The life of Captain Willy

As this is the year of celebrating 60 years since Cayman's first written Constitution, the Caymanian Times looks back at the life of the original Father of the House, Mr. Thomas William Farrington, CBE, JP (1900 to 1978), who was a great contributor to the Cayman Islands community. Captain Willy, as he was known, was one of the first members of the Executive Council, set up under Cayman's first written Constitution in 1959.

His son, Captain Owen Farrington, shares with readers an article first published in the December 1972 Northwester magazine about his industrious father, a summary of which follows.

Seniors try Bliss Yoga

One of the key take-aways from Grand Cayman's newest fitness class is that yoga is for all fitness levels and all ages.

Bliss Yoga Cayman, is hosting its first-ever Seniors Chair Yoga classes during Older Persons Month in partnership with the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS). The 45-minute class, being held every Friday throughout October, uses a combination of breathing techniques, stretches and gentle poses to help participants keep their bodies aligned, supple and toned.

The introductory class, held on 4 October, attracted 21 seniors. This was the first in series that is catering exclusively to the over 60s, many of who have never tried yoga before.

According to DCFS Director Paulinda Mendoza-Williams, the sessions are part of her team's commitment to introducing new and dynamic activities into the Older Persons Month schedule each year.

"One of the aims, of our October celebration and appreciation initiative, is to show seniors ways to embrace and enrich the ageing journey," she said.

Bliss Yoga Instructor Lindsay Correia said: "Yoga offers a low-impact and highly relaxing way of exercising in a controlled and tranquil setting. Many of the movements help to open up the rib cage and relieve built-up tension in the body, which can get increasingly inflexible due to long periods of restricted movement and inactivity. A relaxed and comfortable body leads to a relaxed and comfortable mind," she added.

"We experienced unprecedented demand," said Bliss' Manager Tricia Nelson. "We were hoping to attract 15 people per session, but were pleasantly surprised that registration was very brisk. Straight after the first session, 18 signed up again, one's even registered her husband!"

Do your bit to heat breast cancer

month, a global push to raise awareness of the disease, where everyone is encouraged to wear pink (the colour associated with breast cancer). Around the world it is reckoned that one in eight women will get breast cancer. In the Cayman Islands, according to recent statistics drawn from Cayman's cancer registry, it is one of the most common cancers here, along with colon cancer, cancers of the blood, prostate cancer and ovarian cancer. It's also a disease that does not only affect women, with small numbers of men also being diagnosed with breast cancer in the Cayman Islands as well. We have such a small population, so it is inevitable that we will be affected by the disease, whether it's ourselves, our co-workers, our family, our friends or our neighbours. That's why we urge everyone to support initiatives to help to combat breast cancer and help those affected.

Earlier this month the Breast Cancer Foundation held its annual fundraising gala, an event that's always sold out and which attracts big names as speakers, such as this year's keynote, Sarah, Duchess of York. Eclipze Hair Design

and Day Spa is putting on its 19th annual cut-a-thon on Sunday, 20st October, to raise funds for the disease, and next year the Breast Cancer Foundation will hold its annual Light Up the Night fundraising event on 7th March 2020, a beach walk from Royal Palms at sunset that gets a bigger participation each year.

Probably one of the most important things you can do to help the medical profession in Cavman learn more about the types of cancer we have here is to ensure that anyone you know registers with the Cayman cancer registry if they have been diagnosed with cancer, no matter what the type of cancer. The registry was developed by the World Health Organisation and all information is kept confidentially. The information that is collected will arm the professionals with the data they need to fight the disease, which means better monitoring and treatment and more targeted screening, whether that's breast cancer or any other cancer affecting people in Cayman.

The Caymanian Times encourages our readers to do their bit to beat breast cancer, not just in October but all year round. 😚

Registering for Postal and Mobile Voting

In the Cayman Islands, postal ballots provide a means for individuals who are unable to attend the polling station on the day in person to vote. The 2009 Elections Law introduced mobile voting to allow persons to vote at mobile polling locations, homes or other places such as nursing homes and hospitals should they wish to do so.

As drafted, the Referendum (People-Initiated Referendum Regarding the Port) Bill, 2019 maintains provisions for mobile voting. It also enhances the option of postal voting by adding the flexibility for the Elections Office to use commercial trackable courier services.

Postal ballets

The draft bill permits the Elections Office to send postal ballots to persons overseas by commercial courier, so these ballots can be delivered within 2-3 business days after the ballots are issued by the Returning Officer. The following individuals qualify for postal

- 1) Voters who are already registered on the Official Register of Electors and are living off-island, such as students and persons away for medical care.
- a) These overseas postal ballots will be sent via express courier as soon as the Referendum Law is gazetted. We expect the first issue of ballots will be sent during the week of 5 - 8 November 2019.
- 2) Voters on the Official Register of Electors who are living in the Cayman Islands but will be travelling off-island or will be off-island on Referendum day (19 December).
- a) These voters can apply for a postal ballot as soon as they have purchased airline tickets showing that they will be away on Referendum Day.
- b) These ballot papers will be delivered by local courier and should arrive within 2-3 business days. In the case of ballots being delivered to voters who are on-island, the completed ballots can be sealed and returned to the Returning Officer of the Elections Office by hand or local courier.

