BERNIE AND ROLSTON SPAR OVER WEST BAY NORTH

When West Bay North contenders, incumbent Bernie Bush and challenger Rolston Anglin met in the Chamber of Commerce's Candidates forum it was not as combative as the previous clash between the candidates for West Bay Central but it was equally compelling viewing and listening.

Both with considerable parliamentary experience - Mr

Statement from the Hon. Chief Justice

The case of *Kattina Anglin v. The Governor of the Cayman Islands* is of significant public interest. Case documents unjustifiably were not posted on the public website in a timely manner. The Clerk of the Court on 14th January 2021 explained, as she then understood it, why the ex parte Leave Application was not then on the website. The explanation was inadvertently misleading. On learning of her statement, I ensured the documents were made public and considered it necessary to issue a correcting statement setting out the accurate position. GIS did so on 2nd February 2021 at my direction. I hoped that setting out the correct position would reassure the public. The inconsistency of one with the other instead led to justifiable concern and some even questioned whether there might have been a deliberate attempt to suppress information. Unfortunately, some have also sought to impugn the integrity of Justice Williams and of the process.

I consider it vital that the public retains confidence in our Court system and consequently I instructed a Queen's Counsel to undertake an independent fact finding exercise to see how the situation arose.

Open justice is a core principle so I consider it right I give this detailed release with conclusions reached in the investigation:

- There are practical, public policy and legal reasons why *ex parte* applications for leave to bring judicial review proceedings should initially be kept off the public Register of Writs unless and until leave is granted. These reasons are set out in the 2019 Judgment of Justice Kawaley in Cause No. 30 of 2019. In this case, leave was granted and case documents should have been uploaded to the public website but were not.

- On the same day he issued it, 20th November 2020, Justice Williams' Personal

Assistant sent a written Judgment on the Leave Application to the relevant person in the Court Administration for publication on the Website in accordance with usual practice and internal guidance. It was not uploaded immediately onto the Register of Judgments, on the Website, because of inadvertent oversight by a member of the Court Administration.

- It is possible that the failure to upload the Judgment had a knock-on effect. Its absence may have reinforced a belief in the Court Administration that no leave had been given and no judicial authorization for publication of the proceedings that would allow them to upload other documents.

- No orders arising from the ex parte Application heard on 17th November 2020, (adjourning it for written judgment to come) or on the grant of leave on 20th November 2020, were filed because the Applicant's attorneys, who had carriage of the orders, failed to do so. This may have contributed to mistake.

- The intention of the judiciary to ensure open justice in this case and the approach of the judicial administration were at cross purposes as the administration followed a long standing but unsanctioned practice of requiring express judicial authorisation before publication of ex parte applications. Whilst initial withholding until decision was judicially accepted (at least in judicial review cases per Justice Kawaley's judgment (above)) the position post leave was not. This expectation of express notification of judicial permission for publication was contrary to Rule and Practice Direction whereby the default position is publication unless expressly prohibited.

- Justice Williams did not inhibit, prohibit or otherwise embargo the timely publication on the Website (or otherwise access to the public) of the Leave Appli-

cation, the Judgment or other documents in the Cause. He made no order to that effect and understood, correctly, that no authorisation from him was necessary for such publication (at least after the grant of leave). In particular, the Clerk of the Court did not, as suggested in her 14th January 2021 email quoted in the press, "reach out" to him about the case on a request from the Cayman Compass or otherwise, and he gave no "indication" to her at any time that the Application (or indeed any other document) was not available to the public. The press criticisms of him are unwarranted.

- The Clerk of the Court may have confused the earlier history and progress of these proceedings or misremembered events of November 2020 but she in fact "reached out" to no Judge and received no "indication" from any Judge in the way she suggested in that email.

- There are contemporaneous emails demonstrating that both Justice Williams and the Chief Justice, in the interest of transparency, favoured press admission to the 15th December 2020 *inter partes* direction hearing (which in the event was vacated because the parties agreed an order). It is likely that had the parties not agreed directions and the hearing vacated it would have been open to the Press.

