After their parade, Cayman's newest uniformed agency took their seats in front of dignitaries including Premier, Hon Alden McLaughlin, His Excellency the Governor Martyn Roper, and Deputy Governor Franz Manderson.

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Little Cayman receives first purpose-built ambulance

The Health Services Authority (HSA) recently presented Little Cayman with its first new and purpose-built ambulance at the Blossom Village Park. Government officials including Hon Moses Kirkconnell, Deputy Premier and Minister of District Administration, Tourism and Transport attended the presentation.

Prior to the arrival of the new ambulance, Little Cayman utilized an emergency response vehicle, which did not adequately suit the needs of the emergency service of Little Cayman. Therefore, it

was determined that an upgrade was required.

Dr Srirangan Velusamy, Director of Sister Islands Health Services stated that the new vehicle is an important addition to the island and to the country's emergency services.

"This is a significant investment by the HSA and one that will enhance our emergency medical response capabilities. With this purpose-built and technologically advanced ambulance, as part of our emergency medical systems fleet, we endeavor

our to meet the specific needs of those requiring emergency care in Little Cayman," said Dr Velusamy.

HSA Chief Executive Officer Lizzette Yearwood stated that the new vehicle demonstrates the Authority's continued commitment to providing an improved and accessible healthcare system for the entire population of the Cayman Islands. She noted the ambulance will be utilized for emergency intervention and timely transport of patients, in a variety of situ-

ations and environments, who require urgent response to medical and trauma-related emergencies.

"This latest addition to our fleet of ambulances will increase the overall efficiency of our emergency response service and improve the health outcomes of our people," Ms Yearwood announced. "We have also received extremely positive feedback from the Little Cayman community who are delighted that their healthcare needs have been thoughtfully considered and met."

MCLAUGHLIN CHALLENGED IN BID TO RETAIN RED BAY

Outgoing Premier Alden McLaughlin who is defending his Red Bay seat and his government's track record, traded policy ideas with his constituency challenger Sammy Jackson when they met in the

Chamber of Commerce's Candidates Forum on Monday evening.

Mr McLaughlin, who is completing his constitutional two consecutive terms as Premier, has also stepped down from leadership of the Progressives party. But he has said he is available for a ministerial role if he retains the seat and his party stays in government.

While national issues dominated the two-hour session, matters specific to Red Bay were also in focus with Mr Jackson leading off by committing to address the persistent traffic problems, flooding and concerns about crime.

Mr McLaughlin responded by disclosing that the government has been working on a plan for a six-lane highway serving the area, adding that just on Monday a contract had been signed for local access roads and drainage improvement as a key component of that project.

The impact of the pandemic, from the plans for reopening to how the economy will be structured going forward also featured prominently.

Premier McLaughlin said, "I suspect that it will take us into May or June before we have 75 to 80% of the population here vaccinated, which will then allow us to reopen up our borders relatively safely."

He said the economy was "doing well" but accepted that the tourism industry was struggling while listing infrastructure, the environment and climate change among key areas for the next government.

While commending the government for its handling of the pandemic, Mr Jackson said it had overlooked the cost of living.

"I think that is certainly the top national issue that needs to be addressed by the new government, whoever that may be. And that needs to be vigorously addressed because there are folks who are falling through the cracks."

Both stressed the importance of defending financial services as an even more important economic pillar now, through negotiation and legislative compliance in the face of continuing harsh scrutiny by the EU and others.

Regarding economic diversification, Mr McLaughlin pointed to medical tourism being pursued under his leadership and the development of the tech sector as examples with stay-over tourism now being prioritised now over cruise visits.

Mr Jackson however questioned financial services firms being registered in Cayman but basing their staff overseas depriving the jurisdiction of work permit fees.

THE BATTLE FOR SAVANNAH

The three candidates vying for the vacant seat of Savannah made their pitch as the Chamber of Commerce's Candidate Forum series continued.

Jeanna Williams and Heather Bodden are in the race for Savannah along with Malcolm Eden, the son of six-term veteran MP Anthony Eden who retired from politics this year, giving up the Savannah seat.

The candidates shared broadly similar agendas for the area with traffic, flooding, and education - especially support for the Savannah primary school - being their headline points.

Jeanna Williams who also promised a district council and community park said the main thing she'd heard from residents "was that they did not see their representative."

Heather Bodden stressed care for the elderly while Malcolm Eden said he would push for incentives for small businesses.

Nationally, community development, care for the elderly and equality for women are key concerns for Heather Bodden.

"I think when we all look back at 2017, fewer female candidates stepped forward. And that to me, needs to be changed," she stated.

For Malcolm Eden it's quality of life issues, alongside the environment, employment and the cost of living.

"Speaking with many of my constituents, the number one issue and concern was their inability to meet their ongoing requirements."

Jeanna Williams spoke of addressing the high cost of living, maternity leave and human rights.

"I think the time is very appropriate to push forward for human rights of families



with children who have special abilities because of the stigma that is created in our society."

Traffic again featured in this forum with traffic lights for the Hirst Rd intersection being one of the issues

Malcolm Eden, while agreeing, felt that was symptomatic of a bigger problem saying: "I think what could make a difference is continuing with the east-west arterial extension," he said, along with a reliable public transportation system.

He also proposed limiting the importation of older vehicles and encouraging people to cycle more.

Jeanna Williams said while placing traffic lights at Hirst Rd is a good idea, remote working is an option that should be explored to reduce traffic density, learning from the lockdown period.

Discussing the cost of living Jeanna Williams called for a Consumer Protec-

stewardship and its management of the pandemic so far.

But there were reservations.

Roydell Carter said "I believe that where we are today is the consequence of an action handled poorly such as the calling of early elections."

Raul Gonzalez Jr felt that the government "dropped the ball" in its spending priorities. "I could only rate them good on where they have us here, on anything else they dropped the ball and our people are feeling that."

While he also gave the government high marks for handling the pandemic and economic management, Newlands incumbent Alva Suckoo, a one-time PPM government councillor, said the cruise port issue was a setback.

"They didn't handle that national issue very well."

Former PPM financial services and environment minister Wayne Panton who quit the party last year over the McKeeva Bush assault scandal, cited that the handling of that issue as a failing of the administration. He also felt that the government erred on the cruise port issue.

