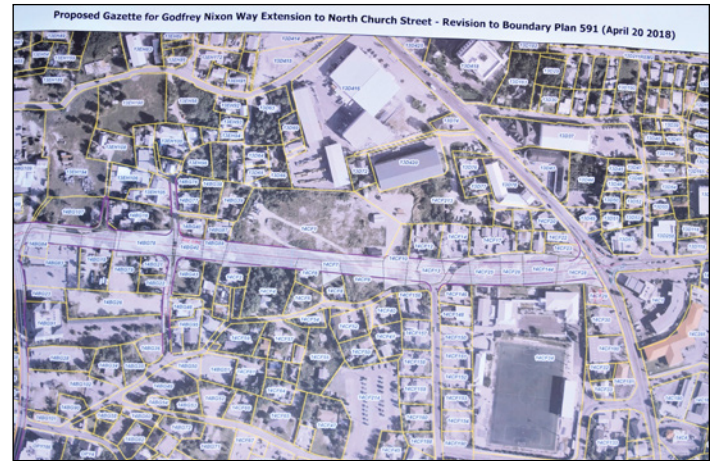
Extensive Road Upgrades. Part 2

Recently, Government Ministers and senior National Roads Authority officials showed the Caymanian Times and other media outlets some of the extensive road widening, extending and improving that is happening all over the island and has taken several years, both in planning and execution. The new improvements will cost more than 30 million, Infrastructure Minister Joey Hew said. It is part of a comprehensive transport strategy aimed at helping Cayman develop in a sustainable way as its population continues to grow.

Godfrey Nixon Way extension

One of the new roads that is not too far from completion is a large extension to the Godfrey Nixon Way, all the way through to (the area of Da Fish Shack on North Church Street / South Church Street. The new extension is going to employ what Mr. Hew calls the "Complete Streets Methodology," which is a new way of planning new roads to better accommodate pedestrians, cyclists and those using busses, helping them feel safer and encouraging them to be less dependent on cars. "plans are underway, and we are looking at opportunities to redesign the town and pedestrianize certain areas using parking garages, hop on and hop off services that allow people to park and move around the town freely. These are all ideas we are looking at in a very comprehensive approach to the traffic issue. The next step has to be a comprehensive study on public transport and the hop on hop off service is just one of those projects that we are doingand then we hope to do more ...our public transport and its not just about getting bigger busses or anything I want us to think outside of the box when it comes to public transport – how do we move people safely and comfortably, and how do we plan for the future? I agree 100 percent we cannot continue to build ourselves out of traffic congestion. We have to approach

this in a holistic manner, and that's what we're doing," Mr. Hew said.

The new Godfrey Nixon Way extension will also provide an alternate route for tour busses, as well as corridor for shipping containers at the Port area to be transported up to the holding area just off the North Sound Road.

Big new roundabout at the end of Linford Pierson Way

On the other side of town, the Linford Pierson Way was recently upgraded from a single lane each way to a two lanes, greatly speeding the traffic and making driving times from Savannah and Bodden

Town noticeably faster. But the end of the road is still single-lane each way, and so the whole of the last section of road and the small roundabout at the end represents a bottleneck.

for the last phase of the Linford Pierson Highway to get the three lanes all the way down to what is now known as the Torguga roundabout and Bobby Thompson way...so the roundabout that is left we will expand to six lanes, so there will be three lanes heading East and three lanes coming

into town. That small roundabout will become this massive roundabout.


New Airport Connector Road

When it is complete, the new Airport Connector Road will take traffic from the area of the Airport Long-Term Carpark all the way through, from the Environmental Health Building to the big roundabout which is also the turnoff for the International School on the Esterly Tibbetts Highway, enabling the traffic to move swiftly all the way from the Airport up into West Bay, The first phase of the connector road goes round behind the dump, and will finish at Sparky Drive, with the next phase taking the road right up to the Department of Environment building at Smith Barcadere, and the final phase all the way through to the Airport parking lot.

It is hoped that the new road will alleviate traffic considerably at the Butterfield Roundabout, especially at peak traffic times, and take most of the workers from Industrial Park and CUC.

CIFS Extinguishes Windsor Park Brush Fire

The Cayman Islands Fire Service has overnight extinguished the large brush fire that began in the Windsor Park area yesterday afternoon (Friday 12 March 2021).

A small flare-up earlier this morning was addressed by a crew on standby. No other issues have been reported and the area will be monitored throughout today as a precaution.

Approximately 18 fire personnel, one light portable pump, four tankers and one rapid intervention vehicle were deployed to fight the fire, the cause of which is under investigation.

