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Cost cuts for the elderly

In line with an ever-growing general population, some of the most vulnerable members of society are also increasing in numbers, specifically, the elderly. In 1999 the population was 39,020 with 2,194 or 5.62 per cent of the population over 65. The percentage of the population who are elderly has barely changed in the last few decades, with just small changes up and down. There was an estimated population of 65,813 as at the end of 2018, with 4,946 people over 65 (7.5 per cent); but while the numbers of elderly per population might not have changed a great deal, the fact that the population has grown

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How to Find an Angel Investor for Your Small Business

Owning and operating a small business is never easy, particularly when the biggest part is gaining access to capital in order to finance the day-to-day operations.

Need money to fund your startup or expand your small business? Forget venture capital (VC) and bank loans. For 99% of today's startups, VC money is a fantasy and bank loans are hard to get. Angel Investors (AIs) are the way to go. They are more abundant and better organised than before, and linking up with them has become easier (not easy, mind you, but easier than it was before).

Consider Chris Michael who recently sought funding for his virtual business phone numbers firm Swytch. He found funding paradise at a place called Angel Investment Network. "Xavier and the team at Angel Investment Network were a pleasure to work with, extremely professional and everybody that we were introduced to said the same. They provided us with quality leads and we have a couple on board as first round investors."

Angel investors have become a key source of startup and early stage capital to tens of thousands of promising young companies annually. Moreover, Angel investors are actively looking for enterprises to back. Once conducted largely privately, the angel investment process has moved more front and centre stage. Some angels act alone, but today's angels are more apt to work through angel investor groups that have bloomed universally.

Angel investors and venture capital (VC) firms are unlike. Whereas Angels invest mainly in startup and early stage businesses, VCs provide growth capital for later stage businesses. The good news for local based entrepreneurs is this: Locating angel groups, learning how they work, what types of startups interest them, and discovering the exact process on how to approach them, has become easier thanks to websites such as Caribbean Angel Investment Network (CAIN).

CAIN is the Caribbean's branch of the Angel Investment Network (AIN) a professional alliance of angel groups, bringing together over 145,172 angel investors. Currently, over 2 billion dollars of capital is available on the Carib-

bean branch of the Angel Investment Network, a clear sign that the market is growing. Investors from various countries have also helped the market grow, with investors from China and India amongst the list of countries looking to invest in the Caribbean.

On CAIN's website www.caribbeaninvestmentnetwork.com, The "Entrepreneurs" section will tell you:

- How to register
- How to add a pitch using their template
- How to connect with angel investors
- What criteria angel groups use to select entrepreneurs to back
- What fees you can expect to participate apply for group funding
- Information on Investors and sums they're willing to invest

Usually, the investment process has numerous steps, including an initial application, pre-screening, screening, investment meeting, due diligence and, finally, a term sheet offering if you make the cut. Approximately one in three angel groups charge a fee to present your idea. For those groups that do charge, the average application fee is about \$190, and the average presentation fee is around \$500.



There are other angel investor sites entrepreneurs can try though most of them are Asean, Canadian, European, UK and USA centric. One exception is <https://gust.com> which provides a single common application for hundreds of angel groups around the world. The Gust Company Profile pilots you through the process of polishing your application and connecting with the right investors. Currently, thousands of companies have used their profile to collectively raise over \$1 billion through the Gust angel network. So getting your funding re-



quest on Gust is a great way to help get yourself on the map and attract funding for your business.

You can also search for regional angels on the RAIN website at <http://link-caribbean.com/rain/>. It currently has three groups organised by country, such as Jamaica, and Barbados. The site includes a link to each member's website where you can learn more about that particular group, including investment preferences and application process.

Here are three "should know" tips about finding and approaching angels, from the non-profit Angel Capital Education Foundation:

1. Angels are not venture capitalists (VC). Angels invest their own money in a business. VC money usually comes from institutional sources. Angels also back startup and early-stage businesses, while venture capitalists usually prefer later stage companies. Individual angels invest \$5,000 to \$100,000, while VC investments start \$2 million and up.

2. To attract angel interest, be willing to relinquish some ownership or control of your business, and be able to show a significant return within 3-7 years, as well as a profitable exit strategy.