Postal ballot applications are now being accepted by the Elections Office. The deadline for postal ballot applications is 7 December 2019.

Those wishing to apply for postal ballots are required to provide the following information to the Elections

- 1) Completed Form B (available at www.elections.ky or at the Elections Office at 150 Smith Road Centre)
- 2) Photo identification (e.g. voter ID card or passport)
- 3) IF RESIDENT ON THE ISLANDS BUT WILL BE AWAY FOR REFEREN-**DUM DAY** - A copy of purchased airline tickets showing the individual will be travelling or off-island on Referendum
- a) Clearly print the local street address for ballots to be delivered locally.
- b) Please note, only purchased tickets will be accepted. Reservations that have not been paid for in full do not qualify.



4) IF CURRENTLY AWAY AND WILL BE AWAY FOR REFERENDUM DAY - Clearly print the full overseas address for postal ballot to be sent to.

Mobile voting

In cases where a registered voter on the Official Register of Electors is unable or unlikely to be able to go in person to the polling station, that voter can request mobile voting. Postal ballots are not permitted for persons who will be physically in the Cayman Islands on Referendum Day.

The following individuals qualify for mobile voting.

- 1) Those who are or are likely to be in a hospital, rest home or other similar institution on Referendum Day or because they are a geriatric at home.
- 2) Those who are blind or have any other physical incapacity and are unable to go in person to the polling station or unable to go unaided.
- 3) Those who are unable to go in person to the polling station because of the general nature of his occupation, service or employment.
- 4) Persons working during Referendum Day (e.g. polling staff, police, medical personnel etc.) may vote early by applying for mobile voting and casting their vote at a mobile voting station on a prescribed day during the week before the referendum.

In cases where the Registering Officer approves mobile voting, mobile teams will consist of an Elections Office presiding officer, poll clerk, logistic officers, police officer and appointed observers.

The mobile voting teams will visit persons during the week before the referendum (10 to 13 December 2019) to allow the individual to vote at their nominated location.

Those wishing to apply for mobile voting are required to provide the following information to the Elections

- 1) Completed Form C (available at www.elections.ky or at the Elections Office at 150 Smith Road Centre), setting out the reasons mobile voting is being requested
- 2) Photo identification (e.g. voter ID card or passport)

Former Well Known Broadcast Journalist Obtains New Deputy Chief Officer Post

Letter from Captain Paul Hurlston

I started my sea career at the age of fifteen in 1946 culling turtles around the Nicaraguan coast. At the age of 16 I went to the US and joined the Merchant Navy Sailing of Foreign Flag Ships. I sailed on fruit ships, general cargo ships, oil tankers, bulk carriers, container ships, heavy lift ships and RO-RO (roll-on roll-off) ships.

I started as a deck hand. Retired after $41 \frac{1}{2}$ years as Master.

During my sailing as Master, I transported building equipment and supplies to many countries to construct docks. Just to name a few, Port Hess in St Croix USVI; St Thomas, USVI; Point Lisas, Point a Pier, Galleoita, Trinidad; Bonaire, Netherland West Indies; St Martin; Cul

de Sax Bay, St Lucia; Purto Moralis, Mexico; Freeport, Bahamas; Guyanilla, Puerto Rico and many more.

I will name some of the company's I transported equipment for: Chicago Bridge and Iron Works, Brown and Root, Badger Litwin Contractors, Riggers International and many more. I also transported a Breeder Nuclear Reactor for the US Atomic Energy Commission from Chattanooga Tennessee to Longview Washington; so I would say I have a little experience in observing dock construction.

I have a few questions to ask. Why is the builder of the dock designing it? It seems the Government doesn't know what they want. When you don't know anything about the project they can build anything, you don't know if it will work or not.

Yes, you can build the dock at a cost; but will you be able to use it?

Why is the design so secret? One thing more, George Town does not have a harbour. George Town has a roadstead, a harbour is an enclose. Please see Webster's dictionary.

These such large cruise ships have a lot of height above the water which holds a lot of wind power. Try docking one of these large ships when you have 15-20 knots of wind. You are not docking the Kirk Trader or the Merco. It is a different



ball game. In closing, think and listen. Listening to people can save a whole lot of headache; sometimes even your life.

