UK to rule Caribbean waves again?

It might not be a case of Britannia ruling the waves again, but the UK is clearly keen on plotting a course for possible Caribbean anchorage.

A recent article circulating in British press suggesting that the UK government is looking at setting up naval bases in the Caribbean post-Brexit has caused a wave of reaction in one of the possible locations hinted at. Dengue Prevention and Awareness Urged

Local health officials are urging Cayman Islands residents to be aware of the symptoms of dengue as a precaution following increased activity in the region.

With the frequency of travel between the Cayman Islands and other destinations in the region, the likelihood of imported cases is a strong possibility. The Public Health Department has already initiated response measures to contain the situation should it arrive to our shores. Key interventions include continued

active surveillance, infection prevention and control and risk communications.

"Currently there is no report or evidence indicating any cases of Dengue Fever in the Cayman Islands, however the risk is considered high due to the high level of travel between the Cayman Islands and neighboring territories, currently being impacted by Dengue Fever," said Acting Chief Medical Officer and Medical Officer for Health Dr Samuel Williams-Rodriguez.

He added, "In this regard, there is the need to amplify surveillance for early detection and appropriate response, and to increase awareness among the general population on ways to prevent, and /or protect against introduction and spread of the mosquito borne disease."


Dengue is a mosquito-borne viral disease transmitted by female *Aedes aegypti* mosquitoes. Symptoms of the disease include the acute onset of high fever and at least two of the following:

- Severe frontal headache
- Joint pain
- Pain behind the eyes
- Muscle and or bone pain

• A rash (sometimes) may be visible two to five days after the onset of fever

Nausea or vomiting (sometimes)

• Signs of bleeding (such as: pinpoint red or purple spots on the skin, nosebleed, bleeding gums, blood in urine or stool, or vaginal bleeding) are seen in a severe form of dengue fever known as dengue hemorrhagic fever, severe dengue or dengue shock syndrome.




that involves weekly monitoring of potential cases of mosquito borne illness reported by public and private physicians that has proven very sensitive when it comes to detecting dengue cases, Dr. Williams-Rodriguez notes.

All residents and visitors experiencing symptoms of dengue after travelling to a country with established transmission of dengue should immediately see a doctor and report their travel history.

Minister for Health Hon. Dwayne Seymour voiced his appreciation for the highly sensitive detection system of the Public Health, and underscored the importance of personal responsibility to avoid mosquito bites: "The Cayman Islands to date has only experienced imported cases. At the same time, the number of cases in the region is rising. As such, persons visiting countries with established transmission should take mosquito bite prevention measures when outdoors at all times."

These measures include wearing long sleeves, long pants and mosquito bite repellent containing at least 50% DEET. Persons should also eliminate potential *Aedes aegypti* breeding grounds by turning over sources of standing water around their homes and other buildings.

In addition, the Mosquito Research and Control Unit will continue its own surveillance efforts, and ongoing work to identify and eliminate *Aedes aegypti* breeding grounds around the Islands. Over the last three years, the Cayman Islands experienced three imported and one locally transmitted case of dengue in 2016, no cases in 2017 and two imported cases in 2018.

Town hall meeting set for concerned Caymanians

A group of local people all concerned with the way Cayman is being developed are putting on an event for the public on Saturday 19th January at the South Sound Community Centre from 12 to 4pm to help the public better understand the issues that they believe need to be given far more input by residents.

The 'Cayman 2020 – Visualising Our Future' event will be a town hall community event and is supported by a whole range of community groups all keen to protect Cayman's environment, including the National Trust, CCMI, Saved the Cove, Save Barkers, Save Cayman and CPR (Cruise Port Referendum) Cayman.

Participating groups will be presenting on a range of topics including sustainable development, tourism, social wellbeing and community development, and environmental conservation efforts and legislation.

According to organiser, Katrina Jurg, founder member of the CPR Cayman group which is pushing for a referendum on the Port development, the event has been put together following the support the CPR Cayman group say they received once they began speaking to people about the referendum.

