Then & Now: GT Post Office

Sitting squarely in the middle of George Town, the General Post Office has been serving the needs of the Cayman public since it first opened its door in 1939. It was constructed during the administration of Sir Allan Cardinal as part of a plan to provide public facilities for the inhabitants of the islands.

Up until that point, records at the Cayman Islands National Archives show that Cayman's first post office opened in Cayman in 1889/1890 as a branch of the Jamaican Post Office. Before this post office was established, post was sent to Jamaica and then delivered by ships. The first Cayman Islands stamp was issued in 1901 and the first commemorative postage stamps were issued in the Cayman Islands in 1932, celebrating the centenary of the Assembly of Justices and Vestrymen. Historically, stamps had been a significant source of revenue for the Government and Cayman has a proud reputation as issuing highly decorative and interesting stamps that have been sought after by collectors the world over.

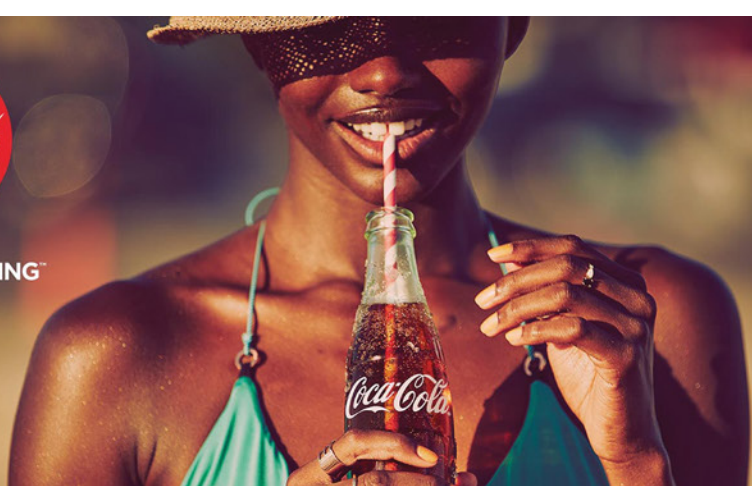
Much more of that among the family of British Overseas Territories (OTs) would be welcome.

WORC Cracks Down on Illegal Employment Activity



On the 10th February Compliance officers from the Workforce Opportunities & Residency Cayman (WORC) and officers from Customs & Border Control (CBC) carried out a joint operation at a large scale construction site in George Town.

The operation was initiated based on information received by the WORC department that there were illegal employment activities taking place on the site. After the inspection and examination of several persons on site, officers discovered Immigration laws had been breached which resulted in the arrest of multiple persons for various offenses. The WORC department continues to investigate and inquire into the matter.

Jeremy Scott, Deputy Director of Compliance said, "In line with the one of the department's strategic initiatives focused on detection and mitigation of risks, efforts such as this, will be consistent by the Department. Effective collaboration with other Government Departments such as Customs and Border Control and other key stakeholders is fundamental to the department's success. The WORC department looks forward to the public's cooperation and support in moving forward."

Employers are strongly encouraged to ensure that they are employing persons within the limitations of their permits, and in accordance with the Immigration Law. If employers or anyone is uncertain as to their compliance with the law, they should reach out to the WORC department.

Failing to adhere to the Cayman Islands Immigration Laws could lead to a substantial monetary fine, being arrested or prosecution in court.

