PAC Lauds Government Entities

As part of what is now an annual exercise, the Public Accounts Committee applauded all government entities that have excelled in meeting the audit office's annual requirements.

In addition, a number of special awards were presented under three categories: leading by example, audit efficiency and most improved.

Welcoming the Chief Officers, Chief Financial Officers and Chief Executive Officers and team mem-

bers who were there to receive the awards, PAC Chairman, Mr. Ezzard Miller highlighted the nearly full compliance of government entities with the requirements of the audit office.

Terming 39 unqualified audit opinions obtained out of 41 entities as a "really serious and commendable achievement" in keeping with being a


Students Application Process Adjusted

The Department of Education Services (DES) has announced an adjustment in the application process and entry requirements for the Dual Entry Programme opportunity provided by Government Secondary Schools. Prior to the pandemic, eligibility to successfully enter the programme was mainly based on external examinations results. Due to the pandemic induced delay in the regular external examinations schedule, an alternative means in determining students' eligibility has now been established.

Facemasks still a requirement at HSA

Following Government's updated regulations on 25th August 2020, the Health Services Authority is advising the public that the wearing of facemasks is still required for all persons entering any HSA facilities (this includes Faith Hospital and District Health Centres).

The updated regulations states [Wearing of masks Section 5(2) (a)] that a *Healthcare Facility may require that any person who visits any of such places shall wear a mask and a person who refuses to do so shall be refused entry.*

Masks are required in all areas of the hospital (ie: covered walkways, wait-



ing rooms, elevators, hallways, cafeteria, atrium, blood bank, wards, etc.)

HSA to relocate COVID-19 testing clinic

Effective Monday 31st August, the Health Services Authority (HSA) will be relocating the COVID-19 testing clinic from the General Practice Building to the previous location of the Physiotherapy Department, (located on the side of the hospital facing the Seventh Day Adventist Church, to the far left of A&E). Please park in the Seventh Day Adventist Church parking lot use the physiotherapy entrance.

The new location is a dedicated space for persons being tested and has additional indoor seating, providing a better patient experience.

HSA recently launched an online appointment booking tool for the public to schedule free COVID-19 screening tests <https://www.hsa.ky/Appointment/>. Testing is by appointment only and must be made at least 2 business days in advance. Appointment times are currently available between 7:30am - 8:20am Monday - Friday.

If a COVID-19 test is required for travel purposes, travelers are reminded to check the entry requirements for the country you are flying to, as some have testing guidelines in place (ie: 72 hours prior to travel), therefore the date of your COVID-19 test must be timed up with your departure. As part of the online appointment booking form, travelers will be asked to enter their departure date.

All persons screened are also enrolled into the free MyHSA Patient Portal which provides 24 hour secure access to your health information as well as other convenient features. For more information on how to set up a Patient Portal Account, visit <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=wD1cpldeRkM>.

- Choose the date and time you would like to come in for your test. Appointments must be made at least 2 business days in advance and are available Monday - Friday. *At this time, we cannot accept walk-ins.*
- Enter your information as all persons need to be pre-registered.
- You will receive an email confirming the date, time and location of your appointment.
- Please show up for your appointment on time. The screening process only takes a few minutes.
- Test results will be emailed to the patient approximately 24 hours after test.

COVID-19 UPDATE

CAYMAN CONTINUES ITS IMPRESSIVE COVID TESTING

Having surpassed 35,000 tests this week, Cayman continues to be one of the frontline countries in the region doing screening for the COVID-19 virus.

Chief Medical Officer, Dr John Lee, reported on Friday that all of the 141 COVID-19 tests carried out across the previous day were negative.

It brings to 35,195 the number of coronavirus PCR tests done here.

There are currently two active cases being monitored. Of the 205 cases confirmed in Cayman since the global outbreak of the disease, 202 have fully recovered. There's only been one fatality.

At present, 297 persons are in isolation either at a government facility or in their homes as required by the Medical Officer of Health.

The continued testing, both for the presence of the virus (PCR) and the antibody test for persons would have contracted the disease, is critical to plans to re-open the borders as well as suppressing the spread of the virus in the territory.

A wearable health-monitoring device for visitors called a bio-button is



being trialled. It will check their vital signs while they are in isolation. Another gadget called a 'geo-fencing' tracker will monitor their movements to ensure that they remain within the isolation zone.

