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Local artists explore COVID difficulties and opportunities

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Holness: I'll impose lockdown again if numbers rise

TURBULENT TIMES AHEAD BUT CAYMAN KEEPS HOPE ALIVE

The full scale of the economic challenge facing the Cayman Islands has been laid out.

Pledging that the government is committed to presenting "the unvarnished truth", Hon. Minister of Finance Roy McTaggart said it was "disheartening for me to relay such bad news" in outlining the real impact of the economic consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic here.

Unemployment is projected to rise to between 11% to as high as 20% putting up to 10,000 people out of work, about a third of them Caymanians.

The economy is forecast to contract by up to 12%.

THE SHORT TERM OUTLOOK

According to Mr McTaggart, a best-case scenario modelled by the Economic and Statistic Department (ESO) would see the economy reopening by the beginning of July with tourists returning by October of this year, albeit in small numbers.

It projects an unemployment rate of 11.6% contrasted with the 3.5% jobless rate in 2019.

He said: "Under these scenarios, GDP is projected to contract by 11.4% with the unemployment rate rising to 11.6%. The number of displaced jobs was estimated at 8,859 (or an unemployment rate of 18.7%), of which



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Registration of New-borns Must Be Done by Appointment Only

General Registry is adopting interim measures to assist members of the public register new-born babies during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

As of Thursday, 28 May, General Registry (the department within the Ministry of Financial Services which oversees this area) will implement an appointment system to complete the registration of new-borns. The process is as follows:

- Parents of new-born children will be contacted and information verified over the phone
- Parents will then be given a time to attend the Government Administration Building (GAB) to sign the registration documents
- Where possible, out of an abundance of caution, parents should not bring their new-born(s) or other children with them for the appointment
- Being on time for the appointment is important, if persons run behind schedule they must call the number provided by the Registrar to re-schedule (there will be no exceptions)
- Based on current COVID-19 protocols, persons must ensure they are wearing masks before entering the

building or else they will be denied entry

• Persons with an appointment should go to the front entrance of the GAB and a member of the security team will direct them from there

Persons should not visit the GAB if they were not given an appointment as entry will be denied.

In navigating this arrangement, General Registry is reaching out to parents based off of the contact details provided by the hospitals where the babies are born. Therefore, it is vitally important that parents give the most accurate and current contact information to their hospitals.

In addition, only the registration of new-born children is being processed in this manner. The receipt of hard copies for all birth certificates, as well as marriage and death certificates, continues to be done through the previously announced policy of online ordering and curb side pick-up. Details on this policy can be found on the General Registry website.

2,772 would be Caymanian jobs. The scenarios are conditioned on the gradual return of visitors (less than 20% of normal visitor levels that usually prevails at the high tourist season) beginning in the last quarter of 2020."

The worst-case scenario presents a more dire picture with unemployment projected at close to 20% or around 10,000 people out of work.

He added: "If international developments prevent the arrival of visitors to our shores for the rest of this year, then based on the economic projections, we would see a further uptick in the unemployment rate and a further contraction in the ability our residents to earn money."

"Under this scenario with a July 2020 lifting of most domestic restrictions, the income earning capacity (GDP) of these Islands is projected to contract by 12.2% with the unemployment rate rising to 12.3%."

Mr McTaggart surmised that "as a result of the projected decline, the Caymanian unemployment rate is projected to jump to 19.7% (or 2,981 persons), and a total of 9,582 jobs (or 12.3%) would be displaced."

In both scenarios, GDP is projected to contract by over 10% year-on-year (between 11.4% and 12.2%).

This drastically contracts with the picture at the end of last year.

"We concluded 2019 with a thriving economy growing at about 3%, led by construction growth of 6.1%, hotels and restaurants by 5.3%, inflation running at 5.7% and an unemployment rate at 3.5%," he stated.

Tourism, which accounts for 20% of GDP, has been severely set back, although the financial sector, the other main economic pillar, remained relatively stable for now.

