11 of the 12 approved positions have been filled and the 11 selected CSOs have recently completed their induction training. They will each be deployed in a specific district, where they will work closely with local community members, stakeholders, and partners, to problem solve and address local issues. EDITORIAL

The future of Newspapers. Part 1

"Change is Constant. In life there is no standing still. We are either moving forwards or backwards"

We have read recent commentary on local websites regarding the demise of Newspapers in the Cayman Islands. As a newspaper owner and proud entrepreneur, I wish to speak to the future of newspapers based on research, experience and global trends.

The change that we speak about in our opening statement is not the transition to online media but rather using the internet to compliment the printed newspaper.

Readers may say there is a bias, and there should be, for as a business-man, there needs to be considerable effort in maintaining the viability of your chosen industry.

Newspapers are making a comeback from the decline over the past 10 years. The old model of printing your own newspaper have long been dismissed as viable and profitable newspapers now use factories that print multiple newspapers to benefit from economies of scale.

We are aware of benefits from internet and social media and remind newspaper owners that the key to success is using the internet to compliment the newspaper's operation, not replace the distribution.



Readers are now becoming concerned with fake news that have been known to dominate some websites and have also voiced their concerns on the numerous pop-ups that appear on websites.

There is no replacement for the tangible printed newspaper that you can read at leisure with no interference and which is also readily available without the use of a computer or smart phone.

Newspaper publishers are known to be wary of the accuracy of content as it will be impossible to replace content in a newspaper once it is published. This is possible on the internet and articles can be removed or amended if necessary.

The time spent reading a newspaper is also much longer than reading the article online and advertisers get more value for their money. The challenges for newspapers are to maintain reasonable prices and demonstrate value for money to their clients.

In Part 2 we will explain how free newspapers survive and are growing from strength to strength.



COMMUNITY VOICE

IN PRAISE OF YOUTHFUL ENGAGEMENT

Whatever the outcome of the planned referendum regarding the building of cruise ship berthing piers in the George Town harbour area, one thing is clear: we have seen a maturation in the development and expression of democratic processes in Cayman's society. In particular the engagement of the younger members of our community has been enlightening, in part because it reveals the apparent emergence of a new ethos in our islands. This new ethos is not driven by the traditional bottom line of money and more money, but by a value system that gives priority to environmental concerns. Perhaps this phenomenon has been driven by the prognostication of environmentalists that human activity is causing or accelerating global warming, with consequences that include terrestrial and marine extinctions, extreme weather manifestations and the rise of sea levels, and all that this implies for us here on these three little limestone up-crops in the Caribbean.

We should celebrate this growing concern and sensitivity among our children and youth, even if the more informed among us might be inclined to instruct them that global warming is a cyclical natural phenomenon with astronomical causes, which they can learn about by reading up on the Milankovitch Cycles. Although learning about Milankovitch Cycles would be helpful to all who are concerned about global warming, it

does not negate the need for all of us to be better stewards of Planet Earth as our ultimate physical resource for existence. The careless and casual attitudes that are demonstrated by far too many of us have contributed to waste of resources, destruction of habitats and extinctions of species, and a mountain of garbage and littered roadsides, beaches and oceans.

Our youth have a right to be concerned that they may be inheriting a planet that may be more uncomfortable, unhealthy, dangerous and ugly for its inhabitants in the next two or three generations. They apparently understand what those with a less sensitive earth-use ethic have failed to demonstrate, that this blue planet is really the ultimate goose that has given us the "golden egg" of existence.

Public Notice: Species Conservation Plan - Sybil's Crownbeard

The National Conservation Council (NCC) is seeking public comments on a plan to protect and conserve the 'Sybil's Crownbeard' plant, which is only known to grow in one location on Cayman Brac.

Public consultation on the species conservation plan will begin on Oct. 25, 2019 and end on Nov. 22, 2019.

Copies of the proposal may be obtained at the Department of Environment (DoE) offices, 580 North Sound Road, Grand Cayman, at the Cayman Brac Library, the Brac administration building, or at the Brac Agriculture Department. The plan may be viewed online at www.doe.ky.

Please note, the species conservation plan would ban any taking, possession, purchase, sale or exchange of the Sybil's Crownbeard plant. Comments on the proposal may be received at the DoE offices, mailed to PO Box 10202, Grand Cayman KY1-1002, or sent via email to ConservationCouncil@gov.ky. A survey document will also be made available at www.doe.ky and on DoE social media pages.

Public Meeting Held in Windsor Park by MLAs

MLAs Barbara Conolly and David Wight, the elected representatives for GTS and GTW respectively, decided to hold an informational meeting for a great amount of their constituents. Windsor Park is a large community that is encompassed in both GTS and GTW electoral districts, and with news of some importance needed to be announced, the idea of a public meeting was a choice. In fact, all politicians should keep their citizens informed like this.

Inside the George Town Wesleyan Holiness Church on Anthony Drive, the meeting was called to order at about 6:40pm. There were fewer than 40 people in the audience, far less than hoped for, but the meeting had to continue. There was a sizeable contingent of special guests ready to present. After a welcome from MLA Barbara Conolly and an opening prayer from the resident pastor, Mr. Kim Evans, all of those guests were introduced. Present were CI Red Cross director, Jondo Obi; Simon Boxall of Haz-

ard Management; Commissioner of Police Mr. Derek Byrne; Police Inspectors Courtney Myles (Community Policing) and Dwayne Jones (Traffic); PC Tamara Jackson (new Community Officer for Windsor Park); and the two newest Community Safety Officers (CSOs).

