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

CCG WANTS SCENIC SITES PROTECTED



The Concerned Citizens Group (CCG) is calling on the government to "implement scenic protection legislation to protect the unique views from pressure of development."

The CCG argues that scenic beachside views are being destroyed due to the rapid pace of development in the territory.

PSA: COVID-19 testing appointments required for travelers to Sister Islands

Persons wishing to travel to the Sister Islands from Grand Cayman can fill out **form** by link <https://bit.ly/3fd2G8S> and email sisterislandstravel@hsa.ky at least 3 business days prior to travel to schedule your COVID-19 test.


Government regulations state that individuals traveling to the Sister Islands require a negative COVID-19 result 48 hours prior to travel.

How to book your COVID-19 test for Sister Island travel:

1. **3 business days or more prior to travel** – Visit the HSA.ky website to fill out the appointment request form <https://bit.ly/3fd2G8S>. This form will ask for your travel dates, full name (as per government issued ID), date of birth and contact number.

2. **2 business days prior to travel** – Travelers will be tested for COVID-19. Testing will take place Monday – Saturday from 7:30am – 9:00am at the COVID-19 Testing Clinic at the George Town General Practice Clinic. Testing will be by **appointment only**.

3. **Day prior to travel** - HSA will email test results to traveler and Government's TravelTime.



Public Health recommends self-isolation once tested until time of travel. Traveler is to drive directly from home to the airport.

If you are traveling on a Monday or weekend, please ensure you have scheduled your test with enough time to be resulted prior to your flight. Travelers are asked to arrive for their scheduled appointment on time, in order for your test to be resulted in time for your flight.



THE NEW NORMAL - a tightrope for Cayman

The economic repercussions for the existing 'normal' on which Cayman has built a thriving society are already being felt.

VIRTUAL IS REAL

Online marketing firms are literally 'capitalising' on the boom in virtual shopping by consumers for real products, resulting in a flow of capital out of the country with local wholesalers and retailers seeing a consequential reduction in footfall and the knock-on impact on their turnover.

It's quite paradoxical also that what was intended as emergency access to pension funds seems to be triggering a wave of 'retail therapy', except that the windfall - as it's seen and is being treated by many - isn't circulating within the local economy...as was hoped.

Working from home 'out-of-country' is the new phenomenon especially for the financial sector where huge advances in fintech enables firms to dramatically cut back on their overheads for office space.

But that gain for the company is a loss for the property developer here.

Likewise, residential real estate also suffers locally as the technology-driven remote working concept means more empty properties in the local real estate portfolio.

In the UK, the government is urging people to 'go out and spend' the very generous crisis support packages it has offered to both companies and workers.

But shoppers, after an initial foray - mainly perhaps to test the outdoors after being in lockdown for nearly three months - are instead now choosing to stay indoors in their numbers...and when they go out it's less retail therapy and more prudent spending than profligacy.

The original message from the government to stay indoors on health grounds, drummed in even under the threat of criminal charges, now seems to have fallen into the category of the laws of unintended consequences to the extent that the knock-on economic effect is cause for concern.

Et tu Cayman?

IT'S THE ECONOMY (and that's not stupid)

Tourism as we knew it will take a long time to recover. Even if the borders were to open sometime between September and October it will be months before visitor numbers return to anything looking like normal.

Inward tourism or 'staycations' might very well become part of the new normal and a crucial part of the industry. That is unless the urge to venture abroad with its attendant risks proves irresistible to those in search of a respite.

Conversely, it's the same marketing strategy that Cayman would deploy for wooing visitors here as the tourism industry adapts to the new realities being flexible within strict public health boundaries.

Virtual tourism anyone? It's possible but the experience isn't quite the same.

Health tourism offers great possibilities, plus remote healthcare works

although ideally in the case of Cayman medical tourism requires having the patients here.

Virtual education has been proven even pre-COVID to work and its possibilities have been tested in Cayman's schools with some degree of success with the lockdown.

But the longer it takes to adjust to what in some instances will be 'the new normal' will only prolong the economic agony sending worrying ripples throughout the society.

As daunting as the challenges might seem though, there's hardly any alternative but to tackle them head-on.



The strategy of gradually reopening the economy in phases with a keen eye on keeping the spread of the virus under control is sensible.

Now is no time to throw caution to the wind out of sheer desperation to hastily return to a pre-COVID lifestyle. This 'new normal' will dictate how Cayman interacts with itself across all sectors of society; business, consumer and visitor.

On the other side of the coin, being excessively cautious could itself be counter-productive.

By its very nature, reopening of the Cayman Islands economy has to factor in other issues that other territories and countries might not have to face on the same scale and complexity.

The virus is still among us and until a vaccine is found - or it somehow dissipates - Cayman has no alternative but to manage it and live with it.

Subjecting the economy to further disruption is hardly an option.