As we prepare to participate (or merely observe) the annual Silent Witness March, organised by the Business and Professional Women's Club, I am unable to stop images from flooding into my mind from my memory bank—images which include the faces of women, young and old who have been the victims of physical violence at the hands of men. As a pastor, I've sat by the bedside of a woman lying in a foetal position who had endured so many years of physical and mental abuse from a man who claimed to love her that she

tottered on the cusp of the only solution she could think of that would give her relief—suicide. But I've sat across a table from a man, ashamed and broken, as he detailed incidents of physical and emotional abuse from the woman he loved—images that stirred me share his pain and sense of shame, so that I could not help feeling that all that happened to him included a betrayal of his manhood.

Domestic abuse, or gender violence, or intimate partner abuse—whatever we may call it—is nothing new. But that does not mean that it should be tolerated. Exposing it for what it really is must be the ongoing duty of every man and woman, not just a small group of women, or a department in a government ministry. And what is it real-

ly? It certainly is not love! Just the fact that a woman can be heard saying, "He wouldn't beat me if he didn't love me" must tell us that a level of mental violence in the extreme has been perpetrated on the very soul of this woman. Any man who would willingly create this thought pattern in the mind of someone with whom he is intimate has absolutely no idea about what it means to love or be loved.

"Love is patient and kind," we read in 1 Corinthians 13 in the New Testament of the Bible. And it continues, "[love is] never jealous or envious, never boastful or proud, never haughty or selfish or rude. Love does not demand its own way." In fact, real love is not only unselfish, but it is sacrificial. Jesus put it this way (Living Bible Paraphrase): "And

Cayman to develop new reservist-style military regiment

The Rt Hon Mark Lancaster TD MP the UK Minster of State for the Armed Forces, HE the Governor Martyn Roper and the Premier Hon Alden McLaughlin have announced a proposal for a Cayman Regiment. Their announcement follows nearly a year's worth of talks between the UK and Cayman Islands governments, aimed at boosting Cayman's local and regional capability in dealing with disaster management and security issues. as and when they arose.

They envisage a group of reservist military personnel, rather than full-time soldiers. Most of the personnel would be voluntary and part time, with just a few regular full-time officers involved. Reservists are soldiers who have regular civilian jobs, and are called out in time of a country's need, as well as being obligated to attend training and ongoing training exercises on special days or at weekends. There will also be a special group who will be sent out from the UK before Christmas, to scope out a plan on how to proceed, but it is hoped the new regiment should be operational by the end of next year.

Premier Hon Alden McLaughlin said: "Having a specially trained Regiment in Cayman would have a positive impact on youth development and leadership on the Islands. It will also give a boost to

security and increase our resilience on disaster management and the support we could offer across the wider Caribbean. I am pleased that the UK are keen to support this initiative and we welcome their expertise and involvement.

"I think this is something very positive in the territories. I think that the assistance we are able to render to the brothers and sisters in the region in the aftermath of Irma and Maria, more recently Dorian in the Bahamas makes it very clear that collectively as a region we need to be able to work together to assist each other, because as we say in these parts: 'tomorrow for you, today for me."

Minister for the Armed Forces Mark Lancaster said: "The UK enjoys a close and historical bond with the Cayman Islands and through helping to establish the Islands' first Regiment we are strengthening this relationship even further. We are committed to the safety and security of the Overseas Territories.

"By creating a network across the region we will effectively then have a structure which everybody recognizes is affiliated to the army reserve, and the discipline and structure which that brings really helps in times of crisis because it means that we can mutually support each other and that is why find-

ing this structure is probably the best way of finding this resilience for Cayman.

Governor Roper said: "I am delighted we are able to announce this exciting new initiative, which is a further example of the strong and enduring Cayman and UK partnership. The establishment of the Cayman Regiment will help reinforce hurricane assistance and disaster relief capability in the Cayman Islands

as well as the other Overseas Territories and across the region. It will also help bolster security more generally and help to develop skills amongst Cayman's young people and provide a further avenue for the Cadets when they reach the age of 18. It will be a Cayman force, and one option is to have an association with a part of the UK army, and the Royal Engineers would be a very good way of doing that."

Caribbean Tourism Performance Maintains Hot Streak

Tourism continues to grow throughout the Caribbean, according to recent data from the Barbados-based Caribbean Tourism Association.

Stay-over arrivals to the wider region were up in 23 of the 26 destinations reporting data for 2019 so far. Through August, the Cayman Islands has recorded a 10.7 percent increase in stay-over arrivals year to date, year over year.

Regional industry leaders forecast a strong year-end for the Caribbean region, predicting between an eight and nine percent increase in tourist arrivals for the complete year.

The United States remains the region's largest tourism source market, accounting for 6.6 million tourists in the first seven months of the year, while Europe sent 2.4 million visitors, and Canada sent 2 million visitors to the Caribbean region.

Cruise passenger arrivals to the Caribbean region increased in 14 of the 23 reporting destinations, while nine recorded declines. Year to date, through July, the Cayman Islands has reported a -5.8 percent decline in cruise passenger arrivals, year over year. There were 32 less ships thus far in 2019 during this timeframe according to DOT statistics.

