CITA slams Government for pausing Reopening Plan

In a blistering attack on the Government for their decision to indefinitely pause the reopening plan, the body that represents Cayman's tourism industry, the Cayman Islands Tourism Association, has said the move would force many tourism-dependent businesses to close and many livelihoods would be lost.

Stating that the decision showed "a complete disregard for the livelihoods of thousands of Caymanians," CITA said such a move stole hope for the future.

"It is incredibly disappointing that the Government has reversed course, responding to emotion and fear rather than remaining guided by sound logic and scientific evidence," they stated.

Not only would the shutting of Cayman's borders to tourists badly impact this and

next year's tourism industry, the ramifications would be felt for years to come, they said.

"The decision made now to remain closed to tourism does not only impact Cayman for the rest of 2021, but it also eliminates the possibility of a meaningful level of tourism in 2022 and sets the course for no less than 4 to 5 years for the industry to recover," the CITA said.

The result would be that thousands of tourism employees and Caymanian business owners and operators would be dependent on Government stipends for survival for the long term which would impact all Caymanians and the level of services the Government would be able to provide.

CITA said the advent of Covid within the community should have come as no sur-

In time, Cayman must move on

The people of the Cayman Islands have a long history of resilience, bravery and tenacity and it is to these qualities that the nation must once again turn in the face of Covid-19. The cold, hard fact is that this awful virus is the world over and while we commend our Governments (both old and new) for keeping the virus at bay and away from the Cayman Islands, it is inevitable that it will arrive on these shores and among our community.

For that reason, we believe that Cayman needs to get back to work and move on, because the virus is not going away anytime soon.

The Cayman Islands does not have the means to keep our tourism workers paid on stipend forever and people simply have to get back to work. One only has to cast one's mind back 12 years to September 2009, when the Cayman Islands was forced to get approval from the UK Government to obtain loans to help this country manage its debts due to the economic crash of 2008/9. We cannot let ourselves get back to that unfortunate state of affairs. Cayman is not and never has been a welfare state. We do not pay taxes which means the Government only has limited sources of funding, and they are certainly not in a position to subsidize unemployed workers indefinitely.

It is time, Cayman, to do what is best for the country and that is to allow our borders to be open and get the country financially back on its feet. This means we have to get vaccinated, wear masks, sanitise our hands, keep our distance from people and form social bubbles with people we see on a regular basis. It is inevitable that people will get Covid-19, yes, even children. But all the studies show that children do not in general fare badly, even if they do catch the virus. It is the elderly and the clinically vulnerable who must take care, but if they have been vaccinated even, they should not suffer as much as if they are unvaccinated.

In a recent press briefing, the Governor pointed out that in the UK they have, in the main, managed to break the link between catching Covid and death thanks to a high uptake of the vaccine. As a result, they largely go about their day as usual. This is the way forward. We must get our economy going again. We just cannot afford to stand still.

This is not about putting the economy above people's lives; this is facing the cold, hard reality that Cayman has no other option. If the economy breaks, we all go under. We cannot allow that to happen.

Temporary Suspension of Training Courses at Department of Environmental Health

The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) is advising residents of the temporary suspension of its Food Hygiene and Cosmetology training sessions from September 15, 2021 until further notice.

Mr. Richard Simms, DEH Director explains that the decision to put on hold the training courses is a precautionary measure to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in the community. "We have decided to postpone all training sessions as part of the DEH response to the current increase of COVID-19 cases and aims to help ensure the safety of our staff, participants and their families," he says.

While DEH is unable to offer its training programmes at this time, residents are advised that their team of Environmental Health Officers are ready and available to answer questions related to food hygiene and safety guidelines. They are also reachable to provide recommendations related

to cleanliness, personnel hygiene, prevention of infectious skin, respiratory and blood borne diseases to barber shop, hair salons and Spa operators.

There are currently two training courses being offered by the DEH to the Cayman Public. These are the Food Hygiene & Safety course for food operatives and the Cosmetology course for barbers, hairdressers, nail technicians, tattoo artists and spa attendants. The first training is offered every Wednesday by the Environmental Health Officers while the second training is offered once a month by District Officers.



George Town Primary School closed after student tests positive for COVID-19

Classes at the George Town Primary School have been suspended and students advised to stay at home after a Year 6 child tested positive for COVID-19 on Monday.