STEADY AS SHE GOES

The risk of another forced lockdown rises exponentially alongside the chances of another spike. The current economic slowdown pales into insignificance when one contemplates that scenario.

A rush to reopen carries great risks both to public health and economic wealth. All that has been done could easily be undone by irrational decisions.

The message from the authorities must be clear and uncompromising. Some restrictions will no doubt be in place for the foreseeable future.

The imminent Level-1 All Clear goal might itself even be somewhat overzealous under the circumstances and in need of clarity as 'all-clear' suggests all risks have passed.

Living at the current Level 2 might itself become the norm for some time as the degree to which Cayman returns to even a 'new normal' relies on many external factors, many of which are outside our control.

The surge in coronavirus cases in Florida is an example.

Elsewhere, reports of outbreaks and second waves are forcing some countries to institute targeted regional lockdowns, a facility not available to Cayman.

In the meantime, COVID-19 seems like it will be around for some time to come, a new reality to which we'll just have get accustomed, adjusting as we go along.

A sobering thought, but sober thinking is what this situation requires.



al areas of uniform policing throughout his career.



not only for the dozen-or-so employees who have passed through the Bridge Foundation’s the 6-month programme which breaks hold of drug and alcohol dependency and provides the clients by adding a necessary “second step,” of real, meaningful employment of a real job where they can put down their own roots and grow.

Beacon Farms is really the hub of a new vision for Cayman agriculture, and by extension, for all of Cayman society. It is the spearhead of a movement to create sustainable, unique, eco-friendly products– things that speak of Cayman’s heart, and its values – by not only growing, but processing and marketing the finished product. It is a win-win, because it means all of the profit of the supply-chain goes to the farmer and into Cayman society.

After buying up the farm three years ago, Beacon Farms needed a cash-crop

to help finance the Foundation’s vital work. So they thought of growing tobacco on a small part of the farm’s 34 Acres in North Side, and then drying and processing the leaf themselves, and finally rolling it into the finest cigars, worth between 20 and 45 dollars each, at the Cayman Cigar Company site located at the Bubbles Plaza in Bodden Town. “We are hoping in 2021 we will have a cigar with 100% Cayman tobacco,” said Mr. Granger Haugh, Chairman of Beacon Farms. The Company is looking to export to all around the world, and so Beacon Farms is showing the way for other small businesses – makers of Cayman honey, juices, jams and jellies, to make their mark with a unique Cayman personality-branded product. The farm are doing the same with their on-site coconut-oil and coconut- flower processing plant, too.

Then there was a second cash-crop “We looked around and said, ‘you know, every bit of animal food used on this island is imported,’” said Mr. Haugh. That is when Beacon Farms struck on the idea of growing mangels, a fodder root crop now they have thousands of mangels growing next to their tobacco crop.

The key is working within the ecosystem, rather than trying to fight it. In nature, there is no need for fertilizers, and Beacon has taken this idea-torch and began to run with it. The farm was 34 acres of overgrown jungle when they took it over, but by hard work the Bridge Foundation crew have begun transforming it. Nothing goes

to waste, and, by using a chipper, they turned a nuisance into an asset. Now, by adding green waste to the mix, they are able to transform it within 20 days into high-grade organic humus, which fertilizes the soil naturally without destroying its life-structure. The farm has been receiving landscaping waste from the landfill in George Town, but would like to offer Eastern district landscapers the chance to drop off their waste at Beacon Farms, too. “We have a separate project on composting sargassum from the shore – off shore, sucking it out into a truck. We can load that in minutes. Compost each and we mix and match have the right mixture that will grow successfully.

The investment in Cayman’s future has been substantial. “We have about

a million dollars in equipment now 600,000 dollars of equipment on order that will be here in the First Weeks of September. That is when we are going to have an agricultural revolution here,” Mr Haugh said. We want a model of what agriculture could be on the island.” The new piece of equipment is a rock crusher; that can be attached to a slow-driving tractor, to gradually pulverize the rock into fragments that can be used to enhance the soil structure, its aeration and drainage properties that allow oxygen to get down to plant roots, and allow all those beneficial natural bacteria, insects and worms to do their work, keeping the soil healthy and aiding the turnover of nutrients. In every way, Beacon Farms is shining a light for Cayman’s way forward. 🌱

Cayman Turtle Centre bounces back as restrictions ease

Cayman Turtle Conservation and Education Centre has opened its doors to the public again, and everything is nearly back to ‘normal’ again, apart from the fact that their biggest source of revenue, tourists from other countries, is still closed off until Cayman’s borders open back up again. Oh and of course, all the ‘normal’ social distancing rules are in place, plus, at the moment, the Centre is not open on Mondays or Tuesdays.

