REFUGEES - THE ULTIMATE CHALLENGE FOR CAYMAN

The arrival of two illegal migrants in a boat off The Brac on Monday has opened up a floodgate of questions that need to be addressed in the event that this might signal a possible wave of refugees seeking safe harbour in Cayman.

It may not be as far-fetched as it first appears.

Cayman is not only seen as an economic safe harbour but a COVID-19 safe haven - considering the scale of

'geo-fencing' monitoring and tracking system.

The data collected from those who'd agreed to participate in the pilot scheme was being analysed with adjustments made for this week's planned phased border reopening.

Main areas of review from this month's trial included how long it takes to process arrivals following the new procedures, and the capacity at the Owen Roberts International Airport to streamline the processing of passengers under the new health protocols.

The experience of the persons selected to use the wearable geo-fencing electronic tracking device was also factored into the review.

WATCHING THE WORLD

This Thursday's scheduled reopening was postponed from the previously planned September 1st start date due in part to a spike of coronavirus cases in the main market, the United States.

Since then, while there was an initial dip in the rate of global cases, recently there has been another spike especially in the US, and also now in the UK and some Latin American countries confirming concerns of a second wave of the outbreak.

On Tuesday, the UK recorded the highest daily increase in the number of new cases since the outbreak with over 7,000 cases recorded this past Tuesday alone with a series of targeted lockdowns and other restrictions being put in place.

At the same time, the global death toll from the disease surpassed one million on Tuesday. A few days earlier the United States passed a milestone of 200,000 deaths while cases there are also on the rise again in several states.

THE STRATEGY

The Cayman Islands government had set a cautious target of 800 travellers for October on the premise of a "soft opening".

"We are not opening our borders to commercial flights. As before, we will focus on repatriation flights and private charters, and the continuation of the fortnightly BA flights from London, which will have started in September," officials had earlier stated.

A government statement had outlined that the phased opening is only for Cayman Airways repatriation flights, fortnightly BA flights and approved private charter flights; not for commercial flights.

"Categories of people will extend beyond Caymanians, permanent residents, work permit holders and their families to also include persons who own property in the Cayman Islands as well as persons looking to live and work from here for an extended period of time, and other approved visitors."

It has been further explained that: "In addition to the lessons learned from the September testing, the Pilot in October will allow the Government to trial the new arrangements and safeguards, and to use the information from the September Pilot to decide if any improvements are needed going forward."

"This approach will further enable the Government to consider any

changes that are required as a result of local or international developments relating to the COVID-19 pandemic."

STRICT CONTROLS

From 1st October, the requirement for all inbound travellers to receive pre-travel authorization from Travel-Time, which has taken over the coordination of the repatriation and other flights, will remain in place.



Other changes planned to come into effect from October include expanding the locations where persons may quarantine to include residential accommodations approved by the Medical Officer of Health, in addition to government-operated isolation facilities.

However, self-isolation at a residence must be combined with the use of monitoring device technology. Persons who choose not to participate in the monitoring programme will be required to quarantine in a government facility for a minimum period of 14 days, and will be tested on day 15.

A negative test result will be required to leave the facility.

All persons entering the Cayman Islands will be tested on arrival at the airport and will be taken by approved transport from the airport to begin their quarantine period either at residential accommodations or in a government facility.

The test result is anticipated to take 24-72 hours. In both instances, the quarantine period will be 14 days with a PCR test on day 15.

All persons who are not ordinarily resident in the Cayman Islands will be required to have health insurance that includes COVID-19 coverage.

TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS

During the month of October, Cayman Airways and British Airways will continue to be the only two airline carriers operating repatriation flights to and from the Cayman Islands. Seat capacity remains limited and therefore non-essential travel is strongly discouraged until there is a measurable change in the global situation and normal commercial airlift resumes.

The government had advised that "although other airline websites are offering flights to the Cayman Islands, the reality is only Cayman Airways and British Airways have permission to operate flights to and from these Islands."

It had further stated that: "Any person who makes reservations directly with other airlines are doing so at their own risk and should be aware that airline vouchers issued by other airlines are not transferrable for British Airways or Cayman Airways repatriation flights."

