## Get your Vaccine



Hon. Premier Alden McLaughlin is urging residents to “collectively once again come together to do the right thing and get vaccinated and protected against the virus.”

He was speaking at a government press conference a few hours after he along with other senior government and health officials took the first jab in Cayman to start the National COVID-19 vaccination programme.

In a direct challenge to those persons who question this and other vaccines - otherwise known as anti-vaxxers - the Premier had this message:

“Today, going forward we have this opportunity again with this vaccine, but I’m afraid that the doubters are again raising their heads and creating unnecessary fear and concern around the safety of the vaccines. My people we did not let the doubt-

ers win last time and I implore you to not let them win this time.”

Mr McLaughlin pointed to his own decision to be vaccinated today.

“The governor, the minister and other elected members, as well as senior doctors, took the vaccine this morning because we know it is safe and we know it is the right thing to do,” he said.

The Premier also emphasised the important link between the vaccination campaign, reopening the borders and the implications for the economy.

“We know the hardships we have faced because our borders have for the most part been closed for the past nine months,” he stated.

Mr McLaughlin also stressed that the vaccine roll-out will be the “best hope” go-

## CRUISES NOT ON CAYMAN'S RADAR

“Cruise is not on the radar at all at this stage. Honestly, I don’t see cruise tourism resuming on any sort of significant level before next year.”

With that unequivocal declaration Hon. Premier Alden McLaughlin has taken Cayman off the cruise itinerary for this year at least.

“The cruise ship business is not really within our contemplation at this stage,” he stated.

The global multi-billion dollars cruise industry has been struggling to regain its footing after being quite literally crippled by the COVID-19.

During 2020 the pandemic caused a series of high-profile incidents of onboard outbreaks of the disease and deaths - especially with the saga of the Diamond Princess in Japan - as well as ships being barred from entering ports out of safety concerns.

The pressure on board ship was also felt on shore with countries having to treat seriously ill passengers in local medical facilities or arranging for them to be evacuated back to their home countries.

Cayman was not immune from those situations having had one cruise passenger die from COVID-19 complications after being transferred from a vessel and also closing its port to cruise ships.

That was one of only two deaths in the jurisdiction linked to the pandemic.

“I think we would have to be satisfied that the world was a very different place in terms of relating to coronavirus before we would even consider having the cruise ships come here,” Premier McLaughlin said, “because as they have demonstrated they are really crucibles for the virus.”

He was referring to the confined proximities of life on a cruise ship regardless of the size of the vessel where

The Cayman Islands Health Services Authority (HSA) Flu Clinic will be relocated to the General Practice Building, effective Friday, 8th January 2021.

The Flu Clinic will close early at its current location at 1pm tomorrow Thursday 7 January 2021. Persons wishing to visit the clinic from 1-5pm will be seen inside the General Practice Clinic.

The clinic will continue to operate from Monday to Friday 9:00am – 5:00pm in the General Practice Building at the Cayman Islands Hospital beginning Friday 8 January. A dedicated physician will be available as normal to treat patients in the clinic.

All persons with flu symptoms are advised to first contact the 24-hour Flu Hotline to speak to a health professional about their symptoms prior to visiting the clinic. Contact 1-800-534-8600, 345-947-3077 or flu@hsa.ky.

Flu symptoms may include:

- Fever



- Sore throat
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Chills

If you experience worsening symptoms such as:

# CRUISES NOT ON CAYMAN'S RADAR, PREMIER SAYS

passengers invariably are in close contact with one another.

The Premier's scepticism that cruise ships are "really crucibles for the virus" is borne out by the shockingly large number of cases and deaths connected to the coronavirus on cruise ships around the world.

Still virtually adrift, the sector has been looking at some semblance of recovery for this year banking a lot on the roll-out of vaccines and interest among cruise enthusiasts.

With Cayman effectively off the cruise itinerary for the rest of this year, the focus is on a national vaccination programme as a path out of the economically stifling effects of the pandemic here.

The emphasis will be on the stay-over tourism sector and a newly-launched Global Citizen remote worker scheme as Cayman looks to some semblance of further opening its borders by March beyond the limited access in place for the past three months since October 2020.

