

Reopening Plan: Phase 3

The Cayman Islands Government (CIG) on Wednesday gave itself some wiggle room by indicating that the much-vaunted October 14th re-opening date could be delayed.

Hon. Premier Wayne Panton made the announcement while moving ahead with the Phase 3 soft reopening from September 9th.

Mr Panton said a final decision will depend on increasing the vaccination uptake among the remaining numbers of people yet to be inoculated against the COVID-19 virus and trends in the disease globally.

"My government has been clear. We must reopen the borders. We will only do so safely, and in a way that protects most vulnerable ensures our children are educated and allows our people to work. We all will have to work together to continue our success story," Premier Panton stated.

With an increase in COVID cases likely with the full reopening of the borders, the Premier's announcement also came as Cayman recorded a one-day total of 24 positive cases in the past few days.

"As we go into phase three, we enter another important evaluation and assessment period," the Premier stated.

"Whether or not we move to Phase 4 on the 14th of October will depend heavily on what we've observed over the next few weeks," he emphasised by repeating

for effect, "Let me repeat that, whether or not we move to Phase four on the 14th of October, depends heavily on what we observe over the next few weeks."

Mr Panton also announced that that the government will consider reinstating control measures on public gatherings should that be deemed necessary.

"But coming to the higher phases will bring important changes, and a gradual shift away from the status quo along with the additional safeguards for the community remains. There are many public health measures that we can utilise as protective layers," he said.

According to the Premier, "In addition to vaccinations to keep each other safe and to keep economic activity going in this country, which has a 70% vaccination rate, now, we may encourage you to do things like spending less time indoors more time outdoors...If you plan to travel, we may ask you to carefully consider if that is indeed necessary. We may or may not recommend wearing a mask."

He also stated that the government was "not going to be stuck exclusively to the 80 per cent target," stating that they had become "somewhat fuzzy and meaningless particularly when it comes to issues around the Delta variant."

Premier Panton also stated that the government will assess the situation going into the planned Phase 4 with the likelihood of additional support for struggling businesses and workers which he estimated could run into "tens of millions" over months.

HE Governor Martyn Roper, endorsed the government's stance on the important of stepping up the vaccination rate, noting that Cayman has been fortunate to date due largely to measures in place, in not

having a community spread of the disease for over a year which he said was "truly remarkable".

However, he also raised the prospect of a vaccine mandate becoming necessary in specific circumstances.

"A part of the answer may have to be in mandating vaccines for those who are educating our children and for those on the front line."

Noting that in some countries there is a vaccine requirement for entering some establishments such as bars and restaurants, the Governor said he did not envisage such a requirement in Cayman.

"That may be a step too far for some here, but we simply cannot stand still as a jurisdiction," Mr Roper said but added that, "I believe that these measures do need to be considered to ensure that we could protect the community and make sure as many as possible get the protection offered by the vaccine."

Hon. Minister for Health and Wellness Sabrina Turner assured that adequate preparations are being put in place to cope in the eventuality of an increase in cases and listed a series of systems and supplies being activated.

"While the Cayman Islands has been preparing to open our borders, our medical community has not been idle, not have they been stagnant or have become complacent," he said.

She was however concerned about the number of breaches of quarantine and self-isolation protocols.

Reporting that for August Travel Cayman reported 52 such breaches, Min. Turner, said "the report warranted a close review of the system, and some changes were made."

She also said that the government was also considering the reintroduction of GPS tracking as part of the quarantine and isolation monitoring.

The Hon. Min of Tourism and Transport, Kenneth Bryan, detailed the systems and protocols in place for the Phase 3 reopening as of the 9th of September.

"While Phase 3 signals that the country is open for business, it will not be business as usual overnight," he declared referring to limitations on the number of flights allowed and "stringent protocols" in place by the government.

He also admitted that the tough requirements and emphasis on safety was likely though to see smaller passenger numbers as potential tourists choose other destinations with less demanding protocols.

"Although the Ministry of Tourism continues to prepare for the return of tourism in the safest, most balanced and practical way possible, we are also continually evaluating the experiences of other countries that are farther along this path and seeing what we can learn from their examples," Mr Bryan stated.