Construction and development projects are being relied on to ease Cayman out of the current economic doldrums - at best to stabilise the situation.

UPSIDE DOWN OVERNIGHT

"Ladies and gentlemen, we woke up in 2020 and met a different world with COVID-19. It turned our world upside down overnight and it will forever change it," Finance Minister McTaggart declared.

The government has taken some steps interim to cushion the economic impact of COVID-19 via a series of relief and stimulus measures.

These, Mr McTaggart said, are expected to boost GDP value-added by approximately \$184.9 million in 2020, an improvement in the GDP contraction from -11.4% to -7.3%. This translates to roughly 36% of the projected falloff in real GDP.

"As a result of the measures implemented, more jobs will be saved, an estimated 1,468 jobs, of which 678 are likely to go to Caymanians."

He voiced particular concern about the spike in the unemployment rate, the effect it is having on Caymanian families in particular, and the dismal outlook as presented in the scenarios projected by the ESO modelling.

THE HUMAN FACTOR

Underlining the gravity of the problem, Mr McTaggart, in response to a

question from Caymanian Times, said it bothered him to see people queuing for food.

"Personally it does bother me to see my people in that position. I've never seen it in Cayman in my life. I grew up at a time where for the most part life was really good. The economy worked well. We were all quite prosperous and all benefited."

He lamented that "now this is a very significant impact on us all and you are seeing it. You are seeing hundreds of Caymanians now having to seek food from charities to put food on the table."

Stating that the government "cannot do it all ourselves", he said it will take the private and public sectors working together.

Mr McTaggart mentioned in particular "non-profit organisations really stepping up to the plate and assisting with food and delivering other services to those who are in need, saying he was "extremely grateful "to see the response of our people in giving and supporting these charities as they try to help."

ECONOMIC IMPACT

However, he also noted that "depending on the outcome of the stimulus measures implemented and the timing of the opening of our borders to tourism, the ESO estimates that our revenues could contract to between \$632m to \$649m for the year.

"If this holds true, this would represent a decline in revenue of between \$211m and \$227m for the year, or 24% to 26%."

Looking at the increased spending required to manage the COVID-19 crisis and the economic fall-out, it is calculated that "government could be faced with a deficit of \$250m this year."

Government reserves have been put at CI\$ 621m on a declining scale with the Finance Minister revealing that they have already "burned through \$38.5m of our cash reserves."

"At the present burn rate that we are going through," he explained, "unless there is a significant turnaround in our financial fortunes, it will be sometime, maybe the first to the second quarter of next year before we will start to run into issues before we might start to run into issues and possibly try and access the standby line of credit."

CREDIT ON STANDBY

Finance Minister McTaggart announced that as a fallback, the Cayman Islands is seeking a short term CI\$ 500 million standby line of credit which it would be able to draw down if needed, he announced.

He said the credit line "would only be a security blanket which would give Cayman the ability to access funding quickly if we need it."

"In light of the significant deterioration in governments' fiscal performance and in order to give the country the financial security and build the resilience that we need, Cabinet last week authorized the Ministry of Finance to issue a Request for Proposal for the establishment of a Standby Line of Credit in the amount of \$500m for a period of 18 months.

"This line of credit will be utilized, or drawn down, only if we find ourselves in the unfortunate position of having exhausted all of the cash reserves available to us."

Approval for this will be required from the Legislative Assembly and significantly, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

CREDIT RATING STILL HIGH

There was some encouraging news showing through when he announced that the international rating agency Moody's had maintained the Cayman Islands' high credit rating.

"Amidst this crisis our Islands' have become a beacon to the region, Moody's in its latest credit report published April 13, 2020 maintained Caymans' Aa3 rating with a stable outlook, amidst this economic uncertainty," he reported.

Mr McTaggart said: "They noted that 'prudent government planning has left the islands with fiscal space to deal with the economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic'."