"Throughout the process of engaging the public on this issue we engaged the public on much wider issues - a lot of people have brought a lot of issues to our attention and people are very concerned about the direction the country is going in: a lack of vision; a lack of planning; a lack of national development plan; a lack of consultation," she said.

"There's a disconnect between what Caymanians want for the future and what the government wants for the future," she continued. "If you just look at the new year's addresses, the Speaker is talking about building 50 storey skyscrapers and the Premier says they are moving forward with the cruise berthing facility completely ignoring the peoples' referendum that is in process."

Ms Jurg said that throughout the process of campaigning for a referendum,



organisers noticed a sense of disconnect among the community, whereby people were seeking the ability to come together to plan for the future. As a result, Ms Jurn said that they were encouraging people to come together to visualise Cayman's future at the meeting and help to begin planning for it.

"We understand the need for unity as we all want to live in a Cayman that is safe, clean, environmentally protected and demonstrates stability, participatory democracy, sound financial management and good governance. Cayman 2020 we hope will be the start of a new era of greater community involvement in building a better Cayman for all citizens and residents," she confirmed.

Ms Jurg underscored the importance of their movement when she said that the various topical issues impacting us all today had the potential to negatively impact current and future generations in a myriad of ways. These concerns included environmental, socio-economic and long-term financial concerns, she said.

Admission to the South Sound Community Centre event is free and is open to the general public. At 4pm there will also be a free showing of Rebirth, which Ms Jung described as a compelling documentary made by university students in the United States discussing the continuing war between development and conservation.

Ms Jung confirmed that CPR Cayman were "very close" to presenting the petition to government calling for a referendum on the port development.

Heroes Day 2019 will Celebrate Coat of Arms Brokers

Vestrymen and Justices of the Peace who were instrumental in getting into place the Coat of Arms for the Cayman Islands will be honoured at the 2019 Heroes Day celebrations.

The Cayman Islands is in the midst of Celebrate Cayman, which recognises the 14 May 1958 conferral 60 years ago of the Cayman Islands' Coat of Arms by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Cabinet has approved that the theme for the 2019 Heroes Day celebrations, "Celebrating the Creation of our Coat of Arms", replace the previous theme, "Pioneers in Maritime Heritage". Those Maritime pioneers will be recognised in the 2021 Heroes Day ceremony.

Our Coat of Arms is the Cayman Islands' first internationally recognised symbol of identity and its rich imagery tells the story of who we are, our history, our culture, our earliest industries, our constitutional relationship and our faith.

"The grant of the Coat of Arms represents the seminal moment that started the chain of events that placed the Cayman Islands on the path to modernity," said Premier Hon. Alden McLaughlin.

To mark the occasion, there has been a year-long calendar filled with activities that are focused on engaging, educating, and inspiring youth; celebrating our diversity and encouraging connection; establishing a spirit of cultural community; and discovering the Cayman Islands'

colourful history, and engendering national pride.

"The National Heroes Day is a highlight of our cultural calendar each year. The Ministry looks forward to working with the Protocol Office to ensure the 2019 event comes together adeptly and that the pioneers who saw the Coat of Arms instated, are duly recognised," said Minister for Culture Hon. Dwayne Seymour.

Key milestones followed the grant of the Coat of Arms, including the First Constitution on 4 July 1959, and the choice to remain part of the United Kingdom following Jamaica's decision to become independent in 1962. These milestones were fundamental to the development of the Cayman Islands that



we know and love today and were built on the foundation of the Coat of Arms, our symbol of national identity.

The granting of the Constitution will be the theme of the 2020 National Heroes Day. 🟈

Solar energy won't burn a hole in your pocket

The cost of living in the Cayman Islands is extremely high and many will attest that their electricity bills are a big drain on their monthly income, sometimes running into the thousands in the summer time.