It is hoped that by the Spring around 70% of the population - approximately

42,000 people - will have been inoculated creating a ring of 'herd immunity'.

"Our borders cannot remain closed forever," the Premier said, "and we will not be able to maintain the bubble that we have created indefinitely. This vaccine is our best hope in the long term to continue protecting health and life for and life for Cayman and the world."

Meantime, the cruise industry is reporting that it is working to refloat its prospects with some limited cruising already restarting after many vessels were riding out the pandemic anchored at several ports around the globe including the Caribbean.

The industry body, Cruise Lines International Association (CLIA) said in its "2021 State of the Cruise Industry Outlook" report that it was hoping to relaunch cruising this year with a strong emphasis on onboard health protocols.

The United Nations World Tourism Organisation (UNWTO) has projected recovery in the cruise industry to start around the second quarter of this year after declining by 70-80% since last year.

It pinned its expectation on the roll-out of vaccines but cautioned that a return to 2019 levels could take 2½ to 4 years.

## Cayman International School welcomes students into new high school building

Cayman International School opened the doors of its new high school building this week, welcoming 160 returning high school students in grades nine through 12, its highest enrollment in the division to date. The high school expansion was completed in partnership with Dart and the school's governing body International Schools Services and marks the final phase of a \$60 million investment by the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation to double the capacity of the school.

The three-storey building spans nearly 100,000 square feet with 22 new classrooms, which include a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics) lab, four science labs, a technology lab, an art lab, band room, choir room and mixed-use classroom.

In addition to those spaces are five music practice rooms, 12 collaboration spaces, a black-box theatre, video production room, library, video production room, multi-purpose gymnasium, fitness room, faculty offices, open floor spaces on all three levels, a courtyard, fully-equipped kitchen, and accessibility features including an elevator.

The school's Director, Jim Urquhart, explains how the spaces collectively allow people to learn and work together in a fluid fashion.

"Learning is at once an introspective and a social endeavor and having these creative spaces allow peo-



ple to collaborate in small and large groups or quietly reflect in equal measure," said Urquhart. "These additional indoor and outdoor spaces allow for progressive and purposeful programme expansion in the high school, as well as school wide. Thus, we have space to match our increased enrollment and high

interest in our growing school community."

CIS' high school curriculum follows the school's modern approach to education based on American and International standards that are designed to prepare students for entrance into colleges and universities around the world. Among the high school's curriculum options is the globally-recognised International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme.

The new facilities were designed by US-based architectural firm Perkins + Will to provide a customised learning environment for lessons and extra-curricular activities. Rooms such as the STEAM Lab allow for a range of learning and teaching opportunities such as using 3D and laser printers, engaging in robotics or conducting research.

The visual and performing arts rooms are fitted with acoustic panels, padded floors, and ventilation for proper use of a kiln.

The completion of the high school building marks the end of a two-year

expansion project that includes the new Early Childhood Centre which opened in August 2019. The new facilities have allowed the elementary and middle school divisions to expand within the original campus, adding an extra class per grade and increasing the school's overall capacity to nearly 1100 students.

Since moving to Camana Bay in 2006 as the town centre's first tenant, Cayman International School has grown its student body from 206 to 820 today.

"Dart has a longstanding commitment to education and by partnering with International School Services, we continue to fulfill our shared vision of creating world-class education opportunities for students in the Cayman Islands," said Ian Downing, Dart's chief financial officer and director of the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation. "The first generation of graduates from CIS is now in the workplace and we are looking forward to seeing many more join each year. Investing in education is an investment in our future."



# OPPOSITION LEADER DEMANDS REMOVAL OF SPEAKER

Leader of the Cayman Islands Official Parliamentary Opposition, Arden McClean, is stepping up the pressure on Premier Alden McLaughlin to remove Speaker of Parliament, McKeeva Bush.

There have been calls from several quarters for Mr Bush to step down or be relieved of his duties in the Speaker's chair following his conviction on a series of assault charges stemming from an incident last February.

In a statement, Mr McClean details correspondence exchanged with the Premier over the matter and chides him for failing to act.

He said he had delayed writing to the Premier on the grounds that Mr McLaughlin would have needed time to discuss Speaker Bush's recent convictions.