"Those were the words of Moody's, not mine, he pointed out, adding that, "arguably, even the worlds' largest debt rating agency has confidence in our little islands and our government."

Meanwhile, It will take a mammoth effort to bounce back from that according to the Finance Minister and it will take an "all hands on deck" to restore the economy to some semblance of equilibrium and growth.

He doesn't see that happening until late 2022 at the earliest.

HOPE ON THE HORIZON

It was also announced that the government is working on a further series of measures aimed at easing the burden on residents and businesses.

They include:

- A low-cost loan program for small businesses most affected by the closure of the tourism industry.

- Increasing community employment programs (NiCE and others) post-COVID-19, using unemployed and displaced Caymanians.

- Expedited resumption of Government's 2020/21 capital expenditure program, focusing initially on the resumption of construction projects that were in progress prior to the onset of Covid19.

This includes projects such as the Mental Health Facility in East End, enhancements to the road infrastructure by the NRA, and the John Gray High School.

- And, continuing with efforts to diversify the local economy, with a focus on agriculture for domestic food security and resilience.

With the gradual reopening of the economy, approval is already being expedited for a number of key construction and development projects to kick-start the economy, get people back to work and create jobs.

New opportunities in the growing virtual financial sector are also being explored.

Finance Minister McTaggart stated: "While the challenges are indeed enormous and may seem unsurmountable, I would posit that our actions so far have left us in a strong position and well placed to eradicate COVID-19 from our community."

"We have been safely navigating the single largest health disaster in this generation, and this is a demonstration of this government's commitment to the lives and livelihood of all residents."

While battling COVID-19 and grappling with its economic consequences, Cayman is also preparing for the hurricane season (which starts Monday June 1st) and elections due in May next year. 🌐

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Austin Harris's Prospect Bond

Prospect MLA Austin Harris regularly makes the rounds of his constituency with calls and visits, however since the onset of the COVID19 Pandemic, he has been seen making regular deliveries of Food Vouchers to the elderly and families in need. More recent-

ly he and his team visited 196 homes delivering disposable protective masks in an attempt to keep the community safe. While planning to visit each home individually, MLA Harris was grateful for his close connection to the residents of his home district.

"In Prospect I have established a number of WhatsApp Community Groups that allow my constituents to not only stay connected with me but also each other," Harris shared. "Prior to COVID19, our community chat served well as a neighborhood watch tool, but

since then it's been very useful to send out official government advisories to large groups of people which enables them to stay informed."

While respecting social distancing, Councillor Harris also got to check in on his constituents, who are also his neigh-


bors. "A great many have coped well and have understood and supported the life saving measures of the Government," stated Councillor Harris. "Others however feel frustrated and thus it is important to always have an open line of communication." 📍



Cayman Enterprise City's Economic Impact is US\$260 Million

Cayman Enterprise City (CEC) has recently released its annual estimated economic impact report. The report, which was independently compiled by Berman Fisher, estimates the 2019 impact of the CEC special economic zones project on the local economy to have exceeded USD \$50 million for the second year in a row. Local artists explore COVID difficulties and opportunities

Artists and musicians are free spirits, and they don't like restrictions, such as those brought by the COVID-19 rules. Painters of landscapes and seascapes, or photographers who like to catch the hustle of town scenes, are naturally going to feel restricted. But being shut up on your own for long periods also gives artists the chance to explore inner landscapes; the reflective world of the soul.

Professional painter and sculptor Artist Al Ebanks has been using the time to delve more deeply into the nature of human interactions. "In this human world, we always rise to overcome and I am no different. I started on a new series of art, called "Unmasked." When the mask is taken off, the true colors and character come to light. Sometimes it's not a beautiful picture, in this series, I used subtiles, like empty space. It's a natural selection, for the human to find their own space." About one of his new paintings, entitled Domino Effect, shows a stylized handshake: "In this current situation, a simple handshake can cause a domino effect," he said.