On the development side of the industry, there are currently 57 hotels totaling 14,085 rooms in construction in the Caribbean, and it's not anticipated the pace of new supply entering the marketplace will slow. And, with increased supply, markets will continue to become increasingly competitive.

The Caribbean continues to rebound nicely after weak results in 2018, following the impact of two hurricanes, Irma and Maria in late 2017 - and as Tropical Storm Dorian tracked through Puerto Rico and the Virgins Islands, most recently.

To date we have spent less than CI \$12,000 on radio, internet and cinema advertising costs, compared to the



Government, who has spent over \$157,000 on advertising in the same period (\$217,000 less Fountainhead Consultancy payments of 5,000 per month since August 2018).

This significant discrepancy in advertising expenditure highlights the importance of the inclusion of campaign financing provisions in the Referendum Bill,

The life of Captain Willy, the late Thomas William Farrington

Mr Thomas William Farrington's early life began at the turn of the 20th Century in West Bay. His father, William, had been a sailor who came ashore to raise cattle, and Captain Willy, the fourth child and second son of a family of five sons and five daughters, was required to help out.

"It wasn't an easy life, but we never went hungry - but we had to work," Captain Willy recalled in the Northwest-

In 1924 the young Captain Willy built a home for himself and his wife, Myrtle, in Farrington Square in West Bay, a home he continued to live in decades later. They had four children - Captain Owen, Myrtle and Grace, (a second son died in an accident at the age of just ten).

Captain Willy termed himself "the landlubber who was left here when the other boys went to sea", even though he went to sea for a year in 1919 and later operated a schooner on trading runs to Florida during the Second World War. He took over the family business aged 20 when his father contracted typhoid. Captain Willy did well at school but hopes of becoming a doctor were put paid to once he had to take over the family business.

He was elected to the Legislature of Justices and Vestry in 1921 as a member for West Bay and his 51 years membership was at the time thought to be a Caribbean, if not Commonwealth record.

One of the first things he remembered undertaking in his government position was to reallocate assembly seats so that West Bay's representation was increased

In one particularly interesting anecdote, he recalled selling land to the government and, during the process, as he was passing a particular area of West Bay rugged with ironshore, he remarked to his colleague, Commissioner A.W. Cardinal:

"What's this? Dante's Inferno? It's Hell!" thereby christening the now famous West Bay tourist attraction.

In the late 1940s, Captain Willy played an integral part in the development of education in the Cayman Islands, backing the founding of a high school through his connection with the church, the beginning of John Gray High School. He also played a part in developing aviation, as an early investor in the airline industry.

In the early 1950s, his rise through government was apparent, having been elected to the Executive Council in 1959, which had been set up under the first written Constitution, a position which he held for the next ten years. In those early years he battled for Cayman to be separate from the West Indies Federation, so it could be in a position to govern itself internally. Captain Willy eventually retired at the age of 72.

Hard work, he said, was his "recreation" and even during his retirement he rose early each day, working for an hour on his garden first thing and spending time in the family store. By that time, his son, Captain Owen Farrington, had taken over the running of the family's shipping interests which, at one time, included well-known Cayman boats the Nunoca, which mysteriously disappeared in 1936, and the Addie H.

In 1965, Captain Willy became the first Caymanian to be honoured by Queen Elizabeth as a Commander of the British

Empire (CBE) and, having passed away in 1978, he was named posthumously as a National Hero on National Heroes Day in 2011. 😚

Volunteerism: The Moral Element

their paper, 'Defining who is a Volunteer', say that volunteers are commonly considered as "unpaid help provided in an organized manner to parties to whom the worker has no obligations."

Volunteers generally work within a formal program with an overarching mission that subdivides into goals, plans, job positions, and tasks. The intended beneficiaries of a volunteer's efforts should be strangers, not friends or rela-

The literature on the subject says that volunteerism refers to a wide range of activities, including traditional forms of mutual aid and self-help, formal service delivery and other forms of civic participation, undertaken of free will for the general public good and where monetary reward is not the principal motivating factor (Halski-Leventhal, 2011). At least four different types of volunteer activity can be identified within this conceptual frameservice to others; participation or civic engagement; and advocacy or campaigning.

Professor Don Robotham, in his 1998 Grace Kennedy Foundation Lecture,' Vision and Volunteerism, Reviving Volunteerism in Jamaica', argues that volunteerism can be defined as any action or course of action, usually of a social or civic nature. This course of action is prompted primarily by altruistic motives, from which the actor does not obtain wages, salary or profit and in which the beneficiaries are people who are not normally the volunteer's direct responsibility.

Robotham in his definition also gives recognition to the critical importance of the moral element in volunteerism. The moral element must be the heart of volunteerism.

