## Single Use Plastics may be banned by 2021

After three meetings, the Single-Use Plastics (SUP) Stakeholder Committee is in agreement to recommend restrictive legislation on certain single-use plastics in the Cayman Islands effective at the start of January 2021.

The SUP Committee, led by the Honourable Dwayne Seymour and Honourable Joseph Hew, also includes representatives from a broad cross-section of industry and advocacy groups. The committee has agreed unanimously that part of their proposal that will be submitted to Government will include legislation to restrict certain single-use plastic items such as: single-use check out shop-

ping bags, polystyrene take away containers, plastic straws, plastic stirrers, and plastic cotton swabs. The Committee will continue to actively consider whether other single-use plastic items will be subject to legislation.

As part of the SUP Committee's scope, other issues such as littering and increased penalties, effects of plastics on our physical health, the reduction of importing non-recyclable items, and public education on waste reduction, will all be considered and discussed in the SUP Committee's Report to Cabinet.

## Cayman Updates Our Money-Laundering Strategy

Noting the work that already has been done to strengthen the Cayman Islands' regime for anti-money laundering, countering the financing of terrorism, and countering the financing of proliferation, Government has put into action an updated plan that seeks to strategically address the Cayman Islands' AML/CFT/CFP risks.

Covering six core themes, the Cayman Islands Anti-Money Laundering and Counter Terrorist Financing Strategy 2019-2022 is available on the Anti-Money Laundering Unit's website.

Leading with forewords from the Premier, the Hon. Alden McLaughlin; and the Attorney General, the Hon. Samuel Bulgin, QC, the strategy identifies the priority enhancements to Cayman's regime.

"We fully support the global agenda on fighting financial crime, and we have embarked on an extensive work programme to enhance (our) regulatory and operational frameworks," the Premier said in his foreword.

Thanking those who contributed to the 2019-2022 strategy, the Attorney General recognised that the strategy is designed to ensure that Cayman continues to be "robust and relevant in line with evolving international standards."

He also said that the March 2019 Caribbean Financial Action Task Force (CFATF) report on our regime provided Cayman with a unique opportunity to reset the AML/CFT/CFP agenda over the medium term, taking into consideration the strategic areas for improvement that the report highlighted.

The updated strategy, which already has been implemented, builds upon Cayman's previous 2017 strategy.

The six themes, and current activities to support them, are:

1. **Enhancing Cayman's legal and regulatory framework.** Since January 2018, several important laws and regulations have been amended to strengthen the framework, including the Proceeds of Crime Law; Anti-Money Laundering Regulations, Terrorism Law; and Proliferation Financing (Prohibition) Law.

2. **Implementing a comprehensive risk-based supervisory framework.** Regulators have enhanced their methodologies to ensure they can identify, among the entities they supervise, the ones that are most vulnerable to being misused for money laundering, terrorist financing and proliferation financing. More resources have been devoted to those areas of greater risk. In addition, Cayman has conducted several risk assessments, including a review of terrorist financing risks, certain registrants under the Securities Investments Business Law, and risks of non-profit organisations.

3. **Strengthening sanctions, intelligence, investigation, enforcement and asset recovery.** An Interim Pro-active Task Force has been established within the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service, and a permanent Bureau of Financial Investigations will be opened shortly. The Financial Reporting Authority has implemented systems that allow anyone to sign up via the FRA's website to receive updates on lists of targeted financial sanctions. CIMA and other supervisors send automatic notifications to its supervised entities.

4. **Enhancing domestic cooperation and coordination.** The Financial Crime Focus Group; Proliferation Financing In-



teragency Group; and the Supervisor's Forum have been established to ensure domestic cooperation and coordination in the areas of pro-active investigations in line with the jurisdiction's risk profile, proliferation financing and the supervision of those conducting relevant financial business by their respective supervisors.

5. **Ensuring an efficient and effective system for international cooperation.** Supervisors and law enforcement agencies have implemented enhanced policies and procedures to request assistance and seek feedback from their overseas counterparts.