However, the Opposition Leader said, "it soon became apparent

that the Premier had no intention of removing Speaker Bush; despite the continued public outrage and Speaker Bush's subsequent convictions."

He said he wrote to the Premier on December 24th 2020 "asking him to exercise the leadership needed and remove Speaker Bush" but said the reply he received on January 4th did not address his concerns and instead questioned his authority.

"The Premier's response displays a breath-taking level of contempt for the thousands of decent, hard-working Caymanians rightly offended and appalled that Speaker Bush continues to hold not only the highest post in Parliament but also the full support of the Premier and his Unity Government," Mr McClean said.

The Premier's response released by the Opposition Leader, show Mr McLaughlin stating: "Reports recently made to me bring into question on whose behalf your letter has been written, and indeed raise concerns about your authority to write in such terms on behalf of the Official Opposition," the Premier wrote.

It continued: "Consequently, before I respond substantively I would be grateful if you would confirm which members of the Official Opposition support your demand for the removal of Speaker Bush."

The Premier also referred to the relevant section of the constitution and points out to Mr McClean that "as Leader of the Official Opposition you must continue to enjoy the support of the majority of members of the Parliament who are in opposition to the government."

Mr McLaughlin, who leads the People's Progressive Party (PPM) coalition Unity government with the support of independent members, ended his letter by



challenging the Leader of the Official Opposition "to confirm that is still the case" that has he has the support of the majority of opposition MPs.

The opposition in Parliament is split into factions of the Official Opposition led by Mr McClean and independent opposition members. One of them, MP Ezzard Miller has been very vocal in demanding Mr Bush's ouster as Speaker.

Commenting on the Premier's letter, Official Opposition Leader McClean said:

"The Premier's willingness to sacrifice his integrity/principles on the altar of political expediency should worry him."

He also posited that with a general election due in four months, "it is quite clear that current members of this Uni-

ty Government are only united in their desire to protect their self-interests."

"No Member of Parliament should be allowed to remain in a publicly funded position following a guilty conviction, much less one involving violence against women. The Premier's refusal to remove Speaker Bush, whilst clearly politically convenient, lacks integrity and is an act of cowardice," Mr McClean concluded.

When the issue of Speaker Bush's tenure was put to Premier McLaughlin during a recent event, his response was: "I am not sure that the country will be well served now by my taking action which precipitates the collapse of the government and the holding of early elections, so we have to bear that in mind."

## Disqualifications of Electors

91(1) A person shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector in any electoral district who—

- (a) subject to subsection (2) is serving a sentence of imprisonment (by whatever name called) exceeding twelve months imposed on him or her by a court in any country or substituted by competent authority for some other sentence imposed on him or her by such a court, or is under such a sentence of imprisonment the execution of which has been suspended;
- (b) is a person certified to be insane or otherwise adjudged to be of unsound mind under any law in force in the Cayman Islands; or
- (c) is disqualified for registration as an elector by any law in force in the Cayman Islands relating to offences connected with elections.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1)(a)—
- (a) where a person is serving two or more sentences of imprisonment that are required to be served consecutively he or she shall, throughout the whole time during which he or she so serves, be regarded as serving a sentence exceeding twelve months if (but not unless) any one of those sentences exceeds that term;
- (b) no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed as an alternative to or in default of the payment of a fine; and



ing forward given the challenges of maintaining the current system of arrival protocols including quarantining.

"Everyone coming here must be quarantined at not insignificant cost for two weeks not to mention the inconvenience and the challenge of being confined for

that length of time. They must be tested on arrival and again before they can leave quarantine."

The premier admitted that "this is not a process that we can keep up indefinitely."

"Our borders cannot remain closed forever and we will not be able to maintain the bubble that we have created indefinitely. This vaccine is our best hope in the

long term to continue protecting health and life for come on and the world."

He again urged the public to get vaccinated, especially mindful of new strains of the COVID-19 virus now circulating.

"Two new strains of the virus that are much more infectious is an additional challenge. As a country, we have come through the worst of this crisis, but we now need to

provide everyone with the best chance possible to maintain the gains that we have made."

"In doing so will also protect our way of life and helped get back even more of the life we once knew."

According to Premier McLaughlin, "Last year was a tougher time than any of us can remember and we are not out of the woods yet."