There are no restrictions on outbound travel from the Cayman Islands and constraints on movement between Grand Cayman and the Sister Islands were lifted some time ago.

The ports are closed to cruise ships until 31st December 2020.

While to date, there has been no indication of any change of plans for the first phase of the formal reopening this Thursday, on the government's website it states that "due to the fluid nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, border decisions will continue to be evaluated and processes are subject to change." 📍

Social Worker of the Year Award Given at DCFS Recognition Event

The commitment and professionalism of government social work practitioners was formally acknowledged on Saturday, 26 September 2020.

Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) staff attended the DCFS Awards Recognition Dinner at Pedro St. James. The ceremony centred on the giving of long service, individual, team and manager certificates, culminating in the presentation of the inaugural Social Worker of the Year – Joyce Hylton Award.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Martyn Roper; Deputy Governor Hon. Franz Manderson; Community Affairs Councillor Mr. Austin Harris and Ministry of Community Affairs Chief Officer Ms Teresa Echenique were in attendance.

In her opening remarks DCFS Director, Mrs. Paulinda Mendoza-Williams, said: "It is with great honour and pride that I have the privilege of working with colleagues who truly exemplify what it means to be exceptional civil servants delivering world-class customer services. Your passion, compassion, hard work, and dedication consistently make the lives of those we serve better every day."

The Director also acknowledged two staff members who will be retiring at the end of the year.

Describing social work practitioners as the "backbone of a community-focused society", Councillor Harris praised DCFS staff for upholding the highest standards of the profession during the

most difficult time in living history. He acknowledged social workers' vast remit, their heavy caseloads and the increasingly multi-disciplinary scope of their work.

He said: "We were in the middle of celebrating Social Work Month in March under the theme of "Generations Strong" when we were thrown into the clutches of COVID-19 and found ourselves staying at home, isolated from our relatives, friends and co-workers. But I commend the Department's dedicated staff for maintaining contact with clients via various methods including telephone calls, Whatsapp video and Zoom. Throughout

the trial of COVID, DCFS remained committed to its staff and vulnerable clients. For that, we all thank you."

As Head of the Civil Service, Mr. Manderson focused on the lead that DCFS management and staff had taken in safeguarding the welfare of the nation's most vulnerable persons in the past six months. He said that the Department had proven its importance as an essential service, adding that government social workers and community care staff embody the Civil Service's commitment; to making the lives of those they serve better.

Both Mr. Manderson and the Governor presented long service awards honour-

ing departmental employees with 20 to 32 years' service.

The team and individual awards, were presented by Councillor Harris and Chief Officer Echenique, and included recognition certificates for staff that were chosen by their colleagues.

The evening culminated in the presentation of the inaugural Joyce Hylton Award Social Work Manager of the Year- Joyce Hylton Award to Mrs. Tempora Wesley. On receiving the honour, the Elderly Services Team member said: "It is a high honour to receive the first ever Social Worker of the Year award. I am humbled and so proud to be furthering Mrs. Hylton's mission by doing the job I love, working alongside colleagues that I admire."

The award was sponsored and presented by representatives of the Hylton family and the estate of the late Mike Simmons. His executor Ms Elva Smith said; "Mr. Simmons, was the informally adopted son of Mrs. Hylton and it was his wish that his estate honour her. This was the most fitting opportunity to do so, as she was the Cayman Islands' first social worker. The estate has committed to continue sponsoring these awards for the next five years."

Teams and staff honoured at the ceremony included the Family, Youth and Elderly Services teams, as well as the Department's Community Development officers, Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (M.A.S.H), and the Adoption and Foster Care, Cayman Brac, Adult Special Needs, Administration and Finance teams. 🌐

Dreams Become Reality for Doctoral Awardee

Dreams became a reality this month (September 2020) with the award of a doctoral degree in human and social services to Diane Ricketts, manager and accountant at the Cayman Islands Conference of Seventh-day Adventist.

In congratulating Dr. Ricketts on behalf of her colleagues at the church's headquarters, Pastor Reinaldo Dracket, president of the Conference, said: "You have demonstrated through this attainment that through inspiration and hard work we are able to see our dreams become reality."