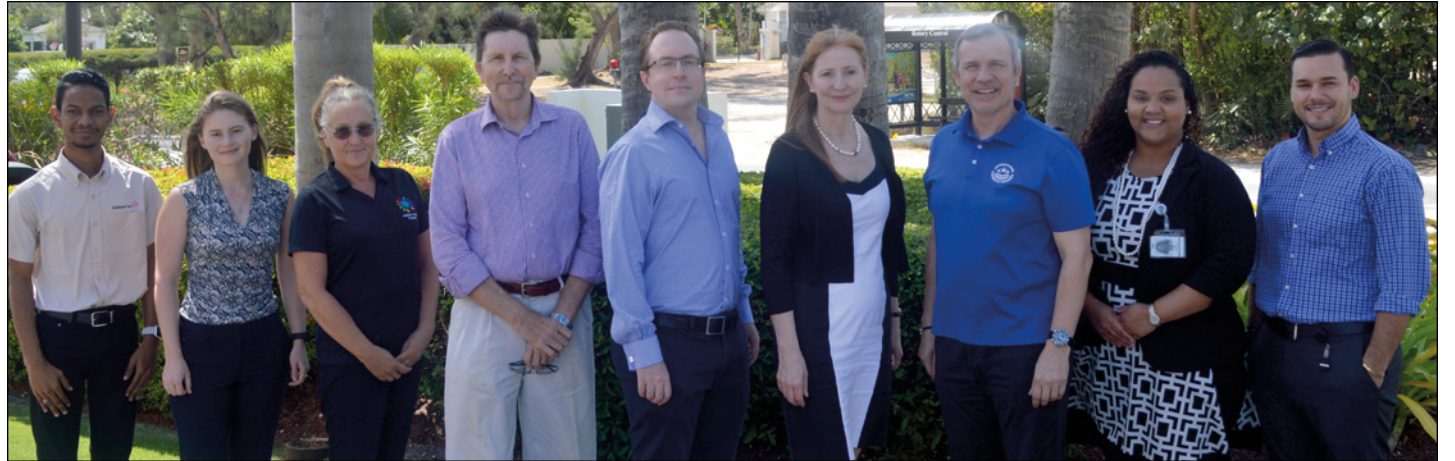

The George Town Post Office: serving Cayman for 80 years

Another signature project undertaken by mariner turned architect Royal Brazley Bodden, the General Post Office building again demonstrated his nautical influences, especially in the design of the ceiling that reflects his trademark upturned hull of a ship design within, regarded by some as his best work. While Captain Royal took charge of the majority of the design of the building, it was his brother, Roland Bodden, who designed the heavy wooden doors of this location. The General Post Office was designed to neatly fit at a crossroads (now called Edward Street and Cardinal Avenue), and was built with a wide porch at its front to act as a public shelter.

At the time, the construction of the post office was the largest project ever undertaken in the Cayman Islands and was certainly ahead of its time in terms of construction, using concrete blocks that were again a hallmark of Captain

Royal's construction techniques. When it was opened, the building not only housed a traditional post office, it also was home to the Treasury, the Government Savings Bank and Customs. When it was first in operation, the building was considered very spacious in its day, with just one end of the building alone sufficient to handle the monthly mailbags that arrived via the ship the Cimboco (a motorised ship that was also built by Captain Royal).

The post office opened its doors in September 1939, taking less than a year to build and costing £1,997. The year before, the Cayman Islands Government

had obtained a loan of £6,500 approved by the Jamaican Government in order to pay for this project, as well as the con-