# HEALTH MINISTER - VACCINE IS LIGHT AT THE END OF THE TUNNEL

Emphasizing that "we have to keep doing our part here at home to fight this deadly disease", Hon. Min of Health Dwayne Seymour, has again appealed to residents to get the COVID-19 vaccine.

Speaking at Thursday's government press conference he said although the vaccine is not a cure-all, it is a light at the end of the tunnel for Cayman in its battle against COVID-19 pandemic.

"I am proudly have joined this life-saving campaign with the islands first batch of COVID-19 vaccines being administered having taken my first dose this morning," Mr Seymour said.

"I can attest to the safety of the vaccine and confirm that I am feeling fine.

He again appealed to everyone to participate in the voluntary vaccination programme.

"I ask everyone in our community to come forward when it is open to your category. Although the vaccine is not a cure-all it is a light at the end of what has been a very long dark tunnel for so many people. We cannot become complacent."

According to the Health Minister, "We should all, if we are able, get vaccinated and do our part in the fight to help rebuild our economy to open our borders to travel freely once again...and of course the spend time without worry with our the elderly and those who are vulnerable."

## GOVERNOR ADVISES AGAINST VACCINE MISINFORMATION

HE Governor Martyn Roper praised the British government for providing the vaccine free of cost to the Overseas Territories with Cayman being one of the first in line to receive the Pfizer/BioNTech drug.

It is expected that other vaccines will be added to the list once they are approved, including the UK-manufactured Oxford/AstraZeneca drug.

He however stressed that the number of people taking the vaccine will have an impact on future supplies.

"We want to see a strong take-up of the vaccine in our islands. And as the premier said the vaccines have been provided at no cost to the overseas territories. This batch alone cost over 200,000 UK pounds, which excludes freight costs."



A first batch of 9,750 doses arrived on January 4th and is already being administered in two doses person at intervals of three weeks unlike in the UK where the vaccines are spaced at 12 weeks.

That decision has become a source of controversy between UK health experts and vaccine manufacturers.

British experts maintain that the first dose is the most important in ensuring immunity against COVID-19 with the second being a booster.

"So far on the trial run I expect the next batch to arrive on one of the next British Airways flights but that isn't confirmed at the moment," Governor Roper said.

"So we want to see a strong take-up of the vaccine in our islands. And as the premier said the vaccines have been provided at no cost to the overseas territories. This batch alone cost over 200,000 UK pounds, which excludes freight costs."

Mr Roper said it was "a really strong signal of support from the UK to the overseas territories, which are a really important part of the UK family, and as the premier said quite rightly, it shows the value of a very constructive partnership."

He also sought to reassure the public about the safety and efficacy of the vaccines and advised residents to do their own research and steer clear of misinformation.



# R3 Cayman Foundation Closes Out 2020 with Over CI\$1.3M Distributed in Grants

Social welfare organisations, including Feed Our Future, Meals on Wheels, Resilience Cayman, the Cayman Food Bank and Cayman's Acts of Random Kindness (ARK), were among the first R3 Grant recipients in June 2020.

Through R3's support of ARK, Sacha Miller was able to give her children access to much-needed medical care.

"I am forever grateful for their kindness and generosity that came at a time during which my family and I didn't know where help could come from. Everything became less stressful. My daughter was able to get her vision checked and speech therapy, and my son was able to have his mouth operation. Their help has been a blessing ever since," Ms. Miller says.

# TIGHTER ARRIVAL CONTROLS FROM MID-JANUARY

The Cayman Islands Government (CIG) is taking a more aggressive stance to reduce the risk of COVID-19 and its new strains entering the jurisdiction.

From January 14th all arriving passengers will be required to present proof of a negative COVID-19 test obtained before travelling.

Hon. Premier Alden McLaughlin has announced that this test - a chain reaction PCR COVID-19 test - must have been done at least 72 hours prior to their departure.

It will also be a requirement in order to board their flight.

"All travellers aged 10 and older will need to provide a negative test result from an upper airway swab given the new highly transmissible strain of the SARS COVID-19 virus discovered in the UK and more recently in other countries," the Premier stated.

The aim is to reduce the potential for in a surge of cases here.