The government has also announced that it will be "significantly beefing up" the Public Health Unit with additional staffing and other resources as the battle against the coronavirus moves into another phase.

Just this week more restrictions were lifted and schools started resuming in-person classes.

Cayman remains at Level 2 Minimal Suppression until September 30th, the day before the first phase of the re-opening of the borders to visitors.

world-class service provider, the Chairman urged those lagging to change their status by next year. He recalled that the entities had come a long way from 2009 when a considerable number did not have their accounts ready for audit.

Mr. Miller had equal words of praise for the Audit Office whose principals completed all the audits efficiently even during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Thanking the entities and adding his congratulations, Deputy Governor, Hon. Franz Manderson welcomed the fact that the PAC had held the entities' "feet to the fire" to ensure they spend the public's money in a "very judicious manner". In addition to meeting their financial responsibilities, the accounts were completed to a standard that ensured the public's right to know how government's funds were spent.

He acknowledged that all the achieving entities made him very proud, especially the **Ministry of Finance and Economic Development** for leading among core government entities and encouraged others to give the ministry good competition in the next audit cycle.

PAC Member, MLA Chris Saunders was elated with the improvement in government levels of controls in dealing with finances. Noting that there have to be different standards for the public sector, which was not as easy to audit as the private sector, he emphasised that the quality of work and calibre of persons providing the government accounts were truly world class.

Awards were presented by MLAS and PAC members Mr. Christopher Saunders, Mr. Bernie Bush, Hon. Barbara Conolly, Mr. Austin Harris and Mr. David Wight.

The Chief Executives and Chief Financial Offices receiving special certificates relating to 2018 and 2019 financial audits were as follows:

For a **ministry, office or portfolio**:
1. The **2018 and 2019 Leading by Example Awards** – to the **Ministry of**

Finance and Economic Development for submitting their financial statements and annual report for the two years before the statutory deadline, for being the first entity audit completed in both years and yet again achieving unqualified audit opinions; **Financial Secretary and CO, Mr. Kenneth Jefferson, CFO Ms Nina Vandine** and her team;

2. The **2018 Audit Efficiency Award** – to the **Ministry of Community Affairs** for quick and efficient audit completion, having an unqualified opinion with no ISA260 control points raised and for getting their annual report tabled promptly – **Chief Officer Ms Teresa Echenique, CFO Mr. Joel Burke** and his team;


4. **2018 Most Improved Award** – to the **HSA**; this award went to the entity whose achievement in the year was judged most significant; the HSA had **qualified** audit opinions for many years having real difficulties in managing their debt and proving their revenue was complete – after concerted efforts and a systematic plan of action, the HSA achieved their first **unqualified** audit opinion in 2018; for their considerable work undertaken, **CEO Ms Yearwood** for her leadership and new **CFO Ms Cummings** and her finance team; laudably the HSA now has achieved a profit.

Ministries, offices and portfolios receiving unqualified audit opinions for 2018 and 2019 are: Cabinet Office, Ministries of Community Affairs; District Administration, Tourism and Transport; Education, Youth, Sports, Agriculture and Lands; Finance and Economic Development; Human Resources and Immigration; Fi nancial Services and Home

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DEBATE INTENSIFIES AS CONSULTATIONS CLOSE ON CONTROVERSIAL 'PARTNERSHIP' BILL

Saying he understood the “extremely sensitive” nature of the controversy surrounding the Domestic Partnership Bill, HE Governor Martyn Roper wrapped up a series of public consultations ahead of his decision to unilaterally enact the bill.

Another protest against it was planned for last weekend.

Governor Roper has resorted to his Reserve Powers under Article 81 of the Cayman Islands constitution to pass the law after it was defeated in the Legislative Assembly in a close 9-8 vote a month ago.

That move which been questioned by some Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs) and other segments of the community was already anticipated during debate of the bill in the Legislative Assembly.

Mr Roper subsequently said he was left with no alternative.

While the bill itself which will give legal recognition to same-sex unions outside the Marriage Act is a very contentious and polarising issue, the authority of Governors having the power to override government and Legislative decisions has also been cast into the spotlight again.

It is one of the points down for constitutional review talks between the British and Caymanian governments and positions are expected to be now even more entrenched over it.

Among those who have questioned the Governor's decision to resort to his Reserve Power to enact the bill is the Ministers Association of leaders of the clergy.

