

## Major Opening for Level 2

Cayman takes a huge step towards returning to normal life as of this weekend.

From Sunday, July 21 st, a huge swathe of the remaining restrictions will be removed as the territory moves to the anxiously-awaited Level Two (Mild Suppression).

That's just one level before the Level 1 All Clear, although indications are that might still be some way off.

Despite that, the announcement of the Level 2 stage is widely welcomed both for its economic and social impact, while a keen eye is still being

kept on the still ominous presence of COVID-19 in the community.

Cayman has recorded 193 cases of COVID-19, but no additional cases were recorded on Wednesday when Hon. Premier Alden McLaughlin announced that lockdown restrictions are being lifted on a wide range of businesses and social activities.

"We are continuing the plan to move to Level 2 Mild Suppression with effect from Sunday coming June 21st," the Premier announced.



## Captain Robert Hamaty, CAL tribute

On behalf of the entire Cayman Airways family, we offer our deepest condolences to the family of former Cayman Airways Captain and Chief Pilot, Robert "Robbie" Hamaty, who passed away peacefully on June 13, 2020.

Captain Hamaty served an integral role in the growth and development of our national airline in its formative years. When he joined us in 1978, Cayman Airways only had one aircraft, a BAC 1-11, and only eight pilots - four captains and four first officers. In the late 1980's, Captain Hamaty served as Chief Pilot, and also flew Cayman Airways' first Boeing 737-200 aircraft. He was a founding member of the Cayman Airways Pilots Association (CAPA), and was instrumental in setting up CAPA's annual Cayman Airways Fishing Tournament.

While at Cayman Airways, Captain Hamaty met his wife, Carlene, who was a flight attendant at the time. His son, Basil Hamaty, is also a captain for Cayman Airways today.



"Even after Captain Hamaty left Cayman Airways in the 1990's for health reasons, he maintained a lifelong love and interest in Cayman Airways, and will always be remembered for continuously sharing industry tips and insights with our Senior Management Team over the years," shared Cayman Airways President and CEO, Fabian Whorms.



# CAYMAN STEPS INTO SUMMER WITH LEVEL 2 'COVID UNLOCK'

He said: "In practical terms that means that there will be some softening of restrictions, some starting of the 21st, some starting on the 5th of July and others on the 19th of July."

## JUNE 19th to JULY 4th

What this means is that from 4:30am on Sunday the 21st of June 2020, the hard curfew will come to an end. Also, from that date the shelter-in-place requirement will be lifted, and travel restrictions "to certain places on certain days based on their surnames" will also be removed.

However, social distancing will still be in force as will the requirement to wear a mask while indoors in public indoors where it's not possible to maintain the 2 meters (6 feet) social distance.

Stating that "I know this will be greeted with a lot of welcome," the Premier went on to say that, "as of Sunday 21st there will no longer be a prohibition on persons visiting each other's homes. This also means that domestic helper and caregivers will be allowed to return to work."

He said in Grand Cayman gatherings of up to 25 persons will be allowed as is the case in Cayman Brac and Little Cayman.

This also applies to churches. Social distancing and other safety protocols in those settings will remain in place.

On the other hand, mass public gatherings such as carnivals and concerts, parties and festivals "will continue to be banned on Grand Cayman and Cayman Brac, regardless of the number of people involved," Premier McLaughlin stated.

He did specify however that: "most establishments, institutions, businesses, organisations including churches, offices, cinemas, theatres, beauty salons, barbers, spas and masseuse services, and medical and dental offices (subject to approval from the HBC), will be able to fully operate but must observe the social distance requirements and enforce the wearing of masks."

He said "these establishments are not subject to the social gathering restrictions of 25 persons maximum. They are only subject to requiring that the social distancing requirements are properly maintained and mask-wearing is enforced."

While businesses and offices will be allowed to open, the Premier said that managers of these establishments, especially in the financial sector are encouraged to have their staff work to continue working remotely as far as is practicable.

For restaurants and bars, there are specific new measures for them from Sunday June 21st.

While tables are required to remain eight feet apart, there are no limitations on the number of persons who may sit at the table providing that they maintain the 6 feet (2 meters) separation.

Serving and eating at indoor counters is disallowed in a bar or restaurant.

## OTHER 'RELAXATIONS'

The range of other measures being relaxed from June 21st are:

Restaurants and bars can now open during their normal hours with staff continuing to wear masks, but dancing and karaoke won't be permitted.

Beach and maritime leisure activities are also back from Sunday, June 21st.

But while access to public beaches is again allowed, beachgoers are advised to maintain social distancing and follow other safeguards on public gatherings which will remain in place.

In Grand Cayman, only 10 persons will be allowed per boat but the Sister Islands remain out of bounds for pleasure trips.

Also still out of bounds are Stingray City, Rum Point, Starfish Point and the sandbar.

Scuba diving is now permitted using personal gear as scuba and snorkel equipment, except tanks, will not be available for rent.

Other restrictions being lifted from Sunday include; weddings and funerals where a maximum of 25 persons are allowed.

Exercising at any time is permissible once social distancing is observed, while persons of different households can once again use each other's pools and hot tubs.

Staycations are being permitted but under strict conditions when planning to go to the Sister Islands as air travel restrictions remain in place.

Anyone from in Grand Cayman planning to travel to the Sister Islands by air must first notify the Medical Officer of Health, go into self-isolation for 14 days and be declared COVID-free before being allowed to proceed on their journey.

These measures will be in force until the 4th of July.

## JULY 5th TO JULY 19th

A further series of steps easing the lockdown will be introduced from July 5th and will be in place until July 19th while officials continue to monitor the trend of COVID-19 in the community.

These include:

The opening of all education institutions and facilities – including camps and bible schools and preschools as well as sporting and social events. However, contact sports will not be allowed.

Restaurants and bars will be able to offer both indoor and outdoor services, with a restriction of six feet between tables. There will be no limits on the number of people at a table, plus the distance between those at a table decreases from six to three feet.