Dr. Ricketts was awarded her human and social services doctoral degree, with a specialization in higher education, by Walden University. Walden is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (www.hlcommission.org), recognised by the U.S. Department of Education.

In another landmark achievement for Mrs. Ricketts, the Cabinet of the Cayman Islands Government appointed her as a "Guardian Ad. Litem", effective May 2020. Guardians represent the interests of infants, the unborn, children, or incompetent persons involved in various legal actions coming before the courts.

These achievements are the pinnacle of some eight years of study, beginning in 2012 when Mrs. Ricketts was in her late 30s, at the International College of the Cayman Islands (ICCI), where she ultimately completed her bachelor's and master's degrees.

Commenting on Dr. Ricketts's achievements, ICCI's Dean and Chief Academic Officer Dr. Aleza D. Beverly, said: "ICCI is proud to have Diane Ricketts as an involved alumna who has not forgotten the sacrifices made to gain her education," by giving back to ICCI financially and professionally.

In so doing, Dr. Beverly said, the new doctoral awardee "is actually paying it forward to help students go on to achieve the success she has achieved. ICCI looks forward to a continued relationship with Dr. Ricketts."

Dr. Ricketts's thesis for her doctorate was on the topic of "service learning", which is based on the hypothesis that student engagement in local community service will impact many areas of the current and future lives of high school graduates. Her research focused on high school graduates aged 18-25 and included relevant school principals and teachers.

"It is my hope the results of this study will be helpful in developing effective strategies for future service-learning programmes," Dr. Ricketts said, adding: "I hope that stakeholders, such as principals, school supervisors, and policy makers, will find these results helpful in their efforts to ensure future graduates receive quality training and resources that will equip them for a lifetime."

Dr. Ricketts' academic achievements at Walden were recognised in the university's Fame publication.

Her PhD programme at Walden, where her support team included Drs. Gregory Hickman, Kelly Chermack and Rebecca Stout, was sponsored by the Cayman Islands Government.

That team was joined by a host of local supporting friends, co-workers, and family members, especially Dr. Ricketts's husband Robert and son Raget; and aunt, Mrs. Gloria Powell.

Mrs. Powell stepped into the mothering breach following the passing of Diane's mother, the late Hillary Hamilton, who, Diane said, always encouraged her to achieve academically.

Looking to the future, Dr. Ricketts said: "My passion is to advance the course of lives of the youth of the Cayman Islands. This is my dream, and I will be endeavouring to bring reality to that dream wherever opportunities present themselves."

the crisis in some nearby countries compared to the challenges the jurisdiction is now facing.

The migrants are said to be Cubans. It's not the first time that Cayman has had to address the issue of Cubans refugees arriving in our waters. That this has happened just days ahead of the official partial opening of the borders is just coincidental as far as we could tell.

What it does is throw up is the issue of border security and the practicalities of managing this particular arrival which has been made even more complicated in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Under normal conditions this would be a challenging prospect. But now, with conditions being anything but normal the implications for public health and border security are many and varied.

The new arrivals system comes into play this Thursday October 1st with the partial reopening of the borders replete with screening, tracing and quarantining protocols.


Just how robust it is will be put to the ultimate test if Cayman has to deal with an influx in illegal migrants, where screening, isolating, 'geo-fencing', security and upkeep pending outcome of complex immigration processing will come at a cost beyond the financial.

One hopes that such a scenario was factored into the planning and trial runs of the new arrivals system as how Cayman handles this situation might be a test run for what could possibly come. It might not. But preparedness precludes response.

It appears to have been proven that the two migrants are Cubans. Whether they came from Cuba or via a third country are other issues is another issue.

Assuming that they came from Cuba raises questions about why they left and conditions in Cuba.

The country's economy, struggling to hold on to the hopes ushered in by the Obama-era relaxation of US sanctions, has been dealt a devastating blow by the Donald Trump administration's relentless unravelling of almost anything that bears an Obama imprint.

And with its economy diving back into the doldrums, Cuba once credited for how it was tacking the COVID-19 outbreak is now faced with seeing those early strides unravelling under the economic strain.

