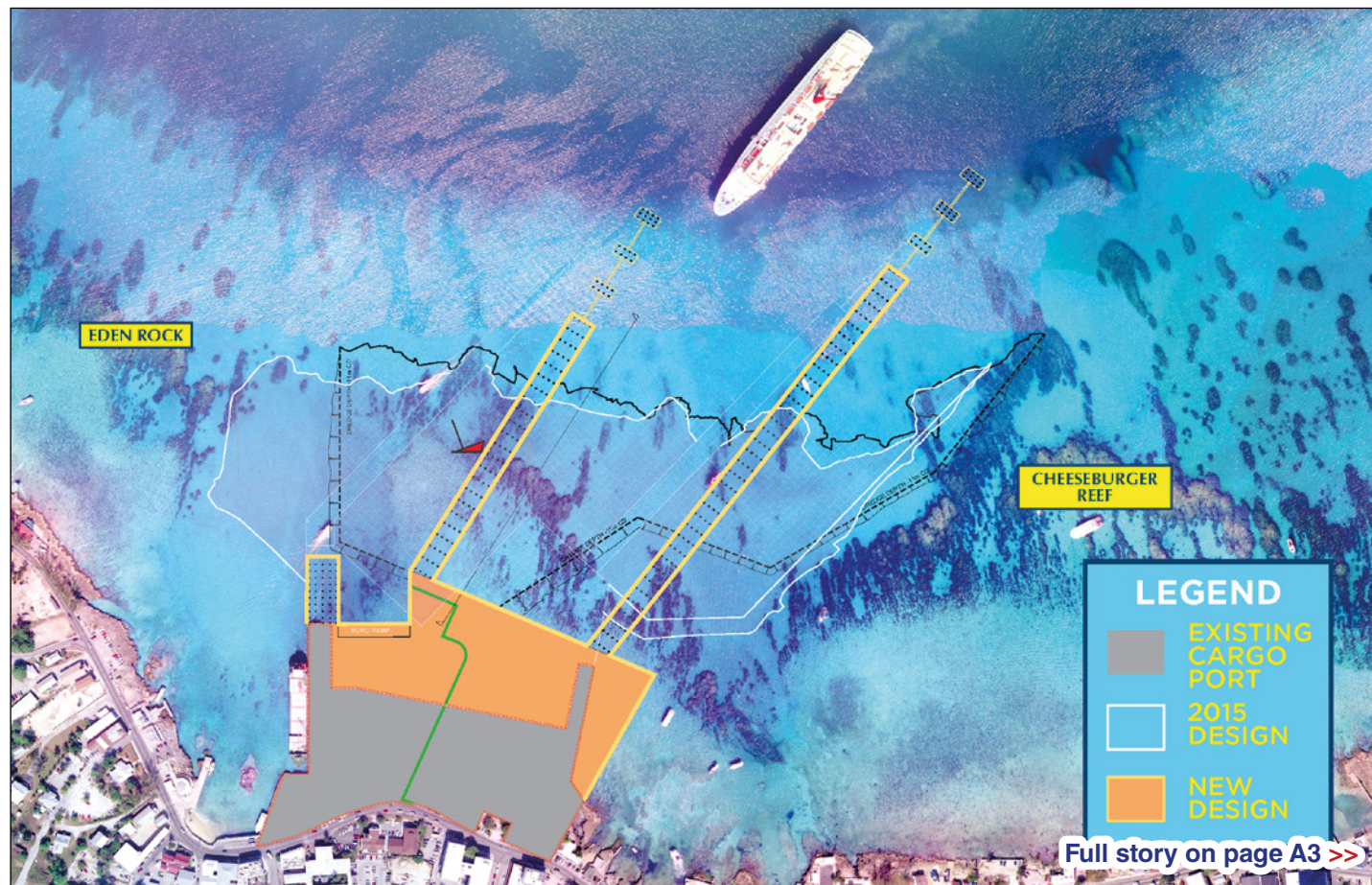

EDITORIAL

Landfill capping to start next year

As negotiations continue to progress between the Cayman Islands Government and the Decco Consortium, they have advised that capping and covering the main mound at the current George Town Landfill is expected to start early next year (2020).