He insists that volunteerism is an expression of the degree of moral and civic unity of a society. It is a measure of its state of spiritual integrity. 'Total strangers' in a society take steps to assist others in that society without seeking reward because they have a sense of common feeling and duty to each other. They do not, in fact, regard others as 'total strangers'. They recognize that they have moral claims on one another. That is what a real society is like, says Robotham.

The literature on volunteerism says that it involves much more than working without pay and that it is where people make choices to do so things to help society that go beyond their basic obligations. Volunteerism strengthens civic engagement; safeguards social inclusion, deepens solidarity and solidifies ownership of development results. Volunteerism has a ripple effect in that it inspires others and advances

for any positive change to take root in communities.

The United Nations highlights four key areas in which volunteering has been transformational: These are in the areas of peacebuilding, environmental sustainability, social inclusion and basic services.

In peacebuilding, volunteerism, says the UN, is known to help regenerate certain fractured or absent dynamics that are crucial to reconciliation and reconstruction. In the area of environmental sustainability, volunteerism has been key in mobilizing communities globdegradation.

In speaking to social inclusion and volunteerism, The United Nations says that 'the values inherent in volunteerism opens up diverse pathways for marginalized groups to overcome social exclusion, while enabling them to become drivers of development action'.

In terms of basic services and volunteerism, The United Nations also explains that 'Volunteer action, when well facilitated, can be a particularly effective mechanism to foster support and complement the state provision of essential services

Handy and Wadsworth in work: mutual aid or self-help; the transformations required ally to address environmental across a number of sectors.' The sectors, it continues, include the provision of basic services such as clean water and sanitation, health care and primary and secondary education. These are key ingredients of human development and wellbeing.

> One does not have to look far to see the positive effects of voluntarism. It provides an opportunity for concerned members of the community to identify needs and offer their time and skills to implement change. I use this column to celebrate the hundreds of volunteers in the Cayman Islands in whatever area and capacity. 😚

Commissioner Receives Copy of RVIPF Accounts of Hurricane Irma

Commissioner of Police Derek Byrne can now read direct accounts of the actions of police officers, including officers from the RCIPS, in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma in the British Virgin Islands in 2017.

He was presented with a copy of the Royal Virgin Islands Police Force book, Irma, a RVIPF Perspective by its author, the Force's Information Officer Diane Leonard-Drayton, on behalf of RVIPF Police Commissioner Michael Matthews.

The book features accounts from law enforcement officers who had to flee fully or partially collapsed buildings and police stations during the hurricane to response to calls for help from persons trapped in homes and buildings, help transport the injured to hospitals, and tackle the issue of looting and a total prison breach even before seeing to the welfare of their own families and personal property.

While accounts are mainly from officers of the RVIPF, included are accounts from the British Marines, and officers from Britain, Bermuda and the RCIPS who pro-



vided the needed help. One of the chapters gave a perspective from Police Sergeant Peter Maragh, the RCIPS officer who was deputy commander of the third deployment from Cayman to the BVI.

During the presentation, Ms. Drayton spoke of the invaluable com-

"The feedback received is that our officers performed their duties with great professionalism, working long hours in difficult conditions with local officers and other relief agencies. I am also quite happy to see the great progress BVI has made in recovering since the hurricane struck."

AFRICA-CARIBBEAN FLIGHT CONNECTIONS

In a landmark development, it's been announced that direct flights between Jamaica and South Africa could soon be airborne.

The two countries have signed an air services agreement that is expected to open up new trade and cultural contact opportunities.

Importantly, it will drastically cut travel time and travel costs between the two nations.

Making the announcement in the Jamaica capital, Kingston, Minister of Transport and Mining, Hon. Robert Montague said: "In order to get to South Africa you no longer need to go to Panama, Brazil, New York or London; the possibility exists that you can go from Kingston straight into Johannesburg."

Minister Montague said that the new arrangement will open up opportunities for trade, tourism, study, and travel, adding that the

arrangement comes after many years of trying to secure the deal, with "several stops and starts".

The possibilities transcend trade, tourism, study and travel.

Jamaica is being strategically positioned as the gateway to cultural, tourism, business and educational ties between Africa and the Caribbean on a scale largely dreamed of but yet not realised.

The Jamaica government also says it's exploring similar air service agreements with other African nations, especially in West Africa.

"We are discussing with Ghana and I believe Nigeria; we are far down the wicket with them," Mr Montague dis-

closed. Noting that Nigeria is a manufacturer of motor vehicles, including cars, sport utility vehicles and trucks, Mr. Montague said: "how nice and wonderful it would be to have some of those on our Jamaican roads to underline the whole Southto-South cooperation and to underline that umbilical link to the motherland".



The possibilities with the West African nations of Nigeria and Ghana is of even more poignant interest given the Trans-Atlantic slave trade out of which modern Caribbean societies grew having survived the atrocities of that era.


