Saving Cayman's Blue Iguanas

The fight to save one of the worlds rarest and most revered lizards is raging in Grand Cayman and there have been many organizations and individuals whom have played a crucial role in saving this creature.

Alberto Esteban, who works with the Islands' National Trust, has been working to understand their behavior and is at the forefront of the efforts to save the animals, spends most of his time with the creatures.

Originally Hailing from Costa Rica, Mr. Esteban came to the Cayman Islands in 1970 and initially worked at the Gallon Beach, as well as the Holiday Inn as a bartender before going back to South America, where he joined an environmental group - working to save sea turtles.

Upon returning to the British Territory some years later, he began working as a volunteer with the Blue Iguana Recovery Programme and was eventually offered an official job by Mr. Fred Burton; one of the programme's progenitors.

"I used to go to the reserve at that time. The wardens there were very experienced and I learned a lot, eventually becoming the head warden. There were lots of iguanas in the 80's and 90's and quite a few hatchlings. I fed them everyday and learned from the animals," he noted.

Mr. Esteban added that he does not miss working in the bars and much pre-

HISTORIC CLAYTON NIXON HOME RELOCATED

The Ministry of Culture's relocation of a centuries old traditional, Caymanian style cottage from George Town to the National Trust's Mission House property in Bodden Town took place on Sunday 05th January, 2020, after months of planning.

Built in the 1800s, The dwelling is named after a former owner and

thought to have been constructed by his grandfather.

Quaintly known in the community as the Clayton Nixon House, the home was located on Goring Avenue, across the street from the Citrus Grove Building in George Town, where it stood for

Dead Hawksbill Turtle found



According to the CI Department of Environment, the Cayman Islands ended 2019 with some sad news:

Local divers found a dead hawksbill turtle off the coast near Lighthouse Point on Dec. 30. The turtle was found at about 80 foot depth with its left front flipper wrapped in fishing line.

Lost or discarded fishing line poses a major threat to sea turtles, especially juveniles, as it can entangle them and cut into their skin. The line is virtually impossible to see underwater. Hawksbills are critically endangered and lay very few nests in Cayman.

The Department of Environment (DoE) urges residents and visitors to use their fishing line recycling bins (pictured), in place at boat launching ramps and some local dive shops, rather than discarding their lines into the sea or on the beach. 🌐

Garden Club hosts Family Fun Day at Botanic Park



Tree Fire causes outage in the Lime Tree Bay area

On Saturday, January 4th, 1,313 customers from The Ritz-Carlton on the West Bay Road/Esterly Tibbetts Highway to the Hydesville Substation on Willie Farrington Drive in West Bay, experienced interruptions to their electricity service in varying durations between 5:58 p.m. and 1:38 a.m.

This interruption to service was caused by a tree fire next to a utility pole in the Lime Tree Bay area. The Cayman Islands Fire Service was immediately called to the scene to extinguish the blaze. Once the fire was extinguished, CUC's line crews worked diligently throughout Saturday evening and into the early Sunday morning hours to safely restore power to customers and repair the damaged equipment.

Approximately 1,213 customers were restored between 7:00 p.m. and 9:45 p.m. with the final 100 customers restored by 1:38 a.m. on Sunday, January 5th.

The cause of the fire was due to the tree contacting the power lines.

CUC reminds customers to refrain from planting large trees in close proximity to power lines and that it is the customers' responsibility to maintain trees on their property to ensure they are at least 10 feet away from power

lines. In cases where trees are within 10 feet of power lines, customers are advised to contact CUC's Customer Service Team at 949-5200, via e-mail at service@cuc.ky or visit the Company's website at www.cuc-cayman.com to arrange for trees to be trimmed as they represent a significant safety hazard.

Fishing Line Disposal

Entanglement in lost or discarded fishing line is one of the most severe threats to juvenile turtles in the Cayman Islands and is also a danger to other wildlife. Fishing line is nearly invisible underwater and causes drowning and severe injuries when it tangles turtles, birds, and other animals. It takes more than 600 years for line to degrade.

To address the threat of wildlife entanglement, DoE has installed fishing line collection bins at almost 40 sites across the three islands. With sponsorship from Atlantis Submarines, poles donated by the Caribbean Utilities Company, and additional support from Cayman Turtle Farm, DoE has placed the bins at public docks, dive shops, and fishing supply stores.

The purpose of the bins is to prevent entanglement by removing fishing line from the marine environment and from the shoreline. Collected line is recycled because even if unwanted fishing line is sent to the landfill it can continue to entangle birds and other animals.