Public Health officials along with the Ministry of Education have activated their

planned response measures, in line with the current Public Health COVID-19 protocols.

“Since receiving notification late Monday evening that one of our students has tested positive for COVID-19, we, along with Public Health, have immediately activated our Continuity of Operations Plan for schools. In consultation with Public Health authorities, our staff will be on the ground at GTPS to oversee the implementation of the appropriate measures, and to provide support and guidance where needed,” assured Director of Education Services, Mr Mark Ray.

Parents of students attending the George Town Primary School (GTPS) have been advised that students and their families should remain at home until they

are contacted on this morning (Tuesday) by the school administration and advised of a time their year group will be tested for COVID-19.

Students and accompanying family members are also asked to wear masks and take all precautions around hand hygiene and physical distancing.

School facilities and buses will be sanitised and families will be supported by the school counsellor and other staff.

Chief Medical Officer, Dr John Lee said, “I want to reassure the community that Public Health is doing everything to ensure the safety of our students. We can all appreciate that this is a very difficult time for many of us in the community.”

He also strongly advised against spreading of misinformation pertaining to this development.

“However, it is best not to spread misinformation, and to cooperate with Public Health officials at this time. I am thankful



that we are a highly vaccinated community; which will serve us well during times like these,” the CMO stated.

GTPS will remain closed until they receive clearance to return to school from Public Health.

Meantime, students and parents are advised to wear masks at all other government school facilities.

BORDER OPENING ON PAUSE

COVID COMMUNITY SPREAD GAME-CHANGER FOR CAYMAN

The Cayman Islands Government (CIG) on Tuesday rolled back its plans to further reopen the borders and announced a raft of measures in the wake of the recent confirmation of cases of community spread of COVID-19 and an equally concerning increase in the number of positive cases among travellers.

The planned next phase of the reopening of the borders - Phase 4 from October 14th - has been postponed, and quarantine for incoming vaccinated travellers is being increased to seven days after being reduced to five. It was previously set at 10 days. Geo-tagging of persons in quarantine is also being re-introduced.

Hon. Premier Wayne Panton made the announcement during a government press conference on Tuesday stressing his administration's concerns over the evolving situation.

"Going by the WHO (World Health Organisation) definition, we are in this low level of community transmission, but that for us reflects a game-changer, although earlier than expected," Mr Panton stated.

He said the ongoing Phase 3 (soft reopening) was being paused with immediate effect. This would also delay the start of the Phase 4 which was planned for October 4th and would have seen Cayman's borders further open to international air traffic especially for tourism.

This delay is now expected to last until at least the end of the year, the Premier indicated.

"We don't want to be rushing anything. We want to remain cautious and be able to carefully consider everything that we need to put in place to ensure that our people feel safe and to ensure that our children are best protected"

The Premier also said that mask-wearing indoors in public places is being re-introduced and an emphasis on hand hygiene.

"We are imminently going to make changes to the regulations," he added indicating that limits are also being considered on public gatherings and social distancing.

Mr Panton said in light of the economic implications for the business community, the government was looking into further support considering the additional costs for both the business community and the government.

The Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee reported that up to Tuesday there were known cases of community transmission affecting seven households.

Of the recent reported cases, the one person who was hospitalised was described as "doing well and is very stable" while the condition of two others isolating at home was also stable and unchanged.

In addition to a student at the George Town Primary school who tested positive yesterday and is linked to the community spread, contact tracing had started on Tuesday in the case of another student who tested positive on Tuesday.

Details were sketchy but Dr Lee indicated that the second student might also be linked to the George Town Primary School which remains closed.

HE Governor Martyn Roper said despite the recent cases of community spread of COVID-19, the numbers were comparatively small, and Cayman continues to be a leading nation on the regional and global vaccination table.

"I do recognise it's a time of stress for everyone in our community right now, we've had an incredibly safer bubble for 18 months and it doesn't quite feel like that, but we should remain calm and take great comfort from the fact that our vaccination rates gives us a lot of protection, one of the highest rates anywhere in the world.

Repeating his call to unvaccinated persons take the jab, Mr Roper estimated that if 80 per cent of the different age groups eligible for the vaccine get inoculated that would create what he called 'a firebreak effect' to suppress the spread of the virus and its variants.