Reports from Cuba suggest that the younger generation who had begun to get a taste of economic freedom are not prepared to suffer the privations of their parents.

And with the tourism industry literally on hold, especially the cruise sector which was an economic lifeline for Cuba, and the country's borders still closed, an escape valve could be taking to high seas once more in search of, well, hope.

Some see that hope in Cayman, where there's already an established Cuban community and where the challenges are no where near the scale of what's confronting Cuba.

The government here has been repeatedly credited for its handling of the public health aspect of the pandemic and it has taken credit for its management of the economy which has allowed Cayman to so far cushion the impact of the economic fall out.

But the longer the crisis lasts, the bigger is the looming economic challenge becomes.

An extensive repatriation programme has successfully seen many non-nationals returned to the home countries and overseas-based Caymanians returned home - generally at their own expense.

That repatriation plan might now need another chapter in the likelihood of what might be on the horizon. Trickles do lead to floods.

With the phased reopening of the borders, Cayman is looking at attracting

initially less than a thousand high-end, long-stay visitors and eventually launch its version of the new trend of the global remote-worker scheme.

Even those are being planned under strictly managed COVID-19 protocols.

How Cayman prepares for any influx of refugees could very well be its next test given reports coming not just from Cuba but also from Honduras; places where Cayman has had historical social contact.

Might it be so that the much-debated regiment might find its first deployment in maritime border security?

In that case, the remit of the Turks and Caicos Islands, just one of three other overseas territories with a regiment, might prove instructive.

Given their challenges with the influx of illegal Haitian migrants regularly turning up in sloops, TCI has mandated its regiment with supporting that jurisdiction's Maritime Police along with its other primary role of disaster relief.

Pension Holiday Period Extended for an Additional Three Months & Emergency Withdrawal Expires Next Month

To further aid in the rebound of the Cayman economy and to alleviate the financial strain the pandemic has had on industries, the National Pensions (Amendment) Law 2020 ("the Amendment"), in accordance with section 1(3) of the Amendment relating to the pension holiday, has been extended for an additional three months.

Cabinet has granted an approval for the pension holiday to expire on 31 December 2020 during which time all employers and employees will not be required to pay pension contributions into their pension plans.

Persons are reminded that the Emergency Withdrawal provisions within the



Amendment are due to expire on the 31st October 2020, as this section of the Amendment will not be extended.

THE ROADS LAW (2005 Revision) Section 3 Declaration of Intent Section 6 Authority to Enter Lands

In exercise of the powers conferred on the Governor by Section 3 and 6 of the Roads Law (2005 Revision), and acting upon recommendation by the National Roads Authority and Cabinet in the public interest, it is hereby declared that;

1. It is the intention of the National Roads Authority and in the public interest to open an access road as described hereunder:

REGISTRATION SECTION:

Prospect

REGISTRATION BLOCK:

22D, 22E, 23B 23C

BOUNDARY PLAN:

BP 634

PORTIONS OF LAND NEEDED:

The proposed roadwork is defined by boundaries outlined in green on BP 634 and listed in the Schedule below.





UCCI named ACCA online testing centre

The University College of the Cayman Islands is now an authorized centre for on-demand, computer-based exams offered by the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants. Scheduled paper-based exams have continued to be offered at the school, but online exams, which were handled in Cayman by a different agency, have been unavailable since March. A computer lab in the UCCI library, which can handle up to four students at a time, will offer the first seven papers for the Foundation (FIA) qualification and the ACCA qualification in five separate areas:

- Accountant in business,
- Management accounting,
- Financial accounting,
- Corporate and business law (LW-ENG), and
- Corporate and business law (LW-GLO).



Other ACCA exams besides these will still be paper-based and held at a specified times and dates in March, June, September and December. Those exams include:

- Advanced audit and assurance,
- Advanced taxation,
- Strategic business leader,
- Advanced performance management,
- Strategic business reporting and
- Financial management.

