This encouraged the youth, and they prepared to give the money to the Hurricane Dorian relief effort by purchasing essential items on Amazon to be delivered to a distribution outpost in the Bahamas. The fact that they raised so much money, including an additional \$65 on Sunday, made them decide to give some of it to the Red Cross effort here as well.

All in all, the experience has served two purposes. First, it has allowed these youth to learn the importance of giving to others in need. 
emergency services, enforcement and education as they relate to road safety in the Cayman Islands.



CAYMAN ISLANDS FUEL MARKET ASSESSMENT COMMENCES

Economics Partners Limited were selected last month by Of-Reg following an open competitive bid process by the Central Procurement Office to perform the assessment of the fuels market across the Cayman Islands, and the assessment is expected to be completed within six months.

The Fuel Market Definition and Economic and Regulatory Assessment will deliver the fol-

- A definition of the fuels market in the Cayman Islands which will identify the products that fall within the relevant markets in the sector, and the way those markets behave:
- · An assessment of the market(s) in the Cayman Islands. This will include analysis of the impact of the supply chain, logistics and infrastructure on the proper functioning of the market, with a view to understand the extent and the effectiveness of competition in the market(s);
- · Recommendations to address issues identified at the assessment phase of the project, which will be designed to enhance competition in the sector. Recommendations will be made following a consultation process with stakeholders, including fuels providers, busi-

ernment.

An assessment of the state of competition was identified as a pre-condition for OfReg to fulfill its mandate of effectively regulating the fuel sector. Effective regulations designed to enhance performance ensures competition, transparency, efficiency and innovation in the fuels market(s).

Mr Duke Munroe, Executive Director of Fuels at OfReg, said: "I am pleased to announce to the public that the necessary foundation work that will allow the Office to effectively regulate the fuels market(s) across the Cayman Islands is underway. We fully understand the public's concern about the price of fuel at the pumps, and this assessment will allow us to establish the framework to balance the dynamics of the various factors that influence the fuel market and ultimately, prices at the pump. It will further allow us to identify the appropriate regulatory remedies and intervention measures needed to fix market failures where they exist."

The fuels sector emerged into the full 'economic' regulatory space in the Cayman Islands at the time OfReg was formed. Prior to this, while safety and compliance regulations existed, there was limited regulatory oversight carried out by the former Petroleum Inspector-

... Continued story ness users, the public and govate, in respect of competition in the market(s). This assessment therefore represents the first major step towards appropriate and effective regulation of the economic aspects of the fuels market(s).

OfReg invited bids locally and internationally, which were judged against criteria relating to the quality of the methodology proposed, the expertise, experience and achievements of the bidder, price and timeframe. The team of professionals at Economics Partners, has very considerable experience in performing market studies of this kind across the world, including in jurisdictions similar to the Cayman Islands. 🏵

Government commits to beneficial ownership register

In a statement issued this week, Government has announced that it will advance Cayman's laws to introduce a public register of beneficial ownership information when these types of registers become the international standard and at least implemented by EU Member States by 2023.

"We recognise and fulfil our responsibility to the globally interconnected financial system to prevent the use of our jurisdiction for hiding and transferring illicit funds around the world," a release from Government read.

Government went on to say that such a move needed to be undertaken by many other countries in order to have an impact.

"In such a globally interconnected framework, transparency standards had to be widely adopted and effectively implemented in order to have a tangible impact," it said. "The United Kingdom has been a leader in championing such standards, and the European Union has further advanced these principles in the EU fifth Anti-Money Laundering Directive (5th AMLD). We support these principles and commit to further develop the accessibility and transparency of our systems for beneficial ownership of companies consistent with emerging international standards."

Government also confirmed that this commitment was made "with due regard to the protection of and proportionate safeguards for fundamental rights of individuals, in particular the right to privacy, the protection of personal data and the presumption of innocence."

The Government's intention to introduce a public register of beneficial ownership is in line with evolving standards and international obligations such as those reflected in the principles of the EU 5th Anti Money Laundering Direc-

tive and follows the announcement of similar moves made earlier this year by the British Crown Dependencies.

"The commitment to introduce publicly accessible registers on a timeline that reflects the development and evolution of public registers in the UK and EU confirms our ongoing commitment to meeting international standards, and to adapting proactively as global best practice evolves," a Government statement read.

Premier Alden McLaughlin said the Government had committed to introduce a public register of company beneficial ownership when it becomes an international standard and that time was now approaching.

"The introduction of the UK's public beneficial ownership register, the EU 5th Anti Money Laundering Directive and similar actions by other jurisdictions represents a shift in the global standard and the practices used to combat illicit activity," he confirmed. "I am proud that the Cayman Islands has worked so well with law enforcement and tax authorities the world over, and that the level of transparency of our regime has been recognised by key international bodies and other governments. The timeline we have announced today recognises the work necessary to create a register that is sufficiently robust, capable of suitable levels of interoperability and that will avoid the redesigns that the UK now has to undertake."