- Justice Williams gave a detailed judgment to explain not only to the parties but the public his reasons for grant of leave. The Judgment itself supports this. He was aware that his Judgment had been released for publication and circulated. It had no embargo header required to prevent publication. He was entitled to believe that the normal process would follow and the Judgment would be placed on the Website in the usual way. In fact, he had been insistent on the correct procedure being followed in the case.

- Justice Williams had no reason to believe that the case documents were

not published on the Website until the CNS article of 21st January 2021. He did not speak to the Clerk of the Court about the release or non-release of information about the leave application. He did not have cause before that date to involve himself in or check the normal administrative process of publication and such involvement and checking was not the role of a Judge.

- On becoming aware of the issue, Justice Williams immediately contacted the Chief Justice about the inaccuracy concerning his supposed directions and challenged the narrative that he had been in contact with Court staff to prevent publication. He did everything he properly could to ensure a timely statement to the public of the true position.

I am now aware of weaknesses in administrative practice and they are being remedied. I am taking the necessary steps so that these unfortunate circumstances do not recur.



Ombudsman issues data protection order following ransomware attack

The Cayman Islands Ombudsman has found that a local liquor retail group contravened the Data Protection Law (2017) when it failed to take adequate technical and organizational measures to protect against unauthorized processing of employees', shareholders' and pension account members' personal data.

The Ombudsman also found that Jacques Scott Group Ltd. (JSG) failed to incorporate certain mandatory provisions into its agreement with its IT provider, which constitutes a separate violation.

JSG reported the ransomware attack last year after employees discovered they were locked out of a number of the company's critical network systems. The breach involved the personal data of about 150 people but did not include computer passwords or personal financial data. Jacques Scott was proactive in notifying both the Office of the Ombudsman and the affected individuals of the ransomware attack. In addition, along

with its IT services provider, the company did take mitigating action following the breach.

It is believed no customer data was accessed and, importantly, there appears to have been no serious or ongoing consequences for those whose data was compromised in the ransomware attack.

"This situation is a good representation of the serious data protection concerns now facing both private and public sector organizations in Cayman," said Sandy Hermiston, Cayman Islands Ombudsman. "Mitigation after the fact is simply not enough. All of these entities must proactively take security precautions with their computerized record-keeping systems – the Data Protection Law makes it their responsibility."

JSG separately sought and received recommendations on IT security from Deloitte and the Ombudsman supported these recommendations, urging their implementation. In addition, the Ombuds-

man recommended future steps to prevent ransomware attacks including:

• Providing training to employees on cybersecurity prevention and response, in line with any information security policies and procedures the company may develop

• Enabling logs on all critical network devices to ensure information is kept in the event of future cyberattacks and also ensuring multiple backups of information are maintained with that at least one backup kept off-site

• Implementing periodic vulnerability assessments to identify IT security weaknesses

As with all enforcement orders made under the Data Protection Law, the entity against which the order is made has 45 days to seek judicial review of the Ombudsman's decision. Anglin a former minister - argued persuasively for the constituency and national issues they would champion.

Specific to West Bay North, incumbent MP Bernie Bush listed poverty, property ownership and the future of the Barkers Nature Park as the main challenges facing the district.

Mr Anglin cited employment, care for senior citizens, improving the public infrastructure and the environment as in need of attention.

Nationally, Mr Bush listed the cost of living, healthcare and the pension system as his three top priorities.

Mr Anglin spoke of affordable housing, adequate household earnings, and insurance especially health insurance as warranting urgent attention nationally.

Discussing the cost of living Mr Bush proposed reducing import duties on essential items, a strategy not supported by his challenger.

"We have to look on the essentials and wave duties," he maintained.

Mr Anglin who lists affordable housing as one of his national priorities expanded on that as a means of reducing the overall cost of living with an equity credit scheme.

"This would instantly lower the monthly payments for every single Caymanian," he said, adding that government should support green initiatives for housing such as solar panels with zero import duties.

