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CHANGE TO QUARANTINE PERIOD AS CASES INCREASE

An urgent appeal has been made for residents to strictly adhere to the COVID-19 protocols as the number of community cases continues to increase.

At the same time adjustments have been made to the quarantine period with Public Health announcing an immediate reduction in the isolation period for primary contacts of a positive COVID-19 case to 10 days.

This is based on everyone in the same household being fully vaccinated at least 14 days prior to the contact with a vaccine that is on the Chief Medical Officer's approved list.

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Covid-19 keeps old friends apart

Cayman's last surviving Justice of the Peace, Captain Owen Farrington, is currently unable to meet with his long-time friend, Mr Earl Ebanks, due to Covid-19 worries, but says he talks with his friend frequently.

The gentleman met when Captain Farrington took Mr Earl Ebanks (who he described as a "poor, young boy") on board with him when he went to sea, helping him to become trained and go on to be an able seaman.

Retiring from the sea, Mr Earl started painting, and later was able to build a home and some small rental units. He never forgot the goodness of Captain Farrington, and their friendship continues until today.

The photograph was taken when Captain Farrington received an award from Her Majesty The Queen, having been nominated by widowed members of Cayman Islands Seafarers Association. The photograph is dedicated to Mr Earl, Captain Farrington said.

As well as being one of the last JPs of the Cayman Islands, Captain Farrington is the last of the crew of the M V Addie H, the vessel on board which he extinguished a fire that broke out in the engine room, while the ship carried its cargo of dynamite and detonators. He is also the last of the crew of the M V Jemsons of which he was captain, when he rescued 17 shark fishermen who were out of food and water, and took them to Grand Cayman. In the photograph the gentleman to the left is Mr Malachi Anglin who is the last of those shark fishermen.

Usually, at least in non-covid times, FirstCaribbean's 5K Walk for a Cure attracts well over a thousand. This time, there were only a hundred or less, because the official walk was cancelled by the organizers, because of the covid-in-the-community scare, amid fears that such a big gathering is bound to pass it on. But people still came. There were only handfuls of them, small groups here and there, and they were for the most-part, pretty careful to social-distance. Because it was unofficial, here was no great big official "start," they just got going when they wanted to, from the West Bay Public Beach southwards down west bay road, and then turning around at blue Cilantro restaurant, and back up again. Some ran it, but the majority walked the 5K distance. There were quite a lot of children and parents taking part, and it was nice and relaxed and a lot of fun.

Omar Chambers, cofounder of Link International accountancy firm was one of the ones who had decided he wanted to go ahead, despite the cancellation, and was there with members of his group. "We do this every year in support of the Cancer Society," he said. "The organizers just said whoever wants to take part can still take part, and they will post pictures on social media. We went ahead anyway just to show our support."

"We are supporters of any event that looks forward to fighting the cause of cancer, because it's prevalent here in Cayman and a lot of people are dying from it so we hope that one day this will contribute to the overall cure. That is the reason why we are doing this."

Teacher Dorothy Chambers was proud that two groups of her students, one from UCCI and the other from John Gray, had come out to walk for a cure. "We want to make sure that we contribute - its our social responsibility to give back. A cure for cancer, it's a prayer, it's a dream and anything we can do to contribute to that becoming a reality, we want to be a part of it."

One of the people in her group, John Gray Student Marisa Dunbar, 15, wanted to walk for a cure. "I did it because I feel that as part of the community it is very important to give back," she said, while UCCI student Lacieanne Nelson said, "the reason I want to do this is it's a social responsibility to help the persons that have cancer to know that we care about others around the world, we want them to get well and we will do whatever small part we can to ensure that we help out in that aspect."

A mother, father and two young ones, one a baby in a stroller and the other a young boy, were walking too, and enjoying it, "Its for cancer awareness isn't it?" said Tanya Salvaterra. "Most people in the world know somebody who has cancer."

Parliament divided over new vaccine Bills

The Customs and Border Control Amendment Bill was the first of three major Bills proposed on Monday at a special sitting of Parliament by the Finance Minister and Deputy Premier Chris Saunders, an intensely debated Bill that drew heated discussion from both the Government and the Opposition.

Minister Saunders introduced the second reading of the Bill saying that, while they listened to all advice given them, the Government had questioned all information before they wrote the Bills.

Having come to the conclusion that 80% of the entire population ought to be vaccinated before moving forward with opening, Minister Saunders said that their approach was to ensure that all the hard work undertaken to convince people to take the vaccine wasn't in vain.

"They are now telling us that we should fly the gates open and let everyone in, whether vaccinated or unvaccinated," he said.