June South-Robinson is an Inclusion Specialist, working with children, but

she is also a well-established visual artist with her own distinctive style in painting: "For me, COVID19 was the unseen, unspeakable horror," she said. "Living alone, here, in Grand Cayman also suddenly felt like the loneliest place in the world and the geographic distance between my children in the UK and my mother in Jamaica seemed to have become a yawning dark chasm. For the first time in my life I felt totally alone. So I started to paint, and write to make sense of the moment we are in."

"I do believe that art and storytelling can help us come together, cope and heal in the face of grief and loss. It took me to that 'quiet place' - where nothing hurts, loneliness and worries are gone, and I inhabit a place of joyful oblivion. That's where the large painting, 'Hope' came from. It shows a mother with her hands uplifted to heaven entreating for intervention, while surrounded by colours which symbolize peaceful hope."

Helene Jones has many years' experience as a photographer, and has found that the lockdown was a key to looking more closely: "There is a lot to capture from the smallest insect to the depths of

a flower. My backyard on Sundays has been a treasure-store where I find all kinds of things. At night when I could not leave the yard I look for things like the full moon or frogs to photograph. I always bring my camera when I go for a walk, just in case I would see something unusual like a parrot flying towards me," she said.

Local painter, Zane Kuttner said: "In quarantine I have forced myself to push my limits while I can and paint that which I am usually uncomfortable with, focusing on colour and value; I am always learning and what better time to take advantage of the time given?"


James Geary is a local musician, a multi-instrumentalist, singer and songwriter. Like many other artists, he has found the unprecedented times to be a source of inspiration. "Lockdown has

provided me an opportunity," he said. "I think pain produces some of the best art I have ever made and that has been my COVID experience as a musician...I've been able to tap into a creative that I have seldom experienced before, and it has produced a lot of written material and creative ideas."

Mr. Geary has also helped pioneer some online musicians groups, sharing music and ideas with one another: "My friend Amy Kiflin actually introduced me to a group out of Canada who created an online community to uplift people, so we thought it would be a good idea to start one here," he explained. "We musicians have been very adept in collaborating with one another while maintaining social distancing. I really feel like we are helping to promote peace and sanity by using our gifts." 🌐

Anastasia Filippova represents F4F’s organising committee and she said that Raeanne participated in the F4F programme in 2018.

“Raeanne was a participant of Football for Friendship 2018 that took place in Moscow and she opens the fourth episode of Good News,” Anastasia advised. “We think she did very well and she is not afraid of being creative which is very important too. In her video, after saying her news, she catches a football ball; we didn’t include it in the episode but we took this fragment for a film we will be creating by the end of the season. And she has already sent news for the next episode, so we will see her soon in Good News.”

Football for Friendship was started in 2013. Participants of the programme are young players and young journalists – girls and boys aged 12, including children with disabilities. Young players participate in mixed teams, where they represent different countries, learn how to play together, and show what the world would be like without war and discrimination, Anastasia explained. Young journalists cover the events of the programme in the International Children’s Press Center and promote universal human values.

Football for Friendship is supported by UEFA, FIFA, the International Olympic Committee, football federations, and the world’s leading football clubs, international charity funds, famous athletes, politicians and artists. The project has received many national and international awards in the field of social responsibility, sports, and communications. Over the previous seven seasons, the programme has covered 211 countries and regions, united more than 6,000 participants, and

gained more than 5 million supporters. In 2019, Football for Friendship set a world record and obtained the Guinness World Records® title for the most nationalities in a football training session in history.

Each year Football for Friendship takes place wherever the UEFA Champions League final is held.

“Due to the situation with Covid-19, our final events were postponed,” Anastasia explained. “But this year will be different; soon we will announce a new format for this year. Following the situation all around the world, we un-

derstood that we could do something useful even while staying at home, we can support all the world with good news created by children. Most of the correspondents are the participants of 2018 season. We also have a couple of newcomers: some of them found the information on the Internet and wanted to join us. Also, we invited schools of journalism and different media for kids (newspapers, magazines, radio, TV) to support us.”