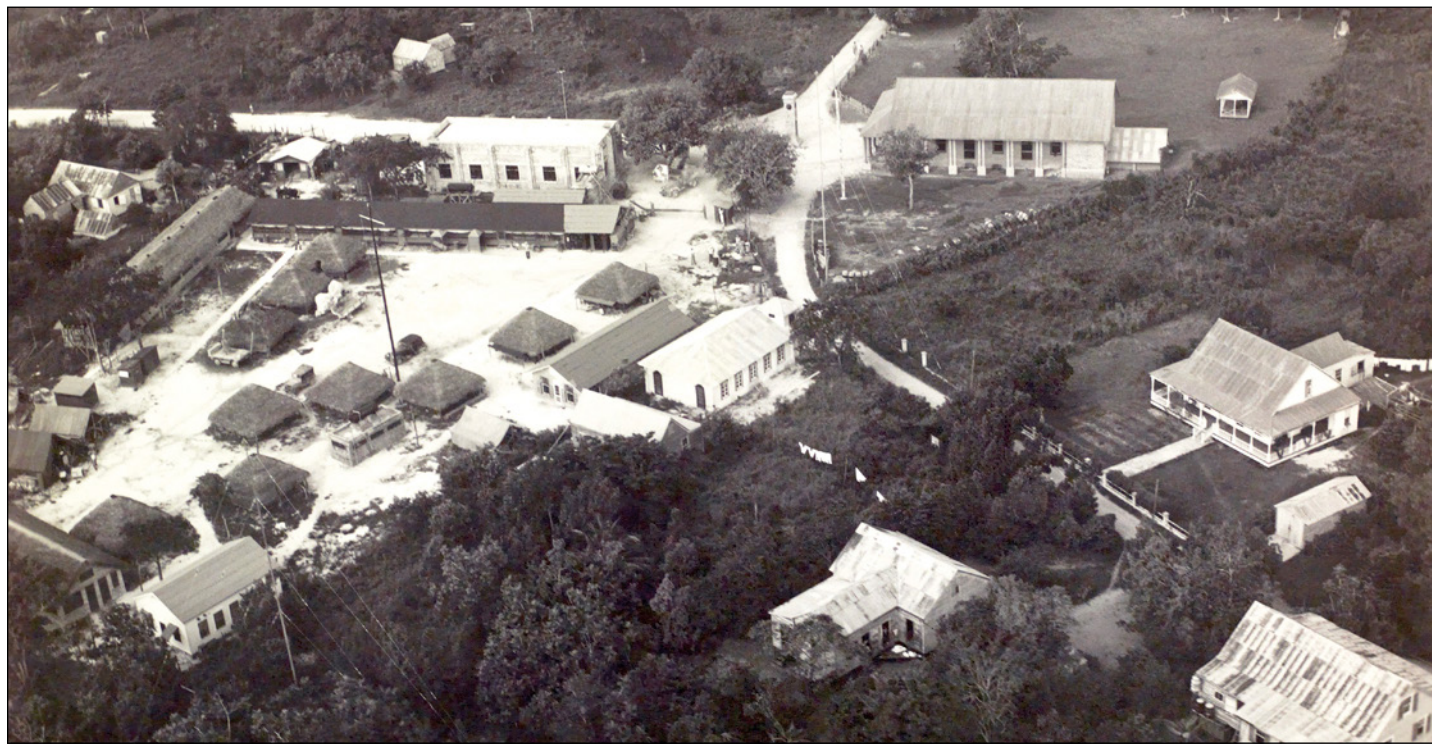

struction of the George Town public library and other civic projects.

Due to the rapid growth in the need for postal services, the post office aspect of the building took over the entire premises in the mid-1970s, when a complete remodeling of the interior took place. The post office went through further major renovations in 1994 to help the facility cope with the tremendous growth in population that the islands were experiencing. Presently, Grand Cayman has two large post offices, the General Post Office which still serves customers today and also at the airport. There is also a large post office on Seven Mile Beach at the West Shore Centre and smaller post offices at Savannah, Bodden Town, North Side, East End, Hell and West Bay, Hell's branch being a popular spot for tourists so they can send postcards from "Hell".

Even though it was built some 80 years ago, the General Post Office in George Town still serves local residents and tourists alike on a daily basis, an important reminder of Cayman's past and a symbol of its progression. 🌐

Little League season starts big on the Field of Dreams

Little League began its 31st season in the Cayman Islands on Saturday 15, at George Town's Field of Dreams. When you consider that there are 27 teams in total, and ages ranging from 4 right up to teenagers, and that every single team has to be coached by a small army of volunteers (along with the dedicated YMCA staff members who run it, that's a pretty remarkable achievement.

Cayman's Little League is actually really big, because it enables kids not only to learn baseball, but all the character-building and team building values that go with it. Everywhere you look, the kids were doing their best. It isn't always easy, especially if it's your big moment to impress mom or dad with your batting, and you miss every single ball.

But that's where you learn that it isn't just about winning; it's how you play the game.

Now Little League is old enough to have some Little Leaguers grow up, and come back as coaches, making it round the full circle. Garth Ebanks is one, and he is presently Head Coach of the Maples team, one of the six teams in the "Pony" league division, which covers the seven-to-eights. "I played little league growing up in Cayman both at the Field of Dreams as well as its previous location next door," he said.

The different divisions cater for different ages, starting with the 'T-Ball' which are the four-to-sixes, Pony, and then Single A, Double A, and Triple A divisions taking the players into their teenage years. Girls and boys join in

up to Age 11, and then the girls have the option of joining a softball team, or remaining with baseball. It's a three-month season, and it ends sometime around the middle of May, with championships and prizes.

Former Little League Director Bill Souza said: "There are so many benefits. All the kids are intermingling so it's a great time for them to get to know each other outside of school and make friendships. They're learning teamwork, and we really try to instill good character-building skills. It's about developing the kids not just as athletes, but looking to who they are going to become in the future as human beings and as people, moving forward for this community wherever they end up.