Of the special guests, Inspector Myles, was first up to the microphone. He introduced the two Community Safety Officers and explained their function within the department, as liaisons between the police and the members of the public. The inspector mentioned that 85% of the CSOs hired are women, and he lauded the strides that females are making within our society. He then introduced Police Constable Tamara Jackson and as she took the mic, she spoke of what her role in the community is. PC Jackson also stated that she was very glad to be assigned in the community of Windsor Park.

Next up was the Commissioner of Police, Mr. Derek Byrne. He used his al-



lotted time to speak about the several different topics. He covered his goals for community policing in the Cayman Islands, specifying his vision for the CSOs and the Community Officers. He also lauded the partnerships that RCIPS has with other agencies such as the Red Cross and Hazard Management.

The C.E.R.T. program was the next topic of discussion. Ms. Obi and Mr. Boxall each took turns speaking of this very important program. Ms. Obi told the audience of the origin of the Community Emergency Response Teams here in Cayman and gave a breakdown of what the program encompasses. Mr. Boxall mentioned the possible opportunities for the C.E.R.T.s to deploy and to render aid. He also reiterated that the knowledge each member of the team gains from the training is a huge asset of itself.

After that segment, the floor was opened to questions from the audience. This appeared to be the most anticipated part of the meeting as the small crowd brought numerous concerns. Among them were the community members feelings that the police was not addressing crime or even violations effectively; that with another new Community Police Officer assigned to the area they feel like they are starting over; the problem of cars constantly parking on the road and blocking effective traffic flow; the fact that some rental facilities do not upkeep their premises and sometimes al-

low vegetation to grow out into the road blocking drivers' view at junctions; the allegation that there are persons selling illegal alcohol and drugs in the neighborhood; and the issue of disturbances caused by persons speeding and playing their car stereos extremely loudly in the early morning hours. Another concern brought forward was the case of a certain establishment that has been causing a disturbance for many years because of loud music, and because of domestic disputes between some of their customers. Several members of the audiences chimed in to speak of their personal experiences regarding this; and all voiced their frustration with the fact that RCIPS has not been able to effectively solve the problem. For all those issues, Mr. Byrne said he took them to heart, and that it was his job to ensure that his department addresses them effectively.

To close the meeting, Ms. Barbara Conolly and Mr. David Wight gave updates for upcoming events/projects within the community. Some highlighted were Neighborhood Watch programs starting in three different sections; Christmas in the Park at two different parks in Windsor Park on November 23rd; the children's Christmas party on December 7th; the Senior Citizens luncheon on December 15th; and drainage wells on Anthony Drive to be dug on December 12th to address the flooding issues on that thoroughfare.



DOE Reports Drastic Decline in Green Iguana Population

The DOE expects the milestone of 1 million captured Green Iguanas will be reached sometime this week. With just about one year gone in the green iguana culling program, the Department of the Environment is proclaiming the effort a measured success. It is being called a success because a survey done in August is pointing to a possible 90% reduction in the number of the invasive species on Grand Cayman.

The cull is being called a success because in this survey, done "via a distance sampling method developed by Dr. Frank Rivera-Milan, the remaining green iguana population on Grand Cayman was estimated at between 60,000 and 145,000. Again, it must be noted that this estimation was done in August." (DOE Press Release, Oct 22, 2019). This was in stark contrast to the estimated green iguana population prior to the cull, which was between 1.1 million and 1.6 million.

It was mentioned earlier that DOE officials are proclaiming a measured success. The reason it is "measured" is because as DoE Terrestrial Unit Manager Fred Burton stated, "We have no direct measure of the number of green iguana hatchlings that have emerged this year.

Their emergence represents the reproductive output of the breeding green iguanas nesting earlier in the year, at a time when there were many more surviving adults than there are today. This emergence was inevitable and expected. It has also likely put the total number of green iguanas significantly above the August population estimates." A bright spot is the fact that most of the iguanas turned in to the landfill since August has been of the hatchling or juvenile variety.



A summary of the situation, in layman's terms, is that the iguana population is drastically reduced but, because of the recent hatchlings, it is not yet to the desired level; the population of these pests is not to a point where DOE can be confident that it will not increase quickly to prior infestation levels. Minister of Environment, the Hon. Dwayne Seymour said, "Our green iguana cullers have done a great job thus far. However, we must keep focused on the job over the next few months, so the breeding green iguana population doesn't rebound next summer."

Since the cull began, more than 500 individuals or groups have registered to join in the effort. The registration is still open, however. So, if there is anyone

Cayman Spirits Company distills its own spirits, right here in the Cayman Islands. Its distillation with a Cayman distinctiveness, and lots of the company's drinks, which were on display at the recent CIBA Expo, were named after Cayman places or people or things. "We are the first rum distillers on the island, and we produce everything from Seven Fathoms Rum to Governor's Reserve Rum," said Cayman Spirits' Event Manager, Sarita Singh.

"The story behind Seven Fathoms is we age them in barrels, 42 feet deep which is seven fathoms, and this makes our rum very unique. Very few people do this method of aging. Our newest product is a rum and cola in a can, which has become really popular; we launched it at Kaaboo and we sold out a hundred cases.