For the Good News broadcast, children chose their personal topics of interest, which are often football, sports,

music, culture and ecology, Anastasia said. Raeanne’s news was about music, the next one will be about sports.

This campaign was specially made for social networks, so the broadcasts are posted on YouTube, Facebook and Instagram.

Holness: I'll impose lockdown again

Jamaica Prime Minister Andrew Holness has warned that he is prepared to re-impose tough measures to contain COVID-19 if the country's numbers begin to rise. Jamaica had 564 confirmed cases on Tuesday which included eight new cases.

The number of recoveries stands at 238, which includes more than 100 in the last week. There are currently 309 active cases.

"If our numbers change, for any reason - people stop observing the curfew measures, for example, people start to gather in groups of 10, people who are ill deciding that they are not staying at home - all these behaviours

could contribute to an increase in our numbers," Holness said.

But even as he spoke about observing the various disease prevention protocols, he conceded that full-compliance and a zero-tolerance approach to enforcement is impractical.

"We are not going to be always successful and overly strict in what we are doing," Holness said in response to a question from a journalist about the lack of social distancing that was observed during the Verzuz Battle between dancehall artists Bounty Killer and Beenie Man last Saturday.

"If we were to be brutally honest, certainly not at all

times social distanced was observed during the performances but from my recollection, the gathering orders were observed," Holness said about the entertainment event that attracted some 500,000 views on Instagram.

Holness said that Jamaica is doing well in managing the epidemic. He said that it is important that attention be paid on ensuring Jamaica minimises the effect of the recession.

"Yes, we are doing well but don't let our success become our enemy. Continue to faithfully follow the measures until we can declare this pandemic as being over," he said. 🌐

Chastanet is cautious to open economy

The St Lucia government has defended its decision to seek a four-month extension of the state of emergency saying it allows for the authorities to move swiftly between phases especially as the coronavirus (COVID-19) virus evolves.

"This would not be possible under normal circumstances. We can plan and be prepared for COVID-19 but all of us who watch the international news will observe that this virus is ever changing, and we need to adapt accordingly. Therefore our state of readiness today may be very different next week depending on the effects of its impact," Prime Minister Allen Chastanet told legislators.

Chastanet said that having examined the actions of countries in the Caribbean and internationally, a state of emergency is the best mechanism in securing timely and seamless execution of protocols and guidelines.

He said that a state of emergency "is no small matter" and comes as a result

of a declaration by government in response to an extraordinary situation posing a fundamental threat to the country.

"In our case, we face two fundamental threats; a pandemic and the risk of a financial/economic crisis. It remains one of the most, if not the most effective mechanisms in dealing with events which pose a fundamental threat to a country and it reminds us all to remain vigilant."

Chastanet likened the virus to a hurricane "like no other that we have faced in this region". 🌐

Bahamas may be first to resume cruises

Bahamas Paradise Cruise Line plans to resume operations that could make it the first ocean-going cruise line to resume service after the global suspension of cruise operations in March.

The operator of short cruises between the Port of Palm Beach, Florida and Grand Bahama Island plans to resume cruises on July 25, just one day after the expected lifting of the Centres for Disease Controls' current no sail order.

Bahamas Paradise's first cruise ship, the Grand Celebration will resume the line's two-night cruises with many new restrictions designs to address travellers' concerns and the anticipated CDC regulations to ensure the health and safety of the passengers and crew.

The ship will be capacity controlled reducing total capacity by 40 percent - to around 900 passengers maximum.

The news of the planned resumption of services came as the Bahamas government announced plans to resume

commercial travel in and out of The Bahamas by July 1. The nation's tourism minister, however, has warned that despite the advantages the Bahamas has to offer being near to the US and its relatively low levels of the virus on the islands, that they are expecting a slow build up for tourism.

