CIFS Reminds the Public about Tackling Fires

On Tuesday, 21 January 2020 at 4.27 pm, the Cayman Islands Fire Service (CIFS) were called to a well-developed tree and hedge fire near the Old Hyatt building which was then safely extinguished.

Emerging video footage of the fire prior to the arrival of CIFS shows members of the public attempting to put the fire out with buckets of water and vehicles passing dangerously close.

CIFS would like to remind residents, businesses and visitors to the Cayman Islands that they should Get Out, Stay Out and dial 911 requesting fire and rescue. This includes outside wildfires where you should move to a safe distance, stay away and dial 911.

CIFS would only recommend tackling a small undeveloped fire where safe to do so with an appropriate fire extinguisher to prevent further escalation and calling 911 to report the fire as a matter of urgency.



Tackling larger fires, with no training, the wrong equipment or wrong extinguishing agent can lead to serious

injuries or a fire related fatality and should be avoided in the interest of public safety. 😚

Record-breaking air arrivals for 2019 Stayovers reached the half million mark in 2019

A symbol of how strong Cayman's stayover tourism product has become over the last decade, stayover visitor arrivals toppled the half a million mark for 2019, the Department of Tourism has advised.

The huge number of visitors (502,739 in total) who came to Cayman last year for a vacation via air was attributed to a steady growth in airlift and also in accommodation. This figure represented an 8.6 per cent increase over the same period in 2018 and was the highest number of stayover visitors in recorded history and tenth consecutive year of annual growth in stayover visits.

When broken down geographically, the number shows a marked in crease in vacationers from the United States (up 33,293 on 2018), 3,525 more visitors from Canada and 829 more from the UK. Although these figures are for Grand Cayman, the Sister Islands also saw increases in air arrivals, with Cayman Airways recording a seven per cent increase in air arrivals in 2019 (visitors and residents) at 62,911, while Little Cayman recorded the most arrivals ever at 30,537.

Rosa Harris, Director of the Department of Tourism, said the rise of the 'homeshare' segment of new licensed tourism accommodation properties (such as Airbnb and Vrbo) had contributed to the increase in numbers.



"It is a great sense of accomplishment that the Department of Tourism is able to help the general public understand that tourism involves everyone. We remain committed to embracing travel trends early and ensuring that the Cayman Islands stay ahead of the curve when it comes to giving our visitors the idyllic dream sun, sand and sea vacation," she said.

In addition to this newly developing segment of accommodation offerings in



Cayman, increased airlift had also played a significant role in the stayover tourism growth.

Calling airlift Cayman's "oxygen", Ms Harris said: "My team and I invest significant effort to maintain and grow strong aviation partnerships to ensure that airline capacity and flight frequency throughout the year are maintained and increased wherever possible. This ever-increasing ease in accessibility for our visitors, paired with the exceptional Caymankind service and experience unique to our

country, enable us to grow the business and set visitation records."

Airlift from key visitor source markets showed significant expansion in 2019, the DOT said, whether through increased service or new airlines flying into the country. Airlift expansion included Cayman Airways returning to Denver in December 2019 through August 2020 with a twice weekly service, American Airlines putting on an additional seasonal service from Boston



and new service from JFK in 2020, Sunwing launching a service from Toronto, Canada for February 2020 and British Airways introducing an extra flight on Tuesdays, among others.

Ms Harris said she would continue to focus on source market diversification, new partnerships, and innovative destination marketing plans to continue to drive the record-breaking successes for the Cayman Islands in the new decade ahead.

the role that Cayman plays in Global Finance. Ms Heather Smith, Head of the Investment and Securities Division at CIMA, provided an update on the work of the Authority over the past year. Frozen iguanas were found in Florida

Frozen iguanas 'fell from the skies'

Cayman Islands has gone through a dip in temperatures recently but at least our iguanas have survived, unlike those in nearby Miami who are literally falling from trees, frozen with cold.

The National Weather Service in Miami felt the need to issue its forecast for iguanas on Twitter. "Don't be surprised if you see iguanas falling from the trees tonight," it tweeted on Tuesday evening.

Because iguanas are cold blooded, they slowed down, or become immobile when temperatures drop below 45F.

