The Party Is Over



The Cayman Islands does not have political parties which are distinguishable based on some clear political ideology, policy approach or vision for the country. The two political parties of modern times can be aptly described as “cults of personality” led by a dominant public figure or a big personality. In the case of the UDP and now CDP, it is none other than Mr. McKeever Bush. The genesis and nucleus of the Progressives was and is Mr. Kurt Tibbetts, even though he transferred party leadership to his apprentice Mr. Alden McLaughlin in 2013-2017 political term.

These two parties hardly function as a party except in the weeks leading up to election. Since May 2017 elections, the MPs of the two parties are bound tightly together in a quest to hold onto political power.

The irony of this is that the voting and donor base of the Progressives are largely persons opposed to the decisions and actions of Mr. Bush, and vice versa. Yet in 2017, when it was politically expedient to do so and advantageous to both the leaders of the Progressives and CDP they joined force to consolidate their power and political survival; they negotiated a deal that satisfied both egos and awarded each party leader with lofty, lucrative position – Premier and Speaker. This fragile alliance holds firm today and led to the early dissolution of Parliament to avoid the Progressives having to openly show their support for Mr. Bush remaining as Speaker. Had the Progressives and the Independents on the Government bench been willing to vote to remove him as Speaker, he would not be sitting in that role today. Both sides are actively seeking a better deal or counter deal with incumbents and potential candidates for the 2021 elections. This is the definition of a government of National Unity.

It is almost certain the 2021 elections will result in another coalition Government. Voters will decide the future of the country. Voters need to educate themselves about the new candidates and incumbents putting themselves forward as candidates in April. Voters need to answer these questions as they compare candidates:

1. What values and principles does the person stand for?
2. What have they done in leadership roles?

3. Who and whose interests do they represent?

4. Does their track record line up with what you need in a leader?

5. Where do they stand on the most pressing issues facing our country: public education, cost of living, affordability of healthcare, the rapidly increasing inequality, environmental protection and management, and housing costs?

As voters, be prepared to ask them tough questions and demand straightforward answers on the key issues.

When campaigning, the incumbents are known to say and do anything to keep their positions, power, compensation packages and perks. For many individuals getting elected is like winning the lottery. Majority of them have never had it so good and couldn't otherwise earn such a generous package based on merit or competence.

The country has a choice to make in the upcoming election.

What does the country want? Does the country want a change for the better? Does the country want qualified candidates with a proven track record of success, capable and willing to fix some of the complex issues that have been neglected and gotten worse these past 4 years?

Or does the country want more of the same policies and incompetence? Does the country want to give the incumbents another well paid 4 years to make deals for themselves, advance their own pecuniary interests and the interests of their political donors while they make excuses to the voters who live with increasing uncertainty and frustrations?

It is bad enough that the current Unity Government failed to provide practical solutions to the most pressing issues facing all Caymanians, as leaders they have failed us on the most fundamental of issues – the ability to know the difference between right and wrong. The current unity Government has shown us that when it comes to making the hard decisions, they do what is easy instead of doing what is right.

Look at their track record.

After the last 4 years, during unprecedented economic growth and prosperity for a select few, majority of Caymanians are worse off. With a construction boom that saw nearly 800 new projects approved in 2020, the Government has not ensured a robust technical and vocational training programme for Caymanians to earn trade jobs in the construction industry. The construction industry is hot as can be, yet the majority of Caymanians are still unprepared and left behind, with no practical way of getting the qualifications, the

soft-skills and the apprenticeships they need.

Unemployed persons from the tourism industry cannot easily get retrained or upskilled to move into another industry. Instead, unemployed Caymanians are to be satisfied with handouts from charities and the Government relief payments, the twice a year NICE programme at \$10/hour. The bureaucratic administration that doesn't work for Caymanians seeking work or for employers looking to hire Caymanians.

Top of the list of failures is public education. All Government schools are rated weak or satisfactory. Government schools are attended by mostly Caymanians. Yet, Government spends 12.5% of its budget on education. What does that tell you? It tells what they are doing is failing our children and putting them at a disadvantage. What they are doing is not working. Not working for our children and not working for employers.

Another failure is lack of a practical way to balance environmental protection with physical development. There is no vision for the country, no national sustainable development plan and no attempt to balance the competing interests of the environment and the society with the insatiable lust for more and more development which results in construction politics.

