REDUCED QUARANTINE IN EFFECT

As of this Wednesday (June 23rd) travellers arriving in Cayman will only need to quarantine for five days provided they can prove that they are fully vaccinated.

However, they must be tested before exiting quarantine, and un-vaccinated travellers will have to complete a 14-day quarantine period.

Study Local, Go Far with UCCI

Admission applications are now open for fall semester at the University College of the Cayman Islands (UCCI). Record enrolment this summer increased the demand for classes, so students are being encouraged to apply early in order to get the courses they want.

If you've been thinking about continuing your education, why not take a cue from those who have had success at UCCI?

Recent graduates Laurent Bodden and Leah Archibold say UCCI changed their lives and set them on a path leading to what they are certain will be successful careers.

Bodden, who was honoured in April with UCCI's Recent Graduate Alumnus Award, earned an associate degree in hospitality management in 2018. He was a top student, receiving such recognition as the Minister's Award, the F&B Award and the Rotation Award. In May, he was named assistant restaurant manager at Grand Old House.

A skilled football player, Bodden is now a senior at Johnson & Wales University's North Miami campus, a school with a global reputation in the hospitality industry. Bodden is encouraging other young people to take advantage of what UCCI has to offer when classes begin in August.

Tamsin Deasey, UCCI's director of admissions and registration, says that demand is expected to increase as more people see the advantage of studying here in the Cayman Islands.

"Almost 1,000 students signed up for classes at UCCI in April, a 25% increase compared to Summer 2020. With a growing programme that offers everything from pre-college classes to post-graduate studies. This summer we had a number of students that couldn't get the schedules they wanted because our classes filled very quickly.

"UCCI is now attracting a broader range of students of all ages, many of whom might traditionally have opted to study abroad. Cayman residents are choosing to study local and go far and take advantage of the education available on their doorstep.

"The amazing thing about UCCI is that you can go as far as you want," Deasey added, "because UCCI prepares you with a quality education comparable to what students might find at any respected university around the world."

The ability to study local and go far proved true for Leah Archibold, who graduated in April with a bachelor's in business administration and a minor in marketing. Archibold began her career at UCCI as a dual-enrollment student while attending Clifton Hunter High School and was poised to head to the UK to complete her bachelor's degree when she discovered UCCI had just added a marketing minor to its busi-



ness administration degree options. It was a relief she said.

"At 17, going to another country is a big jump," Archibold said. "I didn't really feel like I was ready for that."

At UCCI, she said, she got to know her instructors well.

"I've developed these great relationships with all the business professors," she said. "They're passionate about us learning. They want to see us excel academically. I've grown to call them my family."

Archibold, a football fan and former player on the Cayman national team, is an avid photographer and also served as president of the UCCI Student Government. At UCCI, she had the advantage of job internships, including a year-and-a-half stint with UCCI's marketing department. She said she feels well prepared to pursue her master's degree and will be attending Nottingham Trent University in the UK this fall.

Academic and strong ties to the business community are not the only benefits UCCI can offer students, Deasey said. There are also logistical advantages.

"Given the Covid-19 global pandemic, staying in Cayman, where the virus has been kept at bay, makes a lot of sense," Deasey said. "It's also cheaper than going overseas to study, especially when you consider that a number of private and local scholarships are available to students."

UCCI President and CEO Stacy McAfee said continuing integration with the Cayman business community is making it even easier for students to transition into the work environment. The university prepares students for entry into the workforce as well as career progression, and provides reskilling and upskilling to meet the needs of the labour market in Cayman.

"UCCI is actively forging relationships with important job creators in Cayman," McAfee said. "In fact, private sector partnerships are up fivefold since 2018. We are building the future of the nation through cooperative programmes that ensure local industry has access to local talent both

while those students are studying and after graduation. This means our students are accessing satisfying careers within the Cayman Islands."

For his part, Laurent Bodden found great training and a foot in the door with local restaurants such as Grand Old House and the Wharf. In 2019, he won the Stingray Award for Restaurant Employee of the Year.

"UCCI gave me the foundation to take on the necessary responsibilities in the restaurant management field and to excel," Bodden said. "It was an important step in my career and in motivating me to go on to further studies at Johnson and Wales University, one of the world's top schools in hospitality management."

But students cannot take advantage of such benefits without first applying for admission. The time to do so is now, Deasey said. The future is just around the corner.