But everyone seemed to be having fun while learning more from their encounters with regional wildlife. Kids love visiting there because they see all the animals – the huge, majestic turtles of the breeder pond, and the little turtles too, and of course the nurse sharks and fierce and grumpy-looking great big tarpon of Predator Reef. And they love hand-feeding all the charming birds of different shapes and colours and sizes of the Caribbean Free Flight Aviary too. Plus there are plenty of places to just hang out and have fun – like the Breakers Lagoon with its water slide and waterfall.

Although the park has been shut to the public all their important conservation programmes which involve captive-breeding and release, have continued just the same, and the Centre has kept schools and the general public engaged with their virtual tours. It’s been a challenge to keep people engaged, because it’s close interactions with animals that children, especially, love, such as snorkeling with friendly turtles and fishes in the safety of the Snorkeling Lagoon, which is a great place to learn how to snorkel for the first time. “We are happy that it’s opened up again,” said a mother with her children, “the children like it – they like the water slides best of all. But when it wasn’t open we did the Facebook tour, one morning, too.”

Inside the Education Centre and Hatchery, some little tiny hatchlings could be seen through the big glass window. The Hatchery was full of Styrofoam boxes containing some of Cayman’s beach sand and eggs, taken from the artificial beach area of the breeding pond, where the huge females, weighing anything from 180 to 500 pounds, lumber up onto the sand to make their nests. The Cayman beach sand is so that the turtles, who have a mysterious homing instinct that brings adult turtles back, sometimes over hundreds

of miles, to the very same beach from which they hatched.

Green sea turtles have been making a comeback in the Cayman Islands after nearly becoming extinct, and their numbers, down to just a handful a couple of decades ago, are well up into the hundreds now. Two years ago an scientific survey found out that 9 out of 10 nesting turtles are directly related to those released from the Centre in previous years, and so although such dramatic increases in population may be due to multiple factors, it seems clear that the Centre has played a major role in this success story. More and more, people can see groups of five, ten or even fifteen turtles swimming around our shores, and, coming to make their nests, too.

In the Caribbean Free Flight Aviary, the Turtle Centre has again been busy, breeding rare and endangered birds for release into the wild. Normally, Cayman Law prohibits Cayman’s national bird from being kept in captivity, but around

10 years ago the Department of Environment contacted the Centre to see if the Aviary could look after some rescue parrots that had been injured and could no longer fly. The story has a happy ending, because not only did the Aviary take care of them, but they began to breed, and now a large number of Grand Cayman Parrots have been released into the wild. The latest chapter in this success story is ‘Bluffy,’ the first-ever Cayman Brac baby parrot hatched in captivity, from a couple of rescue parrots both found on Grand Cayman.

There is much more too, to do see at the Turtle Centre, and it’s really a great family day out. And now is a good time to visit because everyone is only charged for the special “resident” rate for the whole park - C\$15 for adults and C\$10 for children from ages 3 to 12, with children under two are free. At present, the Centre is open from Wednesdays through to Sundays from 8 am to 5 pm, with the last admission at 4.30 pm. 🌱





The Health Services Authority (HSA) advises the public that its temporary Smith Road Centre Pharmacy location will be closed effective 1 August.

“The expansion of the pharmacy to the Smith Road Centre in April was a part of our COVID-19 response. We wanted to expedite pharmacy services during this challenging time for our patients, as well as provide more convenient and safer options for them,” said Chief Pharmacist Colin Medford. “By directing CINICO and private insurance members with 100% cover-

age to the Smith Road Centre we were able to better manage prescription demand and ensure the practice of social distancing.”

The closure of the temporary location is a necessary action to facilitate further development of the building space, which will be expanded to make room for the relocation of the Main Pharmacy from the Cayman Islands Hospital to the Smith Road Centre.

Persons who have already requested refills may collect them at the Smith Road Centre Pharmacy before its closure on 1 August. 📍



Macfee qualified as a Chartered Accountant with KPMG in the UK before joining KPMG in the Cayman Islands where he specialized in restructuring and liquidations under Cayman, BVI, and Hong Kong Law. He joined IMS to act as director to a portfolio of hedge and private equity fund clients.

Prior to joining IMS, Ruan Van Vuuren was a Chief Analyst in the Investments Supervision Division of the Cayman Islands Monetary Authority (CIMA) where his role included approval of fund registrations, supervision of liquidations and de-registrations, consulting on new regulatory requirements, providing guidance on industry queries to fund directors and trustees, leading risk analysis of funds and licensees, managing a team within the inspection division and managing projects to fulfill new fund requirements including the AML Officer regime. Most people told me that this allowed for greater family time, but they missed being in church. As the months passed by and things began to abate, and restrictions began to be lifted,

finally the relaxations allowed churches to resume services.