DEH Announces Closure of Temporary Vegetation Sites

The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) is announcing the closure of its temporary sites from incoming vegetation waste, starting with the West Bay Site which will be closed on Saturday 11th September, 2021.

The last day to drop vegetation debris at the temporary site located in Prospect

will be 18th September, 2021. Meanwhile, the other three temporary sites located in Bodden Town, East End and North Side will cease operations on Saturday 25th September, 2021. Following these closure dates, persons are expected to take any materials to the George Town landfill.

DEH Director, Richard Simms indicated that "the cooperation from members of the public has been great and continue to be critical to ensure the efficiency and success in the operation of the temporary vegetation debris sites. Our staff members has also been working long hours to complete this clean-up exercise. Now is time to redirect our efforts to the ordinary operations of the department as we prepare for the

annual Bulk Waste Collection, which traditionally take place before the Christmas season."

The George Town Landfill operates from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekdays, until 1:00 p.m. on Saturday and it is closed on Sunday. However, the landfill drop-off facility at the gate will remain accessible for the public and small vehicles 24 hours per day.

The DEH is also reminding residents of the importance of **no smoking at the debris site** in order to prevent bush fires.

Ministry of Education (MoE) Further Enhances Scholarship Programme

The Cayman Islands Ministry of Education (MoE) announces further enhancements to its current scholarship programme following its 7 July announcement of several increased scholarship funding opportunities for post-secondary and undergraduate students.

Increased Postgraduate Overseas Funding

The standard annual funding for all overseas postgraduate studies, i.e. Masters and Doctoral degrees, will increase from up to CI \$25,000.00 to CI \$35,000.00 per student per annum for current and new postgraduate students.

Minister for Education, the Honourable Juliana O'Connor-Connolly, provided further details on the funding increase scheduled to begin with immediate effect.

"Following careful consideration, the Cayman Islands Government saw the need to revise the current funding amount to ease more of the financial burden that many of our Caymanian students face when in pursuit of higher learning opportunities," Minister O'Connor-Connolly commented.

One-time Grant towards Student Visas

The Ministry of Education also announced a one-time grant of \$1,500.00 towards the costs associated with obtaining a student visa.

Minister O'Connor-Connolly continued, "Since the onset of the COVID 19 pandemic, students, particularly those accepted to institutions in the United States and Canada, have faced increased expenses in their efforts to obtain a student visa. They often have difficulties accessing regular flights and incur high costs due to quarantine protocols in the countries where embassies are located."

Temporary Waiver of SAT Requirement

Another notable enhancement to the scholarship programme includes the temporary waiver of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) requirement for students initiating studies in US-based institutions in fall 2021.

"This will enable us to remove an obstacle in the educational development of a number of students and enhance their path-

ways to higher levels of tertiary education, thereby allowing Caymanians greater opportunities for advancing within the workforce," Minister O'Connor-Connolly remarked.

Increase in A-Level Funding

The Ministry of Education also announced a broadening of the scholarship award to include full tuition funding for all Caymanian students pursuing Advanced (A-Level) Level studies at St Ignatius Catholic School and Cayman Prep & High School throughout the prescribed two years of study.

Post Grace Vegetation Waste recycled into Mulch

The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) would like to advise Grand Cayman residents that “free mulch” will be available for collection at its Temporary Vegetation Collection Site located in Prospect from Wednesday 8th September, 2021.

The mulch will be provided on a first come, first served basis at the National Road Authority (NRA) stockpile at Poin-dexter Road. Residents are invited to come out early and to bring their shovels and bags for the removal of the mulch. Assistance will be provided by the DEH to load the members of the public’s small vehicles on Saturdays only.

“We have started the recycling of the vegetation waste collected following the passing of Tropical Storm Grace last month. This is the first of many free mulch offerings as we make arrangements to do the same at other temporary sites. Mean-

while, we continue with our Island Wide Vegetation Collection Schedule. This week we are serving the people of George Town District until Saturday 11th September, 2021”, says DEH Director Richard Simms.