Both MP Bernie Bush and his challenger Rolston Anglin say any decision to reopen the borders should be based on the advice of the health professionals, and linked to the vaccination programme both in Cayman and the internationals from which Cayman sources its trade and tourism.

In the interim Mr Anglin said the tourism stipend should be further increased to \$2000.

The viability of the Turtle Centre came up during this session looking at the economic impact on the attraction from the pandemic.

MP Bush said it should not be closed as it's an asset to Cayman for both scientific value and leisure activities.

Challenger Anglin said management issues at the centre which have been brought to his attention need to be resolved first.

"Once we understand what's happening, we need to ensure that we put the neces-

sary leadership and talent in place to maximize the potential of the turtle centre."

That was just one of the issues pertaining to sustainable development which spread across the discussion.

Another was preserving the Barkers Nature Park with both candidates lamented the scale on ongoing development in Cayman and questioning the immediate and long term impact.

Bernie Bush: "They've gone overboard. We have to protect what's left for my grandchildren, your grandchildren, your great-grandchildren."

"It's time for us to grab the bull by the horns and say enough is enough."

Mr Bush also suggested revisiting the previous National Development Vision 2000.

The importance of the National Development Plan was also highlighted by Mr Anglin who also pointed to what he sees as an urgent problem for Cayman; sewage management.

In discussing reserving certain jobs exclusively for Caymanians, Mr Anglin, a former minister of Labour, proposed a quota system based on a policy he had introduced while in office.

"If you allocate a job and say that it's only for Caymanians, what happens when you don't have Caymanians who want or enter that job category?" he asked.

"When you have a quota system what you can do is that you can ensure that certain jobs are designated for Caymanians by having a quota of zero."

From Mr Bush's point of view, "We have to sit down with the Chamber of Commerce with the Labour Office and say which sector are we going to look at. We just can't just pick them out of the air...I have no problems saying, 'Yes, this particular job is for Caymanians only'."

This was also reflected in opportunities for young Caymanians aggravated by the current economic climate where lack of opportunities was associated with a high incidence of stress.

The two candidates felt that the law for the district councils needs to be amended to enable them to be more effective and called for more community policing in West Bay North.

They also share concerns about traffic density with a public transportation system seen as a solution.

CIFS Respond to Landfill Fire

Crews from the Cayman Islands Fire Service (CIFS) and the Department of Environmental Health (DEH) are tackling a large fire at the George Town landfill site.


The fire is contained to the metals area where CIFS are working to establish four points of attack using defensive fire-fighting tactics and safe systems of work.

Heather Bodden fights for Savannah

Heather Bodden, OCI, Cert. Hon., JP who is running for election in Savannah alongside "Community Builds Country," candidates Osbourne Bodden for Bodden Town East, and Wayne Panton for Newlands, held an election campaign meeting outside her home in Savannah on Saturday March 20. Ms Bodden is former elected MLA for Bodden Town District from 1995 - 2000, a Justice of the Peace for 13 years,

and chairperson of the Cayman Islands Beautification Committee for 20 years.

There were many endorsements, first from Stephanie Bodden who spoke of Heather as an exemplar of women's empowerment. Maxine Bodden was next: "You call her, and she is there. How many other representatives have you tried to reach who will not return your call, who will not engage with you, but they have all the answers. They don't want to hear your troubles. But you know what? Heather

does and she is already helping you with them," she said.

Wayne Panton told the audience all about how Heather Bodden never seems to tire of helping people in her community: "People don't talk about how incredible Heather is. They talk about how big her heart is. They talk about how committed to her community she is. They talk about how she cares about every single person. I can tell you she inspires me. I go into that office sometimes, and she comes in 20

minutes later. I say, "where you been? She says, "Oh someone wanted me to get some medication. Then I carried this for this man, and then I got some cards for these people and then I got a birthday cake for Mr. so and so and he enjoyed it...oh I've had a wonderful day already."

At the podium, Heather Bodden addressed many issues in Savannah and Newlands too, but also issues of national

concern: "The high rate of unemployment and underemployment is one of the most crucial issues facing Cayman today. We all know what happens when there is low or no employment: People go hungry. People go without health coverage and eventually somewhere to live. This sparks all forms of crime.