There has been a constant stream of positive COVID-19 tests among persons arriving in Cayman mainly from the UK.

However, Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee has explained that the number of positive tests relative to the number of persons on each incoming flight has remained about the same on average.

The new arrival clearance regime being introduced by the government will require that the test be provided in the UK



from an accredited laboratory or the National Health Service.

A similar pre-travel test approved by American health authorities will also be required for persons coming from the United States.

Airlines will check passages prior to departure to confirm that an appropriate negative PCR test has been provided and will deny departure to anyone without proof of a negative test, the Premier stated.

Also, travellers will have to show Cayman Islands Customs and Border Control (CBC) officers documentary proof of a negative test either in paper form or electronically.

Premier McLaughlin said further details of this new system are forthcoming prior to its introduction mid-January.

"The reason why they're not available in some issues are still being worked out but we felt that it is important that we give people as much notice as we possibly can

of this significant change in the requirements," he explained.

With the outbreak of the new COVID-19 variant, said to be 70% more transmissible though not more deadly than the current strain, many countries have begun tightening up their border control and entry procedures.

Passengers arriving in England from all international destinations, including the Cayman Islands, are now required to present a negative COVID-19 test result before travelling, as well as their Passenger Locator Form.

Permitted travellers will need to take their test up to 72 hours before departure, whether or not a country is on the UK's Travel Corridor list.

The UK Border Force is carrying out spot checks on arrivals into England with the power to impose an on-the-spot fine of £500 (CI\$555) on travellers whose COVID-test paperwork is not in order.

## Antigua puts millions aside for LIAT

Antigua and Barbuda is underwriting the unprofitable LIAT airline at almost EC\$17,000 (KY\$5,200) per day to keep regional airline LIAT airborne.

The colossal figure was revealed during a post Cabinet press conference in St John's. The money is coming from resources borrowed over a year ago for the purpose of re-capitalizing the airline. A sub-committee of three ministers – Robin Yearwood, Molwyn Joseph and Lennox Weston – has been formed to track LIAT's progress.

They will be a meeting with decision makers and reporting back to cabinet in the coming weeks.

Information Minister, Melford Nicholas, said the monthly payments amount to around EC\$500,000 (KY\$156,000) a

month. Millions were put aside to keep the airline operating until full service can be resumed later this year.

Nicholas said the government still has the bulk of a US\$15 million loan from the ALBA bank in Venezuela at its disposal to help fund LIAT. The money is being held in an escrow account.

He said talks with prospective investors are also ongoing. In the meantime, the Antigua and Barbuda government is shouldering the financial burden alone.

## Jamaican sprinter opens marijuana clinic

Olympic sprinter Michael Frater officially opened a medical marijuana dispensary in Manor Park, Jamaica on Saturday.

It is called 4/20 Sports Therapeutic Bliss. Frater, 38, who was forced to retire because of injury, said the medical marijuana dispensary is an alternative treatment for the sick and injured.

Frater said that cannabis treatment helped him to recover from a bad knee, which affected him for years. Medics could not find a solution to his problematic knee after numerous visits to The University Hospital of the West Indies and a hospital in France.

"I tried it and within a month I was feeling brand new," Frater said. "I started studying about it and I realised that this drug which has been a taboo for most of my life is a miracle drug."

"Apart from the matter of business and sport, this is a commitment that has characterised your professional career and I have no doubt that it will characterise your business forever," said Samuda.

## Guyana starts oil wealth spend

Guyana's new found oil wealth will soon be benefiting its citizens, according to a cabinet minister.

Guyanese can look forward to the widespread transformation of the country's economy from February's national budget, said Mohabir Anil Nandlall, Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs.

The government is set to announce its budget February Nandlall said and promises "greatness" for Guyana and its people as the PPP/C embarks on its first full year in office.

The commencement of the new Demerara Harbour Bridge is one of many projects. Major highways are planned, including one to Brazil and the Deep Water Harbour in Berbice will be built.

He added that at least three international hotels will be built and another Marriot, Best Western, Hilton, Holiday Inn and Sheraton will be added as well as investment in manufacturing industries.

Nandlall also said more airlines are expected to debut their service to Guyana, while new, large oil

companies would start operations there. "Look at the budget. Tens of thousands of projects are unfolding.