Residents are reminded to **ONLY** place vegetation debris on the curbside where it is easily accessible to the collection crews. Do not obstruct the roadway or storm drains or place household trash. Trim vegetation to lengths of 3 feet to enable an efficient collection. Alternative arrangements should be made to transport any other type of debris to the George Town landfill drop off.

“It’s all student-led, the passion and motivation come from the students. Teachers guide them and try to connect them with people in the community to help them along with their initiatives,” said Ms. Urquhart.

QEIBP General Manager, John Lawrus was on hand to receive the donation at last week’s assembly, thanking students for their generosity. “I’m very excited to be able to talk to you today about the Botanic Park and I appreciate the donation that’s been gifted to us.”

Regrettably, we did suffer immense damage and we are most likely going to put this towards repairing a portion of our greenhouse structure which is completely gone,” he said.

Protect Our Future member, Nicolas Corin indicated the group hopes to get further involved. “We’re super passionate about our work and we’re proud of how this all went. I think it was a success and we are looking forward to possibly working with the Botanic Park in the future,” he said.

Government commences new business asset stipend/grant program for water and land tour operators

The continued border closure since the end of March 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic has significantly affected the Cayman Islands' water sports and land tour activity businesses.

As of Monday, September 6, the Cayman Islands Government has initiated a new type of support for local businesses in this sub-sector.

Eligible Caymanian-owned businesses will receive a monthly business stipend and relevant asset preservation grant(s), initially over three months, to aid in maintenance and retention of assets, including but not limited to loan repayment, insurance, repairs, and servicing fees.

A series of detailed eligibility criteria apply to operators, as well as to the funds dispersed through the program.

Applications will be submitted for processing and approval to the Cayman Islands Center for Business Development - under the Ministry of Investment, Innovation and Social Development. As of July 2021, the CICBD has granted 2,253 grants in the amount of

\$8.5 million to micro and small businesses.

Hon. André Ebanks, Minister for Investment, Innovation and Social Development, explained that while the tourism stipend for individuals has been a lifeline, this new type of innovative business assistance is aimed at micro and small business owners to assist with maintaining the viability of their businesses and preservation of critical assets in this uniquely Caymanian-built sub-sector. "Water sports and land tour businesses are integral to the Cayman Islands' tourism offering and small business environment, and have significantly suffered the consequences of the many months of border closure," he stated.

Following the Finance Committee meeting last week which approved additional supplementary funding to assist micro and small businesses impacted by continued border closure, Minister Ebanks and the Ministry will be considering other types of micro and small businesses and developing criteria to receive similar financial assistance in the coming weeks.

CG to acquire Massy United Insurance, expanding Caribbean presence

Bermuda-based Coralisle Group Ltd. (CG) announced today that it has signed an agreement to acquire 100% interest in Massy United Insurance Ltd. (United) of Barbados.

The transaction, which is subject to regulatory approval in relevant jurisdictions, is expected to close as soon as requisite approvals are obtained.

The acquisition of United will significantly expand CG's existing presence in the Caribbean and add 14 new markets where United operates, including Anguilla, Antigua & Barbuda, St. Kitts & Nevis, Montserrat, Dominica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Grenada, Trinidad & Tobago, Guyana, Curacao, Aruba, Jamaica and Belize.

CG and United have complementary operations in the Bahamas, Turks & Caicos, British Virgin Islands, Barbados and the Cayman Islands, with minimal overlap in their product offerings. More specifically, the acquisition will add a complementary suite of property and casualty insurance products to enhance CG's core life, health and property and casualty product offerings in those locations.





HURRICANE IVAN - 20 years on

Considering the rather tranquil weather conditions currently gracing Cayman a hurricane might be the last thing on the minds of many residents.

There are no immediate indications of any potential 'storm on the horizon', and monster Category 3 Hurricane Larry is far away to the north of Cayman (spare a thought for Bermuda).

It might be easy to forget that we are at the peak of the 2021 Atlantic hurricane season.

But embedded in the collective Caymanian memory are vivid recollections of Hurricane Ivan of September 12th, 2001.