It was reported on Friday afternoon that a large amount of smoke was emanating from the scene and there had been some reports of falling embers. All residents were asked to avoid the area if possible while the incident was being resolved.

Residents in the vicinity of the scene were requested to stay indoors as much as possible with doors and windows closed and were told to monitor air conditioning units for smoke intake.

DCR Opens its Doors in New Location

The Department of Community Rehabilitation (DCR) celebrated its office relocation with an open house event held on Friday, 5 March 2021.

In response to a steady expansion of services offered since its inception in 2003, DCR now operates from a larger fit-for-purpose space in Apollo House East on Mary Street, George Town.

The facility provides a safe environment for victims of crime and offenders to receive the necessary support they need to take positive steps forward in their lives.

DCR and its clients will now also benefit from being co-located with partner agencies within the building including the Department of Counselling Services and Family Resource Centre.

The Director of DCR, Ms. Lisa Malice welcomed guests which included His Excellency, the Governor, Martyn Roper, the Deputy Governor, Hon. Franz Manderson and the Minister for Home Affairs, Hon. Tara Rivers on a tour of the department's new facility.

During the tour, guests were shown a closet of donated clothes available to DCR's clients to wear for job interviews or similar if they do not have something suitable to wear.

In addressing those gathered for the open house, Minister Rivers reflected on the important work the department does for the community.

"Our shared philosophy has been clear. To reduce an individual's likelihood of reoffending, we must address the underlying issues that have contributed to their offending behaviour and equip them with the necessary tools and skills they require to deal with real life problems appropri-



ately, so that they can make a positive contribution to their families and their community," she said.

"This government's investment in new office accommodation for the department is a clear endorsement of the importance of DCR's work and a direct result of the recognition of the successes that their dedication and commitment has achieved to date," she continued.

The Deputy Governor shared that overall crime is down 16% compared to last year, and burglaries and robberies were also on a downward trend. He credited the brave men and women of DCR for playing a key role in our crime reduction strategy by assisting persons released from prison to become productive members of the community through the recently introduced Conditional Release programme.



The Deputy Governor also thanked Minister Rivers for increasing the budget of the DCR by 67% during her term in office, which has no doubt fostered the reduction in crime. "Thank you Minister for making the lives of these amazing civil servants better – they have now in turn made the lives of those they serve better as well," the Deputy Governor remarked.

Focusing on evidence-based practices, DCR aims to promote prosocial thinking patterns and develop skills to self-manage through a cognitive-behavioural approach to rehabilitation.

The department offers specialised services through the Judicial Department, the Prison Service and the Conditional Release Board in critical areas such as female empowerment, domestic violence, victims services, mental health, drug court and intensive supervision.

Clients under their guidance may be supervised through one-on-one sessions or may benefit from cognitive-behavioural and psycho-educational group services such as anger management, men's non-violence as well as a specific group workshop that focuses on healthy relationships.

"The open house event has been an excellent opportunity for everyone at DCR to proudly showcase the life-changing work we do every day. This new location signifies the growth the department has seen over the years and the importance of offender management, restorative justice, victim empowerment, and offender rehabilitation in our community. We look forward to continuing our work and welcoming partners and clients to our new space," said the Director of DCR, Lisa Malice.

COVID-19 Emergency Field Hospital at Family Life Centre demobilized

The emergency field hospital established at the Family Life Centre to support the local COVID-19 preparedness strategy was fully demobilized on Sunday, 28 February 2021. All assets of the 60-bed facility have been appropriately placed into storage by Hazard Management Cayman Islands (HMCI) should the need arise for the hospital to be remobilised or reallocated for other national and potentially regional disaster situations.

"Sustainability was the key word throughout the design and mobilisation stages of the field hospital. Everything was done with the objective of its remobilisation as a whole or in part in the Family Life Centre or in other locations," explained Public Works Department Senior Project Manager Simon Griffiths. "In addition, certain assets were chosen for relocation within the HSA once the hospital was demobilised."

A few examples of relocated equipment include the standby generator that will be sent to Faith Hospital in Cayman Brac and the mobile hand wash basins to be used at various locations including the Airport COVID-19 Vaccination Clinic and COVID-19 testing district clinics. The bed partitions and fully demountable electrical system will be stored in a warehouse

with other equipment from the temporary facility and may be utilised by HMCI for emergency sheltering purposes.

"It's pleasing to report that this attention to sustainable ethic has worked as even the plastic sheeting used to shield certain parts has been saved and will be used elsewhere," Mr Griffiths pointed out.