This was loudly applauded by all. Pastors ensured that all guidelines laid down by government were adhered to strictly. All things from masks, to sanitizers, the social distancing requirements and no congregating were in strict compliance. Some churches re-opened in time for Mother's Day celebrations. Others waited a little longer and re-opened in time for Father's Day celebrations.


Pastor, Dr. Gayle Woods of Spot Bay and Watering Place Churches of God Holiness said, "there was a positive and negative aspect to this. In the negative sense it led to people being distressed but on the other hand they were forced to minister outside the 4 walls of the church. Via Face Book we started having services, Sunday morning, evening and Wednesday night. People have learnt to enhance their relationship with God, during this lockdown time. We are looking forward to that time when all restrictions would be lifted and church normalcy would be returned."

Joel Scott Senior, Senior Pastor, Crossroad United Baptist Church said, "On behalf of my congregation, we complement our government for the fantastic job they have done. We could not ask for better service. They were committed to keeping the spread as minimal as possi-



ble. With God's help they have done well. We kept in touch with members through our Sunday morning audio messages, as well as, our Wednesday night Bible studies. Many of my members kept in touch via WhatsApp, and Facebook. We resumed on Father's Day and we had two morning services to facilitate the occasion. We have now resumed Morning and Night Sunday services, as well as, Wednesday night mid-week service. We will adhere to all guidelines until notified otherwise."

Most churches on the Brac have now re-opened their doors. Attendance is continuing to improve and everyone is giving thanks to the Lord for His Goodness and Mercy.

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CCG WANTS SCENIC SITES PROTECTED

reational values for the enjoyment of the present and future generations need to be preserved."

The organisation says the government has failed to "preserve the special character of the coastline views, beaches and important scenic views", adding that "now it is time for us the people to demand that this be done."

They are pressing for legislation to establish a scenic list to preserve and protect the islands scenic roads and promote tourism and economic development.

"The scenic views are sections that are free of development and need to be recognized for intrinsic qualities, cultural, historic, natural recreational and scenic. They need to be administered for example by the NRA. In so doing there must be community involvement to identify all scenic views in the Cayman Islands which would include beaches as well."

The CCG mentions scenic beach areas and service roads such as The Mary Mollie Hydes

Road - the only place now it says where you can see the entire Seven Mile Beach.

It lists other sites including Smith Barcardere, Governor's Beach, Barkers and many others which it says need that type of protection.

"The only way to permanently protect scenic views from development is to purchase parcels of lands or future easements for the benefit of the public, which must state to be held for the benefit in trust of the public. (i.e. for the people of the Cayman Islands)," the CCG says.

Pointing out that other countries such protection in place to enhance and preserve their natural resources, it argues that such regulatory guidelines or laws must be put in place for the protection of scenic areas leading to substantial benefits that will increase tourism value.

"We should not forget that these islands were known for their wonderful natural beauty and this should not be totally sacrificed for the sake of concrete buildings," the CCG concludes.



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Guyanese Politics, Oil and Sovereignty – Part One

The countries of the English-Speaking Caribbean, sometimes described as dots of sand in the Caribbean Sea, have been punching above their weight in the world. For example, these islands have so far produced three noble Laureates – Sir Arthur Lewis in Economics, the first and so far the only black person to win a Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Sciences and Sir Derek Walcott and Sir V.S. Naipaul, in literature. Reggae and Calypso are two of the regions prized cultural exports.

Geographically speaking, Guyana is in South America, but culturally, it is part of the Anglophone Caribbean. In addition to producing sugar, bauxite, rice, gold, timber, diamonds, garments, rum and pharmaceuticals, Guyana has given to the world some of the greatest sportsmen, scholars, and diplomats.

In cricket, Clive Lloyd epitomizes the classic leader, and anti-apartheid champion who led the West Indies Team when it was the very best in the world. Carl Hooper, played his cricket more delicately and with more finesse than Shakespeare wrote his plays and Shivnarine Chanderpaul, could dominate a game of cricket at will.

In scholarship, Walter Rodney stands out as one of the greatest thinkers of all times; his book - **How Europe Underdeveloped Africa**, one of the most acclaimed of the 20th century that focuses on African development and post-colonial theory. But one should not underestimate the place of other Guyanese intellectuals such as C. Y. Thomas, David Dabydeen, Russel Rickford and so on.

Sir Shridath Ramphal is the revered statesman and diplomat and the Guyanese poet Martin Carter is celebrated as one of the most important poets of the Caribbean region. Carter's poem, 'This is the Dark Time My Love' is one of the most known and celebrated. It was written when the British sent troops into the then British Guiana as it disapproved of the results of the April 27, 1953 elections, when the Peoples Progressive Party (PPP), then a coalition of the country's two main ethnic groups, won the election. The democratically elected government was removed, the constitution of Guyana suspended, and a government more to the liking of the

British was installed. Verse two of Carter's poem reads:

*'This is the dark time, my love,
It is the season of oppression, dark metal,
and tears.*

It is the festival of guns, the carnival of misery.