Bahamas Paradise Cruise Line also expects a scaled resumption. Its second ship, the Grand Classica, is scheduled to resume sailing on Oct. 3. The cruise line also plans to resume its sail and stay program with the resorts on Grand Bahama Island, before then offering only round-trip cruises to the US. 🌐

St Kitts proud of its low crime rate

St Kitts and Nevis can claim that is one of the safest places in the world because its crime rate has been trending down for the past two years with it decreasing by 33 percent from 2019.

Cromwell Henry, Superintendent in the Royal St Kitts and Nevis Police Force, said that 21 crimes were reported in 2019 with only seven so far in 2020. The country's population is 53,000.

He highlighted this during his presentation on the National Emergency Operations Centre COVID-19 Daily Briefing for May 26.

Henry compared statistics of crime from week 21 of 2019 and week 21 of 2020. The statistics he gave were zero homicides up to week 21 of last year and zero for 2020 as well.

He said: "There was one bodily wounding and none this year. There were two robberies last year with none

this year. There were seven break-ins in week 21 last year and there was only one this year. One sexual assault last year, none this year. Seven larcenies last year, five this year. Four drug possession cases reports, there was none this year. Six malicious damage last year, none this year." 🌐

Antigua's Sheer Rocks eatery has been the most sought place to eat on the island for years, culminating with the coveted top slot in the 50 best Caribbean restaurants this year.

With the wide-ranging impacts of the pandemic, though, Sheer Rocks and its sister eatery, Catherine's Cafe, had to adapt. Now, the restaurants' parent company Rocks Group has taken the restaurants mobile, with "Rocks Box."

The food and wine takeaway and delivery service began life as a subscription wine service several years ago. Now, it's come to life as an alternative to in-restaurant dining.

The offering includes ready-to-eat meals, meal kits, deli items and the company's beloved wine selection — along with bottled cocktails, too.

Flying fish return to St Lucia

St Lucian fishermen have started catching flying fish for the first time in years which means some of them will earn well out of it.

Fishers of Choiseul have been catching flying fish, which had largely disappeared from St Lucia's waters for over a decade, for two weeks now.

Gros Islet fishers made a major catch of about 5,000 which sold off in short order. According to the Choiseul fishers, they have not yet made a major catch, but they expect to do so in the upcoming weeks. They made their first catch a few days after the major catch in Gros Islet.

Fisher Guy Phillips said: "We expect to make some big catches soon. Things are picking up. We never have enough flying fish to sell to the public. Every day people are asking for flying fish. It's flying fish people want."

According to Phillips, any fisherman who can make a few big catches of the coveted flying fish will become rich. Another fisher said: "Flying fish is coming back and it's a good thing for us." He said fishers also burn less gas fishing for flying fish than other fishes.

The disappearance of flying fish from St Lucia is thought to be related to the prevalence of sargassum seaweed in the water, which disrupts their habitat. 🌐

Grenada quick to welcome yachts

Grenada is the first Caribbean destination to welcome back yacht arrivals, its government confirmed last week.

The first yacht arrivals returned to Grenada since the island closed its seaports to recreational vessels in March. Grenada is facilitating yacht arrivals under strict health and safety protocols.

Officials from Grenada's Ministry of Health are present to perform screenings of yachters, including temperature testing for yacht passengers. Yacht passengers arrive at a designated dock at Camper & Nicholsons Port Louis Marina.

Yachts seeking to arrive in Grenada must be pre-registered into the destination's database before being given pre-clearance. The yachts are then placed on 14-day quarantine at two approved locations.

At the end of the quarantine period, crew will be given formal immigration

clearance, after receiving a negative COVID-19 test and health clearance.

Grenadian officials said it had prepared provisioning protocols for the quarantine sites of Port Louis Marina and Carriacou Marine, for yachts needing water, essential supplies and fuel during quarantine.

The government said over 700 yachts had been registered and scheduled; they will be facilitated through the plan over the coming months. 🌐
