MLA Calls for Study of Root Causes of Declining Social Conditions

With the Chief Justice highlighting the pressing need for more courtrooms at the Opening of the 2019 Session of the Grand Court this week (Wednesday, January 16, 2019), MLA Alva Suckoo is again raising the alarm that the social conditions of Caymanians are declining and has called on Government to address underlying causes with urgency.

Mr. Suckoo issued this call to action against the backdrop of the Social Mobility Motion recently debated in the Legislature and which failed to gain the support of the Government. The MLA's Social Mobility Motion had asked the Government to commission a study on the root causes of the barriers to Caymanians moving from one socio-economic strata to the next.

"This would include," he said, "understanding the root causes of increasing continue to dispense justice in these cases in a timely manner."

Commenting, Mr Suckoo said that he regards this statement as "a stark warning to the country that criminality has grown beyond the capability of the courts to dispense justice in a timely way and signals the breakdown of law and order on a widening scale."

Mr. Suckoo said that the Chief Justice's warning about the court's capacity to dispense justice in a timely way brought the need for the study his Motion had called for in sharper focus: "We now see these concerns highlighted by the Chief Justice," he said, adding: "I hope that while the Government essentially trivialized my Motion, they will pay close attention to the Chief Justice."

Turning to his disappointment that the Motion failed to win the Government's support, the MLA said that he had envisaged that the study would ultimately lead "to the creation of policies and initiatives to address the myriad existing social problems that serve as obstacles to Caymanians leading productive and happy lives."

progress of many Caymanians, despite the many development projects in progress and that promise so-called "trickle-down" benefits for everyone.

"Far too many people are not earning enough to sustain themselves and their families, many are not sufficiently educated and trained to be able to secure adequate wages, and far too many are turning to criminality," he said.

As a result of these declining social conditions, the MLA said, pressures are being felt in the court system, in the way we do business, in family life, and in the school system: "We see it every day—more and more people are showing up in the court system, serious crimes have become commonplace, cheap labour has become a requirement of doing business, and our children are leaving the school system unprepared to fend for themselves."

To rectify these declining social conditions, Mr. Suckoo said, a new approach was called for: "What is needed is a radical shift in thinking and in our approach. We can no longer simply react in an ad hoc fashion to every problem that is thrown at us," as that would inevitably "result in more courtrooms, a bigger prison, and a society where law and order is reduced to where we no longer feel safe and secure."


Mr. Suckoo decried this traditional reactive approach and appealed for a proactive mindset that would examine the root causes of social problems in order to gain a better understanding of what needs to be done to reverse the trends.

"Until we change our thinking and our approach, our social conditions will continue to deteriorate," Mr. Suckoo predicted, tracing the increasing demands for facilities at the court: "We went from needing a new courthouse and securing a new building, to needing three additional courtrooms not even a year into the new building's acquisition. If that doesn't concern the Government, then they are living in denial."

# **Premier and Cayman Delegation wrap up meetings in Europe**

Premier Hon Alden McLaughlin, Minister of Financial Services Hon. Tara Rivers, Attorney General Hon. Samuel Bulgin and the Cayman delegation wound up their meetings in Europe and planned to travel to New York over the weekend to speak at the Cayman Finance Breakfast Seminar where Mr. McLaughlin, and the delegation will continue to promote the Cayman Islands as a reliable and stable jurisdiction in which to do business.

As of Thursday, Premier McLaughlin, Minister Rivers and the delegation have had 10 meetings in Brussels, two in France and one meeting is scheduled tomorrow in Germany. On Monday, 14 January, the delegation met with Mr. David Boublil, Mr. Gints Freimanis and Ms. Emer Traynor. Mr. Boublil is a member of the Cabinet of Pierre Moscovici, the Commissioner for Economic and Financial Affairs. Taxation and Customs. Mr. Freimanis is a member of the Cabinet of Valdis Dombrovskis, whose responsibilities include Financial Services and Capital Markets. Ms. Traynor is Deputy Head of Unit at the Director General of Taxation and Customs Union (DG Taxud)

Also Monday the delegation met with representatives of the European Union Code of Conduct Group (COCG). The COCG is charged with assessing jurisdictions to determine whether they potentially have tax regimes that are harmful to EU Member States. Ms Fabizia Lapecorella, the Chair of the Code of Conduct Group participated via telephone as she was in Rome.

Other members of the Code of Conduct Group meeting with the Cayman Delegation were Mr. Andreas Strub, Mr. Aloys Rigaut, and Ms Emer Traynor, representing DG Taxud. The discussions focused on the commitments made by the Cayman Islands and our intention of continuing to meet all international global standards. Ms Lapecorella noted that she was aware of the excellent cooperation and engagement by the Cayman Islands.

In both meetings with the EU representatives the Premier and Minister Rivers, along with Mr. Bulgin, outlined the leading position of the Cayman Islands, over many years, in adhering to international standards regarding regulatory and tax cooperation as well as anti-money laundering and prevention of terrorist financing. More recently the Cayman Islands, along with many other financial centers, passed legislation to adopt and implement the new international standards on economic substance.

The EU representatives thanked the Premier and delegation for meeting with them and commented that the "good work and positive engagement" with the EU was appreciated. They noted that the legislation passed by the Cayman Islands and other jurisdictions in December 2018 is still being assessed by the Commission. However, they committed to advise the Cayman Islands technical team of the outcome once the assessment is completed.