And 20 years later, the 2021 hurricane season is turning out to be a year to remember. Hurricane Larry out in the Atlantic in the general vicinity of Bermuda and heading towards the eastern US and Canadian coastline, has already set a record of being the longest-lived, major hurricane in the Atlantic.

Cayman was way out of the path of Larry but the brush we had recently with Hurricane Ida, was a sobering reminder of the destructive force of hurricanes, and none more so than the anniversary that's seared in the collective Caymanian memory.

On September 12th, 2001, Hurricane Ivan brought its full Category 5 destructive force to bear on these islands.

In its wake, paradise was almost lost. But with true Caymanian courage paradise was regained and rebuilt from the over 2 billion dollars in direct property damage and over half a billion dollars to the economy caused by Hurricane Ivan.

Two people lost their lives.

Lessons have been learnt. Awareness has been heightened, the disaster preparedness and response systems upgraded, and Cayman is better placed to cope (we hope) - as evidenced from the seriousness that most people attach to the hurricane season.

Some policies are unfortunately still lagging behind despite repeated ministerial pledges and political campaign promises to address them as matters of priority. Among those are upgrading the drainage system which quite literally strains to cope, coastline encroachments to ac-

commodate property developments, and threats to the natural barrier of the mangrove network.

But as we look around, it's clear that Cayman has bounced back economically from the devastation of Hurricane Ivan twenty years ago.

The question is; although lessons have clearly been learnt, are they all being applied?

Awareness and preparedness for particular storms can only be as effective as the systems and processes in place to mitigate damage from adverse weather conditions, especially severe storms that venture into the local area.

Many who lived through the hours of horror of Hurricane Ivan and 'weathered' the deprivations of its aftermath will be reminiscing on that period.


September 12th, 2001, and the days, months and years of recovery which followed are now indelible reminders and permanent fixtures in both the Cayman calendar - and we hope, mindset.

The 2021 hurricane season is far from over. There have already been a few close calls to date even, some even before the season officially started.

Concerns over climate change and the vulnerability of low-lying islands such as the Cayman Islands make heightened awareness an even greater requirement for these islands.

TERRIBLE IVAN REMEMBERED

Hurricane Ivan was a "classical" long lived Cape Verde hurricane. It has been categorized as one of the most powerful hurricanes to hit the Caribbean in recorded history. On September 2 Ivan developed into a tropical depression, it became a tropical storm on the following day and reached hurricane status on 5 September. On September 7 and 8 it damaged 90 percent of the homes in Grenada and killed 16 people. By Thursday morning on September 9, Ivan's sustained winds reached 160 mph making it a rare category 5 hurricane on the Saffir-Simpson scale. On September 11 Ivan began affecting the sister islands of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman with tropical storm winds and Grand Cayman began experiencing tropical storm winds later that afternoon.

According to information from the National Weather Service the centre of Ivan was located 113 miles SE of Grand Cayman by 10 pm, and at that time hurricane force winds of over 100 miles per hour were already being experienced on the island. At 5am on Sunday the storm surge from the North Sound was peaking at 10 feet (National Weather Service).

The hurricane made its closest approach at 10 am on Sunday when the eye passed 21 miles SW of the Grand Cayman with winds of 150 mph and gusts of 220 mph. As the storm continued on its track, storm surge and battering waves heavily affected the south coast of Grand Cayman. Ivan was a slow-moving hurricane which increased the exposure of the Island to hurricane force winds as well as increased the total amount of rain.

Hurricane Ivan took the lives of two persons on Grand Cayman and it temporarily displaced significant proportions of the population.


All persons experienced the loss of electricity, water and access to telecommunications for some period immediately following the disaster.

The three most affected districts were George Town, Bodden Town and East End. Together these three districts account for 75% of the total population on Grand Cayman. 402 people were treated for lacerations, wounds, removal of for-

eign bodies, fractures and burns as a result of the disaster. However, the general health and wellbeing of the population was good and was well maintained by dedicated health care professionals, first responders and the kindness of neighbours.