6. **Raising awareness among all stakeholders and the general public.** Industry sectors of Cayman's business community that have AML/CFT/CFP

obligations are continually updated regarding their responsibilities, by the agencies that supervise them. Public awareness initiatives include public service announcements on Radio Cayman and dms stations, as well as media appearances, articles and social media. In addition, a new website for Cayman's Anti-Money Laundering Unit will be launched soon.

"As we look toward the further strengthening of the Cayman Islands AML/CFT/CFP framework, I wish to thank all the stakeholders who made the successful completion of this document a possibility," the Attorney General said in his foreword, adding that Cayman must demonstrate the same commitment and fervour in pursuing its effective implementation.

## Amendment to Customs & Border Control Law Helps to Fight Laundering

To further strengthen Customs and Border Control's ("CBC") capacity and capability to adequately identify, investigate and detect cases of money laundering (ML) and terrorist financing (TF), The Customs and Border Control (Amendment) Law, 2019 ("the Law") and the Customs and Border Control (Money Declarations and Disclosures) Regulations, 2019 came into force on 10 February 2020.

The changes in Law are as a result of recommendations for CBC following the CFATF Mutual Evaluation Report (MER), which now provides CBC with the legislative framework to enhance its response to these critical aspects.

The Law now requires that inbound and outbound passengers transporting currency or Bearer Negotiable Instruments (BNI's) amounting to CI \$10,000 or more, or its equivalent, to truthfully declare such amount by way of stating it on the Customs Declaration Card or by informing a CBC Officer.

In the event that passengers fail to declare or disclose currency or BNI's or where passengers make a false declaration or a false disclosure, the Law now provides that the Director of the CBC may impose administrative fines. In addition, the fines for non-compliance with declarations/disclosure requirements have been increased to CI\$10,000 and a maximum term of imprisonment of twelve months and the maximum forfeiture of funds is now at 100%.

CBC is updating its signage at all entry and exit points in the Cayman Islands to inform passengers of the required declaration.

To further enhance the Cayman Islands' response to ML/TF, CBC has recruited and trained staff to conduct compliance risk; trace assets; confiscate proceeds and instruments of crime; collect financial data; analyse intelligence; analyse supply chains; and conduct joint taskforce inspections and inves-



tigations for international cooperation.

This enables CBC to effectively and efficiently identify, investigate and prosecute transnational organised border crimes.

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# Single Use Plastics Stakeholder Committee proposes to Ban Certain Plastics

“The world, including the Cayman Islands, has a real problem with over reliance on single-use plastics. We have to work together on all levels; government, organisations, companies and individuals. We have to be accountable for the islands we intend for future generations to inherit,” said Minister Seymour.

The Ministry recognises that any legislation on single-use plastics in the Cayman Islands will impact local businesses and consumers. As the Committee continues to assess options for restrictive legislation on these items and other plastics, it will consider the implications for alternatives to single-use plastics within a holistic understanding of Cayman’s economy, society and environment. Opportunities for public input are planned for later in the year and a dedicated email address is also currently being established, and will be shared shortly, which members of the public may utilize for further information or comments for the Committee.

In assessing the scale of the plastic pollution problem, the Ministry and its Committee cite many countries and cities around the world which have already passed legislation banning certain products. The Cabinet-appointed Ministry-led Committee intends to fight against these harmful products ending up in the environment and also to alle-

viate the pressure on recycling plants, which cannot on their own solve the massive problem.

Minister Seymour continued, “At this time we are in the research stage. In the interim, as we continue to work diligently to make this a reality, there are so many organisations to thank for taking up the global plastic-free movement. I know local restaurants that have already started to switch to compostable corn straws and many grocery stores now charge for plastic bags. Advocacy groups such as Plastic Free Cayman were also pivotal in bringing this to the national forefront for which both I and Minister Hew thank them”.

The SUP Committee also intends to look into the effects of possibly banning other plastics (e.g. polystyrene or expanded foam products), as well as to identify reasonable, practical alternative products that can be imported in place of the items that are proposed to be banned.

