Amazing Coconuts at Cocofest

Cayman's fifth annual celebration of the humble coconut took place last Saturday at Pedro St James, a family-oriented afternoon of food and festivities all centred on one of Cayman's most important means of sustenance from days gone by.

It's always an excellent day out for foodie families because the event brings together an ensemble of local producers who use coconut, in its many guises, to create amazing food ready for sampling, often unavailable in supermarkets. The Caymanian staple of fried fish and fritters was a welcome sight for visitors upon entrance to the Pedro St James grounds, fried in coconut oil to impart a lovely aroma and flavour to the dish. The popular Powder Monkey Gourmet Treats stall was doing a good trade in their coconut pineapple marshmallow fluff, not to mention their coconut and vanilla marshmallows in bags. The Farmfresh.ky team also had an array of coconut-inspired goodies such as their coconut oil that comes in a wine bottle,

Libraries a mainstay of public life

This second in our Then and Now series on iconic Cayman buildings looks at the development of another important central George Town building, the George Town Public Library.

In the late 19th Century, Cayman did not possess a public library; instead public reading rooms began to develop to satisfy residents' literary curiosity. In 1919, Commissioner Hugh H. Hutchings arrived in Cayman and was an avid reader, subscribing to the likes of the Saturday Evening Post, Punch and Atlantic Monthly, all of which became popular reads with Caymanians. As a result, in

1920, the Government included an annual amount of 40 pounds in its budget for to establish a subscription library, located in a room above the old jail next to the Old Court House (now the National Museum). Cayman's first librarian was Jane Bond Arch.

In West Bay, history books detail how the residents so badly wanted their own reading room that they raised money for one by having debates, concerts, cake sales and plays. Their hard work paid off and a

as well as simple coconut water and sugar cane, straight from the plant.

Libraries a mainstay of public life

reading room was opened in West Bay in 1934 under the eye of librarian Mrs Ada Hydes. It was located to the west of the Four Winds Esso along the old 'Marl Road' and became a cultural meeting place on a Saturday evening. Another reading room opened in Bodden Town and another in Stake Bay on Cayman Brac.

In 1937 plans were put in place to build a larger library in George Town. A well-known Caymanian architect of the 20th Century, Rayal Brazley Bodden, who died in 1976, designed the new building, which was built in 1939. The new library eventually opened its doors on 11th January 1940, during the administration of Commissioner Allen Cardinall. Two distinct features pointed to Bodden's distinctive architectural style – the use of concrete blocks which was innovative for the age, and the marine-inspired design of the ceiling featuring a design that took its design from the upside-down hull of a ship, the style hallmark of Bodden, who was also a mariner. He used a similar design in the building of the Elmslie Memorial Church, which stands nearby to the George Town Public Library.

Carnegie Corp granted \$1,250 to equip the building, while the main source of printed matter came from the Ranfurly Library in the UK. Lady Ranfurly, who was the wife of a colonial governor, started the project of collecting used books for shipment to the territories where books were in short supply. The first Caymanian librarian for this new facility was Alice Parsons and in 1980 the library gained its first trained librari-

an. Over the years, the library amassed around 15,000 volumes, including reference books, local history books, large print, books on tape and periodicals.

New wing is opened

Due to increasing demands of an ever-growing population, the Maples wing of the George Town Library opened in May 2009, greatly expanding the George Town Public Library's offering, with a new three-storey extension of the origi-

nal building strategically placed behind it, adding 12,000 square feet to the building. The Maples Foundation, established by the law firm Maples, donated US\$2.5 million to the project. The new modern wing was built by Royal Construction and designed by Public Works Department architects Colin Lumsden and Sean Evans, employing materials such as Caymanite stone and glass, a fitting tribute to other historic buildings and landmarks in the nation's capital.

The new wing greatly enhanced the selection of written material available for the public, as well as adding computers with Internet, a children's section and a conference room.

At the time of its opening, the then Minister of Education (now Premier) Alden McLaughlin remembered when his father would take him to the library every Thursday. Premier McLaughlin called the library the "heart, brain and memory of the community".



School field renamed in honour of beloved BT citizen

Lots of people, not only from all across the Cayman Islands came out on Saturday 8 February to remember David Gerrard Powell (one of Bodden Town's most loved and respected citizens), in order to rename the Theoline L. McCoy Primary School's football field in his honour.