Coordinated by the National Emergency Operations Centre (NEOC) in collaboration with the government, charities and the private sector, the emergency field hospital was set-up in May 2020 to accommodate an overflow of COVID-19 patients should local healthcare facilities reach capacity. With effective implementation of precautionary measures such as social distancing, hand washing and the wearing of masks, the Cayman Islands was able to avoid an outbreak of COVID-19 and utilization of the field hospital.

"The NEOC and supporting organisations initiated this project with the single-minded focus of saving lives. We wanted to ensure we had the infrastructure in place to handle the very worst scenario," said HSA Chief Executive Officer Lizzette Yearwood.

"If the field hospital was ever to be utilised it would mean that all the beds of the local hospitals have been filled and we are

now in a national emergency situation," Ms Yearwood noted. "Therefore, it has always been our hope that the facility would not have to be used, but if needed, it can always be remobilised in a relatively short time."

The UK Association for Project Management awarded the Cayman Islands Government winner of the social project of the year category for the cross-sector project management approach taken for the construction and delivery of the field hospital.

Youngsters find new careers thanks to pandemic

The fallout from the Covid-19 pandemic has brought surprising benefits for three young Caymanians, who have seen their careers flourish thanks to changing circumstances, with great prospects ahead working within the automotive industry.

Nineteen-year-old Christopher Scott was working at a watersports company before the pandemic. Faced with the prospect of no employment in the tourism industry for the foreseeable future, he reached out to a former teacher who introduced him to Tony Williams, owner of Tony's Toys. Mr Williams decided to take a chance on Christopher, who had no experience but a general interest in cars and a willingness to learn more. Now he assists the technicians with oil, brake pad and battery changes and vehicle inspections.

Christopher said he was thankful to Mr Williams for giving him the opportunity.

"Sometimes that is all a person needs. Both this job and my previous one in water sports have given me work experience which I can use in the future, whether or not I end up in those careers," he said.

Amanda Robinson, 20, graduated from Triple C in June 2018 and was looking forward to completing an associate degree at UCCI before going off to the USA or

UK to earn a bachelor's degree in Human Resource Management, but the pandemic curtailed her plans to travel. While she pursues an associate degree in Business Administration at UCCI and will also complete her bachelor's degree in Cayman, she works part-time in accounts at Tony's Toys. Amanda said she actually preferred working on cars than sitting behind a desk. Since joining Tony's Toys, she has learned to change oil, check transmission and other fluids and perfected the art of changing tires. She is also finding out more about how to service and repair brakes.

"I never thought I would say this, but I wouldn't mind a career in auto mechanics. I can see myself practicing HR in a setting like this but also fixing cars as a hobby here at the garage," Amanda confirmed. "I would tell any female to take advantage of opportunities to learn more about how her car works, and not to reject the idea of working at a garage if she has the chance."

Eighteen-year-old tire specialist, Shemar Scott, has been interested in cars since primary school and has wanted to work on them as far back as he can remember. After he graduated from the Cayman Islands Further Education Centre in September, he worked at a supermarket

for about two months before applying as a tire specialist at Tony's Toys.

Now, he also helps technicians service vehicles, and is learning more about bodywork and spraying services. Shemar hopes that in five years he will move on to technician at Tony's Toys, once qualified.

Mr Williams said he was always looking for opportunities to help young Caymanians get their foot in the door of the automotive industry.

"Most of the time they do not come to us with any experience but that is not, and should not be, the most important thing, in my opinion. They have to start somewhere, like we all did, no matter what business it is," said Tony Williams. "Chris, Amanda and Shemar have shown me a desire to learn and a solid work ethic. I can work with that and I feel fortunate that the pandemic brought these three young people to us."

CSEC Examinations to Commence in June

The Ministry of Education, Youth, Sports, Agriculture and Lands (MEYSAL) announces that 2021 sitting of the Caribbean Secondary Education Certificate (CSEC) Examinations will occur between 14 June 2021 and 16 July 2021.

The decision, revealed by the Caribbean Examination Council (CXC) earlier this month, was made following consultation with the regional Ministries of Education and formed a part of the CXC's wider strategy to ensure that none of the region's children are disenfranchised by the administration of the regional examinations.

Minister for EYSAL Hon. Juliana O'Connor-Connolly lauded the CXC's decision to make changes to the administration of the regional examinations.

"I am pleased that CXC has considered the plight of students throughout the region, providing each candidate with the opportunity to excel in their examinations despite the challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic."