About 200 Cayman students take the ACCA exams annually. The Ministry of Education oversees the coordination of the paper-based exams, which are administered at UCCI. Now the school will also host the on-demand online exams. Scheduled computer based exams are not being offered by the school. The open dates for the on-demand exams are Nov. 23 and 24, and Dec. 1-10. Vice President of Finance Emily Huner said the ACCA's approval of UCCI as an online testing centre means students have better options. "It expands our testing center abilities," Huner said. "Until now, students have to travel to Miami or Jamaica" if they wanted to take the online exams. The school applied for the designation in the spring, but the acceptance pro-

cess was slowed down by the outbreak of Covid-19. The formal approval was announced on Monday (Sept. 14). Shelly-Ann Mohammed, head of ACCA Caribbean, said UCCI's testing centre will allow the accounting organization to continue the service it has had in the past. "ACCA has had a presence in the Cayman Islands for many years," Mohammed said. "The announcement means that over 200 students will now have the benefit of sitting specific ACCA papers right here at home instead of having to fly to another destination. A win-win situation for all stakeholders involved." UCCI has established a dedicated email address for all student enquiries at acca@ucci.edu.ky, and a dedicated phone line: 345-769-ACCA (2222). Students can pre-pay for the online exam sittings through UCCI's online payment portal https://ucci.caymangateway.com/. The ACCA FIA Exam is \$130 and the ACCA Qualification Exam is \$150. Students are required to bring their payment receipt to their exam sittings. Caribbean aware of Chinese stealth tactics

Barbados recently announcing that it wants to become a republic and break away from the rule of Queen Elizabeth is not the only control issue being discussed because China now has an inordinate presence in the Caribbean.

Through its emergence as an economic superpower, China has engaged in "debt diplomacy", lending to smaller countries to gain leverage. Barbados and its other Caribbean Commonwealth counterparts are among the most recent targets of this campaign. This form of diplomacy has forced far larger and richer countries to surrender sovereignty and influence to an assertive Beijing.

China's Belt and Road Initiative is involved in 138 countries on six continents and it is focused on the Caribbean, part of China's strategic thrust into Latin America.

Chinese loans for badly needed ports, roads, bridges, telecommunications and oil terminals come without the strings western inves-

tors attach and are often not commercially viable but subsidised by Beijing's foreign aid budget. Countries such as Sri Lanka have bitter stories to tell of what happens when they are unable to repay the debt. It was forced to cede control of its Chinese-funded port three years ago, handing a major strategic asset to Beijing.

The Caribbean offers clear strategic and trade gains for China. Planned projects include hundreds of miles of road through Guyana, reaching untapped markets of landlocked millions in Brazil, and

linking them to a rehabilitated port in Trinidad and Tobago. Barbados signed up to the BRI in February last year, just before Jamaica.


Yet only months later Jamaica suspended all borrowing from China over concerns about its indebtedness and a desire to balance its relationship with an increasingly alarmed Washington. Jamaica cancelled a Chinese-funded port project amid intense pressure over the environmental impact. Beijing, undeterred, switched to ports in Trinidad, Antigua and the Bahamas instead.

On Grand Bahama Island, a Hong Kong-based company has spent \$3 billion developing and expanding a deep-water container port. The Freeport Container Port's Chinese and Bahamian backers expect to benefit from increased shipping through the region as a result of the expansion of the Panama Canal, as well as an overall boost in trade between China and Latin America and the Caribbean. 🌐

Guyana elections chief arrested

Guyana's chief elections officer, Keith Lowenfield, has been bailed after being arrested on Saturday and questioned by police as investigations continued into alleged electoral fraud in the March 2 general and regional elections.

The police say several allegations were put to him in the presence of his attorney. "After being told of the allegations, Mr Lowenfield exercised his right to remain silent. Thereafter, a confrontation was held between him and a witness and once again

Mr Lowenfield opted to remain silent," a spokesman for the Guyana Police Force said.

He is already facing criminal charges for alleged misconduct in public office and fraud. 🌐

Grenada wooing rich Africans

Grenada has opened its shores to Nigerian and African high-net-worth individuals, looking to invest in the Spice Island, while it rewards them with second citizenship.

The Grenada government is looking to attract foreign direct investment, particularly in tourism, hotels, agriculture, manufacturing, and the services sector, and create both direct and indirect jobs for its citizen.