Ask them who exactly is all of this unbridled development for? It is clear to me that it is not for Caymanians. The current Government and the Minister of Infrastructure, Planning & Commerce continues to give away hundreds of millions of dollars of current and future revenue in ad hoc grant of secret concessions via multiple Development Agreements that he has deemed to be “commercially sensitive” or “confidential information” in Parliament. This directly contradicts the precedent set in 2011 with the NRA agreement, a development agreement with the country's largest private investor (the original agreement can be found here <https://cnslibrary.com/wp-content/uploads/NRA-deal-15-December-2011.pdf> and each subsequent amendment was also public, with the current third amended version also available for public viewing (see <https://cnslibrary.com/wp-content/uploads/Amendment-to-NRA-deal-30-May-2016.pdf>).

If we are booming but Caymanians are left behind, who is the development for? If housing prices are going up, and there is not enough affordable housing, what are Caymanians to do? From housing to education and training, this Government has demonstrated they have no plan to help

lower income and middleclass Caymanians participate in the economic miracle taking place all around us. The Cayman Islands is the most attractive country in the region for foreign direct investment in almost all sectors, it has an open immigration policy guaranteeing a path to permanent residency and Caymanian Status for anyone with the right means and access, and thus accelerates the race to a population of 100,000. Is this what we want for our country?

The best part of the democratic process is we all get a chance to use our voice. Voters get the type of government representatives they choose. The power rests in the people.

Each voter has the power to be a part of the change that Cayman needs or be part of the status quo and outdated way of thinking about nation building which has exacerbated the divisions in our country.

Do we want leadership or representation that exercises the principles of accountability, transparency, and good governance, or is the political status quo that failed to follow its own constitutions and commitment to its members?

Is the political status quo that has proven to be lacking in solutions, integrity, morals and the willingness to do the right for the greater good enough for you?

On April 14th, 2021 you have the power to make the change for a better Cayman.

Cayman Airways 737-8 back to the Brac

Cayman Airways took to the skies with its first passengers on a complimentary day trip to Cayman Brac - a signal to the world that the airline's 737-8 fleet is back in business.

Onboard were government officials and business representatives, members of the public and the press.

The 737-8 was grounded in March last year following the Ethiopian Airlines tragedy.

During that time the entire global fleet of the Boeing-manufactured planes have undergone a comprehensive upgrade of their operating systems before being given the all-clear to take to the skies again.

The flight was greeted on arrival at the Sir Captain Charles Kirkconnell International Airport by students from the Brac's West End primary school, and the Layman E. Scott Sr. High School who also were taken on a tour of the aircraft.

Ten-year-old Sachy said: "I really liked looking over the airplane, and her friend Leia chimed in: "I like the fact that they had

first class and it was a really big plane with a lot of space."

Hon. Minister of Tourism Moses Kirkconnell said, "It's a very special feeling when you see the CAL colours landing on the runway; when you see the flight attendants, when you see the support staff, when you see the Caymanian pilots, it has to make everybody extremely proud."

Mr Kirkconnell, Deputy Premier and MP for Cayman Brac West and Little Cayman, said the Sister Islands "always depend on Cayman Airways as a tool for the people."

HE Governor Martyn Roper remarking on the turnout to see the flights touch down said, "There's a huge crowd that has come out to see the planes in the Brac and that's fantastic, because these planes are the safest planes in the world, especially given how much work has gone on to make sure they are safe."

Mr Roper said the 737-8 is "a fantastic addition to Cayman Airways" and called the airline "a national treasure."

Chairman of the CAL board, Philip Rankin said, "These aircraft can do a lot more than the 300's can and we can open up new routes because of the distance that these planes can fly. And of course, it's a major tool for Cayman tourism."

we have a national airline," Mr Rankin declared.

CAL CEO Fabian Whorms, anticipating a return to normalcy, stated: "We are taking it one month at a time. When things resume, Cayman Airways will be ready. We've weathered the storm of 2020, we are in a position where we know we can weather through 2021, so we are looking forward to 2022 being normal and better."

HEALTH CITY CI\$100 MILLION EXPANSION ANNOUNCED: SECOND MAJOR HOSPITAL PLAN IN TWO MONTHS

Another major hospital development project has been unveiled for Cayman.

This time it was Health City Cayman announcing CI\$100 million medical facility in Camana Bay in partnership with the Dart Group.

Work on the project was expected to start “within the next few months” with a timeline of two years for completion.

The facility will specialise in cancer care for both Cayman and overseas patients.

Welcoming the project which comes just two months after another major CI\$350 million hospital project was announced, Hon. Premier Aden McLaughlin said reflects a commitment to position Cayman as a leading centre for medical tourism.