"Gun Bay Vodka named after Gun Bay - we do a lot of local names for all of our products," Ms. Singh continued, we also have dark rum, spiced rum, coconut rum, white rum, and gold rum," she said. "Governors Reserve is our coconut rum, and we use young local Caymanian coconuts. So everything is fresh and there is no preservatives. Oh, and we have banana rum as well," Ms. Singh explained.

The company hopes to source more produce used to add flavor to the rum from local sources: "We do distillers' specials every so often depending on what is in season. We will go to the farmers market and team up with a farmer. The last one we did was a mango brandy. So we went to farmer Clarence and we got about 500 pounds of mango to make a mango brandy," she said "It was sold out in two weeks." 🌐

course at Canterbury College of Art in England, after which he transferred to Clark University in the United States, where his studies broadened to encompass international relations and philosophy, receiving a BA in 1976.

National Gallery Director, Natalie Urquhart, said they had been thinking about doing a career retrospective with Bendel Hydes for several years. The National Gallery hosted 'Soundings' in 2003, which was a retrospective of his work to that point and since then they presented his 'Circumnavigating the Globe' series which Natalie described as "really one of the pinnacles of Bendel's career" which coincided with the opening of the new National Gallery facility in 2012.

Natalie said they had been speaking with Bendel since then to try and put on a retrospective of his work and to also collect a survey of his work at the Gallery for perpetuity. The effort included going to New York and cataloguing Bendel's entire personal archive, professionally photographing more than 400 paintings. Having recently moved back to Cayman, Bendel worked with the Gallery who assisted the artist in moving his work back to the Cayman Islands.

"The story that we've been able to piece together as a result has been very, very exciting," Natalie confirmed.

The Show

Initially, the gallery was just working with local collectors in order to put the show together, but since they discovered this "artistic hoard" in New York, it doubled the size of the show, Natalie said. The exhibition features about 70 artworks, including archival material featuring a documentary by Jacob Olde in which the artist talks about his career.

The gallery is also working on a career survey catalogue that features over 200 plates of artwork, a full history of his life and career.

The show begins with his early work following his art school training, working primarily in figurative work, after he

returned to Cayman to paint in the late 70s, a time when Bendel created some beautiful watercolours capturing Cayman's maritime history.

"It's a really integral part of the story, because lots of people find abstract art a little intimidating and you can write it off in many ways," Natalie explained. "It's really important to show that the movement into abstraction was a very conscious movement. The basis of good abstract art is a true understanding of drawing techniques, composition, light and shade, all the basics to create these remarkable Circumnavigating the Globe-type luminescent abstracts that we see from the last decade."

By the early 80s despite being very involved in the start of artistic entities such as the Cayman National Cultural Foundation, Bendel realised there wasn't a climate for the type of art he was interested in, so he moved to New York in 1981 and he's been there until the last couple of months. The exhibition really starts with the expression of

this new confidence when he went to New York, Natalie said.

"The pieces are very heavily inspired by Expressionism. You see these very loose, colourful, bold brush strokes," Natalie stated. "There is still an element of recognisable objects in these works but he's moving away from figurative elements. He was inspired by surrealism movements by this point and moving into abstract expressionism before moving into pure abstract over the later decades."

Natalie described how one series of the period is called 'Tropical Plants', so, even though he was in a very urban New York environment that essence of tropical island living and the Cayman story was integral to his work and remained so all the way through this period, she said.

"One of the most important elements of understanding Bendel's practice is the dichotomy between the urban experience and the island experience and he brings both into his practice," she said.

The exhibition also shows snippets from newspaper and magazine articles on the development of the CNCF and others, a movement in which Bendel played an intrinsic part, Natalie advised.

By the mid-90s Bendel moved away from any element of figurative work and was now inspired by mid-century American abstract expressionism. Composition and light were still very important, Natalie explained, and he was still connected to Caymanian history. In his 'Reef paintings' of the period there are

lots of nautical and shipping references in these abstractions. Also happening in the latest 1990s simultaneously were the 'Soundings' and 'Source' series relating to the journey the Caymanian fishermen would have taken down to the Nicaraguan coast, with figurative references to the symbols of that story, including lots of maritime objects.

"I think this is a really beautiful part of Bendel's work," Natalie said.

The "pinnacle of his practice" is 'luminescent abstraction' where he is experimenting with light and colour.

"These works are made by diluting oil paints and Bendel would create washes and then create layer upon layer of colour.

"I think the term he uses, "luminescent abstraction" is a really wonderful way of connecting to the work as it's all about light and luminosity," she explained.

The exhibition closes with huge 78" by 78" oil paintings adorning the walls.

"You come into this room as a conclusion to the exhibition [where the Circumnavigating the Globe series is shown]. I really wanted this space to feel a very spiritual moment. This moment is where you see these huge stained-glass Cathedral-like images. I would hope that at this point the visitor would stop and have a moment of contemplation at the pure majesty of these artwork," Natalie said. "It's remarkable what Bendel has achieved through 45 years of experimentation and dedication to his craft."


sons Month Ambassadors, shared fellowship and gave thanks for the blessings of old age.

Community Safety Officers Join RCIPS Ranks

and will utilize specific vehicles, both of which are clearly marked to identify them as Community Safety Officers. West Bay, Bodden Town, and George Town each have three CSOs assigned to them, while East End and Cayman Brac have each been assigned a single CSO. There is also a post available for a North Side CSO, which has not yet been filled.