Another issue on which the candidates were asked directly to rate the government was on the work permit and employment situation via the WORC agency.

Alva Suckoo who was involved in setting it up before he crossed the floor as an independent said: "I am proud to say that I was able to contribute to the beginning of this, but it needs to go a lot further."

Wayne Panton said that perceptions that Caymanians are not benefitting needs to be addressed urgently. "I think it's a very significant problem and one which we want to roll up our sleeves and really get to find out exactly how to address that."

For Roydell Carter the agency is still trying to find its way. "Many Caymanians are still not getting their fair share and I think we need to have a revisit of some areas of that department."

"It ain't working," was the assessment of candidate Raul Gonzalez Jr who said the agency needs to be "radically reformed."

A number of ideas were put forward to address the seemingly intractable traffic problems with the focus this time on whether roundabouts are a help or a hindrance.

An efficient public transportation system, express bus lanes, a park-and-ride shuttle system in George Town, vehicle import restrictions and staggering work and school hours were suggested.

Education was another subject that the Newlands candidates agreed warranted serious attention. There were commitments to better resource it and a debate over whether the Cayman education system should be modelled more on the British system without sacrificing its local and Caribbean component.

The cost of living is the top concern of respondents to its surveys. That alongside the minimum wage, health insurance, and utility costs factored into a mix of pressures on household incomes and how to address that challenge.

In that connection is the reopening of the borders - and the economy with the four candidates advising to proceed with caution.

Roydell Carter: "We will be probably looking sometime in the summertime, although that is no certainty."

Raul Gonzalez Jr called for more government support in the interim.

"People are feeling it, people are struggling. You have to, as a government, find

other ways to help these people," he stated.

Mr Suckoo highlighted the risk of rushing to reopen.

"If we were to go back into another lockdown situation...it would be not just an economic disaster but a disaster for us."

Looking at the stability of the government's finances, Wayne Panton suggested: "I think if anything we need to make the necessary investments, helping people to get to the point where we are in a safer position where we have most of our population vaccinated."

On their priorities for Newlands, Raul Gonzalez would focus on a district council and ensure that there are proper amenities at the public parks including the launching ramp.

Incumbent Alva Suckoo said he would focus on floodwater management, care for elderly and a third primary school.

Wayne Panton cited upkeep of the parks, community beautification, flooding and education outcomes.

Roydell Carter listed flooding, the parks, and the launching ramp among matters that he would give attention to for the district.

tion Board, Heather Bodden suggested that "because of the pandemic crisis, everything has gone up and there's just no magic wand at this time. It just has to be considered carefully," she advised.

For Malcolm Eden, "the fuel costs, the cost of mortgages and also revisiting import duties in certain areas could potentially lower the cost."

There was also overlap on issues of economic diversification, the financial services sector and reopening the borders with the three candidates agreeing on supporting the financial services industry.

Heather Bodden said "It is the pillar of our economy, and we cannot allow ourselves to be bullied when we are in fact maintaining high international standards."

Malcolm Eden agreed that the sector is well-regulated. "I think that is a story that needs to be told," he stated. Mr Eden also sees diversifying into the alternative energy sector as a strategy to be considered.

Regarding financial services, Jeanna Williams suggested "an awareness campaign or representation around the world."

She also favours focusing on stay-over visitors and encouraging the entrepreneurial spirit of Caymanians.

The current strategy for gradually reopening the borders was endorsed by the Savannah hopefuls.

On the matter of pensions, including the policy of allowing pensions withdrawals last year, it was broadly felt that educating the public in financial literacy including investing should be considered.

The three candidates expressed concern over the message they are getting from the youth ranging from feeling left out, lack of opportunities and are becoming disengaged, especially from politics. Jobs and education opportunities were seen as solutions to be pursued.

They also concurred on a review of the government's WORC agency.

A population target of 100,000 was not embraced and the idea for a national lottery got a mixed reaction.

The three independents say they are open to governing alliances with Mr Eden saying he prepared to assume a leadership position.

Jeanna Williams said she would consult with her constituents before agreeing to a coalition and would opt for the health portfolio, while Heather Bodden prefers community affairs.

He also challenged Mr McLaughlin on his benefits to the citizens particularly from concessions granted to developers, claiming that there are "far too many projects approved in the last four to eight years, where we didn't really get what we were statutorily promised."

That dovetailed into an exchange about population and development with stridently opposed views.

Mr Jackson: "We've already seen what has happened as a result of land banking in Cayman and investment in real estate. We are not building for Caymanians any more...We simply need to stop, get a handle on development and curtail population growth because we're already reaching our capacity in terms of infrastructure. We know that there's going to be irreversible economic harm."

But Premier McLaughlin countered: "I sit here and I listened to my colleague and I shake my head. It is amazing how history can be revised," he said referring to appeals from the Chamber and Commerce and others in the private sector to stimulate the economy when his government took office in 2013.

"When we took office in 2013 the economy was in the doldrums, employment was at 10 and a half per cent, every association involved in business was clamouring for us to do something to get the economy moving...that's the reason why we gave concessions at the time for development."

Providing opportunities for young people, education and employment garnered much attention during the discourse with the model of the education system coming in for close examination.

On the question of civil partnership, Premier McLaughlin who had piloted the original ill-fated Domestic Partnership Bill declared:

"I believe that person is entitled to their right to sexual orientation in their private life. It's not for me to sit in judgement about those things."

Mr Jackson summed it up by calling the issue a fait accompli.

Views diverged on having a constitutional amendment to recall MPs, and both were lukewarm to the idea of a national lottery.

'Community Builds Country' theme at Osbourne Bodden's campaign meeting

With the slogan "Community Builds Country," Osbourne "Ossie" Bodden held an election campaign meeting for Bodden Town East at the side the Bodden Town Bypass road. MC Robert Bodden, Osbourne's brother, who ran for election last time, but had chosen to be a fellow campaigner supporting his more politically-experienced sibling this year, introduced the 'Community Builds Country' fellow-campaigners: Heather Bodden and Wayne Panton.

There was an endorsement via video from the venerable ex-parliamentarian and educator Roy Bodden, who spoke of Osbourne Bodden's dedication to the people of Bodden Town, his hard work, and experience. There was also a heartfelt endorsement from artist and special Olympian athlete, artist and photographer Matthew Ebanks "We love you Mr. Bodden. You're the best," he said.