It was a field that he helped make into the world-class football field that it is today, and for any of the kids who grew up in the 80's and 90s in Bodden Town, and knew the rock strewn patch of land it used to be, they will tell you that

was no easy task. Mr. Powell, an expert electrician by trade and a dedicated civil servant, was passionate about football, and did whatever he could to encourage it. Many who had come out on Saturday knew him as coach, mentor, friend, and also fellow teammate, who took part in the Reds and Blues – Bodden Town's famous Sunday morning football teams. H.E. the Governor, Mr. Martyn Roper joined the Reds for a match against the Blues, alongside fellow teammate Hon. Dwayne Seymour who regarded Mr.

Powell who spoke warmly about Mr. Powell, during the ceremony:

"As a fellow born and bred Bodden Towner, it is my absolute pleasure to be

with each of you this evening at this momentous event which serves to honour a culture and sports icon, David Gerrard Powell. As I look out on the football field, a field that he himself helped build, I immediately feel the fond memories of my dear friend and mentor."

"It is a privilege to be here as Gerard's friend and teammate but also as a Minister of Culture, I cannot think of a finer person to rename a football field after than this man who invested so much love, time and energy in the sport".

Cutting everyone a generous nice slice of Bodden Town history, Mr. Seymour remembered the days before there was a proper football field: "We used to practice at the town Hall," he said, "That was hard ground, ladies and gentlemen. Just dust, no grass. One of the goal posts was an almond tree, and the other was a block. The area around the school (the present-day field) was generally rocky, and not an ideal place for children to play. A plan was hatched to beg and borrow to make the field more beneficial

for the school. The football team and the community, along with David Gerrard Powell, were central figures in the process. Mr. Powell used his skill and knowledge to arrange the lighting for the football pitch, Mr. Seymour said.

Hon Juliana 'O' Connor-Connolly, Minister for Education, Youth, Sports, Agriculture & Lands explained the significance of naming landmarks after the Fathers and Mothers of the Cayman Islands: "This is our country that we're nation-building, and we do whatever it takes; so it gives me a warm feeling of pride that we have reached a stage in our development that our people can be named (after buildings, and other landmarks) and our children in a school can look at a name, and say, 'He went to Bodden Town School, and he was able to break those glass ceilings.' The Bible tells us that some plant, some water, and others reap, today we are the happy beneficiaries of all of the wonderful positive, impactful seeds that he planted, so that we could have a field here." 🌎

for Team Nolan in honour of Congenital Heart Defects (CHD) Awareness Week 2020. The walk was also to honour the memory of seven-month old baby Nolan Evans, who passed away early last year, losing his battle with a complex congenital heart disease known as Truncus Arteriosus.

All of this support culminated in today's event being extremely successful in meeting all of Team Nolan's targets," she said.

The mission of Team Nolan is to raise awareness in Cayman for congenital heart disease and to financially assist local families with CHD babies, through fundraising efforts such as the annual Heart Warriors & Angels Beach Walk



and Kidfest events. In June 2019, Team Nolan donated the Nolan Evans Memorial Bench to Health City's main lobby, which illustrates CHD awareness messages for all to see when passing through the hospital's lobby, Ailian advised.

In October of 2019, Team Nolan was able to cover the full cost of the purchase

of a critically needed infant transport incubator for the Health Services Authority's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. In December 2019, Team Nolan presented a substantial donation of financial support to a family in need, helping out the family of baby Mirella who was born with a critical congenital heart defect Tetralogy of

Fallot and who was hospitalised for over four months at Health City.

"Most CHD children don't look sick," Ailian said. "Sometimes you can't tell them apart from other kids but their scars are very real!! Beneath their shirts are battle scars... constant reminders of their battles to live."



Bowman grabs his chance to fill in for Curry

NBA rookie Ky Bowman has agreed to a major contract with the Golden State Warriors and already looks like a perfect stand in for the injured Steph Curry.

An undrafted free agent out of Boston College, Bowman was signed to a two-way contract that allowed for him to spend 45 days in the NBA. He played 37 games for Golden State and has spent the rest of the season with the team's G League affiliate in Santa Cruz. Encouraged by his ball-handling, scoring and ability to defend full-court, the Warriors view him as a rotation player for the future.

Bowman can finally move out of his team-provided hotel room. In the wake of a chaotic trade deadline that saw the Warriors deal away six players, Bowman's contract was converted to a guaranteed three-year NBA deal.