In addition the Terms of Reference for the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) was submitted to the Environmental Assessment Board (EAB) this month along with the Remediation Options Report for the George Town Landfill.

As the policy, strategy and outline business case for the Integrated Solid Waste Management System (ISWMS) went through a period of public consultation before receiving final government approval, the EIA will focus on the design and impact of the proposed ISWMS facilities. These include: a Waste to Energy (WtE) facility, a materials recovery facility, a green waste composting facility, a construction and demolition waste facility, a bottom ash processing facility, an end-of-life vehi-

cle and scrap metal processing facility, a household waste recycling centre and a residual waste landfill.

They anticipate the EAB will complete its review of the draft Terms of Reference in the coming weeks and look forward to providing more details at that time.

To facilitate capping and covering the main mound, tipping operations will be moved to lower areas of the existing landfill where there is sufficient capacity to contain the country's waste until the planned ISWMS facilities are fully operational.

Although negotiations have taken longer than initially anticipated, the extended consultation period is not unusual for contracts of this scale and complexity. The Cayman Islands Government and Decco Consortium are equally committed to ensuring that ISWMS solution is implemented in a timely manner while representing a long-term, environmentally sustainable and value for money solution for the country.

Government promises a more environmentally friendly cruise berthing project

Last week the Government and the cruise berthing and cargo port builders, Verdant Isle, announced that they had listened to the concerns of the public and were now building a more environmentally-friendly facility.

Michael Bayley, President and CEO of Royal Caribbean spoke on behalf of Verdant Isle and said the group had been working on the continual improvement of the original plans that were initially submitted as part of the tendering process.

"Since the announcement of Verdant Isle as preferred bidder we have been working with the Cayman Islands Government, and in particular the Port Authority of the Cayman Islands, to adjust and refine our submitted plans to better fit their specific requirements. We are happy to now be in a position to release these updated plans."

The updated plans reflected a number of adjustments when compared to the original plans, he said. These adjustments included a slight increase in the total cruise facility, an increase in the cargo port area by just under a third, a reduction in total marine excavation volume by about a third, a just over ten per cent decrease in total marine excavation footprint, a reduction of the width of the piers from 25 to 22 metres and the elimination of the marine excavation area/volume associated with the South Side Dock and Eden Rock. They also confirmed that there would be no offshore dumping and that they would be incorporating the use of all materials from their marine excavation and would use that for upland reclamation.

"We want this project to be a model for design, construction and operation that is responsive to community needs, sensitive to its unique setting and meets functional and operational requirements," Mr Bayley said.

Premier Alden McLaughlin said the Government has listened to the concerns of the public and had put the piers into deeper water and chosen a cargo option that also minimised the dredging.

"The process has taken as long as was needed to ensure we arrived at a project that secures the future of the Cayman Is-



lands cruise tourism industry and protects the well-being of the thousands of Caymanians who benefit directly or indirectly from cruise tourism as well as minimise the environmental impact," he said.

Deputy Premier and Tourism Minister Moses Kirkconnell said the Government was confident the project would deliver long term benefits for the country, including providing a much needed increase of about 30 per cent in usable working area for the cargo port that would make it available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"This improves our current situation where large sections of the cargo yard have to be cleared every night to allow for buses for the cruise tours. We are also confident that the financial arrangement delivers the best overall deal for the country," he stated.

Verdant Isle Port Partners are currently in the process of submitting to the Department of Environment an Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Update to the EIA which compares the previous 2015 Baird Drawings to the most revised drawing set supplied by Verdant Isle Port Partners.