There has been a growing interest by Caribbean descendants of enslaved Africans kidnapped and trafficked from what then the Gold Coast, in exploring their African heritage.

While some have made the emotional sojourn, direct travel links have been the main obstacle.

2019 is the Africa diaspora Year of Return project, an outreach initiated by several West African nations to their global diaspora including the Caribbean.

Just this year, the Caribbean saw high-level visits by the presidents of Ghana and Kenya in a bid to foster closer diplomatic, cultural and trade ties.

Transportation is key to the success of this, and setting up air links, starting with South Africa and hopefully extending to other African and Caribbean destinations augur well for the future. ③

Trudeau hostile to Trump before election

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, who looks set to lose his parliamentary majority after an election on Monday, said this week he needs a strong government to keep standing up to US President Donald Trump.

Trudeau's remarks unusually forceful, especially since the two leaders looked to have patched up relations after Trump accused the Canadian last year of being weak and dishonest.

Opinion polls put Trudeau's Liberals even with the Conservatives of Andrew Scheer and suggest the ruling party will lose its majority in the House of Commons. That would leave the Liber-

als relying on smaller parties to govern.

Trudeau, campaigning on the Canadian Thanksgiving holiday, noted the Liberals had overseen the successful negotiation of a new US-Mexico-Canada trade agreement last year. The talks were tough at times and Trudeau said Scheer had favoured capitulating to the IIS side

"We need to continue to have a strong government with a clear focus on standing up for Canadians, standing up to Donald Trump, standing up to the forc-

es of populism and chaos around the world," Trudeau told reporters in Wind-

A recent poll put the Liberals at 32.3 percent support and the Conservatives at 32.1 percent. The left-leaning New Democrats of Jagmeet Singh, the most obvious choice of partner for a Liberal minority government, were at 19.2 per-

Singh wants more spending on social programs and higher taxes on the wealthy. Scheer called on Canadians to give him a majority, saying the alternative was a coalition between the Liberals and New Democrats that would generate massive budget deficits. 🏵

Philippines police chief steps down

The chief of police in the Philippines has stepped down after facing historical accusations in the Senate that he protected officers who had resold confiscated drugs and received some of the profits.

It was a rapid fall from grace for Oscar Albayalde, the head of the Philippine National Police who rose to prominence as the enforcer of Rodrigo Duterte's war on drugs in Manila before Duterte was appointed president. Albayalde has denied the allegations.

Thousands of people have been killed as part of Duterte's campaign against illegal drugs. Amnesty International called it a "large-scale murdering enterprise". It comes weeks before his scheduled retirement on 8 Nov.

The shocking allegation stemmed from a 2013 anti-drug raid in Pampanga province in Central Luzon, when he was a provincial police chief. He allegedly sought to stop the dismissal of officers under him who were found to have taken and hidden more than 100kg of methamphetamine, as a bribe from a drug suspect so he could escape. A fall guy was arrested instead.

A retired police general made the revelation during a Senate inquiry on another topic. Benjamin Magalong, the

retired head of the criminal investigation and detection group, testified that Albayalde made a call to intervene in the investigation of the raid. Senators pursued the matter and another retired general, who investigated the controversial raid, came forward to allege Albayalde told him he "got a little" from the profits.

The Senate probe established irregularities in the controversial raid and found the reports the police filed were inconsistent. It also found the police were slow in punishing corrupt personnel. Magalong claimed the officers involved in the raid were given desirable posts under Albayalde. 😚

Honduran Rosenthal family were drug dealers

As Honduras remains riveted on the trial of Tony Hernández, a document from the case file reveals details of another drug trafficking connection involving one of Central America's wealthiest and most politically connected families.

Exhibit G from US v. Juan Antonio "Tony" Hernández

the landmark trial in New York against the brother of sitting Honduran President Juan Orlando Hernández — is a straightforward legal request by the US prosecutor to a judge for access to information from emails stored on various private servers.

As a justification for its request, the exhibit details numerous connections between one of Honduras' foremost drug trafficking clans, popularly known as the Cachiros, and one of the country's most powerful families, the Rosenthals.

The document, dated July 2, 2015, lists the targets of the investigation, which include Jaime Rosenthal, the recently deceased patriarch and former Honduran vice president; Jaime's son,

Yani, who ran for president once and may do so again; and Jaime's nephew, Yankel, then the president of Marathon, one of Honduras' premier soccer clubs, which was owned by the family.

In October 2015, US prosecutors charged Jaime, Yani, Yankel, as well as a company lawyer, Andres Acosta, with drug trafficking and money laundering, among other crimes. But unlike the Tony Hernández case, the Rosenthal case did not go to trial. Yani, Yankel, and Acosta pleaded guilty and were sentenced independently. Presumably because of their cooperation in theirs and other cases, US authorities did not press Honduras to extradite Jaime, who died in Honduras in January 2019. 😚

Cubans grow Chinese trees for cash

Cuba and China may be separated by thousands of miles, but a Chinese tradition is thriving in the struggling Caribbean island.