Minister of Financial Services Tara Rivers said these plans reinforced Cayman's standing as a leading International Financial Centre and Cayman's commitment to global best practice.

"It is appropriate that other jurisdictions with developed financial services industries follow suit, and we will make every effort to support the global devel-

opment and implementation of evolving international standards in this area. We stand ready to work collaboratively with other jurisdictions as a common approach emerges in the design and maintenance of verified beneficial ownership registers," she stated.

Cayman Finance issued a statement in favour of the move.

"Cayman Finance supports the decision by the Cayman Islands Government to introduce a public register of beneficial ownership in line with evolving global standards and practices within a timeframe that aligns with UK legislation and the EU 5th Anti Money Laundering Directive," it said.

"The Cayman Islands' position as a premier global financial hub is based, in part, on our industry's long-standing commitment to the highest global standards for transparency and cross-border cooperation with tax and law enforcement authorities. That commitment has

contributed significantly to the Cayman Islands achieving the same OECD rating for transparency as countries like the UK, US, Germany, Canada and Australia.

Cayman, it said, was already ahead of the game in this respect, having had its own system of verifying beneficial ownership for a good while.

"Our industry has also actively supported Cayman's verified ownership regime for more than 15 years even though verification of ownership information is not yet a standard achieved by most other jurisdictions, who still rely on less accurate registers of self-reported information," it said.

The association said now that the UK and EU were establishing an emerging global standard for ownership registers to be public, the Cayman Islands financial services industry would work closely with the Cayman Islands Government to ensure Cayman met that standard also.

Minister Hew Addresses Mare Forum of Shipping Sector Leaders

The Minister for Commerce, Planning and Infrastructure, Hon. Joey Hew was the keynote speaker at the Mare Forum on Friday, 27 September.

The Mare Forum conferences take place across the world and are regarded as highly influential for key players in the maritime and shipping industries. They host prestigious discussions and debates relating to current and future issues pertaining to the sector.

The theme for the Superyacht Europe 2019 conference held in Monaco was: What's next in yachting?

The high-profile symposium gave Minister Hew a platform to stress that the Cayman Islands is open for business and will continue to grow the portfolio of mega yachts that operate under the Cayman Red Standard.

"A huge cross-section of powerful industry voices came together at this prestigious forum to share views and debate business strategy alongside policy-makers," Minister Hew explains.

He adds: "Everyone from yacht owners to maritime lawyers, marine equipment manufacturers and industry regulators is able to voice an opinion. This makes it a highly useful exercise for us to participate in, as we seek to maintain our position at the forefront of this important industry."

The Cayman Islands has the top-rated shipping registry in the world, with the most experienced staff of the flag states in the yachting industry. An efficient registration system and competitive pricing structure, coupled with highly specialised service providers, contribute to the Cayman Islands being the preferred choice for discerning ship owners.

In his speech, Minister Hew noted that the Cayman Islands is continually updating legislation and introducing innovations, which enhance safety. These also help to make the industry sustainable, by promoting improvements such as helping prevent pollution.

He emphasised how the highly-skilled technical staff at the Registry has, for more than two decades, been involved in the majority of the largest new-build yacht projects in the world.

Under the leadership of Maritime Authority of the Cayman Islands (MACI), which falls under the remit of the Ministry of International Trade, Investment, Aviation and Maritime Affairs (MITIAMA), the Cayman Registry team is able to offer the best possible advice to owners and find actionable solutions to new yacht designs, without compromising on quality or safety.

The Cayman Islands also recently qualified for continuance in the United

States Coastguard's Quality Shipping for the 21st Century (QUALSHIP 21) Programme for the ninth consecutive year.

"I am glad that we had the opportunity to provide Governor Roper with an understanding of some of what we do here at the Department of Agriculture," Mr Estwick said.



Asylum Seekers Win Right to Remain in Cayman

Two recent asylum appeals before the Immigration Appeals Tribunal have been granted and both individuals have been granted refugee status. HSM acted for the asylum seekers after their initial applications had been rejected. In two detailed Judgments, the Immigration Appeals Tribunal accepted that both individuals would likely suffer persecution due to their political beliefs if they were to be returned to their home country.

HSM Lawyer for the asylum seekers, Alastair David, reflected upon the fullness of the hearing afforded the

applicants and the detailed reasoning provided by the Immigration Appeals Tribunal. "It is clear that the Government's efforts in ensuring compliance with all applicable standards, are bearing fruit. Opposition urges Government to reconsider Referendum date

Leader of the Opposition, Hon. V. Arden Mclean expressed his disappointment with Governments plans to hold the Cruise Berthing referendum on December 19th, 2019. Speaking on behalf of the Official Opposition, Mr. Mclean pointed to the announced date as the worst possible time that the Government could have chosen to hold the referendum.