If this was the case, the Minister worried that, if overseas workers were not vaccinated, the numbers of people vaccinated would be watered down and thereby the country would not have the immunity it needed to weather Covid.

"That is highly irresponsible and not something that this Government or the vast majority of the Caymanian people can support," he said. "As the population increases, the local vaccination rate would get lower and this is not something we can support."

While the Bill requires certain sectors of people to be vaccinated before being able to reside in Cayman, the Government had tweaked the Bill from its original format. The Minister said that it was decided to remove the requirement to get vaccinated for dependents of Caymanians seeking permission to reside in Cayman and children of Caymanians seeking to enter who would be entitled to become Caymanian once they have lived in the Islands for one year.

Opposition sees problems ahead

Opposition Leader Roy McTaggart said that the Government would face a series of "thorny issues" that might see legal challenges should the Bill pass, one being that people are asked to prove they don't have a variety of communicable diseases (including Covid-19) before they can live and work in Cayman.

"Being vaccinated is no indication that one does not suffer from this communicable disease. Only a suitable test for the presence of the virus before arriving and again after an appropriate quarantine period provides sufficient satisfaction that the person is not infected with the virus and therefore not able to transmit it," he stated.

Mandating vaccines was no panacea, he said.

Some of the categories of people allowed in only when vaccinated was also an issue, Mr. McTaggart said, including students, and children and dependents of Caymanians.

The potential impact on an unvaccinated child or dependent of a Caymanian was a thorny issue that the Government should have considered when taking into consideration the right to family life under the Constitution. There maybe other Constitutional issues that might come into play, he added.

"This Bill clearly ventures far beyond work permit holders," he said, stating that the Bills had received scant if any public consultation.

Former Premier and Member of the Opposition Alden McLaughlin felt that the Bill would unfairly target one particular segment of the Cayman population who had been more reticent to take the vaccine, the Jamaican community. While stressing that he and other members of the Opposition were pro-vaccine, he felt it was the individual's right to decide on whether to take the vaccine.

"It is not for the Government to do, however we'll meaning they are and however smart they think they are," he said.

Government not scared of legal challenges

The debate then continued on the Immigration Transition Amendment Bill. Speaking to the Opposition's worry that such Bills would be challenged in the Courts, Attorney General Sam Bulging said that there was no shortage of legal opinion on the proposed laws but that those which had been aired were "selective".

There was nothing in the proposed legislation that actually mandated people to take the vaccine, rather, if people wanted to enjoy certain rights such as living and working in the Cayman Islands, they would be subject to the requirement to take the vaccine.

"Although the words "mandatory vaccination" have been banded about in a kind of loose sense, there's really no mandatory requirement in this legislation," the

Ag stated. "All it says is that if you want to enjoy certain privileges, under the immigration law - work permit or renewal of a work permit - one of the conditions that you have to meet is to demonstrate that you've been vaccinated."

Opposition member Joey Hew said it was a "fairytale" for Caymanians to think that they would be protected from Covid-19 if the Government mandated that all ex-pats be vaccinated.

"The more I listen tonight, the more I feel that this Bill will not provide the outcome the Government is seeking," Mr. Hew said. "The debate, the emphasis today took us far away from how do we get as many Caymanians vaccinated and how do we protect our Caymanian people and most importantly when we open our borders how do we protect and secure our health services authority."

Mr. Hew said to mandate only work permit holders be vaccinated gave the Caymanian community "a false sense of security". The debate continues Tuesday.

should have to be vaccinated; however he felt that the entire civil service, especially frontline workers, should be vaccinated, ex-pat or Caymanian.

Mr Manderson conceded that not enough Caymanian frontline workers who interacted with the public were vaccinated, putting themselves, their families and the public at serious risk.

The fact that some people in frontline agencies such as Customs and Border Control and Travel Cayman who deal with Covid positive people were not vaccinated was of concern to the Deputy Governor. The vaccination numbers were low, he said.

"One of my greatest fears from March last year...and today, knowing that a large number of public servants are dealing with Covid positive persons, get sick and God forbid die," he stated. "But I believe if

we don't see a change in persons' attitude we can see that happen."

Mr Manderson begged all civil servants to get vaccinated.

"I implore, encourage, beg civil servants, especially those on the frontline to do the right thing and get vaccinated," he stated.

He went on to say: "I think the civil service should lead in this area. Civil servants, except those who cannot be vaccinated due to medical grounds, should be 100% vaccinated. Seventy percent is not good enough. We strive for 100% in everything else we do. It's life-saving."