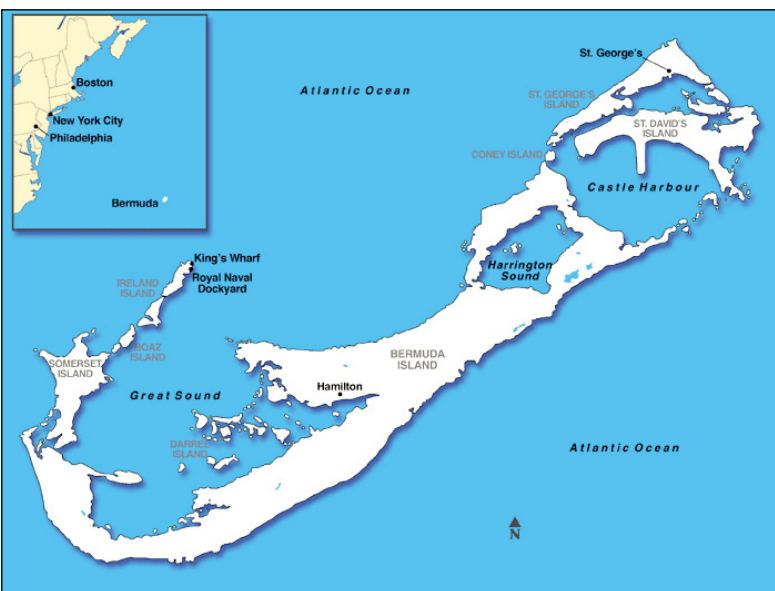
for the kids to have activities, and I think its more important that we can offer them free of charge, to the children of the Cayman Islands.

Vicky, a proud baseball mom, was watching her eight-year old son, Franklin through the wire fence. "My son loves the sport, and enjoys playing it, and I enjoy watching him," she said, "he practices at home, after school and he practices with his grandfather."

Greg Smith, CEO of the YMCA said: "Any sport is a great opportunity to teach kids about values, about sportsmanship, about respect and responsibility, and about discipline, and baseball is an excellent example of that. It teaches focus, it teaches discipline, and it gets kids more active doing something constructive, and that's what the YMCA stands for." 🌐

Topics range from Cayman 'building more economic pillars', to questioning if development in the territory is 'spinning out of control'.

'Most would not believe the poverty in Cayman' posits one article, while another suggests 'average Caymanian not having a better life'.

The series, however, pivots on a fundamental theme; 'Bermuda and Cayman can combat threats together'.

Looking out for - rather than merely looking at - one another is a way of looking at it.

Caymanian Dr Roy Bodden, author, historian, former labour minister and retired president of the University College of the Cayman Islands, offers informed insights.

His well-documented concerns about the path and pace of rapid development of the territory feature prominently in one article labelled; 'Cayman development 'spinning out of control'.

"Many Caymanians are alarmed now, because they realise the development is spinning out of control," Dr Bodden told The Royal Gazette.

"We're on a treadmill — and if you're on a treadmill and don't know what you're doing, you're likely to fall off," he said.

Bermuda and the Cayman Islands lead the Caribbean in per capita income, the measure of the average earnings of citizens over a year.

In the Cayman Islands it's around \$US 67,000 while for Bermuda the figure is \$US 95,000.

Both OTs have populations of around 65,000.

Even more worthy of reflection is the exploration of areas of cooperation between Georgetown and Hamilton.

Critical to this is the sector on which they both rely on to maintain their individual - and joint - development within their economic specialisms; insurance for Bermuda and banking, hedge funds and investment in the Cayman Islands.

Both OTs are world leaders in their respective financial sectors.

The islands are saddled with the rather unfortunate label of offshore tax havens, somewhat of an albatross, which has put them in the firing line of scrutiny as havens for tax evasion which both reject.

Both have been at pains to make the distinction between tax legal avoidance and the illegalities of tax evasion.

The territories' administrative authority - the United Kingdom, the European Union, the Organisation for Economic Development(OECD) and other agencies monitoring the lucrative global offshore financial sector regularly raise issues of compliance with what a bewildering array of rules.

In the most recent case, the Cayman Islands is now facing EU sanctions with the risk of being placed on

an EU blacklist for failing to meet the stringent compliance demands.