As a result the iguanas have seemed to fall from the sky, onto streets, cars, pools, or even people walking around.

Florida residents have even resorted to selling iguana meat on Facebook Marketplace after capturing the frozen reptiles.

Several ads selling skinned, butchered - and headless - iguanas, often nicknamed 'chicken of the trees', started springing up online overnight in Miami, Doral and Homestead.

One post advertises freshly prepped garrobo, a name often used in Latin America for iguana, for a steal at \$1. The same seller also offers the skin-on variety for chefs who want a more hands-on approach with their food.

Others, however, were selling frozen iguana meat several days before the cold weather kicked in, suggesting this is far from a seasonal specialty for some.

Bemused residents took to social media to poke fun at the craze. "You know it's cold when Facebook Marketplace got garrobo meat for sale #BecauseMiami #ChickenOfTheTrees," one person tweeted.

The supply of the unusual meal choice comes just hours after states across the Southern and Eastern United States were told to brace themselves for freezing temperatures with icy winds, frost, snow and iguanas falling from trees.

"This isn't something we usually forecast, but don't be surprised if you see iguanas falling from the trees tonight as lows drop into the 30s and 40s. Brrrr!" NWS Miami tweeted.

The low temperatures stun the invasive reptiles, but the iguanas won't necessarily die. That means many will wake up as temperatures rise.

Female iguanas can lay nearly 80 eggs a year, and South Florida's warm climate is perfect for the prehistoric-looking animals. Iguanas are native to Central America, tropical parts of South America and some Caribbean islands.

Iguanas can be kept as pets in Florida but are not protected by any law except anti-cruelty to animals. They've been in South Florida since the 1960s, but their numbers have increased dramatically in recent years.

Seventeen people have died in China and over 500 hundred have so far been reported to have caught the deadly respiratory virus which has flu-like symptoms.

According to Cayman Islands Medical Officer for Health, Dr Samuel Williams Rodriguez: "While there have been no local reports of the coronavirus in the Cayman Islands, the public health department is closely monitoring the situation.

"At the advice of the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) we continue to strengthen our surveillance efforts to detect patients with acute respiratory disease and to ensure all health care professionals are up to date with guidance on infection and prevention control, and standard recommendations to prevent infection spread of the disease", he stated. Dr Rodriguez has also advised that: 'Travellers returning from countries where there have been reported cases, and who develop breathing difficulties that are unexplained by any other illness or virus, should contact a doctor as soon as possible and state their travel history so that a correct diagnosis can be made."



At the moment, there is no vaccine available and treatment is supportive care based on the patient's symptoms.

The World Health Organisation(WHO) has confirmed that the virus which has been traced to the city of Wuhan, China, has to date spread rapidly across Asia, with cases reported in Singapore, Thailand, Taiwan, Japan and the Republic of Korea.

The Pan American Health Organization has not advised special screening for the coronavirus at points of entry nor recommended any travel or trade restrictions in the Caribbean/Latin America region.

However, that advice could be changed.

The WHO was meeting this week to determine is the current situation warranted a global pandemic alert.

WHO physicians said they've found evidence of human-to-human transmission. The virus was first noted for his transmission from among animals, then from animal to humans.

The coronavirus is being compared to the SARS outbreak of 2003.

However, while SARS took almost two months to spread to around 400 people, the rapid spread of this strain of the coronavirus to over 500 in less than a month is a cause for concern by global health experts.

Meanwhile, in the United Kingdom, Health Secretary Matt Hancock has said there was an increased likelihood of the virus occurring in the country.

However, he said while there are presently no known cases, the National Health Service (NHS) was "well prepared" to handle an outbreak. Flights from China arriving in the UK are being monitored as a precaution.

Similar measures have been put in place in the US.

In Wuhan, China where the outbreak started, the city has been placed under lockdown with the transportation network closed. P





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St Kitts farmers go ape over monkeys

The St Kitts and Nevis Department of Agriculture has intensified its pest control efforts to address its growing monkey problem. Farmers have reported hundreds of thousands of dollars in losses after their crops were destroyed by Green Vervet monkeys.