Line from the bins is collected by DoE staff and volunteers, cleaned, and sent overseas for recycling where it is made into artificial fish habitats and tackle boxes.

To launch the project the DoE held a competition inviting students from across the islands to complete posters depicting the dangers of lost and discarded fishing line in the Marine Environment. Designs from Delissa Sarah Tatum (age 9, West End Primary School), Aiden Powery (age 9, homeschooled), and Jose Daniel Unruch (age 15, John Gray High School) were selected from among nearly 100 entries and made into signs for the recycling bins.

DoE asks fishermen, divers, snorkelers, and other members of the public to assist by depositing line in the fishing line recycling bins. Line which is wrapped around corals and sponges should be collected carefully in order to avoid damaging the marine environment: see our Guidelines for Fishing Line Cleanup below. [🌐](#)



DoE Requests Photos of Upcoming King Tides for Climate Science

King Tides, or unusually high tides are expected for the shores of the Cayman Islands in Mid-January and Mid-February, Scientists at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) officials say. And, while the tides are not normally considered cause for alarm, sea water could settle in low-lying areas.

King Tides occur at a few specific times during the year when the moon is closest to the Earth, and the Earth is

closest to the sun. Depending on the location of the sun and moon relative to the Earth at the time, tides may rise just a few inches to a couple of feet above normal, according to the Department of Environment (DoE).

These tides are being documented all over the world to help visualize and understand the impacts of sea level rise (like flooding and erosion) in the coming decades, and the Department of Environment (DoE) is appealing to residents of the Cayman Islands to help with the documentation of local occurrences. Documentation could include photographs of familiar landmarks like jetties, roads, seawalls, shorelines, and beach infrastructure. Those landmarks can help show how high the water is.

“In recent years we are aware of increasing instances of seawater from King Tides washing into some low-lying


local streets or groundwater backing up in storm drains,” said Wendy Williams, manager of DoE’s environmental management unit. “Unfortunately, we don’t currently have any annual, reliable observations of these occurrences. DoE staff members will document the high tide incidents they are aware of, but more eyes watching are always helpful.”

These tides are especially important to document in the winter when storm surge and high winds and waves are more frequent, creating even higher water levels. Through the King Tides information and photo initiative, residents can contribute to the study of sea level rise and the changing climate. Over time as the project continues, photos taken at the same locations year after year will help to show changing sea levels and other impacts.



“Having better annual records of these high tide events can help us to understand what a future sea level rise might look like, and thus aid in making preparations for such an event,” said Minister of Environment, the Hon. Dwayne Seymour. “I would encourage Cayman residents to participate and help us to document these events so we can learn from them.”

fers working in the forest with the lizards he has come to love so much.

In fact, he is credited with spending weeks at a time in the forests of Grand Cayman during the beginning of the programme, during which time he logged the animals' feeding and behavioral habits, which has been instrumental in their recovery from only 20 animals in the beginning of the recovery efforts, to over one thousand having been released into the wild since the inception of the project.

"They love regular plants, especially from the western Caribbean and they love fruits such as bananas, mango and papaya. We often feed them fruit platters and some like eating pecans," he remarked.

Mr. Esteban credits decades of working with the Blue Iguanas for keeping him 'young' and at 75-years-old there's still quite a lot of fuel left in his tank.

He can often be seen clasping his hands together and rubbing them before chanting, "My babies" upon seeing one of the iguanas and still takes between 300 and 400 persons on the walking tour of the their facility at the National Trust's Blue Iguana Recovery Programme facility in North Side each month.

Working 6 days each week, Mr. Esteban explained a regular day on his shift:

"I get there very early to sure they are ok and that they have water. Right diet is very important. Our priority is their diet

and we try to give them the best plants to eat."

One of the park's more popular Blue Iguanas is Peter, who loves to pose for pictures with visitors and stole the show in the Prince Charles visited Grand Cayman recently. The lizards are usually

very territorial and can be quite aggressive but Peter has taken a liking to his human suitors and is one of the few lizards that actually enjoys being hand-fed and showered with attention.

Alberto loves to show him off to visitors and even puts the creature on his

back sometimes while giving his presentation to visitors and guests.

The Blue Iguana is only found in Grand Cayman. Due to the Island's land mass being so remote in relation to any other Caribbean Island, their gene pool is extremely distinct. 🌐

nearly 150 years, not only as a reminder of the past but also as a testament to the soundness of craftsmanship and ingenuity of the Caymanian people.

