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

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# Residency seekers need to be vaccinated under new law

The public only has a few days to give their input to a Bill proposed by Government to require various categories of ex-patriates provide a vaccine certificate "of any notifiable disease" (which includes Covid-19) when they make their applications to remain on island.

Input on the Immigration (Transition) (Amendment) Bill, 2021, ends this Sunday, 3rd October, and is being requested by Government as it seeks to amend immigration regulations to mandate that people seeking to reside permanently in Cayman, must provide a Covid-19 vaccine certificate.

The categories of people affected by this new requirement include people who have been legally and ordinarily resident for eight years (section 37 of the principal Act) and dependents aged 18 and over and also spouses or civil partners of a Caymanian who applies for an Residency and Employment Rights Certificate (RERC).

Other people who must now provide a vaccine certificate include people of independent means who apply for a 25-year Residency Certificate for Persons of Independent Means and their surviving or former spouses or civil partners and their dependents when they are 18. It also includes people who have applied for a Certificate



of Direct Investment and the surviving/former spouse or civil partner of a Certificate of Direct Investment holder who has applied for such a certificate in their own right. People who have applied for a Certificate for Specialist Caregivers for that person's employee/former employee and applicants for a 25-year Residency Certificate on the basis of substantial business presence must also show that they have been vaccinated against Covid-19.

These new legal provisions only apply to people who can actually receive the Covid-19 vaccine. In this regard, the Bill states: "While vaccination certificates for dependants must be provided, the amendments will not apply to dependants who are not eligible for vaccination under the Public Health Act (2021 Revision) or to those persons for whom medical certificates are provided which certify that vaccination would be injurious to the health of the person or a dependant of the person."

# Cabinet Clarifies Social Distancing Regulations

To provide further clarity around social distancing requirements in restaurants and bars, Cabinet today published more details pertaining specifically to those businesses.

The updated Control and Management of Covid-19 (Amendment) Regulations 2021 regulations specify that:



• Restaurants and bars may offer indoor and outdoor services, subject to the owner or operator satisfying the following conditions:

- \* Tables must be at least six feet apart;
- \* Notwithstanding social distancing requirements laid out elsewhere in the regulations, people from different households may be seated at the same table in a restaurant or bar;

\* Servers and front of house staff must wear masks or cloth face coverings while serving customers;

\* Owners and operators of any establishment found in breach of these regulations are liable on conviction to a fine of KYD10,000 and to imprisonment for up to two years.

The amendment regulations come into force immediately.



# Quick turnaround on work permits mandatory vaccines discussion

The Government has introduced two pieces of legislation to be discussed by the public that, if agreed upon, will mean anyone applying for a work permit must have already been vaccinated against Covid-19.

Premier Wayne Panton announced the gazetting of The Immigration (Transition) (Amendment) Bill, 2021 and the Customs and Border Control (Amendment) Bill, 2021 at a press briefing late last week and the public will be able to give their comments to the two Bills up until Sunday 3rd October 2021. This ten-day period is a reduced period of time for public consultation (the normal period is 28 days) because the Government said the issue was urgent.

The new legislation will require people hoping to work in Cayman on a work permit to provide documented evidence that they have either completed an approved

Covid-19 vaccine course or pledge their willingness to undertake an approved vaccination course and comply with other instructions given by the Medical Officer of Health within a specific period.

This urgent move was part of Government's plan to keep people's health and safety at the forefront of all policy decisions relating to border opening, Deputy Premier and Minister for Border Control & Labour Chris Saunders said a critical aspect of keeping people healthy was ensuring that a high percentage of the population was vaccinated against Covid-19.

The rules will apply to new expatriates seeking to work in Cayman and also existing ones looking to renew a work permit.

Government announced its intention to ensure work permit holders were vaccinated back in July when the Premier spoke at the Chamber of Commerce Legislative Luncheon.



Deputy Premier Saunders said: "As we see the deadly and overwhelming havoc that Covid outbreaks have had, and are currently having, on neighbouring countries in the region and on fellow UK Overseas Territories, it is important that we act

swiftly in taking every precaution to protect our community."