They had written to the Governor challenging the basis for his intervention and calling on him to “withdraw all the bills and amendments you have proposed to enact.”

“Again, we believe a misinterpretation of Section 81 and Section 55 of the Constitution of the Cayman Islands means you are overstepping your authority to take the course of action you have set out in this matter.

For all of these reasons we would expect you to withdraw all the bills and amendments you have proposed to enact,” the Ministers Association had said in a letter to Governor Roper.

In a Facebook post after meeting with the Ministers Association on Friday Mr Roper reported:

“I have also just discussed the matter with the Cayman Ministers' Association. We were not able to agree on many issues but we understand each other better after our meeting. I recognise that it remains highly sensitive for many but that others strongly welcome it.

“I continue to believe that the Bill, and associated legislation, is a sensible albeit difficult compromise enabling us to comply with our laws and Constitution, end discrimination suffered Caymanians and others in our community and protect the institution of marriage.”

The Governor has been making several media appearances and has utilised his very active Facebook social media presence as part of his public outreach on the divisive issue.

Commenting about his interview on Cayman Crosstalk he said, “As ever, a lively discussion. Many callers do not agree with the Partnerships Bill and some have strong views. I respect their right to put their views across and am pleased we had a courteous, polite and respectful exchange of views.”


That was a reflection of other media interviews the Governor has given on the issue.

He referred to the Domestic Partnerships Bill as it is currently officially named as the ‘Partnerships Bill’.

Mr Roper has indicated that the bill was likely to be renamed as a civil union or civil partnership following feedback that he has obtained from his ongoing consultations which end on Monday.

That seems to be the most significant change so far, although it was expected that several laws related to the bill will be amended before it becomes law.

When he announced on August 5th that he was invoking his constitutional prerogative following the defeat of Domestic Partnership Bill on July 29th, Governor Roper outlined following a 21-day consultation period - which started on August 10th - he would review the outcomes with the Attorney General before enacting the legislation.

“At the end of this period, acting under instructions from the Foreign Secretary, I will use my Reserved Powers under Section 81 of the Constitution to assent to the Bill. I expect it to be gazetted and come into law at the beginning of September,” he said then.

The legalisation of same-sex unions in the Cayman Islands has drawn interest and attention from outside the jurisdiction.

One of the most recent comes from an organisation called Caribbean Cause described as “an alliance of Christian organisations that challenge anti-biblical and antiscientific ideologies, law and policies in the public sphere and work towards stability and sustainable development of the region by defending and promoting biblical values in their respective Caribbean societies and beyond.”

In a release dated August 24th, the Jamaica-based organisation with representatives in Cayman and elsewhere in the region said:

“It is unfortunate, but not unexpected, that Governor Martyn Roper intends to impose same-sex Domestic Partnership on the Cayman Islands.

“It is unfortunate because the Governor has chosen to abuse his power as the British representative in Cayman Islands to overturn the decision of the democratically elected Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs).”

Caribbean Cause further stated: “It is imperative that the people of the Cayman Islands join with their MLAs here and now to resist any attempt to re-order their society to accommodate the sexual lawlessness that is bound up in LGBT ideologies.”

In one of his several social media postings, Mr Roper had stated:

“I continue to recognise this is a very sensitive and emotive issue for many people in our community. I did not want to be put in this position. But I am left with no choice and must uphold the rule of law.”

Cayman Air Traffic Visibility Requires Clearing of Trees

As part of the next phase of continued improvements in operations and safety standards at the Airports, The Cayman Islands Airports Authority (CIAA), which operates the Owen Roberts International Airport (ORIA) and the Charles Kirkconnell International Airport (CKIA), will be clearing trees at the Airport Park near to Fosters Food Fair and clearing of land near the Cricket Pitch on Wednesday, 2 September 2020.

The clearing of trees at the Airport Park has become necessary to provide Air Traffic Control with better visibility of aircraft maneuvering on the newly extended runway at the westerly section of the airfield on Grand Cayman. The clearing of land by the cricket field is necessary to remove the vegetation penetrating the flight path for landing and departing aircraft.

These works are being carried out in accordance with the "AIRPORTS AUTHORITY (SAFE GUARDING) REGULATIONS, 2019".

SCHOOLS RESUME IN-PERSON CLASSES

The Department of Education (DES) has updated and revised its guidance for the opening of government schools for the 2020-2021 school year.