Minister O'Connor-Connolly continued, "As with our counterparts across the region, we have worked to mitigate learning loss due to the pandemic, however, Cayman is in the enviable position across the region to have reconvened onsite learning for our students in August 2020. Many territories within the Caribbean have had to do in-person learning on a rota, or even resorted back to remote learning due to upticks in the COVID-19 numbers in their countries. I am confident that our students will capitalise on the increased learning opportunities brought on by the additional instructional time and expend maximum effort in the upcoming examinations."

In addition to the delayed examination start dates, the regional examination body will share with the Ministry, for communication to candidates, broad topics to be assessed on Paper Two, five weeks before the start of the examinations. The CXC does note, however, that all topics can be assessed in Paper One.

Acting Director of the Department of Education Services (DES), Mrs. Tammy Hopkins, noted that a team from the Ministry of EYSAL and the DES will meet within the coming days to finalise the examination process for local students.

"With the timing of the examinations, results will be returned to territories later than normal. The joint MEYSAL and DES team is currently facilitating meetings with various stakeholders to ensure the transition of our students to the next stage of their education is as seamless as possible. Once the logistics are finalised, students, parents and teachers will all be notified of the processes," Mrs. Hopkins stated.

Other changes to the 2021 CSEC examinations include a reduced number of SBA practicals/assignments and a modified approach to the implementation of SBAs in line with that outlined in the 'Treatment of Syllabuses and the School-Based Assessment for Administration of Examinations in 2021 Handbook for Students' published on the CXC website in 2020.

to keep the Cayman Islands safe during the pandemic, which resulted in no loss of life and the creation of a 'bubble' that has seen the Islands become the envy of the world, with virtually no restrictions such as face masks and lockdown being necessary after a protracted period of defence.

Mr. McLaughlin spoke about his time in Government and his delight at seeing his successor as Party Leader and possibly the next Premier of the Cayman Islands, the Honourable Roy McTaggart taking the reins.

"The Opposition has its place, but to get anything done you have to be a part of the Government," he noted.

"I cannot go any higher ladies and gentlemen. I have been to the mountain top but it is important for me to use my experience and time in the Government to guide the new Premier and the Government," he said.

He added that, "What I am doing now is out of love and concern for my country and people."

Mr. McLaughlin also spoke about his concerns regarding an alternative Government led by either Ezzard Miller of Northside or Arden McLean of East End.

"I am scared to think what would happen if the wrong people come in on the backs of what we have done. All we need are a few silly decisions to ruin what we have been able to achieve in the fight against COVID.

"They can't criticise me on my record when it comes to our response to this pandemic," noted Mr. McLaughlin.

Recounting his experience during the darker days of the pandemic, the Premier asked, "Do you know what it is to shut down a country and lock people in their house?"

He explained that he and Health Minister Dwayne Seymour held 65 press conferences, along with the Governor, His Excellency Martyn Roper, whom he said he got on with well and noted that though he had a great relationship with the Governor, he was not prepared to allow him to declare a state of emergency, thereby stripping the Government of its power.

"This is the land of my birth and this was a responsibility that I was not prepared to pass on to anyone else," noted the Premier to resounding applause from the audience.

Mr. McLaughlin then introduced his successor, the Honourable Roy McTaggart, who is the incumbent in George Town East, the new Progressive Party Leader and the Party's choice for the Islands' next Premier.

Mr. McTaggart danced on to the podium amid a throng of cheers and makeshift flags, made of red shirts.

"This election is about the future; Independents and Progressives are ready to form the new Government," he said.

He added that nearly 3,000 new jobs had been created in Cayman before the pandemic and hundreds have started and grown their businesses in the time since the Islands' successes in the fight against the global crisis.

However, he said more needs to be done. "When we are returned to office the goal is for everyone to have affordable homes, better education, better opportunities. We are investing in improved classrooms

and sports facilities, as well as governing bodies for the public schools that will give parents a direct say in policy."

The new Progressive Party Leader also revealed that the landfill would be capped and garbage will be used as a renewable energy source going forward.

He said the planned expansion of Marine Zones done in his Government's tenure had been the largest upgrade in 35 years.

Sound stewardship of the Nation's finances were also a strong point for Mr. McTaggart, whose surplus meant that the Cayman Islands Government could operate for three months without any revenue.

"The starting point is keeping people safe and rapid testing is crucial," he said adding that in Cayman we can enjoy everyday life and that in many other countries and event of Saturday night's magnitude would have been illegal.

"No one should be left behind and the Alliance Government is the only one that can ensure strength of country."

New members to the Progressives' Alliance such as Vincent Frederick, who will be running in the Constituency of Bodden Town West, told the audience that it was important for the Country to act in, "one accord" to continue to be successful in the years ahead, noting that the legacy of this Government would be hard to reproduce.