Known as the Citizenship by Investment (CBI), the programme promises investors additional free visa travels to over 149 countries including the United States, Russia, China, the European Union, the UK, India, just for a fee, after passing through the due diligence criteria of the Grenadian government.

"Our biggest challenge is hotels. And that is why we welcome investors since we have a need for more rooms,"

said Peter David, Minister of foreign affairs, labour and investment.

"Our manufacturing and service as well as our agricultural sector are not well developed. In those sectors, we are seeking investors. The CBI has helped in bringing some of our best investors hence, we continue to encourage more investors in all of those sectors."

David said the government has earmarked an expansive concession and industrial packages that are appealing to investors. 🌐

JLP stayed in after better campaign

The Jamaica Labour Party remained in power by a landslide victory because they ran a far better campaign, was the overwhelming view of people in a poll.

The general election was held on Sept. 3 and the JLP, led by Prime Minister Andrew Holness, won by 49-14 seats ahead of the main opposition party, the People's National Party (PNP).

The poll was conducted by Bill Johnson a week after the election. It found that 20 percent of PNP supporters thought that their party's campaign was not good enough in the country's 18th general election since 1944.

"Jamaicans believe the JLP won the recent election the old-fashioned way — by running a campaign that convinced voters they were doing a good job and were the better party to lead Jamaica for the next five years," said Johnson whose research team, on a commission from the Jamaica Observer, questioned 1,000 voters island-wide on issues relating to the election.

This was the second consecutive election in which the PNP — once regarded as the most efficient campaigner — has shown poor organisation.

After the February 2016 general election, former Prime Minister Bruce Golding said that the campaign the PNP ran for that vote was the worst he had ever seen from the party. 🌐

Antigua forges ahead with Sailing Week

Antigua and Barbuda is cautiously optimistic of staging its annual Sailing Week next year despite the uncertainty created by the global pandemic. Yachting stakeholders are planning events for the 2021 staging.

The Antigua Sailing Week team are working on the race formats and shore side protocols to ensure the safety of everyone who will be involved in the event and are already receiving entries from around the world to attend the six-day regatta from April 24 - 30.

With the importance of the event to the national economy and a vital part of the Caribbean season, the event creates welcome revenues for the entire islands which in turn facilitates businesses being able to support themselves over the long summer period. The cancellation of the 2020 event hit the organisation, which is a not-for-profit, and the island hard. In order to assist in creating a safe

and successful 2021 event the organisers are launching a 'Friends of ASW' programme.

Of the programme, president Alison Sly-Adams said: "Antigua Sailing Week was the first regatta of its type in the region and continues to today to create important economic activity for the island as well as destination marketing year round. In 2019 we estimated the event injected EC\$7.4m (KY\$2.28) directly into the economy." 🌐

Dominica allocates more homes

Sixty Dominican families have received keys to their new homes as part of the nation's 'Housing Revolution' initiative. Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit handed over the keys to 30 families in Grand Bay and to another 30 families in Jimmit.

The Housing Revolution project is fully financed by Dominica's Citizenship by Investment (CBI) Programme and aims to build thousands of hurricane-resistant and affordable homes for middle-income households. All housing units are built to the highest standards and can withstand natural disasters. The initiative aligns with the island's commitment to become the world's first climate-resilient nation, as pledged by Skerrit following Hurricane Maria in 2017.

The Grand Bay project is housing 138 people, including 80 children aged under 16.

Over a thousand homes have been constructed under the Housing Revolution project, accredited to funds generated by the island's CBI Programme. The Programme enables wealthy investors and their families to obtain Dominican citizenship once donating to the Economic Diversification Fund or buying into selected pre-approved real estate options. 🌐

Trinidad eases virus rules

Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley has announced that some of the COVID-19 measures can be relaxed as soon as Saturday, if Trinidad and Tobago's citizens continue to comply with the measures currently in place. He did not specify which measures would be relaxed.

Speaking at the Ministry of Health's virtual media conference, Rowley said that the country is currently on track to meet those goals but only if mask-wearing and other sanitation measures are maintained. Trinidad and Tobago had seen a recent spike in virus cases.