This is the year the boom will begin. That is how the PPP plans to unfold governance this year."

## Grenada PM: I won't retire after all

Prime Minister Dr Keith Mitchell has changed his plans and will not be leaving public life before the 2023 general election.

During the campaign for the 2018 general election Mitchell, who leads the ruling New National Party (NNP), insisted that he will not contest another general election.

However, Mitchell said that he has had to change his plans about handing over leadership.

"A decision has been made, I would have preferred not to have but there are rationales based on my own colleagues' views and general perceptions that the right time will have to be after the next election to hand over the reins to someone," he said.

"So, it looks likely, highly likely that I will certainly run unless I have some health issues or physi-

cal problem," said Mitchell who has served in the Parliament for almost four decades.

He turns 75 in November.

The NNP was returned to office in the last election by landslide with all 15 constituency seats won. As a result, there was not an official opposition in the Lower House of Parliament until Tobias Clement, who represents St George's North East, crossed the floor and became the Leader of the Opposition.

## Dominica focuses on airport and housing

Dominica's Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit insists that with so many projects planned, 2021 will be an exciting one despite the global pandemic.

"2021 is going to be a very exciting year for Dominica," Skerrit said on DBS Radio. "You know, in every disappointment there is a blessing and we have to ensure that we take advantage of the blessing and going into 2021, there are many important projects and programmes that our country can look forward to."

He identified the international airport as the major infrastructural project. "We have finalised negotiations for the lands, we have started to clear the sites for the construction of the residencies for those persons being affected by

He said this will be a major investment for Dominica to create mass employment. There are numerous housing projects underway too. "Housing continues to be a major need in our country and we have given a commitment to build 5,000 climate resilient homes and that's what we are doing," Skerrit said.

# AN AMERICAN INSURRECTION. THE UNRAVELLING OF THE TRUMP PRESIDENCY

Cayman and the rest of the outside world continue to watch on in amazement, glued in shocking disbelief to the unfolding drama in America.

Outgoing president Donald Trump's continued resistance of the outcome of last November's presidential election is widely seen as fuelling the storming of the Congress on Wednesday, January 6th.

For many, it's a day that will live on infamy in US history and will be the abiding legacy of the Trump presidency.

Under mounting pressure, Mr Trump, appearing to be somewhat chastened, issued an appeal late Thursday distancing himself from the events of the previous day, calling for "healing", and committing to an orderly transfer of power.

That's after declaring to his crowd of supporters just 24 hours before at the Washington rally on Wednesday: "We will never give up. We will never concede."

Mr Trump has been chastised for inciting and condoning the conduct which led to Wednesday's attack on the Congress.

Even some of the handful of his closest personal international allies, among them British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, are separating themselves from the increasingly isolated outgoing president.

"In so far as he encouraged people to storm the Capitol, and in so far as the president has consistently cast doubt on the outcome of a free

and fair election, I believe that was completely wrong," Mr Johnson said.

"I believe what President Trump has been saying about that has been completely wrong and I unreservedly condemn encouraging people to behave in the disgraceful way that they did in the Capitol."

There's now a mounting crescendo of calls from within both Democrat and Republican circles in the US for Mr Trump, to be held criminally liable, removed from office or impeached.

There's also been a spate of resignations from his cabinet and others are expected.

Mr Trump is due to demit office on January 20th when Democrat Joe Biden will be sworn in as the 46th President of the United States, an eventuality that the soon-to-be ex-president now seems to have reluctantly and belatedly accepted.

He however continues to insist that last November's presidential election was flawed and that victory was "stolen" from him.

Even leading up to the election Donald Trump was accused of already fanning the flames suggesting that if he lost it would only be due to the polls being rigged.

It came to be a mantra of a self-filling prophecy orchestrated by Mr Trump which he also attempted to insert into the Congressional elections, especially in Georgia.

Up to early last Wednesday, the southern state was 'elections central' with attention in the US and globally focused on the outcome for

which control of the US Senate was hanging in the balance.

Here in Cayman, interest in the Georgia run-off was piqued as the two Republican Senators in the race had written a joint letter seeking leniency for Georgia teenager Skylar Mack jailed here for violating quarantine regulations in a case extensively covered in US and global media.

