As a result, Trevor has been recognised by both the Department of Children and Family Services and the Duchess of York at Child Month's first

event. Trevor found out he had received these awards as the Child Month 2021 (High Schools) awardee during the opening church service at the Red Bay Church of God (Holiness) which took place at the beginning of May.

The Child Month's superhero theme: My C.A.P.E – Challenges are Passable for Everyone, was particularly apt for Trevor, as he had not only rushed into a burning house to rescue the elderly man but he had also promptly called 911, a true superhero in his community. Before receiving the award, a video message was shown from Duchess Sarah Ferguson congratulating Trevor on his heroism and his award. He also received a plaque and laptop from the Department of Children and Family Services Director Paulinda Mendoza-Williams, who said Trevor's recognition was one of the highlights of the child-focused service.

Trevor was, she said, "an exceptional young man", having been the youngest ever Proud of Them recipient (Community and Academics) at just 11 years old. He is a Cayman Islands Cadet Corps sergeant and was the Most Outstanding Overall Recruit and Most Outstanding Clifton Hunter High School Recruit (2018). 

# ANNUAL PRAYER BREAKFAST PREACHES TOGETHERNESS

With a theme of ‘Make the most of this time: Develop the right mindset’, the 5th Annual Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast last Wednesday morning served to hopefully draw a line under the tensions which characterised the recent general election and government formation.

Hosted by new Hon. Minister for Health and Wellness, Sabrina Turner, the Prayer Breakfast featured scripture readings and calls for the community to come together following what Hon. Speaker McKeeva Bush himself described as “a bitter election campaign” during his presentation.

“It’s time to lay down the sword and pick up the plowshare. And so, I feel we set the example early. The election is past, the people’s choices have been made, our democracy is secured.”

Continuing in that vein, he said: “If our house be so divided, our country will not rest...God has been merciful to us. We must not and cannot squander this new opportunity with pettiness.”

HE Governor Martyn Roper also reflected on the election campaign and again urged the community to put it behind and move forward.

“We had our own challenges recently in the election where social media fed a growing assertiveness and polarisation in our society which we’ve seen across the world and is unhealthy for our democracy. I join the call of the speaker that we put that behind us, I urge everyone, continue to treat everyone else in our community, dignity, courtesy, respect at all times, even when differences are deeply held.”

Looking back at the events of the past month, Hon. Minister for Tourism and Transport Kenneth Bryan, who offered this perspective.

“In respect to formulating our government, there were some protests and some strong words in social media. And it may seem divisive but it depends on the eyes that you see them through,” Mr Bryan opined.

“For me, I saw it as finally Caymanians were starting to find their voice again.”

In a later remarks, Hon. Speaker McKeeva Mr Bush spoke of his confidence in the new government and Cabinet to navigate Cayman through the many challenges which he said the country faces, especially the COVID-19 pandemic.

“We have a new, very young and dynamic cabinet,” he said. “We’ve come a long way but we have many, many challenges,

let’s not forget that. The reality is there, this country faces tremendous challenges. Look around the world. And you will know what I’m saying.”

Acknowledging that “we want to open up because we need the money,” Mr Bush however urged stressed the importance of residents getting vaccinated in order for that to be realised.

It was a message also delivered by Hon. Minister for Tourism and Transport Kenneth Bryan.

“It’s very important that we find the best strategies to keep you safe. And based on the scientific information, vaccines are the only way that we know. So I ask of you, if you have not been vaccinated already, please consider it as God fearing people. I ask you to pray about it and I encourage you to think about being vaccinated to keep us all safe.”

HE Governor Martyn Roper also highlighted the importance of the vaccination campaign in an address that touched on several issues.

“Some people still have genuine concerns about vaccines and we should re-

spect (that) but I would just urge them to speak to health professionals and seek objective advice. Speak to family and friends who have taken it. I really do believe taking the vaccine is the Cayman kind of thing to do for everybody in our community, and I hope everyone here will encourage others to take it,” he said.

The Prayer Breakfast also featured scripture readings By Hon. Premier Wayne Panton and Hon. Leader of the Opposition Roy McTaggart alongside sermons by the local clergy.