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

# Digital COVID Vaccine Certificates now being uploaded to MyHSA Patient Portal

Nearly 40,000 individuals' securely verified digital COVID-19 vaccination records with QR code have now been uploaded into the MyHSA Patient Portal for persons vaccinated in the Cayman Islands.

"Everyone who has received a COVID-19 vaccine is encouraged to sign-up for the MyHSA Patient Portal, as this is the primary platform to access your digital certificate," HSA CEO Lizzette Yearwood stated. "The uploading of vaccination records is ongoing and I'm pleased that nearly 75% of vaccinated persons can now access their digital record".

In parallel with the uploading of vaccine records HSA will continue verification of some records to ensure that all information collected from the Cayman Islands COVID Vaccination Programme is accurate.

"All persons who are already signed up for the patient portal are encouraged to

log-in and check your record for accuracy. If there is any discrepancy, please email portalinfo@hsa.ky. If your vaccination record is not showing yet, we ask that you please be patient, as that means your record will be imported soon. Only persons who have a discrepancy need to contact," confirmed Ms Yearwood.

Once logged into the portal, the digital vaccine with QR code can be found under the 'COVID Centre' quick link on the home screen or under Health Record, COVID Centre, COVID-19 Vaccine Verification.

Basic immunisation records can be found in the portal under Health Record, Health Profile, Immunizations.

Anyone 16 years and older can now register themselves for full access to the patient portal. Parents & guardians can sign up children 15 and under via a child proxy.

Portal sign-up in the community is ongoing and the latest schedule is available at [www.hsa.ky](http://www.hsa.ky). A dedicated registration officer is also available at the Cayman Islands Hospital atrium Monday - Friday 8:30am - 5pm. Please bring your Government Photo ID showing your date of birth and a valid email address. All persons are required to wear your own facemask at all sign-up location.

He was transported to the hospital by ambulance and is currently critical but stable.




The motorcyclist was immediately transported to the hospital by ambulance, but succumbed to his injuries and was

# Cayman Data Protection: Can Employers Ask For COVID-19 Vaccine Status?

A: Absolutely the DPA applies. Any information about your employees is personal data under the DPA. Vaccination information is medical data which falls under the definition of sensitive personal data in the DPA which means an employer must meet stricter legal requirements before processing. Processing is broadly defined as recording, holding, obtaining or carrying out any operations on the personal data.

**Q: What is meant by “stricter legal requirements” when it comes to processing sensitive personal data?**

A: Under the DPA, to legally process sensitive personal data the data controller (i.e. the employer) must identify a legal basis for processing from both Schedule 2 and Schedule 3 of the DPA.

Additionally, the more sensitive the personal data the more security is required to ensure against unlawful processing. Security measures can include policies, access controls, technical and physical measures.

**Q: What are the appropriate legal bases for processing sensitive personal data under Schedule 2 and 3 in this context?**

A: The appropriate legal basis for processing will vary depending on the specific employer, the employee’s position within the organization and any legal framework to which the employer must adhere. For example, there will be a stronger legal basis for knowing the vaccination status of an ICU nurse than a dump truck driver. Legal frameworks will be employment sector specific but the Labour Act (2021 Revision) has a general requirement under section 58 that “Every employer shall ensure so far as is reasonably practicable the health, safety and welfare at work of that person’s employees.” This may provide a legal basis for processing, however, an argument exists that the interpretation of the words “necessary” and “reasonably practicable” are open to distinction.

**Q: Is the collection of vaccination data a reasonably practicable measure and, if so, is the collection of the vaccination data then necessary as required by the DPA?**

A: The answer to this question will vary from employer to employer as well as between occupations. However, before asking this question the organization should first consider less privacy intrusive means

of achieving the same goal. For example, can the risk to employees be sufficiently reduced through mandatory mask requirements, social distancing and hand hygiene? Can employees work from home or alternate between home and the workplace so not all employees are in the workplace at once? Is a blanket policy necessary or is a more strategic approach just as effective but less privacy intrusive? There is no “one size fits all” solution. If in doubt, you should seek legal advice.