Going a step further to the completion of T&T's second 28-day cycle on Oct. 11, Rowley revealed that if the country can maintain a daily case intake of 20, it may be able to participate in the CARICOM travel bubble.

So far, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Dominica, Antigua and Bar-

buda, Grenada, Montserrat, St Kitts & Nevis, St Lucia and Barbados have qualified to be part of the arrangement, but not all those countries have been operating. 🌐

Cave Hill name change for Arthur

The Barbados government wants the University of the West Indies' Cave Hill Campus to be renamed after former Prime Minister Owen Arthur, who passed away in July, aged 70.

Prime Minister Mia Mottley told the House of Assembly that her administration approached the Vice Chancellor of UWI and recommended that the campus be renamed The Owen Arthur Campus at Cave Hill, The University of the West Indies.

"This is not a decision of the Barbados Government obviously, it is a decision of the University of the West Indies, and we will live with whatever decision they make. But we will strongly advocate for the Cave Hill Campus to be named The Owen Arthur Campus at Cave Hill, The University of the West Indies," Mottley said as she led off tributes to Arthur in the Lower House.

She said this "simple act" would "inspire another young boy, whether in Rose Hill or a young girl in Bush Hall, or a young boy in Hindsbury Road, to believe that they can be the best that they can be in this country".

Arthur was Barbados' longest serving prime minister, from 1994 to 2008. 🌐

Miami must put Heat on LeBron

Miami Heat fans in the Cayman Islands are thrilled that they are in the NBA Finals but that elation is tempered by the fact that their former talisman, LeBron James, is on the opposing side now.

LeBron was a solid favourite to return to the championship round once the LA Lakers got Anthony Davis, while the Heat are surprise finalists.

The Lakers bring a pair of All-NBA first-team members while Miami have not had anyone on that level since James left Florida in 2014.

But Miami should not be underestimated, regardless of what happened in the first game on Wednesday night in the Orlando bubble. The Heat chopped through arguably a tougher path than

the Lakers by beating the Bucks and Celtics and did so quite comfortably. Most important, the confidence and swagger of their youngsters is soaring. They believe that they can repeat the unexpected feat of the Raptors last year who surprisingly won the championship.

Miami are placing a burden on rookie Tyler Herro and second-year players Bam Adebayo and Duncan Robinson, but so far none of them have succumbed to stage fright. Rather than settle for simply growing into being a contender, the Heat's mind set is they can be champs, despite the obvious star power of James and Davis.

It's astonishing how much of Jimmy Butler's indomitable spirit has rubbed off on his teammates. They embraced his positivity from day one.

It is a credit to Butler, who did not respect the personnel in Minnesota or Philly and followed his instincts to Miami, which at the time did not have proven stars, yet had a spirited group that apparently only needed a leader.

However, if the heavily-favoured Lakers maintain the same intensity they played with in the previous three rounds, then Miami may struggle. LeBron is playing in his 10th NBA Finals and

wants a fourth title, which he would win with a third team.

He is anxious to accomplish that rare feat and knows where it will place him in the pantheon of legends. With James locked in and Davis enjoying his deepest run into the post-season, they look set for the title. For the storied Lakers franchise, this 17th championship seems theirs to lose.

Butler is the Heat's leading scorer, doing so by drawing fouls, attacking the rim and shooting from deep. Goran Dragic was not expected to be a primary option this late in his career, but he is defying that theory. If this continues, he will be a handful for Danny Green and Rajon Rondo, the Lakers' best defensive guards.

After sitting Dwight Howard during the Rockets' series, the Lakers unleashed the big man and he left an impression against the Nuggets. This time it won't be so easy. Miami lack a scoring-minded centre, despite how productive Adebayo was in the closeout game against the Celtics. Howard's minutes might be rationed again, unless Adebayo gets his number called more often than anticipated. The Lakers can put LeBron against Bam and get away with it.

The Heat's three-point shooting was spotty in their last three games against the Celtics, but with Duncan Robinson and Tyler Herro on form, anything is possible. 🌐

Adesanya can't wait for next fight

Israel Adesanya was in sensational form again in defending his UFC middleweight title then immediately called out the opponent he wants next.