The ancient Chinese art of cultivating miniature trees and landscapes known as penjing, like bonsai in Japan, is attracting an enthusiastic following in Havana and providing economic opportunities.

The Chinese art f miniature trees,

which began at least 1,400 years ago, has many followers in Cuba. An exhibit in Havana's Chinatown showcases some of the finest local pieces.

Cubans began developing this art in the 1960s, said local expert Jorge Guerra. He noted that penjing and bonsai cultivators here are encouraged by the rich and colourful indigenous flora.

The dwarfed tree art has also provided a source of revenues for many of the 2,000 Cubans who devote a lot of their time to this activity.

However, the commercialisation of miniature trees starts with their sales



and extends to post-sale services, said expert Manuel Paniagua who manages a bonsai shop in the heart of Havana's Chinatown.

"The technical procedure, that is defoliation, branch trimming, transplanting of the tree, all of that post-sale service I do it at the clients' home the first year following the purchase of the plant, so that they learn how to do it by themselves," Paniagua explained.

For Cubans, the cultivation is a way to connect with nature, a noble business and an art form to last for gener-

Venezuela raises minimum wage to \$8

Venezuela's ident Nicolas Maduro has ordered a 275 percent increase in the monthly minimum wage, the third hike this year, as hyperinflation drains the value of workers' salaries.

minimum monthly wage rose to 150,000 bolivars (\$8) from 40,000. In addition, workers will receive a food bonus of 150,000 bolivars.

Despite the increase, the new 150,000 bolivars wage barely amounts to enough to buy four kilos of meat. Annual inflation in Ven-

ezuela is currently running at around 50,100 percent, according to figures produced by the opposition-led National Assembly. The government does not provide data on price rises. According to Bloomberg's Cafe Con Leche Index inflation is running at 19,900 percent annually.

Venezuela's severe economic crisis, including hyperinflation, a private sector in ruins and a shortage of basic goods,

has forced more than four million Venezuelans to leave the country, according to the United Nations.

In 2018, Maduro ordered six hikes to the minimum wage but Venezuelans' purchasing power still ended the year lower. Maduro has tried to avoid increasing the minimum wage this year to curb inflation that has included austere economic policies from the central bank. 😚

UK hate crimes rise alarmingly

The number of hate crimes reported to police in the UK has more than doubled since 2013, according to government figures, which also showed a large increase last year in offences against people based on sexual orientation.

Most hate crime offences recorded by police forces in England and Wales were racial

- 78,991 - which increased by 11 percent in the past year.

Transgender identity hate crimes increased by 37 percent to 2,333 last year. The Home Office figures also recorded a 25 percent rise in offences linked to sexual orientation (14,491) while disability hate crimes rose by 14 percent to 8,256.

The steady rise in recent years is partly because of improvements in crime recording, but there were spikes after events such as the referendum on Britain's EU membership and terrorist attacks in 2017.

Forty-seven percent of religious hate crime offences were targeted against Muslim people (3,530 offences), a similar proportion to last year.

However, hate crimes against Jewish people more than doubled to 1,326 offences, compared with 672 in the previous year.

Meanwhile a large survey by an umbrella organisation of faith and community groups suggested the Home Office figures potentially showed only the tip of the iceberg, after seven in 10 participants said they never reported hate crimes to the police. ③

Simmons returns as Windies coach

West Indies have appointed their former opening batsman Phil Simmons as coach for a second spell.

The 56-year-old Trinidadian guided the Windies to the World Twenty20 title in 2016 but was sacked five months later.

Simmons helped Afghanistan reach the 2019 World Cup and won the Caribbean Premier League with Barbados Tridents.

He succeeds Floyd Reifer, who had been in interim charge since Richard Pybus - also an interim coach, was dismissed in April.

The Windies have been without a permanent coach since Australian Stuart Law left the role in November.

Under Reifer they won only two matches at this year's World Cup, with just Afghanistan finishing below them in the group table.

Simmons, who guided Ireland to three successive World Cup tournaments from 2007-15, was suspended during his first spell as Windies coach in September 2016 when he criticised the selections for the tour of Sri Lanka.

Cricket West Indies president Ricky Skerritt said: "Bringing Phil Simmons back is not just righting a past wrong, but I am confident that CWI has chosen the right man for the job at the right time."

Director of cricket Jimmy Adams, the former West Indies captain who played alongside Simmons, said: "I have no doubt that Phil brings the requisite leadership skills and experience needed to drive improvement across our international squads."

The Windies are currently eighth in the ICC Test rankings, ninth in the ODI standings and ninth, below Afghanistan, in the T20 rankings.