The Scoping Update will be undertaken for Verdant Isle by professional consultants subcontracted through Schneider Engineering: Baird & Associates, the Environmental Consultants who undertook the original EIA in 2015; Polaris who are coral relocation specialists; and potentially, Van Oord, an international dredging contractor with specialist ex-

perience in dredging in sensitive marine sites.

perience in dredging in sensitive marine sites. Joseph Woods, Acting Port Director said that the upgraded and expanded cargo port would enable the Port Authority to handle well into the future the growth in the volume of cargo as both the economy and the population grew.

"The addition of a longer and wider pier makes it possible for the Port Authority to upgrade its cargo handling equipment to serve larger cargo vessels more efficiently. The new design also makes it possible to handle more than the two ships simultaneously; an amount that we are presently limited to," he said.

East End Public Meeting Held Regarding Dengue

Spurred on by the fact that there are now confirmed cases of dengue fever in the Cayman Islands, including two in East End, MLA Arden McLean set out to do something about it. He felt that what his community needed most at this time was reliable, current information. So, Mr. McLean began organizing for a public meeting to be held in his district; one that would feature the experts on the subject. Thursday night's meeting was the culmination of those efforts, as the meeting in the East End United Church Hall included three different speakers. These speakers were Tim McLaughlin, Epidemiologist with Public Health; Richard Simms, Director of Department of Environmental Health (DEH); and James McNelly, Director of Mosquito Research and Control Unit (MRCU).

As the meeting was called to order, Mr. McLean, who is also the Honourable Leader of the Opposition, explained the purpose of the gathering and the basic timeline of events that led to him organizing it. He assured the crowd that they were going to get the best and most straightforward information available. He then proceeded to introduce the guest speakers.

First to speak was Tim McLaughlin, himself an East Ender, who spoke of the disease itself. He talked about the symptoms, and how it presents. He also clarified that it was a disease that can only be passed on to another person through a mosquito bite. Mr. McLaughlin explained about the length of time that the disease stays active, and the expected length of time that someone would remain sick with Dengue Fever. Also, he elaborated that with this disease, the only thing to

be done medically is to treat the symptoms, as there is no vaccine.

Next on the microphone was Dr. James McNelly who spoke to the audience about the mosquito. He expounded on the way that the mosquito feeds, breeds and lives. The fact that this particular type of mosquito that transmits the disease, *Aedes aegypti*, does not lay eggs in the swamp but rather prefers fresh water, and the fact that this type is rather adept at living indoors, got a big "Oh" from the crowd. Mr. McNelly pointed out the necessity for individuals to survey their property, inside and out, and to eliminate any and all possible breeding spots (any objects where water may collect including buckets, cans, bottles and even lids).

Because he is the director of MRCU, Mr. McNelly also described in detail what his department is doing about this problem. He went over the regular tactics used to control the mosquito population, and how that has been amplified now because of the positive cases of Dengue in the country. Along with Mr. McLaughlin, he did point out that there have been cases of this disease in Cayman in the past and that the transmission had been shut down through these particular strategies of investigation, identification and aggressive treatment of the "hot-spots." They assured everyone that they would again be successful.

Mr. Richard Simms, Director of DEH, spoke last. He called on the public to work alongside his department to eliminate possible breeding grounds for mosquitos. He reiterated that everyone should ensure that nothing holding standing water exists on their proper-



ty. Mr. Simms also advised the crowd that his department had placed a large dumpster at the community center and he urged everyone to take advantage of it for their large item disposal. Furthermore, Mr. McLean responded to a statement from the audience regarding illegal dumping and urged everyone to spread the word about the dumpster; stating that he hopes that there will be no need for anyone to dump items illegally in the district.