"If something is working, leave it alone," declared the former Human Resources Manager, who has ran in previous elections but has not yet had the privilege of serving in parliament.

Another Independent Member of the Alliance, Mr. Frank Cornwall, who is running against Mr. Kenneth Bryan for the Constituency of George Town Central, made his political debut on Saturday night.

Mr. Cornwall has served as a political advisor to the Premier for the past several years and said he spent most of that time building his community and assisting the people of George Town.

"My opponent is sitting alone and can't sit with the Government or the Opposition and so nothing is getting done," he remarked, opining that his ability to work with the public and private sector would bode well for the prospects of the Constituency to have a voice in Parliament.

"Now is not the time for 'still can'. This is the time for 'will do', he noted.

He added that sports development and protection of the environment were issues that he hopes to focus on, if elected.

Deputy Speaker of the House and Candidate for George Town South, Barbara Connolly took to the stage among a great reception from the audience and thanked voters for the privilege of being able to serve them for the past four years.

She noted that other than family, this was one of the greatest pleasures of her life.

"From a new drainage system in Windsor Park; one of the most flood prone areas in the George Town, to clearing the underbrush along Smith Barcadere and a new pedestrian crossing at the same beach, as well as WIFI service at the South Sound Community Center," she felt her passion for the community she served was evident.

Mrs. Connolly also worked to have a beach in South Sound named after beloved Caymanian artist, playwright and community activist Consuelo Ebanks.

Cayman's Covid success story was a highlight of the evening and featured heavily in the theme of the night's remarks.

Not the least of which were delivered by Tourism Minister and Deputy Premier, the Honourable Moses Kirkconnell.

He lauded the efforts of his colleagues and listed some of the major accomplishments for the Constituencies of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman.

These include, but are not limited to a new Government Pensions office, job creation, a new General Registry Office, and the introduction of over 6,000 square feet of new office space, which he said would be ready in the next three months.

The Sister Islands also have a new fire truck and ambulance.

From a plethora of ribbon cuttings, to now being referred to as 'the new Miami', the Brac has benefited greatly from the inability of Caymanians in Grand Cayman not being able to travel overseas and instead rediscovering the wonder of the Sister Islands.

He said 2019 was a record year for the tourism industry in the Cayman Islands, with over 500,000 stay-over visitors; the best ever.

"1 billion dollars came into this country in 2019 from our stay-over tourism industry and in 2020, that all stopped. 25 percent of our economy stopped with COVID," said Mr. Kirkconnell. He went on to explain that the government then had a duty to protect the workers in that industry and others.

A massive reallocation of funds then had to be syphoned from the Ministry's marketing budget, which contributed to the stipend that was given to those affected by the abrupt closing of the Islands' borders.

"Joey" (the Honourable Joseph Hew, Minister at Commerce Planning & Infrastructure) then orchestrated a small business grant and 'Juliana' (the Honourable Julianna O' Connor Connolly, Minister of Education, Youth, Sports, Agriculture) then organised a front for those in the agricultural industry whom had been affected.

"Roy" (the Honourable Roy McTaggart, Minister of Finance) then arranged for the

grant of low interest business loans worth over 200 million dollars.

Representative for the District of Prospect and Master of Ceremonies for the night Austin Harris, along with the Cayman Islands' Premier then committed to work with the Needs Assessment Unit to make sure Caymanians in need were taken care of, noted Mr. Kirkconnell, who added that Cayman could not and would not stay locked down forever.

During his remarks, the Honourable Minister Joey Hew; incumbent in the District of George Town North, addressed the audience with a reminder that unemployment numbers in the Cayman Islands were at their lowest (3 percent) just before the pandemic, which shook the world in the first quarter of 2020.

Once the stark realities of closing the borders began to hit home, Mr. Hew noted that his Ministry waived some hundreds of thousands of dollars in outstanding trade and business licensing fees.

Throughout his remarks, Mr. Hew reminded those on hand that the theme of the last year for he and his government was to, "put lives before money".