**Q: What are the possible repercussions to my organization if I collect vaccination data in contravention of the DPA?**

A: If the Ombudsman receives a complaint, or initiates their own investigation, and finds that the business is not in compliance with the DPA, they can issue an Enforcement Order which may require the cessation of processing and that the data be destroyed. Non-compliance with an Enforcement Order is an offence and the business and/or director(s) could face a fine of up to \$100,000KYD or imprisonment for up to five years, or both, as a result of court proceedings. Enforcement Orders are routinely published on the Ombudsman’s website so this type of enforce-

ment action also has a high likelihood of becoming public knowledge.

Additionally, if there has been a “serious contravention” of the DPA and “the contravention was of a kind likely to cause substantial damage or substantial distress” the Ombudsman may levy a monetary penalty of up to \$250,000KYD.

Under section 13 of the DPA an individual who has suffered damage as a result of a contravention of the law also has a cause of action for compensation against the organization. It should be noted that courts in the European Union have now recognized that damages include mental distress.

## Conclusion

Vaccination status and data protection laws worldwide are a rapidly evolving area of jurisprudence. Some governments are taking legislative measures to mandate vaccinations in an attempt to provide a degree of certainty and it is only in the event of a judicial challenge will more “comprehensive” legal guidance be available.

As we navigate through this COVID-19 era, HSM strongly encourages people to reach out to their legal advisors to assess whether or not they are within their legal rights.

## Census Will Follow COVID Quarantine Protocols

The census organising team has said field workers will observe COVID-19 quarantine protocols when Census 2021 starts 10 October 2021.

Some 400 Census enumerators, who will start visiting all households in the Cayman Islands from the next day (11 October 2021), have been trained to strictly follow protocols around places of quarantine during the Cayman Islands population and housing data count.

The Economics and Statistics Office's Census Team, which is tasked with conducting Census 2021, said enumerators will avoid any contact with persons in quarantine.

The team said, starting Sunday, 26 September, Travel Cayman will begin distributing Census Protocol COVID-19 Quarantine Information Cards to households in quarantine and all incoming travellers.

Explaining further, ESO Director Mr. Adolphus Laidlow said if a resident is in quarantine, the resident will show this Quarantine Protocol card given to them by the Travel Cayman Team to the mask-wearing enumerator visiting their household, who will not attempt to conduct a census interview.

Enumerators have been trained to knock on the door of a household, then step back six feet from the door before introducing themselves.

All enumerators will wear distinctive Census shirts, carry Census bags and IDs, and use their Census tablets to record the interview information. Households are

not required to touch any of the census materials during the interview.

A resident who is in COVID-19 quarantine will show the card to the enumerator.

Upon seeing the card, the enumerator will leave the premises, thereby bypassing that household interview. No attempt will be made to conduct a face-to-face Census 2021 interview with that household at that time, the Director reiterated.

However, all in quarantine will be enumerated either by phone or in person at a later date suitable to both, after their quarantine is complete.

Residents in possession of the Census 2021 Quarantine Information Cards will be required to follow the information contained in the card to ensure they are enumerated. This will enable them to call, or WhatsApp text, the ESO hotline provided on the card to arrange a future telephone interview. Alternatively, they can set up an appointment date for an in-person interview by an enumerator upon completion of their quarantine.

Enumerators will wear masks and carry hand sanitisers to disinfect their hands before visiting each household, the Director emphasised.

# The UWI Open Campus and CCLEC Collaborate on Capacity Building Training



## World Tourism Day Message 2021



## Cuba brings forward re-opening plans

The Cuban government is permitting areas with lower number of COVID-19 cases to open shopping centres and beaches.

The government has been planning to ease the restrictions to prepare for the high tourist season. This restriction uplift is beneficial for overcoming the terrible financial crisis.

The government is allowing more flights to the country, and they will be accepting COVID-19 vaccination certificates and PCR test reports from November.

Health officials said in the past month, the high numbers of COVID-19 cases have been lowering in recent weeks. The officials claimed that they had vaccinated 90 percent of the island's population which is the reason for a decrease in covid cases.

At the starting of the vaccination campaign in Havana, they had vaccinated about 86.5 percent of the 2.2 million living in that area.