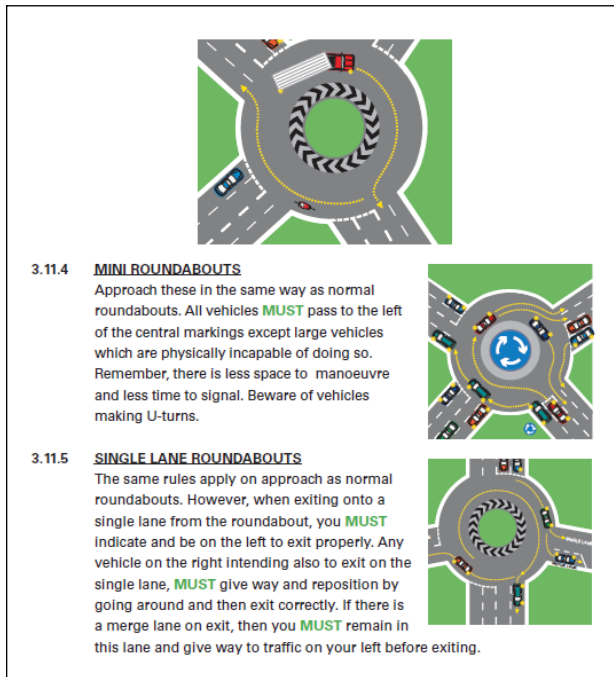
Traffic Advisory: RCIPS Warns Motorists about Poor Driving Habits

roundabouts. You should choose your lanes, based on your direction of travel well in advance before approaching the roundabout so that you can avoid causing confusion and traffic buildup. Motorists should not stop on roundabouts and once you have entered a roundabout, should not give way. You must always exit the roundabout in the lane that you entered on.

Distracted Driving continues to be a major concern on the roadway, with persons creating pauses at roundabouts and stop lights when it is their turn to go, causing a backup of traffic as a result. When operating a motor vehicle, driving should be your only priority. Driving and using a mobile phone is an offense according to the Traffic Law which carries a penalty of CI \$150. So far this year, officers have issued just under 400 tickets for this offense. In the event of a collision, you may also be charged with inattention or even careless driving if it is discovered that the result of the collision was due to the driver being distracted.

Speeding and dangerous driving are also major causes for concern. So far this year, there have been over 1300 speeding tickets recorded for speeds



over 55 miles per hour, which is a concern since the maximum speed for the entire Cayman Islands is 50

miles per hour. Further to this, officers have recorded vehicles going in excess of 95 miles per hour. As a result, we would like to remind the public that the cost for speeding in the Cayman Islands is CI \$20 per mile over the limit and CI \$40 per mile over the limit if you are recorded speeding in a school zone. Tickets are issued at a maximum of CI \$500 and any person recorded speeding over that cost, will be warned for intended prosecution for the offense of dangerous driving (speeding) and be summoned to court. Speeds that double the speed limit in an area result in an automatic disqualification for a period no less than 6 months.

Additionally, the RCIPS have also been informed of persons attending brunches on Sundays, consuming an exorbitant amount of alcoholic beverages and then proceeding to drive whilst intoxicated. Driving under the influence of alcohol is an offense that is dealt with as a priority within the service and specifically by the Traffic and Roads Policing Unit. In order to discourage and prevent this behavior, we have heightened police presence along main thoroughfares on Sunday afternoons. Last Sunday the first patrols were introduced and 10 tickets were issued for speeding during the period.

United Church Moderator visits Cayman

Recently the Moderator of the United Church of Jamaica and the Cayman Islands, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Gordon Cowans, came to visit the Cayman Islands. He was very busy during his visit, giving many words of encouragement and exhortation to Cayman's United Church family. His visit coincided with the 70th Anniversary of the beginning of the Cayman Prep & High School and on Sunday 13 October he attended a special service to mark the occasion at Elsie Memorial Church. He was also shown around the school earlier in the week, by the Head Boy and the Head Girl.

"The United Church of Jamaica and the Cayman Islands is two nations and one church," he said. "We have nearly two hundred congregations, and I am here visiting our people, our ministers our ministries and our mission work in various places including the work we have done in the last seventy years in the Cayman Prep and High School. We are the owners and operators of that school and are very proud that this week they are celebrating their 70th Anniversary. We cherish the work that we have already accomplished through the schools and we believe that the Cayman Prep and High School offers a

particular gift to this nation, with the quality of their education, the excellence of their teachers and the obviously fine performance of their students," he said.