Committee member and Acting Chief Officer of the Ministry of Health Ms. Nellie Pouchie said, “Research shows that plastics cause so much harm to our environments. Ensuring Caymanians benefit from a healthy environment is one of Government’s broad policy outcomes. Actions that help us mitigate harmful impacts to the environment, our beloved blue seas, wildlife and ultimately to

our people, align us with these goals. The single-use plastic-free movement is on the rise with a proliferation of legislation happening around the world. We look forward to working with this dedicated group on the Committee to come up with the best policy and methods with which to mitigate the health and environmental harms of single-use plastics on our islands.”

The formation of the SUP Committee is aligned with the National Solid Waste Management Policy which prioritises reduction, reuse, recycling and recovery through an Integrated Solid Waste Management System within the Cayman Islands. 🌐

who are doing their options, some people are just starting their Associates, some are coming to the end of their Associates; it's a cover-all for everyone really."

Butterfield's Kaylie Wright, Recruitment Specialist also said that it was great to meet all the students and hear of their career aspirations and see how

Butterfield could support anyone interested in a career in financial services.

Jitu Rathore, Front Desk manager at The Ritz-Carlton Grand Cayman said that students coming to chat with him and the Ritz-Carlton team were generally interested in the culinary side of careers at the resort.

"When we talk to the students we find that most who pass by who are not interested in hospitality don't realise that

hospitality is not limited to culinary or the front desk, but there are a lot of other options, such as sales and marketing, golf and working on the Ambassadors of the Environment programme," he advised. "So, there are a lot of other departments that they aren't aware of. When we talk to them, they get more interested. We are offering them internships and also job openings that we have available. Two Clifton Hunter High School students already had a clear idea of where their career path ought to take them: Alden McLaughlin Junior, a 13, said he was looking around at the different careers to see what this career fair was offering, but that he had been interested in pursuing a career in corporate law

since he was little, while Stafford Hunter III, 14, said that he was interested in accounting and was studying courses that would help him onto that career path.

Tunisia Barnes, Training and Development Coordinator with the Department of Tourism, said she and the rest of the DOT team were there to try and entice young people into her field of expertise.

"We are trying to plant a seed with regard to different jobs in the tourism industry because tourism is a multi-million-dollar industry. Last year we brought in over half a billion dollars from the industry, so we are trying to get as many young persons as possible to consider a career in the hospitality industry," she said.

Matthew Elphinstone, 21, is still completing his university education studying mechanical engineering however he has already completed two internships with Neuralstudio.ai at Cayman Enterprise City and looks forward to working there full-time. Matthew's idea to use a vision recognition system that could be used as a lionfish smart trap netted him a position with the company once he finishes his studies. Acting as an ambassador for Cayman Enterprise City, Matthew said most of the students he had spoken to so far were asking about the specific field they were interested in and whether Cayman Enterprise City had such a business.

"Most of the time it's a yes, because we have so many opportunities. It's just about looking at Cayman Enterprise City online and seeing what we do," he advised.

For its part, the Chamber of Commerce said it was committed to education and development in the local community, especially for the younger generations who will go on to become the leaders of tomorrow. 🌐

### Man Warned for Intended Prosecution after Failing to Stop for the Police

Just after 8:30AM on Thursday, 20 February, police had cause to stop a blue Honda Civic that was travelling along Eastern Avenue in George Town. Using emergency lights and sirens, the officers attempted to stop the vehicle, however the driver of the vehicle failed to stop for the police. The officers followed the vehicle after assessing that it was safe to do so.

On arriving in the Washington Blvd area, the driver of the offending vehicle stopped the vehicle and exited, then ran away from the officers on foot. The officers made chase, however the man escaped. The officers continued to search in the surrounding area.

Shortly after the incident, the police were later informed that the driver of the vehicle received serious but non-life-threatening injuries after running away from the police. The man was located and spoken to by the police and was warned for intended prosecution for several driving offenses. The Emergency Medical Services were notified and attended the location where the man was located and he was transported to the hospital for treatment.