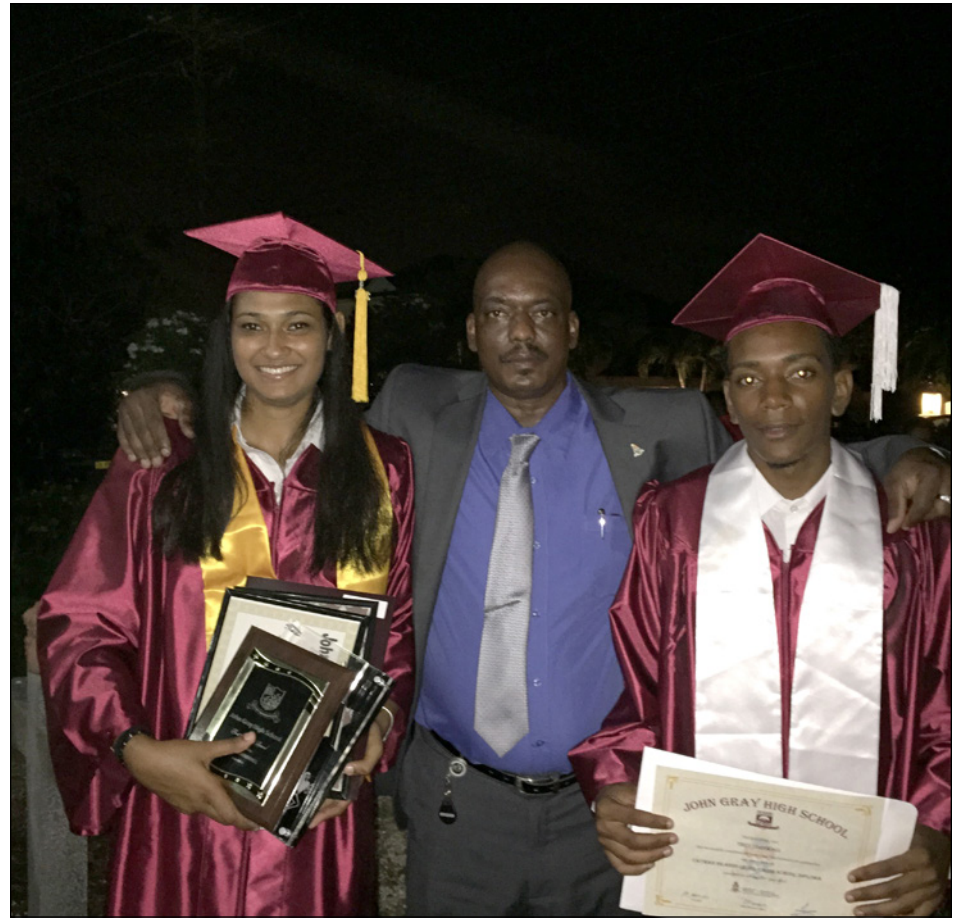
The Cayman Islands' Government implemented new strategies to make up for the shortfall in revenue due to the pandemic, however.

These included over 14.5 million dollars in small business loans and grants, the development of a new Trades training centre at the Public Works Department, which was actually started in 2017 and now avails young Caymanians of the opportunity to achieve level 1,2, and 3 City and Guilds certifications.

There have also been over 635 capital projects approved in addition to other measures, for a total of 1 billion dollars of revenue into the Islands' economy.

Other members of the Alliance on the podium included Health Minister and former United Democratic Party Member, Dwayne 'John John' Seymour, former United Democratic Party Member Julianna O'connor Connolly and David White.

The Party's Manifesto is expected to be available later this month, according to members at Saturday evening's event.



Frank Cornwall stands for office

Having served as the political assistant to the Premier for the past seven years, is no stranger to the political arena. He believes his career has given him solid, hands-on experience that will stand him in excellent stead, should he be elected as the Member of Parliament for George Town Central.

"I have been the point of contact for the people of Red Bay and George Town for the past seven years, especially when it comes to issues that involve infrastructure enhancements, such as improving roads and drainage, but also when people are searching for employment and educational opportunities as well," he advised.

Prior to his move into the political arena, Frank's career was in the areas of en-

vironmental health and construction. This experience has given him a solid foundation with which to assist people in his community when it comes to rectifying infrastructural concerns. If elected, Frank said a key area of focus for him would be to unite the separate communities of his constituency through one of his great passions, sport.