Wayne Panton began: "People of Bodden Town East, you're discerning people. You look at the track record of the people that have represented you. If you look as Osbourne Bodden's track record, he has worked extremely hard during the term 2013-2017. That was a very trying time for the country." Mr. Panton reminded the audience of the tough financial times, and the ten percent unemployment rate that that government had worked hard to turn around, expressing his disappointment that, when the time came for the people to benefit, the present government had failed to deliver:

"We were not re-elected, and what have you got out of that? Nothing," he said.

Taking the podium, Osbourne Bodden said: "We need statesmen. We don't just need politicians for ego and for money to go around and puff out their chest because they're now a politician. You need people that are here for the right reason, and that's what my two humble colleagues and myself are about. We have been working in the community, that's why this theme is so relevant, because we have lived it. I started off doing community work here in Bodden Town as a youth," he said.

Speaking about the Premier, Mr. Bodden said: "Him and Mr. Bush the Speaker warred for twenty years, yet they are now one happy married couple. The reason

they did that was because they both killed their parties. They don't want anyone else near the parliament; they want to keep a lock on that. So now an independent candidate is a bad word to them."

"Ladies and gentlemen don't be fooled, the only way to deal with this group of people that are selfish and all about big business and big money, is to vote them out. If you make the mistake of re-electing that government you are going to have four years of the same suffering: the lack of homes, the lack of food on the table, the lack of jobs."

Warming to the theme of affordable homes, Mr. Bodden said: "The National Housing Development Trust is simply too cumbersome and moving too slowly for

the amount of people that we have needing homes. We have 400 people on our waiting list. That is unacceptable."

"Government look seriously into buying up large parcels of land or reclaiming the land that is already in the government's hand, putting infrastructure into it such as electricity and water, having it ready in lots and selling it to our people. We have to maybe look at reducing the size of the plots, going up instead of just single-story."

"We know the minimum wage is too low, so a lot of people are being paid that. The minimum wage should be at least nine or ten bucks an hour without a doubt. You cannot live on those six dollars an hour. They were supposed to revise that, because that was the starting point," he said.

Sutherland, a retired major, recalled his own commissioning in Sandhurst, England, many years before: "It's a proud moment. It never leaves our memory, and I am sure that those of you who are being presented today will never forget this afternoon, even long after you have left this service," he said.

There was a moment of silence for the lives lost at sea, as Mr. Dennison Tibbetts rang the seaman's bell before Lieutenant Commander Leo Anglin read the Course Report: "These coasties have come to understand, and be raised on the core values of honor, courage and commitment," he concluded, after listing all that was entailed in their intense 10-weeks of training, including physical fitness, drill, and sea-rescue procedures.

Governor Martyn Roper said, "As the newest members of the Cayman Islands Coastguard, you have shown impressive determination and dedication to successfully complete what I know was a vigorous and intense ten weeks of basic coastguard training, which also included a five mile jog along seven mile beach which I know we all found rigorous and tough, and I'm ready for the rematch."

"From an initial group of 250 young Caymanians who applied to join the Cay-

man Islands Coastguard, the 16 of you sitting here before us today can be very proud. This is a historic occasion for our islands, and you will be adding to the Cayman Islands' rich maritime heritage. You have taken up a noble role to serve your country, and follow in many of your forefather's footsteps."

Hon. Alden McLaughlin remarked: "This is just one facet of Cayman's approach to maritime safety and security to bring our islands into conformity with a series of international obligations. The coastguard has already delivered further reductions in crime, but giving our islands a significantly enhanced maritime capacity and capability, ensuring safe use of our waters for recreational and commercial vessels."

Governor Martyn Roper presented each of the new coast guards with their grad-

uate certificates. The first of the special awards were presented by the Premier and the Coast Guard Commander. The Poseidon Award, for best academic performance, was presented to Tevin Crawford. Christopher McTaggart received the Neptune Award for a consistently high standard of physical endurance and performance throughout training. Deputy Governor Franz Manderson presented the Mark Luke Award to Jessica Smith, for tenacity and resilience throughout basic training, and presented the Leeland Scott award for leadership during training to Leanni Tibbetts. The Governor presented Anthony Clarke with the Best All Round Graduate award.

Then there was a very special award to Melicia Ebanks, by the Governor and Mr. Craig Anderson, a representative of the Royal Life Saving Society of Canada, be-

Light up the night to save lives

The 11th annual Light Up the Night fundraiser for the Breast Cancer Foundation is taking place on the 24th April, and the public is encouraged to don the familiar pink t-shirt, grab a balloon to light the way and take the walk starting at Public Beach to The Ritz-Carlton and back again. Walkers will start to gather at 6pm on the night and begin the walk at 7pm.

Janette Fitzgerald, Chief Administrator with the Breast Cancer Foundation, said



they were excited to have the walk start at Public Beach this year, as it gave them much-needed space to have their own catering, bouncy castle, face painting, and a DJ. She anticipated a real fun family event and all kindly supplied by Island Taste/Davenport and RE/MAX Cayman Islands, attracting hopefully around 1,000 participants. She also confirmed that Governor Martyn Roper had agreed to lead the walkers to the Ritz-Carlton and back again this year.

Janette outlined the theme of this year's event.

"The theme is Awareness and Early Detection – early detection is the key to

survival of breast cancer, with 99% to 100% survivability if it is caught early, so it is vital that women (and men) know what to look for and to do something about it when they see it," she advised.

Registration forms can be found on their website: <https://breastcancerfoundation.ky> and entry is just CI\$25 which includes a shirt and raffle ticket. Shirts can be collected at the Breast Cancer Center in Grand Harbour. The message on the shirts underscores this year's theme - Early Detection Saves Lives.

This year all funds raised will go to the Breast Cancer Foundation's Awareness

Programme and their specialised bra/prosthetic service.

"We run our Awareness Programme year-round and go to any company, school, college, group or community who requests our presence," Janette confirmed. "It would appear that all cancers, especially breast cancer, are on the rise. Patients are all ages, and for us, at the BCF, ages of persons coming to us have varied from 20 years old to women in their 70s. Some people might think of it as an older woman (or man's) disease, but what they need to realise is that you can be diagnosed at any age, and in our awareness programme we can discuss how to make yourself less vulnerable."