Several changes have been made to the schedule and how the schools operate due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

These affect a range of school operations including opening dates, classrooms, playgrounds, and on school buses.

Some of the regulations previously issued this past Tuesday, August 25th, remain unchanged while others have had varying degrees of adjustments.

MASKS AND DISTANCING

The issue of children wearing masks in school has been a major point of concern.

Earlier this week, Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee, announced that the previous regulations had now been changed but required to go through a legal process.

"I now feel free to say that I don't believe children under 10 should have to wear a mask in countries where COVID is well controlled and that includes Cayman," he said then.

Under the revised guidance, while it remains mandatory to wear masks on school buses, wearing them in class is now optional.

There's no longer the need to physically distance in classrooms, corridors or outdoors. However, the DES guidance says physical contact is strongly discouraged.

SCHEDULE: PRIMARY SCHOOLS

The opening dates for primary schools on the three islands and their respective year groups advisory has had some adjustments.

The DES says parents were advised of the staggered start dates based on their child's year group.

It also advises that to prepare for a full return to school earlier than anticipated, parents are being given time to ensure all resources and necessary arrangements are in place for a start on August 31st.

In-person classes for Years 3, 4 and 5 in primary schools in Grand Cayman and Cayman Brac will now resume on Monday, August 31st.

Reception and Years 1, 2 and 6 at primary schools on Grand Cayman and West End Primary School on Cayman Brac have started on August 26th following the previous schedule.

Likewise, Little Cayman Education Service, and Creek and Spot Bay Primary Schools on Cayman Brac welcomed back all students including the Nursery class on Wednesday August 26th.

SCHEDULE: HIGH SCHOOLS

High schools were also conducting orientation this week with parents being given the opportunity to ensure all preparations that are completed and resources acquired for a full return to in-person classes for their students on August 31st.

On Grand Cayman, John Gray High School and Clifton Hunter High School are conducting on-site orientation this week until Friday August 28th.

Classes for Years 7, 10 and 11 will resume on Monday August 31st as previously announced.

However, students at those schools in Years 8 and 9 who were due to return to in-person classes on September 9th will now turn out on Monday, August 31st as well.

Cayman Islands Further Education Centre is conducting its orientation this week with classes resuming on Monday August 31st as well.

While students of Years 7, 10, 11 and 12 at Layman E. Scott Sr. High School on Cayman Brac went back to classes yesterday, Years 8 and 9 will now return to in-person classes on Monday, August 31, 2020.

UCCI Dual Entry students will now also return on Monday August 31st instead of September 9th as previously announced.

FINAL AIR-BRIDGE FLIGHT DEPARTS

The 8th and final British Airways air-bridge flight organised as an emergency transfer due to the COVID-19 crisis left Cayman on Friday.

The Governor's Office which has been coordinating the flight operations reports that 316 passengers, mainly students along with their families, were on the outbound flight.

According to HE Governor Martyn Roper, "This final flight is the culmination of months of hard work by Team Cayman which has seen over 2,600 people from more than 35 nationalities heading off the island all with a story to tell."

"Bereavements, illness, medical treatment, study and loss

of employment are just some of the reasons people have had to leave and it has been an amazing feat for everyone involved that during a worldwide pandemic we have been able to support them and get them to where they need to be," he added.

The Governor's Office which has been coordinating the repatriation flights is handing over that responsibility to the new government agency, TravelTime.

From now on flights to the UK can be booked directly with British Airways.

The first flight under the new system is scheduled to arrive in Grand Cayman on 17th September and depart on the 18th.

Thereafter flights will operate every two weeks until the end of November.


The September 17th flight will also be a test run for the

new COVID screening system for visitors arriving in Cayman when the borders are initially re-opened on October 1st.

Fatal Stabbing Incident at the Strand

Just after 3:30AM today, police and other emergency services were dispatched by the 9-1-1 Communications Centre to a report of a stabbing incident that took place at the at a night club located at the Strand on Canal Point Road.

One man that was involved in the incident was stabbed, and was transported to the Cayman Islands Hospital by a private vehicle. He was later pronounced dead by the attending doctor.

Subsequent inquiries have led investigators to arrest a 27-year-old-man at his address in George Town on suspicion of murder. He has been taken in custody where he will remain, pending further investigation.

Additionally, police are also investigating two other incidents that took place at the location around the same time of the fatal stabbing:

One man was assaulted and received a wound to his head. He attended the hospital for treatment and is believed to have non-life-threatening injuries.