"The vision is that all the locations in which we operate - and we have houses and churches all across the island, that we would fill those churches with the Caymanians of today. The work of the church really is about showing people how we really ought to live; how to live together in community and be contributing to each other's wellbeing."

Spirituality is not an 'optional extra' in the way that people sometimes think of spirituality, he said. "Spirituality is really the heart of living. When the church decides to do what it clearly has decided to do; to live out the reality of what it means to be a Christian in the world, so then a society such as this now cosmopolitan society of Cayman needs a church that speaks to the goodness of God and the gospel of Jesus Christ by which life gets better."

The Moderator's visit to the Cayman Islands took place between October 9 and 16. On 11 October it included a Joint Youth Gathering and Presentations of UCYPF awards, at Elmslie Memorial

Airport Airfield Upgrade Project Ramps Up

This newly formed partnership of the CIAA with IDL Projects Joint Venture brings focus to the continued airfield upgrades and improvement of Cayman's beloved airport, ORIA, for the people of the Cayman Islands.

"We are very excited to partner with the IDL Projects Joint Venture on the Airport's Airfield Upgrade project," said CIAA Chief Airport Operations Officer Wayne DaCosta. "We are dedicated to providing our customers with professional, innovative airport services and facilities in a safe, efficient manner; and IDL Projects Joint Venture has a proven track record of delivering successful, quality development to the wider community."

Representing the joint venture, Island Paving Ltd. Managing Director Barry Bodden says the partnership brings together three well-known and highly competent companies with a track record of success on largescale infrastructure projects.

"We are committed to ensuring this project benefits the wider community through employment opportunities and building the local skillset for future maintenance and expansion works," he says. "It is our intention to support local businesses, first and foremost."

The Airfield Upgrade Project consists of five sub-projects, including the milling and re-paving of the existing runway surface, a runway extension, the filling of the ponds within the airfield perimeter,

establishing a robust airfield perimeter road and expanding the aircraft parking ramp in an easterly direction to provide additional aircraft parking.

The Project works will commence in early November and are expected

to take approximately eight months to complete. The apron work will be the first of the five sub-projects to begin, followed by the runway rehabilitation and extension in January 2020. The works will not affect the airline schedules.

Standard & Poor's Says The Bahamas in Good Position to Handle Fallout from Hurricane Dorian

International credit ratings agency Standard & Poor's (S&P) says The Bahamas may actually be able to recover from the catastrophic Hurricane Dorian without too much economic fallout.

It said in a recent bulletin that early signs suggest the country is well positioned to handle the fallout, emerging without any "meaningful deterioration in...the economy, fiscal performance, debt burden, and external assessment". It added that Dorian's long-term impact on credit quality could be limited, particularly if the government responds in a timely manner to various challenges.

That is the case, S&P said, although the Category 5 hurricane last month devastated Abaco and Grand Bahama in the northern part of The Bahamas, which account for 15-20 per cent of gross domestic product (GDP).

"Despite the significant damage to Abaco and Grand Bahama, several factors suggest that the long-term effects of the hurricane on The Bahamas' credit quality could be limited," it said, pointing to the fact that the hurricane struck outside of peak tourist season, and the physical damage was concentrated on two islands that together attract only about 20 per cent of tourists.

"Other destinations within the country, including Nassau, the capital and economic centre, were unaffected. Furthermore, before the hurricane, the country had been on track to achieve good GDP growth in 2019, slightly exceeding our forecast. The government also recently reported a relatively strong fiscal performance in 2019 (year ended June 30). Based on the information currently available, the timing and location of the hurricane's impact, and the country's relatively strong economic and fiscal performance year to date, it is possible that Dorian may not lead to a meaningful deterioration in The Bahamas' economy, fiscal performance, debt burden, and external assessment."

The assessment came on the heels of a Central Bank of The Bahamas prediction that the economy will resume healthy economic growth in 2021, following a potential Dorian-induced contraction next year as rebuilding gathers pace.

Despite the optimism, S&P did note that The Bahamas' economic growth and fiscal discipline have become extremely vulnerable to weather-related disasters.