Front of house staff must continue to wear masks/cloth face coverings.

In Grand Cayman, exercise in strata gyms and public gyms will be permitted.

The restrictions on travelling to the Sister Islands will remain in force.

## JULY 19th to AUGUST 22nd

From July 19th through to August 2nd the plan calls for nightclubs to reopen, dancing and karaoke at bars and restaurants will be allowed, contact sports can be played again, and restrictions on pleasure boat activity will be lifted with access allowed to Stingray City, Starfish Point and Rum Point and sandbar. 🌐

# WORKING FROM HOME WORKS FOR GOVERNMENT

And rather than the private sector, it seems like its government services which are taking the lead on this.

Hon. Deputy Governor Franz Manderson sees a silver lining in the 'working-from-home' experience that civil servants have had to adapt to.

Utilising modern remote-working technology, increasingly a feature in the modern business environment, Mr Manderson said the experience has opened up many possibilities that the civil service will benefit from.

Already, basic remote working capabilities are standard features such as access emails and remote online meetings.

Government departments have resorted to the technological possibilities with apps for meetings of the Legislative Assembly, homeschooling, meeting government payment obligations and other vital services.

## SILVER LINING

"There's always a silver lining in a crisis like this," the Deputy Governor who heads the civil service said.

"We have learnt so much about what we can do at home. Some of the transitions have been seamless," he said, giving as an example: "I have a PA who has been at home throughout this pandemic but I have had all of my meetings arranged, all of my emails answered, everything that I would have asked to do in the office has been done from home. The only thing I really had to do was go to the photocopier machine and get my papers."

The Deputy Governor marvelled at the possibilities the technology offers: "I never would have believed that that was possible, not having someone sitting next to me dealing with all of the issues that I deal with on a daily basis."

He listed work permits, naturalisation, planning applications and other documents all being processed by civil servants working from home.

"I've been swearing in new citizens by zoom. None of those things we would have thought was possible a few months ago."

Mr Manderson is of the view that "this has fundamentally changed the way in which we will operate as a civil service, and it will make us much better."

With the pending Level 2 reopening phase expected to start on June 23rd, some civil servants will continue to work from home in the interim as government offices gradually reopen.

Mr Manderson said consideration is also being given to the child care requirements of staff with children at home.

However, he stated that the civil service will be fully prepared to immedi-

ately respond to provide 100 per cent service when the next phase opens.

With safe-distancing one of the key concerns in the workplace, the Deputy Governor explained that "while everyone is keen to work again with their colleagues and be in the office, we - and they - understand that the safety of our staff and customers must be paramount."

In this regard, he said the plans call for a phased reopening of government offices with civil servants available "to provide 100 per cent of our services but that doesn't mean that we'll have 100 per cent of our staff at any government office."

Duties that staff can carry out working from home will continue in that vein while those required to be in the office will be provided with PPE (personal protective equipment) and hand sanitisers, along with safe distancing arrangements and other COVID-19 safety protocols.

Government offices have also been rearranged to allow for a safe working environment.

## CHARITABLE SERVICE

Meanwhile, Mr Manderson has announced the launch of a new charitable drive by civil servants to assist persons whose circumstances have been worsened due to the COVID-19 crisis.

He said many civil servants have reached out to ask how they can give back to the community.

"Over the last few weeks I've had too many civil servants reach out to me and state their appreciation for having a job and that their salaries have remained intact. But, they care and they wanted to know how they could give back to the community."

He said after further discussing the idea it was determined that the support from the civil servants would be channelled through the National Assistance Unit (NAU).

The number of persons seeking assistance from the NAU has increased considerably due to loss of jobs and additional strain on family and personal finances the pandemic has caused in Cayman.

As a result, a scheme is being launched in which civil servants can make voluntary donations to the CIG Cares Community Support Programme, which will be deducted from their salaries.

All proceeds will go towards helping the most vulnerable in our community.

Commenting on the scheme, His Excellency Governor Martyn Roper, said it will give them the opportunity to support vulnerable communities by donating either a regular sum every month or a one-off donation from their pay packet

to support Cayman's vulnerable communities.

He said it was "a great idea and wholly in keeping with the civil service mission to make the lives of those we serve better."

NAU is supporting 3000 Caymanian families and gets around 60 new requests for assistance every day.

It provides meal and grocery vouchers, Meals-on-Wheels services and burial cost assistance. 🌐

# KEEPING OUR CHILDREN CONNECTED TO EDUCATION

What started out as an opportunity to serve disenfranchised families at their almamater, George Town Primary School has transitioned into a mission to keep our children connected to their Education.

Michal Myles and Alric Lindsay have developed a partnership that is far reaching and rooted in serving their communities. Over the past two months, Mr. Myles and Lindsay has personally raised and donated well over CI\$30,000 in laptops, personal protective equipment (including face masks and hand sanitizers), food supplies, scholarships for TVET training and the Financial Peace University money management course.

On Saturday, June 6, they donated another 3 computers to families who have struggled to keep their children connected to their curriculum.

Mr. Myles stated "Why are we not more committed to ensuring that every child owns a laptop computer and con-

nected to the internet? The country was reportedly committed to spending CI\$2,000,000 on the redevelopment of Smith Barcadere and to participating in a financing deal in the region of CI\$300,000,000 on a cruise berthing facility that would have served to benefit mainly mega cruise ship CEOs and their financial bottom lines, however we still have children that are doing their schoolwork off their parent's cell-phones. Why have we not committed this type of financing and expenditure to ensure that every child in the Cayman Islands is connected to the internet and has a laptop?

Mr. Lindsay stated that "policy makers do a good job of making bullet points and jotting down notes about things that need to be done to make our communities better. But when the time comes for implementation or taking action, our representatives support deals that only benefit a small group of people or corporations who become wealthier



and wealthier each four-year period that our representatives serve in the legislative assembly. In contrast, the less

fortunate communities and lower income groups live their daily lives facing adversities and are forced to accept \$50 food vouchers and \$10 gift certificates to make ends meet. Starting with our children, we must take steps to develop wealth for the masses and not just a few privileged people".