The vehicle he was driving was searched by the officers but nothing illegal was found. The matter is under investigation by the police.

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# Rudder's anthem loved by cricket fans

David Rudder is one of the most influential calypsonians ever to come out of Trinidad.

The 64-year-old entertainer was born in Belmont, Port of Spain, and has been spreading his unique brand since his childhood.

One of nine children, Rudder spent much of his early life with his grandmother, a devout Baptist. He began singing with a calypso band early on and in his teens sang backup vocals in a calypso tent run by Lord Kitchener. It was a great apprenticeship because Rudder could develop his own style under the legendary Kitchener.

In 1977, Rudder joined Charlie's Roots, a leading band in Trinidad and Tobago, and spent many years as one of the band's vocalists. In 1986, he came to prominence on Andy Narell's album *The Hammer*, which produced two big hits: 'The Hammer' (a tribute to the

late pannist Rudolph Charles) and 'Bahia Girl'. The following year 'Calypso Music' captured the public's imagination. It is a brilliant encapsulation of the history of calypso. In 1988 Rudder released what is widely considered his best album to date, *Haiti*, which included the title track, a tribute to the glory and suffering of Haiti; 'Engine Room', which captured the energy of the steel band; and 'Rally 'Round the West Indies', which became the anthem of West Indies cricket. In 2008, Rudder did a soca collaboration with fellow Trinidadian Machel Montano, 'Oil and Music' on Machel's 2007 album *Flame On*.

Rudder is a strong advocate of Caribbean people. Without knowing their history, people can have no foundation.

"Europeans wrote their history, Africans passed it down orally, here in T&T we have combined the two

through calypso," he said recently. "If you listen to calypsos over the years, you can track the historical events that are taking place." He should know, he has contributed to much of it. 🌐

# Bad boy Killer is unlikely mentor

Bounty Killer is the dancehall maestro known not just for his amazing lyrical ability and ability to work his audiences into a frenzy, he is also renowned for nurturing talent.

The 45-year-old Jamaican was last month honoured at the Jamaica Reggae Industry Association Awards for his extraordinary impact on the reggae industry through mentorship. Those he has helped become stars include Mavado, Vybz Kartel, Busy Signal, Wayne Marshall, and Baby Cham.

Killer told the audience gathered at the Courtleigh Auditorium in Kingston that he was humbled by the recognition.

He said: "This is something different for me", adding that it was never his aim to become a mentor. "This award is bigger than my Grammy to me because this is for helping my peers, not my own career. This is a togetherness award, and this is for all of us - all of who I have helped over the years from the Scare Dem to the Alliance to the ANG."

Killer was born Rodney Basil Price on June 12, 1972. A career in music was inevitable as he grew up in Kingston hearing music on the Black Scorpio sound system his father owned.

At the age of 14, he was shot by a stray bullet during a gunfight between rival political factions, and while convalescing in hospital he decided on the name Bounty Killer.

Before his entry into the dancehall industry, Killer was in the retail industry as an entrepreneur selling figurines. He was encouraged to record at King Jammy's studio in Kingston. One of his first tunes was the 'Coppershot' which Jammy was unwilling to release due to how it glorified gun culture. Jammy's brother Uncle T disagreed and released the single himself.

In 1993, Price performed at Sting, held in Portmore, Jamaica every Boxing Day, where he had a high-profile clash with fellow deejay Beenie Man. The rivalry continued for years with both accusing the other of various slights. They eventually settled their differences after both realised the negative effect their feud was having on the industry. He has also had heated rivalries throughout his career with several stellar deejays, including Merciless and Vybz Kartel.

Killer increased control over his career in 1995 by leaving Jammy and setting up his own Scare Dem Productions company and Priceless Records label.

During the 1990s, Killer voiced for several producers and labels in Jamaica, releasing songs such as 'Defend the Poor', 'Mama', 'Book, Book, Book', 'Babylon System' and 'Down in the Ghetto'. Killer's fame spread internationally through recording with artists like Busta Rhymes, No Doubt, The Fugees, Wyclef Jean, Mobb Deep, Capone-N-Noreaga, Swizz Beatz and AZ.