"With one exception, each CSO actually lives in the district they will be working in," said Superintendent of Uniform Operations, Robert Graham. "This means each of the new CSOs have a vested interest in what's going on and a real commitment to addressing the issues that the community believes are important. I see this new introduction of the CSOs as a real and very tangible difference to the way we work with and for our communities. It will build upon our ability to identify local issues and also improve our responsiveness through enhanced working relationships within local communities. This is about really focusing on those issues that cause the local community the most concern and addressing those concerns through an improved partnership approach."

The CSOs will be deployed at key times, based on local requirements, for up to twenty hours per week, and their deployments will be directed by the Inspector in charge of the Community Policing Department, Courtney Myles.

"I am extremely delighted to see the launch of the Community Safety Officer programme, which will come under my



management, as they are now part of the RCIPS community policing team," said Inspector Myles. "It will enhance public safety while building on our community partnerships. I see this as a positive step in the community and have no doubt it will make a real difference to the Cayman Islands."

The Community Safety Officer programme was one of the campaign manifestos of Premier Hon. Alden McLaugh-

lin and has been delivered by the RCIPS Commissioner's Office with the support of the Cayman Islands Government.

"Tackling crime was a major campaign issue for all of us in Government. As such, we budgeted some \$270 million for national security and committed to putting into place a dedicated community policing programme. We have seen that community policing does make a difference and as such I welcome this

new Community Safety Officer programme," said the Premier. "We, as a Government, are doing what we need to in order to financially support the RCIPS, and I am satisfied that under the leadership of the current Commissioner and his senior team the RCIPS has taken seriously this Government's commitment to keeping our communities safe and reducing gun crime in the Cayman Islands." Evening Traffic Flow Adjustment to Hurley's Roundabout

The RCIPS is informing the public that there will be a temporary traffic flow adjustment made to traffic entering the Hurley's roundabout on weekday evenings, beginning next Monday, 28 October.

Traffic entering the roundabout from South Sound Road (eastbound) or Shamrock Road (westbound) will not be permitted to exit at the Grand Harbour entrance but must either exit onto Crewe Road (westbound)

or onto Shamrock Road (eastbound). Traffic entering from South Sound Road (eastbound) or Shamrock Road (westbound) and needing to access Grand Harbour will be required to exit east onto Shamrock Road, travel along Shamrock Road, and then enter Grand Harbour by turning left onto Bimini Drive.

This adjustment will not affect traffic entering the roundabout from Crewe Road, which will be permitted to take

the first exit and access Grand Harbour as usual, or continue onward to Shamrock Road.

This adjustment will be in place on weekday evenings from 4:30PM to 7:00PM, in order to allow the continuous flow of eastbound traffic, as part of the RCIPS' continued efforts to alleviate traffic issues in these areas.

Roy Bodden's – From Guard House to the Glass House: A Preliminary Discussion

Roy Bodden, now Emeritus President of the University College, recently launched the latest of his academic work, **From Guard House to the Glass House: One Man's Journey through the Maze of Caymanian Politics.**


Bodden is also the author of **The Cayman Islands in Transition: The Politics, History and Sociology of the Cayman Islands; Politics, Personalities and Parties: Caymanian Politics from 1950- 2000; Reflections from a**

Broken Window and A Gathering of Old Men: A Collection of Short Stories.

By any account, this is quite an impressive body of work on the Cayman Islands told from the perspective of the Cayman Islands, even if from one person's point of view. The act of writing can be a tedious task, especially for those who take it seriously. The actual writing itself is preceded by research, organization of thought, the sifting and interrogation of materials, and the exercise of critical judgement. Writing requires discipline, not to mention cogency and clarity of mind. American writer, Harlan Ellison, once said that 'People on the outside think there's something magical about writing, that you go up in the attic at midnight and cast the bones and come down in the morning with a story, but it isn't like that. You sit behind the typewriter and you work, and that is all there is to it.' Writing is hard work and the two hundred and sixty four pages, the size of Bodden's recent book, is quite an accomplishment.

In writing about writing, Arthur Homes, the author of the famous book: **The Idea of a Christian College**, says that to write is to become articulate, to express what one feels, to explain why one feels that way, to expound, to argue, to offer good reasons, to explore relationships, to have a sense of the whole, and so on.

One should never underestimate the power of the pen, the power of the book, the power of ideas. And, certainly, the writing of history must never be underestimated. Even if one believes Churchill's famous quip: 'History will be kind to me, because I intend to write it' and proceeded to write history, this kind of enterprise must be celebrated. Marcus Garvey did say that 'A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots'. There is the famous saying that 'No one can tell your story, so tell it yourself, no one can write your story, so write it yourself.'


Bodden took the latter saying seriously. I believe that there are many other stories not yet written, and that should be. Others must be encouraged to write their story as Bodden has done. The development of a society is not confined to the building of businesses, physical edifices and landmarks and such things. The role of the writer, the thinker, the historian, is vital. The past must be documented and told and the more the voices, the more interesting the record.

How does one make sense of the current issues and their impacts without having some understanding of the historical context that gave rise to them?

A study and knowledge of local history is indispensable to a real understanding of the society itself. How can a country understand its own character or fully appreciate its unique identity without an accurate knowledge of its past? How can the young of a society properly appreciate other cultures, without being immersed in their own? How can a multicultural society forge bonds of cohesion without having strong ties, understanding and appreciation of the culture of local society itself?