That is why fitting solar panels is becoming increasingly popular and in recent years has become more affordable. Fitting solar panels used to be an ideal but expensive option, but the way things are going it will soon become a necessity. Yes, fitting solar panels can cost tens of thousands of dollars, but they are becoming far more cost-effective. The necessity to fit them increases every year.

Alarmingly, the fossil fuels we depend on to power many aspects of our lives will only continue to rise in cost as supplies dwindle. Electricity is already very costly in Cayman, and as small Caribbean nations don't have the bargaining power of much larger nations, they will be the hardest hit as oil reserves dwindle. Finding alternative sources of en-

ergy is vital and various businesses in Cayman are specialising in exactly this.

Industry improvements

Significant improvements are being made in the solar energy industry every year and the Cayman Islands is the perfect location to harness the power of the sun. Solar energy is harvested in two ways: solar photovoltaic (PV), which converts sunlight into electricity and solar thermal which heats water. Solar PV systems come in thin films, panels or tiles and are usually placed on roofs. These require little maintenance and should last 25-30 years.

Home energy storage systems use intelligent technology to power your home if you need to be off the grid to save energy. These systems are also handy during a power outage or hurricane.

Many people are signing up for the Caribbean Utilities Company initiative called the Consumer Owned Renewable Energy (CORE) Programme, whereby CUC will buy alternative energy from independent

> sources. CUC has proved it is moving with the times with its first solar farm in the Cayman Islands, created in 2017. Although a modest size, it was a historic event.

> The 5Mega-Watt Bodden Town Solar Farm generates enough electricity for 800 homes and substantially reduces diesel fuel consumption.

> In its National Energy Policy 2017-2037, the Cayman Islands government has set a target of 70 percent of total electric-

ity generation to come from renewable sources by 2037. There's a big job ahead as the only non-oil energy source in the Cayman Islands is a small amount of solar power; well, now a little more with Bodden Town Solar Farm online. In 2015, renewable energy accounted for only 0.9 percent of electricity generation.

Why choose solar power?

Energy costs have increased dramatically in the last decade and evidence suggests that those costs will continue to spiral upward.

Tariff programmes supported by government such as CUC's CORE programme provide competitive payback terms and the security of remaining connected to the country's main energy supply. Twenty-five-year contracts are available to purchase the power produced from your rooftop.

The cost for renewable energy systems continues to decrease, and manufacturing systems for solar systems continues to produce better quality

products. The financial returns from investing in for example, Greentech Solar's SunPower solar system ranges from 10-15 percent annually; with a 250-300 percent total return on investment over 25 years. This equates to an average \$400-450 a month saving for a 10kW SunPower system or \$200-225 a month for a 5kW SunPower system.

Adding solar power to your commercial or residential property is becoming the environmentally right thing to do.

A solar-powered pool pump will reduce your yearly electric bill by as much as 20 percent.

Will solar panels last in this environment?

Solar panels are salt and humidity tested to ultimate limit levels to endure environments as harsh as in the Cayman Islands. They are warranted for 25-30 years depending on the manufacturers.

Indices of Good Governance

Discussion about good governance, what it is and how it can measured has been ongoing for decades and has been made more robust by the empirical work done by the World Bank and other global institutions and think tanks.

As the World Bank itself says, there is a growing and accepted recognition of the link between good governance and successful development. Because of this, the demand and expectation that the quality of good governance be measured, has grown over time. The comparative information provided by the World Bank in its databases has grown considerably, and even though there are no surprises as to which countries are at the bottom and which are at the top, the information is invaluable, in spite of growing criticisms over issues of research methodology.

The World Bank says that 'Governance consists of the traditions and institutions by which authority in a country is exercised. This includes the process by which governments are selected, monitored and replaced; the capacity of the government to effectively formulate and implement sound policies; and the



respect of citizens and the state for the institutions that govern economic and social interactions among them'.

This brief article merely summarizes the World Bank's Worldwide Governance Indicators six key dimensions of governance: Voice and Accountability, Political Stability and Lack of Violence, Government Effectiveness, Regulatory Quality, Rule of Law, and Control of Corruption used between 1996 and present.