With many voters travelling for the holidays, and everyone caught up in Christmas activities, Mr. Mclean feels that the Government is attempting to manipulate the vote in order to discourage people from fully participating in the process. Mr. Mclean stated:

Mr. Mclean also pointed to the extremely short time voters will have in order to apply for, and be allowed to vote by, postal ballots, he considers it very unfair for the Government to now mobilize civil servants who have worked extremely hard throughout the year and subject them to more time away from their families throughout the holiday season.

Overtourism: At What Point Is There **Too Much Tourism?**

Tourism forms the backbone of many economies; in fact, it is one of the largest industries in the world. It has brought wealth to forgotten rural communities, cushioned the blow of financial crashes, conserved critically endangered species and restored crumbling, historic cities. And, while tourism's benefits are indisputably clear, at what point does a destination experience too much tourism or 'overtourism' - and it becomes an existential risk to the destination?

What is 'overtourism'?

'Overtourism' is a relatively new term in the public and academic debate on the negative effects that emerge from the presence of too many tourists at certain places and times. "Too many" is a subjective term, of course, but it is defined in each destination by residents, hosts, business owners and tourists. It describes the situation in which the impact of tourism, exceeds physical, ecological, social, economic, psychological, and/or political capacity thresholds.

When rent prices push out local tenants to make way for vacation rentals, that is 'overtourism'. When narrow roads become jammed with tourist vehicles, that is 'overtourism'. When wildlife is scared away, when tourists cannot view landmarks because of the crowds, when fragile environments become degraded - these are all signs of 'overtourism'. There are many examples where the cultural and natural heritage of a place is at risk, or where costs of living and real estate have substantially increased and caused a decline in quality of life.



'Overtourism' is a complex phenomenon. And, you may be surprised to hear some of the many contributing factors

to 'overtourism', and of course these will vary from destination to destination. Airbnb has been used as somewhat of a scapegoat, as hundreds of beds have suddenly been made available, without being subject to any kind of planning. Hosts can undercut nearby hotels, rooms open in already-saturated districts, and as the "home share" concept becomes ever more commercialized. the demand for apartments means that rents are pushed up, and local people are pushed out.

Governments and tourist boards have long believed that more is better. A "successful" year in tourism is generally considered to be one in which numbers have increased substantially. Not necessary considering whether these numbers are of cruise ship passengers, duty free shoppers, resort guests, or high-end visitors; the number is all that counts. The shifting focus of governmental tourism agencies play a role in 'overtourism', as well. Many agencies are now almost exclusively marketing-focused, and their singular goal is promoting growth. Sustainable tourism strategies no longer seem to be as high a priority.

Giant cruise ships are another contributing factor when it comes to 'overtourism'. Thousands of passengers spill out into port cities each day, returning to the ship in time for dinner. Passengers often spend very little in the destinations, yet ensure that historic streets, monuments, cafes and shops are crammed with people, creating an unpleasant experience for residents as well as for visitors who may be staying on land and spending money locally.

Social media also plays a role in popularizing places, which go from being off-the-grid to "must-see" destinations overnight.

With access to affordable flights for most people, it is easy to jet away to that Instgramable destination. The most popular destinations though, are only large enough for a limited amount people. Natural resources become stretched, environmental issues are raised and residents are pushing back.

Are we really in danger of 'overtourism'?

Grand Cayman isn't seeing visitor numbers anywhere close to destinations with major 'overtourism' just yet. However, ineffective tourism policies may still lead to a form of 'overtourism'. It's critical for stakeholders to understand what figuratively constitutes 'overtourism' for the island and be prepared with strategies to address the threats from 'overtourism'.

What can be done to prevent 'overtourism'?

Most experts agree government regulations are key to addressing the threats from 'overtourism'. While it may not be

> a challenge now, be prepared. Many cities, for instance, are following Barcelona's lead to tighten restrictions on Airbnb. The Thai government is closing popular Maya Beach on Phi Phi Island for four months every year to allow the sea life to recover. Creatively, Copenhagen is promoting a tourism policy based on "localhood": A long-term vision that supports the inclusive co-creation of

What are the key causes of 'over- their future destination. A future destination where human relations are the focal point. Where locals and visitors not only co-exist but interact around shared experiences of localhood. And in New Zealand, the tourism board is actively promoting tourism visits outside of peak season. This is a good example of how government agencies can use "demarketing" strategies, or deflecting interest in places, to address rising tensions over tourism.

In order to proactively prevent and/ or address its impacts, customized and island-specific tools and measures are needed. In addition:

Key recommendations include:

- Conduct systematic research on the 'overtourism' issue.
- Collect data on the number of tourists and day-visitors, Airbnb and other new forms of accommodation and transport mode shares. • Put greater emphasis on qualita-
- tive elements of tourism development (profitability; local employment, fair pay rates) rather than continued arrival growth. · Involve stakeholders and particu-
- larly residents in tourism planning and development processes on a regular basis in all destinations.
- Support monitoring the 'sentiments' of both tourists, hosts and (other) residents in order to have an early warning of the psychological and social forms of 'overtourism' developing.
- Encourage the creation of a cross-Caribbean 'Task Force on 'overtourism'. The Task Force should provide 'overtourism' management recommendations and solutions. The tourism bodies worldwide should consider taking a more sustainable and holistic approach to tourism planning to reflect the values and desires of local communities. That will ensure visitor numbers remain in check and tourism remains an enjoyable experience – for tourists and residents alike. Let's get creative. There's room for everyone, at the right time.