The total economic impact to the Cayman Islands was estimated by the United Nations ECLAC team to be 3.4 billion (183 % of GDP). Approximately 83% or 13,535 units of the total housing stock in the Grand Cayman suffered some degree of damage. Dwellings which were situated on the seashore, in low lying, or swampy areas suffered the most severe damage. Older and less well constructed housing was also severely affected.

Four per cent (4%) of homes that were affected were so severely damaged that they required complete reconstruction. 70%, or 9, 475, dwellings suffered severe damage which resulted from sea surge or damage caused by winds to roofs, windows and doors. The remaining 26% or 3,519 dwellings, suffered minor damage caused by partial roof removal, low levels of water inundation, or flying roofs and floating objects such as containers. The total financial effect on the housing sector was estimated at CI\$1,444,868,244. (1.4 billion) The financial effect on the finance (commerce) and tourism sectors were estimated at around CI\$ 460 million each.

Jah Rover's new sound

Kurt Danlaw, better-known as Jah Rover has been in the music business for nearly four decades. Rover means traveler, and Jah Rover's musical career has seen him travel far and wide, but he has always come back to his roots in Cayman. Now he has his own music studio in West Bay where he is working on a new kind of music, a kind of hi-energy kind of very fast reggae beat with a hauntingly detached vocal floating over it, full of important messages and warnings, prophet-style, about the world we are living in and its troubles. He has recently produced a 19-song compilation called Kingman, and a single from it, called 'Is Fallen.' "It is my interpretation of Jeremiah 50, verse 1," he said. "It is about the land of the Babylonians and everything is laid to waste. I'd like to say it is the times we are now in because we can see Mr. Covid is taking over everything."

"I started playing the bass in reggae band Bloodline back in 1985, which debuted on the Courthouse steps," he said. Kurt played for the best of the mid-1980s and late-80's flourishing of Cayman reggae bands including 'Thanks and Praises,' 'Odyssey,' and 'The Chosen Few.' Then, after moving to the States in the early 90's Kurt found work playing the bass in the Graveyard Blues Band which toured all over America, opening for some top class blues and rock bands, including Edgar Winters and Ronnie James Dio, before coming back to Cayman. Then Kurt left Cayman again, this time going to Cardiff in Wales where he was introduced to massive sound systems and more technical knowhow, as his songwriting skills developed. He has been back home for nearly ten years now, and has been busy evolving the new sound. Settling back in to Cayman again in 2012, Jah Rover has since been developing his new sound.

"The sound is Cayman Reggae which I would like to say is an original sound. This sound has developed over decades of listening to all world's music and I call this sound C-Dub." Jah Rover takes influences from everywhere, and makes them his own, in the best Cayman tradition. "After listening to Nat King Cole for about two weeks. I always wondered what he would have sounded like in the Reggae genre so I started composing and I got my song, 'Rocky Rd.to Zion.'" He said.

"The truth is that all the music yet to be played is out there in the great universe and my music comes to me. Sometimes it's a drum beat first of all and other times it's just a guitar melody. Sometimes I hear the entire song and just have to translate it into sound and voice. I try my best to keep the sound pure and rich of soul so as to hold the originality," he said.

Mayor Hynds has birthday out of jail

Jerry Hynds, the Mayor of Roatan, celebrated his birthday on Sunday, grateful of being freed from a charge of attempting to smuggle cocaine with a street value of \$24 million onto the island.

Hynds, Jorge Bustillo, Efrain Sanchez and Francisco Gomez were all arrested on Aug. 27, in a police operation, charged with attempted drug trafficking of two tonnes of the class-A drug.

Prosecutors accused the mayor of guarding the haul into Roatan when security agents found 2,430 kilos of the substance inside a cistern that was travelling on the main street. His lawyers denied all charges, claiming Hynds was the victim of a vehicle error and confusion during the police operation.

After a long initial hearing in the capital Tegucigalpa, Hynds and Sanchez were given provisional dismissals on

Saturday while the others were held in custody awaiting trial.

Provisional dismissal means a temporary file; although it closes, it is likely to be re-opened if new, relevant evidence is revealed.

Jamaica tops London tourism event

The Jamaica Tourist Board will be the headline destination of the new Caribbean Showcase in London on Sept. 23. Jamaica, like many Caribbean destinations, has been badly hit by the Covid pandemic.