The relocation was carried out by Miguel Brown of Green Iguana Construction Company and involved the house being fortified with plywood prior to hoisting it onto a low boy to be transported.

Caribbean Utilities Company (CUC) and the Royal Cayman Islands Police (RCIPS) were also crucial in the journey being made possible; clearing lines and low hanging trees and ensuring the flow of traffic.

Crowds of onlookers marveled and gathered to watch the historical building passing through the Districts to its final resting place.

“The structure is one of the only remaining examples of an early home, and was possibly built and owned by a slave family. It is also a fine example of traditional Caymanian construction techniques with walls that include wattle and daub as well as limestone,” explained Minister for Culture, Hon. Dwayne Seymour.

He also praised the efforts to relocate the historic home, which was in danger of being demolished due to the upcoming development of Citrus Grove II.

A press release from the Ministry of Culture stated:

“Because of the home’s important heritage, the Ministry put together a group of stakeholders that met throughout the last half of 2018. In addition it conducted research to verify the historical value of the property, developed a medium-term plan for the relocation, and finally sought and obtained approval from Cabinet.

“The stakeholders’ group included: Ministry of Culture representative DCO Nancy Barnard, Cayman Islands National Museum (CINM) Director Dr Margaret (Peggy) Leshikar-Denton, Cayman National Cultural Foundation (CNCF) Managing Director Marcia Muttoo, NTCI Director Nadia Hardie, NTCI Historic Programmes Manager Stuart Wilson, NTCI Chairman Andrew Gibb, NTCI Historical Preservation Committee members John Doak and Cathy Frazier, NTCI Volunteer Sue Gibb, and NCB Group property company representatives Alan Wight and Ally McRae who will



be developing the next phase of Citrus Grove.”

Nancy Barnard expressed pleasure that the relocation had successfully taken place.

“Buildings like the Clayton Nixon home offer an invaluable porthole into our past. The Ministry is committed to preserving all relics of historical importance for future generations. I am thrilled we have been able to carry out the relocation successfully and offer my sincere thanks to the numerous stakeholders who have collaborated with us to ensure the home is preserved.”

Noting that there is currently no legislation to protect Caymanian built heritage, Acting Chief Officer Nellie Pouchie said the Government is considering whether this can be addressed under the National Development Plan and the National Culture and Heritage Policy.

In the interim however, ad hoc approvals such as this will be supported by the Ministry, as they are in line with Policy Direction 5; Ensuring the place of Culture and Heritage in Development of

the National Culture & Heritage Policy and Strategic Plan 2017-2026.

“The Cayman Islands has developed so quickly over the past several decades that we have lost some irreplaceable historical structures and others are still at risk today. Through the National Culture and Heritage Policy the Ministry hopes to ensure appropriate levels of protection for these historic buildings which are so important to preserving our Caymanian heritage”, Ms Pouchie added.

Minister Seymour thanked developers NCB Group for their support and patience with the relocation.

“They had no hesitation in collaborating with this project. The built heritage of the Cayman Islands contributes to our understanding of ourselves and to our quality of life. We believe it is one of our country’s most important cultural assets” said the Hon Minister.

A step-well of historical value is also located on the Goring Avenue property, which the group hopes the developers will preserve on site. 🌐



Green Iguana cull to continue in 2020

The Cayman Islands Green Iguana Cull Project will continue in 2020 and all participating cullers will be required to renew their cull registrations in January.

Registration renewals will begin on 6 January, 2020 at the George Town Landfill counting station and continue until the end of January. Participants are asked to bring proof of Caymanian status and a valid Government-issued photo ID, as well as a valid firearms licence (if they are using an air rifle). Firearms licensing renewals or permits must be obtained from the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service.

"Any Green Iguanas brought in after 31 January, 2020 by cullers with expired registration cards would not be accepted," said Karl Noble, director of Cornwall Consulting Ltd., the company that manages the cull for the Department of Environment.

Registered cullers must be at least 18 years old and possess either Caymanian status or a valid trade and business licence. All registered cullers must also agree to terms set out in their con-

tracts with the cull management company. These include: the ability to correctly identify Green Iguanas and Blue Iguanas, agreeing never to trespass on private property and to treat animals humanely. Cull companies must also agree to manage team members and/or acquire Green Iguanas in a responsible manner, consistent with local laws and regulations.