The \$3.5 million he's set to earn on that contract should be enough for him to afford a nice apartment in San Francisco, a luxury he didn't have a week ago. With Curry out injured, Bowman is the Warriors' starting point guard for the time being.

With D'Angelo Russell now at the Minnesota Timberwolves, the next few weeks until Curry returns should be a key opportunity for Bowman to solidify his spot in the 2020-21 rotation. A score-first point guard at Boston College, he has made strides as a facilitator, using his time in Santa Cruz to study defenses and master kicking out to open shooters.

In 12 G League games, Bowman averaged 14.5 points, 5.5 assists, 5.9 rebounds and 1.3 steals. His ability to guard full court should help him against some of the NBA's better scorers over the season's final two months.

"This has been a really good season for him," Warriors head coach Steve Kerr said of Bowman. "I'm excited to have him up for the remainder of the season. This will be a good 30-game stretch for Ky. He's going to get plenty of action and a chance to further his development."

How Bowman looks in coming weeks should help the front office determine its off-season plans. If he continues to look impressive at NBA level, the Warriors might decide to enter next season with

Bowman as Curry's primary backup at point guard.

That would free up Golden State to use the mid-level exception and minimum contracts on more pressing areas, such as centre and backup small forward.

"The thing I like most about Ky is just his competitive desire," Kerr said. "I think we have to prepare for next year. This year has been really rough in so many ways. We have a chance to make it really productive."

After not making a single midseason trade since 2014, the Golden State Warriors have made all the noise at the 2020 trade deadline. They started by flipping Willie Cauley-Stein to Dallas, then trad-

ed veterans Alec Burks and Glenn Robinson III to Philadelphia, reducing their looming luxury tax burden and picking up some minor assets in the form of late second-round picks.

Then it all got busy. After a persistent campaign from the Timberwolves, the Warriors have traded Russell, Jacob Evans, and Omari Spellman for Andrew Wiggins, a top-3 protected 2021 draft pick, and a 2021 second-round pick. It seemed like there was no logical reason for the Warriors to trade Russell before the summer, and that whatever Minnesota had to offer would be there in the summer. But they pulled the trigger anyway.

Kobe and daughter service is on Feb. 24


A memorial service for Kobe Bryant and his daughter Gianna will be held Feb. 24 at the Staples Center in Los Angeles, a month after they and seven others were killed in a helicopter crash, his widow Vanessa Bryant announced.

The basketball legend's widow shared details of the memorial in a post on Instagram, calling the event a "celebration of life."

The date 2/24 could be symbolic, as Kobe Bryant wore No. 24 in the latter part of his illustrious NBA career

and Gianna wore No. 2 for her youth basketball teams. Vanessa's post was captioned, "#2, #24 #20 years as a Laker."

All nine people were killed when their helicopter, heading to a youth basketball tournament, crashed on a foggy Sunday morning. The other victims were Gianna's teammates Alyssa Altobelli and Payton Chester; Alyssa's parents, John and Keri; Payton's mother, Sarah; assistant girls basketball coach Christina Mauser; and helicopter pilot Ara Zobayan.

Djokovic wants to be greatest in history

Novak Djokovic wants to end his tennis career as the greatest of all time and after a wobbly couple of years when his form dipped, he is back to his dominant self, determined to overhaul the grand slams tallies held by rivals Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal.


Only a few other sports can legitimately claim to be currently going through an era where its competitors have a strong claim to be considered the greatest ever.

If Nadal is the 'King of Clay', Djokovic is unquestionably the most dominant on courts. His victory at the Australian Open last week was his eighth in Melbourne.

He has won the most Masters 1000 titles, has winning head to head records against Federer and Nadal which are unlikely to be beaten and he's banked the most in prize money.

And he now has 17 Grand Slam titles, two behind Nadal and three off Federer's record of 20 and you would be hard pushed to find a good reason why he can't finish 2020 on the same number as his Swiss rival. To come are the French Open, Wimbledon and US Open, all which Djokovic has won multiple times.

Right now, the only things that can stop Djokovic from rewriting the his-

tory books are injury and the emerging generation stepping up when it matters.

Djokovic has spoken openly about his determination to leave behind a legacy and there would be no greater illustration of that if he becomes the all-time leader for weeks at world No 1. The Serb is now on 276 weeks at the top, 10 behind his idol Pete Sampras and 34 away from Federer's record of 310.