The mission for the two men over the next six months is to raise funds to purchase another 20 laptops computers for 20 students; expand the money management course Financial Peace University to another 30 Caymanians who want to learn how to budget, dump debt, save and live debt free. Currently, the course has 30 persons participating and establish TVET training for another 20 Caymanians at the Inspire Cayman Training Center. 🌐



# MINISTRY OF EDUCATION RESPONDS TO OES REPORT

The Ministry of Education has defended the systems it has put in place to support online learning and homeschooling during the COVID-19 crisis, as well its preparations for when schools reopen - possibly in September.

A report by the Office for Education Standards(OES) had made a series of recommendations for the Ministry and the Department for Education Services(DES) following a review of the arrangements currently in place.

The OES report concluded that "although everyone involved in delivering home learning deserves recognition for the continuation of educational provision, a key finding is that home learning currently serves as an imperfect substitute to school-based provision."

In its response, the Ministry of Education says many of the recommendations put forward by the OES are in fact already in place or planned.

## LEARNING ABOUT LEARNING ONLINE

In its review of the current online learning environment, the OES notes the need for "a comprehensive educational digital strategy for home and school learning."

However, the Ministry has highlighted inadequate internet access as a major setback.

It said: "Many families did not have internet access or had a slower connection due to the number of persons in the household requiring internet access for work or school. Several families did not have a digital device or that the devices had to be shared between multiple members of the family."

Based on this information, the decision was taken to continue with paper/activity-based resources as well as on-line resources.

The Ministry also says a switch to solely online provision would have severely disadvantaged students, especially those from more vulnerable circumstances.

The OES had recommended that all upper primary and secondary students should have regular access to an appropriate, designated 'Bring Your Own' device to support their school-based and home learning.

In response, the Ministry says it and the Department for Education Services(DES) are already in contact with various internet providers to help to increase online access.

In addition to the over 500 laptops or digital devices that have been sourced for students during the pandemic, Ministry officials say they are seeking Cabinet approval for additional funding to provide each student with a gadget.

## TACKLING THE TECHNOLOGY

The OES said all government schools should be equipped with the appropriate technology ensuring equality of opportunity for all students.

The Ministry responds by stating that "while it has no control/authority over internet access in homes, its teams have worked with internet providers to increase access to students and staff."

"It should also be noted," it adds, "that attempting to set up internet access in persons' homes during the pandemic and stay-at-home order would have put families and private sector personnel at risk."

Another suggestion put forward by the OES is for "all school leaders should agree to minimum expectations in terms of online, face-to-face teaching at different stages of education and monitor implementation on a regular basis."

But the Ministry says: "Minimum expectations were set for all learning (digital or paper/activity-based) and that it, the DES and Schools were also aware that expectations for students went far beyond teaching and learning."

"Setting standards and expectations had to be balanced with principals' knowledge of the hardships being experienced by students, families, and staff as a result of the pandemic," it added.

On another aspect of the OES report deals with ongoing professional development for teachers on the relevant technologies.

On that, the Ministry said "system-wide professional development proved difficult due to the over 700 educators that would have required such training amid the pandemic."

It said schools provided support to teachers as-needed and regularly assessed training needs.

## COPING WITH THE CHALLENGES

The Ministry of Education says the COVID-19 crisis has thrown up challenges which have severely impacted on the learning process.

"This pandemic, and its multiple effects on the health, income and well-being of



individuals and communities, put a strain on the psychological reserves of all, including students and parents/guardians.

"It should be noted," it adds, "that the number of students requiring free school meals increased throughout the pandemic as some parents/guardians were newly unemployed or struggling, for other reasons, to provide nutritious meals for their families."

The Ministry said "the education system provided: access to counsellors, educational psychologists, special-needs teachers/specialists, or other personnel for students with physical and mental/emotional needs, as well providing meals for approximately 600 students each day."

In partnership with the Department of Children and Family Services, charities and the private sector 3000 care packets and other supplies to students and families," it stated.

## LOOKING AHEAD

Where the OES recommends that at the start of the next academic year, there should be assessment arrangements to determine the students' skills, knowledge and gaps in learning, the Ministry says "this is already in place."

Also already in place the ministry says, are 'catch-up' plans for 2020-21 and 2021-22" which has also been advised by the OES.

Where the OES proposes "lengthening the next two academic years, if possible, may be a necessary consideration", the Ministry points out that "this is already in place."

Furthermore, it says, it's focusing "special attention on students who will

sit exams at the end of the 2020-2021 academic year to ensure they have the best chance of success."

The OES recommendation that "a cross-agency, multi-disciplinary partnerships should be strengthened", gets a similar response with the ministry saying: "This is already in place. Several new partnerships have developed in responding to students' needs throughout the pandemic."

Another suggestion calls for "appropriate modifications to existing school premises in advance of the students' return to school". The OES lists multiple hand-sanitising stations, signage and "a heightened regard for supervision at break and lunchtimes".

But according to the Ministry: "This is already planned", adding that it has developed a 'Guidance for the Reopening of Schools and Early Childhood Care and Education Centres'.

This covers safety protocols, breaks, physical distancing, pick up and drop off protocols and protocols for buses.

## DOING BETTER COMPARED TO ENGLAND

On another point of the online remote and home-working system during the pandemic, the Ministry of Education says Cayman compares favourably with England.