‘THE PANEL’ PROGRAMME PROPOSES ‘REOPENING CZAR’

A call has been made for the Cayman Islands Government (CIG) to appoint a ‘re-opening czar’ to lead and coordinate the next phase of the jurisdiction’s unlocking of the economy from COVID-19 restrictions.

The suggestion came in the first edition of the new Caymanian Times weekly podcast, The Panel.

Panellists Dr Roy Bodden and Mario E Ebanks agreed that the situation now warrants a key person to coordinate the process given the scale and significance of what’s at stake for Cayman.

With the important linkages between kickstarting the economy while safeguarding public health, there is mounting speculation that the government could very well be reviewing its decision to delay the previously announced October 14th reopening.

The schedule has been ‘paused’ at Phase Three (soft reopening with limited tourism) of the five-stage plan due to an outbreak of the first community-spread COVID-19 cases in Cayman since the pandemic started.

Phase Four was due to start on October 14th allowing for the reintroduction of stay-over tourism. Cruise tourism is still off the cards possibly until early next year.

Responding to a question from host Ralph Lewis, panellists Roy Bodden and Mario E Ebanks suggested that the leadership strategy on the reopening needs rethinking.

“I don’t think anything was wrong with the ‘pause’. What I think is weak is our leadership strategy,” was the assessment by Roy Bodden.

“I think what we need and what we are looking for, and I hope it’s not too late, is for someone now to come forward from the government to say, here is where I think we should go based upon the science.”


“Why, why isn’t there an assistant to (Chief Medical Officer) Dr John Lee, so that if he is missing, we could have someone filling in?” he wondered.

As posited by Dr Bodden public confidence in a reopening plan is critical.

“What you don’t want to lose at this point is the confidence. You don’t want to let the populace believe that you were just floundering and you’re putting out fires, so when you appear on the national scene or hold a press conference is because of

your track record situation. You want to let them leave them with the impression that you are in full control that you know where you’re going and that there is a plan. And for me, that’s a disappointment now. Come January, we don’t have a timetable, we don’t have a plan, so we pause? And what is it, a forever pause?” he asked.

The idea of a key person or agency coordinating all facets of the reopening is shared by co-panellist Mario E Ebanks.

“We need to have to understand who is in charge, what’s the structure, do they have a project team, do they have a project manager so that if something happens, they activate this plan. This is the war. You cannot fight a war by panicking.”

“Whether it’s Dr Lee or whoever we call upon, we need to know who is in charge. We don’t need to have everybody involved because you get nothing done, but you got to have a structure in place.”

Mr Ebanks also felt the current ‘pause’ itself at Phase Three would have a detrimental effect on the economy, especially the tourism sector and the expectations for the upcoming peak season.

“I agree with the tourism industry. What happened in this case airfare reservations are cancelled, all the bookings are cancelled, and a lot of things are happening which is bad for the economy.”

He felt that the government might have overreacted in its decision to pause the reopening.

“By that time, I guess, the government didn’t know how bad this thing was (referring to the community cases) and without raking a little longer to assess it, the cancellations started. So, the traditional

Christmas season for tourism now is pretty much dead,” he determined.

However, there was an appreciation for the predicament the government is in with its plans thrown off-kilter by the community outbreak which continues to spread although only one hospitalisation has been reported and no other instances of serious illness reported.

“Had we gone ahead on 14th of October and liberalised the opening we would have been a bit total chaos. So, this was almost like a dry run. So, in a way that gave us a chance to say well wait a minute, we have been complacent, we have been flatfooted for the last year.”

It was agreed that the restrictions and border closures over the past year and a half have created an opportunity to “reset” as both panellists agreed.

Prompted by a question from host Ralph Lewis, it was felt that the period of the downturn hadn’t been utilised to the best advantage to retrain and re-skill Caymanian tourism workers. It was also felt that an opportunity has been missed to develop subsectors and cottage industries from the main tourism sector.

Making the case for Cayman to ‘think outside the box’ Roy Bodden said: “I have said that the hospitality industry offers an incredible opportunity for young Caymanians to take advantage of. Why for example, are we not encouraging micro industries with spin-offs for the tourist industry can tap into cottage industries? Why are we not training artisans? Why are we not encouraging people in the whole cottage industry is making things like jams, jellies, crafts, for example?”

With attention now keenly focused on an expected adjustment to the reopening plan, both panellists emphasised the importance of the ongoing vaccination campaign and strongly condemned misinformation and conspiracy theories but upheld freedom of choice and speech.

It was considered that some elements of vaccine mandates were in the broad community interest and underpinned by existing legislation.

Amendments to the relevant laws regarding vaccines were also down for debate in Parliament this week linked to the reopening plans.

