

To Be-Or Not to be-Vaccinated



I write this for two reasons. First I hope it will encourage my fellow Evangelical Christians to remember, as the Psalmist stated, that "Our God is a God of salvation, and to God, the Lord, belong deliverances from death" (Psalm 68:20). I will state categorically that every discovery that has saved human lives is from God. Science is not the purview of atheists; science belongs to God, the Creator and sustainer of the universe (and the sustainer of life). The second reason that I feel compelled to write this is because I am becoming increasingly embarrassed by some of the chatter that I hear in the Evangelical camp-which in essence is just an echo chamber—people choosing to speak and listen to only that which they are already convinced of. If that attitude had prevailed during the days of William Jenner and Louis Pasteur, where would the science of immunology be today?

At times I hear many of my fellow Christians complaining that people in certain camps ignore science in order to promote their sexual ideology, for example. But this is exactly what I see when it comes to the all-too-common attitude among Evangelicals with reference to vaccinations—in particular, the Covid-19 vaccines. I read somewhere recently that in the U.S. the largest group that is resisting Covid-19 vaccination is Evangelicals. From what I have detected, Cayman and much of the

Caribbean have caught the "American evangelical bug," symptoms of which include the belief in some conspiracy theory associated with vaccination, distrust of Bill Gates, and the rather naive expectation that there should be no adverse results associated with any world-wide vaccination.

Therefore, on the one hand, local Evangelical and other conservative Christians express their distress that those who wish to promote non-Christian views of human sexuality are ignoring science in preference of their feelings, while on the other hand many of us operate along the same lines when it comes to Covid-19 vaccination.

I assume that by now most of us will have read and heard enough about vaccines to know what they are. As a Christian pastor, I believe that since God is in the business of saving lives, and not taking them, that he chose two committed Christian men to bring about the initial gains in vaccination and immunology that we enjoy today. We know from history that the first human vaccines against viruses were based using weaker or "weakened" (attenuated) viruses to generate immunity. The smallpox vaccine used cowpox, a poxvirus that was similar enough to smallpox to protect against it but usually didn't cause serious illness. This breakthrough was at the hands of Edward Jenner, a committed follower of Christ. Rabies was the first virus attenuated in a lab to create a vaccine for humans. The breakthrough for this can be credited to Luis Pasteur, the celebrated French microbiologist and chemist, honoured as "the father of bacteriology." Pasteur was a devout Christian, whose work set the stage for some of the greatest advances in medical science.

I am not a doctor, so I look to doctors when I need medical advice and action. But I never forgot the name of William Jenner from my days in elementary school, where we were taught about his discovery—one that has saved multiplied millions of lives. Some things have changed from Jenner's days. I have read that vaccines are now made using several different processes. The most common method until today has been to make a vaccine that contained either live viruses that have been weakened or altered so as not to cause illness, or inactivated or killed viruses; as well as inactivated toxins for bacterial diseases. A recent development, and one directly related to the Covid-19 vaccine, are vaccines using mere segments of the disease-causing virus.

I recall that immediately after my daughter was born (I was in the birthing room), the nurse took her aside and administered some sort of vaccination. I believe it was against Tetanus. And over the years I myself have received multiple vaccinations for all sorts of pathogens. In reality, each year more than 10 million vaccinations are administered to American infants (those one year old and under). Thankfully, because of vaccination as a medical tool, smallpox-a disease that caused fatalities in 30-40% of cases-has now been declared as eradicated. But vaccines are not perfect; even if they were, human bodies and immune systems are not. So despite its effectiveness, there were adverse events associated with the smallpox vaccine. According to some sources, an average of 28 persons out of every million who received the smallpox

vaccine had life-threatening reactions to it, with a mortality rate of one to two people per million.