3. Seek angel funding when: a) your product or service is fully developed; b) you've already invested your own money (aka seed capital) and exhausted other alternatives (like family and friends); c) you have existing or confirmed potential customers; d) you can show that the business is likely to grow fast and can pass \$1 - \$10 million in revenues within 3-5 years.

For small amount, tech startup funding, check Y Combinator. If you have a startup idea in the software or web ser-

vices space and need between \$5,000 and \$20,000, plunge in and submit your idea. These savvy startup funding people are more interested in good ideas than slick business plans. Interestingly, you don't need to be a US citizen to take advantage of this funding.

Thinking of placing a pitch on CAIN? Here's their advice on how to write it:

"Fill in our quick & easy pitch form to send your business idea to our network of Angel Investors."

However, before you pitch investors, you need to build a minimum viable product or service, get it in front of customers, and know something about its product/market fit. If you can't reach this stage by yourself, find some idea investors instead. Then register with CAIN, fill out and submit a 150-word elevator pitch that will be presented to CAINs registered angels. Spend time writing and re-writing the pitch until it's remarkable. Get feedback from good writers and entrepreneurs who have raised money."

Finally, you need to know your targets well in advance. There are entrepreneurs who end up in a meeting with angel investors oblivious of what they are looking to get out of the Angels. You need to value your idea and show the Angel the value in his/her investments. It's essential to show some realistic projections in terms of gaining a footing in the market and converting your customers and sales into profits. Don't try and bamboozle the Angel as they have a better feel of the market than you may have guessed. You need to focus on the top figure based on the possibilities of your idea. If your idea is sound and merit the money, an experienced investor won't waver from putting his/her money into it.

Be aware of these things and you'll be able to successfully raise the needed capital for your business. 🌐

The Water Authority continues to make repairs to its water distribution network following last week's (28 January) earthquake. Further to the temporary measures put in place to restore water service in areas with significant infrastructure damage, the Authority will be carrying out pipeline replacement work over the coming weeks.



On **Tuesday, 4 February**, between **9 am – 4 pm**, the Authority will carry out pipeline replacement works along Oak Mill Street, where the earthquake caused sinkholes.

so quickly means that a large number of people, most of whom are Caymanians (4,435 as at 2018), may now be in need of extra care, medical assistance and financial help.

To help ease the financial struggle many elderly people face once they can no longer work, Government announced a raft of measures to reduce costs for Cayman's elderly population, with the Premier Alden McLaughlin advising that government was introducing a package of concessions designed to reduce the costs falling on older persons late last year.

"Across government, some 14 fees or duties will be significantly reduced or waived for persons over 65," he advised in his Budget address to the House.

This package included reductions in vehicle licensing fees, duty reductions for mobility scooters and wheelchairs and reduced post office box rental fees. The Premier also announced that work permit fees for caregivers of older persons would be reduced and they would also reduce import duties for older persons coming through the airport.

"The impact of the changes will obviously vary from individual to individual but the concessions generally focus on those in greatest need," he said. "We calculate that the revenue foregone by government will total approximately \$830,000."

The Premier also said that income payments for seafarers, veterans, those in need of social assistance and long serving civil service pensioners would also be increased, further to an increase

for this demographic in the previous Budget.

"...this budget has again provided for more support for these groups of people and that from the 1st of January, 2020, they will see their monthly income rise by another \$100 per month to \$850," he advised, adding that the Government intended to go further and introduce an extra \$100 per month from January 2021, lifting the monthly payment to \$950.

"This means that under this Government, there will have been an increase of at least 73 per cent in the income of over 2,000 of Cayman's most vulnerable and hard-pressed households," he advised.

Over the past few years, Cayman appears to be gearing up to take more care and make more focus on its elderly population. October has been assigned as Older Persons Month, bringing the elderly into the forefront, with events taking place during that month integrating young people with the elderly, in particular.

The private sector, however, seems to be relatively slow in specifically working towards aiding Cayman's elderly population. One supermarket, Hurley's, stepped up to the mark, with their 10 per cent discount on Thursdays for all shoppers over 65.

"It started a few years ago when we offered the discount just throughout the

month of October, when that month was designated Older Persons Month," Scott Kristal, Hurley's Marketing Manager advised. "I started talking with my bosses to see if we could introduce this one day a week year-round, to help out elderly people, particularly those on a fixed income, as every little helps."