He again urged adherence to the prevention protocols and said while the source of the cases of community spread is yet to be determined, instances of undeclared boat trips to Jamaica was a concern to the authorities here.

The Governor also announced that the booster shots approved by the UK for Cayman have been ordered and are expected to arrive.

He reported that Public Health England has noted the high vaccination rates in Cayman and has advised government to consider the risk of infection rates from feeder countries in their COVID mitigation policies and said that additional resources were also mentioned.

Hon. Min for Health and Wellness, Sabrina Turner acknowledged the concerns in the community about the current developments urged that community-wide, the issue should be taken seriously.

Min. Turner said staffing resources at the Health Service Authority were being increased; up from 62 in January last year to 83 this month.

She also stressed the importance of persons getting vaccinated.

The Health and Wellness minister also welcomed initiatives by the business community putting their own preventive measures in place to minimise spread.

With one student having tested positive for a community spread of COVID-19, the George Town Primary School will remain closed for a second day on Wednesday.

Hon. Min. Of Education Juliana O'Connor-Connolly said the school will remain closed until an all-clear is given by the CMO Dr John Lee.

She also said that there was a flexibility in policies allowing the Ministry and Department of Education to respond to developments.

Throughout Tuesday's press conference there were repeated calls from the government panel for person to desist from misinformation.

It was also commented that the current state of affairs should not be politicised.

The Leader of the Opposition, Roy McTaggart, had earlier in the day issued call for the government to postpone the planned October 14th reopening and reinstate the 10-day quarantine for vaccinated travellers.

With the government taking those two steps on Tuesday, in addition to reinstating the geo-tags on persons in quarantine, Premier Wayne Panton said the government was being advised by the same programme Board that had advised the previous administration.

Saying the Opposition "had nothing to worry about", Mr Panton added that it was not a matter that their comments and suggestions were not appreciated.

Expressing confidence in his PACT coalition government's handling of the crisis since it came into office this year, Mr Panton said there is no playbook and his administration's approach is taking into account what other countries had attempted but not succeeded.

Compared the current and ongoing situation, the Premier stated that locking down was comparatively easy compared to the current challenge confronting Cayman with COVID-19.



prise to the Government and that Cayman was ready to deal with this inevitability, citing Cayman's enviably high vaccination rate and world class health professionals.

"The Government has now clearly demonstrated a lack of confidence in its own planning and advisors," they confirmed.

CITA said it echoed the Governor's message that waiting out the pandemic was a forlorn hope. They also supported Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee's comments based upon his time in the UK that Cayman could live normally with Covid in the community.

"We should be measured, calm and proactive rather than anxious, emotional and reactionary. We must have collective courage to chart a positive course forward for our Islands in place of the fear stoked by continual uncertainty," CITA urged.

They also said that there were inconsistencies in the Government's policy reversal, in that while borders were closed indefinitely, and the quarantine period increased, they had not, at the same time, issued vac-

ination mandates for frontline workers, educators, and others at risk as many other countries had done, nor had they sought opportunities to control Covid through layers of preventative measures and using technology such as smart phone contact tracing.

Calling the current way forward unsustainable, CITA said border closure was at the expense of sacrificing the livelihoods of thousands of workers, entrepreneurs and other stakeholders rather than deploying targeted measures and policies specific to the proven threats was illogical.

Highlighting the statistics which showed an extremely unlikely chance that children and vaccinated people will die or have serious illness if they contract Covid, CITA said the Government ought to be reiterating such statistics to calm fears.

CITA called for the community to speak out and share their views.

"We need other community leaders to stand up and oppose the Government's abandonment of the reopening plan," they said. "Lastly, we pray that those residents recently infected recover swiftly. We continue to urge unvaccinated residents to get their first jabs without delay."

ATLANTIC TROPICAL WAVE COULD BE THE NEXT NAMED STORM

Residents and weather forecasters in Cayman and across the eastern and western Caribbean are keeping a close eye on a developing weather system in the far eastern Atlantic.


Currently a tropical wave, the US National Hurricane Centre which is tracking the system reports that it is showing signs of further intensification as it heads on a westerly track which in the coming days could bring it into the eastern Caribbean Island chain.

A slight west north westerly shift could very well eventually bring it in the vicinity of the Cayman Islands.

"This system has a high chance of tropical cyclone formation within 48 hours," the NHC reported on Wednesday.