“Please follow the guidance from Public Health about your release from isolation,” urges Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee, who also explained that “if unvaccinated people, including children, are part of your household then you will need to continue to observe 14 days of isolation until being released following Public Health instruction.”

He said this does not affect households where there is a positive case. These households must follow the guidance from Public Health staff.

According to the outgoing CMO, as Cayman moves forward with its reopening plans, the isolation period will be under constant review.

With the recent outbreak of community cases, high volume testing is being carried out with 2,255 PCR tests processed last weekend alone and a further 1,232 PCR done on Tuesday.

Most of those tests were mainly of students and teachers associated with Prospect Primary School, Triple C School, Cayman Academy, John Grey High School, Clifton Hunter High School and two other pre-schools.

That alone showed up 38 incidents of community spread of the virus out of the 52 positive cases. The other 14 from that batch were from people exiting quarantine after travel.

Subsequent tests on the following days continued to show positive community-spread cases especially linked to

schools, with 10 identified among members of the community, mostly staff and students from Clifton Hunter High School and additionally from First Baptist Christian School.

According to Dr Lee, “In view of the fact that infection is fairly widespread, I wish to remind people to please take good care of themselves and their community members by wearing masks in indoor places, keeping distanced, using appropriate cough and sneeze etiquette and practising appropriate hand hygiene.

He also said: “Those who are clinically vulnerable and the elderly need special attention to this for their own part and those who interact with them. Please follow Public Health’s guidance if you are asked to isolate; this is vital to reduce and

slow the spread of infection through our community.”

In a video message in which he stressed the gravity of the situation, the CMO stated that he was “not really able to continue to give precise locations for all of these positive cases as they’re becoming quite widespread.”

Dr Lee also addressed the issue of positive cases being uncovered as people leave quarantine.

“We know, time and time again that people at the end of an isolation period can test positive, which is why it’s so important to stay isolated for the entire period, and not to breach. What we’re attempting to do by these isolations, is to slow the spread of COVID throughout the community so that our hospitals are never overwhelmed, we can always cope.”

Covid vaccine Bills passed by Government

After two days of debate at a special meeting of Parliament, the Government finally saw its two hotly discussed Bills be approved, with some amendments to both, mandating vaccinations for Covid-19 for certain sections of the ex-patriot community. The two Bills, the Customs and Border Control Amendment Bill and the Immigration Transition Amendment Bill, saw MPs from both side of Parliament give their views on the idea of mandating vaccinations for work permit holders and permanent residents throughout Monday and Tuesday, with the Bills’ eventual passing on Tuesday evening.

Deputy Premier and Finance Minister Chris Saunders said that what the Government was trying to do was something no other country in the world had done, to open up borders safely but without going into lockdown. Cayman, he said, was

learning from the mistakes made by other countries.

Civil Service should be 100% vaccinated

Speaking at the special meeting of the Parliament on Tuesday, Deputy Governor Franz Manderson said he felt the civil service should follow the private sector with regard to mandated vaccinations. Mr Manderson felt that all new civil servants on work permits and those renewing work permits should have to be vaccinated, although Caymanians would be exempt; however he felt that the entire civil service, especially frontline workers, should be vaccinated, ex-pat or Caymanian.

Mr Manderson conceded that not enough Caymanian frontline workers who interacted with the public were vaccinated, putting themselves, their families and the public at serious risk.

The fact that some people in frontline agencies such as Customs and Border Control and Travel Cayman who deal with Covid positive people were not vaccinated was of concern to the Deputy Governor. The vaccination numbers were low, he said.

“One of my greatest fears from March last year...and today, knowing that a large number of public servants are dealing with Covid positive persons, get sick and God forbid die,” he stated. “But I believe if we don’t see a change in persons’ attitude we can see that happen.”

Mr Manderson begged all civil servants to get vaccinated.

“I implore, encourage, beg civil servants, especially those on the frontline to do the right thing and get vaccinated,” he stated.

He went on to say: “I think the civil service should lead in this area. Civil servants, except those who cannot be vaccinated due to medical grounds, should be 100% vaccinated. Seventy percent is not good enough. We strive for 100% in everything else we do. It’s life-saving.”

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LIFE STORY AND LEGACY OF REV. DR. LINDA DARNELL MCFIELD, PSY, D, CERT. HONS.



Rev. Dr. Linda McField, known affectionately by her family as “Darnell” and by friends and members of the community as “Mrs. Linda” was born on January 21, 1953 in Grand Cayman to her beloved mother, Murline Gaynell Dixon (nee Pearson), of East End and father, Arthur Ransford McLean, of North Side.