## CUC 's profits down

Cayman's sole electricity provider, Caribbean Utilities Co, announced its net earnings for the first quarter of 2021 and they were down over the same period last year. For the quarter ending 31st March 2021, net earnings were \$3.3 million, decreasing \$0.5 million over the same quarter's earnings in 2020.

The decrease in net earnings was mainly due to higher general and administration and depreciation costs, which were partially offset by higher electricity sales revenues and lower finance charges, they said. After the adjustment for dividends on the preference shares of the Company, earnings on Class A

Ordinary Shares for Q1 2021 were \$3.2 million or \$0.09 per Class A Ordinary Share, compared to earnings on Class A

Ordinary Shares of \$3.7 million, or \$0.11 per Class A Ordinary Share for Q1 2020.

Electricity sales revenues were up for the first quarter of 2021, at \$21.4 million, which was an increase of \$0.2 million when compared to sales revenues for the first quarter of 2020. The reason for the increase was due to a 6.6% base rate increase which took effect on 1st June 2020 which was partially offset by a 6% reduction in kilowatt hour sales, CUC advised.

The Covid-19 pandemic, which hit the economy in March 2020, was blamed for a decrease in sales for the first quarter of 2021, which totalled 143.8 million kWh, a decrease of 8.5 million kWh in comparison to 152.3 million kWh for the first quarter of 2020. While the pandemic still takes its grip on the economy, CUC confirmed that


they would continue to focus on providing a safe, reliable and sustainable electricity service to its customers.

They also recorded no lost-time injuries during the first three months of 2021 and said that the reliability of service to customers was also still a major focus for the company throughout the pandemic. The Average Service Availability Index, the percentage of time power was available to customers, was 99.97% for the period.

CUC President and CEO, Richard Hew, said he was very pleased that during first

quarter of 2021 there were no lost-time injuries or significant recordable safety incidents.

"During the period the company also successfully completed the re-registration of its environmental management system to the ISO 14001 standard. The company is committed to the advancement of renewable energy and continued its discussions with the Utility Regulation and Competition Office to pursue a number of initiatives under the 2017 Integrated Resource Plan," he said.



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# Batteries remain suspected culprits for landfill fires

During the months of April and May the George Town Landfill has experienced three small fires.

These fires started within the surface in recently tipped waste – therefore it was likely contained within a load brought to the landfill. Whilst no source has been identified in each case, the issue of batteries in the waste remains a present risk and high likelihood of being the culprit.

“We have been ramping up our messages to help the community better understand the risks of improperly disposing batteries and the hazardous results this can cause. Our team working the landfill are our brothers and sisters and we urge the public to help us ensure their safety while they go about their jobs,” said Michael Haworth, Assistant Director – Solid Waste, DEH.

Thanks to the quick actions of the team at the Department of Environmental Health (DEH) along with the Cayman Islands Fire Service (CIFS) these were quickly isolated and extinguished but the threat to safety remains particularly if persons do not dispose of their batteries correctly.


DEH aims to provide communities on all three islands with the knowledge they need to create best practices at home for disposing of batteries.

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## LOCAL NEWS BRIEFS

## CABINET AND PARLIAMENTARY CODE OF CONDUCTS COMING

In related news, Hon. Premier Wayne Panton has committed to seeing through the codes of conduct for Cabinet members alongside a similar set of ethics rules and guidelines for parliamentarians.

Addressing the issue during his government's first press conference last week, Premier Panton said both codes were being prepared for implementation.

He recalled his efforts at the forefront of moves dating back over five years ago as a minister and legislator to have them instituted.

"Ironically, that's something that I had sort of worked on and had in fairly final form five years ago. It had never been taken up but I think it probably needs some tweaking now but I think we can move ahead."

Mr Panton said he had already indicated to HE Governor Martyn Roper and Hon. Speaker McKeever Bush that having both codes enacted is a priority for his government.

"I have given the Governor the indication that it's a priority for us to move for-

ward with and have that adopted by the Cabinet. I have also had a conversation with the Speaker indicating to him in relation to Parliament."