"This event highlights the importance of considering environmental factors in our analysis of The Bahamas, given its lo-



cation in the Atlantic hurricane belt, and the large geographic dispersion of its 700 islands over almost 14,000 square kilometres," the ratings agency said.

"In the past five years, The Bahamas has been affected by at least four other serious hurricanes. We believe this elevated environmental risk has contributed to below-average growth for The Bahamas, when compared with peers with similar GDP per capita. The Bahamas has taken steps to mitigate the risks related to increasingly frequent climate disasters by strengthening its public finances, planning for these events, and obtaining insurance. Despite these efforts, vulnerability to natural disasters

continues to affect the country's creditworthiness."

S&P said it will continue to follow the developments and pace of recovery efforts, including the Government's ability to respond effectively to the many challenges of recovery.

"We will focus particularly on the implications for long-term economic growth, government finances, debt burden and the country's external position. We could lower the rating if we come to expect that public finances deteriorate compared with medium-term expectations, either because of the fiscal impact of the hurricane or weakened political commitment to fiscal sustainability." Bahamas Government Offers Guaranteed Loans for Small and Medium-Sized Businesses Impacted by Hurricane Dorian

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Peter Turnquest has announced that US\$10 million will be taken from the Dormant Fund to help small businesses in Abaco and Grand Bahama which were impacted when Hurricane Dorian slammed into the two islands last month.

He said the Access Accelerator, Small Business Development Centre (SBDC), through the Ministry of Finance and private financial partners, is offering government-guaranteed loans to micro, small and medium-sized (MSMEs) enterprises directly affected by Hurricane Dorian.

"Both Grand Bahama and Abaco represent some 18 per cent of our overall Gross Domestic Product and so it is in our interest and certainly significant for us to get them back and up and operating to as near normal as quickly as possible," he said.

The \$10 million will facilitate grants, loan guarantees and equity capital for entrepreneurs residing and displaced from Abaco and Grand Bahama.

Executive Director at the SBDC, Davinia Grant, explained that it is the goal of the Centre to continue serving those clients it had before the storm while creating opportunities for other existing MSMEs to bounce back even better.

"I need to emphasize this. We will continue to take care of our existing clients. What is being discussed today is additional resources that have allocated by our government and our partnering financial institutions to help the 2,525 active MSMEs across Abaco and Grand Bahama, employing approximately 4,000 people," she said.

Grant said the government is providing US\$5 million to guarantee up to US\$6.7 million dollars in loans through the Clearing Banks Association. US\$2 million will be given equity in partnerships and US\$1.3 million in microloans and grants.

Businesspersons displaced will fill out an application form which will be looked over and an executive summary created by volunteer advisors. Those summaries and supporting documents will then be sent to the relevant banks.

Grant said it is anticipated that the process will take no more than 10 business days and disbursements for grants and microloans will be processed in four to five business days.

The Bahamas Chamber of Commerce will verify the authenticity of businesses seeking to access funding in order to ensure transparency and accountability. [🌐](#)

States of Emergency in Jamaica Trigger Canada to Issue Travel Advisory

The Canadian Government has issued a travel advisory for Jamaica due to "a significant increase in violent crime since the beginning of the year" that has caused several states of emergency (SOEs) to be imposed across the country.

It has advised Canadians to "exercise a high degree of caution" in the island. The update issued a few days ago, pointed to the SOEs in the parishes of Clarendon and St Catherine, which are in effect until October 19; the three in effect until October 28 - Hanover, St James where the popular vacation resort town of Montego Bay is located, and Westmoreland, also home to the resort area of Negril; and the St Andrew SOE which will remain in place until January 4.

Under the SOEs, security forces have increased power to conduct searches, sei-

zures, and detain persons of interest. Curfews may also be imposed without notice.

The Canadian government has advised citizens from the North American country who are in the areas affected by the SOEs to: always cooperate with military and police officers; carry valid ID at all times and be prepared for various checkpoints; avoid outings outside the resort after dark; allow extra time to reach your destination; follow the instructions of local authorities; and monitor local news to stay informed on the current situations.