Mrs. Linda spent most of her formative years residing in East End with her mother and grandmother, the late Mrs. Florence Jervis, where she attended the East End Primary School. She later moved to Shedder Road in George Town in the early 1960’s with her mother and stepfather, the late Rayas Dixon, and her siblings, Ronnie, Marita, Robert, Jessica and Rodrick, where the family home still remains. She came from humble beginnings and attended the Secondary Modern School, where her favourite subject was Mathematics.

She was active in all types of sports, netball being her most favourite. Throughout her early teenage years she worked in various places, one of the earliest delivering meals to the prisoners at the George Town Police Station; this due to her being a very fast runner who was able to deliver the meals quickly.

Mrs. Linda was always ambitious and wanted to further her education. She enrolled in the Sylvia Gill Secretarial School and went on to achieve qualifications as a paralegal. Her first job, at the age of 15, was at Barclays Bank, after which she moved to Scotia Trust, where she work for over three years. She later worked with Casey Gill law firm for three years, then at Vampt Motors for over four years, where she became the first and only female in the Cayman Islands, at the time, to be certified as an Auto Parts Technician. Following that, she worked for the Fire Department for 10 years, and then at the Department of Education for almost 10 years, before settling in at Cayman Against Substance Abuse (CASA) for over 15 years, until her retirement.

She earned the recognition and respect of her colleagues at every place of employment. All those who came into contact with her admired her strong work ethic and her tenacity to share her opinion on her strong beliefs of fairness and equal treatment for all, regardless of age, gender, nationality, race or background.

Mrs. Linda met her husband, Henry (“Bunny”) McField, in 1968 and as their relationship blossomed she always said that she could feel the warmth of his smile in her heart and she knew then that they would share something special

that many people only dreamed of. He was her love, partner, best friend and confidant for life. Their first child, Delbra Natasha was born in January 1975, after which they dated for another four years until they were married in October 1978. Their second child and only son, Eric Estrada, was born in March 1979. Their third child, Sybil Samantha was born in July 1982.

She was also a devoted mother to her step-children, Sarah, Julie, Henry, Thorna and Carson and never hesitated to refer to them as her ‘children’. She made sure they were involved in family activities and celebrations with their father, Bunny, along with their siblings, Delbra, Erick and Samantha. In her heart, attitude and actions they were all members of one family.

Mrs. Linda attended Chapel Church of God under the spiritual guidance of Pastor Thesill and made the decision to serve the Lord and was baptized in late 1981. She believed that God had plans for her life and she was dedicated to serving Him in any way she could. She allowed her passion to serve others to become her guide for living a purpose-driven life and held many different roles in her church family for many years. She served as a Sunday School Teacher and Youth Leader; she sat on the Church Council and served in many other roles for almost two decades.

In all of her endeavors and travels, she walked side-by-side with her husband and rarely travelled or attended any function, locally or internationally, without him being present. She called him her American Express card, because she never went anywhere without him. They travelled to Israel, Australia, England, Nashville, TN to visit Graceland, Louisiana, Florida, Texas, Georgia, Canada and many other parts of the world.

She fondly spoke of their travels to Israel where they both were baptized in the Jordan River and renewed their wedding vows in Jerusalem.

She enjoyed participating in sports, however she has a passion and a strong love for netball. In 1968, Mrs. Linda, Ms. Lucille Seymour and the late Jean Pierre attempted to form a charity for the sport of netball. Despite being unsuccessful, they continued their efforts and in 1977 she was instrumental in the formation of the Netball Association, which became an official charity and was recognized as a competitive sport for young women. She was an advisor on the writing of the bi-law and regulations. Competitions in this sport led the Cayman Islands to compete in England and Australia. She was elated at the level of exposure the young ladies received from their travels and interactions with others and mostly the opportunities where she could mentor. Mrs. Linda not only believed that through sport one builds character, but also through education and the building of self-worth are we molded, and that was the key role she proudly played. In 2016, she once again was instrumental behind the scenes in assisting in registration of the Netball Association as a Not-for-Profit Organization.

In 1978, Mrs. Linda joined the Grand Cayman Business and Professional Women’s Club (BPW) and she stated that she believed in its mission, goals and objectives, in particular the vision statement which stated: “To achieve a just and equal status of women in all levels and areas of society where decisions are taken in true relationship with men, based on mutual respect, for a more balanced and peaceful world’. She strongly believed this organization could equip her to meet the needs of those who were socially excluded and those whom other organizations and service clubs may have excluded from membership. She embraced the opportunity to develop and enhance her mentoring skills to be able to help other women, girls, men and boys to believe in themselves, to hold up their heads and be able to maintain full time employment and become role model citizens in her beloved home, the Cayman Islands.