Parties, Independents, Coalitions and the Need for a Strong Opposition

With elections closing in and clarity on the candidates who have put themselves forward for election, there is little doubt as to the likelihood of a PPM-led coalition government. This is so as the PPM is the most obviously organized political entity. One must also bear in mind that in the last election the concoction of independent candidates was unable to stitch together an effective coalition to form a government.

One notices that persons running as independents understand the need for collaboration and, depending on political outcomes, are indicating willingness to work with the main bloc of winning candidates once this known. This election is likely to remove the political shine off the idea of independents as a credible political framework, but the fact is that political parties, even with single-member constituencies, have not, so far, become the only game in town. The other important issue that must be factored into the discussion is the critical need for a strong opposition, whatever the outcome.

Readers will know that Cayman's first political party, the Cayman Vanguard Progressive Party, duly registered on August 8, 1958, contested elections in that same year and then perished after failing to win a single seat. It survived for little under a year. Cayman's second political party, the National Democratic Party, formed by Ormond Panton, seemed to have had all the credentials for sustainability and permanence, but by the 1965 election was on a route to extinction.

The Christian Democratic Party was the island's third and when it engaged in election contests with the National Democratic Party, presented the possibility of a vibrant two-party democracy. However, a confluence of circumstances and personality issues made this impossible. When Panton lost by four votes in the 1965 election with only one NDP candidate, Warren Conolly, in East End winning, the first chapter in Cayman's first real attempt at party politics came to a slow but certain close.

Thereafter, up until 2000, Cayman's politics was organized around teams and independent candidates. The formation of the United Democratic Party in 2001 and the PPM in 2002 was another attempt. The UDP, turned Cayman Democratic Party, has since died. Ezzard Miller's 2019 Cayman Islands People's Party has not taken off.

Properly conceived and led, there are several advantages to political parties. Political parties are principally political organizations which have as their main objective control of the machinery of government. They must be concerned with the broad agenda of issues facing the societies in which they operate and the larger global environment which have direct and indirect bearing on local realities. They work not just to influence policy but ultimately to have control of the government apparatus to oversee the formulation and execution of policies.

In terms of functions, they provide opportunities for people with similar political philosophies and ideas to meet, organize and campaign in order to place

their members in Government, but if not, at least in Opposition. Globally, political parties are the main institutions which provide candidates for elections and by extension the nation's political leaders. Political parties recruit and nominate candidates who the leaders think will win in elections. They help their candidates to win elections and while not in office they monitor the actions of office holders.

A distinguishing feature of a political party is desire for permanence. In this respect the Teams which dominated the local political scene prior to formation of the UDP and PPM, were not political parties. Those who form political parties usually do so with a desire that they become a permanent part of their societies. That many disappear after at most two years does not mean that that was the intention.

Because political parties are characterized by an intention to be permanent, there is need for a constitution, formal constituency organization, a system of voting to change party leaders and so on. Political parties are thus much more formal organizations. As political parties are permanent political organizations, they strive to have an organizational structure that can facilitate the recruitment of members, develop policy, raise campaign funds to educate the electorate about campaign issues, and other such activities. They develop views, positions and policies and communicate these to the electorate not only but especially during election campaigns.

In addition, because political parties are permanent organizations, the voting

and public know way beforehand what they are getting. They know that that the party in Opposition or simply not in government, is striving to do so. The public knows beforehand that if the leader of the party in Opposition were to win the election, he or she will be leading the country. There are no surprises with political parties as persons contesting are likely to be in the public domain for some time.

Whatever the eventual outcome of this election, the role of an effective opposition must not be underestimated. The Opposition has a special place in the political process in the Westminster System.

NEWLY ELECTED CMEA EXECUTIVE BOARD 2021

The Cayman Music & Entertainment Association (CMEA) is now governed by a newly-elected Executive Board, comprised of five first-time Board members, and four returning members.

The 2021 AGM and Officer Elections were held on February 28th. The four-hour event touched on new priorities, past issues and the 2021-22 post Covid outlook. One unresolved issue is a member-dispute between a small faction of ex members, which was recently referred for bi-partisan arbitration, after members failed to come to a consensus.

Jéan - eric "Mr Notch" Smith was unanimously returned as President, along with newly elected Dominique Ebanks as Vice-President, Charles "Chuck Taylor" Barnes Jr - Secretary, Fred Sambula - Treasurer, Steve Reid - Asst. Secretary and four additional officers: David Gooding, Christopher Seymour, Verlene Wallace and Martino Connolly. Together, these members come from across the music-entertainment industry, and constitute the most diverse and experienced line-up in CMEA's history.

Reflective of the diverse membership, the new Executive Board consists of the broadest base of entertainment industry experience ever represented nationally; with the new line-up including current and veteran musicians, venue owners,

band leaders, singers, radio and club DJs, promoters, technicians.

President Smith noted that the first mandate of the new CMEA Exec is to update its Constitution, bringing it into full compliance with new non-profit organization standards.

The priorities on the CMEA 2021 calendar, he shared, are to maintain:

- "Summer Beach Party" started last year in late September
- "Sounds of Love" Annual Benefit Concert on 27th November "Cayman Thanksgiving"
- Continue to partner with the Pirates Week Festival in the production of "The National Song Competition"
- "Night with the Legends" on 4th December
- Preparing for The MUZAIC XIII Festival Weekend in January 2022 on Heroes Day Weekend
- The new Executive also intends to round-out this year's calendar by creating more live music and Dj musical events showcasing its own members and newly acquired PA system. noting that "It is very important for the tourism sector that we get things back to normal within the local music-entertainment industry."

Expressing appreciation for Government's continued assistance for musicians during



this COVID pandemic Mr. Smith – whose 2020 INTERIM Executive initiated the campaign that sought governmental financial support for all local musicians – thanked the Ministry and Minister responsible for Culture for once again revisiting the stipend programme extended to its members. Over

the past year an unprecedented CI\$400,000 has been distributed directly into the collective hands of the veteran and current musicians of our local music community.

To date there are about 100 active CMEA members in good standing, with twice as many people on its general mailing list.