“This investment by Health City, it's another opportunity to further reinforce Cayman as the flagship medical tourism destination,” he said.

“My government will continue to support such opportunities and where possible we are committed to safeguarding the health and wellbeing for all who live in the Cayman Islands and for those across the region.”

According to the Premier, in addition to the health and economic benefits, the project will also provide employment opportunities in the construction, medical and ancillary sectors as well as provide

opportunities for careers in the health sector.

Hon. Minister of Health Dwayne Seymour addressed the issue of the cost of healthcare and affordability which he said are matters that the government is looking into.

“My goal is to have ultimate health care security and close all medical gaps for islands. This means that no person would ever have to leave Cayman again for the life-saving or life-altering procedures. This expansion project brings us much closer to making that a reality”

He also said that he has been pushing for collaboration between the HSA and Health City to complement rather than to compete, “and I am pleased to see the growth and development of this relationship.”

Plans also include a satellite branch of the medical campus in Cayman Brac.

Mr Seymour called the project “a major step in ensuring all communities and residents of Cayman “regardless of geography to have access to affordable world-class healthcare”.

Speaking remotely from Dubai, Dr Devi Shetty, founder of Health City, said: “We will start a state-of-the-art facility for bone marrow transplant. Health City at Camana Bay will also have the most advanced Critical Care department for adults and children because we want every emergency patient requiring instant life support with the artificial heart demands to be treated within minutes.”

He also spoke of his dream “to see in my lifetime a kid from Cayman with magic in his fingers becoming a heart surgeon who I will personally train.”

Shomari Scott, Chief Business Officer at Health City Cayman Islands said expanding to where the majority of the population lives and works allows for better logistics and treatment for patients, especially when dealing with oncology and palliative care.

“We understand the burden placed on patients who need to travel back and forth to East End for their care,” he said. “We want and need to make health care easier, more comfortable and more convenient for our community.”

The project is being delivered in an undertaking between Health City and the Dart Group.

Dart's Chief Executive Officer Mark VanDevelde said: “Health City's decision to build their new campus at Camana Bay reflects our shared belief in the impor-

tance of planning for the long term and investing in ways that improve the lives of current and future generations.”

One concern has been the location of the facility in close proximity to the landfill but the Dart CEO assured that “with the landfill under remediation and new road infrastructure being built, Camana Bay's continued growth is further testament to the private sector's confidence in the country.”

According to Dr Binoy Chattuparambil, Clinical Director and Senior Cardiac Surgeon at Health City Cayman Islands, having a campus close to where the majority of people live and work would mean more lives saved – both adults and children.

“There are many incidences where time plays a significant role in the outcome of a treatment or even the life of a patient... so being centrally located will add much benefit to the quality of life and saving of many others,” he said.

On the issue of concessions, Health City Cayman Islands said it is not requesting any additional concessions outside of its original agreement with the Cayman Islands government.

It also said the services the expansion will provide will remain within the scope of the previously planned phases.

Once completed, this will bring to five the number of hospitals in the Cayman Islands.

CBC Statement on Exemption Granted to Spouse of Asylum-Recipient

Further to the previous Media Release dated 4th February, the Ministry of Employment and Border Control (MEBC) and the Customs & Border Control Service (CBC) recognise the legislative limitation within the Customs & Border Control Act, 2018, and its inconsistency with the principle of family unity under the 1951 Convention and the 1967 Protocol relating to the Status of Refugees.

As such, in December 2020, Cabinet granted approval to the Ministry of Employment and Border Control to amend the Customs and Border Control Act, 2018.

The Ministry is working with the Legislative Drafting Department to prepare an appropriate Bill for Cabinet's consideration.

In the absence of legislative amendments, a viable option to allow a spouse of an asylum-recipient to legally remain and

work in the Islands, is for Cabinet to exercise its powers in accordance with section 53(1)(b) of the Immigration (Transition) Act, 2018, and grant an exemption to allow that person to lawfully take up gainful employment.

Cabinet, at a recent meeting, exercised those powers in respect of the spouse of a particular asylum-recipient, thereby providing an opportunity for gainful employment within specified occupations for a period of two years. That decision was subsequently communicated to the relevant parties earlier this week by CBC.

Workforce Opportunities & Residency Cayman (WORC) will manage employment-related services, while CBC will continue to facilitate additional temporary support services.

In respect of persons seeking asylum as well as those who have received asylum,



CBC will continue to monitor individual circumstances and provide appropriate support in tandem with other agencies as necessary.