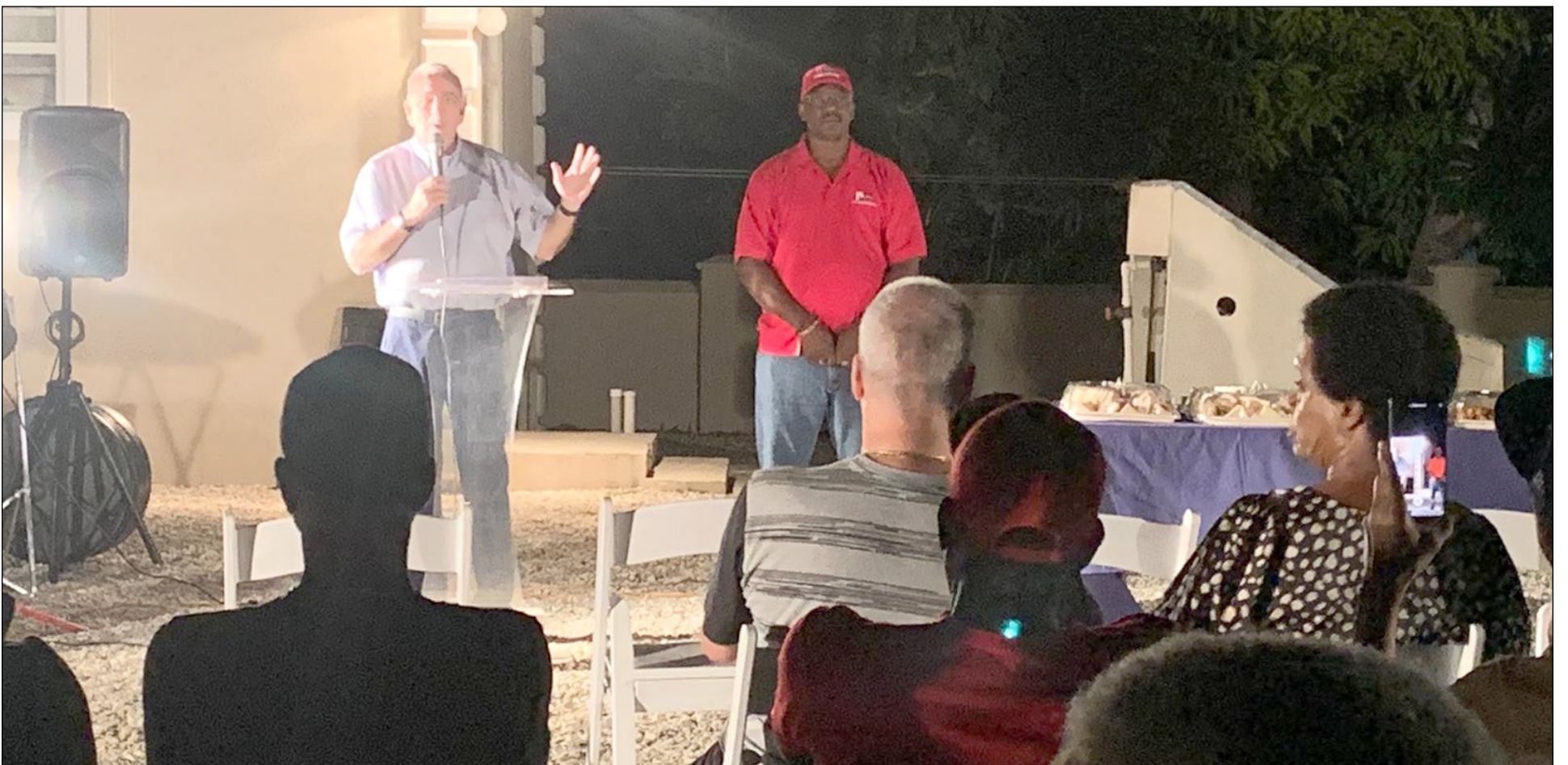

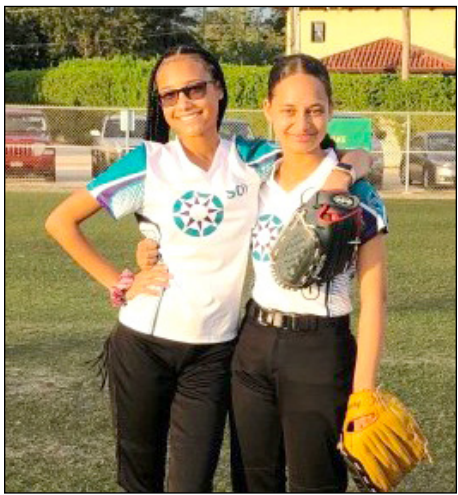

Alva Suckoo Returns to Progressives

He has served as the Deputy Leader of the Opposition and was elected as the first representative for the constituency Newlands in May 2017. He maintained his independent status for the past four years while working as a Member of the Official Opposition.

Mr. Suckoo will be running for a third consecutive term.

As a Member of Parliament, Mr. Suckoo was also a member of the Governments' negotiating team that travelled to London in 2019 to negotiate the recently implemented constitutional amendments, and recently negotiated amendments to the controversial Defense Bill, 2020; ensuring that the bill was passed with the support of the Opposition bench.

ANTIGUA AND BARBUDA CHALLENGES COVID-19 VARIANT LABEL

The government of Antigua and Barbuda is challenging the linking of a COVID-19 variant to the island by Public Health England (PHE).