Created by the Caribbean Tourism Organisation UK & Europe, the event will bring buyers and suppliers together and provide the opportunity to grow business and learn more about the region.

Hosted at the Leonardo Royal London St Paul's Hotel, the event provides a full day of business meetings and networking, culminating in a drinks reception and hosted three-course dinner.

Over 100 people from accommodation representatives, tourist offices, airlines, media partners, travel agents and tour operators are registered to meet up.

The Jamaica Tourist Board will highlight increased Virgin Atlantic air services from

London Heathrow to Montego Bay via Nassau twice a week and a new direct Virgin Atlantic flight from Manchester to Montego Bay, from November.

All UK travellers, including those aged 12 and over need to show proof of a negative Covid test performed by an accredited lab within three days of travelling and complete a simple travel authorisation form before they arrive, which is accessible there.

Windrush victims fear Afghan distraction

Windrush campaigners are even more concerned about compensation claimants being delayed for longer amid the Afghanisthan crisis.

Windrush survivors are the Caribbean people who arrived in the United Kingdom decades ago, usually as children and teenagers, worked and lived there throughout but because they hadn't got their British passports were treated badly by the Conservative government. They could not work, access health care or benefits and some were deported.

Britain's pledge to aid thousands of Afghans fleeing persecution is generally accepted as fair, but hundreds affected by the Windrush scandal have yet to receive pay-outs as delays mount.

Only 412 of the 2,367 claims submitted had received a final award despite the process being open for two years, according to a report by the Public Accounts Committee published in July.

Last month, attendees at the monthly Windrush National Organisation meeting were surprised when told that the de-facto head of the Windrush Compensation Scheme, Tom Greig, had moved onto the Afghan Resettlement Programme while someone temporarily covers his post.

Windrush victims – many in their 70s and 80s – feel the Home Office is deliberately delaying making compensation payments hoping they will either die or lose the energy to seek compensation. At least 21 have died so far.

Filipino nurse crisis as Covid rages

The Covid Delta variant has swept across south-east Asia over recent months, prompting lockdowns and overwhelming hospitals with the Philippines hardest hit compounded by a chronic lack of health workers.

The number of Covid patients in the Philippines is at a record high. But nurses and medical staff have for years been leaving in droves for better paid work abroad which means that many hospitals are now severely short staffed.

The Philippines is one of the world's biggest suppliers of nurses, with 17,000 leaving to work overseas in 2019, including in the UK and the US. But it is increasingly struggling to staff its own wards, where pay is low and conditions poor. Last week, the Private Hospitals Association of the Philippines estimated 40 percent of private hospital nurses quit last year, and more have left after new waves of infections this year.

Maristela Abenojar, president of Filipino Nurses United, warned more will

go unless the government begins large-scale recruitment to ease the pressure on wards, and pays overdue benefits to staff.

On Saturday, 16,694 infections were reported, as well as and 398 deaths – the second-highest daily death toll since the pandemic began. So far, over 32,000 people have died.

Hospitalised Zuma gets medical parole

South Africa's jailed former President Jacob Zuma has been granted medical parole.

The 79-year-old is serving a 15-month sentence for contempt of court at Est-court Correctional Centre.

The nature of his illness was not specified, but a statement said he would complete the rest of his sentence in the community under special conditions. Zuma has been in hospital for the past month where he has undergone surgery. He will remain there until discharged.

Zuma handed himself in to police in July after being sentenced for failing to attend an inquiry into corruption during his presidency. His jailing was unprecedented for an ex-president, sparking violent protests and looting.

Though he was forced out of office by his own party in 2018, the African National Congress (ANC), he retains a loyal body of supporters, especially in his home province of KwaZulu-Natal.

Zuma was sentenced on 29 June for defying an instruction to give evidence at an inquiry into corruption during his nine years in power. He has testified only once at the inquiry into what has become known as "state capture", meaning the siphoning off of state assets.

Businessmen are accused of conspiring with politicians to influence the decision-making process while he was in office. Zuma has repeatedly said he is the victim of a political conspiracy.