Over the rest of the week in Brussels the delegation met with the Hungarian Permanent Representative as well as with the permanent representatives of Belgium, Cyprus, Luxemburg, Austria, Romania, Spain and the Netherlands.

In France meetings were held with Mr. Gael Perraud, Deputy Director of International Taxation and European Affairs, as well as with senior representatives of Secretariat General on European Affairs. The Secretariat is a department of the Prime Minister and deals with several matters including taxation and the OECD.

In all of these meetings the delegation reiterated the positive engagement by the Cayman Islands and the measures taken to address the concerns of the EU. The Premier also sought to understand whether there were issues that need clarifying or further discussion. In the meeting with the Netherlands the Pre-

mier and Minister raised concerns regarding the blacklist that was recently issued by the Netherlands Government, in particular the lack of engagement prior to the list being published and the rationale for including the Cayman Islands on the list.

On Friday the delegation travels to Germany for the final meeting in Europe after which they travel to New York.

Premier McLaughlin commented that "Whilst the EU delegation were not at this stage able to provide any insight on whether the Cayman Islands had passed muster and would avoid being blacklisted, they did not mention anything glaring that has so far concerned them.

"However, we are taking no chances. The extensive engagement throughout the week in Europe, at the EU level as well as with representatives of several member states, including the influential French and Germans, was important to help ensure that those in the EU Commission, and in some Member

States, who decide on these things, or who make recommendations to the decision makers, understand fully that we take our role as an international finance center seriously and that we will continue to adhere to the evolving international standards. It also assisted in a better understanding on where some states were in their thinking," he said.

Minister Rivers noted that "We have been directly engaging with the EU for almost two years, both at the technical as well as the political level, including some five visits by myself to Brussels and three for the Premier. We have worked with financial services partners at home in crafting the legislation and I am proud of the work we have done and for the support of Industry.

"In addition, we have consulted with the EU along the way to ensure that the elements that they were seeking to be in legislation were present. In short we are collectively doing what we can to maintain a vibrant financial services business for years to come," she said. 😚

# **Region Urged to Prepare for Possibility of Severe Dengue Outbreak**

that there could be an outbreak of the mosquito-borne dengue soon.

[CARPHA] has put the region on notice joint pains, and a characteristic skin tensified. rash. This illness can evolve to severe dengue, characterized by potentially deadly complications, such as internal haemorrhaging, intense and continuous abdominal pain or tenderness and persistent vomiting. In some cases, Dengue may be severe and cause death. Dengue and other mosquito-borne diseases threaten health, tourism, social and economic development, and a collaborative effort is required to reduce the spread of disease. Dengue remains a global health problem and like Zika and Chikungunya, there is no specific treatment for the disease. The Aedes aegypti mosquito vector, which spreads dengue, is present in all Caribbean territories. The measures used for controlling the spread of dengue are the same as those for Zika and Chikungunya as these diseases are also transmitted by the Aedes aegypti mosquito. With the arrival of the rainy season within a few months, CARPHA says mosquito control

The Caribbean Public Health Agency fever, headache, vomiting, muscle and and awareness activities need to be in-



It has therefore advised countries to implement enhanced measures to reduce mosquito breeding and prevent the spread of disease.

The last major regional outbreak occurred in 2009. Since then, the Region has experienced two large outbreaks of mosquito-borne diseases, Chikungunya in 2014 and Zika in 2016, which CAR-PHA said are unlikely to reoccur soon.

"Disease modelling, however, predicts that another regional outbreak of Dengue may occur in the near future. In 2018, Latin America showed an increase in the number of Dengue cases. More recently, the outbreak of Dengue in Jamaica has elevated the level of concern in other Caribbean islands," the agency said in a statement yesterday.

Dengue is a flu-like illness that affects infants, young children and adults. Symptoms typically begin four to ten days after infection, and include a high

It therefore advised Caribbean Ministries of Health to increase health promotion messages to prevent mosquitos biting and breeding; combine efforts with communities to eliminate mosquito breeding sites; intensify vector surveillance and control; and disseminate appropriate clinical care and treatment guidelines.

The most effective way to avoid becoming ill from viruses spread by mosquitoes is to prevent mosquito bites. Research carried out by CARPHA and the Pan American Health Organization/ World Health Organization (PAHO/ WHO) show that drums and tyres are the main mosquito breeding sources in our countries.

"We all need to clean up our surroundings. The two most important things to manage mosquito populations in our Caribbean countries are to manage water storage drums and tanks, and properly dispose of used vehicle tyres to prevent mosquitos breeding," said Dr

James Hospedales, Executive Director of CARPHA.

Actions that can be taken include covering drums and tanks, cleaning the guttering, removing stagnant water sources, such as old tyres, bottles and buckets, and individuals protecting themselves and their family from bites. Infants, young children, older adults and women who are pregnant or trying to get pregnant should take extra precautions to avoid mosquito bites by using insect repellents containing DEET, Picaridin, IR 3535, and Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus. CARPHA added that individuals would also do well to work together with family, friends and neighbours to destroy breeding sites in and around their homes and communities to achieve total community impact. 😚