2020: an unprecedented year for youth mental health

Attendees to this year's Alex Panton Foundation's Youth Mental Health Symposium, held last Saturday at The Ritz-Carlton, heard how the Foundation had reached out to assist young people during 2020, a year in which the mental health of all generations took its toll due to the global pandemic and subsequent restrictions and worries that event has generated.

During his opening address at the symposium, Governor Martyn Roper said that youth mental health had been hugely impacted by the pandemic.

"My office has been acutely aware of the strain the lockdown and the continuing impact of the pandemic has had on the mental wellness of Cayman's youth community," he said, stating that remote learning, separation from friends and family, loss of family income, missing important life milestones such as graduation, fear

of the unknown, obsessive social media usage, the impact of undefined external exams, inability to take part in sport and uncertainty over travel, all had had negative impacts on youth mental health.

Youth mental health was a global issue currently, the Governor said.

"The UK is facing the biggest hit to mental health since the second World War," he said.

In the U.S., one study found 70 per cent of young people were struggling with mental health issues, while a recent UNICEF study found out of the young people they studied in Latin America and the Caribbean, 73 per cent felt the need to ask for help concerning their mental wellbeing, with some 40 per cent not reaching out to get the help they needed.

The Cayman Islands was therefore fortunate to have an entity such as the Alex Panton Foundation which championed, raised awareness for and supported young people.

"I was so pleased to see the Foundation jump into action with innovative ideas as to how to assist those most in need during lockdown, such as online forums, social media campaigns, and peer-support groups," the Governor stated. "I particularly commend public/private sector volunteers who launched a mental health hotline providing this vital resource at the beginning of the pandemic."

Collaboration by the Foundation with other entities such as the Red Cross and the Crisis Centre was also important.

"Collaboration and coordination are the key to making a real difference," he said.

The purpose of this year's symposium, the fourth annual event, was to look back over the past year and reflect on what had taken place with regard to mitigating the ef-

fects of Covid-19 on youth mental health, to help build resilience for them.

Alex Panton Foundation Chair and co-founder, Jane Panton, outlined the work the Foundation had done in 2020, highlighting their virtual interactive programmes such as the 'Stay in and Chill' programme, which reached out to young people, the emotional literacy pro-

grammes which had had a "phenomenal impact" on young children helping them to learn coping skills, support groups for people aged 18 to 30, and a recent addition of an online support group for teens.

"We are especially very proud of the impact of these programmes over the past year, which help to build a stronger, more compassionate Cayman," Mrs Panton said.

They will be on the Road, with beautiful costumes and plenty of feathers, albeit on a different date.

The Directors of CayMAS Carnival are excited to announce the provisional Road Closure approval from the Royal Cayman Islands Police Services (RCIPS) and the plans for CayMAS Carnival 2021. However, dates have changed due to the Covid-19 pandemic from the Discovery Day Holiday Weekend in May, to the Constitution Holiday Weekend, 30th June – 5th July. The Chairman of CayMAS Carnival, Mr. Brent McLean said. "July is the best Pandemic choice and the last long weekend until November which is Pirates Week. In keeping things localized we still have logistics to consider and to give the vaccine time for acceptance mainly and hopefully the local gathering limit to be lifted to allow us free movement in July, are the primary factors in the move. particular 7th February marks the start of Congenital Heart Defects Awareness Week 2021 that runs until 14th February.

CHD's occurs during the early stages of a mother's pregnancy when a baby's heart is forming. Identification Criteria:

Everyone must now present photo identification to receive the vaccine and demonstrate they are ordinarily and legally resident e.g. with initial permission to remain in the Islands for at least six months. This includes Caymanians, Permanent Residents, people holding Work Permits, as well as Global Citizens and their families.

Accepted ID's include:

- Cayman Islands Driver's License
- Cayman Islands Passport
- Cayman Islands Voters Card
- A Global Citizens Certificate (GCCP)
- Non-Caymanian passport showing approval to be on island for six months from arrival

- Work Permit extension letter
- Work Permit grant letter
- Job letter (from a local organisation)

If a visitor has already received their first dose, they may still receive their second dose.

Update to Vaccination Campaign Stage 2:

Stage 2 is in three groups: Stage 2, Group B will commence on Monday, February 15th. Please see schedule as this Group has been divided by Surname.

Group A

Anyone aged 16-60 with relevant medical conditions predisposing to COVID-19

Group B

Essential workers, teachers, school staff*

Group C

Those living at home with persons from stage one of the programme.