This reality of adverse events associated with vaccinations in general must be appreciated in the greater reality that smallpox, polio, and many other vaccines are the single greatest life-saving medical intervention and invention in human history. Thanks be to God for his great mercy. I declare with the psalmist, "Our God is a God of salvation, and to God, the Lord, belong deliverances from death." And I now encourage my Christian brothers and sisters to celebrate the fact that science is of God, as is medicine, as is vaccination, and in faith trust him to preserve your life when you act unselfishly to be vaccinated. And, by the way, I wouldn't worry about receiving the "mark of the Beast" by way of vaccination any more than I would suggest that someone could receive the "mark of Christ" accidentally.

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MORE COVID RESTRICTIONS RELAXED

Significant changes have been announced to the current regime of strict COVID-19 protocols in Cayman.

The changes, which will be in effect until July 15th in the first instance, relax particular restrictions currently in place on travelling, as well as preparations for the hurricane season and carnival events

Among the changes is the removal of pre-flight PCR testing for returning resi-

dents who are travelling back to the Cayman Islands and were vaccinated by the Health Services Authority (HSA).

A government release says this applies only if the traveller has completed a full course of vaccination by the HSA against the COVID-19 disease at least two weeks before boarding.

In a development seen as linked to the onset of the hurricane seasons, emergency shelters can accommodate over 500 persons indoors but only in circumstances where the premises are being used as

an emergency shelter in the event of a threat of a disaster or the aftermath of a disaster.

With planning underway for what will be a scaled-down 2021 summer carnival season, parties, stage shows, concerts and other social activities related to parades are now permitted.

However, parades, including carnival parades, are still prohibited, regardless of location and the number of persons participating, and require the express approval of the Cabinet via regulation to occur.

The government statement says however that Cabinet will continue to determine what public health measures are necessary, including after July 15th and may continue to amend the regulations and/or extend these restrictions as long as required.


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Easing these restrictions is seen as a first major decision by the PACT coalition administration in line with the drive to increase the vaccination rate and positioning Cayman to return to normality.



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Young Caymanian nets job at Apple TV+

Possessing an artistic flair that has shone from an early age, 22-year-old Jazz Pitcairn is currently putting her creative talents to exciting use, having recently landed a job at Apple TV+, working as the assistant to Executive Producing Director, Silas Howard. This makes Jazz the only

Caymanian since Frankie Flowers and the only Caymanian female to have achieved such success at the level she has in the industry at such a young age.

As a youngster Jazz loved to dance, travelling to perform with the Barnes Dance Academy and winning several NCFA awards for dance and piano during her early school years. A multi-talented mu-

sician, Jazz plays the piano, saxophone, clarinet, flute and violin. An early leader, Jazz participated in Model United Nations (MUN), travelling to Yale University and Budapest for MUN conferences. Her participation in the Global Young Leaders Conference in 2014 took her to Washington and New York.

A member of the Cayman Drama Society since 2009, Jazz acted in Annie, and worked as backstage crew on several productions. Graduating from Cayman Prep and High School and then Trinity College School in Canada, Jazz began her film career early on, having been nominated for Best Local Filmmaker in 2016 for her first film, Missing at the Cayman International Film Festival, and then working on Luna's Ring (dir.Badir Awe, 2018), Tocsin (dir. Frank Flowers, 2018), and In This Moment (dir. Frank Flowers, 2020).

"From a young age, I have been in love with storytelling. Whether through dance, theatre or art and music, " she said. "I remember watching Leroy Holness in Rundown at a young age at the Harquail Theatre. He is hilarious. So talented. I was inspired to bring that same level of entertainment to mass audiences around the world. I started writing plays, which quickly turned into screenplays about life in Cayman. We live in such a vibrant, diverse, and unique community...I wanted to tell our stories."