Thinkers like Caribbean intellectual icon Rex Nettleford and Michel Foucault, French philosopher and historian of ideas, have always pointed to the importance of history for self-knowledge and self-empowerment. As Foucault reminds us, correctly used, history is a form of critical self-knowledge that promises a certain freedom.


Most people grossly overestimate just how many calories they burn during a workout and don't realize how hard it is to create that deficit through activity alone.

Prime Minister Holness on a Mission to Make Jamaica the Most Modern Caribbean Country in Next Two Decades

Prime Minister Andrew Holness, says he intends to make Jamaica the most modern country in the Caribbean by the next 20 years.

"Jamaica must develop... we have lost 40 years," he said.

"We have a generation or two that has not benefited and we have to catch up, so that we can help that generation. So, the Government is going to do what it must to ensure that this country is developed."

The Prime Minister, speaking at the recent official opening of Fontana Pharmacy's newest branch, noted that there has been minimal infrastructural development in the country over the last 40 years, and the Government is now intensifying sustainable development.

"For many years, we had literally a disinvestment in our infrastructure. For a period of about 40 years, there was very little investment in infrastructure and in particular, in our buildings, not to mention the investment in the communities that were developed and built in the 50s and 60s, so urban blight set in," Holness said.

Consequently, the Prime Minister said many of the country's structures are

now "sick buildings" and face challenges with air quality and are no longer fit for purpose, as they cannot accommodate the administration of private or public sector affairs.

"So, there really needs to be now another phase of construction or the putting up of new buildings, and totally retrofitting the old ones, because what we now have is just simply not adequate to carry the demands of the society," he noted.

The Prime Minister pointed out that one of the greatest challenges is that the proposition for new buildings often runs into conflict with people's vision for their community.

"There's a very palpable tension when we see new development happening versus how people would want to see their community remains," he said, adding that the debate concerning the different developments will have to be managed, so as not to remain at a stalemate and cripple the society.

"One thing you can be assured of is that I believe in doing something. So, you can be assured that yes, there will be the debate, there will be the back and

forth, there will be adequate opportunity for ventilation and where good points are made, they will be incorporated, but we will develop Jamaica. We will make Jamaica the most modern country in the Caribbean and I will give myself 20 years for that."

In the meantime, the Prime Minister urged business people who are developing and building not only to ensure that the developments benefit the community, but that their corporate social responsibility component factors in the environment. 🌐

Multi-Million-Dollar Deal Signed for Medical University in Storm-Ravaged Grand Bahama

The Government of The Bahamas signed a Heads of Agreement with Western Atlantic University of Medicine Ltd. for the establishment and operation of a University School of Medicine in Freeport, the capital of Grand Bahama which was devastated by Hurricane Dorian last month.

The development represents a US\$64 million investment and will provide hundreds of construction and permanent jobs.

Prime Minister Minnis described yesterday's signing as an important part of the Hurricane Dorian recovery and reconstruction effort.

"This development represents a significant investment in Grand Bahama, the country's second largest economy," he said.

It is estimated that in the University's first 10 years of operation, student and faculty spending on housing, food, entertainment, goods and on-island transportation, will provide a combined US\$200 million in revenue for Grand Bahama.

At the peak of construction, 150 jobs will be created. During the full operation of the campus, approximately 200 permanent jobs will be created for Bahamians.

"This major development will inject hundreds of millions of dollars into the local economy over time, and provide direct and indirect opportunities for scores of residents," said Prime Minister Minnis.

The development will include university-owned housing for faculty, staff and students on campus. It will also encompass: on-campus businesses, including a bookstore, cafeteria and a student centre providing music, food, beverages, a copy centre and related services.

Western Atlantic intends to build its own campus on land to be leased from the Public Hospitals Authority.

A maximum of 50 acres will be leased in three tranches, based upon the University's satisfaction of certain deliverables.

The campus will be developed in multiple phases over the next 10 years. It will involve the construction of 98,000 square feet of classrooms, offices, lab facilities, maintenance, security and related spaces.

Construction will begin on the first phase by the end of this year.

During the construction phase, Western Atlantic has agreed to aim for an overall ratio of 80 per cent Bahamian workers to 20 per cent non-Bahamian workers.

Under the agreement, Western Atlantic will also work closely with the Government and local communities to develop training and professional development

programs for Bahamians who want to work during the operation of the campus.

Approval to operate the campus will be contingent on the University obtaining accreditation from the Caribbean Accreditation Authority for Education in Medicine and other Health Professions (CAAM-HP), or an equivalent body.

Western Atlantic will also work toward receiving accreditation for its students to be able to practice medicine in the US, Canada and The Bahamas.

"This development has the potential to attract global talent and build international connections," said the Prime Minister. "It also represents another opportunity to diversify our economy."

Minnis pointed to signs of recovery progress on Grand Bahama, including of the reopening of the Grand Lucayan hotel and Port Lucaya, the return of cruise ship visitors and the restoration of essential utilities.

"We have a long road ahead of us for recovery and reconstruction, but we are making progress," the Prime Minister said. "Today's signing is yet another indication of the progress we are making together." 🌐



Trinidad's Opposition Distances Itself from Assassination Plot Allegations and Accuses PM of Making up Stories

The main opposition United National Congress (UNC) has denied any involvement in any alleged plots to kill the country's Attorney General or Prime Minister Faris Al-Rawi. In fact, it charged that the claims made by Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley were part of a "desperate attempt" to revive his "dying political career" and get political mileage ahead of next year's elections.