PREMIER CLARIFIES REMARKS BUT INSISTS ROAD PROJECT IS VITAL

Premier Alden McLaughlin has issued an apology to Davenport Development Ltd for erroneously naming the company in a government project to build an access road through Grand Harbour to Red Bay Estates and Admiral Landing.

He made the remark during Monday night's Chamber of Commerce Candidates Forum while outlining steps being taken to alleviate traffic bottlenecks in the area.

"We have today reached an agreement with respect to local access from Selkirk Drive into the Grand Harbour and Davenport Development," Mr McLaughlin had said.

That prompted a stern response from the company in a statement on Wednesday.

"Davenport has not made any recent agreements with the Government regarding the creation of local access at Grand Harbour. Indeed, we do not own the land in negotiation."

"This is a lie," the company said.

Admitting the error, Mr McLaughlin explained, "I simply reported what I understood from the briefing I received from the ministry responsible. I was not in any of the meetings. If I was mistaken in naming Davenport, then I apologise."

Regarding the overall project, Premier McLaughlin went on to state that he has rechecked and has again been advised that "the Grand Harbour developer is as keen as government is to find a solution to the traffic congestion in the Red Bay area for which we are all grateful. The ministry staff is working on finalising the terms of the agreement before the roadway is gazetted."

Davenport Development Ltd said it "was not in any conversations with the Government on Monday. In fact, Davenport has not had discussions on this matter prior to 2020, when the matter was decided, and we were told quite clearly that the access road was off the table."

The company said its clients have been upset and were calling since the broad-



cast, "questioning Davenport's integrity since we communicated the Government's earlier position".

"They purchased and have been misled by the words of the Unity Government that we passed on to them."

According to the company, "Sadly, the voters in Davenport's newest development Arvia must now make a decision if they will invest or withdraw. These words have sabotaged our business and our reputation, something that is abhorrent to us."

The scathing statement added: "Davenport Development wishes our loyal and valued purchasers to know that we have been blindsided by this announcement and are investigating how such false information came to be published."

In further setting out to clarify the issue, Mr McLaughlin stated that he is advised that the approval of Davenport is not required as they do not own the property or the Grand Harbour road.

"Despite their objections which are disappointing, I do believe that this local access road will only enhance Davenport's ability to sell their units. Their development will disgorge dozens more vehicles on to an already severely overtaxed Red Bay road system.

"When they started the development they would have been aware of the issue and that the development would make traffic matters worse," Mr McLaughlin said.

"In any event," Mr McLaughlin continued, "it is government's responsibility to find solutions to alleviate the traffic congestion and improve the quality of life of Red Bay and Prospect residents and indeed all those who live east of Grand Harbour."

He pointed out that "Government has been patiently working to resolve this issue for some years now," and concluded by saying: "As the representative of Red Bay and Premier I am out of patience. We must resolve this issue now."



CELEBRATING CAYMAN WRITERS, WRITINGS, & THE ARTS

Nasaria Suckoo Chollette: Songs of Experience, History, and Culture. Part Two

In part one, we spoke of Romantic poet, William Blake's *Songs of Innocence and of Experience*. When he wrote the *Experience* poems in 1794, the French Revolution was in its fifth year, and his viewpoint had changed radically from what they had been under *Innocence*. Having lived through the horrors of the Revolution and seen its and the Industrial Revolution's impact on children who were forced into labour, women who resorted to prostitution, as well as the regression of social institutions like marriage and the church, the innocent charm and the untainted naivety of the child that resonated with Blake's earlier writings, are juxtaposed in the later collection where Blake used his works to speak out against the artificiality of industrialism, and the hypocrisy that was stark in 18th century England. Nasaria Suckoo Chollette's poems of NCFCA innocence in Part One, are similarly juxtaposed with her more 'mature' works. Like Blake, she focuses on children but also writes from experience. Chollette admits that she writes to "start conversations and establish what I know is the truth in Cayman. We have a rich history and culture, and I want to establish that. I want to challenge the idea that we don't, as our youth need this history and culture to have purpose and direction".

Long Celia

Chollette wrote "Just Long Celia" in 2013 when she represented the Cayman Islands in Poetry Olympics – Poetry Parnassus - in London.

It was Long Celia they called me
Not Ntozake
Or Mama Zulu
Or even Nanny

Chollette's establishment of identity is the start of a fascinating retelling where she celebrates this real person - an enslaved African in Cayman - a Caymanian woman who had been beaten but remained unbroken. In "Just Long Celia" the persona repeatedly asks, "Unna hear dem

drums?". An important symbol in African epistemology, the drum is often evoked in Caribbean Literature. In Chollette's poem, it represents the displaced Cayman woman who has been banged and beaten but still survives. Chollette's poem ends, "Lick dem drums Julia/Lick dem drums". Aunt Julia, Cayman's iconic drummer who was 103 years old at the time the poem was written, was, says Chollette, "an echo of Long Celia for me". Chollette speaks of Long Celia and Aunt Julia with something akin to reverence, bemoaning that "we have people dying who are taking unrecorded history with them". Her poems seek to preserve their memory and simultaneously make Cayman confront its heritage.

In "Tell Me", written in 2020 for Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) as it celebrated 'Month of the Elderly', Cayman's history and continuity are likewise preserved.

Take me back to the past Mama
And teach me olden ways
Take me back to the past Papa
And tell me about those days.

Chollette's request to remember evokes in her readers a similar need to know and safeguard. Why? So "we can be heroes anew ... we will Captain ship Cayman/ and keep our culture true". It is a powerful legacy that the poet is acknowledging and safeguarding. She postulates that "if those who choose to live here believe Caymanians have no history and culture worth preserving, they erase my grandmother, and I cannot let this happen as she went through a lot and survived to be here".

Womanhood

Chollette's poems celebrate the power of the woman who speaks out against her restrictive situations, highlighting her as praiseworthy. Women's potential to survive trying situations is seen in the self-sufficient woman in "The Lady in Blue" where she "feminized that sea", celebrating that "never-ending vastness" intimately tied to Cayman's seafaring history. Chollette's discussion of the centrality of the sea to Cayman history reflects St. Lucia's Derek Walcott: "Where are your monuments, your battles, martyrs? ... The sea has locked them up. The sea is Histo-

ry." But Chollette's poem is about more than the sea. The persona states repeatedly, "You forget...". Forget what? How in the males' absence the Cayman woman "cat-rigged (a) single mast sea vessel" in her bid to feed her family. In "Just Long Celia", she declares, "I a naked woman/I a torn an' tattered woman ... but you can't open my cockspur thorny shell". Here then is a powerful and poignant celebration of 'tough' and resilient Cayman.