While the process for establishing the Cabinet code of conduct might be easier to achieve, Mr Panton said he was equally committed to seeing the Parliamentary code in place as well.

## DPP DEPARTS

Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP), Patrick Moran has quit the job citing personal reasons.

Mr Moran who joined the DPP's office in 2015 will officially leave the post in July but will be on vacation from the middle of this month.

In light of the unexpected announcement, the process to appoint a replacement has already started with the Governor's Office consulting with the Judicial

and Legal Services Commission on the appointment of both an interim post-holder and ultimately a new DPP.

In a statement thanking Mr Moran for his services to Cayman, the Governor Office said the outgoing DPP "contributed enormously to the prosecution of criminal matters, advancement of Cayman's status in accordance with C-FATF (Caribbean Financial Action Task Force) and undertaking of the National Risk Assessment."



## COMMISSION FOR STANDARDS IN PUBLIC LIFE

New appointments have been made at the Commission for Standards in Public Life (CSPL).

HE Governor Martyn Roper has announced that the oversight body will now be chaired by attorney-at-law Sonia Bush who succeeds Rosie Whittaker-Myles.

Other new members are; accountant Rosalie Twohey, retired lawyer Richard Addlestone and finance sector expert Keith Blake. They will join existing member Isatou Smith who was been with the Commission since November 2018.

CSPL appointments are for a four-year term.

According to a government statement, the work of the Commission has led to the long-awaited Standards in Public Life Act and Regulations, an important step forward for good governance for the Cayman Islands.



"I would like to thank Mrs. Whittaker-Myles and Ms. Hislop for their time, dedication and valuable contributions to the CSPL. I would like to especially thank Mrs. Whittaker-Myles for her guidance and leadership during her tenure," The Governor said in the statement.

The Commission for Standards in Public Life (CSPL) is an independent body enshrined in the Constitution to enhance democracy in the Cayman Islands and ensure that there is sufficient oversight of the public sector.

## GOVERNMENT FINANCES IN GOOD SHAPE

The PACT coalition government has reported that it has inherited government finances in generally good shape, particularly up to the first three months of the year.

Speaking during the new administration's first press conference since taking office on April 21st, Hon. Minister of Finance Chris Saunders revealed that Government is doing better in 2021 than in 2020 with respect to Surplus results for the Entire Public Sector.

He explained that combining the Government's surplus of \$196.2 million with a \$6.4 million net surplus from Statutory Authorities & Government-owned Companies (SAGCs), the Entire Public Sector (EPS), had a Surplus of \$202.6 million to 31 March 2021 which was \$43.1m better than budget and \$25.4m better than 2020.

Mr Saunders said the government's Debt-to-GDP ratio is a very favourable 5.1% - amongst the lowest in the world.

He affirmed that the PACT administration will refrain from borrowing for as long as possible but said this may become necessary if the borders remain closed and the economy is not operating at its full potential.

He assured that there will be no cuts in domestic spending and the government will be looking at ways to encourage

funds to remain in the domestic economy.

The Minister for Finance and Economic Development and Labour said motivating more people to support local farmers and being more energy-efficient would help to reduce the amount of money spent overseas to buy agricultural and fuel products.

However, Mr Saunders pointed out that stability in the government's finances is not necessarily an absolute reflection of how well the economy might be doing.

He estimates that the economy might have contracted by between CI\$600 million to CI\$1 billion due to the pandemic.

Kenneth Bryan, said, "We are proud to support Mariah during this time, and wish her best of luck at the Miss Universe Pageant. She has made great strides during her reign as Miss Cayman Islands Universe, especially in this challenging period."

## CAYMAN ON UK AMBER TRAVEL LIST

The Cayman Islands has only made it to the amber category of countries to which British tourists are allowed to travel for holidays.

The new traffic light system announced on Friday by the UK Transport Minister, Grant Shapps places countries around the world in green, amber and red categories with specific conditions for travel in each case.

For the Cayman Islands, the current amber rating means that British tourists should not travel here for leisure purposes, meaning tourism.