Killer began releasing albums, with four released in 1994. His 1996 album *My Xperience* was hugely successful, spending six months on the Billboard reggae chart.

In 1997, Bounty Killer made a cover version of the Rose Royce hit single 'Love Don't Live Here Anymore' with Swedish singer Robyn which was a success in the Caribbean. It was featured in the Sean Penn film *She's So Lovely*.

Killer has scorned popular rap, which he's called "embarrassing to reggae," even when collaborating with Wu-Tang Clan, Mobb Deep and others he considers hardcore.

In 2002, a collaboration with No Doubt, 'Hey Baby', won Bounty Killer his first Grammy Award, for Best Pop Vocal Performance by a duo or group. The win made Killer one of the few hardcore dancehall artists to win a Grammy. 'Hey Baby' also sold over a million copies making it Killer's first single to go platinum.

In 2003, Killer cancelled two of his concerts after the gay rights magazine *Outrage!* petitioned Scotland Yard for his arrest, claiming songs about assaulting gays would incite harassment against the gay community. He returned in 2006 after a three-year hiatus, performing uncensored lyrics at several venues without recrimination. He has since directed his focus to social com-

mentary and party lyrics, admitting that he will not pay attention to nor attack the gay community in his music.

In 2014 Bounty Killer and long-term rival Beenie Man put aside their differences and recorded a single together, 'Legendary'. A huge deal was made of this in the Jamaican media because their bitter rivalry had been such an issue for so long.

Killer's bad boy image has been enhanced by brushes with the law including being arrested in June 2006 and charged with assaulting the mother of his child. According to the Jamaica Star: "The complainant was allegedly punched in the face several times, dragged some distance away and her head slammed into a wall." 🌐

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# Griffiths makes us boogie

Marcia Griffiths is probably best known as one of Bob Marley's backing singers The I Threes, yet she is an accomplished performer in her own right and since his passing in 1981 she has been touring the world to appreciative packed houses. Anyone who has partied to the hit 'Electric Boogie' has danced to a Griffiths classic, a biggest single in a long, distinguished career that started in her teens.

Marcia Llyneth Griffiths was born on Nov. 23, 1949 in West Kingston, Jamaica. She started her career in 1964, performing on stage with Byron Lee and the Dragonaires

at the behest of Phillip James of The Blues Busters, who had heard her singing in her home neighbourhood. Her performance was sufficiently impressive that the following day Ronnie Nassralla and Clement Dodd both offered her recording contracts. She chose Dodd's Studio One label, where she recorded a series of duets with male singers including Bob Marley ('Oh My Darling') and Bob Andy ('Always Together'), with whom she would have a relationship lasting several years. In 1968 she had her first success as a solo artist, with 'Feel Like Jumping', which like her other early Studio One solo hits including 'Truly' and 'Melody Life', were written by Andy.

From 1970 to 1974 she worked together with Bob Andy as a duo Bob and Marcia, on the Harry J label. She also recorded for Lloyd Charmers.

Between 1974 and 1981 she was a member of the I Threes supporting Bob Marley & the Wailers. She continued to record as a solo artist throughout the 1970s, working with producers such as Sonia Pottinger, and Joseph Hoo Kim.

In 1983, she released her re-recording of the Bunny Wailer song 'Electric Boogie', originally recorded and released by Wailer in 1976. Although the 1983 version became a minor hit for Griffiths,

the song was remixed in 1989, and it was this version that made the Electric Slide line dance an international dance craze. It reached number 51 on the US Billboard Hot 100, making it her most successful single. It is currently the highest-selling single by a female reggae singer of all time. She has more recently had further hits with producer Donovan Germain.

She had two children with JBC disc jockey Errol Thompson, and raised them alone after his death in 1983.