One business woman in her late sixties commended some initiatives but felt more could be done.

"There are some measures which are really working, parking at the hospital designated for seniors is a good one, but they need senior parking at the Government Admin Building, as well as behind the Public Library and at the Courthouse would be good," she said.

She went on to say she felt that programmes which get seniors involved in going out and doing things are what was really needed.

"One of the biggest problems seniors face is loneliness. The John Gray Memorial Church in West Bay has an exemplary programme for seniors, enhanced by the fact they have a bus. My 92-year old mother has an active social life thanks to this," she advised, adding that she felt what was really needed by Government was for them to get out and talk to the elderly about practical things which could be done to ease their lives.

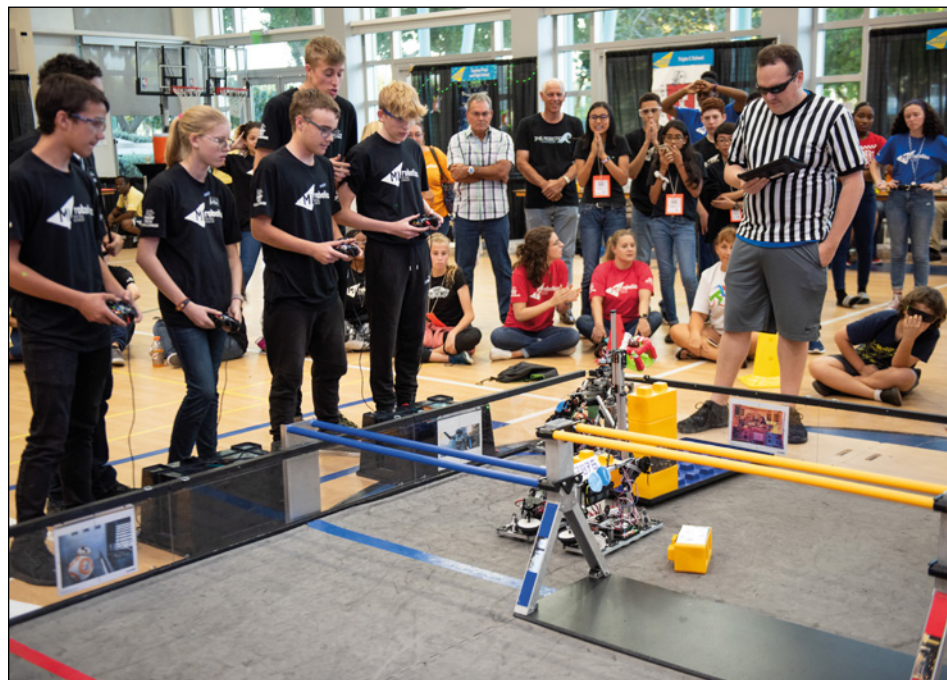

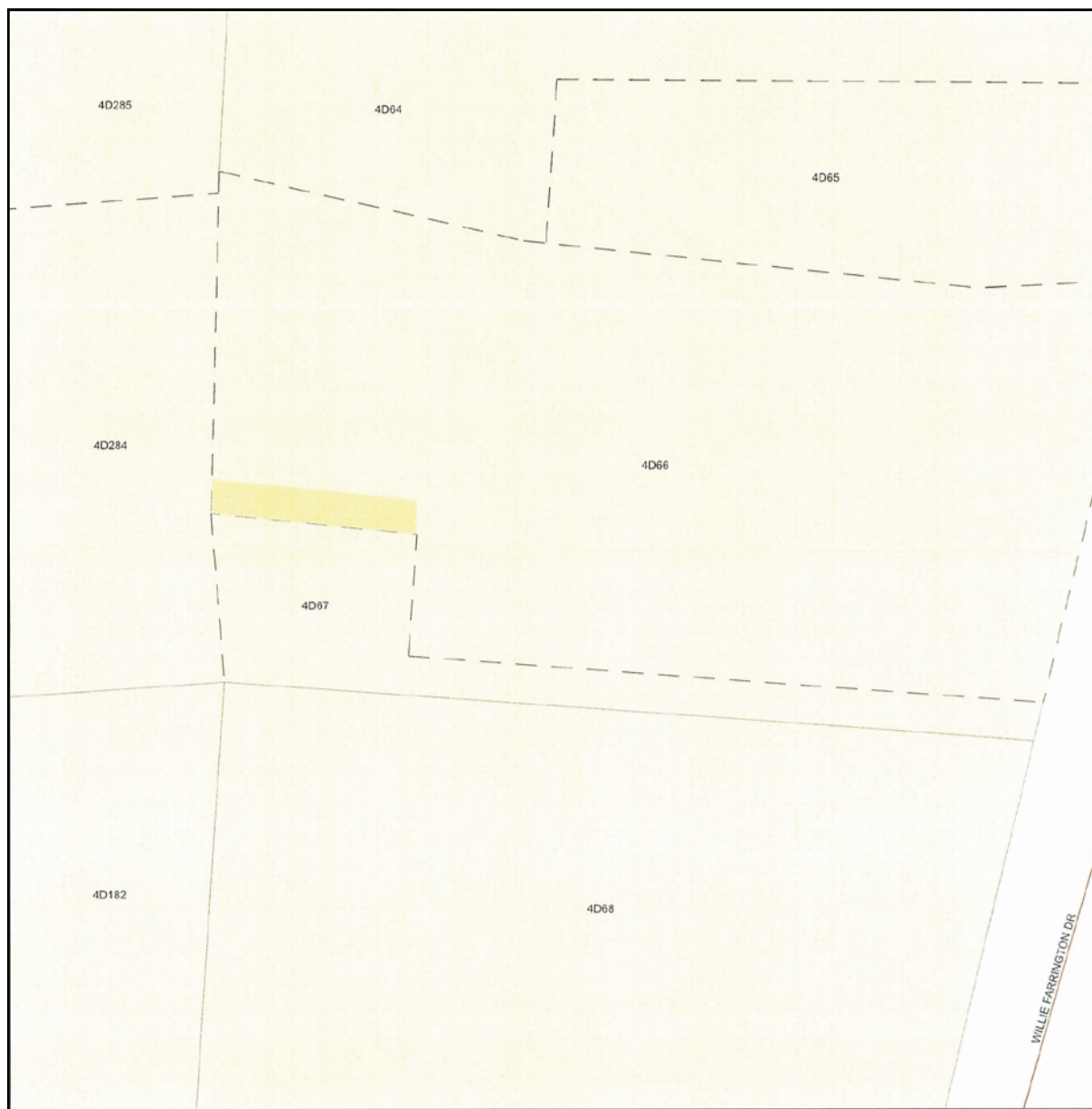

The Cayman Islands Junior Squash Programme kicked off a couple of weeks ago at the South Sound Squash Club and those who run the programme are keen that any youngster interested in trying out the sport come on over and give it a go.

Overseen by Marlene West, Manager of the South Sound Squash Club, along with squash professional Cameron Stafford who are assisted by top junior player Nathan MacLean and senior

player Hugo Janse van Rensburg, the programme is a great way to get fit, make friends, and develop a competitive streak.

The Junior programme, which runs from 11th January until 4th April, is taught to each individual's ability within three categories - bronze, silver and gold - with consideration for age in the bronze category. Bronze meet on Wednesday after school and on Satur-

day morning, silver meet on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday after school and Saturday morning and gold meet Monday, Tuesday and Thursday after school and later Saturday morning. In addition, there is open play on Friday after school.

Marlene advised that, depending on group level, the young players are taught the all the basics, "from catching a ball or bouncing a ball on the racket all the way through to technique work and tactical match play," she said.

While there are not any specific tournaments on the agenda right now specifically within the junior squash programme, Marlene advised that they would like to get different match play via traveling to training tournaments or have other Juniors attend the Island to play, but this, she advised, is a "work in progress".

"The more advanced Junior players will be gearing up towards Junior Caribbean Championships in Bermuda July 2020," she said.

Marlene said that squash is a great sport with which to become involved, ideally starting at the age of 6 or 7. The advantages to one's overall health (physical and mental) are numerous, she said.

Trinidad-Venezuela Gas Deal on Back Burner Because of US Sanctions

The Trinidad and Tobago Government today disclosed that a 2013 agreement with Venezuela for the joint development of a natural gas field straddling their maritime border has been on hold.

And Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley has blamed the decision on the United States' imposition of sanctions on Venezuela's state-owned oil and natural gas company, *Petróleos de Venezuela, S.A. (PDVSA)* last year.

As a result of, he said, Venezuela and Trinidad would independently develop the shallow-water field which is estimated to contain 10.25 trillion cubic feet of natural gas.

Rowley made the disclosure about the latest development in the Dragon Deal – considered a landmark cross-border agreement between the two Caribbean neighbours – at the Trinidad and Tobago Energy Conference and Trade Show at Hyatt Regency in the capital, Port of Spain this morning.

"Progress in the development of the unitized Loran-Manatee field has been impeded by the sanctions imposed by the US government, which inhibit US companies from doing business with Venezuelan oil company PDVSA," he said.

"This impacts on the ability of US company Chevron, which has a 60 per cent interest in the Loran field, to participate in the development of the Loran-Manatee Field. As a consequence, the Government of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago and the Bolivarian Government of Venezuela have agreed to the independent development by each Government of the field within the Loran-Manatee cross-border that falls within its marine area."

Shell Trinidad and Tobago has full stake in the Manatee field and it is projected that gas production there could start by 2024 or 2025, at rates ranging from 270 to 400 million standard cubic feet per day.

"Shell is in conversation with the government and is working on various development scenarios to determine the best option," Prime Minister Rowley told those gathered at the energy conference which was organized by the Energy Chamber of Trinidad and Tobago and is being held under the theme, 'Shaping the Caribbean's Energy Future'.

He added that should the US sanctions be lifted, both parties would be in a position to move ahead with their cooperation as "virtually all the preparatory work has been done". Under the gas deal

signed in 2013, 73.75 per cent of the joint field belongs to Venezuela and the rest to Trinidad and Tobago.

In imposing the sanctions in January last year, the US government alleged that PDVSA has been a vehicle for corruption, and that a variety of schemes have been designed to embezzle billions

of dollars from the state-owned company for the personal gain of corrupt Venezuelan officials and businessmen. As a result of the action, all property and interests in property of PDVSA subject to US jurisdiction were blocked, and Americans were generally prohibited from engaging in transactions with them.

Jamaica Bans Travel to and From China Over Coronavirus Fears

The Jamaica Government has imposed a travel ban on all flights to and from China, and citizens have also been strongly advised not to travel to that country.

The ban comes in the wake of the World Health Organization's declaration of the new Coronavirus, which originated in the central Chinese city of Wuhan, in the Hubei Province, as a global health emergency. As of today, more than 17,400 people – mostly in China – have been infected by the virus which has also killed at least 362 people.

Minister of Health and Wellness Dr Christopher Tufton, in announcing the travel ban, said people entering the island from China will be subject to immediate quarantine for a minimum of 14 days.

"Quarantine facilities for these persons will be provided by the Govern-

ment of Jamaica and they will be required to adhere to all restrictions, in line with the provisions under the Quarantine Act. Individuals returning from China who have been granted landing privileges and who show any symptom of Coronavirus will be put into immediate isolation," he disclosed, adding that quarantine facilities at all public hospitals are operational, with a specialist facility at the National Chest Hospital, in Kingston.

Dr Tufton said he recognized the inconveniences the ban posed, but appealed to Jamaicans in China who may be affected for understanding.

"Our first and foremost objective is to secure the safety of the Jamaican people," the Health Minister said.

"We certainly hope that those who have been affected will appreciate why



this decision had to be taken. The Government of Jamaica, through my own Ministry, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, the Ministry of National Security and other Ministries have been monitoring the situation as it relates to the Coronavirus."

Dr Tufton said the virus poses a clear and present danger, and is spreading rapidly in terms of countries that are being affected.

Meanwhile, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, Senator Kamina Johnson Smith, said the Government continues to be in dialogue with Jamaicans residing in China.

"We are doing our very best to support them as best as possible. Every Jamaican overseas, their welfare and wellbeing is of importance and interest to the Jamaican government. Our students, our teachers and other persons living and working in China are at the forefront of our thoughts now, recog-

nising the great concern that is being experienced because of this outbreak," she said, adding that her Ministry has also moved to further verify the number of Jamaicans living and working in China.