It points to government schools here reporting on average student engagement percentage of 90+% (over a number of weeks), while England reported less than 40% of students engaged in online learning during the first few weeks of the pandemic. 🌐

# The Teacher: The Central Force in the Education System

*'Just as a well-trained mind is a country's most important resource, a competent teacher, motivated and empowered, is invaluable for national progress.'* Livingston Smith

It is now well-established that the shift to a knowledge economy that is being experienced in the most progressive centres of the world, has brought unparalleled attention to the quality of education systems. As James Stronge in his book **Quality of Effective Teachers (2018)** points out, 'Within this continuing shift to a 21st century knowledge economy, a primary factor shaping the workers of the new economy is education quality. Indeed, we must understand that the nations with the best schools, and the schools with the best teachers and leaders, will own the future.'

Many factors make for student success in our schools. These include such critical ones as teacher and parent relationship, the extent of parental involvement and interest in the education of their children and the extent to which discipline, persistence and fortitude are nurtured and encouraged at both the home and the school, both reinforcing each other. Also important are the availability of critical resources, the quality of leadership in the school as well as its physical environment.

However, the body of research in the area is emphatic in identifying the teacher as the most important in-school factor impacting student success. A motivated and competent educator, with the appropriate autonomy and accountability, is the central force deciding the quality of education that is delivered. Just as a well-trained mind is a country's most important resource, a competent teacher, motivated and empowered, is invaluable for national progress. Not only must the teaching profession be valued, but continuous investment in the teacher and teacher quality, is a pre-requisite for a society to experience and benefit from the transformative power of education.

This is especially so in the Covid-19 crisis and the reliance on the online format in the delivery of education. Those who teach must be constantly reminded that what they do is priceless and the better they do it, even more so.

To quote further from Stronge's book, 'Teachers have a powerful, long-lasting

influence on their students. They directly affect how students learn, what they learn, how much they learn, and the ways in which they interact with one another and the world around them.'

'Teachers must prepare all students to meet world-class standards, diminish achievement gaps and social inequality, and serve as the linchpin for educational reforms (Cochran-Smith & Villegas, 2015). All of these factors, along with many others, place a renewed premium on our populating every classroom with the best teachers possible.'

A speech given recently by Mrs. Felicia Robinson, Director of the University College's Social Work Programmes, to the volunteer teachers of the CXC Education Volunteer Programme, places in sharp focus the importance of teachers, at whatever level, and the crucial nature of the educational enterprise.

What follows is taken verbatim from this excellent speech.

'In the capacity as educators you are enriching not just the individual but also indirectly touching and reshaping your community. Through education, you are empowering and propelling students into new heights. Your work with the students enables them to create a new narrative; to vision and reach forward into new possibilities. It creates room for them to sit at tables where a seat is guaranteed based on academic or professional achievement only. Education opens doors for them to imagine, to tell and rewrite their story, to set goals for new successes, to meet social expectations, to practice reasoning skills, to think logically, listen carefully and expand their participation in society. All of this is what your giving facilitates. It helps the student to step into pathways that will lead towards improved social status and life circumstances.'

'The aim of an educator is not to clone or reproduce him or herself. Rather, it is to challenge and inspire the student to become their best. The mentoring and teaching of students is intended to support their individual and collective successes. This is the responsibility that you undertake when you sign on to give and invest in the education of others.'


'I see education is an extraordinary gift that brings limitless possibilities for personal and professional success. As a three-times graduate of the University of the West Indies and graduate from

two other Universities in the United Kingdom, I am very much aware of the power and value of an education. Education helps us to advance but education also humbles us. It is true that the more we learn, the more we recognize that there is so much more that we do not know.'

'Let us be grateful for the privilege of access to a quality education. When I pause and reflect upon the breadth of opportunities that are available to educated individuals, I conclude gracefully that we all have a moral imperative to teach and bring others along with us into the knowledge world. The truth is the exact outcomes of what our students will become are often unknown to us at the beginning of their education journey. This uncertainty of outcome should never be a discouraging factor. It is because of our education that we can believe and hope that many others will be socially transformed.'

'Today, education is still counted as a powerful vehicle for social justice. However, I caution that education alone will not put all wrongs right. While it will not substitute for integrity or character, education can position the individual into the space where he or she can contribute to the process of redress, redirect trajectories and make changes. Someone has aptly described education as the great leveler of social class and inequalities. This truth is very evident throughout our Caribbean societies. It is because of educational achievements that many of us here have experienced improvements in our family and personal economic circumstances. Without any doubt, our education has impacted the quality and definition our social status and our family life.'

'Education also has the potential to bring changes into our employment settings and to engineer the transformation of the moral, socio-cultural, political and economic aspects of our communities. When we participate in the creating of a more highly educated population, we do so with the hope that our investment will contribute to the formation of a community of thinkers, dynamic, knowledgeable, and ethical leaders. As educators is a moral imperative for us to be involved in the teaching and championing of transparency, honesty, and accountability in public life and in influencing the definition and

adoption of good governance models in our societies.

'Education is not a passive engagement. Arguably, education has always had at its core a reforming agenda. As educators we are involved in what could be described as a political process of teaching, influencing, and changing minds. As educators, we facilitate access to knowledge and information. We promote a voice when encourage individuals to speak up (opinion) and to engage in debating matters important to them. As teachers, we can shape the context of the social, political, and economic discourse. We can influence the voice, tone, the volume, and tenacity with which the community speak on issues. By encouraging careful thought, respectful debate, and exchange of ideas we instill in our students an appreciation of not simply rights but also their responsibilities. As educators, we are also involved in developing informed advocates who will challenge and seek to correct social injustice.'

'I would like to suggest these are some of reasons why we choose to engage in the transfer of knowledge and in supporting the education of others. As educators we are simply opening a pathway for persons to enter and experience knowledge, greater freedom, and self-actualization.'





# Governor's Updates

• **Huge thanks to Angela and her team at HSA** - I want to send my huge thanks to Angela at the HAS lab and her team. When we look back at this time in the future, I think testing will be one of the outstanding successes of our response. Angela and her team, with Doctors Hospital and Health City, have played a crucial part. I believe we are on track to significantly ease the remaining restrictions from 21st June. We will give more information in due course. In meantime we must not let down our guard – we must keep doing social distancing, basic hygiene and wearing masks.