"We would strongly encourage both new and current students to complete their ap-

plications and register for classes, at the earliest opportunity, to secure their place at UCCI for Fall 2021," Deasey said.

REGISTRATION NOTICE

TAKE NOTICE that –

- (a) Every person who is entitled to be registered as an elector in the **Cayman Brac East and Cayman Brac West & Little Cayman** electoral district(s) and who wishes to have his/ her name placed on the Register of Electors for the three month period commencing on the **1st day of October 2021** shall, unless already registered in the current Register of Electors, apply in writing in Form 4 for registration as an elector, which duly completed form must be received by the registering officer for the said electoral district(s) on or before the registration date, namely the **1st day of July 2021**.
- (b) Every person not disqualified on any of the grounds set out in the next paragraph of this notice is qualified to be registered as an elector in the said electoral district if he or she –

Qualifications of Electors

90(1) Subject to section 91, a person shall be entitled to be registered as an elector in one electoral district only, but he or she shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector for elections to the Legislative Assembly unless—

- (a) he or she was, on the day immediately preceding the date of commencement of this Constitution, entitled to be registered as an elector; or
- (b) he or she—
- is a Caymanian; and
 - has attained the age of eighteen years; and
 - is resident in the Cayman Islands at the date of registration; and
 - has been resident in the Cayman Islands for a period or periods amounting to not less than two years out of the four years immediately preceding the date of registration;
- or
- (c) on the day of the issue of a writ ordering an election, he or she is otherwise qualified under paragraph (b) but has not attained the age of eighteen, but he or she will attain that age on or before the polling day at the election.

Disqualifications of Electors

91(1) A person shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector in any electoral district who—

- (a) subject to subsection (2) is serving a sentence of imprisonment (by whatever name called) exceeding twelve months imposed on him or her by a court in any country or substituted by competent authority for some other sentence imposed on him or her by such a court, or is under such a sentence of imprisonment the execution of which has been suspended;
- (b) is a person certified to be insane or otherwise adjudged to be of unsound mind under any law in force in the Cayman Islands; or
- (c) is disqualified for registration as an elector by any law in force in the Cayman Islands relating to offences connected with elections.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1)(a)—
- (a) where a person is serving two or more sentences of imprisonment that are required to be served consecutively he or she shall, throughout the whole time during which he or she so serves, be regarded as serving a sentence exceeding twelve months if (but not unless) any one of those sentences exceeds that term;
- (b) no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed as an alternative to or in default of the payment of a fine; and
- (c) no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed by a court outside the Cayman Islands other than a sentence on conviction of an offence constituted by conduct which, if it occurred within the Cayman Islands, would constitute an offence punishable under the law of the Cayman Islands by imprisonment of twelve months or any greater punishment.
- (d) A revised list containing the names, street address and occupation of all persons qualified to vote in the said district –
- whose names appear in the current Register of Electors; or
 - who have submitted to the registration officer a duly completed and signed application for registration in Form 4 will be available at the Elections Office in George Town, the District Administration Office in Cayman Brac and the Post Office in Little Cayman for a period of twenty-one days beginning on the **23rd day of July 2021**.
- (e) copies of Form 4 may be obtained at the following places –
- any post office or sub-post office;
 - the registering officer for any electoral district; or
 - the Elections Office
- (f) The registering officer for the electoral district(s) is **Ellen Lazzari**.

WATER SAFETY TIPS:

1. Never swim alone or without a water watcher. When children are swimming, make sure they are actively supervised at all times. Teach your children that they should only swim in locations where a lifeguard is on duty, or where a responsible adult agrees to watch the children in the water without distractions.

2. Supervise your children whenever they're in or near water. Whether it's bath time or taking a dip in a pool or lake, make sure your children are within arm's reach at all times.

3. Don't engage in breath holding activities. Children should not hold their breath for a prolonged amount of time while swimming, as this can cause drowning and has several other severe physical side-effects.

4. Wear a life jacket: Inexperienced or non-swimmers should wear a Coast Guard-approved life jacket.

5. Don't jump in the water to save a friend who is struggling in deep water. If a child finds their friend in deep water unexpectedly, their natural reaction may be to jump in the water to try to save them. Even if a child is a great swimmer, a panicked person will overpower them, pulling the rescuer underwater. The Y's Safety Around Water programme teaches the "reach, throw, don't go" concept of using a long object to reach for them and pull them to safety. By using this technique children can help their friend without compromising their own safety.