For persons who would need to travel to Cayman from England, upon returning to the UK they would need to complete a passenger locator form, take a series of COVID-19 tests, and quarantine for 10 days.

In a statement following Friday's publication of the UK's new traffic light travel system, HE Governor Martyn Roper said, "Although this may come as disappointing news to some, this is the first iteration of the red, amber and green lists and they will be reviewed every three weeks.

The self-isolation period from 17 May remains the same as faced by travellers to-

day – there is no change, just a new name for the rating system."

Mr Roper also said that "given Cayman's excellent response to the Covid-19 crisis I am hopeful that Cayman will move onto the green list at the review point. My office will remain in close contact with the UK as the list evolves."

He also pointed out that it's worth noting that the UK's 10-day self-isolation period is shorter than Cayman's mandated quarantine period for non-vaccinated travellers. Furthermore, he added, in the UK there remains the option to pay for a test-to-release scheme on day 5. A negative result ends self-isolation early."

"The UK, like Cayman, remains vigilant of their borders in the fight against Covid-19. As a result there are only a small number of countries on the green list, including places like Israel and Gibraltar where there are very high vaccination rates."

Other Overseas Territories on the amber list are; Anguilla, Bermuda, British Virgin Islands, Montserrat and Turks and Caicos Islands in the Caribbean, plus Pit-

cairn, British Indian Ocean Territory and British Antarctic Territory.

Gibraltar, the Falkland Islands, St Helena, Tristan da Cuna and Ascension will move from amber to green - 'all-clear' - list from Monday 17th May.

Keen to safely reopen its borders to international travel, Cayman is launching an intensified vaccination campaign starting with an all-day 'vaccination rally' this Saturday May 8th at the Owen Roberts International Airport where a vaccination centre is located. Mobile vaccination units are also being considered.

The new PACT coalition government has set a target of 70 per cent of the population to be fully vaccinated as the basis for reopening the borders, especially for tourism.

With the UK being one of Cayman's main tourism markets, eventually getting on the 'green' travel list, coupled with reaching the vaccination target here are key objectives looking towards a possible 2021 peak tourism season.

In a statement on Friday outlining the new UK travel traffic light system, Trans-



port Secretary (Minister) Grant Shapps said: "Today marks the first step in our cautious return to international travel, with measures designed above all else to protect public health and ensure we don't throw away the hard-fought gains we've all strived to earn this year."

He said it's "a new way of doing things", adding that "people should expect travel to be different this summer – with longer checks at the borders, as part of tough measures to prevent new strains of the virus entering the country and putting our fantastic vaccine rollout at risk."

While life in the Cayman Islands in the 19th and early-to-mid part of the 20th centuries might have been hard with few luxuries or home comforts, there was a real sense of camaraderie and excitement as soon as musical instruments were produced for the community's enjoyment. People saw dances as one of the easiest ways to have fun, and so they were extremely popular at that time.

The November 1978 *Norwester* magazine noted that dances were a widely used form of entertainment in the districts and were usually held in someone's home or yard. Music was provided by local musicians proficient in the banjo, fiddle and grater, with sometimes the maracas or bottle as an accompaniment.

In the 3rd January 1992 edition of the *Caymanian Compass*, it noted how kitchen dances and pan dances were part of the Christmas season celebration. Kitchen dances were held, naturally, in the kitchen, which was a separate building from the house, called a caboose. Dances were held from Christmas sometimes all the way until late March, when the men would be home from sea. Pan dances involved hitting a pan like a drum, with someone else scraping a grater and the general community singing and dancing along to the music.

According to the *Caymanian Weekly* of 1st January 1970, an old-time orchestra consisted of a triangle, scraping grater, drum and accordion along with a violin. During the dance, the men rarely touched their partners, and instead, danced holding the front of their jackets while the women wheeled out their skirts as they danced.