• **New initiative - CIG Cares Community Support** - The DG and his senior leadership team are launching a new initiative next week: CIG Cares Community Support. This will give civil servants the opportunity to support vulnerable communities by donating either a regular sum every month or a one-off donation from their pay packet to support Cayman's vulnerable communities. The NAU is supporting 3000 Caymanian families and getting 60 new requests for assistance every day and provides meal and grocery vouchers, meals on wheels services and burial cost assistance. So if you're a civil servant and want to contribute look out for more information next week. A great idea and wholly in keeping with the civil service mission to make the lives of those we serve better.

• **Students returning to school overseas** - Planning is in the very early stages for students who need to return to the UK for school/university. At the moment, we are thinking of two flights, one towards the end of July and another later in August but we will provide more information very soon.

For those who go to school or university in the US or Canada, the process will be handled by the Ministry of Employment/Border Control and CBC. But wherever your destination please do ensure you are registered on the travel website: [www.explore.gov.ky/travel](http://www.explore.gov.ky/travel)

• **Recruitment for CI Regiment** - I am pleased to report we have had over 200 applications to join the Cayman Islands Regiment and as the Premier and I have said we are keen for this to be predominantly Caymanian. It's my belief we are building something for Cayman to be proud of. We're looking to have about 60 people in place by the end of August ready to assist before the peak of the hurricane season arrives because disaster management and preparedness will be their key role. The direction it takes after that will be for us to decide but we need to get it started. The UK is funding equipment including uniforms and will be sending a small training team to Cayman in July to provide the reservists with their initial training course. If you would like to apply please go to <https://www.explore.gov.ky/ciregiment> and click on apply to join. Deadline is 21 June.

• **National Emergency Operations Committee** - I spoke via Zoom to members of our National Emergency Operations Committee (NEOC) who had a virtual cake to mark 100 days of work on the Covid crisis. They have played a pivotal and successful role in many areas - managing isolation facilities, establishing the field hospital and testing capacity/PPE - to name a few. NEOC has shown working from home can work and bring benefits. Always lessons to learn in any crisis but NEOC has stepped up impressively to support our community.

• **BA airbridge flight in complex logistical operation** - In a hugely complex logistical operation led by my office, over 300 people from 4 nations in the #Caribbean returned home this week on a BA airbridge flight chartered by the Cayman Islands Government and today almost 300 people from 35 nationalities will be travelling back to the UK to connect to their homes in places like New Zealand, Montenegro, Switzerland

and South Africa. A resounding thank you to all those involved

• **Queen's Birthday treats delivered** - Last Monday, we celebrated Her Majesty, The Queen's 94th birthday. The Deputy Governor and I delivered Queen's Birthday treats (vegetable patties, banana cake and mango slice from GH garden) to some of our front-line staff in RCIPS, Fire Service and 911. Boxes were also delivered to prison staff and emergency services on Cayman Brac and Little Cayman. I am sorry we couldn't get round to see everyone!

• **Evacuation flight to India** - I am pleased to announce a breakthrough in negotiations to arrange an evacuation flight to India in the first week of July. There may also be a second if demand is there. I know this is a difficult time for many in the Indian community. We will announce details of dates and how to book soon. 🌐

# COVID PUTS A DAMPER ON CRIME

The COVID pandemic has had a direct impact on the volumes and types of criminality on the Cayman Islands reports the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service.

According to the RCIPS, crime overall fell by over 30% during the period of the lockdown between March 23rd and May 31st.

Although many of the restrictions have been lifted, the lockdown is still in force.

In an Interim Crime Report on COVID-19 Crime Impact, it notes that in the first three months of 2020 there were substantial increases in total recorded crime compared to the same period for 2019.

However, the RCIPS reports, "since COVID restrictions were introduced total recorded crime has reduced by a nearly a third."

In its analysis of this trend, the RCIPS says, "It is inferred that without the unique conditions associated with COVID, overall crime would have increased to date in 2020 compared to 2019."

"Due to the restrictions as part of the response to COVID, the opportunities for offenders to commit crime have been reduced," it concludes.

A closer look at the crime statistics shows that between the January 1st and the end of May this year there were 1588 crimes recorded in the Cayman Islands, a reduction of 214 or just under 12% compared to the same period in 2019.

In the period before the lockdown was triggered by the COVID-19 pandemic (1st January 2020 - 22nd March 2020) there were 986 crimes recorded in the Cayman Islands.


That was an increase of 128 or 14.5% compared to the same period last year.

From March 23rd when the lockdown came into force 2020 through to May 31st, 602 crimes were recorded, a reduction of 290 or around 31% compared to the same period in 2019.

The RCIPS says calls specifically related to crime, for example theft, have reduced substantially.

Due to the COVID crisis, it had started recording calls specifically related to the crisis.

On the other hand, there has been a substantial increase in the number of



incidents/calls for service related to public/environment issues.

The report explains that many of the calls were due to people being confined to their homes for long periods and were very sensitive to activity in and around their property.

It said people would call the police when they are unable to obtain services to resolve concerns, for example a bees nest or rubble on the road.

The RCIPS says approximately 10% of calls so far this year have been recorded as crimes.

### Violence against the Person

Between January 1st and May this year, the RCIPS says there were 376 crimes of violence recorded, compared to 400 for the same period in 2019. This equates to a reduction of 24 (-6%).

Before lockdown (January 1st to March 22nd): 226 crimes of violence were recorded, compared to 208 for the same period in 2019; an increase of 18 in total or +8%.

During lockdown (March 23rd to May 31st): 143 crimes of violence recorded, compared to 192 for the same period in 2019; a reduction of 42 or -22%.

The key findings show that in the first 3 months of 2020 violence against

the person was increasing but for the COVID restrictions it has reduced by 27.2% compared to the same period for 2019.