Stylistic devices

Chollette's 'mature' poems' style is different from the NCFCA ones. There are no fairytales here, as she admits in the poem titled "Lord I Didn't Know – Seaman's version" that "...now that I am older, wiser gray, I want you to know...". This desire to make Cayman know leads Chollette to write in her nation language, an appropriate phrase coined by Barbadian scholar, Edward Kamau Brathwaite, who celebrates Caribbean writers who choose to use non-English 'nation language' to write – not 'dialect' with its pejorative connotations. In "Memba Well", Chollette declares, "I MEMBA MORE STORIES/DEN WHA MY

MOUTH CYAN TELL". The poem is written in uppercase as though she is presenting her nation language loudly and proudly! In the poem, "Easter Monday", Chollette defies notions of Cayman having no culture, as she speaks of "Granny drumming /iron pots on wooden fires", and "the enamel basin". She also immortalizes unforgettable Cayman moments in the appropriately titled "Ivan the Terrible", speaking of "that September Day" and its horrors. What is particularly resonating is how she ends the poem – "We are building/Making way for this new spirit...And we are rising".

In these, as in her innocence poems presented in Part one of this article, Nasaria Suckoo Chollette is building and rising and safeguarding what is authentically Caymanian. The words of her poem, "Poet in Exile", are food for thought that I leave with you till we meet again in another few weeks:

I walk amongst you day to day
Poet in exile ...

Beat that drum and gather all the kindred spirits

Call the ones who have gone before us ...
It's time to get up!

Even as it seeks to present itself as a worthy government in waiting, it does not oppose for the sake of opposition, but by its possession of vision and understanding, tackles the concerns that citizens have. A main role of an Opposition is to be in constant pursuit of evidence not only of government mispending of funds but of wider examples of dishonesty and arbitrary behaviour. The Opposition probes for information and prods the government to act on behalf of certain interests, opinions, and needs in society.

It also serves as a brake on government haste, to ensure that all legislation re-

ceives the 'due process' of parliamentary deliberation, and to see that diverse and opposing points of views have a chance to be aired and defended.

The party, or team, or bloc of independent candidates, in Opposition, though not in government, knows that an important function of an Opposition is also to consistently critique Government and to present alternative positions and possibilities in a consistent, organized, and credible way that demonstrates that the Opposition is thinking through current issues and is in touch with what is happening.

This is usually best done by a 'Shadow Cabinet' of persons appointed by the Leader of the Opposition to speak on specified portfolios. So, there is a Shadow Minister of Education, of Finance, of Tourism, or however, else the Leader of the Opposition might indicate he intends to call the various Ministries. Apart from providing cut and thrust in political life, the appointment of a Shadow Cabinet by a serious Opposition, is also a signal to the public as to who would likely be Ministers if the Opposition were to become Government.

The public can scrutinize way ahead of time what it desires and Opposition Spokespersons while providing to the public a 'Government in Waiting', also get useful experience critiquing, agreeing with, and proposing new policy directions that they would undertake so the public knows what the other policy options are likely to be taken if the party in Opposition were in Government. Hopefully, if they became Government, they should be able to 'hit the ground running' being to some extent already familiar with the issue and challenges in their respective portfolios.

Rundown Returns to Spread Laughter, Not COVID!

After a self-imposed quarantine in 2020 due to a global pandemic, Rundown has returned in 2021 to spread laughter, not COVID. Produced by the Cayman National Cultural Foundation (CNCF), Cayman's most hilarious comedy show is back for its 28th season with its usual laugh-out-loud mix of comedy, satire and songs about living life in Cayman told through a collection of skits, monologues and music. The show is rated PG.

Created by then long-time resident Dave Martins in 1991, Rundown is now embedded in the cultural psyche of the Cayman public. People look forward to a mention in the show and count it an honour to be featured in Rundown. When the show first started in 1992, it was described as "one step closer to defining Caymanian theatre" by Henry Muttoo CNCF Artistic Director, designer and director of Rundown since 1992 and also its writer since the mid-2000s.

two other Rundown scripts. His sense of humour will be immediately apparent as audiences watch his work in this production. Another young theatre enthusiast, Jevyvaughnie Ebanks, who has been engaged with CNCF, has also made contributions to the writing in the form of ideas and a short skit that has been adapted. For CNCF, this means planning for the future and welcoming young creatives, who will eventually come into their own as writers, and keep our Rundown, and other traditions, alive into the future", Muttoo added.

This year's edition will include many familiar faces, as well as some newcomers to the mix.

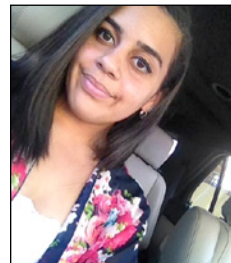
Colin has written 15 stage plays. All have been performed in Cayman, five have been published and he is currently writing another one.

Public Holidays in 2021 Updated

The public holiday date for the General Election Day 2021 has been officially changed.

In view of Election Day being brought forward, the Public Holidays Order, 2021 was approved by Cabinet and subsequently published on 24 February 2021. This designated Wednesday, 14 April 2021 as the date of the public holiday to facilitate the 2021 General Election.

Queen's Birthday public holiday will be on Monday, 14 June 2021.

Christmas Day and Boxing Day which fall on a Saturday and Sunday respectively will be observed as official public holidays in the Cayman Islands on Monday, 27 and Tuesday 28 December 2021 respectively.

Official Public Holidays for 2021, as issued by the Deputy Governor's Office, are as follows:

- New Year's Day: Friday, 1 January;
- National Heroes Day: Monday, 25 January;
- Ash Wednesday: Wednesday, 17 February;
- Good Friday: Friday, 2 April;
- Easter Monday: Monday, 5 April;
- Election Day: 14 April;
- Discovery Day: Monday, 17 May;
- Queen's Birthday: Monday, 14 June;
- Constitution Day: Monday, 5 July;
- Remembrance Day: Monday, 15 November;
- Christmas: Monday, 27 December (observed); and
- Boxing Day: Tuesday, 28 December (observed).