I quote verbatim the World Bank's definition for each of these indices. 'Voice and accountability captures perceptions of the extent to which a country's citizens are able to participate in selecting their government, as well as freedom of expression, freedom of association, and a free media'. Therefore, this dimension looks at the extent to which citizens have a voice and the whether or not their voices are heard. It considers the level of transparency of the policy-making process, the quality of the electoral process and the extent to which public officials are held accountable for their actions- or non-action.

'Political Stability and Absence of Vi-

olence/Terrorism measures perceptions of the likelihood of political instability and/ or politically motivated violence, including terrorism'.

The World Bank explains further that this dimension, political stability and absence of violence, measures 'Perceptions of the likelihood that the government will be destabilized or overthrown by unconstitutional or violent means, including politically-motivated violence and terrorism'.

'Government effectiveness captures perceptions of the quality of public services, the quality of the civil service and the degree of its independence from political pressures, the quality of policy formulation and implementation, and the credibility of the government's commitment to such policies'. This includes areas such as the quality of the civil service and the extent of bureaucracy, the quality and extent of education available to citizens, the health care and transportation system and so on.

'Regulatory quality captures perceptions of the ability of the government to formulate and implement sound policies and regulations that permit and promote private sector development'. These include ease of starting new businesses, investment freedom, level of burden of government regulations, environmental regulation, legal and regulatory frameworks, etcetera.

In "Rule of Law", the World Bank includes several indicators, which measure 'the extent to which agents have confidence in and abide by the rules of society. These include perceptions of the incidence of crime, the effectiveness and predictability of the judiciary, and the enforceability of contracts. Together, these indicators measure the success of a society in developing an environment in which fair and predictable. These rules form the basis for economic and social interactions, and importantly, the extent to which property rights are protected'.

'Control of Corruption captures perceptions of the extent to which public power is exercised for private gain, including both petty and grand forms of corruption, as well as "capture" of the state by elites and private interests'. These include perceptions of public trust in their politicians, overall levels of corruption in government, levels of corruption between civil servants and citizens, diversion of public goods, the extent of corruption among members of the judiciary, and so on.

We will examine these further in subsequent discussions. P

Mahomes and Brees only MVP tips

The two primary NFL Most Valuable Player candidates return to the gridiron in the divisional round after earning first-round byes.

This weekend, Drew Brees of the New Orleans Saints and Kansas City's Patrick Mahomes have opportunities to extend their terrific seasons at home against the sixth-seeded teams in their respective conferences.

Brees faces the Philadelphia Eagles for the second time this season at the Superdome on Sunday, while Mahomes and the Chiefs play host to the Indianapolis Colts Saturday afternoon.

While there are a few other players left in the postseason worthy of being in the MVP discussion, the two quarterbacks distanced themselves from the other contenders with their play during the regular season.



Drew Brees has only had five interceptions

It's hard to argue against Mahomes as the favourite to win MVP in only his second NFL season.

The Texas Tech product, who took over for Alex Smith in the Chiefs offense during the offseason, totalled 5,097 passing yards and 50 touchdowns in the regular season.

Although the Chiefs didn't look like the best team in the NFL down the stretch, Mahomes still produced solid offensive numbers.

In the December defeats to the Los Angeles Chargers and Seattle Seahawks, he threw for 516 yards and five touchdowns while turning the ball over once on a fumble.

Mahomes capped the regular season by helping the Chiefs secure home-field advantage in the AFC with his 14th multiple-touchdown performance.

The only games in which the 23-year-old failed to throw for a score came in Weeks 4 and 5 against Denver and Jacksonville, and he still threw for 300 yards in both contests.

Outside of the stats, Mahomes passed the eye test with his playmaking ability on the field, including the different angles at which he completed throws.

His remarkable first season as a starting quarterback in the NFL landed him a spot on the Associated Press All-Pro Team.