Even if he doesn't reach the magic 20 mark this year, at 32 Djokovic is six years younger than Federer and a year younger than Nadal who is injury prone and only dominant on clay. Realistically, Djokovic has time on his side and whatever Federer achieves he looks set to surpass it and really become the GOAT he craves.

Windies Women have experience, but form is poor

West Indies Women are preparing for the T20 World Cup in Australia starting on Feb. 22 and believe under coach Gus Logie, a former Test player, they can win the tournament, despite their poor recent form.

Their captain is Stafanie Taylor, one of the world's best allrounders and having been the defeated finalist to Australia in the 2016 tournament, and got to the semis two years ago, they are upbeat for this one.

Deandra Dottin, another allrounder, is also critical to success. The need for surgery on her right shoulder cut short her 2019 campaign and side-lined her for eight months – but not before she had spearheaded Barbados' domestic T20 title run as the league's leading scorer (222) and with its highest strike rate (179.03) and average (222.0).

But a fit-again Dottin is not only excellent news for the batting unit, as the 28-year-old also offers a potent pace option that has delivered 26 wickets at 12.19 across 18 previous T20 World Cup outings, with a West Indies format record of 5-5 coming against Bangladesh in the 2018 tournament.

It's almost seven years since Afy Fletcher made her West Indies debut and she is finally getting an extended

run in the T20 side. The 32-year-old Grenadian has become integral to her side's short-form efforts in recent seasons with her wicket taking.

Though Logie has no shortage of spin options, particularly in the veteran off-spin of Anisa Mohammed and Taylor, it was Fletcher's miserly contributions that saw her finish as the West Indies' most economical bowler in the 2016 campaign.

Cherry-Ann Fraser is the 20-year-old Guyanese quick is one of just four members of the West Indies squad in line for her maiden T20 World Cup tri. Head selector Ann Browne-John described the uncapped youngster's potent pace and bounce as "ideal for the Australian pitches".

The West Indies know they have precisely what it takes to go the distance in this tournament, with eight members of this year's final 15-woman squad having featured in the XI that chased down Australia's target of 149 in the 2016 final.

In addition to several players returning from injury, the squad has also been boosted by the recent addition of Test icon Courtney Walsh to the coaching staff, which has been led since October by Trinidadian stalwart Logie following a series of changes at the Windies board.

Since falling in the semi-finals of the 2018 competition, the West Indies' T20 outfit has been on a downward spiral that currently sees them winless in their last 11 fixtures.

Compared to high-profile group rivals England and South Africa, the West Indies have far less experience in

Australian conditions. Only Taylor featured in the latest Women's Big Bash League instalment, and other members of the squad will need to adapt quickly as the side is without major fixtures before facing newcomers Thailand to open their campaign on Feb. 22.

No Need to Panic: CARICOM Chairman Says Region Preparing for Coronavirus

Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Chairman and Barbados Prime Minister Mia Mottley has sought to assure citizens of the region that health officials are taking the steps to keep the deadly new strain of coronavirus out of their countries, but also ensuring they are ready should it reach their shores.

CARICOM Ministers of Health were on Monday briefed by the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA), and the Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO) on the virus, and Mottley said the meeting also focused on the region's preparedness in case of any eventuality.

As of today, 24,604 cases have been confirmed with 494 deaths.

"The aim is ensuring the region can protect, first and foremost, its population, but at the same time ensuring that panic does not beset our people. History has shown that panic does not assist the resolution of these matters," Mottley said, adding that going into panic mode

could cause the region's economies and societies to implode.

She said CARICOM will take an evidence-based approach that will guide the appropriate response to any imminent risks.

"We need to equally contextualize it against other public health concerns and not be taken in by those who would want a rush to judgement that may lead to difficulty of our own societies and economies," Mottley said.

"I look forward to a report within the next few days from the ASG [Assistant Secretary General of CARICOM] and from COHSOD, the Council for Human and Social Development, as to what is being recommended as the bare minimum which we must confront as we seek to protect our communities."

She noted that while any country is free to do what it wants, with the single domestic space that exists in CARICOM, governments must work together.

Literary Giant Edward Kamau Brathwaite Dies

The late acclaimed Barbadian poet and historian, Edward Kamau Brathwaite, was remembered by the leader of the land of his birth as "easily one of the titans of post-colonial literature and the Arts", following the news of his death yesterday.