Director of Agriculture Melvin James announced plans to form a Monkey Task Force to implement measures to address the damage being done by the cheeky pests.

He said: "In terms of farming, they're a nuisance, we've noticed that they eat almost everything, cabbage, peppers, squash, pumpkin and watermelon. They even uproot cassava and sweet potatoes. On average we lose 100 metric tons of food every year. Food that would have otherwise been marketed. That has cost us quite a bit."

It is hoped that the task force will serve to reduce the number of pests in the farming district.

He added that despite the damage they cause, the monkeys in St Kitts and Nevis shouldn't be presented as all negative. He said: "They are an important part of the tourism product; a lot of people like to see them and pet them, and we also do very significant bio-medical research which makes the rounds worldwide."

Steps to address the monkey problem are all part of a multi-million-dollar pest control plan which is being funded by the government. 📀

Trinidad restores its heritage sites

Trinidad and Tobago ongoing restoration of its heritage sites has been a long and expensive process, but the recent revival of these national buildings has been met with both praise and criticism.

The rehabilitation of the Red House (the traditional seat of the country's parliament), for example, and Mille Fleurs, which is one in the row of Magnificent Seven buildings bordering Port of Spain's Queen's Park Savannah, have taken years to complete. The works to

the Red House have the longest time frame — 20 years in the making. The extended time frame is due, in part, to the massive scope of the projects, and the fact that some sites have

been neglected to the brink of demolition. The Red House was reportedly in such a poor state that restoration was the only alternative.

Many of the projects remained in the planning stages under various political administrations. It is only within the last five years that the necessary fund-

ing was committed and work was able to begin.

Some of the sites that have benefitted from this restoration thrust include Killarney (also known as Stollmeyer's Castle), Whitehall (also called Rosenweg) and the President's House.

At a Ministry of Finance function in October 2019, Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley told the audience that not only did the buildings need to be saved because of their relevance to the country's history, but that the construction work that was being carried out created employment as well. 📀

Guyana's first oil batch sets sail

Guyana has officially shipped its very first batch of crude oil, a major oil-first for the country.

The first batch of oil — a million barrels of Liza sweet crude oil - is currently on a Suezmax tanker Yannis P headed for the United States. The Liza field is co-owned by Hess Corp, China's CNOOC, and operator ExxonMobil who made 15 offshore finds in Guyana.

The project has uncovered more than six billion barrels of recoverable oil and gas, although a more recent find earlier this month will increase that figure. It is not yet known which of ExxonMobil's US refineries the new crude will end up in.

All in all, ExxonMobil and its partners are expecting to produce at least 750,000 barrels per day within five years—a figure that if achieved would catapult Guyana into a serious global

oil player and significantly raise living standards.

Exxon's quick success in Guyana has triggered an exploration campaign in neighbouring Suriname, with a Total/ Apache partnership striking oil right across the border just last week. The development brings hope to Suriname that it, too, could one day become an oil powerhouse. 📀

Barbados former minister guilty of fraud

Former Barbados government minister Donville Inniss was found guilty of three criminal counts when he appeared in a federal district court in New York last week.

The unanimous verdict was handed down by a 12-member jury after just under two hours of deliberation. Innis is guilty of two counts of money laundering and one count of conspiracy to commit money laundering.

The court found that the former legislator took bribes from insurance giant ICBL in 2015 and 2016 while he was Minister of Industry, International Business, Commerce and Small Business Development.

ICBL then paid him \$US36,000 to use his authority to ensure that the firm's million-dollar contract with the state-

owned Barbados Industrial Development Corporation was renewed.

The court was told that Inniss then conspired to hide the payment by having the money sent to a New York dental company, then deposited into his bank account through a series of transfers. He is to remain on bail pending sentencing next month. 😚

Bermuda Spa Month is set for the entire month of February again this year following its successful launch last year.

This year will include treatments at many of Bermuda's top hotels and spas - with some treatments starting at \$99 — a 50 percent discount off regular prices.

there is a year-round festival program.


These events will include the Real Mas, Jazz and Creole, dive fest, crab fest and the World Creole Music Festival. 🟈

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
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


SUDOKU