Everywhere the faces of men are strained and anxious.'

But as wonderful as these are, they have not been the subject that has Guyana in the news recently. It is the election that was held on March 02 and oil that began to be produced on December 20, 2019 five years after discovery in May 2015. Exxon Mobil estimates that Guyana has around eight billion barrels and expects about 750,000 daily barrels of production. As has been pointed out, this means that by 2025, should all go well, Guyana's GDP could go be so transformed as to make it potentially the richest country in the world.

Undoubtedly, this fact had bestowed added urgency and importance to this election.

The Snap general elections were held on 2 March 2020 occasioned by the one-seat majority of the government and a loss of a vote of no confidence.

The reports are that although election day and the initial count were deemed to be free, fair and credible, the process of tabulating the votes was widely seen to have been fraudulent. The final region to declare gave a significant boost to the ruling APNU-AFC alliance, allowing it to overtake the main opposition party, the People's Progressive Party (PPP/C).

Attempts to swear David A. Granger back in as president were thwarted when an injunction was granted on March 6 by the High Court to block the declaration of the overall results of the elections until the matter could be heard and determined. Granger recommended a recount, which was completed on 8 June. The recount showed that the PPP/C party won the most votes.

Since then the Partnership for National Unity (APNU) says there were too many anomalies and irregularities and wanted the quality of the votes to be a factor in the final report. An injunction handed down by the Court of Appeal held that only valid votes could be considered leading Keith Lowenfield,

the Chief Election Officer, to Invalidate some 115 000 votes making for a victory for the government. The matter has now been referred to the CCJ, Guyana's highest court. The Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) had already issued a restraining order against the Guyana Elections Commission (GECOM) prohibiting it from declaring the results.

The CCJ will shortly begin hearing arguments about whether it has jurisdiction to hear the appeal filed by Opposition Leader Bharrat Jagdeo and the party's presidential candidate, Irfaan Ali in relation to a Court of Appeal ruling.


The Economist of March 19 gives an apt summary of the nature of Guyanese politics.

'In Guyana, party divisions follow ethnic ones. Mr Granger's A Partnership for National Unity represents mainly Afro-Guyanese, who are 30% of the population. The opposition People's Progressive Party (PPP) defends principally the interests of the Indo-Guyanese, 40% of the total. The rift is made worse by an electoral system that makes members of parliament directly accountable to party leaders rather than to constituents. This poisons political debate, thwarts compromise, and undermines any sense of unified national purpose.'

Outside reactions to this unfortunate situation have been swift, many and various. CARICOM, through its current Chairperson, Mia Motley, PM of Barbados, has been vociferous in calling for the vote count preceding the invalidation to be seen as credible, giving victory to the party in opposition, the PPP. The recount, which was supervised by a high-level three-member CARICOM team, proved that the PPP won the elections by more than 15,000 votes.

Local and international observers, including the Private Sector Commission (PSC), the Organisation of American States (OAS), the Commonwealth, and others have urged acceptance of the recount results. 'This is definitely not our finest hour' Motley is reported as saying.

The US Senate Committee on Foreign Relations has called on the Guyanese government to concede defeat and to declare the winner of the elections based on the national vote recount scrutinized by CARICOM. The view of the US is sim-

ilar to those of the EU, Canada, and the Organization of American States (OAS).

There is even not so veiled talk of sectoral sanctions, the use of Guyanese gas as leverage, and the revocation of visas, as possible sanctions.

Guyana Must get it Right

Guyana, a sovereign nation since 1966, must get it right, for its people and the region.

As Sir Shridath Ramphal said recently, "The outcome of the Guyana General Election 2020 must be an example — not only in Guyana but regionally and worldwide — of the strength of law and democracy."

"As Guyanese, we owe it to ourselves, to the Caribbean Community, which we have helped to bring to life, and to the wider global community whose respect we have earned as an enlightened democratic State, not to debase ourselves by descent into the pit of lawlessness."

The current Guyanese situation is an excellent point for examining notions of sovereignty, development, ethnic politics, and the nature of the Westminster system. We pick up on these in a further article on the subject. 🌐

Guyana's Granger told to step down

The 15-member Caribbean Community is calling on embattled Guyanese President David Granger to respect a court ruling on the country's disputed March 2 presidential and regional elections that would lead to him and his governing coalition conceding power to the opposition.

Granger and his A Partnership for National Unity (APNU) coalition have refused to accept the findings of a 33-day recount led by CARICOM that found Guyana's opposition had won the vote.

Instead, they have called for the vote to be annulled, arguing there were several irregularities and anomalies in the election. The argument was also made by Guyana's chief elections officer, Keith Lowenfield, who ruled out more than 100,000 votes in a June 23 report that he said were tainted by fraud and invalid.