"The Green Iguana cullers did a fantastic job in 2018/19, eliminating more than 1.1 million of these invasive creatures, but there is still more work to do," said Environment Minister, the Hon. Dwayne Seymour. "Cabinet has agreed to fund this project going into 2020 to ensure we don't let the situation get out of hand again."

A speech given recently by Mrs. Felicia Robinson, Coordinator of the Social Work Programme at UCCI, to the volunteer teachers of the CXC Education Volunteer Programme, places in sharp focus the importance of teachers, at whatever level, and the crucial nature of the educational enterprise.

As we begin the New Year and turn the spotlight more on education, those who teach must be constantly reminded that what they do is priceless and the better they do it, even more so.

What follows is taken verbatim from this excellent speech.

In the capacity as educators you are enriching not just the individual but also indirectly touching and reshaping your community. Through education, you are empowering and propelling students into new heights. Your work with the students enables them to create a new narrative; to vision and reach forward into new possibilities. It creates room for them to sit at tables where a seat is guaranteed based on academic or professional achievement only. Education opens doors for them to imagine, to tell and rewrite their story, to set goals for new successes, to meet social expectations, to practice reasoning skills, to think logically, listen carefully and expand their participation in society. All of this is what your giving facilitates. It helps the student to step into pathways that will lead towards improved social status and life circumstances.

The aim of an educator is not to clone or reproduce him or herself. Rather, it is to challenge and inspire the student to become their best. The mentoring and teaching of students is intended to support their individual and collective

successes. This is the responsibility that you undertake when you sign on to give and invest in the education of others.

I see education is an extraordinary gift that brings limitless possibilities for personal and professional success. As a three times graduate of the University of the West Indies and graduate from two other Universities in the United Kingdom, I am very much aware of the power and value of an education. Education helps us to advance but education also humbles us. It is true that the more we learn, the more we recognize that there is so much more that we do not know.


Let us be grateful for the privilege of access to a quality education. When I pause and reflect upon the breadth of opportunities that are available to educated individuals, I conclude gracefully that we all have a moral imperative to teach and bring others along with us into the knowledge world. The truth is, the exact outcomes of what our students will become are often unknown to us at the beginning of their education journey. This uncertainty of outcome should never be a discouraging factor. It is because of our education that we can believe and hope that many others will be socially transformed.

Today, education is still counted as a powerful vehicle for social justice. However, I caution that education alone will not put all wrongs right. While it will not substitute for integrity or character, education can position the individual into the space where he or she can contribute to the process of redress, redirect trajectories and make changes. Someone has aptly described education as the great leveler of social class and

inequalities. This truth is very evident throughout our Caribbean societies. It is because of educational achievements that many of us here have experienced improvements in our family and personal economic circumstances. Without any doubt, our education has impacted the quality and definition our social status and our family life.

Education also has the potential to bring changes into our employment settings and to engineer the transformation of the moral, socio-cultural, political and economic aspects of our communities. When we participate in the creating of a more highly educated population, we do so with the hope that our investment will contribute to the formation of a community of thinkers, dynamic, knowledgeable and ethical leaders. As educators is a moral imperative for us to be involved in the teaching and championing of transparency, honesty and accountability in public life and in influencing the definition and adoption of good governance models in our societies.

Education is not a passive engagement. Arguably, education has always had at its core a reforming agenda. As educators we are involved in what could be described as a political process of teaching, influencing and changing minds. As educators, we facilitate access to knowledge and information. We promote a voice when encourage individuals to speak up (opinion) and to engage in debating matters important to them. As teachers, we can shape the context of the social, political and economic discourse. We can influence the voice, tone, the volume and tenacity with which the community speak on issues. By encour-

aging careful thought, respectful debate and exchange of ideas we instill in our students an appreciation of not simply rights but also their responsibilities. As educators, we are also involved in developing informed advocates who will challenge and seek to correct social injustice.

I would like to suggest these are some of reasons why we choose to engage in the transfer of knowledge and in supporting the education of others. As educators we are simply opening a pathway for persons to enter and experience knowledge, greater freedom, and self-actualization. 🌐

Growing Restaurant Revenues: Revenue Management Series. Part 1

Grow your restaurant's revenue with powerful restaurant revenue management strategies

Perhaps, your restaurant is thriving, but you're always seeking a few new strategies to further boost sales. What is Restaurant Revenue Management?

Sheryl E. Kimes, professor of operations management at Cornell University's School of Hotel Administration (Ithaca, NY), defines restaurant revenue management as "selling the right seat to the right customer at the right price and for the right duration."