Travellers must have completed an approved course of vaccination against COVID-19 disease at least two weeks before travelling to the Cayman Islands.

The vaccine must also be one of the approved vaccinations as provided by the Chief Medical Officer.

She also explained that the mandatory 72-hour pre-arrival PCR testing has been reinstated for all incoming travellers, irrespective of their vaccination status, prior to arrival.

"Vaccinated travellers, whose vaccinations cannot be securely verified will have

to quarantine for 14 days," Min. Turner explained.

The Health and Wellness minister also announced that mandatory weekly nasal and PCR testing will continue locally for unvaccinated frontline workers.

This applies especially to staff working directly with travellers, including Customs and Border Control(CBC) officers, airline staff at the Owen Roberts International Airport and other workers who have direct contact with travellers and other customer-facing roles.

Staff assisting with compliance, those working in government quarantine facilities, cleaners and transport teams are also included.

As of July 1st, further changes to the regulations will come into force especially requiring travellers to meet the cost of their quarantine.

As outlined by Min. Turner this includes persons quarantining in a government-run or designated quarantine facility for all non-essential travel. For this purpose, essential travel is defined as travel for medical reasons with an approved doctor's referral letter, travel for approved government, business, or students enrolled in educational facilities who are attending classes overseas.

However, she said exceptions to payment for government-run designated quarantine facilities for educational purposes, "shall only extend to returning students or parents, guardians returning

from taking students under the age of 22 to an overseas enrolled educational institution, and that's with requisite proof."

Noting that the reduced quarantine period would have been much anticipated as Cayman aims to return to normal, Min. Turner urged residents who have not been vaccinated to take the jab.

"I know that reducing the quarantine measures is something many have been hoping for, but I do want to implore on our community who are vaccine-eligible and who have not yet received their vaccines, to please make every effort to do so."

Cayman's reduction of quarantine to five days comes as several other countries are taking similar steps.

POLICE NEWS

West Bay Man Charged with Murder

Just after 5AM on Thursday, 17 June, police carried out a search at a residence in the West Bay District. During the search officers found a quantity of ganja and ganja plants. No arrests were made in relation to the drugs, however inquiries are ongoing.

A 46-year-old-man of West Bay was however re-arrested on suspicion of murder and taken into custody where he is being held.

The arrest was made in relation to an incident where the then 24-year-old Shaquille Bush was fatally shot near his home in West Bay on 12 November, 2019. At the time, the man was arrested and released shortly after the shooting, pending further investigation. He has now been charged with Murder and Possession of an Unlicensed Firearm.

He is expected to appear in court Friday, 18 June.

Wounding Incident in George Town

Shortly after 10:30PM yesterday, 16 June, officers responded to a report of a serious assault at an address on Patrick's Avenue, George Town. It was reported that a man and a woman known to each other had been involved in an altercation, during which the man was wounded in the neck with an object. The man

was transported to the Cayman Islands Hospital by a third party. He remains in hospital in serious but stable condition.

Officers attended the hospital and subsequently arrested the suspect in the incident, a woman age 34 of George Town, on suspicion of wounding. She remains in custody as investigations continue.

THE WRANGLE OVER REOPENING CONTINUES

This week's wrangle between the ruling PACT coalition and the opposition Progressives/Alliance over reopening the borders continued on Thursday.

"I thank the Government for finally addressing the country on their plans regarding reopening our borders to tourism. It has been some two months since PACT took office, and it should not have required a press conference by the Opposition to prompt them to address the country on this critical issue," Progressives leader Roy McTaggart wrote in a press release on Thursday.

It came one day after the government rebuffed a call by the Opposition made on Tuesday for a September 1st target to reopen the borders, especially for tourism.

Premier Wayne Panton said in a government press conference on Wednesday that his administration was working towards a vaccination target of between 70 and 80 per cent.

"When we were in Government, and now as Opposition, we have consistently said that the key to reopening the borders safely is to get between 75% - 80% of our people vaccinated. So, we do not disagree with the current Government on this point," Mr McTaggart said.

The Premier had also the previous administration of not having a reopening plan and maintained that nothing was left in place for his government.

SIGHTS ON SEPTEMBER

Opposition Leader McTaggart insists that current vaccination trends support their call for a September 1st reopening.