What's significant about the All-Pro voting is Mahomes earned 45 of the 50 first-team quarterback votes, which could foreshadow a large margin on the MVP ballot.

Brees is the only true challenger to Mahomes in the MVP discussion, and that's saying something given the seasons players such as

Philip Rivers, Aaron Donald and others put together.

Unfortunately for the future Hall of Fame quarterback, he'll likely come up short of achieving the honour.

Brees could have tipped the voting in his favour while the Chiefs struggled to lock up the No. 1 seed in the AFC, but he threw three touchdowns and three interceptions in his last four games.

The uncharacteristic stretch from the 39-year-old meant he ended the regular season with 3,992 passing yards and 32 touchdowns.

Had he elevated those totals closer to 4,500 yards and 40 touchdowns while leading the Saints to the No. 1 seed in the NFC, Brees could have had a better chance of knocking off Mahomes.

By his incredibly high standards, the veteran's numbers were average, as his yardage total was the 13th-highest in his career and the touchdown count was tied for his ninth-best output.

The one category in which Brees drastically improved is interceptions, as he was picked off on only five occasions in 16 regular-season games.

The interception total was his lowest in a full season as starter and just the third single-digit mark he's recorded in his career.

Although Brees deserves to be in the conversation with Mahomes, he just doesn't have the eye-popping numbers to warrant many first-place votes, which is why the MVP voting could be as lopsided as the All-Pro ballot.

Curry nears 3-point record

It's just Steph Curry's tenth season in the NBA but he is already near the top three of the all-time 3-point leaders, despite the random way he seems to get his game time.

The Golden State Warriors star, who has buried 2,277 triples in only 654 games, needs just six more treys to surpass Jason Terry, who had 2,282 three-pointers, for third place all-time. With the pace he is going, Curry is touted to eventually overtake Ray Allen (2,973) and Reggie Miller (2,560).





Ole Gunnar Solskjaer has made such an impression at Manchester United that most of the first-team squad want him to be named the club's permanent manager, according to reports.

The Norwegian has



You'd think by now —after four-straight NBA Finals appearances — that the Warriors would know exactly how to utilize Curry.

That, though, is still a work in progress.

Warriors coach Steve Kerr has started playing Curry in the beginning of the second and fourth quarters, and then taking him out midway through the fourth. While he has put Curry back in late in the game on occasion — he re-entered their overtime loss to the Houston Rockets last week with less than four minutes left in regulation — he has generally sat.

That change, though, has come with mixed results. The Warriors are 5-4 since making that change. There are a

lot of factors that have gone into that record, but it's still interesting to note the change during that time.

Kerr, though, thinks the criticism surrounding that move is "ironic," as Curry is actually playing more minutes in the fourth quarter now than he was before.

"He's done a great job of handling it," Kerr said. "It may not be ideal for him. But he understands this is the best thing for us right now. We have to put the best groups together." five since being named Jose Mourinho's temporary successor on December 19, with the Reds netting 16 goals during his tenure to date.

Paul Pogba was a shadow of the player who drove France to World Cup success in the summer under Mourinho but Solskjaer has reinvigor-

ated the 25-year-old. Marcus Rashford has enjoyed an upturn in form, scoring three times under Solskjaer, to assert himself as the Reds' first-choice centre-forward.

Reports are that Tottenham manager Mauricio Pochettino heads United's list of targets for the position of permanent manager, but the players would be happy to see Solskjaer become the fourth manager since Sir Alex Ferguson's retirement in 2013.

Paul Pogba's form has improved since Mourinho's departure

Meanwhile, United have offered Atlético Madrid defender Diego Godin a contract with \$5 million signing on fee for two seasons to lure him to Old Trafford. Inter Milan are also reported to be in the running for the Uruguay international. Mourinho was left frustrated by the club's decision to veto a move for a centre-back in the summer, with Tottenham's Toby Alderweireld deemed to not represent value for the \$52 million fee quoted by Spurs at the age of 29.