Sounds easy enough, doesn't it? Well, with accurate data obtained from your point of sale system (POS), a quick formula calculation, and strategy or way-forward based on the findings - it can be.

Revenue management is not a new concept. It's commonly used in the airline and hotel industry and it's now becoming more common in the restaurant industry because restaurants embody many of the same business characteristics of airlines and hotels that made revenue management so successful.

These characteristics include perishable products, fluctuating demand, high fixed costs, fixed capacities, and low variable costs. There is, however one notable difference: The service capacity isn't fixed.

Sure, you may have a certain number of seats, but service duration is variable. For example, some guests spend two hours eating while others spend three. That's in stark contrast to hotels and have fixed check-in and checkout time or even airlines where customers board and disembark at the same time.

Furthermore, space is limited, which places some constraints on service capacity, but unlike airlines or hotels, you're able to make changes to accommodate increases in demand. For example, you can adjust your table layout or give diners access to another section of your restaurant like your patio.

Revenue management rests on a measure of the time involved in the guest-service cycle. This time-based measure of restaurant operation is called revenue per available seat-hour (RevPASH). This is a key component of the process. The calculation is total revenue for a given period (e.g., meal period, day part, or day) divided by the product of the number of available seats and the length of the period in question. Restaurant owners and managers must understand their operation's RevPASH patterns to develop strategies for augmenting revenue, whether those strategies involve shifting customer demand to shoulder periods or tightening the service cycle.

Restaurant revenue management can be challenging. But can also be very beneficial if the right strategies to manage restaurant capacity, manage table turnover, and engineer a menu for profitability are implemented.



LAW SCHOOL MAKES SENSE OF BREXIT

In a special lecture given by Laura Panades, students at the Truman Bodden Law School got to grips with the causes and consequences of "Brexit".

Brexit is a word used to describe "Britain's Exit" from the European Union, a unique political and economic international organisation.

The European Union exists to promote free and fair trade across 28 different European countries and does special trade deals as a group with the rest of the world.

In a referendum held in June 2016, the UK voted to leave the European Union by 52% compared to the 48% that voted to remain in the European Union. The two-year notice period was extended to 31 January 2020.

Panades' lecture raised concerns about the uncertain impact Brexit will have on the Cayman Islands. She anticipated a generally negative effect on Cayman because of changing rules regarding financial aid, access to the EU's financial markets and international trade.

Panades also explained how Brexit would affect local students who study EU law as a core final-year module in the Law School's law degree programme.

The special Brexit lecture welcomed all TBLS students studying any of the three degrees the Law School offers: the undergraduate law degree, the Professional Practice Course and the International Finance post-graduate degree.

Students took part in engaging activities, recreating the 2016 referendum debate and discussing the results of the 12 December General Election.

Mitchell Davies, Law School Director, said:

"The high participation we saw from students attending this lecture shows how important it is for our students to keep on top of developing legal events."

"Staff initiatives like this lecture are strongly encouraged as a sign of our commitment to providing quality legal education in the Cayman Islands."

McGregor returns to face a cowboy

Conor McGregor makes his long-awaited return next week to the UFC after a hiatus of over a year. McGregor was mixed martial arts' most bankable fighter a few years ago, but a huge money boxing match with Floyd "Money" Mayweather distracted him.

McGregor takes on Donald "Cowboy" Cerrone, in a highly-anticipated clash at UFC 246 in Las Vegas on Jan. 18. McGregor seems faded yet he is still immensely marketable.

His box office numbers prove so. McGregor's last five fights are the highest grossing events in UFC history – with his bout against Khabib Nurmagomedov pulling in a record 2.4 million pay-per-view buys.

The 31-year-old Irishman is the first man to hold two UFC belts at the same time when he took Eddie Alvarez's light-weight title in 2016, while reigning as the UFC featherweight champion – a strap he took from Jose Aldo in just 13 seconds a year earlier. Aldo had been champion for more than five years.

However, McGregor is not an active fighter. In the past five years he's had seven bouts and six of those were completed by the end of 2016. He has only lost four times in 25 fights.

Since the Mayweather fight in August 2017, things have changed. Training

for and promoting that crossover money-spinning fight removed him from the UFC equation for an entire year, with Forbes stating McGregor made around \$100million – why would he be in a rush to get back in the octagon? Or fight again, for that matter?