The third incident is a motor vehicle collision involving a white Honda Civic

that is believed to have sped away from the parking lot of the Strand on Canal Point Drive and collided with a wall on West Bay Road. The driver of the vehicle, who is believed to be the only occupant was trapped and was extricated from the vehicle by the Cayman Islands Fire Service. He was transported by Ambulance to the hospital for treatment and is believed to have sustained serious but non-life-threatening injuries

A Major Incident Room has been established and the matter is currently being investigated. Detectives are appealing for witnesses who were at the location at the time of these incidents. Witnesses are being encouraged to contact the Major Incident Room at **649-2930**.

For the first time in history, these highly anticipated annual gatherings have been canceled and moved to a virtual platform for the safety of all. Many will view the convention from their private homes along with their fellow congregants worldwide.

“Always Rejoice”! Convention of Jehovah’s Witnesses Moves to Streaming Platform

In a world where achieving a state of sustained joy may seem elusive—even impossible—for many, millions of Jehovah’s Witnesses and their invited guests in some 240 lands will “attend” a global convention this summer with the theme “Always Rejoice”!

For the first time in their history of holding conventions, Jehovah’s Witnesses have moved this highly anticipated annual event to a streaming platform. Congregations, families, and guests will view the program during July and August 2020. Typically, these conventions are held in stadiums, arenas, conference halls, and smaller gathering places around the world.

Locally, a prerecorded program of the convention was scheduled to be streamed at both the George Town and West Bay Congregations of Jehovah’s Witnesses at 12 Keturah Street, George Town, and 15 Finch Drive West Bay where 350 were expected to attend. However, this arrangement was cancelled in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

“Our worship is centered on our mutual love for our God and for each other, irrespective of where we are physically,” said Robert Hendriks, U.S. spokesman for Jehovah’s Witnesses. “This year’s convention program underscores the unity of our international family and the joy that people can have against a backdrop of stress and despair.”

The two Christian principles guiding the Witnesses’ historic decision are respect for the sanctity of life and love of neighbor. “As much as we long to meet together, life is far too precious to put at risk,” said Hendriks. “The virtual meetings we have held over the past four

months have proved to all of us that it’s not about where we are physically. It’s about where we are spiritually. In many ways we are closer as a spiritual family than ever before.”

The program is to be released in six installments, each corresponding to a morning or afternoon session of what would have been three successive convention days. Many congregations and families will view the first convention session during the weekend of July 11-12. The final weekend of the virtual event is scheduled for August 29-30.

The program explores questions like: What contributes to finding and sustaining joy? How can you cultivate joy in the family? How can you remain joyful in difficult times? A key feature will be a Bible-based drama that considers the life of Nehemiah and how he helped the ancient nation of Israel find joy in their worship of God.

Those interested in viewing the convention can contact their local congregation or access the program on jw.org, available under the “Library” tab. There is no charge for viewing the convention.

Each year many who are not Jehovah’s Witnesses attend the annual conventions. There are more than 8.6 million active Witnesses worldwide, yet the 2019 conventions had a peak attendance of more than 14 million. With the program available online in hundreds of languages, this may be the most attended convention of Jehovah’s Witnesses to date.

DES Adjusts Student Application Process for Dual Entry Programme

Acting Director of Education Services, Tammy Banks-DaCosta added, “After initial consultation with the Ministry of Education, Youth, Sports, Agriculture and Lands (MEYSAL), my team in conjunction with the Cayman Islands Further Education Centre (CIFEC), gained approval on a decision to adjust the application process for the Dual Entry Programme. The adjustment sees acceptance in the programme based on two factors; the prediction of examination grades pro-

vided by high schools and grades in subjects which were already obtained from previous examination sittings. We further consulted the University College of the Cayman Islands (UCCI) and the private high schools offering A-Level programmes. It was acknowledged that these institutions would need to make decisions on their intake prior to the availability of final grades from the relevant external exams. We absolutely recognise that the disruptions to the school year, exams and indeed our very lives, have made for very challenging times; however, we are fo-

cused on overcoming each obstacle by ensuring we continue to meet our students’ needs.”