She was very much involved in some of the championing highlighted activities of the BPW, such as the establishing of the Family Resource Centre, the Crisis Centre, Office of Gender Affairs, as well as several local legislations protecting the rights and safety of vulnerable members of our society.

She joined the Special Constabulary when it was established by law on October 1, 1981, along with the late Capt. Theo Boddin, Tommie Hurlston, John Gunter, and Rex Crighton. The purpose of this Special Constabulary was formed in response to growing concerns of criminal behaviors and the police did not have the resources to increase patrols in concerned neighbourhoods. She was sworn in as the SC002, the second recruit to be sworn in under the Special Constabulary (SC). Mrs. Linda, along with her colleagues, were trained in first aid and the use of handcuffs and batons. She was last of this initial group to serve up to April 2021, when she retired due to her ill health.

During the period of 1986 to 1994, she served as a Cayman Against Substance Abuse Volunteer in Prevention (CASA VIP). CASA is a Not-for-Profit grassroots organization that provides free Substance Abuse Prevention Training. In 1995, she retired from the Civil Service and took up full time employment as CASA’s Executive Director / Counselor. She delivered training to the general public, including schools, churches and the prison.

She was dedicated to the ethos and community-based services values associated with CASA and its programmes, and did not take a sick day from delivery services to all of the clientele of CASA for 15 years, until a car accident on May 30, 2010 impacted her ability to continue with full time employment.

Along with her other areas of interest, some of her commitment to community-based initiatives included, but were not limited to, the establishment of the Depart-

ment of Children & Family Services National Parenting Programme to promote responsible parenting; Prison Fellowship; Silent Witness March with BPW, and so many others. In addition, she chaperoned students on a College Tour, and numerous Youth Conferences from Rhode Island to Clearmont, California.

Mrs. Linda had many opportunities to minister to the youth who were incarcerated in Eagle House and Fairbanks, or those who were placed in care at the Frances Bodden Girls Home and the Bonaventure Boys Home. Over the years, she, along with her husband, assisted family and friends by fostering some 10 teenaged girls at various times in their home, for up to one year each.

She always shared that she did not want to live an effective life but to live in the dynamic power of the Holy Spirit. She did not want to be a spiritual underachiever and she wanted her life to be defined by her Lord and Savior. Her heart desired to grow in her faith, so that she could become a whole, properly functioning, contributing, productive child of God whose will was manifested in her life.

With this faith and purpose, for over 40 years, she dedicated her life to serving children and was appointed Guardian Ad Litem by the Courts as a child advocate. In collaboration with Acts of Random Kindness (ARK), every Christmas she assisted with providing food, vouchers and gifts for hundreds of families throughout the island, to ensure the children in those families would have a truly happy Christmas.

Mrs. Linda was instrumental in the school-based and individual programme: Kids Helping Kids for Kid's Sake! "Enough Stuff". The Mission of this programme was to help children recognize when they had enough and encouraged them to share their good fortune with those less fortunate than themselves and to change the purchasing habit of the next generation.

Her academic qualifications included a Doctorate in Psychology, Master of Science Degree (Major: Counseling Psychology) and a Bachelor of Theology (Major: Counseling), and she also studied two years at the Cayman Islands Law School.

Some of her lifetime achievement awards included an Ordained Reverend; Pioneer Award for Sports (Netball); Queen Police Medal; Cert. Honors; Certified Protocol and Procedures Officer; Certified Proctor for Walden University; Certified Master Facilitator for Parent Resources Institute on Drug Information; Certified Master Facilitator for Too Good for Drugs and Violence; and Child Month Award.

Although she was admired for her strong contribution to the people of these islands and represented the Cayman Islands with dignity and respect, she would often share that her greatest accomplishments in her life was being a wife, mother and grandmother to her children and being blessed to know her first great grandson.

She was so grateful for the blessings she received in her life and was humbled in accepting the many opportunities she was able to embrace in her lifetime through serving others and allowing God to lead the footsteps of her path.

She loved laughter and never failed to share a good joke every so often. She truly enjoyed celebrating with her family and close friends, whether it was at a birthday party, festivities at her home, spending Easter weekends on the public beaches, or attending various family activities throughout the islands.

Census 2021 Looking for 40 More Enumerators

The Economics and Statistics Office is looking for 40 Census enumerators to work on Grand Cayman.

Enumerators will go door to door and collect data for the official Census 2021, which kicks off on 10 October and continues for two months.


The Census Team is seeking quick learners who preferably have survey-conducting and computer-related experience. The individuals must be Caymanians or Permanent Residents with the right to work or government employees on contracts.