Much of 2018 was spent by fans wondering if McGregor would ever be seen in the cage again. Had his hunger gone now his wealth exceeded what very few sportsmen ever get near, but the rise of an unbeaten Russian offered him a chance to shine on the big stage again. In April 2018, the Irishman and a group of allies tried to attack Nurmagomedov on a bus at the UFC 223 media day. Bad blood began to boil. Nurmagomedov stopped him in four rounds in October that year. McGregor was obviously not at his best after two years out of the octagon against a formidable champ. A rematch is always being mooted but McGregor must prove himself first. Against Cerrone he could go a long way to doing that.

But Cerrone is out to spoil the party - and he reckons he will cause an upset, especially as the contest is set at welter-weight, 170lbs, way above McGregor's usual fighting weight. Cerrone, 36, is naturally the bigger man. Whilst he has never held a major UFC title, he holds the record for most wins in UFC history

with 23 and believes his superior MMA pedigree can add another win to his record. His professional record is 36-13 but many of those losses were against high calibre fighters.

"Do I feel like a better mixed martial artist? Absolutely," Cerrone said. "I feel like I've been in the trenches. I've been in the big fights. I've walked this path many, many times.

"This is my 51st MMA fight coming out of that tunnel. Literally, I've done it more than anybody."


Much has been made of McGregor's plans after fighting Cerrone, with a rematch against Nurmagomedov on his radar, as well as match-ups against Justin Gaethje and Jorge Masvidal.

UFC chief Dana White admitted this week he felt people had been disrespecting Cerrone by writing him off. "We're getting through this one first, we're getting through the Cowboy fight," White said. "And the level of disrespect shown to Cowboy through this whole thing? Apparently, people forgot that Cowboy's lost two in a row before and come back and gone on unbelievable runs. Let's not count Cowboy out."

There are plenty of other quality fights on this bill: Holly Holm vs Raquel Pennington (women's bantamweight), Aleksei Oleinik vs Maurice Greene (heavyweight), Claudia Gadelha vs Alexa Grasso (women's strawweight), Anthony Pettis vs Carlos Diego Ferreira (lightweight). 📍

Windies test no-ball technology

West Indies are playing Ireland in a limited overs series this week and front foot no-ball technology is being trialled. West Indies bowlers like Sheldon Cottrell will be under scrutiny for front foot no-balls.

The third umpire is making no-ball calls as was the case during West Indies' recent limited-overs tour of India. The third umpire communicates no-ball calls to the on-field umpires.

Tuesday's one-day game at the Kensington Oval, Barbados, was the first of a six-match series between the sides which the Windies won by five wickets.

The on-field umpires are not calling front foot no-balls unless instructed by the third umpire but remain responsible for other on-field decisions.

Metcalf proves being receiver is not misplaced

When DK Metcalf ran a 4.33 second 40-yard dash at the 2019 scouting combine as well as other impressive stats, he seemed destined to be a defensive tackle, mainly because he is 6ft 3ins tall. But Metcalf was drafted as a wide receiver by the Seattle Seahawks and their faith in him in that position was fully paid throughout the regular season and even more so in beating of the Philadelphia Eagles in the play-offs.

In the regular season, Metcalf caught 58 passes on 100 targets for 900 yards and seven touchdowns, and that was just a warmup for what happened in Seattle's 17-9 wild-card win over the Eagles. There, Metcalf, 22, set an NFL record for a rookie receiver in his first playoff game, catching seven passes on nine targets for 160 yards and a touchdown. Had Russell Wilson not been hit on a couple of errant throws, Metcalf's day could have been even bigger.

Not only that, but Metcalf set a franchise record for the most receiving yards in a playoff game. Not bad for a guy who

supposedly couldn't do anything but run in a straight line. Not that Metcalf running in a straight line is a bad thing, as he showed on his 53-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter. And his 36-yard catch to ice the game with 1:47 left wasn't too shabby, either.

On Saturday, the San Francisco 49ers face the Minnesota Vikings and the other matches on Sunday are Green Bay Packers against the Seahawks, Baltimore Ravens face the Tennessee Titans and the Kansas City Chiefs take on the Houston Texans. 📍

Giannis feels he is the new king

Giannis Antetokounmpo's rise to the top couldn't have been more different from LeBron James's based on how each was heralded into the league. One of the greatest testaments to LeBron's career is the fact he was labelled the 'Chosen One' while he was in high school, and somehow, he graduated to not only meet those lofty expectations, but exceed them. Where many players have crumbled under the weight of prophecy, LeBron accomplished so much and is still setting records at 33.