The positions immediately led to a court battle because, under the elections chief's decision, Granger's coalition would hold onto power with a narrow lead.

The Guyana Court of Appeal, which was asked for an injunction to stop the recount report from being presented to the Guyana Elections Commission, ruled that only valid votes should be counted.

Arguing that the Guyana Court of Appeal had no jurisdiction in the matter, the opposition People's Progressive Party/Civic (PPP/C), led by former president Bharrat Jagdeo, appealed to the Caribbean Court of Justice, which is the final court of appeal for Guyana.

The CCJ sided with the opposition and invalidated Lowenfield's election report from three weeks ago. Under its latest decision, the recount would stand, making the People's Progressive Party/Civic the new governing party.

CARICOM and its newly installed chairman, St Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Ralph Gonsalves, joined a growing number of voices from the international community calling for Granger to step down.

"The community calls on all stakeholders to respect the ruling of the CCJ, Guyana's final court of appeal," Gonsalves said on behalf of CARICOM, of which Guyana is a member.

Montserrat improves its Wi-Fi range

Montserrat has installed new submarine fibre optic cable system which means it will have better Wi-Fi connectivity.

The project aim was to reinstall a cable lost after volcanic eruptions on the island in 1995. The cable-laying ship IT Intrepid successfully completed the laying of the cable and integration of the branching unit between Guadeloupe and Antigua, which started on 29 June and finished on 2 July. The cable ship returned to Bunkum Bay in Montserrat on 3 July. It then completed the end-to-end testing of the submarine cable system to certify connectivity from the beach manhole to Antigua and Guadeloupe.

Focus will now shift back to the completion of the terrestrial components of the project. An end-of-August ready for service date is predicted for the new Montserrat Submarine Cable System.

As a popular tourist destination, the island hopes that enhanced connectivity will make it better equipped to tar-

get 'digital nomads' who can work from anywhere. Indeed, improved connectivity is said to be one of the strategies in the country's 2019-22 Strategic Plan for Tourism.

The finishing of the project is timely, following on from the lifting of the coronavirus-inspired late-night curfew on 1 July and an end to a number of restrictions on people and businesses, albeit precautionary measures remain in place and Montserrat's borders remain closed.

Jamaica concerned by sexual attacks

A quarter of Jamaican adolescent females experience sexual violence, and with school closures and curfew measures due to COVID-19, local children agencies foresee a heightened risk of exposure.

The source of the data - Jamaica Women's Health Survey 2016 - establishes that sexual abuse for 15-19 year-old women has always been a pervasive challenge, and Novia Condell-Gibson, adolescent health specialist at United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), Jamaica, asserts that sexual violence against girls and women is a long-standing issue that doesn't receive the response it requires.

"It is alarming that one in four women experience this. If that is not an emergency I don't know what is," Condell-Gibson said, pointing out the prediction for a heightened risk of exposure due to COVID-19 measures is a global observation.

Globally, there are reports of increased violence against children and

gender-based violence in the wake of stay-at-home measures. Between January to June 2020, Jamaica's National Children's Registry received over 1,000 reports of sexual abuse that have been referred for investigation. While reports dipped significantly in April (82) and May (119) - at a time when reporting was more difficult among COVID-19 restrictions - they rose again in June to 228.

Rihanna donates iPads to Bajan kids

Rihanna and Twitter CEO Jack Dorsey are continuing to help those in need amid uncertain times.

The pop star took to social media to share a video message from Barbados Prime Minister Mia Mottley, announcing that the singer's Clara Lionel Foundation along with Dorsey's #StartSmall initiative, donated 4,000 iPads to students on the island.

Rihanna and Dorsey have regularly teamed up for charitable purposes amid the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, including partnering up for a joint donation of \$4.2 million that went towards Los Angeles based domestic violence shelters.

Rihanna, who usually stays quiet when it comes to her charitable contributions, admitted to her pride of working alongside Mottley for her latest endeavour.

In April, Rihanna paired up again with Dorsey as well as Jay-Z to donate \$6.2 million towards coronavirus relief in highly vulnerable places including New York, New Orleans, and Puerto Rico. The singer also paused sales

on all three of her business ventures - Fenty Beauty, Savage x Fenty and her Fenty clothing line - on Blackout Tuesday in support of the Black Lives Matter movement.

Dominica to build five-star hotel

Dominica is building a five-star hotel, Tranquillity Beach Resort, which will open by the beginning of 2022. Part of the Hilton Curio Collection, the resort is eligible under the country's world-leading Citizenship by Investment Programme. Featuring dramatic cliff-hanging villas and ultra-luxury facilities, the environmentally sensitive resort will consist of 99 rooms and create up to 300 permanent jobs. It will be in the village of Salisbury, about an hour's drive along the coast from the capital Roseau.