"However, we believe that we are sufficiently close to getting 75% of our people fully vaccinated that the Government can and indeed should announce a firm reopening date. We remain of the view that the date should be September 1. This will give businesses a date to gear up to

welcome tourists back and will also spur unvaccinated residents to get vaccinated."

He said: "Without a firm reopening date by September, we will likely lose the winter season as potential visitors will seek alternative destinations for their holidays. Indeed, there are already indications that it is happening."

According to Mr McTaggart, while his team was in power across the first year of the pandemic, their focus was on 'lives before livelihoods', but he maintains that at this juncture, the economic implication cannot be overlooked.

"As everyone will know from our track record in Government, we are deeply conscious about the importance of re-opening the borders safely, and in all our decisions, we put lives before livelihoods and people above profits. But we firmly believe that with a concerted effort, we can get the number of vaccinated residents up to 75%, which is certainly achievable by September 1st even using the revised population estimate of 71,100 people.

"Reaching these numbers of vaccinated residents allows us to safely re-open and enable visitors who have been vaccinated to enter without the need to quarantine."

QUARANTINE QUESTIONED

Another point of contention between the Opposition and the government is the new arrivals and quarantine protocols which the PACT administration is introducing from next Wednesday.

Mr McTaggart decried the plan as "downright dangerous".

Premier Panton had announced at the government press conference on Wednesday this week that "the quarantine is being reduced to five days for incoming travellers who have completed an approved course of vaccination against COVID-19."

Mr McTaggart questioned the logic of that approach before reaching at least a 75 per cent vaccination rate, saying they considered it while in government but ruled it out.

"We believe this is downright dangerous as we have seen travellers test positive for Covid-19 after 15 or longer days in quarantine. When in Government, we considered this as an option and ruled it out because we did not believe it prudent or safe until we had sufficient numbers of people vaccinated. I hope the Government understands the risk."

Further, he said, a 5-day quarantine period "will do nothing to bring tourists", on the basis that "tourists are not going to want to

spend half of their 10-day vacation in quarantine."

Further challenging the relaxed arrivals protocols coming into effect next Wednesday, he claimed that "a reduced quarantine of 5 days will encourage residents to travel over the summer, thus further injuring local businesses relying on local spending to remain open. We believe that staycations, dinners, lunches and nights-out by residents will be severely affected by the reduced quarantine period."

STIPEND STRUGGLE

Opposition Leader McTaggart welcomed the decision of the PACT coalition to extend the pension holiday and the tourism stipend, but said it was "illogical and heartless" to cut the stipend in half - from \$1500 to \$750 - in November.

"We do not understand how the Minister of Tourism can agree with us that the stipends are needed and that cruise tourism is unlikely to resume this year, yet go on in the same breath to announce that he will cut the stipend payment to \$750 per month in November. That is both illogical and heartless."

Mr McTaggart, the finance minister in the previous Progressives-led government, repeated the call for the stipend to

be increased to \$2000 per month instead of being reduced.

"We remain of the view that the stipend should be increased to \$2000 monthly through the rest of this year," he argued.

"We must ensure that our people who work in Tourism and who remain unemployed or under-employed, and whose pension funds monies have long since been exhausted continue to have the ability to pay their bills and keep a roof over their heads and food on the table for their families."

The Progressives leader said the PACT coalition should have convened a Finance Committee in early May and sought additional funding to extend and increase the necessary Covid-19 relief programmes, which he said they would have done if they were still in power.

But Opposition Leader offered to support the Panton administration if it put the additional funding in place, saying "they can still do so next month and can be assured of our support."

That's when the government budget is due to be presented.

Mr McTaggart called on the government to "provide details sooner rather than later on their re-opening plans for tourism" and said the people who rely on tourism and the country at large needs certainty.

GT Group Learns About Census Workers

At a meeting in George Town Primary School Hall on Thursday, 17 June 2021, over 130 persons heard all about the criteria for being chosen as the workers who will conduct Census 2021 later this year.

They were attending the second public information meeting held by the Economics and Statistics Office to recruit potential workers. Starting on 10 October 2021, some 420 census workers will start visiting households to conduct the population and dwellings count in the Cayman Islands, as part of the once in a decade census. The current count had been delayed from 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The attendees got to sign up to be census workers in addition to hearing from ESO staff led by Director, Mr. Adolphus Laidlow. The ESO team spoke about the requirements as well as the mandatory training the census staff will have to undergo to become workers and supervisors, both paid positions.