UCCI and the Student-Centeredness Approach

This column has been unswerving in arguing the benefits of tertiary education. Resources dedicated to this level of education are well placed as all the evidence shows that higher education is instrumental in fostering growth, reducing poverty and boosting shared prosperity. A highly skilled workforce, with a solid post-secondary education, is a prerequisite for innovation and growth: well- educated people are more employable, earn higher wages, and cope with economic shocks better.

A World Bank Report on the subject says that Higher education fosters growth, reduces poverty and boosts prosperity.

The report says that 'A highly skilled workforce, with a solid post-secondary education, is a prerequisite for innovation and growth: well- educated people are more employable, earn higher wages, and cope with economic shocks better.' It continues- 'Higher education benefits not just the individual, but society as well. Graduates of higher education are more environmentally conscious, have healthier habits, and have a higher level of civic participation.'

'Also, increased tax revenues from higher earnings, healthier children, and reduced family size all build stronger nations. In short, higher education institutions prepare individuals not only by providing them with adequate and relevant job skills, but also by preparing them to be active members of their communities and societies'.

In addition to these benefits is the fact that tertiary education, more than any other level, must teach and develop the skills of critical thinking. These skills are vital for the sustenance of our democratic practices and for the further evolution and maturity of our societies. The examined life, to borrow from Socrates, is thus a requirement for national development.

Our local university, UCCI, has been quietly making transformational changes to better place it on a trajectory for sustained contributions to the Cayman Islands. Readers who follow developments at this University will know that the school has adopted three 'pillars' around which its plans and activities cohere.

The first and most crucial is that of student centeredness: 'A UCCI education builds social and cultural capital, advances subject matter expertise and cognitive development, and nurtures agency and civic responsibility providing school leavers and adults with a lifetime

of personal and professional successes.' The second is that the University must be adequately resourced. As is stated in the Strategic Plan, 'Through the strategic engagement of the UCCI campus community with external stakeholders, the institution has secured the resources and relationships needed to fulfil its mission and purpose.'

The third pillar of the strategic plan is for UCCI to become the engine of economic development, innovation and social change: 'UCCI's teaching and scholarly activities regularly adapt to address the educational, research and innovation needs of Cayman's main economic sectors providing essential knowledge and support to the economy while undertaking activities aimed at solving societal challenges.'

The university believes, correctly, that the fist pillar is the most important and crucial. In this respect, one of the things it has done is explicitly state the standards to which it aspires.

These standards cover the gamut of student achievement and learning outcomes, institutional integrity, faculty, institutional planning and effectiveness and policies, procedures and practices as they affect the academic enterprise.





Second RCIPS 2019 Recruit Class Graduates from Training to Operational Duty

The RCIPS' newest group of officers officially graduated from training to operational duty on Thursday, 26 September

The class of twenty-two, the second recruit class of 2019, successfully completed fifteen rigorous weeks of training under the Initial Recruit Foundation Course, which provides a firm grounding in the legal, operational, and fitness aspects of the job. The graduation ceremony officially recognized the end of the foundational training of these 11 females and 11 males, and the true beginning of their careers as police officers.

The recruits range in age from 19 to 41, and hail from various academic and professional backgrounds. The class also includes a former RCIPS civilian staff member and seven former auxiliary constables, who have made the transition to police constable. The new officers have expressed interest in the range of diverse careers the RCIPS has to offer, including criminal investigation, community policing, K-9 and marine, but all have expressed a desire to become assets to the RCIPS and their communities.

Giving his address on behalf of the graduating class, PC 203 Hershell Thompson said that the reality of the training course was nothing near what he and his fellow recruits had been expecting. "There's no doubt that we challenged ourselves physically and mentally. We constantly strove to overcome our weaknesses and replace them with newfound strength and confidence," PC Thompson said.



Sharon Graham, head of the Training and Development Unit, spoke of the tremendous growth that she observed in the recruits during the training course. For her, they truly became officers during "Traffic Week," when they were able to have their first interactions with the public as police constables, conducting traffic stops and issuing traffic tickets, and dealing with all the pressure that

Three of the recruits were given four special awards at the ceremony: PC 253 Delmar Alexander received two awards: Team Spirit and Best in Drill. PC 443 Sherice Williams received the Most Improved award. PC 384 Winsome Anderson, received the Best Academic Student award.

"Policing is a rewarding and noble profession, and the future is bright for those who wish to excel," said Commissioner of Police Derek Byrne, "I know that there are many careers you could have chosen and many directions your lives could have gone in, but at the end of the day you chose to become police officers, and I thank you for stepping up."