Where LeBron's talent was apparent entering the league, Giannis came in at the Milwaukee Bucks as an unknown quantity, a project. Not only had he not been playing basketball for very long, but he was also a foreigner whose potential was mostly seen through his physical build. He couldn't even get an invitation to the Nike Hoop Summit, and was seemingly picked as a throw of the dice by a frustrated franchise desperate for a superstar. If LeBron was the Chosen One, Giannis was the Uncertain One.

When the Bucks drafted Antetokounmpo with the No. 15 overall pick in the 2013 NBA Draft, so little was known about the international man of mystery that draft reaction around the media landscape had two different spellings of his name. Then 6ft 9ins after growing three inches in the year leading up to the draft, Antetokounmpo was pencil-thin at 196lbs, and it seemed that the Bucks had swung for the fences with one of the highest-variance picks in recent memory. The 25-year-old Greek has filled out now and is a muscly, dominant 242lbs.

Nearly seven years later, it's difficult to argue that Antetokounmpo hasn't maxed out his potential. But that doesn't mean those post-draft prognostications were wrong. It did take him a few years to confirm that the Bucks had really hit a home run with his selection, and a few more for him to blossom into a full-fledged force capable of dominating every single game on both ends of the floor.

He's done that by improving immensely year by year. Antetokounmpo's shooting and making more three-pointers than ever before, having already hit a new career-high for made threes in a season. He's also at a career-high 32.7

percent assist rate. No wonder he is the current MVP and when the Bucks played the Lakers just before Christmas Antetokounmpo mimed wearing a crown, implying that he was the new king of the NBA, not LeBron. 📍

Royals enjoyed Canada break

Prince Harry and Meghan not only spent their Christmas holidays in Canada, but they stayed well into the new year too. It has led to speculation that they are planning to relocate there from the UK to live.

On Tuesday, they visited Canada House, the home of the High Commission of Canada to the UK. Canada House celebrates Canadian art, furniture and architecture. The royals wanted to meet with Canada's High Commissioner to the UK Janice Charette and her staff, "to thank them for the warm Canadian hospitality and support they received during their recent stay."

They also viewed a special exhibition by indigenous Canadian artist Skawenati at the House's Canada Gallery, and the couple met with members of the High Commission team.

The visit to Canada was punctuated by flutters of excitement as hikers spotted them in the hills of Great Victoria, British Columbia.

Filipinos set to flee volatile Middle East

Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte has ordered the military to prepare to deploy its aircraft and ships "at any moment's notice" to evacuate thousands of Filipino workers in Iraq and Iran should violence break out, reflecting Asia's growing fears for its citizens in the increasingly volatile Middle East.

Other Asian nations with large populations of expatriate labour may face similar decisions amid the rapidly escalating tensions between the United States and Iran following the US airstrike that killed Iranian General Qassem Soleimani in Baghdad.

Duterte held an emergency meeting with his defence secretary and top military and police officials to discuss the evacuation plans.

"President Duterte ordered the Armed Forces of the Philippines to be prepared to deploy military assets to repatriate overseas Filipinos in the Middle East, particularly from Iran and Iraq, at any moment's notice," said Senator Christopher Lawrence Go, a close ally of Duterte who fears that the Philippines may have to carry out massive evacuations if violence hits Middle Eastern countries like Saudi

Arabia that host large numbers of Filipino workers.

"I'm nervous. Iran seems to be hell-bent on a retaliation, which I think will come. It's a matter of time... the cry for blood is there," Duterte said. He urged Congress to hold a special session on the impact of a possible crisis in the Middle East and set aside contingency funds.

Iran has vowed to retaliate, and President Donald Trump warned that US forces would hit back at 52 Iranian targets if Americans come under attack. Iraq's parliament has also called for the expulsion of all American troops from Iraqi soil, which could revive the Islamic State group in Iraq, making the Middle East a far more dangerous and unstable place.

Honduras may get flood of US refugees

The Honduras government fears that the Trump administration is preparing to send asylum-seekers to Honduras — even if they are not from there. Under an 'Asylum Cooperation Agreement' signed in September, adults and families seeking asylum at the southern border can be sent to Honduras, denying them the opportunity to apply for asylum here. The US already has a similar agreement to send some asylum-seekers to Guatemala, which took effect last month.