UK TO RULE CARIBBEAN WAVES AGAIN?

The UK is currently scheduled to formally start uncoupling itself from the EU as of March 29th this year following the outcome of the 2016 referendum and its controversial and complicated aftermath.

Although Mr Williamson himself did not identify any specific locations, the Sunday Telegraph report suggested the possibilities included Singapore or Brunei in the South China Sea and Montserrat or Guyana in the Caribbean.

Mr Williamson's Caribbean military outlook for the UK has its supporters as well as detractors, even in Montserrat which was reportedly hinted by one of his officials.

To date there hasn't been any official comment from the Donaldson Romeo-led People's Democratic Movement government of Montserrat on the matter.

However, there has been much social media-driven debate on perceptions of the pros and cons of such a possibility for the island which still struggling to regain its economic footing following the devastation caused by the eruption of its Soufriere Hills volcano over twenty years ago.

The once budget-aid-free Overseas Territory is now heavily reliant on UK financial and technical support.

Some supporters for a military base see it as the economic boost that has been evading Montserrat since the eruptions.

Sceptics cite militarisation of the Caribbean and fears of further social disruption locally, with some even raising concerns about neo-colonialism.

This is not the first time this issue of a possible permanent UK naval presence Montserrat or other Overseas Territories has surfaced in recent years.

It came up in 2017, when UK response was being analysed in the aftermath of extensive hurricane destruction on several of the Caribbean Overseas Territories.

Although Montserrat escaped relatively unscathed then, it was nevertheless mentioned as a possible site for a

permanent British naval presence in the region, with a main aim of quicker disaster response.

At that time Sir Henry Bellingham, a former minister for Africa, the Caribbean and the Overseas Territories who chairs the UK Parliament's All-Party Group on the Commonwealth, had suggested Montserrat or the British Virgin Islands as possible sites.

But his rationale extend beyond disaster response.

He argued that "if the Dutch and French can have at least about four ships on base in their Caribbean territories at a time, the UK can do better than that."

Speaking during an interview on the UK's Channel 4 News alongside Bermuda's Premier David Burt assessing the British response to the 2017 hurricanes he stated:

"We could even have a permanent naval base in say Montserrat or the BVI that we can actually step-up our presence both in terms of not just this particular relief programme but also in terms of promoting trade post-Brexit, and also making a statement to the six territories that we are actually their partner and their friend for the long term.

He also posited that "there are now different cruise terminals that are deep water anchorages. And actually putting together a permanent naval base whether permanent 60 or 70 marines manning that base gives us a permanent presence (...) which will also absolutely increase and enhance our presence in the region for boosting trade, and also relations with other countries where the Queen is also Head of State and where the UK has great relationships."

Once outside the EU, the UK will hardly have any alternative but to 'think global' by extending its soft-power touch while asserting itself as a leader, or at least a player of note, for economic power and military prowess.

With Brexit looming some slippage is already being reported in its global economic powerhouse ranking from fifth, down to a possible seventh place.

Coinciding with this are renewed signs of strategic global trade, political outreach and global military expansionism by several competing powers, including in the Caribbean. This is evidenced by intensified diplomatic maneuverings in the Latin America and Caribbean region by Russia and China especially.

These are seen as are more than mere ripples on the surface of a high stakes jostling for position and influence in a new global power realignment.

Once again by sheer force of its critical geographical location, the Caribbean - which has seen its geopolitical status as a zone of interest decline post-Cold War - could again be the playing field, if not stomping ground of competing foreign powers.

This is already taking shape in the backyard of the United States - and very near its front lawn in a sense. The same goes for the United Kingdom and its territorial interests in the region, both post-Brexit and as it reviews its relationship with its Overseas Territories including those in the Caribbean.

The UK looking at setting up naval or other type of permanent military presence in the region, might have more justification - and opportunity - beyond disaster relief, drugs interdiction and the projection of 'soft power'.