They however lost to their Democrat challengers tipping the balance in the Senate to the Democrats in an historic outcome for both the state and the US Senate.

But the anticipated Trump push-back didn't come although one the Republican Senators he's campaigned for had initially questioned the voting.

By then Cayman and global interest had shifted to the political drama in Washington where the session in Congress confirming Electoral College votes for Joe Biden's presidential victory was suspended when rioting Trump supporters overran the chambers.

In the ensuing mayhem, four people died including a rioter shot by police. A police officer later succumbed to injuries bringing the death toll to five.

The reckoning is now itself slowly unfolding with calls for rapid justice putting Mr Trump at the heart of the what many including incoming president Joe Biden, and global leaders, commentators and historians are calling an American insurrection.

Mr Trump tweeted on Friday that he won't be attending Presi-

dent-elect Biden's inauguration on January 20th.

It would be the first time since 1869 that an outgoing US president would have snubbed the swearing-in of his successor.

That tweet was the first day of back on Twitter for Mr Trump, a prolific tweeter, since his account was restored after it was blocked on Wednesday for violating rules against incitement. His Facebook account has also been suspended his account indefinitely on similar grounds.

He also used it to remind of his large base of loyal supporters.

Meanwhile, if Mr Trump had any plans decamping to his resort in Scotland, the Scottish First Minister Nicola Sturgeon has advised that he won't be welcome as he would be violating Scotland's strict COVID-19 border regulations.

On his way out, Donald Trump leaves in his wake a deeply polarised America.

Healing must be priority number one for the incoming administration.

## TRUMP IMPEACHED FOR INCITING INSURRECTION

With his presidency in tatters, the epilogue to Donald Trump's tenure in the White House was being indelibly etched in history this week.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi tabled articles of impeachment against the outgoing president on Monday for "incitement of insurrection" in connection with the attack on the Congress by a mob of Trump supporters last Wednesday.

It's a crucial step in a series of measures aimed to forcibly remove Mr Trump from office if Vice President Mike Pence refuses to enact the 25th Amendment of the US Constitution which empowers him to move against the president, or unless Mr Trump voluntary resigns.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Mr Trump "represents an imminent threat" to the US Constitution and democracy.

The article of impeachment accused him of "high crimes and misdemeanours" saying he "gravely endangered the security of the United States and its institutions of Government"

This makes Mr Trump the only US president to have been impeached twice, which, despite the eventual outcome would be a further blemish on his already controversial presidency.

It also marks the culmination of a calamitous and tumultuous four years at the helm of the US government.

An inflammatory, rhetoric-laden address by Mr Trump at a Washington rally last Wednesday is widely regarded as the catalyst for the storming of the Congress, despite some of his supporters blaming it on "infiltrators".

Five people died as a result of last Wednesday's raid including a male police officer who succumbed to injuries inflicted by the rioters, and a female rioter who was shot by police.

Mr Trump has subsequently issued statements seeking to distance himself from the incident despite being widely seen as a key instigator.

Arrests continue to be made of many rioters captured on video. There

has been no evidence so far that they are other than Trump supporters.

In addition to the legislative actions initiated against him for his role in what is referred to as the "insurrection", Mr Trump has also been banned from several social media platforms for violating their codes against incitement.

His electoral organisation and the Republican Party have already

faced a backlash with some funding support being withdrawn.

Several Republican politicians have distanced themselves from the besieged outgoing president with some calling on him to resign.

However, support for Donald Trump remains strong among his party political loyalists and his huge support base.

# UFC never really went away

Lovers of mixed martial arts were treated with virtually unbroken events last year despite the global pandemic largely through UFC president Dana White's determination. The action continues soon with superstar Conor McGregor making a welcome return.

UFC events were staged behind closed doors from March with some truly memorable action. Kamaru Usman beat Jorge Masvidal at UFC 251 on 'Fight Island' in July and the company was back in Abu Dhabi in the autumn as Israel Adesanya defended his middleweight title against Paulo Costa.

In October, Khabib Nurmagomedov claimed a stunning win over Justin Gaethje in the UFC 254 headline bout before the legendary Russian retired from the sport. White is attempting to entice Khabib back and expectations are he will return soon.