Consensus is that this agreement with Honduras is unlawful and unsafe

and represents the latest assault by the administration on the country's fragile asylum system. Sending vulnerable migrants to Honduras will endanger their lives, and for some it could amount to a death sentence.

The LA Times claims that under the agreement, if Honduras rejects a person's asylum claim, then they will be precluded from seeking asylum in the US. So not only is the US outsourcing a huge problem to a tiny nation, it is planning to use that process as a pretext for stripping asylum-seekers of their chance to present their claims there.

Cuban tourism dropped after American sanctions

Cuba revealed tourism to the island dropped 8.5 percent throughout 2019 — including major declines in tourism from Europe.

Cuba received 3,896,868 tourists between January and the end of November 2019, a significantly smaller number than the five million the regime claimed it was anticipating at the end of 2018 and nearly 400,000 fewer people than last year. The year marked both the 60th anniversary of the bloody communist revolution of 1959 and the 500th anniversary of the founding of Havana by the Spanish, events the regime hoped would attract more tourists.

The regime blamed tightened restrictions on travel to Cuba by President Donald Trump for the fall in tourism, although all tourism by Americans to Cuba has been illegal since the 1960s. This did not stop 475,235 Americans from visiting Cuba, however, according to the Cuban government. It is not clear how many of these individuals were Cuban-Americans, as the Cuban regime does not recognize the US citizenship of someone born in Cuba or someone born in the United States to parents born in

Cuba, even if they have never been on the island.

Trump did end a loophole to the tourism ban last year that President Barack Obama implemented in 2016: allowing large cruise companies to sail from US territory into the ports of Havana and Santiago. Trump has also allowed Americans who lost territory in this way to sue companies handling properties there in American courts for the first time.

The Cuban Communist Party and Cuban Revolutionary Armed Forces own all tourism properties on the island. Any money generated from hotels, restaurants, malls, and other leisure destinations are paid to the regime.


Venezuela has too many dollars now

Venezuela has been swamped with American dollars which has become a huge problem in the economically devastated country.

The greenback is steadily gaining currency in the inflation-wracked country, where a single dollar buys about 60,000 bolivars on the black market. That's creating challenges for local businesses, because Venezuelan banks are barred from offering foreign currency accounts.

For safekeeping, an insurance saleswoman in the western town of San Cristóbal tapes stacks of dollars from clients to the inside of a toilet tank in her office bathroom. A general contractor, unable to wire cash to his accounts in the US, flew his elderly mother and wife from Caracas to Miami with \$9,900 of cash each, just under the limit required for reporting money to US customs authorities.

"This is money earned through legal means, yet in a currency that exists entirely outside the country's constitutional order. This isn't money laundering," said Luis Godoy, a former deputy chief of the judicial police who now works as a security consultant. "You have to wonder how many people right now have

money stacked inside their homes like Pablo Escobar."

The collapse of the bolívar, which shed 99 percent of its value against the dollar in 2019, mirrors that of the Venezuelan economy, which has endured 21 consecutive quarters of decline. The crisis has been aggravated by international sanctions that prohibit exports of oil to the US and cut access to external financing. While inflation has abated somewhat, largely through severe restrictions on lending, it remains the highest in the world, at an estimated annual rate of 6,567 percent, according to Bloomberg's Café Con Leche Index. A year ago, a cup of coffee cost 450 bolivars; at the end of last month it was 30,000 bolivars.

UK hotels suffer as Airbnb flourishes

The number of UK hotel insolvencies hit a five-year high in 2019, following a drop in business travel and tougher competition from Airbnb.

Hoteliers suffered a 60 percent jump in insolvencies over the year to September 2019 affecting 144 individual sites, according to figures compiled by the accountancy group UHY Hacker Young. That is up from 90 sites a year earlier.

The hospitality sector has been grappling with a slowdown across the UK economy that has caused businesses to cut spending on conferences and awaydays, which tend to be a key driver for hotel revenue.

The number of overseas tourists choosing to visit Britain also dropped by 3 percent and while there has been a surge in staycations among UK residents, hotels are having to compete with online booking platforms such as Airbnb that offer home stays, often at lower prices.

The surge in competition has forced hoteliers to lower their prices to win over customers just as they face rising costs. In 2019, around 15,500 rooms were added to the hospitality market, with another 19,300 in 2019.

Meanwhile, margins are being squeezed by higher business rates and costlier food and drink imports caused by the weaker pound. The report also found rising costs linked to listing on sites like Booking.com, which help hoteliers reach a wider audience but charge hefty referral fees that knock profits.