"We have created an online Jamaican form, which is now on the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade's website. We have shared it through the embassy in Beijing and through the community there. We have, since this week, over 400 registrations by Jamaicans who are across China. We know that the number of persons in Wuhan is about 29 and these are students, teachers and family members of those students and teachers."

The Foreign Affairs Minister said she is aware of requests from Jamaicans to return home from China, but the Government is faced with several challenges, including logistics and restrictions of movement in that country.

Risk of Coronavirus Remains Low For Caribbean But CARPHA Urges Vigilance At Ports of Entry

The Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) is urging Member States to continue to be vigilant and to step up surveillance at their ports of entry, although the risk of the novel Coronavirus is still low.

The advice comes on the heels of the World Health Organization declaring the outbreak in Wuhan, China, as a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC).

A PHEIC is defined in the International Health Regulations (2005) as "an extraordinary event which is determined, as provided in these Regulations to constitute a public health risk to other States through the international spread of disease; and to potentially require a coordinated international response".

This definition implies a situation that: is serious, unusual or unexpected; carries implications for public health beyond the affected State's national border; and may require immediate international action.

CARPHA's Executive Director, Dr Joy St John maintains that the risk of the virus remains low for the Caribbean region, explaining that it is deemed low because there are no direct flights from China to the Caribbean and travellers will receive multiple screenings before arrival to Member States.

Dr St John explained that health agencies and Caribbean officials at a meeting of the Regional Coordinating Mechanism for Health Security (RCMHS) last week agreed with this risk assessment, having confirmed that there are no reported cases of the 2019-nCoV in the region.

The International Health Regulations' Emergency Committee is not recommending trade or travel restrictions at this time.

"CARPHA urges regional national authorities to work with airlines, passenger ships and other transport and tourism industries to ensure that Caribbean residents and visitors alike remain



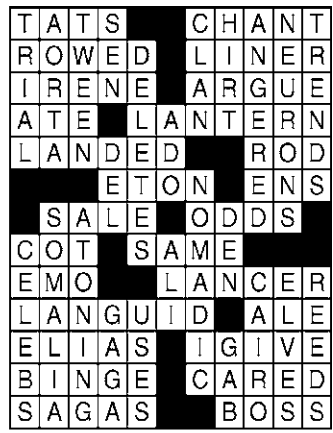
free of 2019-nCoV," the agency said in a statement, adding that it will continue to monitor these developments and provide Member States with guidance

to support national response efforts, while strengthening regional health security in collaboration with regional partners.

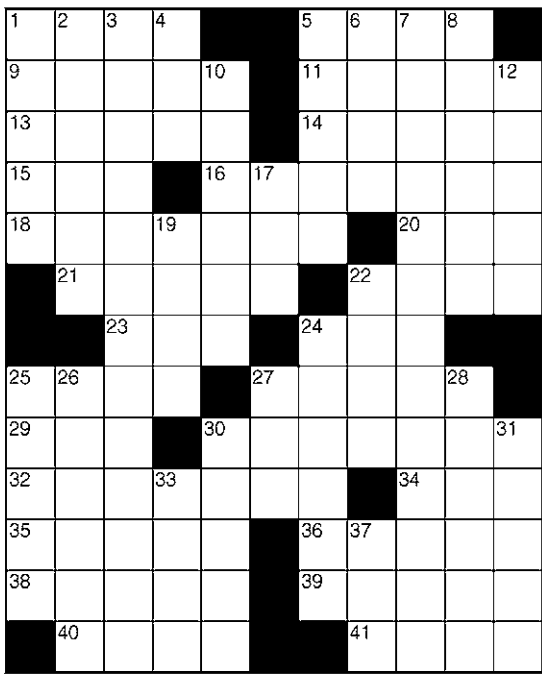

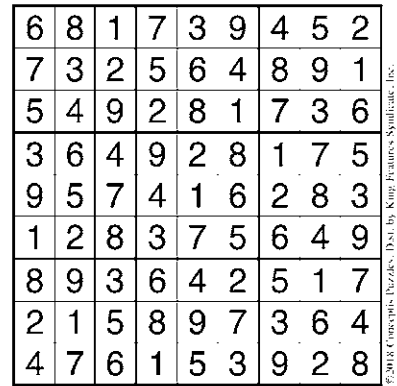