Adesanya wants Jared Cannonier for his next scrap after demolishing Paolo Costa.

The "Last Stylebender" stunned the Brazilian by retaining his middleweight title with a second round knockout. The clash of the undefeated fighters was expected to be a hard-fought, tight affair, but it never was. Costa had taunted him and there was a lot of bad blood in the build-up.

Adesanya extended his perfect record to 20 wins. He brutally dropped Costa with a vicious right before pounding him with ground strikes.

Celebrating his famous win, the 31-year-old Nigerian who is based in New Zealand, said after the fight: "I know this game, I don't just play this on EA Sports, I play this for real, so when I do this, I know what I'm talking about."

"I still have to watch it again, little bit sloppy, but I'm a dog and I do

what I do. I still don't like him. I don't know him personally, I don't wish he dies or anything, he's alive, I let him be alive.

"I want to spend time with my family because it's been a crazy year, so I want to go spend time with my people. Cannonier, I want Cannonier next."

That's assuming American Cannonier brushes aside Robert Whittaker when the pair clash later this month at UFC 254.

Whittaker, 29, will head into the bout with 21 wins from 26 fights while Cannonier has 13 wins from 17. The pair were due to fight at UFC 248 in March but it was called off with Whittaker citing personal reasons. 🌐

Wilson already looks certain to be MVP

Russell Wilson's must be the most spoken in football circles this week after his three mesmerising performances as the Seahawks quarterback. By far the most outstanding candidate for regular season MVP, Wilson has run up all sorts of records in those few games.

"I love winning, I love winning, I love winning, I love winning," Wilson said Sunday after Seattle's 38-31 victory over the Dallas Cowboys. Nobody can contradict that.

Winning isn't new to Wilson—he's been doing it for most of his career. Seahawks have gone 89-41-1 since he entered the NFL in 2012, the best record of any team after the Patriots. He's earned one Super Bowl ring, nearly got another, and in nine seasons, he's missed just two total snaps (not counting garbage time). Since he entered the league, Wilson has been the most successful and dependable quarterback apart from Tom Brady. What's new this year, though, is how Seattle is winning.

Wilson, 31, has recorded 14 touchdown passes so far this season, the most through three games in NFL history and double his previous three-game high. He is also the first player to ever have

at least four touchdown passes in each of his first three games in a season, and he is on pace to rack up 74 touchdown passes in 2020.

Those numbers are partially a product of head coach Pete Carroll's dramatic rethinking of Seattle's outdated ground-and-pound running approach, and so far, so good. The team is 3-0 for the first time since 2013, when Seattle went 13-3 and won a Super Bowl.

Wilson's parabolic touchdown passes, ridiculous ability to extend plays with his legs, and immense calmness amidst chaos has the Seahawks looking like the most well-oiled of the NFL's many passing machines. 🌐

Messi is back - but Fati is new hope

Barcelona kicked off their La Liga campaign with a comprehensive 4-0 win at home to Villarreal on Sunday night but the team spirit will take some time to rebuild.

All four goals arrived in a one-sided first half as Ansu Fati struck twice, Lionel Messi added another from the penalty spot and a fourth arrived from an own goal by Pau Torres just before the break.

Messi is the obvious star but Barcelona have reportedly turned down a mammoth offer for Fati, the 17-year-old won-

der kid who looks destined to emulate his Argentinian teammate.

Barcelona have already rejected a \$150 million bid for Fati, according to reports in Spain. Manchester United have been linked with him, although the club which made the offer has not been named.

When Fati was promoted to the senior squad this summer his release fee rose from \$148m to \$390m

That is almost double the current world record transfer fee paid when Paris Saint-Germain signed Neymar in 2017.

Marca, the sports newspaper, claims it was taken to the Barca hierarchy by super-agent Jorge Mendes, who has recently started representing newly-capped Spain international.

Besides United, the report adds that Manchester City, Liverpool and Chelsea are also interested in the highly-rated forward.

Fati's current contract expires in 2022 and the La Liga giants are keen to extend his stay beyond that.

New Barca boss Ronald Koeman has got a tough job in trying to get the club back on track after they underwent their first season without a trophy in 12 years last term.