He encouraged the new officers to always put integrity first when it comes to their work. "Police work is a business of partnership, and partnerships rely on trust," Commissioner Byrne said. "To be a good officer you must be trusted and rely on your integrity. Your communications with the community must be open and honest. Integrity is about consist-

ency, you must do the right thing at all times, even when no one is watching."

His Excellency The Governor, Mr. Martyn Roper, congratulated the new recruits on their graduation and welcomed them to the RCIPS. "Policing can be a very challenging but also exciting career and I know that the RCIPS is working hard to connect and engage with communities across the islands. I welcome the continuing focus on community policing and our new recruits will have a big role to play in that.

"I was very pleased to see that among those passing out was again a good contingent of Caymanians, and also 11 female officers, indicating that we are achieving an improving level of gender balance in the recruitment process. I thank each and every one of you for stepping up to the challenge to become sworn police officers, to uphold the laws of the Cayman Islands, protect communities and create a safe environment for people to live, work and visit."

Now that they have graduated and been assigned to police duties, the new constables are embarking on a tutored phase of on-the-job training with an experienced officer, during which they will be assessed for their suitability for independent patrolling. Continuous assessments throughout their two-year probationary period will follow, until they are eventually confirmed in rank by the Commissioner.





MOMENTS OF INSPIRATION

I have as yet to meet someone who doesn't want to go to Heaven. Many believe that Hell isn't real but they are sure about Heaven...it just has to be. But like Hell, Heaven is not just a word. It's a destination. So what does the bible say about Heaven? You could easily say, it's described as the opposite of Hell and you'd be correct...but what are some of the particulars?

In St Matthew's Gospel Ch. 25, Jesus says there will be a great day of judgement and on that day, there will be a separation of all who've ever lived. In the end, there will be two kinds of people. Jesus describes them as sheep and goats. The sheep hear these words; "Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. (v. 34) Those described as goats will hear; " Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels. (v. 41)

When the Apostle Paul was writing to the church in Corinth, he described Heaven, repeating the description of the Prophet Isaiah; " But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him." (1 Corinthians 2:9)

Think about that. You have seen some pretty amazing things in your life...but they don't compare with Heaven. Your eye hasn't seen anything greater. Your ears have not heard anything sweeter. In your heart's greatest imagination, nothing

can surpass the reality of Heaven. Breathtaking, isn't it?

As a pastor, it has been my great privilege to be with many people at their death or near it. The saints of the Lord near it with a sense of expectation...a sense of anticipation. The way that they are to die might not be pleasant but they look forward to seeing and hearing the promises of the Bible fulfilled.

One of those dear folks had been in poor health for decades and would openly say, "You know, I don't know why the Lord has kept me alive for so long"...then she'd stop, consider her words and continue, "I guess He still has something left for me to do...so, I'll wait." She had a sense of God's purpose in her life and a lifetime of experience in trusting Him for everything. She knew He was utterly trustworthy.

I don't think I ever visited her when she didn't say, "You know, I just can't wait to see Jesus. I want to see his face. Often, she'd make her arthritic hands play one verse of, "I Stand Amazed in the Presence."

At her funeral, we sang the hymns she'd chosen. The last one was, "I Stand Amazed in the Presence." The last stanza says, " And when with the ransomed in glory, His face I, at last, shall see, Twill be my theme through the ages, To sing of His love for me; How marvellous! how wonderful! And my song shall ever be: How marvellous! how wonderful! Is my Savior 's love for me."

Many in the congregation knew of her desire to see Jesus. As we sang, that last verse hit us all at once. Her faith had become sight. We experienced a little of Heaven that day. It, like Jesus, was marvellous.

Man Arrested in Relation to Boating Collision

A man, age 35 of George Town, has been arrested on suspicion of manslaughter in relation to the boating collision which occurred in the North Sound on Sunday, 11 August.

One of the boats involved, which capsized as a result of the collision, is the PepperJelly, a white 32-foot Scarab centre console boat with two engines, registered to Mango Jam Charters. It is said to have docked in Camana Bay where several passengers disembarked, before departing with three occupants and re-enter-

ing the North Sound where the collision took place. Police believe the boat left Camana Bay sometime after 7:00PM.

The second boat, which sustained significant damage, is a 24-foot Hurricane Deck boat with a single engine. It has a white hull with a dark blue stripe and a light green bimini top. It is said to have last been seen in the Star Fish Point area at around 7:30PM, when it departed with three occupants, to travel back across the North Sound.

As a result of the accident, John Turner, age 70, a UK-national living in Cayman, and Emmanuel Brown, age 49 of George Town died.

Emmanuel Brown was a police officer with the RCIPS for twenty-two years, having retired in 2018.

The woman, who was the third occupant of the vessel, was in hospital in critical condition immediately after the accident. Her current condition has not been reported

The 35 year old man been bailed as investigations continue.





Shortly after 4:30PM on Monday, 7 October, officers responded to a report of a man found unresponsive on Beckz Close in George Town. Emergency Services attended the location and the man was pronounced dead on the scene.