It was last Friday night, at a meeting of the ruling People's National Movement (PNM), that Rowley linked opposition operatives to a plot to assassinate Attorney General Faris Al-Rawi. He also said that on two occasions ahead of the 2015 general elections, "they hired a killer to kill me", offering US\$2 million for the job.

"The first killer refused and went and told a government official. The government official came and told us. We told the police. While dealing with that, they went and found another person. He too refused. There is honour among thieves in this country. It appears as though there is honour among killers too," he told PNM supporters.

Revealing what he said was a recent plot to murder Al-Rawi, Rowley added that one of the first meetings he held when he moved back into the Prime

Minister's office in Whitehall last month, was to determine how to protect the Attorney General "because persons are paid money to kill him".

"I tell you this not because I'm being irresponsible, it's because I want you to know. You can't say you don't know. I want you to know because I am the chairman of the National Security Council," he said.

But in a statement on Monday, distancing the UNC from any assassination plots, Opposition Leader Kamla Persad-Bissessar said she had no "intention of falling for these distractions and distortions".

"I wish to wholly condemn the latest round of wild scandalous allegations of an assassination plot made by Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley on his political platform on Friday, October 18, 2019....These allegations are baseless and are being made for the purpose of fear-mongering and scoring cheap political points," she said.

"It is a return to his 'Emailgate' style of politics - make wild accusations with

of investigations, the matter was closed earlier this year with no charges laid.

"From the producers of 'Emailgate' comes a last-ditch, desperate attempt to fool the electorate in 2020 with a sequel. This is Rowley's 'Mission Impossible'; he knows that he cannot win fair and square. So, the actors and producers are fast at work....," Persad-Bissessar said.

But Police Commissioner Gary Griffith has confirmed that precautions were taken to protect Rowley and, more recently, Al-Rawi after it was confirmed that they

were the targets of assassination plots. The report of the threat against the Attorney General, the top cop said, was received a few months ago. Al-Rawi also confirmed to local media that he was informed of death threats made against him within the past two months.

The information on a plot to kill Rowley was received in 2014, during Griffith's tenure as National Security Minister from September 2013 to February 2015. 🌐

Trudeau clings on to power

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau is incredibly relieved after retaining power in Canada's election but lost both his majority and - by a slight margin - the popular vote.

It was a tough election battle for the Liberals but at least the party faithful in Montreal are now breathing a little easier.

Mr Trudeau had an exceptionally long honeymoon by most political standards - but his popularity has clearly dimmed with the Canadian public.

The first trouble came after a disastrous overseas trip to India, which took place against a backdrop of photo-ops showcasing the Trudeau family in elaborate traditional Indian outfits.

Then came the SNC-Lavalin affair - an ethics scandal related to attempts to pressure a former attorney general to cut a deal for a firm facing a corruption trial, which further tarnished Mr Trudeau's personal brand.

That former attorney general, Jody Wilson-Raybould, was booted out of the

Liberal party by Mr Trudeau. Against the odds, Ms Wilson-Raybould ran and won as an independent in her Vancouver riding. She is a vocal critic of Mr Trudeau and will serve as a reminder of that scandal in the House of Commons.

Finally, revelations that Mr Trudeau wore blackface - widely seen as a racist caricature - on at least three occasions shook the Liberal campaign and forced him to ask Canadians to forgive him for his past misbehaviour. 🌐

Duterte's health problems increase

Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte was forced to cut short his attendance of the enthronement of Japan's emperor on Tuesday, due to what his office said was "unbearable pain" in his lower back after a motorcycle mishap last week.

The health of Mr Duterte, 74, and his absences from the public spotlight are often the subject of fervent speculation, and the source of complaints from critics that his administration is not forthcoming about the extent of his ailments.

Mr Duterte had a minor fall from a motorcycle in the grounds of his palace last week, causing hip pain, bruises and scratches on his elbow and knee.

He used a walking cane in Tokyo during a ceremony for Japanese Emperor Naruhito's ascendance to the throne but skipped a banquet to return home and see his neurologist.

It was the third time this month that the government has tried to allay con-

cerns about Mr Duterte's health after the maverick former mayor told the Filipino community in Moscow that the frequent drooping of one eyelid was due to a chronic neuromuscular disorder. Mr Duterte's known problems include back pain, migraines from nerve damage after a previous motorcycle accident and Barrett's oesophagus, affecting his throat. His circulation is impacted by Buerger's disease, from heavy smoking when he was younger. He last year said he had tested negative for cancer. 🌐

Honduras president's brother is guilty

The brother of the Honduran president has been convicted in a massive drug conspiracy case in New York City after prosecutors said he relied on "state-sponsored drug trafficking" enabled by the Central American leader. He will be sentenced next month.

Juan Antonio "Tony" Hernández, 41, a former Honduran congressman, was stoic as the verdict was announced by a jury that deliberated over two days. He was convicted of drug conspiracy, weapons charges and lying to the Drug Enforcement Administration. His attorney promised to appeal.

The two-week trial put a spotlight on the lucrative drug trade between the United States and Honduras, where thousands of migrants have fled toward the US border with Mexico.

On Twitter, Honduras President Juan Orlando Hernández said he received news of the verdict "with great sadness."

"In the name of the Honduran government and its institutions any false and irresponsible version that aims to

stain the name of Honduras as a result of this verdict is rejected," he said.