From 2017-2018 Jazz attended Northeastern University, and studied abroad in Rome, Italy, Attending Northeastern gave her a different perspective of filmmaking, and the ways in which movies shape culture, and vice versa. Her efforts there creating a short film, Pinion saw it being selected for the Northeastern University Campus Movie Fest. From 2018 to 2021 Jazz attended New York University (NYU), eventually earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts Film and Television Degree and a minor in Entertainment Business. She graduated Summa Cum Lade with a 3.95/4 GPA. While attending NYU she completed internships at a host of studios including CNBC, CBS, Bravo, HBO and A24, learning the ropes of her profession. During her time at NYU (one of the best film-making schools in the world), Jazz wrote/directed/produced five short films, directed two episodes of student television shows and produced nine short films, many of which were selected for student film exhibitions

"To assist my parents with the costs, I worked full time at NYU in Residence as a Resident Assistant. This experience inspired my first television pilot. It got great feedback and exposed me to producers and agents. I also interned every semester I was eligible in order to make some money and gain experience to best position me for life post-graduation," she confirmed.

Currently, Jazz works as the assistant to Silas Howard, an executive producer, and





director of the Apple TV+ show, Dickinson (starring Hailee Steinfeld and Jane Krakowski).

"This opportunity came through the recommendation of a professor who was impressed with my work," she advised.

Silas Howard started in filmmaking with his first feature By Hook or By Crook (Sundance 2002), made with Harry Dodge. His credits include Pose, Dickinson, Transparent, This is Us, High Maintenance, and his most recent feature A Kid Like Jake. Last week, Variety predicted that Howard would be nominated for an Emmy in the Outstanding Director for a Comedy Series category this year.

"Jazz has been instrumental to my success this season on Dickinson. She's quick, witty, smart, and talented. I rely on her to help me prep and conceptualize my vision for the show. It won't be long before she has a television series of her own," Silas said.

"Cayman is such an incredible community of artists and filmmakers," Jazz said. "Frankie Flowers for example has been an incredible inspiration of mine. He left Cayman to pursue his dreams, and succeeded. He has since made it a priority to give back to the Cayman filmmaking community and has been a great mentor of mine. Other Caymanian writers and producers like Brittany Suzanne Kelly and Badir Awe have been instrumental in my development in the local filmmaking world. I can't wait to mentor other Caymanians who are interested in filmmaking."

Jazz said her experience as a producer's assistant on the Apple TV+ show, Dickinson, has showed her that she has a knack for producing, as well as writing and directing.

"I have some exciting opportunities lined up for myself in the producing world over the next few months. I can't divulge what they are at the moment, but once I can, I will be incredibly excited to share that with Cayman," she stated. 'Like Frankie Flowers and Grace Gealey, my dream is to build a brand that we celebrate as Caymanian and see how this can be used to continue to grow our islands globally."

Jazz said she was so fortunate to have her parents John and Theresa Pitcairn behind her all the way.

"I couldn't be more grateful for such kind, supportive, and hard-working parents. Their 'no foolishness' attitude to parenting only inspires me to work harder every day. My siblings Jade, David and I have been fortunate to have them," she confirmed

The project proponent, Dart, is undertaking an EIA for its proposed energy recovery and recycling facilities at the George Town Landfill. The result of the EIA will be an Environmental Statement (ES) which will help to inform the decision-making process.



THE PACT CHALENGE: A PERFECT STORM OR SEA OF OPPORTUNITIES

June not only marks the start of the hurricane season.

For the new PACT coalition of independents, it's also a starting point to embark on realising the worthy ideals encompassed in its acronym (People-driven, Accountable, Competent and Transparent).

It sets the stage for a veritable sink or swim scenario; a perfect storm or the opportunity to set Cayman on a new course in a sea of opportunities.

A confident display by the PACT government during its recent inaugural press conference, though short on detail, points to the very real challenges facing the new administration...and by extension, Cayman.

Understandably, the new government was not expected to be brimming with detail on policy priorities and execution plans - although that would have been welcome. It has newly moved into office (the emphasis being on 'new') and is still getting to grips with the civil service land-scape.