It said that showers and thunderstorms associated with this low pressure continue to show signs of organization.

"Environmental conditions are expected to remain conducive for development, and a tropical depression is likely to form during the next couple of days while the system moves generally westward at about 15 mph across the eastern tropical Atlantic Ocean."



Earlier on Wednesday, the tropical wave was positioned a few hundred nautical miles south of the Cabo Verde islands and moving to the west at 20 knots.

This tropical wave is said to have a 90% chance of cyclone formation in the coming days.

If it does develop and become a named storm it will be called Odette and will be

the 15th storm of this year's hurricane season.

While this system is regarded as "of growing concern for the Caribbean" by some regional forecasters, the current peak of the 2021 hurricane season is also seeing several bands of disturbed weather close to the Caribbean Island chain being monitored by the US National Hurricane Centre.

Those include another tropical wave in the eastern Caribbean Sea crossing the Mona Passage between Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic and moving west at around 15 knots.

The NHC said that the wave has been producing scattered moderate rainfall and thunderstorms over the eastern Caribbean Sea between the Mona Passage, south of Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Weather conditions for Cayman over the next few days according to the Cayman Islands National Weather Service (NWS) will see mainly partly cloudy skies with a 30 per cent chance of showers with possible thunder.

Winds are east to south-east 10 to 15 knots, and sea state slight with wave heights of 1 to 3 feet.

Suggested Hurricane Supply List

To prepare for the unknown, each home should have a 72-hour Disaster Survival Kit. You will need to pack some essential items to help you and your family survive, whether you stay at home or leave it during a disaster.

Ensure at least three days (72 hours) supply for each person. Do not forget pets where applicable! The following is a minimum suggested list of Survival Kit supplies:

Drinking Water:

- One gallon per person/per day in unbreakable containers, Avoid using containers that will decompose or break, such as milk cartons or glass bottles. A normally active person needs to drink at least two quarts of water each day. Hot environments and intense physical activity can double that amount. Children, nursing mothers, and ill people will need more.
- Don't forget to add additional water for mixing formula if you have children and for your pets. Rotate the drinking water each year.
- Food preparation and sanitation require another two quarts (minimum) per person daily.
- Purchased bottled water that has been sealed is best for storage. It meets FDA guidelines for food and is not as vulnerable to temperature changes as unsealed water
- **Tip:** Purchase water this year and use it for drinking next year. This allows for rotation on an annual basis and keeps the water fresh. *Yes water can go bad!*

Water for sanitation use:

- Store extra containers of water to be used for flushing toilets, cleaning, and bathing.

- Purchase water purification tablets (Halazone) to be used if you still have running water but are told to boil water before using it. This allows you to fill the bathtub and other containers without purchasing expensive drinking water.

- **Tip:** Keep plastic containers (milk jugs and other containers) and fill them with water when a storm threatens. You can put these items in the freezer to keep food cold longer in the event that the electricity goes out.

Non-perishable Food:

- Maintain at least 3-7 days of food for each member of the family.
- Small, preferably single serving cans (should not require cooking or refrigeration). Dried fruit, peanut butter and jelly, coffee, tea, soft drinks and pet foods.
- Ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables.
- Canned juices, milk, soup (if powdered, store extra water).
- Staples – sugar, salt, pepper in water proof containers.
- High energy foods like crackers, granola bars, trail mix.
- Raw vegetables that do not need refrigeration.
- Fresh bread.
- Comfort/stress foods – cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, lollipops, **instant coffee, tea bags.**
- Sterno for cooking.
- Vitamins
- Food for infants
- Paper cups, plates, and plastic utensils
- Non-electric can opener
- Aluminum foil
- Plastic storage containers



- Lots of ice (you can freeze your water supply)
- Pedialyte (to restore hydration if needed)
- **Tip:** Purchase only items that you like to eat and would eat even without a storm.

Rotate these items by using them Dec-May each year and purchasing new items Jan-May. This allows you to reduce the cost of buying items for a hurricane kit at one time and keeps the items fresh. *Yes even canned goods have a shelf life!*

CELEBRATING CAYMAN WRITERS, WRITINGS, & THE ARTS

Writing From Experience: Kareen Walker-Balfore's *Where Children Play*

What is wonderful about the Cayman literary scene is that we have some writers that are established, some on their



way to being established, and some who are slowly but surely taking that first step and spreading their wings. We also have young writers – both youthful and new – many of whom are demonstrating that local writings have a promising future. What is also wonderful about the Cayman literary scene, is that with Cayman's multiculturalism and multiculturalism, writers originate from different places and take their varied interests and writing styles with them, thereby enriching what already exists.