The government insists that has been diligent in adhering to regulatory requirements as stipulated by the UK and the EU.

Another joint issue facing Bermuda's and the Cayman's financial sector is the demand by the UK for disclosure of corporate beneficial ownership of registered companies.

It was, therefore, encouraging to read Jude Scott, CEO of Cayman Finance, calling for cooperation between the fellow offshore financial centres as they both are frequently having to deal with the same international pressures.

"I think we need to work together and use the talents that are in both jurisdictions to find better ways to address some of these threats and turn them into opportunities, to share the good news about jurisdictions like ourselves," he told the Royal Gazette.

In the article titled 'Bermuda, Cayman can combat threats together' written by the paper's business editor Jonathan Kent, Mr Scott suggested that such collaboration could take place not only at industry level and between Cayman Finance and the Bermuda Business Development Agency, but also at political and civil service levels.

He is further quoted by the Royal Gazette as saying; "Even though historically, Bermuda and Cayman have seen themselves as competitors, I think there

are enough differences between us that we would benefit hugely from working together," he added.

The appeal for collaboration is particularly timely...and necessary.

The future of the status of the OTs within the 'British family' is already being redefined especially because of Brexit.

It was also a factor of the 2018/19 inquiry into future relations between the UK and the OTs by the British parliament's Foreign Relations Committee (FAC).

That inquiry, the first in over a decade, seems already dated, overtaken the pace and extent of recent political changes in the UK, not least of which are a Conservative government with a much different focus from its predecessor, and the all-embracing Brexit.

A lobby is starting from within the ranks of the ruling Conservative Party for OTs to be represented in the UK parliament. One MP has already indicated that he's already working on proposals for a nine-seat representation.

There are 14 British OTs and three Crown Dependencies.

However that evolves, but more importantly, in the overall post-Brexit relationship, the Cayman Islands and Bermuda will have a key role to play in shaping it along with their sister territories.

Cayman Finance's Jude Scott is 'one of the money' by prioritising cooperation over competition between Bermuda and Cayman. 🌐

Zion Williamson's debut campaign has been curtailed by knee surgery, yet the 19-year-old rookie's 10 games has seen him just as dominant as he was at Duke, overpowering seasoned pros as easily as he controlled matches during his lone college season.

Following his 32-point effort against the Thunder last Thursday night, the New Orleans Pelicans forward became the first rookie in 35 years since Michael Jordan to score at least 30 points in back-to-back games. Williamson also joined Jordan as the second rookie to record eight 20-point games in the first 10 games of his career.

Through 10 games, no player has scored more points in their debut season than Williamson over the past two decades. He is the third No. 1 overall pick since 1992, along with Shaquille O'Neal and Allen Iverson, to score 200 points through 10 games. Williamson also became the first rookie since 1966 to record 30 points, five rebounds and five assists while playing less than 30 minutes.

But stats don't tell the full story. The endorsement of a future Hall of Famer does. "I don't really think he's compar-

able to anyone that I have seen," Carmelo Anthony said. "Someone who is as powerful as that, who jumps like that ... you can tell he's getting better and getting a feel for the game."

The NBA is often mired in controversy and scandals so for many, Williamson is a positive addition to the much-maligned sport. Comparisons with Shaq abound, partly because they are similar height and build but also because Williamson's free throw record so far is poor.

"A talent like that — he's a great guy on top of it all — the whole world needs to see him," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said. "Obviously it's good for the Pelicans, but it's good for basketball. He's quite a package, both as a player and as a person."

Williamson, who leads all rookies with 22.1 points per game, while shooting 57.6 percent from the field, with 7.5 rebounds, didn't imagine becoming a must-see attraction for the second straight year.

"I expected to make an impact, but I didn't expect to do nothing like this," he said. "I was kind of looking to come in and just kind of fit in and just not try to mess up. My teammates and coaches are always pushing me, like, 'No, be outside the box.'"

"People are trying to find their own way (to stop me), but I feel like my game

is so unique that I'll be able to adjust to it on the fly. At the end of the day, I'm 19. I've still got a lot of room for growing. I will mess up. I'm not perfect, I will have bad games. I'm just going to learn from them."

"It's scary to see how good he is this early," teammate Josh Hart said. "He's going to be a problem."