"The cost of living is an issue that we need to get on top of for the whole country but for our seniors too who have


limited income and their buying power is declining. We need to work together to find solutions there.

"We need a better more reliable public transport system which will allow us to restrict new cars coming onto the roads from work permit holders etcetera. We can't continue with things as they are because it will only get worse and have a greater impact on our quality of life," she said.

Tonight I appeal to each of you to elect the candidates that will do the right thing for you.

I have poured my heart and soul into this community for the past 30 years, working to make what you now call home a safe and desirable place to raise your family. I have made community service a priority but I need your vote to be able to do more not only community-wise, but on a national level. In a time such as the one we have faced in the past year, people are hurting, people need representatives who care, people need a voice and they need representatives who will listen," she said.

"We must look after our own. We must fill the job positions with our own, our public schools need to be addressed to have better student performance. We need to address areas of weakness in our schools Joanna Clarke Primary School will get a lot of attention and help from Wayne and myself. We will support that school to address identified weaknesses and improve its performance. No child should go hungry and no teacher should be without the supplies they need to teach our children," she said.

Two Breaches of Quarantine at Residence

Two separate instances of alleged breaches to the isolation protocols have been reported to the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) and are currently under investigation. Both instances involved travellers quarantining at residence (QAR)

In the first instance, during a routine welfare and compliance visit by the Travel Cayman Mobile Compliance Team it was observed that travellers were in an unapproved area of the quarantine property. The team carried out an inspection and it appeared that the travellers may have tampered with their monitoring device. The travellers have been warned for intended prosecution and have been transferred from the quarantine at residence location to a supervised quarantine facility.

The second incident was also identified during a routine welfare and compliance visit by the Travel Cayman Mobile Compliance team. These travellers were also

found to be in an unapproved area of the quarantine property and were also warned for intended prosecution. The travellers were reminded of the isolation protocols and conditions of the QAR programme which must be adhered to, and will complete the remainder of their quarantine at the property.

Public Health has confirmed that in both suspected breaches, all primary contact tracing protocols have been observed, and the public health department would like to reassure the public that there is no immediate cause for public health concern.

The Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) noted that investigations are ongoing and once completed, the files will be sent to the Office of the Director of Public Prosecution (DPP) for a decision.

The public and travellers are reminded that anyone that is found to be in breach of the mandatory quarantine



provisions will be warned for intended prosecution and is liable on conviction to a fine of up to ten thousand dollars and imprisonment for up to two years.

New Grand Court Judge Sworn in

New Grand Court Judge in the Financial Services Division, Hon. Justice David Doyle took his oath of office online, which was administered by His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Martyn Roper.

In attendance at the swearing in ceremony, which took place in the Governor's Office Tuesday, 23 March 2021, were the Chief Justice, Hon. Anthony Smellie and fellow Financial Services Division (FSD) justice, Hon. Ian Kawaley.

Prior to taking up his assignment in the Cayman Islands, Justice Doyle had served



as a Deemster and First Deemster (equivalent to High Court Justice and Chief Justice respectively) in the Isle of Man.

Announcing the appointment earlier in March, the Governor's Office noted that the Judicial and Legal Services Commission recently carried out an open recruitment process advertising the post both locally and overseas. Following a short-listing process, an interview panel interviewed three persons for this post ultimately recommending Deemster Doyle as the successful candidate. The Governor subsequently accepted the recommendation.

He stated, "The Financial Services Division

2 Men Arrested Following Drug Interdiction

On Monday, 22 March, at about 2:20PM, the Air Operations Unit was conducting security patrols when they came across two vessels appearing to meet up approximately 30 miles off the coast of Grand Cayman.

As the police helicopter approached, the two vessels separated at speed. One of the vessels set off in the direction of Jamaica and was observed discarding a number of packages. The other vessel set a course

for Grand Cayman. The Cayman Islands Coast Guard were directed by the AOU to the location of the packages and recovered 22 packages, containing approximately 770lbs of ganja.