** Essential workers will include the following groups: teachers/school employees, supermarket workers, those working for the utilities, people working at gas stations, customer facing people working in retail banking, those working in hotels, restaurants and bars, those working for food delivery companies, caregivers and Civil Servants. All persons must present a work ID to show proof of employer.*

Stage 2, Group A - Proof of Medical Condition:

Anyone in Stage 2, Group A with a medical condition is required to provide a note from their doctor. Persons requiring a note from their HSA doctor are asked to request this by contacting the Flu Hotline flu@hsa.ky, 1-800-534-8600 or 925-6327.

Electronic and hard copies will be accepted at the vaccination clinics.

These medical conditions include:

- Diabetes
- Hypertension
- Cancer
- Heart disease
- Lung disease
- Kidney disease
- Autoimmune diseases or compromised/weakened immune system
- Asthma
- Down's syndrome (adults)
- Severe mental illness
- People on immunosuppression therapies sufficient to significantly increase risk of infection
- People with solid organ transplants



Caregivers

Public Health continues to vaccinate our most vulnerable population, specifically those 70 and over.

Caregivers of persons 70+ are eligible for the COVID vaccine in the continued effort to keep the most vulnerable safe. The vaccine is available for persons providing care for home bound elderly persons

Caregivers and persons responsible for the elderly in their homes can contact the HSA's Flu Hotline 1-800-534-8600 or 925-6327 to provide the following details: Caregivers full name, phone number, patient name, and date of birth. Once a caregiver has been identified, those persons will be approved for the vaccination and name checked at the vaccination clinic. Please check the schedule for your designated vaccination time.

Overseas University Students

University students who will be attending institutions overseas may also get vaccinated on their assigned day and must present university ID.

As a reminder, persons over the age of 60+ can be vaccinated at **any time** during the published schedule.

The COVID-19 vaccination programme continues to administer Dose 2 vaccinations for persons due from Stage 1, Group A, B and C. Persons who have received their first dose are reminded to get their second dose 21 days later or no longer than 12 weeks after the first dose.

If someone is home bound and unable to attend one of the vaccination clinics, they should contact the Flu Hotline 1-800-534-8600 or 925-6327 or their local HSA District Health Centre and arrangements will be made to with a Public Health nurse to provide the vaccine in their home.

Public Health will announce when Stage 2 Group C may come forward for vaccinations.

TRUMP ACQUITTAL EXPOSES RIFTS AMONG REPUBLICANS

The Republican Party in the United States has been thrown into deep reflection over its relationship with Donald Trump, following a partisan vote in the Senate that absolved the former president of responsibility for a deadly mob attack on the Congress on January 6th.

In an impeachment hearing followed around the world, the Senate failed - along party lines - to reach the two-thirds vote margin needed to convict Mr Trump.

Seven Republicans voted with the Democrats in a 57 to 43 split, 10 votes short of the required 67.

It was the controversial ex-president's record second impeachment hearing and again escaping conviction which this time would have banned him from running for the presidency again.

The depth of soul searching amongst Republicans over their party's future comes as Mr Trump is now strategising for another presidential run in 2024.

That splintering, already evident with key former allies distancing themselves from their erstwhile leader, was brought into sharp focus with an unequivocal condemnation of Mr Trump by Senate minority leader Mitch McConnell.

Shortly after he voted to acquit him, Mr McConnell launched a blistering attack on Mr Trump accusing him of being "practi-

cally and morally responsible" for the mob attack.

"They did this because they'd been fed wild falsehoods by the most powerful man on earth because he was angry he lost an election," he stated despite casting the equivalent of a "not guilty" verdict.

Continuing his condemnation of the former president's instigation of the attack, Mr McConnell said: "He did not do his job. He didn't take steps so federal law could be faithfully executed and order restored."

Despite that, Mr McConnell said Trump was not "constitutionally eligible for conviction" as he had already left office by the time of the hearing.

However, it was Mr McConnell, then as Senate majority leader, who had blocked an attempt by the Democrats to hold the impeachment hearing before he'd left office.

An emboldened Donald Trump said after the acquittal, "I always have, and always will be a champion for the unwavering rule of law, the heroes of law enforcement, and the right of Americans to peacefully and honourably debate the issues of the day without malice and without hate."

Meanwhile, President Joe Biden has decried the outcome of the process which



led to his political nemesis being let off the hook.