This week's author hails from Kingston, Jamaica, and has a strong background in education, both in Jamaica and Cayman, where she has been part of the Department of Education Services for approximately fourteen years. She clearly has a love for children and has contributed over time to their development. She also has seen them in their varied spaces and has captured their bright, effervescent, and contagious personalities and behaviours in her works. She has also seemingly enjoyed a free and delightful childhood, as many of the poems she produces are nostalgic

- reminiscent of home even as they echo the joys of her upbringing and the lessons learnt over time.

In a decidedly Caribbean voice, Kareen Walker-Balfore's *Where Children Play*, presents a collection of poems divided into eleven sections that is built on personal experience and clearly presents the values that have long been instilled in Caribbean children. Though appealing to readers of all ages, Walker-Balfore's collection is especially evocative of the young child, transporting all readers back to their childhood and evoking a sense of home and fashioning an identity rooted in origins and influences.

Also fascinating is the division of the book into sections. I dubbed Section 1 'The Curiosity of Childhood', as Walker-Balfore spends time in nine poems, recalling seemingly specific events from her childhood. Her persona is seemingly a "Curious Child", who in a poem so named, speaks of how her sister one day innocently barged in on her dad as he bathed, and what then ensued. "Basic School" tells of going off to what we in Cayman know as Reception or Pre-K, and the fears associated with that moment. Her brother's idle Sunday morning antics brought laughter in "When Pickney Idle", and the poet tells of her ill sister who was subjected to what we all seek in this covid environment, "Home Remedy", as her

Mother rubbed her chest
And back with vicks,
Then forced her to drink
Something she missed (lines 9-12)
"Peeny Wally", "Flies" and "Pigs and Piglets", all examined in poems so titled, prove the curious child's fascination with animals and insects - a fact to which many of us in the Caribbean who had a goat, a chicken, a rabbit, and yes, even a piglet for a pet, can relate. So begins the collection of poems that so unabashedly celebrates Walker-Balfore's origins. One advice that many experienced authors often pass on to those following in their footsteps, is that they should write from personal experience, as this results in more insightful and entertaining works. Recently, my daughter, another aspiring writer, told me that I have not lived until I have read one of Roald Dahl's books. Apparently a hit among adolescent and teenage readers – he wrote *The BFG* (*The Big Friendly Giant*) children's book – Dahl is said to have used his childhood as the platform for some of his most popular books. He also wrote *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* and credits his daily childhood journey past a local sweetshop – one of the few highlights of an otherwise dull childhood – as the inspiration for a work based on what was a seemingly simple trek.

Walker-Balfore successfully gave in to the desire to write what she saw, knew, and experienced. Through her creative works, she is able to pay homage to the many persons who influenced her life. Section two recalls individuals who influenced her childhood – neighbours, grade 4 teacher, her sisters and brothers, and

her dad and mother. Some persons she called by name – Doreen, for example, in "Morning Fuss", and granny, also known as "Greasy Minnie" in a poem so titled. Sections four and five celebrate nature, as the poet references goats, love birds, butterflies, and the rooster at daybreak – all relevant to the Caribbean experience. It made me chuckle when I read of "Mother Hen" who

... likes to walk
Around with her chicks,
She scratches the dirt
And then she picks (lines 1-4)

Then Walker-Balfore writes of "Five Iguanas" who are "laying in the sun" and who "sat looking at me". These are reminiscent of what we see on any given day in Cayman, and she creatively captures what is an integral part of our reality which we often do not see. Also reflective of our reality is the poet's language. Not at all afraid to write in her 'nation language', Walker-Balfore evokes the colloquial concepts of "goat mout", references "hungry belly", playing dandy shandy, and appropriately highlights and celebrates the "Pickney" who likes "fi chat", gets "inna trouble", and "mek up story" – a seemingly fitting description of the precocious pickney the poet had herself been!