US prosecutors say the drug conspiracy was protected by the Honduran government. The trial featured testimony that convicted Mexican drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman aided the conspiracy by giving \$1 million in bribes to Tony Hernández to pass along to his brother.

The Honduran president was not charged in the case but was labelled a co-conspirator. The president tweeted during the trial that the prosecution's allegations were "100% false, absurd and ridiculous." 🌐

Cuba hit by more US sanctions

Cuba's economic strife is likely to get worse after the United States imposed more sanctions on it over its support for Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro and Cuba's human rights record.

The Department of Commerce said that it is revoking existing licenses for aircraft leases to Cuban state-owned airlines and will deny future applications for aircraft leases.

The US will also expand sanctions to include more foreign goods containing US content and impose additional restrictions on exports to the Cuban government, the statement said.

"This action by the Commerce Department sends another clear message to the Cuban regime - that they must immediately cease their destructive behaviour

at home and abroad," said Secretary of Commerce Wilbur Ross.

Last month the US imposed sanctions on Cuba's Raul Castro, along with his children for his support of Mr Maduro.

Cuban President Miguel Diaz-Canel rejected the decision, calling it "inhuman, cruel, unfair and genocidal" in a post on Twitter.

In a separate statement, the US State Department criticised Cuba for its detention of dissident Jose Daniel Ferrer, calling on Havana to disclose his whereabouts, treat him humanely and release him without condition.

Mr Ferrer, a prominent figure who leads the Patriotic Union of Cuba (UNPACU), was arrested in Santiago de Cuba on Oct. 1 after a police raid on his home, which is also the group's headquarters. 🌐

Venezuela's motorists resort to bartering

Venezuela's economy is so bad that people have resorted to bartering rather than use cash to fill their vehicles with gas.

Motorists in socialist Venezuela have long enjoyed the world's cheapest gasoline, with fuel so heavily subsidized that a full tank these days costs a tiny fraction of a US penny. But the economy is in such shambles that drivers are now paying for fill-ups with a little food, a candy bar or just a cigarette.

Bartering at the pump has taken off as hyperinflation makes Venezuela's paper currency, the bolivar, hard to find and renders some denominations all but worthless, so that nobody will accept them.

Without cash in their wallets, drivers often hand gas station attendants a bag of rice, cooking oil or whatever is within reach.

"You can pay with a cigarette," said Orlando Molina, filling up his subcompact Ford Ka in Caracas. "Heck, it's no secret to anyone that it goes for nothing."

Gas is so cheap that station attendants don't even know the price. Emptyhand-

ed drivers get waved through, paying nothing at all.

This barter system, while perhaps the envy of cash-strapped drivers outside the country, is just another symptom of bedlam in Venezuela.

The South American nation of 30 million people is gripped by a deepening political and economic crisis. People live with a nagging feeling that anything from violent street protests to a massive power failure could throw their lives into chaos at any moment.

More than four million Venezuelans have fled the country in recent years, escaping low wages, broken hospitals, failing basic services and lack of security. 🌐

UK expects huge migration rise

The United Kingdom may not seem very appealing for immigrants to settle now because of the economic chaos Brexit is causing, but it is still highly desirable for many seeking a better life.

A migration boom is set to send Britain's population soaring by three million in the next decade. A staggering 73 percent of the UK's population growth will be down to migration - with births and deaths accounting for just 27 percent.

The number of people living in the country is expected to rise by 3 million in the next decade from 66.4m in 2018 to 69.4m in 2028.

The population will then pass 70m by 2031. But the pace of growth is expected to slow as women decide to have fewer kids.

The pace of growth is expected to slow based on assumptions that fewer children will be born as fertility rates fall and a slower rate of increase in life expectancy.

The proportion of people aged 85 years and over is projected to almost double during the next 25 years.

Anna Dixon, the chief executive at the Centre for Ageing Better, said the figures showed the age of the population was "dramatically shifting".

She added: "These longer lives are a huge opportunity, but big changes are needed to our workplaces, homes, health services and communities if we are to ensure everyone is able to age well."

"We also need to rethink our attitudes to age and tackle the ageist attitudes which hold back too many people from enjoying a good later life." 🌐

Jackson was wise to stay defiant

Lamar Jackson's stats as the Baltimore Ravens quarterback are impressive, yet at the 2018 NFL draft combine, speculation arose that several franchises viewed him as a wide receiver. It didn't matter that Jackson had never played the position.

He was, in fact, a quarterback who had recently completed a sensational college career at the University of Louisville, where he won the 2016 Heisman Trophy as a sophomore and finished third in the balloting a year later. During each of those seasons, Jackson threw for at least 3,000 yards and ran for at least 1,500 yards.

Still, some teams questioned Jackson's accuracy as a thrower and thought they could use his speed and teach him how

to become a receiver. Jackson, naturally, didn't take too kindly to the suggestion.

"There are a lot of quarterbacks who had my ability to make people miss," Jackson told the NFL Network at the time. "But they never labelled them as a wide receiver, so I feel I should have a chance at quarterback."

The Ravens gave him that shot when they selected him with the final first round pick of last year's draft. And they have been justly rewarded.

Now in his second season, Jackson, 22, is among the most promising young quarterbacks in the league for a team that could contend for the Super Bowl. Baltimore are 5-2 and atop the AFC North, a division whose other three teams are the Cleveland Browns (2-4), Pittsburgh Steelers (2-4) and Cincinnati Bengals (0-7).