Police later that same evening detained a vessel and arrested two local men aged 32 of East End and 27 of North Side. The men have now been released on police bail as the investigation continues.

HMCI Promotes Cayman's COVID Response Regionally

Following the positive public response to the COVID-19 national vaccine roll-out so far, Hazard Management Cayman Islands (HMCI) was invited by the Bermuda Red Cross (BRC) to speak about Cayman's experience on their local radio this week.

As part of a joint initiative by BRC and the Bermuda Broadcasting Company, disaster management representatives from around the region discussed the impact of COVID-19 and uptake of the vaccine in their community.

"The Cayman Islands' national response to the pandemic has been exemplary, and we are very pleased to be able to share our experience with neighbours in the region. While each country is grappling with its domestic response to and the effects of the pandemic, we still very much live in a highly connected world. We're all fighting this pandemic together. By passing on our lessons learned and best practices to other nations, we help to bring the world one step closer to returning to normalcy," commented the Minister for Home Affairs, Hon. Tara Rivers.

"Equally, it represents another excellent opportunity to further fortify working relationships and synergies with our overseas territory allies. In recent years, this

government has made a concerted effort to strengthen our collective resilience to better prepare us all for any future disasters."

A public education campaign, cross government support and efficient roll-out logistics have contributed towards a promising uptake of the vaccine so far. As reported by the Ministry of Health on Friday, 19 March, over half of adults in the Cayman Islands have had at least one dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine.

"While every nation will have its own particular demands, we all share similar challenges around grappling with the complex logistical challenge of vaccinating an entire population, encouraging the most vulnerable to get vaccinated, and addressing potentially dangerous misinformation that we can all learn from," said the Director of HMCI, Danielle Coleman.

"For three small islands in the Caribbean, the Cayman Islands' battle with COVID-19 has been hard fought but is in no way over. We look forward to continuing to work closely with partners in other overseas territories. This will help us to bring back new ideas and thinking that further bolster our response."

CIFS Bring Landfill Fire Under Control

Cayman Islands Fire Service (CIFS) crews alongside the Department of Environmental Health colleagues have worked tirelessly through Thursday night to contain and control a fire that was detected at the George Town landfill site earlier that day, using safe systems of work and effective monitoring.

Three tactical sectors continued excavating and extinguishing deep seats of fire with a much-improved scene on Friday morning.

A second excavator was provided to assist with excavating and damping down operations continuing throughout the day to minimize the chance of any re-ignition.

Chief Fire Officer, Paul Walker, QFSM said "I am immensely proud of the professionalism and dedication of my CIFS colleagues working hard to extinguish this large and challenging fire. Our work with partner agencies has been fantastic and together we have minimized the impact from the fire on residents and businesses in the landfill area. No injuries have been reported which is down to our focus on deploying crews using safe systems of work with effective command procedures."



NPO Registrar Offers NPO Compliance Session

To help newly registered and existing charitable organisations understand their compliance with the Non-Profit Organisations (NPO) Act (2020 Revision), the Registrar of NPOs is hosting an outreach session on Wednesday, 31 March, at 6pm in room 1038 of the Government Administration Building.

Controllers and/or senior officers from all NPOs which were registered since March 2020 are specifically invited to attend.

The session will cover anti-money laundering methods, best practices for good governance, and overall compliance with the NPO legal framework.

"This interactive session will help NPOs, especially those that are newly formed, understand the mechanics of the law and their compliance responsibilities," said Paul Inniss, the Head of Compliance for the Registrar of NPOs.

"We know that many of the NPOs registered since March 2020 likely have no previous compliance training and could benefit from this session. For the others, the session could serve as a useful refresher," he said.

The Registrar of NPOs is part of General Registry, which falls under the Ministry of Financial Services. It has registered more than 520 charities since 2017.

The NPO sector is one of the areas that are assessed by the Financial Action Task Force for effective anti-money laundering, counter financing of terrorism, and counter proliferation financing measures.