Prime Minister Mia Mottley's tribute came after Brathwaite passed away three months shy of his 90th birthday, which would have been May 11.

Among his most well-known works were his poetic trilogy The Arrivants – Rights of Passage, Masks and Islands; Rights of Passage, Masks, Islands, and Barabajan Poems.

And in her tribute to the cultural icon who for decades displayed exceptional literary craftsmanship, Prime Minister Mottley said "his chronicling of our past through his magnificent works, shone a powerful light on the realities of our present and in turn, guided our sense of self and national identity".

"But his reach and influence were not limited to his beloved Barbados and the Caribbean. His tenure as an educator at institutions from Ghana to America al-


lowed students of every ethnicity and background to experience his wizardry with words.

"Ultimately, however, Kamau's legacy and timeless gift to us all is his powerfully poignant body of work. From Odale's Choice and The Arrivants to Mother Poem and Born to Slow Horses, he leaves us priceless literary treasures that will delight and shape our minds for generations to come," she added.

Brathwaite was formerly a professor of comparative literature at New York University and in 2006, won the Griffin Poetry Prize, for his book Born to Slow Horses. He held an honorary PhD from the University of Sussex and was the co-founder of the Caribbean Artists Movement (CAM).

He was an education officer in Ghana from 1955 to 1962 before he returned to the Caribbean to teach in St Lucia and later at the University of the West Indies, Mona Campus, Jamaica. He also lectured at New York University.

Brathwaite was the recipient of both Guggenheim and Fulbright Fellowships

in 1983 and won other awards, including: the 1994 Neustadt International Prize for Literature, the Bussa Award, the Casa de las Americas Prize for poetry and the 1999 Randall Citation for Performance and Written Poetry from the International Poetry Forum. 

Barbados' Prime Minister Receives Guyana's Second Highest National Award

Barbados' Prime Minister Mia Mottley has been conferred the Order of Roraima, Guyana's second-highest national award, for her dedication and demonstrated commitment and contribution towards the strengthening of the Caribbean Community (CARICOM).

The national honour was presented by Guyana's President David Granger at a courtesy call during a visit to the country which she made primarily to meet the staff at the headquarters of CARICOM, of which she became Chairman last month.

"The Government and people of the Cooperative Republic of Guyana recognize your unflinching efforts in representing the interest of the Caribbean region as it pursues socio-economic development and your advocacy for the furtherance of the Caribbean Community's Single Market and Economy," Granger said in presenting the award at the brief ceremony.

He said the national honour was not just a "legalistic formality", but a clear recognition of the excellent fraternal relations that have existed for many years between Barbados and Guyana.

Granger noted that Barbados and Guyana worked together for the formation of the Caribbean Free Trade Association (CARIFTA) in 1965, prior to independence from Britain which they both attained in 1966; they established a joint high commission in London soon after independence; and the founding fathers of the two countries, Errol Barrow and Forbes Burnham, were among the four leaders who signed the treaty establishing CARICOM in 1973.

"Prime Minister Mottley, you have distinguished yourself as an ardent advocate for the Caribbean Single Market and Economy," President Granger added.

"You have combined your almost 30 years of political activism with your

personal enthusiasm and your country's legendary leadership in regional integration. We applaud your leadership. We applaud your stewardship. We applaud your willingness to partner with the Caribbean states. We commend you on your assumption of office as Chairman of...the Caribbean Community."

In accepting the award, Prime Minister Mottley said she did so humbly, on behalf of all Barbadians, recognizing that the relationship between the two nations long predates her, with linkages that have contributed immensely to the development of both countries.

She recalled that as recently as 2007, official figures showed there were more than 32,000 Guyanese living in Barbados. While that number has declined considerably, she explained, the strong links between the two countries remain.

"The path of our two countries is inseparable and I look forward to our being able to build, Mr President, on that relationship," Mottley said.

She is the second Barbadian leader to receive the Order of Roraima, and the third foreign leader to be given a national award by the CARICOM nation. In 2016, President Granger conferred Mottley's predecessor, Freundel Stuart, with the Order of Roraima for his support for the rights of Small Island and Low Coastal Developing States, his advocacy for CARICOM's demand for reparations for the citizens of the Caribbean region and his contribution to the reduction of the impact of climate change in the region.

And last year, Ghana's President Nana Akufo-Addo was conferred with Guyana's highest national award, The Order of Excellence, for his "unflinching" support for the rights of developing states.