The Dual Entry Programme provides the opportunity for students to begin their tertiary education journey at the age of 16 and to improve their chances of higher education. Upon successful completion of Year 11, students have the opportunity to be dually enrolled in the Year 12 programme, while also pursuing one of two, further or higher education pathways. The two pathway options include the first year of an associate degree at UCCI or the first year of a sixth form advanced level programme.

After successful completion of the selected pathway choice, the student would then graduate with their high school diploma as well as having gained a one-year head start on their desired tertiary education pathway. Students who are not eligible for the Dual Entry Programme have the opportunity to retake or gain more subject passes at CIFEC or the Layman Scott High School Year 12 programme for Cayman Brac students.


“The fact that the Year 12 programme of our government secondary schools provides different pathways is an in-

dications of our commitment to meet the unique needs of our students and provide them with every opportunity to excel. I am pleased in knowing that another cohort is receiving this unique opportunity despite the setbacks of this pandemic. The programme is proof of an effective and sustainable programme, and the adjustment is additional proof that we continue to adapt and innovate in prioritising the needs of our students. Whatever the challenge, no child in these Cayman Islands will be left behind,” assured the Minister for Education, Honourable Julianna O’Connor-Connolly.

Students approved for the Dual Entry Programme were contacted directly by CIFEC. If parents or guardians have any questions or wish to appeal the decision for acceptance into the Dual Entry Programme, they may contact the principal of the high school their child attended. Principals will forward the requests, along with their recommendations, to the Dual Entry Programme panel for review and consideration.

CUC's Newest Technology Building and Control Centre to Improve Customer Service and System Reliability

Control Centre Operators at Caribbean Utilities Company, Ltd. (CUC) are now operating from a new technology building, which includes a new Control Centre.

The new Control Centre is the central point for supervision and control of CUC's electricity generation, transmission and distribution systems. The building and systems have been upgraded following the original installation in 1999, and meets current industry standards with all of the features of modern control centres.

Work started on the project in September 2019 following the temporary

relocation of control system equipment and operators to the Company's Hurricane Centre, and was completed in August 2020.

Among the features of the new Control Centre are improvements in the working environment for the Control Centre Operators, situational awareness of the power system, communication with field crews, storm and outage management facilities, efficiency and renewable energy integration and management capabilities, with the capacity to expand over the next 10 years. With the new Control Centre housing state-

of-the-art technology, CUC's customers will benefit from the maintaining and improving of outage durations and enhanced communications through increased coordination and response of CUC's field-based teams, particularly during outages.

The project came in on budget and just over a month over the timeline due to COVID-19 and the shelter-in place order.

Manager, Engineering & Business Development, Ray Brown, whose department managed the project stated, "I am pleased with the work which

was carried out on this project, from the design to the build-out of the new Control Centre. The transition was seamless and at no time did this project negatively impact the Company's reliability. In spite of the challenging times, the project team worked very hard to ensure that the work was completed as close to the timeline as possible."

Local contractors on the project were Jairam Construction Ltd. for civil works and Corporate Electric Ltd. who won the bid for electrical and other ancillary systems. 🌐

Written by Barbadian and former Cayman resident Donna Tull-Cox, and directed by Henry Muttoo, the play is sponsored by CUC, and will be broadcast on Radio Cayman One (89.9 FM) at 7:30pm every Wednesday starting 2 September until 28 October with repeats of each week's episode airing every Saturday at 6:45pm beginning on 5 September and ending on 31 October.

'De Honeymoon Over' is an outrageously funny play about a young couple, Coreen and Dexter McLean, who are experiencing the growing pains of marriage. Unsolicited advice from their older relatives and more experienced friends wreaks havoc in their once happy home and causes a series of conflicts that must be resolved if the marriage is going to survive.

The production stars Giselle Webb as Coreen and Jevaughnie Ebanks as Dexter, alongside Harriet Vassell, Quincy Brown, Priscilla Pouchie, Susan Watson, Shomari Scott and Aiden Watler.

CNCF decided to bring back the play because it is one of the most highly rated plays from the Foundation's National Playwriting Competition (NPC).

"This play has been a success on the two occasions it has been staged at the Harquail [1993, 2010] and we feel it will translate to radio as effectively," said Henry Muttoo, CNCF Artistic Director. "The playwright, Donna Tull-Cox, is a

Mrs. Muttoo hopes that broadcasting the play over the airwaves will also draw a new audience, stating that radio has a unique and important reach, particularly for those who find it difficult to work a two to three-hour live theatre experience into their schedules, or those who may be home-bound.