The census count will run for some two months with the aim to count 100 percent

BERMUDA SAYS NO TO UN-VACCINATED CRUISES

The Bermuda government is defending its tough stance on compulsory vaccination for cruise ship passengers despite one major cruise line taking the territory off its ports of call as a result.

Royal Caribbean Cruises will not call at Hamilton, Bermuda as the government insists all passengers and crew must be fully vaccinated.

But Bermuda's Transport Minister, Lawrence Scott says the government is sticking to its strict protocols.

"When it comes to health and the safety of the country and the health risk we're not willing to compromise on that," he stated in response to the cruise line's decision.

The US Centres for Disease Control (CDC) confirmed that ships could sail out of US ports with some restrictions – and that not all passengers had to be vaccinated.



The issue has been further complicated with the Governor of Florida, Ron DeSantis mandating that cruise passengers do not have to be fully vaccinated to board cruise ships sailing out of the state. Florida is the major home port for cruise ships sailing to Bermuda and the Caribbean.

Mr Scott said the Florida decision "contradicts our current health policies of fully vaccinated cruises for Bermuda and that is where – although they're running within the guidelines of the CDC – they're outside our health guidelines."

BVI FURTHER RELAXES ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

The British Virgin Islands has further eased entry requirements to the territory with fully vaccinated travellers now no longer requiring an entry test and quarantine.

Health Minister Carvin Malone said effective June 15th all they'll need to provide will be "an RT PCR or an approved rapid antigen test or a within five days of arrival and provide satisfactory evidence of being fully vaccinated."

However, partially-vaccinated persons travelling from overseas would still require a PCR test within five days of travel.

"They must also "provide satisfactory evidence of being partially vaccinated and will be subjected to PCR test or a rapid antigen test upon arrival in the territory, the day zero test and quarantine for a period of four days," Mr Malone said in a radio broadcast.

"For flight and vessel crews who are fully vaccinated, Cabinet decided that these persons will no longer be required to conduct bi-weekly screening and testing, but should self-monitor and report any symptoms of or recent exposure to COVID-19," he said.



The BVI government has also reduced the 'Gateway fees' from \$105 to \$35 for fully vaccinated travellers.

But the Health Minister reminded: "We are not out of the woods yet!" as he urged residents to get vaccinated.

"Despite the growing voices of dissent, the vaccine is literally the only viable assurance of returning to some level of normalcy. I will continue to sound the alarm that vaccination is our best defence against this pandemic," Mr Malone stated.



TURKS AND CAICOS SAYS YES TO CRUISES

The Turks and Caicos government says it's in negotiations with Carnival Cruise Line with the expectation that the cruise line will resume calls by autumn this year.

Premier Washington Misick disclosed in a press conference that the cruise line will be back in Grand Turk by October as the territory prepares for the peak winter tourist season.

He also said the cruise company had committed investments in the region of

US\$18 million to improve port facilities in Grand Turk.

Talks are also being held with Royal Caribbean cruises to resume their calls.

"It looks very positive that between now and the end of the summer we will also have them calling into Grand Turk," he indicated.

Mr Misick also said the cruise ships visits was also dependent on the stipulations of the US Centers for Disease Control (CDC), but he expected cruise arrivals to "come back strong".

ST HELENA COUNTS

The recent census in St Helena has put the mid-Atlantic territory's population at 4,439. The majority, 4,114 are St Helenian.

The St Helena Statistics Office said the current population shows a slight decline compared to the 2016 total of 4,534 residents.

The statistics also show that overall, the population is getting older, with the number of St

Helenians aged 65 and over continuing to rise. They now account for 1,087 residents

or a quarter of the population, an increase of 18% from 2016.



ANGUILLA SECURES UK FUNDING FOR INFRASTRUCTURE

The Government of Anguilla reports that it has secured the support of the UK government, with an additional £2m (US\$3m) in new funding for what it called 'economic resilience projects'.

The initial projects to be funded under the new programme cover road improvement and an aviation master plan including airport expansion.

Premier Dr Ellis Webster stated the airport project in particular "has long been identified as an essential element of Anguilla's journey to sustainable economic progress."

In welcoming the news, HE Governor Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam remarked that since her arrival she has been working with the Government of Anguilla and the UK Government to build on the success of

the Anguilla Programme, to help stimulate the economy and build economic resilience for the island's future.