Griffiths was featured on the album *True Love* by Toots and the Maytals, which won the Grammy Award in 2004 for Best Reggae Album, and showcased many notable musicians including Willie Nelson, Eric Clapton, Jeff Beck, Gwen Stefani/No Doubt, Keith Richards, Toots Hibbert, Ken Boothe, and The Skatalites.

In January 2014 she announced that as part of her fiftieth year in the music business she would be releasing an album of her favourite songs by other artists, *Songs That Inspire Me, Songs I Love to Sing*, recorded with Germain.

Such is the respect Griffiths holds in Jamaica, in 2014 she received the Jamaican Order of Distinction (Commander class). At 68 she shows no signs of slowing down and continues to thrill rapturous fans worldwide. 🌐

# Deep Concern About Crime in the Region Triggers CARICOM to Plan Security Summit

The Caribbean Community (CARICOM) will convene a multidisciplinary summit on Security scheduled for April 2020 to have “frank discussions” given the continuing high rates of crime and violence in the Community.

CARICOM Chairman, Barbados Prime Minister Mia Mottley made the disclosure while briefing the press at the close of the 31st Interseasonal Meeting of the Conference of Heads of Government last night. The security summit will be held in Trinidad in April.

She said that Heads were “deeply concerned about the level of crime and violence in the region”.

Prime Minister Mottley said it was recognized that crime and violence and security were not issues that could “be believed to be simply the responsibility of governments”, particularly in the context of the Caribbean where they are “effectively public health disorders, public health diseases”. To this extent, Heads agreed that a multi-disciplinary approach to addressing the issue was critical.

“It is critical that we bring together not only the heads of government of the Region... but also partners from faith-based organizations...artists, sports personalities, teachers ... [among others] for us to have full and frank discussions about how we, as a region, not as

individual governments, will begin to contain the difficulties that individual communities and countries are experiencing because of a change in behaviour, a change in values, a change in attitudes.

“If we are to win the battle in the medium term, we need to treat this as a national and regional discussion.... the message from Heads of Government is that this [issue] is urgent,” she said.

A brief snapshot of crime and security as articulated in the Caribbean Community Security Strategy (CCSS), shows high rates of homicide and violent crimes; trafficking in guns, ammunition and illegal narcotics; organized crime rising cybercrime; and the growing power of transnational and organized crime networks.

The upshot of this includes, youth violence, gangs and gender-based violence, especially domestic and sexual violence against women and girls, among other ills. Increased cyber and financial crimes on an international scale mainly due to technological advancements.

infrastructure and negatively affect economies. Moreover, in the aftermath of these natural disasters security forces are often challenged to perform first responder duties, whilst addressing law and order issues such as looting, as the environment becomes conducive to various illicit activities.

In addition, there is the public health challenge of viruses and diseases moving across borders given the inter-connectedness of the Caribbean and the world, and these, too, present security and other challenges.

In this last context, the Communique issued at the end of Meeting indicated that the Conferences agreed “to address the matter [crime and violence] as a public health issue and to hold a Summit of Member States and a regional multi-disciplinary partnership in Trinidad and Tobago in early April”.

“Heads of Government also agreed that enhanced security would include measures to assist in minimizing the risk of importation of the COVID-19 virus”, the Communique stated. 🌐

Statistics indicate that the Caribbean region while home to 8.5 per cent of the world’s population, disproportionately experiences about 27 per cent of the world’s homicides; and that some Caribbean countries rank among the highest in the world for the number of homicides per 100,000 people.

The security threats caused by the impact of natural disasters is another issue that contributes to the vulnerability of states. Hurricanes, tropical storms, floods and landslides damage critical

## US Retains Hundreds of Illegally Acquired Artifacts to Haiti

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Art Crime Team has returned more than 450 cultural and historical artifacts to Haiti in the largest repatriation of art from the United State to the French-speaking Caribbean nation.

Representatives from the US Embassy in Port-au-Prince, the US Department of State Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, Haiti’s Ministry of Culture and Communication, and the Bureau National d’Ethnologie of Haiti joined the FBI Art Crime Team for a repatriation ceremony at the Bureau of Ethnology in Port-au-Prince to return the items.