Jackson is first in the league with 6.9 yards per rushing attempt, tied with Minnesota Vikings' running back Dalvin Cook for first with six runs of 20 yards or more and sixth with 576 rushing yards.

If Jackson keeps it up, he will break Michael Vick's record for most rushing yards in a season for a quarterback in NFL history, which

Vick set in 2006 when he gained 1,039 yards for the Atlanta Falcons. Jackson is on pace to run for over 1,300 yards.

On Sunday against the Seattle Seahawks, Jackson threw for 143 yards and ran for 116 yards, his third so-called "double triple" this year and fourth of his career. Vick is the leader with eight such games.

The Ravens have a bye this weekend and then return on Nov. 3 when they host the 7-0 New England Patriots in one of the most anticipated matchups of the season. The Patriots have arguably the best quarterback in NFL history in Tom Brady, who entered the NFL in 2000 when Jackson was 3 years old. And New England's defence has restricted to an average of 6.9 points per game, the fewest in the league.

Still, the Patriots have not faced a challenge quite like trying to contain Jackson, who took over as Baltimore's starter last November when veteran Joe Flacco sustained a hip injury. Three months later, when the Ravens traded Flacco to the Denver Broncos for a fourth-round draft pick, it signalled they were all in with Jackson. It's still early in his career and injuries can always occur, but it's looking like the Ravens' faith in

Jackson as a quarterback will pay dividends for years to come.

Meanwhile, rumours about Brady's departure from the Patriots are swirling after NFL observers claimed that there were signs the six-time Super Bowl-winning quarterback is plotting an exit.

Brady, 42, has his Brookline, Mass., home on the market in the summer, as did his trainer Alex Guerrero with his Norfolk home, according to Mass Live.

If he is planning on moving, it appears it would be news to everyone. Brady – who put up 249 passing yards, a touchdown and an interception in a 33-0 win over the Jets – doesn't appear to be finished playing football just yet. 🌐

Hamilton could clinch sixth title

Lewis Hamilton hopes to seal his sixth World Championship in the buzz of Mexico City this weekend.

The 34-year-old Brit is within touching distance of becoming the second most decorated driver in Formula 1 history – and one more title away from equalling Michael Schumacher's coveted record of seven.

Mercedes team-mate Valtteri Bottas is the driver who can now mathematically beat him. But with a 64-point lead despite Bottas taking victory at the Japanese Grand Prix, the odds are good for another championship fiesta on Sunday.

"Everything's possible," Bottas said after his first win since Baku in April. "Although I'm realistic as well that I will need to be very lucky, that's a fact, to win all the rest of the races."

If things don't go to plan and Hamilton finishes outside the top four in

Mexico, the title race would then move on to the United States Grand Prix in early November.

Hamilton isn't exactly brimming with confidence about the weekend: "Mexico is generally our Achilles heel – probably our worst race of the year," he said after his third-place finish at Suzuka. "The last few have been pretty shocking, even though we've won the title there."

As Mercedes have already wrapped up a record sixth straight constructors' championship, it's left for Hamilton to complete the Silver Arrows celebrations.

This could be the third straight year he seals the title at the Autodromo Hermanos Rodriguez but two things missing from those championship-winning years in Mexico have been pole positions and chequered flags. 🌐

Cristiano Ronaldo and Lionel Messi, who have won the award 10 times between them, again feature among the contenders.

Some of the biggest omissions from the list include Paris St-Germain and Brazil forward Neymar, Manchester United and France midfielder Paul Pogba and Tottenham and England striker Harry Kane.

Champions League winners Liverpool have the most players on the list from one club with Premier League champions Manchester City the next highest number with five.

Barcelona have four players; as well as Messi, Frenkie de Jong, Marc-Andre ter Stegen and Antoine Griezmann feature in the list.

The Ballon d'Or winner will be named in Paris on 2 Dec.

Luka Modric won in 2018 to end the seven-year dominance of the award by Messi and Ronaldo.

Gayle priced himself out of Hundred

Chris Gayle's bruised ego took another knock after missing out on selection in next year's inaugural staging of the new Hundred format in England.

Shane Warne believes Gayle and Lasith Malinga missed out on being selected in the Hundred draft because they priced themselves out of contention.

The two T20 stalwarts placed a reserve of £125,000 on their signatures, meaning that they could only be picked up in the first salary band, where there were 16 spots available, although three had already been taken up by Jason Roy, Eoin Morgan and Moeen Ali.

Given the depth of talent among the top bands – David Warner, Steve Smith, Mitchell Starc, Rashid Khan and Andre Russell were among those to be signed up in the first two price categories, the commercial pull of the two veteran short-format superstars was not enough to see them picked up.

"I think they priced themselves wrong," Warne admitted. "I think if they had gone for £100,000 rather than £125,000 they would both have got picked up."

Gayle experienced an unusually barren run in the Caribbean Premier League, making only 38 runs in the final

five innings of the tournament. The 40-year-old Jamaican has also been omitted from all three West Indies squads which means his career at international level may be over. Malinga, meanwhile, showed in the last over of the 2019 final that his unique action and skillset still bring value.





Ultimately, the game has moved forwards and, while the pair remain world-class performers on their day, they have been usurped as the principal A-Listers on the T20 circuit. Kagiso Rabada, Shakib Al Hasan and Kieron Pollard were among other big names to miss out, but all three had potential availability clashes. 🌐