Formal identification of the deceased man has not yet been established. The matter is currently under police investigation.

Canadian hopefuls rely on millennials

Canadians are thinking about whom they'll vote for in the upcoming federal election on Oct. 21 and the most crucial demographic is millennials. According to Elections Canada, there are 27.2 million Canadians who will have the power to make a difference, should they choose to vote, but the generation most likely to decide the prime minister is millennials.

Millennials will make up the largest voting bloc and will have the opportunity to bring significant representation to the polls. According to Abacus, a research and

strategy firm that specialises in voting trends, those born between 1980 and 2000 can have the most significant impact on the results of the federal election if they choose to vote.

"It's clearly a very important demographic," Peggy Nash, a political commentator and former NDP MP said. "Not only because of their numbers but because of the decisions that they make. The choices that they make will affect the future of the country for many years to come."

Past trends from previous federal elections in Canada have shown low turnouts from young Canadians. "I've talked to people in their 40s, 50s and they had never voted before, and I think it's shocking," Nash said.

However, the last federal election in Canada threw the trends off. In 2015, voter turnout for the Canadian federal election for people aged 18 to 24 went up from 38.8 per cent to 57.1 per cent, in contrast with the trends seen since the 1990s. 😚

Marcos avoids corruption punishment

The Philippine anti-graft court has rejected an effort to claim millions of dollars in art, property and investments from the family and associates of late strongman Ferdinand Marcos, saying the government failed to prove

The government had alleged that Marcos and his wife, Imelda, acquired expensive art works, jewellery, properties and stakes in businesses with help from a former government official and business leader.

During 20 years of rule, Marcos, his family and cronies amassed an estimated \$10 billion in wealth, according to the findings of a commission created after his ouster in a military-backed civilian uprising in 1986.

The government "failed to prove by preponderance of evidence" that the Marcoses and their associates conspired to obtain ill-gotten wealth, the Sandiganbayan court said in a Sept. 25 ruling that was only made public on Tuesday.

The government won a victory in 2018 when the anti-graft court sentenced the former first lady to 11 years in prison for making illegal bank transfers worth \$200 million to Swiss foundations while Manila governor in

the 1970s. She is on bail pending her

Imelda, who famously had thousands of pairs of designer shoes, has served several terms in Congress, while her daughter Imee is a senator. Ferdinand Marcos' son and namesake, popularly known as Bongbong, is seeking a vote recount after finishing runner-up in the 2016 vice presidential election.

The Marcos family enjoys good relations with President Rodrigo Duterte, who just a few months after he was sworn into office in June 2016, allowed the late dictator's embalmed body to be buried at a special heroes' ceme-

'El lChapo' paid \$1m to Honduras president

Prosecutors in New York have alleged that the convicted Mexican drug lord Joaquín "El Chapo" Guzmán personally gave \$1m in bribes to the brother of Honduras's president to pass on to the Central American leader.

Prosecutor Jason Richman revealed the allegation in a federal court in Manhattan where Juan Antonio "Tony" Hernández, 41, is accused of using his government connections to smuggle US-bound cocaine through Honduras.

In opening statements, Richman described Tony Hernández as "untouchable" in Honduras and confident he would never face justice because of his powerful sibling.

"The defendant was protected by and had access to his brother, the current sitting president of Honduras, a man who himself has received millions of dollars in drug money bribes - bribes he received from some of the largest cocaine traffickers in the world, bribes he received from men like 'El Chapo' and the Sinaloa cartel who personally delivered \$1m to the defendant for his brother," Richman said.

The defendant was described as a "violent drug trafficker of epic proportions" who moved "massive" amounts of narcotics.

Hernández's defence told jurors they will see no proof against their client during the trial.

The Honduran president, Juan Orlando Hernández, has been labelled a co-conspirator, though he has not been charged.

Prosecutors allege he took about \$1.5m in drug proceeds to win his first presidential campaign in 2013, in exchange for traffickers receiving pro-

"The allegation in itself is 100% false, absurd and ridiculous ... this is less serious than Alice in Wonderland," the president tweeted on Wednesday. He has said in the past that drug smugglers extradited under his government are seeking revenge. 🏵

Cuba use oxen and horses to save fuel

Cuba is employing thousands more oxen to plough sugar cane fields and pull farmers' carts due to lack of fuel for ploughing machines and transport vehicles.

Horses will also be used for transport. The strange thing is that such measures reflect a far more serious situation than the month-long temporary shortage stated by President Diaz Canel.

Cuban farmers are already using some oxen, though agriculture had become largely mechanised. The government

will now add about 8,000 oxen to those already in use.

Cuba is experiencing fuel shortages due to a drop in the imports from crisis-hit Venezuela, also under US sanc-

The island's sugar cane production fell to 1.2 million tons in the season ending last May, down from 1.6 million tons in the previous season.

Cuba imports the majority of the basic foods consumed by its population, a large burden for its depressed state-centred economy.