"Even those opposed to the conviction, like Senate Minority Leader McConnell, believe Donald Trump was guilty of a 'disgraceful dereliction of duty' and 'practically and morally responsible for provoking' the violence unleashed on the Capitol," Mr Biden said.

In a statement after the acquittal, he added: "This sad chapter in our history has reminded us that democracy is fragile. That it must always be defended. That we must be ever vigilant. That violence and extremism has no place in America. And that each of us has a duty and responsibility as Americans, and especially as leaders, to defend the truth and to defeat the lies."

LANDSLIDE WIN FOR OPPOSITION IN TURKS AND CAICOS

The Progressive National Party(PNP) has won an overwhelming victory in Friday's general election in the UK Overseas Territory.

Confirmation came from the office of Governor Nigel Dakin on Saturday morning that the party, which was in opposition, has swept the People's Democratic Movement(PDM) from power.

The PNP led by former Chief Minister Charles Washington Misick is reported to have won 14 of the 21 seats in the House of Assembly with victories in nine of the ten electoral districts, plus sweeping the five At-Large seats.

Mr Misick will be sworn-in as Premier replacing the PDM's Sharlene Cartwright-Robinson, the territory's first female leader.

Voter turnout was said to be high.

Grenada renews marine protection policy

Grenada is taking important steps to further protect its marine environment while creating opportunities for the sector. Pure Grenada is working with the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) to reduce marine waste coming from pleasure vessels such as yachts.

The project dubbed 'Integrating Water, Land and Ecosystem Management in the Caribbean for Small Island Developing States', will examine Grenada and Carriacou's current capacity and create research-based solutions to deal with waste in an eco-friendly manner.

Grenada is also set to implement a Marine Waste Management policy

with amendments to the existing legislation and the introduction of accompanying regulations. This policy will help the sustainability of Grenada's fisheries.

Besides winning the online Road March, he also won the Soca Monarch with a prize of TT\$150,000 (KY\$18,400). Carnival 2021 was cancelled because of the COVID-19 pandemic so it all went online.

He was presented with his prize at a ceremony at the TSTT suite, Queen's Park

Fresh hope for Jamaican gays

Jamaica should repeal its colonial-era gay sex ban, the top rights body of the Americas has said, in a symbolic landmark ruling on LGBT+ rights in the Caribbean. This ruling said Jamaica's law violated the rights of Henry and to human treatment, equal protection before the law, privacy and freedom of movement.

It is the first time the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights (IACHR) has ruled that criminalising gay and lesbian people violates international law, said the Human Dignity Trust, an LGBT+ legal advocacy group which brought the case.

Two Jamaicans who initiated the case in 2011 - after they were attacked by homophobic gangs and sought asylum overseas - said the 1864 ban on the "abominable crime of buggery" and "gross indecency"

legitimised violence against LGBT+ people.

"I'm overwhelmed with joy," Gareth Henry, one of the claimants who is now a refugee in Canada, said. "Gays and lesbians continue to be killed and tortured because they are deemed to be different," he added, describing how he was beaten by the police in front of a mob. The other claimant, Simone Edwards, fled to Europe after being shot multiple times outside her home.

A spokeswoman for the Jamaican government was not available to comment. Jamaica is one of nine Caribbean countries that criminalise gay sex. Homophobia is rife and the penalty for same-sex intimacy is up to 10 years in jail with hard labour. Gay sex is illegal in 68 countries worldwide.

Braithwaite added: "As we saw last year the weather and conditions are perfect well into the summer months and yachts looking for summer dock space, mooring or haul out and storage have many options

in Antigua and the end of season shipping options will also continue for those wishing to get back to Europe or North America."

He said that there are also locally based insurance companies with policies which can provide coverage over the forthcoming hurricane season.

St Lucia PM launches vaccine programme

St Lucia recently recorded three more virus-related deaths taking the death toll to 28 but at least it has started its vaccination programme in earnest. The health ministry claimed that all these three deceased had pre-existing medical conditions that contributed to their overall health downgrade.

There are 240 new coronavirus cases. The total number of cases diagnosed there is 2,860. At least St Lucia has begun the first phase of the coronavirus vaccine. Prime Minister Allen Chastanet received the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine's first dose on a live telecast at the National Television Network.

Chastanet was joined by his wife and several front-line workers in the country's vaccine drive. "My wife and

I joined in on the vaccination drive as a form of support to help build confidence in those who may be sceptical about being vaccinated," he stated on Facebook.

He stated administering the first vaccines is a great milestone for public health officials in reducing the COVID-19 outbreak.