An investment starting at US\$200,000 in Hilton's Tranquillity Beach Resort qualifies an individual for citizenship in Dominica, provided they also pass all the due diligence checks. Families can apply jointly, including siblings and grandparents of the main applicant or their spouse, according to the most recent changes.

Tranquillity Beach Resort is one of the few shortlisted hotels eligible for citizenship by investment in Dominica. Alternatively, applicants can make a one-off contribution to a government fund. If successful, they earn the right to live, work and study on the Nature Isle of the Caribbean. They can also easily travel to around 140 destinations and pass the valuable citizenship on to future generations.

Barbados wants remote workers

The Barbados government has come up with a plan to help its tourism industry while giving UK residents the chance to escape the new daily routine of working from home.

It says it will offer British nationals who work remotely the chance to make Barbados their home for a year, under a new 'Barbados Welcome Stamp' scheme.

Prime Minister Mia Mottley created the scheme to increase the country's Gross Domestic Product and boost the tourism industry on the island.

The scheme is in the first stages of development and hasn't been finalised yet.

Mottley has also not yet revealed when the scheme will be open for applicants, so those who are interested will

need to monitor developments. Barbados started welcoming international travellers on 12 July.

Those who choose to visit the island will have to undergo mandatory tests for COVID-19 upon arrival and will need to isolate until the test results are provided.

Trinidad opens first Victoria's Secret

Victoria's Secret has opened its first retail store in Trinidad and Tobago. The iconic brand opened at Gulf City Mall last Friday. Victoria's Secret products are sold in more than 1,600 stores worldwide.

Group Marketing Manager Gervais Dattoo said there was an overwhelmingly positive response from mall patrons who lined the red carpet ahead of the opening. He reported that customers were adhering to COVID-19 guidelines by wearing masks and physically distancing. Staff is also wearing masks and following sanitisation protocols as set out by the Ministry of health. No more than 10 custom-

ers are allowed into the store at any given time.

For shoppers who are yet to visit the store, Dattoo said they can expect to see signature scents like Bombshell, Tease and Rush.

West Indies hope this is new Test era

West Indies surprised England by beating them in the first Test in Southampton on Sunday which set many records and heralded a new era. Hopefully, it won't be another false dawn.

The visitors won by four wickets, their first in an opening Test away to higher-ranked opposition since beating South Africa by 128 runs in Port Elizabeth in 2007.

West Indies are holders of the Wisden Trophy after defeating England in the Caribbean 2-1 last year. But entering the three Test series as the world's eighth-ranked team, pundits gave them little chance against the number four-rated Englishmen.

Outside of this triumph at The Ageas Bowl and their success at Headingley in 2017, West Indies have not won a Test match in England since 2000.

Considering they have not claimed a Test series victory in England in 32 years there remains plenty to play for in the remaining behind-closed-doors matches. The second Test started on Thursday at Old Trafford and in Manchester on July 24.

Iconic former West Indies skipper Sir Clive Lloyd said that the accomplishment should be celebrated and used to instil belief for the rest of the tour.

"This is what Test cricket is all about and I must give them all the praise.

[Ahead of the Test match] I wrote about them, saying this is a new era of our cricket, and it has come to pass.

"I want them to celebrate [the win], I want them to realise what they have achieved. Not many teams that have come to England in the last two or three years have beaten them. We have played extremely well," Lloyd, who won 36 of 74 Tests as captain.

This win brings skipper Jason Holder, only behind greats Sir Vivian Richards (27) and Lloyd. Holder has won four of six Tests against England as captain.

Lloyd, 75, added: "It's the dawn of a new era and they'll realise the importance of what they've done. This will give us the type of lift that we need, and congratulations to the captain, the players and all the back room staff. This is a terrific win — excellent for West Indies cricket, for the players, and all the supporters."

Holder praised Jermaine Blackwood as the ultimate "team man" after the batsman's 95.


The 28-year-old Jamaican struck a back-to-the-wall 95 to guide the visitors to 200-6, giving them a four-wicket win on a testing final-day pitch at The Ageas Bowl.

"If I had 12 Jermaine Blackwoods; those are the kind of guys you want to step on the cricket field with. These are team guys through thick and thin," Holder said.

"I've played lots of cricket with, and lots of cricket against Blackwood. We

played all our youth cricket together, we played Youth World Cup together, so I know the player.

"He's a team man, he's a humble team man, and he's one of those guys who I know when he crosses that line he is going to give his all," he said.

"Sometimes he feels he could carry everybody on his shoulders...he's that confident a player." 🌐

Westbrook positive but expects to start

Houston Rockets guard Russell Westbrook announced he has tested positive for COVID-19. Westbrook said on social media he's feeling well as he anticipates joining his teammates once cleared from the virus. He is the most profile player who has tested positive recently.

Westbrook, along with James Harden, haven't joined the rest of the team in Orlando ahead of the NBA restart.