Williamson caught the eye and certainly made a mark as Team USA beat

Team World 151-131 in the NBA's Rising Stars event in Chicago. He produced a series of powerful dunks, one of which dented the backboard in the second quarter and required the basket to be realigned at halftime.

He finished with 14 points and seven rebounds in just under 20 minutes, confirming that he truly is a rising star. 🌐

Tyson favours namesake Fury

Mike Tyson has revealed he is a massive fan of Tyson Fury and will be cheering the Gypsy King on in his showdown with Deontay Wilder.

Fury and Wilder square off on Saturday night in Las Vegas in a rematch of their controversial and thrilling draw in 2018. Fans are struggling to call a winner, but Tyson is hoping for another massive performance from his namesake. "I like both of them as fighters, they both came from nothing and achieved becoming heavyweight champion, you have to respect that, I was in their position one time," he said. "In the first fight I was hoping for Tyson Fury, I always pulled for him because he was named after me, that is the natural thing to do, right?"

"I was always biased toward him. He is very likeable; he is a nice person. I never understood Tyson, I just kept seeing him beating decent fighters. I didn't know if

they were washed up or throwing the fights because Tyson did not look like he should be beating them.

"But he was, and he was laughing at them, that made me a fan. He is so much better than what he appears to be and looks like." He added: "The rematch will be a really interesting fight because both guys will have something to prove. I just wish the best for Tyson Fury, I'm a Tyson fan."

Both fighters have predicted they will win by early knockout. Fury intends to do it in two rounds and Wilder said three.

"Iron Mike" is still amazed by Fury's incredible recovery from a 12th round knockdown in the first fight. "It was almost like a fairy tale how he went down and got back it, it looked like he was finished," the 53-year-old former heavyweight champ said. It looked like a screenplay. "He amazed a lot of people by getting up. He showed he is tough, he got up and won the final round. 'I thought it was over, then he got up and it was like Rocky, he then fought back. 'It was amazing, it made me a fan. It takes great fortitude and belief.' 🌐

Coleman stumbles but still impresses

American sprinter Christian Coleman came close to breaking his own world record after winning the 60 metres at the USATF Indoor Championships in New Mexico, despite stumbling at the start.

Shaky out of the blocks, Coleman still clocked 6.37 seconds to beat Marvin Bracy and Brandon Carnes. Coleman equalled the second-fastest time in history behind his own record of 6.34 seconds, set in 2018. "I felt pretty good," the 100m world champion said. "I thought I had a shot at the record."

Coleman, 23, who is favourite to win 100m gold at this summer's Olympics in Tokyo, added: "I think I could have

executed my start a lot better. But we haven't done a lot of speed work, so this gives me a lot of confidence going into the outdoor season." 🌐

Messi going through drought

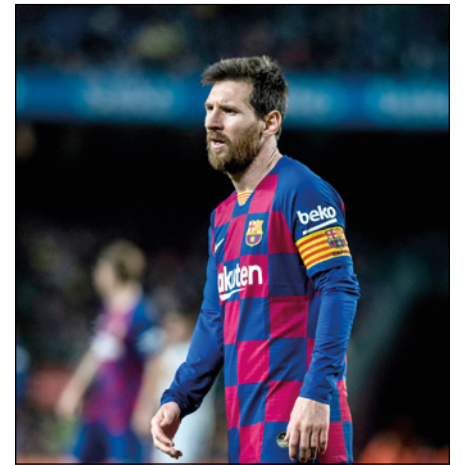
Lionel Messi has been distracted by speculation that he might be leaving Barcelona this summer after a spat with the club's sporting director and it seems to have affected his form.

Messi is on his worst scoring form in La Liga since January 2014, having gone four matches without a goal. He went eight games without scoring then.

The Argentina attacker did not score in Saturday's 2-1 win over Getafe at Camp Nou, which pulled Barca level on points at the summit of the table with Real Madrid, who have a game in hand.

It marked a fourth game without a goal for the six-time Ballon d'Or winner, whose scoring exploits are remarkable. Despite failing to fire recently, Messi, 31, has still managed 14 goals in 19 La Liga matches this season, including hat-tricks against Mallorca and Celta Vigo.

Messi is now up to 12 assists in only 19 league appearances this season, which is only one fewer than he mustered in 34 La Liga games last term.