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
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TROPICAL UPDATE



Suggested Hurricane Supply List

To prepare for the unknown, each home should have a 72-hour Disaster Survival Kit. You will need to pack some essential items to help you and your family survive, whether you stay at home or leave it during a disaster.

Ensure at least three days (72 hours) supply for each person. Do not forget pets where applicable! The following is a minimum suggested list of Survival Kit supplies:

Drinking Water:

- One gallon per person/per day in unbreakable containers, Avoid using containers that will decompose or break, such as milk cartons or glass bottles. A normally active person needs to drink at least two quarts of water each day. Hot environments and intense physical activity can double that amount. Children, nursing mothers, and ill people will need more.

- Don't forget to add additional water for mixing formula if you have children and for your pets. Rotate the drinking water each year.

- Food preparation and sanitation require another two quarts (minimum) per person daily.

- Purchased bottled water that has been sealed is best for storage. It meets FDA guidelines for food and is not as vulnerable to temperature changes as unsealed water

- **Tip:** Purchase water this year and use it for drinking next year. This allows for rotation on an annual basis and keeps the water fresh. **Yes water can go bad!**

Water for sanitation use:

- Store extra containers of water to be used for flushing toilets, cleaning, and bathing.

- Purchase water purification tablets (Halazone) to be used if you still have running water but are told to boil water before using it. This allows you to fill the bathtub and other containers without purchasing expensive drinking water.

- **Tip:** Keep plastic containers (milk jugs and other containers) and fill them with water when a storm threatens. You can put these items in the freezer to keep food cold longer in the event that the electricity goes out.

Non-perishable Food:

- Maintain at least 3-7 days of food for each member of the family.

- Small, preferably single serving cans (should not require cooking or refrigeration). Dried fruit, peanut butter and jelly, coffee, tea, soft drinks and pet foods.

- Ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables.

- Canned juices, milk, soup (if powdered, store extra water).

- Staples – sugar, salt, pepper in water proof containers.

- High energy foods like crackers, granola bars, trail mix.

- Raw vegetables that do not need refrigeration.

- Fresh bread.
- Comfort/stress foods – cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, lollipops, **instant coffee, tea bags.**

- Sterno for cooking.
- Vitamins
- Food for infants
- Paper cups, plates, and plastic utensils

- Non-electric can opener
- Aluminum foil
- Plastic storage containers
- Lots of ice (you can freeze your water supply)
- Pedialyte (to restore hydration if needed)

- **Tip:** Purchase only items that you like to eat and would eat even without a storm. Rotate these items by using them Dec-May each year and purchasing new items Jan-May. This allows you to reduce the cost of buying items for a hurricane kit at one time and keeps the items fresh. **Yes even canned goods have a shelf life!**

Baby Needs:

- Special foods (enough for several days)
- Formula (enough for several days)
- Extra diapers
- Medicines (get a copy of prescription)

- Blankets
- Diaper Rash Ointment
- Baby Wipes
- Powder
- Bottles
- Pacifier
- Favorite toy/blanket
- Medicine dropper
- Diaper-rash ointment

Sanitation

- Toilet paper, towelettes, soap, baby wipes, liquid hand sanitizer
- Liquid detergent
- Feminine supplies
- Personal hygiene items (toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo etc.)

electricity, most businesses (if open) will not accept credit cards and may not accept traveler's checks.

Not evacuating and staying home?

- Ensure you have enough food, water, medications, and other supplies in your survival kit to last at least 2 weeks.
- Turn refrigerator to coldest setting and keep closed.

- Turn off propane tanks.
- Unplug small appliances.
- Fill bathtub and other containers with water for cleaning and flushing. Additional water is stored for drinking.

- Cover all windows and other openings with hardened protections. If you do not have manufactured shutters, cut plywood and secure to protect the windows.

- Close all interior doors and brace outer doors.

- Select an interior room to use as a safe room.

- Plan as though you were evacuating and have enough cash on hand to sustain purchasing of gas, food, and other supplies in the days following the storm.

- If you have a generator, ensure you have enough gas on hand to sustain usage for several days.

- Ensure you have sufficient medications in case you are confined to your home for several days. Post-storm there may not be any electricity and pharmacies will probably closed even with a minor storm.

- Plan to cook on a camp stove or grill in the days immediately after the storm passes. 🌐