Venezuelan oil trio arrested

Venezuelan authorities have arrested the president and two other officials in a corruption investigation at state oil company PDVSA's Sinovensa joint venture with China National Petroleum Corp (CNPC).

The three detainees, in the latest round-up in the struggling and graftplagued oil sector, are Venezuelan. The detention of Sinovensa President Alberto Bockh in eastern Anzoategui state has been confirmed. It was unclear what the precise accusations were against him and the other two detained Sinovensa employees.

Sinovensa had started an expansion project to boost output to 165,000 barrels per day (bpd), President Nicolas Maduro said in August, from a current capacity of 110,000 bpd.

Owned by PDVSA subsidiary Venezuelan Petroleum Corp with CNPC, Sinovensa produces extra-heavy Orinoco crude and blends it with lighter oil to produce medium-grade Merey. Blended crude grades are widely sought in

Asian markets, where PDVSA is increasingly sending its crude production following US sanctions that have effectively halted sales of Venezuela oil to the US market.

Opposition leaders say PDVSA has been crippled by malfeasance under two decades of socialist rule, with sporadic arrests more the result of infighting among rival factions than a real effort to root out corruption. ③

Johnson's Brexit plans look doomed

Boris Johnson's Brexit plan appeared to be all but dead on Tuesday night as the government admitted there was little prospect of a deal before Oct. 31, following a day of furious recriminations.

The British prime minister spoke to the Irish Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar, on the phone after a stormy 24 hours of briefing and counter-briefing, as concerns about his tactics were even raised in Johnson's cabinet.

In Brussels, a further extension that could be as long as next summer is now considered almost inevitable, despite Johnson's continued insistence that the UK will leave on Oct. 31, with or without a deal.

A blame game erupted on Tuesday morning as the cabinet gathered in Downing Street when an anonymous source briefed selected journalists about a private call between the prime minister and the German chancellor, Angela Merkel.

The unnamed figure in No 10 claimed that Berlin's insistence on keeping Northern Ireland in the EU customs union made a Brexit deal "essentially impossible, not just now but ever".

That message infuriated Donald Tusk, the European council president, who tweeted directly at Johnson: "What's at stake is not winning some stupid blame game. At stake is the future of Europe and the UK as well as the security and interests of our people. You don't want a deal, you don't want an extension, you don't want to revoke. Quo vadis? (Where are you go-

ing?)" That sentiment was echoed by the European commission president, Jean-Claude Juncker, who said "nobody would come out a winner" in a no-deal scenario. 😚

NBA tweet sparks China fury

Who would have thought a seemingly innocuous tweet by Rockets general manager Daryl Morey supporting protestors in Hong Kong would set off a huge chain reaction of fallout between the NBA and China?

With the Los Angeles Lakers and Brooklyn Nets set to play two games in Shanghai and Shenzhen this week, China-based media and businesses are pulling their support from the league.

NBA commissioner Adam Silver has already issued two statements clarifying the league's position on Morey's tweet. Despite the tweet being almost immediately deleted, Silver stated he "regrets" upsetting people in China but wouldn't limit free speech for league employees.

The response has not appeared business leaders and the state-run broadcast networks previously set to air the games. What originally started as a backlash focused on the Rockets now threatens to derail the NBA's strong relationship in China where basketball in the world's most populous country of 1.4 billion is incredibly popular, generating billions of dollars.

While both Nets vs. Lakers games in China remain on the schedule, there is fear the games could be cancelled. China's reaction to that tweet is widespread and seems like a massive over-reaction. China has suspended preseason NBA broadcasts in the country.

Chinese state-run broadcast network CCTV has pulled broadcasts of both Nets vs. Lakers games this week. CCTV issued this statement: "We've noticed NBA commissioner Adam Silver's response to the inappropriate remarks by Houston Rockets GM Morey. We are strongly unsatisfied and opposed to Adam Silver's claim of supporting Morey's rights of having freedom of speech," sports channel CCTV5 said Tuesday on its social media page. "We think any remarks that challenge national sovereignty and social stability are outside the category of freedom of speech."

The network also stated it would "investigate all cooperation and exchanges with the NBA."

The league currently has a \$1.5 billion streaming deal with Chinese media company Tencent but that deal is in

jeopardy. Chinese celebrities are boycotting the NBA China games.

Chinese actors, musicians, and other celebrities are pulling out of their involvement in the NBA China games. The Chinese Basketball Association will no longer cooperate with the Rockets even though Rockets former superstar Yao Ming is the president of CBA.

The NBA store in Beijing has replaced Rockets gear with apparel from other teams. Online retailers have also reportedly pulled the team's merchandise. And so on.

On a more positive note, Zion Williamson soared in his first NBA preseason game on Monday night. Showing off the high-flying talents that made him one of the most anticipated rookies in years, Williamson turned in a ferocious slam less than two minutes into his debut with the New Orleans Pelicans and dunked it two more times before the first half was done against the Atlanta Hawks.