The government had listed 533 businesses on the island that could open. This list includes 315 restaurants. To date, only deliveries were open and allowed.

## Grenada targets high-end real estate

Grenada's natural beauty and lack of mass tourism is fuelling the high-end real estate which is proving to be its most important selling points. There are almost no cookie-cutter resorts, few multinational businesses and—most crucially—for the majority of the pandemic, very little COVID-19 outbreaks.

Indeed, since the pandemic began Grenada—like other members of the Commonwealth—has taken an extreme “no COVID-19” approach to the crisis. That has meant strict testing for travellers before departure, a second test upon arrival, and mandatory in-resort quarantine until those second results are revealed. Full vaccination is also a must.

Grenada's strict protocols has been a boost to its luxury real estate potential. And a large part of this is due to Silver-

sands, a 43-room resort that opened in 2018 on a prime slice of Grand Anse Beach—Grenada's finest sandy stretch and one of the best beaches in the Caribbean.

Silversands' rooms are spread over a pair of three-story wings and feature clean lines, subtle patterns, and constant Caribbean views.

## Maroons protest at bauxite mining

Jamaica's Maroon community is defying the increase of bauxite mining on its land.

Decades of bauxite mining have taken a toll on Jamaica's land, and with the primary reserves depleted, the government wants to move mining operations for the major export ore into one of the most ecologically sensitive parts of the island - Cockpit Country. Residents are furious.

Cockpit Country is the ancestral home of the Maroons, the descendants of indigenous people and formerly enslaved Africans who joined together to fight British colonisers. They've held onto their claims to the land ever since. The lush area is home to Jamaica's largest remaining rainforest, endemic species found nowhere else on the

island or in the world, and 40 percent of Jamaica's fresh drinking water.

Bauxite ore is essential to making aluminium, and mining it causes a range of environmental issues. The mining itself strips the soil, making land impossible to farm. Residents who live near aluminium refineries are plagued by red dust, a chemical-filled by product of the refining process that contaminates homes and water supplies, including local rivers.

But with the ore's importance to Jamaica's economy, the government is pushing on with the mining and has even partnered with foreign companies to exploit reserves. But the Maroons are resisting mining on their land.

## T&T film festival was all online

The week-long Trinidad and Tobago Film Festival finished on Tuesday and enthusiasts enjoyed a better online experience.

It was run by the non-profit filmmakers organisation Filmmakers Collaborative of TT (Filmco) from Sept. 22-28, and it was the second year the event was completely online owing to the pandemic.

Mariel Brown, Filmco/TTFI interim executive director, said last year the organisation was in reaction mode, trying to find solutions that could work to engage audiences and show regional films. She recalled that, up to two weeks before the festival, the organisers were hoping, to no avail, some in-person events could be held. But this year it was staged completely online, which made the planning more structured, she said.

And, with TTFI's new online platform, Eventive, customers easily found, watched and bought the films they wanted.

Brown said that audiences grew “more accustomed to the idea of online events, and more comfortable with attending online events. Because we see it as our present, but we also see it as part of our future.”


## Montserrat lifts virus protocols

Montserrat, which since April has only allowed in a handful of wealthy tourists in a bid to keep Covid cases low, is finally opening up to all.

Montserrat opened its borders in April - but only to the wealthiest holiday-makers who reportedly had to earn over \$70,000 were allowed in. They also had to stay for a minimum of two months. The New York Times reports just 21 people have visited the island in recent months.

The measure was to keep Covid at bay while maintaining some tourism. There have been only 33 cases and one Covid-related death on the island. But just a quarter of the 5,000 inhabitants are vaccinated.

The island's entry rules are about to change - and from Oct. 1 all vaccinated tourists will be welcomed on Montserrat.

Visitors will not have to stay for two months, either. The island, which is a British territory, is on the green travel list for UK holidaymakers.

But Montserrat is also currently in its hurricane season, which runs from June to November.

Krystal Bajkor is one of the few people who have visited the island in recent months. She told the New York Times that despite all the craziness, “there's nothing that can kill you here except the volcano.”