McGregor is on Fight Island, Abu Dhabi in a rematch of his 2014 fight with Dustin Poirier on Jan. 23 in the first fight of the year, at UFC 257. McGregor took to Twitter to make a vow to his legion of supporters.

He tweeted: "I promise a masterpiece." The 32-year-old Irishman promises to silence his doubters and has also declared he is "staying away" from his Proper 12 Whiskey in the build-up to it.

He launched the drink in 2018, which is based on his birthplace Crumlin being the 12th postal district of Dub-

lin. He regularly posts snaps and clips of himself enjoying a nip of the whiskey.

Notorious is clearly taking his training in the build-up to the fight a lot more seriously than he did for his infamous defeat to Nurmagomedov in 2018.

He joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and expectations were low at a weaker franchise. But new team, same swash-buckling playoff success for Brady.

Brady threw for 381 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Bucs past Washington 31-23 in their NFC wildcard game Saturday night for their first playoff victory since 2002.

Brady made the most of a lack of pressure to carve up the NFL's second-ranked defence on 22 of 40 passing.

While Bill Belichick and the Patriots watched from home with their playoff

streak snapped at 11 following a 7-9 season, Brady could yet play in another Super Bowl in his new home stadium.

There's not much slowing Brady, who at 43 years, 159 days passed George Blanda as the oldest player to throw a TD pass in a playoff game.

## Curry is piping hot again

Steph Curry missed big chunks of last season through injury and some thought he may be finished as a potent force, but his amazing scoring display last week proved the doubters wrong.

Curry was aware of the numbers he was hitting as he bombed in a crazy career-high 62 points in a 137-122 win over the Portland Trail Blazers.

This was not only an NBA season-high and eight points more than Curry had ever scored before, but they were the most by a Warrior since Rick Barry notched 64 points in 1974.

Curry finished 18 for 31 and 8 of 16 on 3-pointers after beginning with a 21-point first quarter. The 32-year-old also topped 50 points for the seventh time in his career.

The brilliant form has continued. Curry scored 38 points Friday as the Warriors beat the Los Angeles Clippers 115-105. used a 34-6 flurry bridging the third and fourth quarters to stun the visiting Clippers in San Francisco.

The Warriors trailed by 21 late in the third quarter but Curry scored 19 in that period and pulled Golden State within six entering the fourth.

Golden State snapped a four-game losing streak against the Clippers, who beat them at the Chase Centre two nights earlier. Curry got his payback after being held to just 13 points in Wednesday's loss.

## Canelo named WBA Boxer of the Year

Saul "Canelo" Alvarez won the World Boxing Association Best Boxer of the Year award for his victory over Callum Smith to confirm himself as the top pound-for-pound fighter.

Boxing had many setbacks but managed to move forward. The end of the year could not have been any more perfect, with an impressive reappearance by Canelo on Dec. 19 against the previously unbeaten WBA super-middleweight champion.

The 30-year-old Mexican had gone through contractual problems, casting doubt on his ring return. However, he stayed in the gym until they were sorted out. When resolved, Canelo was ready to face the 32-year-old Brit and defeated him by unanimous

decision at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas.

Canelo now holds the WBA and WBC titles in his only fight of the year. He announced that his plan for 2021 is to have three fights.

Alvarez was ringside watching his stable mate Ryan Garcia two weeks ago. Garcia finally proved he's more than just a social media star. The 'snowflake' jibe has been the constant taunts because the 21-year-old American-Mexican has such a huge social media following despite being a relative novice.

With a vicious left hook to the body, Garcia made a resounding statement with a seventh-round knockout of Luke Campbell in Texas. Unbeaten in 21 light-

weight fights, Garcia brings a new, younger audience into boxing, but this was about the respect he gained from the hardcore boxing community.

Garcia's hand speed, power and shot variety is impressive but he his defence is suspect

which against better opponents could be his downfall.

It was the biggest step up in his career, and early on it looked as though he might be in serious trouble as Campbell dropped him in the second round with a left hook. But Garcia overcame

his first ever knock down and his power and speed were too much for the 33-year-old Englishman.

This win raises the potential of mega-fights against Teofimo Lopez, Gervonta "Tank" Davis and Devin Haney. Garcia said he wants Davis most.