"I am pleased that we have been able to secure funding for these critical infrastructure projects. As with the Anguilla Programme, the Governor's Office will work in partnership with the GoA to take forward project delivery of both initiatives," she said.



CARIBBEAN BRIEFS

No Spicemas but events still on

Grenada may not be staging its renowned Spicemas Carnival for a second year because of the global pandemic, but the government has approved private promoters hosting cultural events instead.

Prime Minister Dr Keith Mitchell announced that the government won't allow promoters to organise mass social events until Grenada reaches herd immunity. He said that the reason for allowing smaller cultural events is so that people can de-stress after being confined indoors due to the ban on social activities. However, Mitchell insisted that participation is based on the condition that enough

people get vaccinated ahead of the events in August.

Of the 161 people who have contracted COVID-19 in Grenada since their first case in March 2020, there have been 160 recoveries and only one death.

Jamaica hopes UK changes list

Jamaica is hoping to be on the UK government's next green list when Prime Minister Boris Johnson gives an update this week. Places like Montego Bay, Ocho Rios and Negril, all on the north coast, rely heavily on tourism.

Green listed countries have low COVID-19 rates and have a high percentage of the population vaccinated against the virus. Jamaica, which is on the amber list, is a good candidate to be green listed despite a low vaccination rate, as the country has one of the lowest infection rate of 14.4 per cent per 100,000.

Jamaica's placement on the green list would be great news for the country's ailing tourism industry which took a battering from the novel coronavirus. Johnson's announcement is expected on Thursday.

St Kitts struggles as virus spreads

St Kitts and Nevis was until recently one of the safest Caribbean islands from COVID-19 but a recent outbreak and its first death from the virus has forced the government to implement tighter protocols and create a State of Emergency until July 6.

St Kitts recorded the first coronavirus related death on Thursday as the community spread of the virus became uncontrollable across the twin-island nation. There is also a curfew, and all gatherings are restricted island wide. Curfew hours are currently from 6 pm to 5 am until Friday (June 26).

Dr Cameron Wilkinson, Chief Surgeon and Medical Chief of Staff JNF Hospital, said that a significant proportion of people who are being infected with COVID-19 are unvaccinated, with just a few having recently received their first shot.

He said there had been no incidents of infection in a fully vaccinated adult. Dr Wilkinson said: "People were misled into believing that they could wait for a better vaccine.

They were misled into believing that if they took vitamins and became as strong as an ox, they will be protected from this deadly virus."

He said that people were tricked into believing that it is a personal choice and not that their decision could have far-reaching consequences for others.

Now only vaccinated travellers can visit St Kitts based on a new policy which requires tourists, including those from the United States with either a two-dose vaccine, like the Pfizer/BioNTech, Moderna, or AstraZeneca shots, or a single-dose vaccine, such as the Johnson & Johnson shot.

Antigua remains relatively safe

Antigua and Barbuda has continued its model tourism reopening with a new designation by the United States Centres for Disease Control and Prevention stating it as a "low-risk" destination.

Antigua and Barbuda has been moved to Level 1, the lowest risk level, in the most recent travel advisory by the US CDC. Level 1 countries include Australia and New Zealand — countries that have reported fewer than 50 cases in the last days.

"We are delighted that Americans can have confidence in traveling to our shores," said Charles "Max" Fernandez, Minister of Tourism & Investment. "We have worked very hard to ensure the safety of our people and our visitors and this has paid off in lower numbers of COVID infections and reduced impact

on our economy. This latest announcement by the CDC is an endorsement of everything we have done."

Antigua was among the first Caribbean destinations to reopen for tourism, exactly a year ago. Since then, it's embarked on an exemplary tourism reopening. One of the most popular tourist attractions is the shopping area of Heritage Quay.

Harrison's Cave to get makeover

Barbados's renowned tourist attraction Harrison's Cave has new owners who are extremely optimistic about future prospects for the St Thomas location as they prepare to roll out the highly-anticipated EC\$9 million (KY\$2.8m) upgrades. It will reopen next week and upgrades will be done around visitors.

Marc Melville is Group Chief Executive Officer of Chukka Caribbean Adventures. He said work will begin in August and should last between six to eight months.

Chukka Caribbean Adventures, Jamaica's largest nature adventure tour operator, took over the management of the Harrison's Cave attraction last December under a 25-year lease arrangement.

With a new logo, the new-look Harrison's Cave Eco-Adventure Park is to consist of several exciting features including