The 479 Haitian artifacts were discovered in 2014, when the FBI Art Crime Team seized more than 7,000 items from the private collection of an amateur archaeologist Donald Miller, who had likely acquired the items in contravention of state and federal law and international treaties. This was the largest single recovery of culture property in FBI history.

Miller amassed his collection over seven decades from locations around the world and kept it on display in his basement in Waldron, Indiana prior to turning it over to the FBI. Since 2014, the FBI Art Crime Team has been working to identify the rightful home of each item in the seized collection.

The repatriation returns significant historical property, long missing, to Haiti.

“The FBI recognizes the significant role artifacts like these play in a culture’s history and identity. We are honoured to return these pieces to the people of Haiti,” said Assistant Director Calvin Shivers of the FBI’s Criminal Investigative Division.

“The FBI is committed to returning stolen art and other objects of cultural and historical significance to the communities to which they belong.”

The FBI’s work on this case is ongoing. 🌐

## Search for Victims of Dominica Plane Crash Called Off

A mission to find four French citizens who were on a small plane that crashed in Dominica’s waters on Sunday has failed, with authorities calling off the search after only finding plane parts and passengers’ personal effects.

A statement issued by the prefecture for Guadeloupe indicated that after hours of searching “in difficult weather conditions, there is unfortunately no more hope to find survivors.”

“The search conditions are made difficult with strong winds and rough seas causing poor visibility due to frequent squalls,” it said. “Despite substantial measures, the search team have only found some of the passengers’ personal belongings and parts of a plane.”

The four people – a 40-year-old man, a couple and their 16-year-old son – were on the privately-owned, French-registered Piper F-OGKO en route to Guadeloupe when it went down in the waters on the northeastern coast of Dominica around 7 p.m. on Sunday, shortly after taking off from the Douglas Charles Airport.

Parts of a landing gear, believed to be from the missing aircraft, were found by a search team.

A backpack with the passport of one of the people on the plane, and a bag with the flight plan were also found. 🌐

## Water Prohibition to Start Again in Barbados Soon as Island Continues to Experience Drought

Barbadians can expect their water use to be curtailed once again.

Minister of Energy and Water Resources Wilfred Abrahams has disclosed that Cabinet had approved the re-introduction of the water prohibition, which was first introduced in June last year as part of the Ministry and the Barbados Water Authority’s (BWA) Drought Mitigation Measures. That prohibition expired on November 30 last year.

But Abrahams explained that Barbados was in a drought at the beginning of the year and rainfall had been less than expected, so a decision was made to re-introduce restrictions on water usage.

“The projections are that at best, we will have a normal dry season. So, if we are already in a water deficit coming out of the rainy season and we are going to have a normal dry season, then it is going to be difficult for the rest of the year,” he said yesterday.

“Things being what they are and the water situation being what it is, it’s

necessary now for us to reintroduce the prohibition. And, once the Water Authority has settled the exact form of it, we will come back...and explain and answer questions on that. But I will tell you that Cabinet has already agreed to the Water Authority’s...and the Ministry’s request. We are still in a drought situation; we are still water scarce and the demand for water is great.”

The Water Resources Minister said that during the last prohibition, the BWA depended largely on the goodwill of people and the ability of Barbadians to self-police their water usage.

No one was prosecuted under last year’s drought mitigation restrictions. However, Abrahams said, the situation was now so serious that the BWA would be looking at fully enforcing the prohibition.

“For the most part, Barbadians understand what we are going through and the challenges that the Water Authority face with respect to the delivery



and distribution of water. It was not necessary to charge anybody the last time, but chances are this time around the prohibitions are going to be a bit more stringent.

“We now don’t have the latitude with the water situation being what it is to

depend on the goodwill of people, so we are hoping that everybody tows the line and there is no need to take it any further. But, the Government and the Water Authority will do what they have to secure the water supply to the benefit of Barbadians,” he emphasized. 🌐