Meanwhile, several players have been rewarded for their form in the Caribbean Premier League with call-ups for West Indies tour of Afghanistan.

Tournament leading run-scorer and wicket-taker Brandon King and Hayden Walsh Jr have each been rewarded with maiden selections, while Lendl Simmons, who finished second on the run charts, earned his first pick since 2017.

Top-order bat King and leg-spinner Walsh Jr. have also been named in the ODI squad, along with fellow international newbie Romario Shepherd, a right-arm seamer and lower-order bat.

As previously announced, Keiron Pollard returns as captain of both limited-overs squads, while previous T20I skipper Carlos Brathwaite is absent from all three squads. Test and former ODI captain Jason Holder is in all three squads.

Andre Russell and Chris Gayle are the two other notable absentees from the white-ball squads, with the latter's international future the subject of ongoing debate, while Darren Bravo, who has played all five of West Indies' Tests this year having not previously featured

since 2016, and fast bowler Shannon Gabriel, have both missed out on Test selection.

West Indies will play three T20Is, three ODIs, and a Test against Afghanistan in Dehradun in India between Nov. 5 and Dec. 1.

Ronaldo joins 700 club

Cristiano Ronaldo is obsessed with setting records so after scoring his 700th career goal in Portugal's Euro 2020 qualifier 2-1 defeat by Ukraine Monday he must have had mixed emotions.

Ronaldo's second-half penalty brought up the landmark as he became only the sixth player to score 700 career goals.

The 34-year-old Juventus forward has now scored 95 goals for his country, with only Iran's Ali Daei in front of him in the international charts with 109 goals.

Ronaldo has scored 450 for Real Madrid, 118 for Manchester United, 32 for Juventus and five for Sporting Lisbon.

"How many records do I have? I don't know. I have to enjoy the moment and thank those who helped me reach this impressive mark," said Ronaldo, whose tally have come from 974 games. He claimed: "Records come naturally - I don't go looking for them; records are looking for me!"

He is still some way behind Czech-Austrian forward Josef Bican, who scored

more than 800 goals in his career from 1928 to 1955.

Brazil's Romario scored 772 goals to sit in second place on the all-time list ahead of compatriot Pele (767), Hungary's Ferenc Puskas (746) and former Germany striker Gerd Muller (735).

Barcelona forward Lionel Messi is second amongst active players, having scored 672 goals in his 828 career appearances.

Diggs goes from villain to hero

Stefon Diggs was recently fined \$200,000 for persistently missing training and team meetings. Part of his frustrations were that he was not included in many plays as he perceived the Minnesota Vikings tend to favour a running game. He more than made up for those transgressions in their last two games.

The Vikings had just earned a 28–10 win over the New York Giants. Three days had passed since Diggs had vented his frus-

trations with the team's offense, failing to lessen speculation about his future with the team by saying there is "truth to all rumours" when asked if he wanted out of Minnesota at the end of October 1982.

When the question was posed again after the win in New York, this time Diggs smiled and winked. "Yeah, I want to be in Minnesota," he said. And after a 38–20 win over the Eagles on Sunday, that doesn't look to be changing anytime soon.

Diggs put on his best performance of the season in the Week 6 contest, impressively racking up seven receptions for 167 yards and a career-high three touchdowns on the day. The 25-yearold wide receiver was electric.

Diggs changed that course in that game, and with road games looming at Kansas City, Dallas, Seattle and Los Angeles and home against Green Bay and Chicago to close out the season, the Vikings should be relieved to know they still have him to rely on.

James blasted for criticising Morey

Los Angeles Lakers star LeBron James has criticised a tweet sent by Houston Rockets General Manager Daryl Morey in support of Hong Kong protesters, saying of Morey, "I believe he wasn't educated on the situation at hand." It has caused an incredible backlash.

James has just returned from the NBA's tense trip to China, where teams played exhibition games, but many player appearances were cancelled due to the controversy over Morey's statement, which was deleted shortly after it was posted.

"Yes, we all do have freedom of speech, but at times there are ramifications for the negative that can happen when you're not thinking about others and you're only thinking about yourself," James told reporters in Los Angeles.

"I don't want to get into a word or sentence feud with Daryl, with Daryl Morey, but I believe he wasn't educated on the

situation at hand and he spoke," James said. "And so many people could have been harmed, not only financially but physically, emotionally, spiritually."

James' comments quickly met with widespread criticism. One of them was by Michael David Smith from Pro Football Talk who tweeted: "Morey literally was thinking about others. He was thinking about the people of Hong Kong, who want the same freedoms Americans take for granted."

James has previously been outspoken about social issues in the US, including police shootings of black men and the far-right rally in Charlottesville, Virginia. But his latest comments have drawn criticism in the US and outrage from protesters in Hong Kong. On Tuesday, a protester brandished a sign at a demonstration that showed James embracing a Chinese banknote.