Some of the dances that Caymanians enjoyed were the quadrille, waltzes and the polka. The quadrille was a particular favourite, originally popular during French society during the late 18th Century and then it found its way to England in the early 19th Century. It derived its name from the style of dance, whereby partners would stand in a square. In the West Indies, there was a good deal of an African influence to the dance, according to an article in *Newstar* from May 1990, which details how more tempo, more rhythm, and livelier steps were all a feature of the quadrille in the Caribbean. The Cayman quadrille was a mix of two specific types of quadrille – ballroom (more formal) and camp (livelier), however it has its own specific style, with six figures danced to six specific tunes – Scottish or Irish folk tunes – such as 'Listen to the Mockingbird', 'Dixie Land' and 'Nellie Gray'. The quadrille was traditionally danced for special

occasions such as weddings and especially at Christmas. The band itself that played the music for the quadrille was an important element and consisted of a fiddle (the lead instrument), a cow-skin drum, and a grater.

## Plays, skits

The George Town Town Hall, since renamed as Constitution Hall, was a focal point for many people in the early part of the 20th Century as a place to gather and watch plays and skits being performed. It was an important meeting place for the community and served as a venue for such performances for many decades throughout that century. In July 1970, the Cayman Drama Society was formed as an informal group and put on a play called 'See How They Run', running for three nights in November 1970. According to the CDS, it was the first full play ever presented in Cayman with scenery, costumes and props. The Town Hall, they say, was "bursting at the seams every night". On the first night, there was much consternation when the curtains opened to reveal what looked like a house built on the stage – a theatrical illusion many local people had not previously seen. But they all settled down and quickly got on terms with the play, laughing in all

the right and even the wrong places. The event was a joyful occasion for everyone and most rewarding for the fledgling Society. An extra performance was needed, to meet public demand.

## Kids make their own fun

For children, entertainment was rudimentary in the early development of Cayman and very much home-grown. Games included marbles, home-made gigs (spinning tops), kites, rounders, swimming and diving. Ring-a-rosies was a popular game with girls while boys enjoyed cricket. Skipping ropes were crafted out of bayvine and balls were made out of rags rolled tightly and weighted with sand and then stitched. Boats were made out of coconut husks, complete with a little husk and a leaf for a sail.

Singing was also a popular pastime, with early singing games taught by British and West Indian teachers and passed down the generations either at school or in church. Popular ring songs sung by children included 'Sally, Sally, Water' and 'I Tisk It, I Tisk It'.

Times may have been hard a century or so ago, but the ingenuity and spirit of the Cayman community meant that entertainment was always around the corner.

# Police Investigate Two Drug Incidents in April that Lead to Charges Being Laid

On Sunday, 18 April, officers on patrol in East End observed two vehicles travelling at high speeds on the Queen's Highway. The vehicles appeared to be driving in convoy. The vehicles were both stopped and searched. One vehicle, which was being driven by a 30-year-old man of East End, was found to be carrying over 120lbs of ganja, and the other vehicle that was being driven by a 23-year-old woman of no fixed address contained over 8lbs of ganja.

As a result, both the man and woman were arrested on suspicion of drug-related offences, and were subsequently charged with Possession of Ganja with Intent to Supply. They both appeared in court on Tuesday, 20 April, where the man was released on conditional bail and the woman was remanded in custody.

The following week, on Tuesday, 27 April, police searched a residence located in the Spotts Newlands area, under the Misuse of Drugs Law. During the search, officers found and seized a large quantity of ganja and, as a

result of this recovery, two men, ages 31 of West Bay and 49 of Bodden Town, as well as one woman, age 29 of West Bay, were arrested on suspicion of drug-related offences. The woman has since been bailed by the police pending further investigation.

As part of their investigations, officers conducted searches of other residences in West Bay and a further quantity of ganja was recovered. A second woman, age 26, of West Bay, was arrested on suspicion of drug-related offences.

This investigation has led to the recovery of over 800lbs of ganja.

The 49-year-old man of Bodden Town and 31-year-old man of West Bay have both been charged with two counts of Possession of Ganja with Intent to Supply. The 26-year-old woman of West Bay, was also charged with one count of Possession of Ganja with Intent to Supply. All three persons appeared in court on Friday, 30 April. Both men have been remanded by the court, while the woman was conditionally bailed.




As we gear up for the world to return to a new normal, the