Additionally, all applicants must be available for training later this week, including this weekend. They should be prepared to be assigned for census work anywhere on Grand Cayman.

Equally importantly, the applicants must have clean police records, health insurance, access to a properly licensed motor vehicle, a valid driver's licence and be properly insured to legally drive.

Applicants who meet these criteria and wish to work as enumerators for the next six to eight weeks can download the official application forms from either www.eso.ky or www.census2021.ky and send in the completed forms as soon as possible since time is of the essence.

The form seeks full contact details in order that applicants can be contacted quickly to undergo and complete training before field work begins.

Sister Islands air travel still easy for fully vaccinated passengers

In response to customer queries, Cayman Airways is reminding those passengers who are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and not displaying any respiratory or other symptoms of the virus, that they are able to travel freely domestically between Grand Cayman and the Sister Islands.

Per the current Regulations, which came into effect on September 21, 2021, air passengers who have completed an approved vaccine course at least 14 days prior to travel, just have to present their vaccination card to an agent at the time of check-in on Grand Cayman for their flight to the Sister Islands, so long as they're not showing any respiratory symptoms or symptoms of the virus.

Passengers who do not meet this vaccination requirement can still travel from Grand Cayman to the Sister Islands once they provide a negative PCR test result issued no more than 48 hours prior to their flight, and are not showing any respiratory symptoms or symptoms of the virus. This requirement applies to any person aged five and older.

Unvaccinated persons travelling from the Sister Islands to Grand Cayman for short periods of time must contact Faith Hospital in Cayman Brac for guidance.

Additionally, Cayman Airways is reminding its international passengers that, under the new Regulations for international flights to the Cayman Islands, children aged five and older are now required to have a negative PCR test no more than 72 hours prior to departure.

Passengers are also reminded that they are responsible for researching and securing the necessary documents required for entry into any country.

Online patient portal registration now available

Persons may now register online for the MyHSA Patient Portal at www.hsa.ky. The Portal is a convenient way to access medical records, send messages to physicians and access digital vaccination records.

This new online option will allow persons who received their COVID-19 vaccine in the Cayman Islands, and are currently overseas to gain access to their digital vaccination record. With over 53,000 (97%) of digital vaccine records now uploaded to the patient portal, the HSA wants to ensure everyone has remote, secure access to their records.

Online sign-up only takes a couple minutes and requires a government issued photo ID showing date of birth, photo of self and a valid email address.

After the application is approved, persons will receive an email from MyHSA to activate their patient portal account.

Anyone 16 years and older can register themselves for full access to the patient portal. Parents and guardians can sign up children 15 years of age and under via a child proxy application.

Portal sign-up in the community is ongoing and the latest schedule is available at <https://www.hsa.ky/our-services/patient-portal-info/>.

A dedicated registration officer will remain at the Cayman Islands Hospital atrium Monday - Friday 8:30am - 5pm. Sign-up is also still available at the registration desks at any HSA hospital and at District Health Centres.

Persons are required to wear their own facemask at all sign-up locations.

Little Havana is open from 12 pm till closing.





Pacman fights in parliament now

When Manny Pacquiao visited Grand Cayman a few years ago to attend a local boxing show, he was feted everywhere, especially by the sizeable Filipino community. Some superstars are aloof and prickly with adoring fans. Not Pacman. He truly is a man of the people.

No amount of selfies, hugs, handshakes and autographs were too much, which is why his sporting legacy, now that he's retired, will not just be one of the most decorated but one of the most loved and respected too.

Pacquiao announced on social media last week that at 42 he's hanging up his gloves for good, retiring as the only eight-division champion in boxing history and as one of the greatest boxers ever. His 62-8-2 record includes 39 knockouts, a remarkable feat for a 26-year veteran who fought at elite level right to the end, two months ago, losing on points to Yordenis Ugas.

Senator Pacquiao now focuses on his political career to run for president. While he has received most of his acclaim in the United States for boxing, he's been in the political arena in the Philippines since 2007, first as a house representative, then as a successful senator before targeting the top job.

Through his humane and selfless policies, Pacquiao is revered in the Philippines because so many can relate to his rise from poverty to ring stardom. Millions of his hard-earned earnings have gone to Filipino poor including build-

ing houses for the homeless and numerous programmes to feed, employ and clothe the underclass and to reduce its soaring crime rate. He's aware that post-covid times the challenges will be even tougher.