Vaccinated travellers get reduced quarantine time in Cayman

The Cayman Islands Government recently announced that, as of March 22, 2021, the quarantine requirements for arriving travellers will be reduced from 14 days to 10 days, but only for those who have been fully vaccinated more than two weeks prior to travel.

The following conditions also apply for travellers to qualify for the reduced quarantine time:

- Must receive a negative PCR test within 72 hours of travel
- Must receive a negative PCR upon arrival in Cayman
- All persons in the traveller's quarantine group must have received a full vaccination course against COVID-19, or all persons in the group will have to quarantine for 14 days.

Upon completion of the quarantine period, travellers will still have to test negative for COVID-19 before being released from quarantine.

Cayman Airways reminds passengers that it is their responsibility to ensure that they research and secure



all travel-related documents required by any government for entry into their country, especially during this pandemic. Passengers who do not meet all requirements, will not be able to travel.

The Anti-Corruption Commission joins with the Elections Office to launch an Election anti-corruption education campaign

Nomination Day, Monday 1 March 2021, ushered in the official start of the 2021 General Elections Season, which saw the official declaration of fifty (50) electoral candidates contesting for a chance to represent one of the nineteen (19) electoral districts.

Public sentiment leading up to the election season has indicated a desire for more accountability, transparency, better governance and desires to denounce any form of corruption in the Cayman Islands as a whole. On 14 December 2020, the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland extended the United Nations Convention Against Corruption to the Cayman Islands. The Convention highlights that whilst corruption can be prosecuted after the fact, the most fundamental approach is one that requires prevention, and enhanced transparency which the Commission has found to be very applicable to the current election season where the financing of election campaigns and political parties are at the forefront and concerns of corruption abound.

The Anti-Corruption Commission and the Elections Office have aligned to launch an anti-corruption education campaign,

under the tagline of ACT which stands for Against Corruption Today to promote the participation of the Cayman community to reflect on integrity, transparency and accountability as it relates to the country's public affairs. The campaign addresses voters, candidates and campaign supporters through simplified, attention grabbing graphics and narrative. One specific element presses for accountability by encouraging voters and candidates to affirm a pledge to stand against corruption by denouncing vote buying or selling. The pledge is available for download via the Elections Office website, Facebook page and the Anti-Corruption Commission website, all are encouraged to download, print and take a selfie of themselves with the pledge and post on social media in support of this initiative with the hashtag #ACTCayman2021. VATICAN "NEGATIVE" ON SAME-SEX UNIONS

The Catholic Church has become further embroiled in the continuing controversy surrounding same-sex marriage after the Vatican said this week that the church would not bless such unions.

It came in response to a question asking: "Does the Church have the power to give the blessing to unions of persons of the same sex?"

The unequivocal response from the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF) in The Vatican was "negative".

"God does not bless sin," it said.

In expounding on the issue, the CDF said blessing same-sex unions would suggest that the Catholic Church approves and encourages "a way of life that cannot be recognized as objectively ordered to the revealed plans of God."

The decree was seen as a departure from remarks last October attributed to Pope Francis considered then as suggesting more tolerance of same-sex unions and way of life.

Speaking in a biographical film based on his life and teachings, the Pontiff had said "homosexual people have a right to be in a family."

"They are children of God and have a right to a family. Nobody should be thrown out or be made miserable over it. What we have to create is a civil union law. That way they are legally covered. I stood up for that."

The Vatican now claims his remarks were taken out of context.

"It is not licit to impart a blessing on relationships, or partnerships, even stable, that involve sexual activity outside of marriage - outside the indissoluble union of a man and a woman open in itself to the transmission of life - as is the case of the unions between persons of the same sex," the CDF said.

Pope Francis is also reported to have endorsed the CDF decree saying it was "not intended to be a form of unjust discrimination, but rather a reminder of the truth of the liturgical rite".

GLOBAL IMPLICATIONS OF BIDEN'S AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN

US President Joe Biden has labelled his US\$1.9 trillion economic recovery package the American Rescue Plan.

The package pays US\$1,400 to low paid American workers and members of their family, extends welfare payments including health insurance coverage alongside other relief measures targeting individuals and families.

Passed without support from the Republicans, it also invests heavily in ramping up the country's COVID-19 vaccination programme and makes massive investments into the economy with extensive business support and job-creating projects.

Significantly, the historic trillion dollars spending bill will have repercussions far beyond the shores of the United States, according to experts.

That is evident from analysis of the package and its associated COVID component which focuses on a revamped vaccination campaign.

The implications for the US and the world economy has been occupying the attention of the leading global economists and the media.

According to the UK's Financial Times, the plan has "boosted expectations for growth and inflation in the US and around the world."

The highly-respected business publication also points out that the Biden plan has pushed borrowing costs sharply higher, which it says is "a boon to banks that had languished as central banks cut interest rates last year to prop up economies after the collapse in output caused by the pandemic."

On the markets, the FT says that "investors have also stampeded into sectors such as materials, commodities, consumer goods and industrials in recent weeks, sending prices higher."

The Guardian, another leading UK publication, reports that the Biden plan "lays the ground for a US economic bounce-

back that would have seemed unthinkable last year, but which will now be felt around the planet."

It refers to the intergovernmental Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, saying that America is set to be the only one of its member states whose economy will be larger at the end of 2022 than the OECD was predicting before the pandemic.

"For a time this year, the US is expected to grow faster even than China, which has not happened for years," it adds while noting that "this involves some economic risk - though slack in the US economy ought to restrain inflation."

Meanwhile, in its reporting and analysis, the BBC notes that "Joe Biden just notched his first legislative victory."

It says "Now that the \$1.9tn Covid relief bill has cleared Congress, the new administration will have a firehose of money to fight the economic and social consequences of the pandemic."

The UK's international broadcaster however says that "how effectively and efficiently Biden's team distributes that aid will go a long way toward determining the success of its first term."

"This massive relief package, which provides record amounts of support for low-income families, is a significant accomplishment. Democrats have a lot of work to do if they want any more such wins," it adds.

The American network CNN points to the global impact of the Rescue America Plan as part of its coverage.

Looking at how the plan was expected to stimulate the economy in the aftermath of the pandemic, CNN draws a comparison to China's explosive growth rate.