In an update dated March 11th PHE said a new variant designated a Variant Under Investigation (VUI) was identified on March 4th after two cases were found in individuals who had recently travelled to Antigua.

The British medical agency said the variant traced back to Antigua "does not feature specific deletions that would lead to a designation as a VOC (variant of concern)" - a more serious designation.

However, Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister Gaston Browne wants the UK agency to remove the link to his tourism-dependent country which has been extensively reported in the regional and international press.

According to Mr Browne, "PHE is not saying that the variant was contracted in Antigua. Indeed, they do not know if the infected persons might have contracted the virus in England before travelling to Antigua."

A statement from the Antigua and Barbuda government said officials of its Ministry of Health had been in contact with representatives of PHE "who conceded that they erred in posting on their website any reference to Antigua and Barbuda in relation to persons they believed were infected with a variant of the novel coronavirus."

The government said it now expects PHE to retract its website posting.

Mr Browne said: "It is important to emphasise that the virus was discovered by Public Health England (PHE) in early February only in two persons who were on a brief visit to An-

tigua. Three other family members were designated as 'probable'.

"Further," he stated, "PHE is not saying that the variant was contracted in Antigua. Indeed, they do not know if the infected persons might have contracted the virus in England before travelling to Antigua."

Mr Browne said his country maintains strict COVID-19 protocols and "remains one of the safest places globally with comparatively low rates of infection and a high rate of recovery".

Recently the island has seen an increase in COVID cases with several deaths. Earlier this month nine doctors at its main Mount St John's Hospital tested positive for the virus.

Antigua and Barbuda has been under a month-long 6pm to 5am curfew which went into effect on February 14th and was due to be reviewed on March 15th.

The official COVID-19 dashboard on March 13th confirmed 17 new cases from samples taken on Thursday March 11th bringing the total active cases to 343.

To date Antigua and Barbuda has recorded 962 COVID-19 cases with 27 deaths.

The island has vaccinated over 23,000 people.

Jamaica will pay seniors who take jab

The Jamaican government will roll out a Conditional Cash Transfer for the Vaccinated (CCTV) programme, to benefit more than 100,000 Jamaicans, who will each receive J\$10,000 (KY\$56).

It is geared towards people aged 60 and over, who are not in receipt of a pay cheque or a pension greater than J\$1.5 million (KY\$8,500) per annum, according to records at Tax Administration Jamaica.

Recipients will also have to be vaccinated and confirmed by Ministry of Health and Wellness officials.

Details of the programme were announced by Minister of Finance and the Public Service, Dr Nigel Clarke, as he announced the 2021/22 Budget Debate. The initiative will be facilitated under the Social and Economic Recovery and Vaccine (SERVE) Programme for Jamaica.

Dr Clarke said: "There is public interest in ensuring that the vulnerable, older population is vaccinated. We also want to ensure that older persons who cannot take up the work opportunities that will become available under the SERVE Jamaica Programme, and who otherwise have no formal income or that income is below the threshold, receive a grant."

Barbados eager to become a republic

Barbados is not intending to back down on becoming a republic this year, particularly in the wake of the Prince Harry and Meghan Markle racism row.

Queen Elizabeth is head of state in the UK and in 15 countries across the globe, but Barbados is the latest country to declare its intention to sever its ties.

Barbados has been independent since 1966, however last year it declared plans to remove the Queen as its heads of state and become a republic by November 2021.

Guyana, Dominica and Trinidad and Tobago removed the Queen as head of state in the 1970s. Mauritius did the same in the 1990s.

Barbados used to be enjoyed being nicknamed 'Little England'. It is still expected

to remain part of the Commonwealth, despite the break away.

A British government spokesman said: "We obviously have a shared history and remain united with Barbados in terms of history, culture and language, and we will continue to have and enjoy a partnership with them as members of the Commonwealth."

Antigua denies having virus variant

Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister Gaston Browne has responded to the false information in media in the United Kingdom and the Caribbean, alleging that 'an Antigua variant' has been discovered in the UK by Public Health England.

Browne revealed that Ministry of Health officials talked with representatives of PHE who conceded that they were mistaken in posting on their website any reference to Antigua and Barbuda having a variant of the novel coronavirus. The misinformation stems from PHE discovering a British family of five who had holidayed in Antigua and returned to the UK but they had not been positive.

Browne said: "More than 32 days have elapsed since the discovery and the negative results of contact tracing in the UK. Clearly, any variant of concern would have emerged by now." He added that "daily tests conducted on material from Antigua by reputable external agencies have found no variant arising from Antigua".