Like many Caribbean writings, Walker-Balfore in Section 10 writes about the mirror which "tells" and "shows" and "is always right". We have previously explored the notion that writings from Cayman are mirrors which reflect the society, highlighting what needs fixing by 'showing' our flaws and 'telling' of corrective methods. Section 11 appropriately ends with "A Prayer" by this writer who admits that she has deep Christian roots and has influenced Cayman and Jamaican youths through Sunday School interactions. Not surprisingly, she prays for guidance for herself, for her mom and dad, her sisters, and brothers, and yes, for all of us.

OPPOSITION LEADER SAYS KEEP 10-DAY QUARANTINE AND DELAY REOPENING

The Hon. Leader of the Opposition, Roy McTaggart, has again appealed to the government to keep the 10-day quarantine requirement for travellers in place instead of reducing it to 5 days.

Mr McTaggart who had previously advocated a September reopening, also said in light of current trends with the pandemic in Cayman and elsewhere, the government should now consider delaying the planned October 14th re-opening of the borders to international airline traffic.

The leader of the Progressives said keeping the 10-day quarantine requirement in place was even more necessary now especially considering the threat posed by the Delta variant of COVID-19 and the emergence of community-spread cases in Cayman.

To date, four such instances have been identified including a primary school student, and recent screening of arriving travellers have also seen a surge in positive test results.

In response the government has been placing a strong emphasis on the vaccination effort.

Mr McTaggart reminded: "In June I spoke out against the introduction of a five-day quarantine because this is insufficient time to ensure that the virus is not transmitted in the community. I believe that the government introduced it to encourage more vaccinations."

But he went on to state that "given the re-emergence of community spread of the

virus, it seems obvious to me that such a short quarantine period should be suspended and that we should revert to a minimum of 10 days for those vaccinated. This will help improve our ability to keep what COVID we have now in check."

The Progressives leader said his party supports the government's call for those people not yet vaccinated to come forward and get inoculated, a policy pursued by his party when it led the previous coalition and coordinated the initial national response to the outbreak of the pandemic.

"I am pleased that we have not forgotten the lessons that we learned last year as we all worked to eliminate COVID 19 from our Islands, that we are already taking precautions to protect our families, ourselves, and the wider community."

"As I said last week the Opposition stand by the Government in supporting the call for those not vaccinated to come forward and be vaccinated as soon as possible. It was therefore gratifying to see the hundreds that turned out at the vaccination clinics over the last few days. I pray that these increased vaccinations will continue."

Given the current situation, Mr McTaggart said, "Back in June when the Government and the Opposition proposed specific opening dates, the environment was different. The Delta variant, though a concern, was not understood then to be as dangerous as we now know it to be."

According to Mr McTaggart, with vaccinations losing some efficacy over time, "there is a great risk that those most vulnerable, including the elderly, who were vaccinated early on will be at risk should we open the borders to tourism next month."

He is urging that the booster shot programme, which it was announced last week will be available to Cayman, should be implemented as soon as possible.

Concerning the risk to children, the Opposition leaders said was another reason for the government to delay the next

phase of the re-opening now planned for October 14th.

The government has said that it is closely monitoring current developments and that the October 14th date is now not 'hard-wired' into its re-opening schedule.

The Opposition Leader said, "The decision as to how best to open the border lies with our government. They will receive the best advice and at the end of the day the decision will be theirs. I ask that they consider these points that I have raised in their contemplations."





Schools in Philippines remain shut

Schools in the Philippines reopened for the new academic year on Monday but millions of children remained at home for a second year of remote lessons that experts fear will worsen an educational "crisis".

While nearly every country in the world has partially or fully reopened schools to in-person classes, the Philippines has kept them closed since the start of the coronavirus pandemic, the United Nations said.

President Rodrigo Duterte has so far rejected proposals for a pilot reopening of primary and secondary schools for fear children could catch Covid-19 and infect elderly relatives.

Misery for schoolkids is compounded by a ban on them playing outdoors. A "blended learning" programme involving online classes, printed materials and lessons broadcast on television and social media was launched last October.

It has been plagued with problems: most students in the Philippines don't have a computer or internet at home.

More than 80 percent of parents are worried their children "are learning less", said Isy Faingold, Unicef's education chief in the Philippines, citing a recent survey.