"The last time the two countries' growth rates were even somewhat close was during the dotcom boom. In 1999, the roaring US economy grew at 4.8% and China expanded at 7.7%," CNN reported referring to the World Bank.

The United States hasn't surpassed China's GDP growth pace since 1976, World Bank statistics show.

"Still, 2021 looks to be the year when the United States replaces China as the biggest growth driver on the world stage, at least temporarily," CNN said.

It also reports that the US economic outlook is getting a boost from progress in defeating the pandemic, saying "the acceler-

ation in the roll-out of vaccines, along with plunging deaths and cases, is raising hope that health restrictions depressing the economy could be lifted earlier than expected."

Here in Cayman, the US economic recovery will also be a key factor - especially for the tourism industry and its affiliated services - as the jurisdiction charts its way out of the slowdown caused by the pandemic.

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UK TERRITORIES CONNECTION

BVI TO RE-OPEN SEA BORDERS NEXT MONTH

The British Virgin Islands government is targeting mid-April to start gradually reopening its maritime borders.

There has been an outcry by the territory's private sector that the continued restrictions were hurting businesses and had called on the government to give a clear indication of its plans.

Maritime traffic provides a vital commercial link between the BVI and the outside world especially via the neighbouring United States Virgin Islands with cargo and passenger movement by ferry and yachting.

In an update in the House of Assembly Minister of Health and Social Development Carvin Malone said the ongoing vaccination campaign was critical in realising the April objective of opening the ocean borders and relaxing the strict entry requirements.

TCI's ONE-MAN OPPOSITION

The Turks and Caicos sole opposition member in the new parliament has pledged to keep the government on its toes.

Speaking during the swearing-in of the new legislators, Edwin Astwood, the one-man opposition member and Leader of the Opposition for the People's Democratic Movement (PDM), said he intends to be "the strongest Opposition in the history of our country."

Mr Astwood won the solitary seat for the PDM after it was swept out of office in last month's landslide win for the ruling Progressive National Party (PNP).

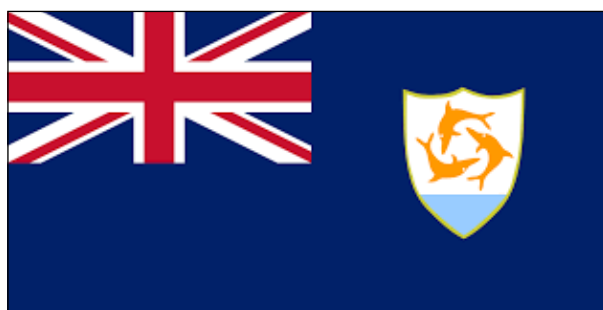
The former PDM minister of health in acknowledging that the PDM has secured an overwhelming mandate, stated: "One of the wonderful things about democracy is that when the people are unhappy, it is their right, their obligation and their duty to express their unhappiness, much to the regret most times to the incumbents."

SALARY CUTS FOR ANGUILLA LEGISLATORS

Members of Anguilla's Government and House of Assembly are taking home 15 per cent in their monthly pay packets.

With the island's economy still reeling from the effects of the pandemic, the pay cut proposed by the previous government last year has now been rolled over by the new administration of Premier Dr Ellis Webster.

Part of the previously announced cost-saving measures was a five per cent



reduction in the salaries of public servants, however that has been deferred to a later date.

MONTSERRAT WAITS ON BRITAIN FOR ITS BUDGET

The Montserrat government's 2021 budget has been delayed as it awaits a decision from the British government on the extent of its budget aid this year.

The island has been receiving UK budgetary aid for over 25 years since the eruption of its Soufriere Hills volcano decimated its economy.

The government is currently offering one-off cash grants of up to EC\$10,000/US\$3,700 to businesses to cushion the effects of the pandemic.

This follows an outcry from many in the island's private sector that they were on the brink of collapsing after the territory recently went into another lockdown due to a sudden spike in cases.

All cases have since recovered and the lockdown is being relaxed.

Meanwhile, Montserrat's popular cultural festival built around a slave rebellion on March 17th 1768 (St Patrick's Day) is restricted to an online celebration this year.



It is a major event on the island's tourism calendar and is a key contributor to the economy.

The event which also references the historic presence of the Irish in the British territory normally attracts huge numbers of nationals from the diaspora and other visitors.

ST HELENA CONTEMPLATES CHANGE

St Helena was voting on Wednesday March 17th in a consultative poll on governance reform.

The question to the public was if the current Governance System should be changed, and if so, whether it should be changed to a Revised Committee System or a Ministerial System.

The St Helena Government and the Legislative Assembly had described the poll as important and historic for the territory.

"We hope that as many voters as possible turn out on Polling Day to have their say on St Helena's future system of Governance - whether that be to keep the Current System or implement a Re-

vised Committee or Ministerial System," the government said.

The territory does not have an elected Chief Minister with the Governor functioning as the head of government.

A previous referendum in 2013 proposing a Chief Councillor elected by the members of the Legislative Council and other nominated members of the Executive Council was defeated by 158 votes to 42 on a 10% turnout.

The St Helena Government is made up of 8 directorates and the Legislative Council consists the Speaker and Deputy Speaker along with 15 members, 12 of whom are elected.

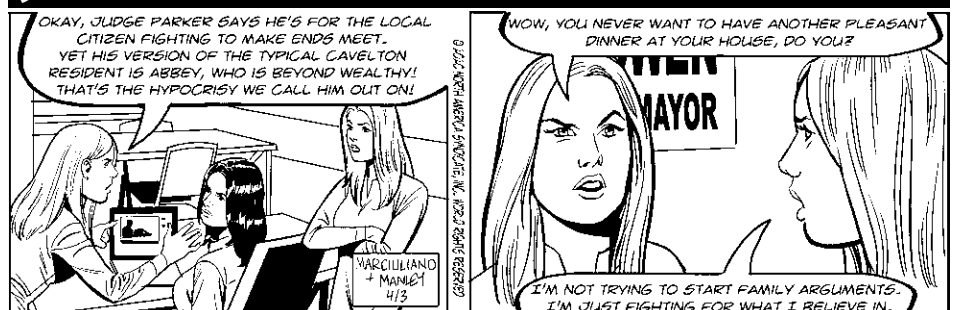