### Sexual Crimes

From January 1st to May this year there were 34 sexual crimes recorded, compared to 39 for the same period in 2019, a reduction of 5 or -13%.

Before lockdown (January 1st to March 22nd): There were 22 sexual crimes recorded, compared to 23 for the same period in 2019. This equates to a reduction of 1 (-4%).

During lockdown (March 23rd to May 31st): 12 sexual crimes recorded, compared to 16 for the same period in 2019. This equates to a reduction of 4 (-25%).

This shows that the volume of sexual crimes has reduced in 2020 compared to the same period for 2019. COVID restrictions have had a noticeable impact on the volume of sexual crimes.

### Firearms

Between January 1st and May this year, there were 6 firearms crimes recorded, compared to 10 for the same period in 2019, a reduction of 4 or -40%.

Before lockdown (January 1st to March 22nd): There were 4 firearm crimes recorded, compared to 4 for the same period in 2019, the same as the previous year.

During lockdown (March 23rd to May 31st): Two firearms crimes recorded, compared to 6 for the same period in 2019, a reduction of 4 (-67%).

The RCIPS says the volume of firearms crimes has reduced consistently since the start of 2020, including the period of COVID restrictions.

### Drugs

Drug crimes were increasing substantially at the start of the year but over the COVID period have then noticeably reduced, the RCIPS says.

However, during the COVID period drug crimes related to consumption/possession of ganja and cocaine have reduced substantially.

It is believed that the restrictions on movement outside the home, coupled with the closure of the night-time economy have resulted in less visible signs of drug consumption.

### Acquisitive Crime (Burglary, Criminal Trespass, Robbery and Theft)

The first 3 months of this year saw levels of acquisitive crime being stable compared to the same period in 2019.

According to the police, the COVID restrictions have had a considerable impact on the volume of acquisitive crime, with volumes down by 56% compared to the same period in 2019.

It is inferred that the volume of acquisitive crimes would have remained at similar levels to 2019 had it not been for the COVID restrictions.

### Public Order

During the first 3 months of 2020 levels of public order crime increased noticeably by 17% compared to the same period for 2019.

COVID restrictions have had a minor impact on the levels of public order crime and it remains 8% higher in 2020 compared to 2019.

The RCIPS says the key areas of Public Order crime where there have been increases in 2020 are Intentional Harassment (+8), Harassment Alarm or Distress (+11) and Threat to Kill, Cause Serious Harm or Damage Property (+26).

The cause of this, the RCIPS suggests could be local disputes between neighbours exacerbated by the COVID restrictions.

At the same time, it notes that there has been a marked reduction in Drunk and Disorderly Persons offences - down by 10 - linked to the shutdown of the night-time economy over the COVID period. 📍

# Bajans want local Nelson statue down

Barbadian are calling for the removal of Horatio Nelson's controversial statue from Bridgetown's Heroes' Square. It has attracted the support of many religious leaders on the island. On Sunday another one expressed solidarity with recent anti-racism displays in Barbados.

In his return to the pulpit for the first time since March, Monsignor Vincent Blackett turned his attention to ongoing movements across the world currently demanding racial justice following the death of African American George Floyd by Minnesota Police.

Blackett drew comparisons between the death of Floyd and the crucifixion of Jesus. "Mother, mother, I cannot breathe. When I heard those words from George Floyd, I immediately thought of the crucifixion of Jesus and as Roman Catholics who have a love for Mary, it taught us something too because we call her Mother," he said.

The former Vicar General of the Roman Catholic Diocese said that had he known about Saturday's Black Lives Matter march beforehand, he may have

been marching alongside hundreds of citizens from Kensington Oval against racism and police abuse.

"We have been saying these things for the longest time and the oppression continues. So I support them, and I support the call to take down Nelson and put him in the museum," Blackett declared.

# Guyana elections results 'were fair'

The CARICOM team which scrutinised Guyana's national vote recount has confirmed that the results should be announced by the chair of the Guyana Elections Commission because they are fair and accurate. The general elections in March were so close that a recount was ordered which means David Granger, leader of the People's National Congress, remains as president.

"We are of the unshakable belief that the people of Guyana expressed their will at the ballot box and as a result, the three-person CARICOM Observer Group concludes that the recount results are completely acceptable," the report presented to GECOM and political leaders states.

It added: "The national recount process then, despite some of its minor flaws, is not an indictment of the 2020 polls and the team categorically rejects the concerted public efforts to discredit

the 2020 polls up to the disastrous Region 4 tabulation.

"Despite our concerns, nothing that we witnessed warrants a challenge to the inescapable conclusion that the recount results are acceptable and should constitute the basis of the declaration of the results of the March 02, 2020 elections. Any aggrieved political party has been afforded the right to seek redress before the courts in the form of an election petition."

# Antigua may have early elections

Antigua and Barbuda Prime Minister Gaston Browne has hinted that the general elections, constitutionally due in 2023, could be held "as early as November next year".

He was reacting to the decision by the main opposition United Progressive Party to name its first four candidates for the next election.

Predicting that his ruling Antigua and Barbuda Labour Party would im-

prove on the 15 of the 17 seats it won in the 2018 snap election, Browne said that it would sweep all the seats.

He said he was not shaken by the four candidates named so far by the UPP, describing them as a school drop-out, a non-achiever, a "bunch of losers claiming the ability to 'rescue' country".

"They are the ones to be rescued from their numerous failures."

# Skerrit: Dominica's health care improving

Dominica is seeing an entirely transformed healthcare infrastructure according to Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit.

He held an online public discussion on Sunday where he engaged with Dominicans and provided updates on the latest government activities. Skerrit announced the completion stages of the new health centres and hospitals, built with funds from the Citizenship by Investment (CBI) Programme.

After Hurricane Maria in 2017, Skerrit pledged to make Dominica "the world's first climate-resilient nation." He focused on the long-term plan to "build back better." Part of this is the Housing Revolution, a transformative project aiming to build around 5,000 new hurricane-proof homes, 14 polyclinics, new hospitals and many other community facilities. The PM says that the government is using CBI proceeds to transform its health sector entirely within five

years, enhance the quality and the delivery of care and build for up to 70 years ahead.