Around two-thirds of parents support the reopening of classrooms in areas where virus transmission is low. "Distance learning cannot replace the in-person learning," Faingold said. "There was already a learning crisis before Covid ... it's going to be even worse."

Trudeau: I'll ban medical protests

Canada goes to the polls on Monday and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau is banking on staying in power by claiming if re-elected he would ban people from protesting outside hospitals and other medical centres. He also accused his chief rival of supporting those who oppose COVID-19 vaccinations.

Recent polls show Trudeau's ruling Liberals have recovered from early setbacks and could squeeze out another minority government in the snap Sept. 20 election he called to gain approval for how he handled the pandemic.

Organisers of previous demonstrations against vaccine mandates mobilised again across Canada on Monday and Trudeau said Conservative Party leader Erin O'Toole was "giving into his anti-vaccination fringe elements in his caucus".

O'Toole is not enthusiastic about mandates, saying he prefers use of rapid testing. He is trying to expand support by pushing more centrist policies.

Trudeau said the Liberals would make it a criminal offence to block access to buildings that provide health care, including hospitals, abortion clinics, pharmacies and testing centres.

O'Toole has repeatedly criticised Trudeau, portraying him as a scandal-hit party goer obsessed with keeping power. O'Toole highlighted photos of a young Trudeau dressed in blackface which emerged during the 2019 election race.

Haiti recovery slow as many still suffer

Aid delivery to Haiti's earthquake-stricken south is slowly improving, but gangs continue to patrol key transport routes, international freight carriers have raised costs, and snags related to Brexit and COVID-19 are causing lengthy air and shipping delays.

The 7.2-magnitude earthquake struck Haiti's southern peninsula on Aug. 14, killing more than 2,200 people, injuring more than 12,000, and delivering another blow to a region that has been by a succession of natural disasters in recent years.

A humanitarian corridor - negotiated between aid groups and the gangs that have terrorised the capital, Port-au-Prince, in recent years - has allowed aid shipments to move from there to the affected areas in the

south, but some relief trucks have still been looted, and clashes have been reported along the border route from the neighbouring Dominican Republic.

A month after the earthquake, several roads and bridges also remain damaged or blocked following heavy rains and floods triggered by Tropical Depression Grace days after the earthquake. As a result, many aid organisations have had to rely on bringing goods in by sea or air.

Shipping costs of humanitarian aid have also tripled. Fuel scarcity in Port-au-Prince hand a global shortage of shipping containers as well as a backlog of containers across ports in the Caribbean has further complicated logistics.

UK's job figures gently improving

Job vacancies in the United Kingdom have hit a record high as the economic recovery continues, according to official figures.

The number of vacancies in the three months to August rose above one million for the first time since records began in 2001.

The unemployment rate fell from 4.7 percent to 4.6 percent in the three months to July.

Figures also showed employee numbers were back at pre-Covid levels in August, the Office for National Statistics said.

August payrolls showed another monthly increase of 241,000 to 29.1 million in total.

The ONS noted though that young people had been badly affected by job losses.

Chancellor Rishi Sunak said on Tuesday: "Today's statistics show that our

plan for jobs is working. As we continue to recover from the pandemic, our focus remains on creating opportunities and supporting people's jobs."

The figures come as the furlough scheme, which was introduced by the government at the start of the pandemic to stop people being laid off, starts to wind down.

Next Honduras prez may be Asfura


Honduras' ruling party presidential candidate Nasry Asfura remains the favourite ahead of the Nov. 28 election. It's a boost to backers of the country's current government.

The poll was conducted by CID-Gallup published on Friday. It showed Asfura, mayor of the capital Tegucigalpa and candidate of the ruling National Party, received 21 percent support among those polled, one percentage point up from a previous survey published in May.

His closest rival is Xiomara Castro, wife of former President Manuel Zelaya, got 18 percent. Castro is running for the leftist Liberty and Refoundation Party (LIBRE).

Television presenter Salvador Nasralla, put forward as a candidate by a coalition of parties, also came in with 18 percent support.

The poll also showed that the number of Hondurans who plan not to vote at all has risen to 18 percent from 12 percent earlier.

The candidates are seeking to replace outgoing two-term President Juan Orlando Hernandez, whose eight years in power have been mired by corruption allegations.

Hernandez has denied the accusations, including by prosecutors in a US trial that he worked with drug traffickers to move large quantities of cocaine into America.