Pacquiao may be in opposition at next year's elections with President Rodrigo Duterte who has been a controversial figure worldwide due in large part to his War on Drugs, which, according to the Human Rights Watch, has led to the deaths of tens of thousands of Filipinos. Although Duterte cannot officially run for a third term, he may run for vice-president or stand down completely to allow his daughter Sara Duterte-Carpio to shoot for the presidential berth. Either way, the divisive leader will still heavily influence Philippines politics.

Despite his popularity, Pacquiao has drawn criticism for his opposition to same-sex marriage and his support of the death penalty. During his first year as a senator, he said that "if you have male-on-male, female-on-female (relationships), then people are worse than animals." He also recorded the worst attendance from

2018 to 2019 as senator which is understandable considering his boxing and commercial commitments.

As Pacquiao moved toward a potential run for president, he was named acting president of the PDP-Laban in December 2020, but voted out as the leader in July after he began to challenge Duterte on China and on fighting corruption, according to Reuters. Nevertheless, his popularity and achievements so far makes him a strong candidate to take the country forward.

Gayle storms back at 42

Chris Gayle was in such poor form a couple of years ago that his West Indies career looked definitely over, yet at 42 the 'Universal Boss' is back in the spotlight and looking forward to the T20 World Cup.

Gayle has left his Indian Premier League stint with Punjab Kings to "mentally recharge and refresh" ahead of West Indies' T20 World Cup campaign.

The veteran Jamaican put the decision down to bubble fatigue, having played under similar restrictions during the Caribbean Premier League while with St Kitts and Nevis Patriots.

Gayle said: "Over the last few months, I have been a part of the CWI bubble, CPL bubble followed by the IPL bubble, and I wish to mentally recharge and refresh myself. I want to refocus on helping the West Indies in the T20 World Cup and would like to take a break in

for giving me the time off." West Indies face England in their opening match of the T20 World Cup, in Dubai on Oct. 23. Windies aim to become three-time champions having won the most recent edition in 2016 as well the 2012 tournament.

Irving leads the anti-vax minority

Brooklyn Nets star Kyrie Irving, an NBA champion and seven-time All-Star, has become the most vocal of a minority of stars opposing the COVID-19 vaccine which is causing controversy in the sport.

The All-Star guard, who serves as vice-president of the players' union that blocked the NBA's effort to impose a vaccine mandate, has sparked backlash from health experts and basketball legends by refusing to get vaccinated.

It's a stance that could cost Irving games and money, since New York City requires proof of vaccination to attend large indoor events. That rule would include players performing before fans at Brooklyn's Barclays Center.

The NBA confirmed that salaries will be withheld from players who do not play because their unvaccinated status does not allow them to do so under local protocols. That could cost Irving half his \$34 million salary for Brooklyn's home games alone.

It could also cost the Nets, the betting favourites to win the NBA title this year, a title.

Yet Irving, an NBA icon known for irreverent views, is not backing down. "Obviously I'm not able to be present there today," Irving told reporters on Zoom during the Nets' media day, which he was unable to attend due to vaccine rules. "But that doesn't mean I'm putting any limits in the future on my being able to join the team."

New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio confirmed that Irving won't get special treatment.

Joshua must find higher gear

Anthony Joshua has banked tens of millions of dollars and at 31 could retire and live comfortably for ever. Yet the former world heavyweight champ, still bruised and battered after his humbling points loss last week to Oleksandr Usyk, immediately demanded the rematch clause was activated.

Usyk picked AJ apart in London before his adoring fans and a rematch looks likely to go the same way once he's fully recovered from a broken eye socket. Yet the gutsy British-Nigerian wants to face the 34-year-old Ukrainian in the new year to redeem himself.

Joshua's promoter Eddie Hearn revealed that he seriously annoyed his fighter by asking

him whether he's certain that he wants to rematch next.

Although AJ was out boxed and battered, his first words after the final bell to Usyk was: "We're gonna go again? Now I know how to beat you!" Joshua had moments of success throughout, but could not maintain.

Usyk had him out on his feet in the final round, with the bell saving AJ from being knocked out as he forfeited his WBA, IBF and WBO heavyweight titles in the process.

The most telling words heard from Usyk after were: "Anthony, I watch you Baku."

This is a reference to the 2011 Amateur World Championships


in Baku, Azerbaijan, where Usyk took gold at heavyweight and AJ won silver at super-heavyweight. Obviously, Usyk had spotted the novice Londoner's ability back then and tracked his progress since.

To win next time, Joshua will have to use his height, strength and reach advantages better, be more agile and connect with his big shots more often. Unlikely, but not impossible.

The loss put paid for the time being to a \$500m megafight for Joshua against Tyson Fury who has his trilogy fight with Deontay Wilder in Las Vegas on Saturday. Wilder is convinced he can conquer the Brit this time although