"I think in the next five years or so, we will have almost a completely, brand new health infrastructure, taking into consideration the impacts of natural disasters on our country and building a greater resilience, building back better so that when these hurricanes come, we'll be able to withstand the impact much better," Skerrit said.

# Jamaica's diners hope to sizzle again

Jamaica's food service industry has taken a financial hit as they faced months of operating at reduced capacity because of the impact of the lockdown. But as the economy gradually reopens, local restaurant operators are confident in re-attracting their customers.

Restaurant and entertainment lounge 100 Hope Road have reopened is currently instituting measures to ensure safety for its employees and patrons, Sudu Ramani, chief financial officer said.

"100 has always been a place of choice for customers who expect to experience great food and entertainment. A lot of restructuring to our business process is being implemented in keeping with our reputation for delivering what we promise. We have a reputation to maintain, and all is being done to ensure our brand value is not diluted but enhanced," Ramani said.

He added that while the restaurant operated with a skeletal staff because of the drastic 95 percent reduction in business, it has now implemented "an aggressive social media campaign to

promote several new events that are being planned".

George Makhoul, manager of Sizzlin' Grill, which is located at the Sovereign Centre's food court in Kingston, indicated similar marketing strategies.

"We are pushing more content on our social media accounts, but now that the curfew isn't so strict, we're trying to convince people that it's safe to come in," he said.

Managing director of Pizza Please, Pietro Giuliani said: "It was, and still is, a bit desolate to have our tables and chairs put aside and unavailable. We are surely looking forward to the laughter and company of our dine-in customers again."

# Jamaican woman is new finance chief

The International Finance Corporation has made Judith Green the regional manager for the Caribbean, overseeing operations in the Dominican Republic, Haiti, and the English-speaking Caribbean.

The Washington-based financial institution, which is a member of the World Bank Group, said that Green will be based in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, IFC's hub for the Caribbean.

"IFC's role in the Caribbean is important now more than ever and I look forward to working with our long-term partners and forging new relationships to support the development of the region," Green said, adding that she aims to "lead IFC's operations to provide private sector investments that drive sustainable growth, as well as leveraging our advisory services to improve the investment climate and support regional governments capital expenditure programs through the successful structuring of public-private partnerships".

Green will also manage IFC's relationships with regional governments, donors and private sector stakehold-

# Trinidad is willing to stage cricket show

The Trinidad & Tobago government is prepared to host the 2020 edition of the Caribbean Premier League this summer because the effect of COVID-19 has made it impractical to stage in various countries as normal. image of defending CPL champions Barbados Tridents. Sharnita Cudjoe, the Minister for Sports and Youth Affairs, has, however, stressed that the final decision is subject to permission from the health ministry and the CPL committing to sticking to guidelines.

"But we are open to hosting, and as long as our virus numbers remain low, and we can establish the right health protocols and guidelines, and get the commitment from CPL to abide and adhere to those guidelines, then we are very much, very, very much open to hosting the CPL at this point in time," he said.

CPL was originally slated to take

place between 19 Aug. and 26 Sept. across six venues. The organisers of CPL have submitted a proposal to the Prime Minister of Trinidad and Tobago Keith Rowley to stage the league in the country.

As part of the proposal, CPL has said it would want to host the entire tournament of 34 matches at Trinidad's two main stadiums, the Queen's Park Oval and the Brian Lara Academy.

CPL signed a three-year contract with the Trinidad & Tobago government to host the semi-finals and finals in addition to home matches of the local team, the Trinbago Knight Riders in 2018.

Last year, Trinidad played host to eight matches including the knock-outs and two T10 women's exhibition matches. The Trinidad and Tobago government is meant to pay \$1 million to CPL to facilitate the matches in the country.

# Tyson's comeback is just for money

Mike Tyson has not confirmed the date of his comeback fight but there is a lot of speculation about who it will be. The latest, most improbable is WBC champion and namesake Tyson Fury.

Frank Warren, Fury's promoter, has confirmed his fighter has received an offer to face Tyson in the ring, but reiterated he is against the idea of 'Iron Mike' fighting again.

The 53-year-old American has teased the prospect of a comeback for months and Fury added significant fuel to the rumours when he revealed he said yes to an offer to take on his idol in a charity fight.

Warren, who co-promotes Fury with Top Rank boss Bob Arum, insisted he will not be involved in any promotion of a clash between Fury and Tyson.

Iron Mike turns 54 at the end of this month and his last appearance in the ring was in 2005, losing to Kevin McBride. Warren worked with Tyson during his career and since he's retired and is worried about how any return for the American would reflect on box-

ing. "Mike is old. He's not any better than when Danny Williams and Kevin McBride beat him," Warren said. "I'm totally against it all to be honest. Fury is considered the best heavyweight in the world Mike fighting anyone is wrong."

Veteran Tyson is accused of wanting to cash in on his name and infamy after. He has finally got out of debt after blowing a \$350 million fortune from his heyday and sees reviving his boxing career as a great option to add to his burgeoning coffers.

With a successful podcast, marijuana ranch and even Hollywood film cameos he is flush again. But gone are the days of the sort of outlandish lavish spending that saw him blow fortune and file for bankruptcy in 2003.

In fact, the Baddest Man on the Planet is even rich again having recovered from eye-watering debt of around \$18m at one point.

But how did he manage to blow that fortune in the first place? And how has he managed to rebuild his wealth?

At his Nineties peak, Tyson was glob-

ally famous, having conquered the heavyweight division.

And he certainly enjoyed the spoils of his success, throwing lavish parties and revelling in the taste of glory.

These bashes included his thirtieth birthday party, attended by a star-studded 700-strong guest list including future president Donald Trump - with the night setting him back an eye-watering \$320,000.