He is eager to break his duck on Saturday when Eibar visit Camp Nou. Then Barcelona enter a critical week as they go to Napoli in the Champions League for a last-16 first-leg encounter, then on March 1 they travel to Santiago Bernabeu for a Classico encounter against Real Madrid. 🌐

Duplantis is firmly in pole position

Pole vaulter Mondo Duplantis is destined to be a global superstar after breaking the world pole vault record for the second time in a week at the Glasgow grand prix.

The way the 20-year-old Swede cleared 6.18 metres — easily beating the mark he set in Poland last week — to earn another \$30,000 bonus from World Athletics suggested there will be plenty more pay cheques coming his way.

"It's the best little split second that could ever be," said Duplantis, describing how he felt once he was over the bar. "Everything builds up to that one tiny little moment. That little free-fall is a magical moment."

He has already had plenty of those moments in his fledgling career. As a child prodigy he took up the event aged four through his dad, who cleared 5.80m in the 1990s and built a pole vault pit in their back garden — and set world bests from seven to 12.

By 14, Duplantis had already vaulted higher than a London double-decker bus. By 18 he had cleared six metres. Who knows how high he could eventually go now? "Every competition I go into I want to win and that's the main goal," he said. "I want to jump high; I want to break the world record but first you've got to win and that's the main goal. But if I have a bit of energy left, I'll try to crank it up." 🌐

Jamaican teachers threaten to strike

The Jamaica Teachers' Association has issued a 30-day ultimatum demanding that the government respond to its call to address security and disciplinary issues affecting the nation's schools.

JTA head Owen Speid said: "There are issues in certain areas, and what we are saying to the Government at this time is that they need to beef up security personnel in terms of trained officers — be it of the Jamaica Constabulary Force or other trained personnel — to be in the vicinity of schools, particularly at dismissal time, or when the children are about to enter the school premises. We are calling on them to provide more security for the schools during those critical moments."

Speid said urgent attention should be given to security issues affecting schools, the student body and staff, noting that some of these issues have been previously articulated.

The association is calling for trained security personnel for schools, enhancement of resolution mechanisms to support the institutions, and for the introduction of more time-out facilities. The teachers also want a compensation mechanism to be introduced for school personnel who are injured on the job, and for legal sanctions against individuals who commit breaches on school premises. 🌐

One of the Caribbean's most beloved eco-hotels has completed its comeback from Hurricane Maria.

Dominica's Rosalie Bay, set on the island's raw, spectacularly beautiful Atlantic coast, officially reopened its doors last week.

"We're coming back, stronger than ever after a direct hit from Hurricane Maria in 2017," a hotel spokesman said. It has reopened under new ownership.

The boutique hotel has 28 rooms and suites, all with soundproofing for quiet retreats, porches or balconies with either garden, ocean or river views, hand-carved four-poster beds and air-conditioning, among other amenities.

Barbados unveils plans for overseas strippers

The Barbados-based Adult Industry Association has submitted a proposal to government asking for the issuing of Entertainers Work Permits to foreign strippers that could earn the Caribbean economy millions of dollars a year.

Charles Lewis, aka, Charlie Spice is the association's president and founder. He said he submitted the official proposal to Minister of Home Affairs Edmund Hinkson.

Spice broke down the financial benefits to the government, economy, club owners, performers and consumers based on an expected influx of 5,000 – 10,000 dancers per year to each participating Caribbean country. In Barbados, Club Incognito would be the ideal place for strippers, he said.

"This initiative is expected to create a significant boost in revenue for the economy.

US\$2.5m – US\$5m per year in fees from the application of Entertainers Work Permit and US\$7.5m – US\$15m per year from money spent locally by dancers

on accommodation, food, entertainment, transportation and other living expenses," he revealed.

"Government saves millions of dollars a year spent on conducting investigations, raids, arrests, incarcerations and deportations. Incidentally, these strategies have been unsuccessful in deterring this activity and are therefore a colossal waste of taxpayers' money," he added.

Spice has proposed to government that dancers applying for permits be allowed to do so online via the website of the Immigration Department; via the website of an agent appointed by the government; directly at the overseas office of the Honorary Consulate; High Commission or embassy of the respective Caribbean country or directly from the local immigration office in the respective Caribbean state.