As a government formed of independents, negotiating individual portfolios after the political acrobatics of the coalition formation must be seen as an early accomplishment in itself.

But the really big decisions on which the government will be judged and rated are pending...and looming.

Chief among these are the pandemic, accelerating the vaccination drive, avoiding discarding vaccines, reopening the borders, restarting tourism, re-aligning the economy, safeguarding the environment and securing the long-term future of the vital financial services sector.

That's just the start of a long and demanding 'to-do' list.

Notwithstanding the eagle-eyed scrutiny promised by the Official Opposition - the Progressives Alliance which formed the last government - it's an encouraging sign to see the new ministers setting about getting a grasp of what their portfolios really entail.

Quite noticeable and laudable is the mentoring, chaperoning and general handholding of the freshman ministers, not just by Cayman's cadre of capable senior civil servants, but by their more experienced coalition colleagues.

Those with prior ministerial and parliamentary experience stand out, notably Premier (and former minister) Wayne Panton, Speaker (and former chief minister) McKeeva Bush and former Progressives cabinet minister Juliana O'Connor-Connolly, along with Finance Minister Chris Saunders and Tourism Minister Kenneth Bryan who bring their parliamentary experience from the opposition benches.

Min. Saunders seemed well on top of his brief straight off the mark with a detailed recap of how well the government's finances - albeit inherited - have been performing, despite the impact of the pandemic.

More importantly, his realistic outlook of the hurdles that lie ahead, though sobering, is reassuring. The same goes for Min. Bryan who has demonstrated a pragmatic grasp of the challenges and opportunities in the tourism sector.

But it's in Mr Saunders' portfolio - and on his shoulders mainly - that the burden and responsibility of the first real policy delivery of the new administration falls.

Budget Day looms in June and translating platform pronouncements into policy while at the same time reflecting the



promises of his fellow independent coalition members, will require acrobatic fiscal planning and political agility in equal measure.

In the absence of a defined mission statement by the new PACT coalition of independents, the crafting of the budget could be the real pact that glues the coalition together.

The pressure on PACT is that it's faced with a perfect storm of pressing priorities, the likes of which none of its predecessors has had to confront.

How well it navigates this perfect storm of challenges and sails Cayman into a sea of opportunities will define its period in government.





Meditation on the Lawn is an initiative held in conjunction with www.Blue-IslandOracle.com to teach people how to harness the power of their minds, she advised, stating that the aim was to build



a community within Cayman which seeks the benefits of meditation and spiritual wellness.

"Together, we aim to offer up tools to encourage self-care practices, at a low cost, as well as offer a peaceful outdoor forum for the classes," she said.

Ms Hill explained: "We believe that meditation is a tool available to every human being with a mind. This tool has been used throughout the history of mankind in different ways and in different parts of the world to different ends."

The event is geared toward both genders, age 35 and over and there are just limited spaces so people are encour-

The Gallery's Siebens Labyrinth is a great place in which to walk and unwind,





BERMUDA MULLS MINIMUM WAGE INCREASE

The Bermuda government is reviewing recommendations for a minimum wage averaging between \$13.20 and \$17.30 with a median range of \$15.75 per hour.


The territory's Wage Commission chairman, Cordell Riley, reported that they reviewed a sample of countries to understand the range of minimum wages applied.

"I must note that Switzerland has the highest minimum wage at \$24.76 while Turks and Caicos have the lowest at \$6.25."

However, he said when comparing the cost of living of those countries to Bermuda's, all had a lower cost of living.

In its report, the Wage Commission said most modern, developed countries have a minimum/living wage regime.

Mr Riley said, "Among the more developed nations of the world, Bermuda is among the few that does not research outlined the many benefits realised by employ-



have a minimum wage, and the goal is to remove us from that list."

The Bermuda Wage Commission chairman said their

ers and employees in countries where a minimum and/or living wage has been instituted.