The 2019-2020 NBA season will resume July 31 at Walt Disney World Resort in Orlando, Florida, with players kept in a bubble. The season was suspended on March 11 due to the coronavirus pandemic.

A number of the league's players, include the Rockets' Thabo Sefolosha, have opted out of the season, citing the risks of the coronavirus. 🌐

Pocket Rocket jets ahead of rest

Four-time world champion Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce clocked a world-leading 11:00 seconds in the women's 100m sprint in Jamaica's first track and field meet since March because of the coronavirus pandemic.

Competing at the Velocity Fest meeting at the Ashenheilm Stadium in Kingston, the 33-year-old "Pocket Rocket", representing Nike, won easily despite a stiff headwind to beat the previous fastest time in the world this year - 11.05 - set by American Sha'Carri Richardson in Montverde, Florida a week earlier.

Fraser-Pryce, who is a two-time Olympic champion, took the victory well ahead of Sprintec's Shashalee Forbes, who finished second on 11:49. The MVP Track Club pair of Bahamian Anthonique Strachan (11:84) and Indian sprinter Srabani Nanda (11:88) finished third and fourth, respectively.

At the 2019 World Championships in Doha, aged 32, Fraser-Pryce became the oldest woman and second mother

in history to win gold at the 100m at a global championship.

Nesta Carter, 10.38, won the men's 100m ahead of Tyquendo Tracey, 10.39 and Romario Williams, 10.39.

Meanwhile, double Olympic sprint champion Elaine Thompson Herah had to settle for second place behind her MVP teammate Shericka Jackson in one heat of the women's 200m.

Jackson, the Doha 2019 400m bronze medallist, came home in 22.89 seconds, the fastest time over the heats, while Thompson Herah clocked 22.98 for the second-fastest time overall. 🌐

Washington's name change was needed

The Washington Redskins changing their name was an inevitable consequence after decades of disapproval as it has always been criticised as racist.

The team said it would "be retiring the Redskins name and logo upon completion of a review" demanded by its sponsors. Its major sponsors threatened to pull funding from the NFL team unless it considered renaming itself.

The Washington DC-based team has faced years of pressure over a name seen as offensive to Native Americans.

Team owner Dan Snyder had been a boyhood fan of the 87-year-old team - which was named the Redskins in 1933 when it was still based in Boston - and had vowed to never change its moniker.

But amid protests over police brutality and racism, major sponsors FedEx, Nike, Pepsi and Bank of America all called on Snyder to consider finally changing the name.

Last week, Amazon, Walmart and Target, Nike and other retail stores removed team merchandise from their websites. ESPN also said it would stop using the team logo, which depicts a Native American man.

A new one must be chosen before the 2020 season begins in September. The team's official website maintains the current team name, as does the team's official Twitter handle.

Some names that have been suggested as replacements include the Washing-

ton Senators, the Washington Warriors and the Washington Red Tails.

The NFL team is not the first Washington DC sports franchise to change its name amid shifting cultural attitudes.

In 1995, the NBA's Washington Bullets were renamed the Wizards after the team owner said he had become uncomfortable with the name's violent overtones.

The Redskins moved to Washington DC in 1937 and was founded by businessman George Preston Marshall, who believed in racial segregation.

They were the last team to recruit black players and only did so after the government threatened to revoke the lease on their stadium in 1962.

Last month, a statue of Marshall was removed from the stadium's grounds after it was vandalised. The stadium has also said they will remove his name from the Ring of Fame, a level of the stadium that highlights contributions made by individuals to the team's history.

Ray Halbritter, Oneida Nation Representative and founder of the Change the Mascot campaign, which advocated for the name change, praised Monday's announcement.

"This is a good decision for the country - not just Native peoples - since it closes a painful chapter of denigration and disrespect toward Native Americans and other people of colour," he said. "Future generations of Native youth will

no longer be subjected to this offensive and harmful slur every Sunday during football season."

"About time," tweeted New Mexico Congresswoman Deb Haaland, one of the only Native American women in Congress.

"It shouldn't take a huge social movement & pressure from corporate sponsors to do the right thing, but I'm glad this is happening. Huge thanks to everyone who made their voices heard."

Activists say the Washington team name has long been the most offensive, amid others that also invoke Native American stereotypes. The Atlanta Braves, Chicago Blackhawks and Kan-

sas City Chiefs are also team names that some activists hope will change as the US undertakes a racial reckoning after the death of George Floyd in police custody.

The Cleveland Indians announced a review of their team name only hours after the Redskins did so earlier this month.

"Today is a day for all Native people to celebrate," said the National Congress of the American Indian, the largest and oldest Native American rights organisation.

"We thank the generations of tribal nations, leaders, and activists who worked for decades to make this day possible. We are not mascots." 🌐