Jamaica's Tourism Minister Edmund Bartlett acknowledged that the travel advisory is a cause for concern, but he also said the international travel market had become more aware of efforts by Jamaica to address its crime problem. [🌐](#)

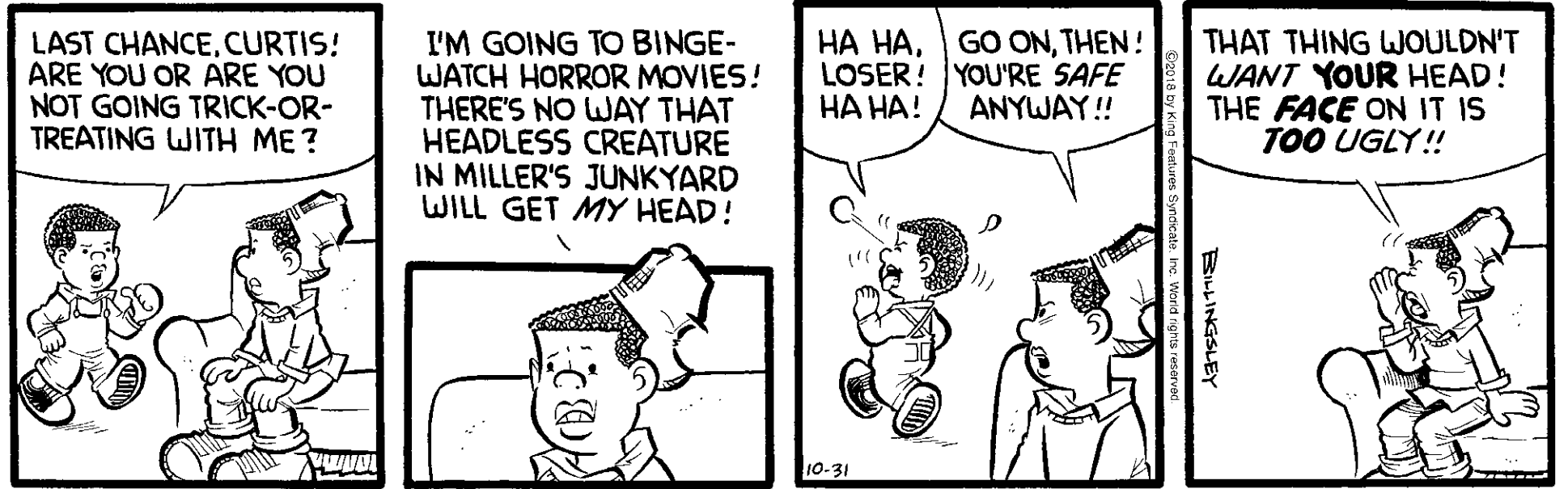

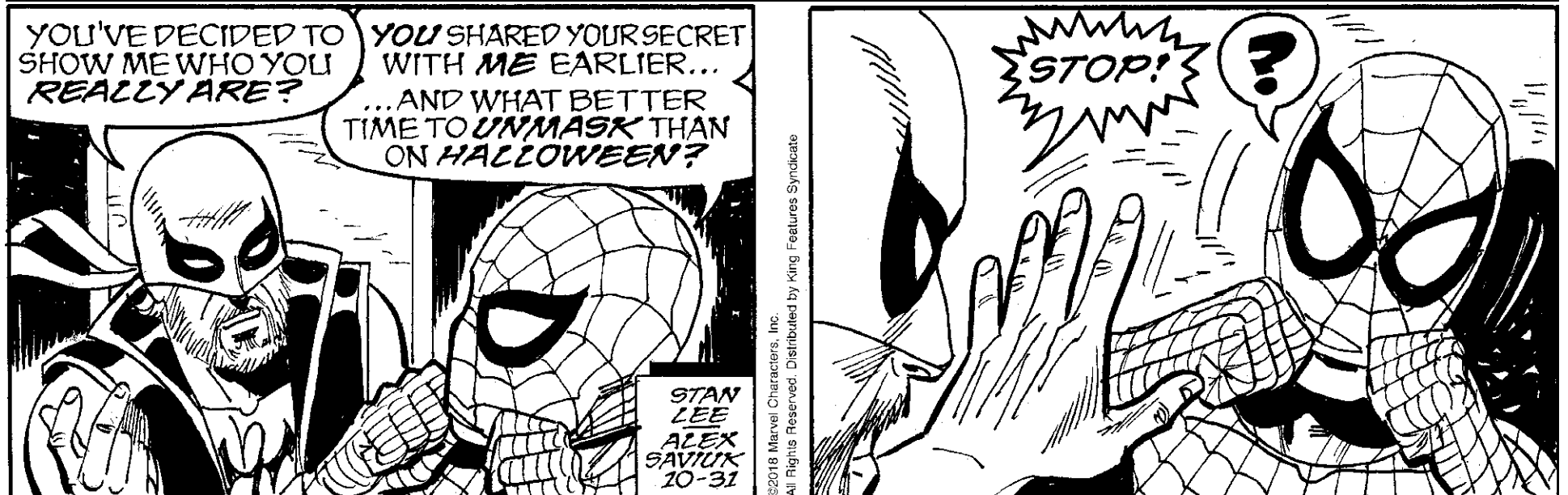

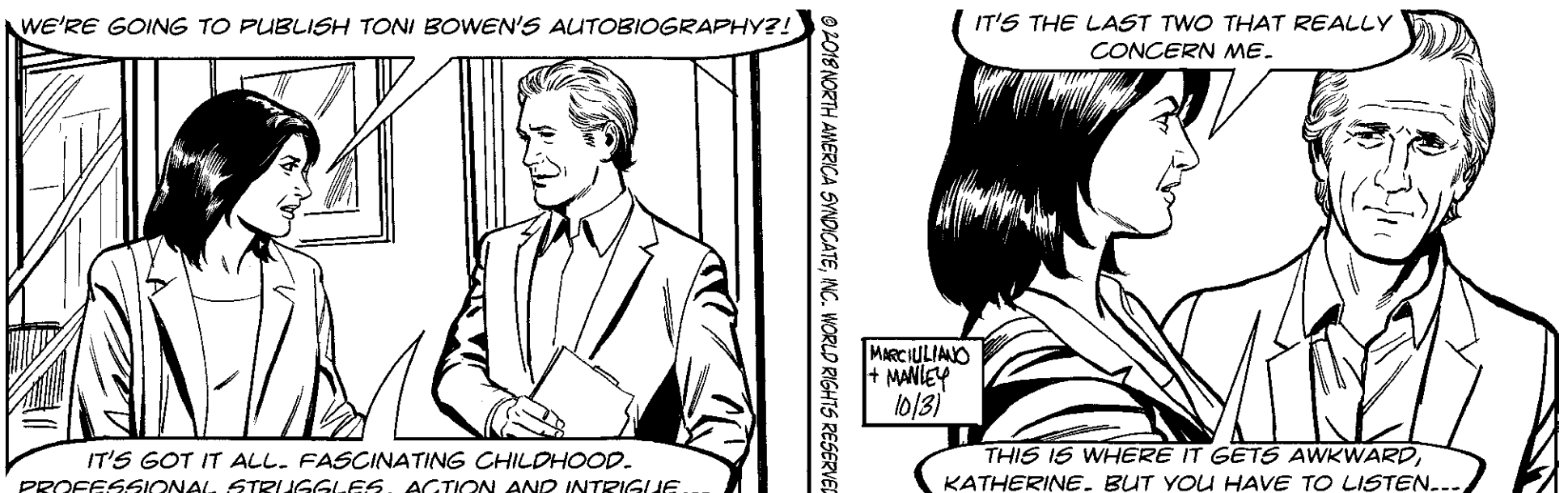