"With the establishment of a minimum and liveable wage, Bermuda can benefit from the lessons learned in these countries," Mr Riley said.

The report is to be presented to the Bermuda House of Assembly this month.

The Bermuda Chamber of Commerce, while welcoming the report, has pointed out the potential impact on the cost of living, especially with higher prices for some goods and services.

It has also raised the prospect of some businesses not being able to function with the added costs.

The Commission began its work in earnest last February looking into establishing levels for minimum wage and a liveable wage in Bermuda.

BVI WORK FROM PARADISE

The Government of the Virgin Islands is introducing its version of the increasingly popular remote worker/digital nomad scheme.

Promoted as the Work In Paradise programme, it allows persons to work remotely from the BVI by acquiring an extended stay.

Premier and Minister of Finance Andrew A. Fahie said that the initiative is one of the many which his government

plans to introduce "to acquire additional streams of revenue to strengthen the economy in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic."

Explaining the structure of the initiative, Premier Fahie said persons who visit for the Work in Paradise programme will not be allowed to work for a company operating in the BVI.

Meanwhile, Minister for Labour and Immigration, Vincent Wheatley said he is confident that the programme will prove



to be a sustainable stream of income for the people of the Virgin Islands.

"The introduction of new revenue streams are needed to propel the BVI into new arenas, thus resulting in more financial flexibility. Similar to other island nations across the Caribbean, the BVI has realised lower tourist arrivals as a result of COVID-19, and as such the introduction of a remote workers programme will encourage more arrivals to our shores."

ANGUILLA's VACCINATION INCENTIVES

Anguilla has launched a COVID-19 daily prize draw that's running until the end of this month as part of initiatives to meet its COVID-19 vaccination target

The incentive which also includes a grand prize of a three-night stay to the neighbouring island Nevis is open to everyone who has been vaccinated.

It's called the VAXAXA challenge - VAX for vaccine and AXA being the international aviation abbreviation for Anguilla.

A joint statement by Anguilla's Governor, Premier and Chief Medical Officer, said the

initiative followed a recent spike in cases.

Anguilla is also under pressure to use up vaccines donated by the British government which now approaching their expiry date.



Stressing that the island is still in an emergency, the Anguilla officials say in order to return to normalcy it is vital that the adult population is vaccinated.

LORD AHMAD IN DIRECT VACCINE PLEA TO **MONTSERRAT**

Lord Tariq Ahmad, the British Minister responsible for Commonwealth relations, has made a direct appeal to the people of Montserrat to take the COVID-19 vaccine.

In an interview on the government-owned Radio Montserrat, the UK official said he was "really concerned when I heard about the reticence we've seen from some of the people in Montserrat."

He appeared in the video call alongside Montserrat's Governor, Andrew Pearce, Premier Easton Taylor-Farrell and UK NHS advisor Professor Tim Cummings.

Vaccine hesitancy in Montserrat has meant that the island (population, 4,500 appx) has had the lowest vaccination rate in the overseas territories - around 30% - compared to other OTs averaging well over 60%.

The reluctance stems from concerns over incidents of blood clots associated with the UK Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine which is being used in Montserrat. British and other global health officials have pointed out that this anomaly has only been observed in a small minority of cases globally.

The Oxford-AstraZeneca drug is also administered in the UK.

"I totally understand that there are some people who have been concerned about not being vaccinated, but I assure you that vaccines are safe," Lord Ahmad assured.

"We've rolled out over 53 million vaccines, right here in the United Kingdom, and why I wanted to come on today is to express, not only our solidarity with the people of Montserrat but also assure you that they are safe, and you should go out and be vaccinated."

An important issue is the expiration date of the current batch of vaccines donated to Montserrat by the British government.

"Now these vaccines need to be used up," Lord Ahmad stated. "There are expiry dates on them and we need to make sure,



for every vaccine that is wasted, that's one other person who has been denied the right together."

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






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