"This isn't high school or college anymore," Williamson said. "You've got to go up strong. So I went up strong and I was able to finish." It was quite the close-range repertoire: one with the right hand, one with the left hand, one with both hands.

He finished with 17 points, seven rebounds, three assists and three steals, helping the Pelicans to a 133-109 victory over the Hawks before a much larger crowd, announced at 15,441, than what would normally be expected in Atlanta for an exhibition between two teams that failed to make the playoffs last season. "I didn't expect that many people to come," Williamson said.

Of course, the score was irrelevant. This was chance to see the future of the NBA for the first time, not counting his brief stint in the Las Vegas Summer League. Williamson did not disappoint, though he's not close to being a finished product after just one college season at Duke. He missed a pair of three-point attempts, turned it over four times and looked a bit lost defensively.

"You know me," he said, breaking into a big smile. "It was a lot of fun. The first NBA game. It's not going to count against the record. But the first one of hopefully many. I'm glad I could get that one under my belt."

King is majestic for Warriors again

Brandon King alone smashed an unbeaten 132, the highest individual score in CPL history, as Guyana Amazon Warriors beat Barbados Tridents to reach the Caribbean Premier League final for the fifth time. Amazon Warriors also extended their unbeaten streak to 11 matches in the process in Guyana

King can increase his tournament tally in the final in Trinidad on Saturday when the Amazon Warriors face the winner of Thursday's other semi-final between the Tridents and Trinbago Knight Riders.

The 24-year-old Jamaican finished with an incredible ten fours and 11 sixes in his 72-ball knock. While the surface quickened up considerably under lights, Tridents kept losing wickets in their quest for big hits, and while they eventually made 188, their meltdown in the last five overs with the ball, where they conceded 98, proved costly.

During his maiden T20 ton, King went past Lendl Simmons' tally for most runs this season. By the end of his knock, he'd opened a 24-run gap at the top, his tally reading an impressive 453 runs in 11

The party started in the third over when King took apart Jason Holder, the Tridents captain, for a sequence of 6, 4, 4, 4. The Powerplay produced six fours, two sixes and the Amazon Warriors

were well on their way at 48 without loss. Even then, they perhaps wouldn't have dreamt of the total they ended up with. King's shot selection and his legside hitting stood out. His pulling off the front foot, reminiscent of Ross Taylor, was particularly impressive.

The Amazon Warriors were 218 for 3 and won by 30 runs. 🏵

Biles flips all records at worlds

Simone Biles won a record 21st medal at the World Gymnastics Championships on Tuesday as the United States retained their women's team all-around title. Already acknowledged as the greatest woman gymnast ever, she is on her way to collecting the most medals of any gender.

Biles' 15th career gold medal brings her a total of 21 medals, breaking a tie with the Russian gymnast Svetlana Khorkina for the most medals by a woman at the world championships.

"Every year it feels better and better just because we're adding to the legacy," Biles said in Stuttgart, Germany. "I feel like I never think of records. I just go out there and do what I came to do, which is compete for the country."

The US team scored 172.330 points to beat second-placed Russia by 5.801 points and win their seventh consecutive team title at an Olympics or world

championships. It's the longest global title streak for a women's gymnastics program since the Soviet Union in the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s.

Biles, the prohibitive favourite in the individual all-around final, qualified for all four event finals. Additionally, posted the best individual scores on the vault, balance beam and floor. "I think if I do the routine that I did tonight I'll be more than happy" on Thursday, she said. 🏵

Bridgewater fills in superbly for Brees

New Orleans Saints quarterback Teddy Bridgewater may have had a career-best performance against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, but he still cycled home after the famous win. As stand in for the injured Drew Brees, he knows he's on borrowed time anyway, but Bridgewater is not getting carried away with his outstanding form.

The Saints won 31-24 to improve to 4-1 and sit atop the NFC South standings. Bridgewater passed for 314 yards and four touchdowns to keep him unbeaten in three starts for the Saints this

Bridgewater has had games where he threw for 300-plus yards or connected on four touchdown passes, back when he was with the Minnesota Vikings, but he's never done both at the same time in the NFL. Until he went out and did just that on Sunday, completing all three of his attempts that travelled 20plus yards downfield. Wide receiver Michael Thomas snagged two touchdown catches from Bridgewater, while veteran wideout Ted Ginn Jr. and tight end Jared Cook each reeled in their own scoring

Despite that success — which prompted the crowd of Saints fans inside the Mercedes-Benz Superdome to chant his name — Bridgewater is keeping a cool head and staying humble.

"Every morning, I'm able to wake up and put my feet on the ground, I'm able to tie my own shoes," Bridgewater said, "and there was a time in my life that I wasn't able to do that." At one point in the aftermath of Bridgewater's infamous knee injury, amputation was considered. He ended up avoiding that drastic decision, but still spent months with his leg encased by stabilising rods. He's come a long way from that to play at a high level in the NFL. No wonder he rode to and from the game on his bike.