He also built quite the car collection, including a rare Lamborghini LM002, a Cadillac Escalade and Hummer H2 and Bentley Continental SC. There were many Overall, Tyson spent more than \$5m on his luxury car collection plus what he bought as presents.


In addition to his wheels, Iron Mike collated an even more impressive collection of mansions. These included a giant estate in Connecticut that he bought for \$2.3m, spent millions on remodelling and 18 months later unsuccessfully tried to flog for \$17.5m.

The property included 24 bathrooms, a four-storey elevator, swimming pool, cinema room, disco and NBA standard outdoor basketball court. He also bought a \$1.9m mansion in Nevada, and a similarly heftily priced pad in Los Angeles.

Tyson treated ex-wife Robin Givens to a ridiculous \$1.75m solid gold bathtub, enabling her to relax in style as well as millions he lavished her from the divorce.

Another big drain on his resources are his eight children by various partners and his generosity to them and friends. When Tyson was rich, he used to walk around with \$100 bills and handed them out like candy. He once banked a \$10m cheque but has no idea if that money went into his account.

Tyson also loved his jewellery and was the proud owner of a stunning \$635,000 Piaget watch. He spent millions on other pieces for himself and those close to



► Mike Tyson turns 54 soon but is making a comeback


him. He pleaded guilty to charges of cocaine possession and driving under influence after his retirement, serving 24 hours in jail and being made to take part in community service upon his release.

But since then, things have looked up for Iron Mike. He properly launched his career on screen by playing an altered version of himself in the hit American comedy *The Hangover*. And he has since appeared in other screen roles including *Ip man 3* - and even a 2015 Madonna track. He gets paid millions just for appearing at events in the Middle East funded by billionaire Arab princes.

Tyson has also launched his successful podcast, *Hotboxin*, as well as collaborating with Spike Lee on a touring one-man show.

Alongside business partner Alki David, he has started a cannabis empire that earns \$500,000-a-month - with plans for a 418-acre weed resort reportedly in the works.

Tyson has now cleared his debts and has a net worth of at least \$10m.




► Evander Holyfield, 57, is Tyson's most likely opponent

## Jamaican Bailey is \$40m Man Utd target

Manchester United are weighing up a move for Jamaican international Leon Bailey amid concerns Jadon Sancho will remain at Borussia Dortmund for another season.

Ole Gunnar Solskjaer had identified the England international as his No.1 transfer priority this summer, but the Bundesliga club are refusing to budge on the asking price and will not allow their prize asset to leave for anything less than \$100 million.

United's executive vice-chairman, Ed Woodward, warned last month that his own club would have to be frugal in the market given the financial ramifications of the coronavirus pandemic.

And with the likes of Liverpool still actively perusing a move for Sancho, United are unwilling to become embroiled in a bidding war and are beginning to look at alternative targets.

Bailey was heavily linked with a move to the Premier League two years ago, but his career has stunted at Bayer Leverkusen, with a series of niggling injuries curtailing his progress.

Bailey, 22, is valued at around \$40m and offers the sort of pace and versatility Solskjaer is looking for to bolster a forward line that already boasts the talents of Marcus Rashford, Anthony Martial and Mason Greenwood.

Bailey's fitness record may represent a concern to Solskjaer given he has made just nine league starts this season, but the left-footed winger has still scored five goals and register two assists.

## Lowry is new Raptors kingpin

The Toronto Raptors won their first NBA title a year ago and although Kawhi Leonard was the MVP in their successful campaign, Kyle Lowry was almost as invaluable.

Leonard was the Finals MVP and he plays for the Los Angeles Clippers now. Lowry is being hailed as the new Raptors talisman. "He knows everything that is going on around him. Every single thing," is Raptors president Masai Ujiri's scouting report on his longest-serving player. "And he just handles himself really, really well."

"Kyle's arguably the best Raptor ever," Ujiri added. "When you think of what Kyle has done, his growth is remarkable. There's something about that guy, honestly, and if it wasn't for that I would have traded his butt, I'm telling you. Because there's something about him that's all competition, that's all winning."

Lowry is the franchise leader in assists and steals—only DeMar DeRo-

zan and Chris Bosh have scored more points. He has made six All-Star appearances, the most by a Raptor. All his other stats are up there with the league's best.

When looking at playoff history, Lowry leads the franchise in total points, assists, steals, and three-pointers. He's second in rebounds behind Jonas Valanciunas. To top it all off, the 34-year-old point guard owns a championship ring.

## Windies still hurt by Archer snub

The West Indies are in England for three Tests starting next month and the player they will be most wary of is the Barbados born Jofra Archer.

The first Test is at the Ageas Bowl, Southampton from July 8-12 July and there will be "no friendships" between the West Indies players and England's fast bowler Archer said Kemar Roach.

Archer, 25, played three times for West Indies Under-19s before opting for England. He played against West Indies at the 2019 World Cup but this summer's series, starting on 8 July, would be the first time he had faced them Tests.

"It is all about winning and playing hard cricket," fellow Bajan Roach said. "Jofra has made his decision and is doing a fantastic job for his career. There are no friendships with this series."

Archer has friends in the West Indies' 30-man touring party, notably batsman Shai Hope and bowler Chemar Holder,

and played alongside bowlers Alzarri Joseph and Preston McSween for West Indies Under-19s.

Asked whether there would be extra words for Archer on the field during the Test series, Roach said: "We will see when that comes around. We will definitely see."

The three-match series will be played at bio-secure venues in Southampton and Manchester without spectators, something Roach said could help West Indies as the hosts will be without their usual vocal support.

Roach expects the tourists to employ the same aggressive, hostile bowling methods used when his side beat England 2-1 in the Caribbean last year.

"I don't think our mode of attack will change much," he said. "We saw [England's batsmen] in the Caribbean and it is pretty fresh in our minds. Once we get stuck into them, we stand a great chance of beating England."


