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'REOPEN CAYMAN' SETS NOVEMBER 22nd DATE



A consortium of private sector interests lobbying under the banner of Reopen Cayman has set November 22nd as a target date for reopening the borders.

Making their case that Cayman is ready to reopen, the group which includes many high-profile business representatives is inviting the public to support their call for a November 22nd reopening by 'pledging' their support - seen as a form of petitioning.

"While we recognise that "ready" will look and feel different to everyone, we're asking you to take this action today and have your voice heard. Pledge that you feel ready for the Cayman Islands to safely reopen," the Reopen Cayman states on its website.

Public Health Offers COVID-19 Safety Guidance for Mid-term Break Activities

Following the advice of the Department of Education Services to the public that mid-term break has been brought forward for government public schools, Public Health officials are providing COVID-19 safety guidance for camps and sporting events planned for students during the break.

"We recognize that during this period of extended break from school, parents will seek to have their children participate in extracurricular activities to occupy their time safely and wisely. In the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, there is no 'zero risk' when it comes to any kind of public gathering; however, guidelines can be followed to mitigate the spread of the virus" said Dr. Samuel Williams-Rodriguez, Medical Officer of Health.

The guidelines for youth activities are as follows:

- If your child is sick, please keep him or her at home and contact the Flu Hotline if he or she has any flu symptoms.
- Close contact or indoor sporting activity is discouraged; however, wearing a mask, playing outside and staying at least six feet away from others must be considered.
- For close contact sports (i.e. basketball, football, netball) play can be modified by the coach to increase distance between players. Activities such as skill building (dribble, pivot), simulation drills or conditioning is highly encouraged.
- Discourage unnecessary physical contact, such as high fives, handshakes,



fist bumps, or hugs. Encourage a "thumbs up" instead.

- Use household cleaners that contain soap and detergent on play/sporting equipment to reduce the amount of germs on surfaces.
- Focus cleaning efforts on high-touch surfaces and objects such as, drinking fountains, balls, bats, gymnastics equipment, and protective gear.

Dr. Williams-Rodriguez added, "We understand wholeheartedly the anxieties and many uncertainties being faced by parents during this time. I'd like to take this opportunity to reassure the public that their safety remains a top priority as we continue to adapt best practices to mitigate the impact of continued spread of COVID-19 in our community. We encourage everyone to adhere to the public health guidance provided."

World Mental Health Day Message from Minister for Health & Wellness Hon. Sabrina Turner

"There is no health without mental health."

This quote by former United States Surgeon General Dr. David Satcher illustrates for me on this World Mental Health Day the fundamental importance of mental health for each and every one of us.

World Mental Health Day is celebrated on 10 October every year under the auspices of the World Federation for Mental Health and endorsed by the World Health Organisation (WHO).

The observance represents a global commitment to raise awareness of mental health issues and to mobilise efforts in support of mental health around the world.

Here in the Cayman Islands, it is an opportunity to recognise and reflect on the mental health challenges we have all been under throughout the past year and a half while dealing with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on our Islands and the world around us.

COVID-19 has had a major impact on people's mental health globally, and certainly within our region, increasing new cases of mental health conditions and worsening pre-existing ones.

Some groups, including health and other frontline workers, students, people living alone, and those with pre-existing mental health conditions, have been particularly affected.

As we have seen locally, the pandemic also disrupted the provision of services for mental, neurological and substance use disorders. The mental health impacts of COVID-19 on all of us cannot be discounted and will be seen for a while to come.

Many Caymanians and residents remain under great strain, dealing with increased anxiety around the challenges this pandemic has thrown at us, including financial pressures and fears about our personal safety and that of our loved ones.

The theme for this year's World Mental Health Day is "Mental health care for all: let's make it a reality."

And I certainly aim to make it a reality in the Cayman Islands.

Mental health and overall wellness are very important to me in my role as Minister of Health and Wellness. I hope to strengthen the existing mental health services available locally for vulnerable groups such as our children, youth, and elderly, but also for everyone.

I think it is impossible for anyone to say that they have not experienced mental health challenges at some point in their lives, and certainly not over the past year and several months.

We are taking steps in the right direction, with the increased provision of mental health counseling and educational psychologist support in schools, and our commitment to construct the Cayman Islands' long-awaited residential mental health facility.

I believe there is also a far greater awareness of the impact of mental health on all of our lives, largely through the services provided by the hardworking mental

health professionals throughout both our public and private healthcare systems.

But I know that more must be done.

Which is why, included in this Government's Strategic Policy Statement are specific objectives aimed at providing more holistic and available mental health services for the people of the Cayman Islands.

Such as providing a specialised youth mental health facility; promoting better mental health and special needs insurance coverage so everyone has access to mental health care; and promoting programmes that offer greater work/life balance and which support family systems.

Building a focus on better mental health into our healthcare system and reinforcing every individual's commitment their own personal mental health and that of their families is so important.

I hope that the increased awareness World Mental Health Day provides us with can serve as an opportunity to empower each of us to look after our own mental health and provide support to others.

It is needed.

In our region of the Americas, mental health disorders account for more than one third of total disability, with depressive disorders being the largest single cause of disability. And so sadly, nearly 100,000 people die by suicide each year in our region.

We as Caymanians know the intense sadness we all experience when we lose one of our own to depression and suicide, as small and interlinked as our community is. It is a pain which reverberates throughout our Islands.

One thing I am so glad of, is that the stigma against mental illness seems to be diminishing in our community. There is a greater understanding that anyone, anywhere can be affected – just as close to one billion people around the world are.

I would like to pledge today, that during my tenure as Minister for Health and Wellness, I will do my utmost to ensure that the people in our Islands living with mental health conditions have access to quality community-based mental health services and that their rights and best interests are protected.

Now more than ever, as the COVID-19 pandemic highlights and deepens long-standing mental health challenges in our Islands, it is essential that we work to make mental health care a reality for all.

U.S. VIRGIN ISLANDS TOURISM COMMISSIONER CALLS FOR CARIBBEAN CRUISE COLLABORATION

"One destination does not make an itinerary," said U.S. Virgin Islands Commissioner of Tourism Joseph Boschulte as he highlighted the importance of greater collaboration among Caribbean destinations and cruise line partners to ensure the safe and successful return of cruises to the region.

Speaking at the 35th edition of Seatrade Cruise Global in Miami last week, Commissioner Boschulte said it is important for travelers to feel safe at every destination they visit, and working with other destinations is essential to ensure that happens. "There has to be a collaborative effort amongst us in the Caribbean on health protocols because if a destination does not have effective protocols in place, that impacts not only the ship but also the next destination as well," he commented.

Commissioner Boschulte reflected that while the stayover sector performed well for the U.S. Virgin Islands throughout most

of the pandemic, the destination and the region suffered a setback in the cruise sector. "We didn't have ships arriving for about 15 months before welcoming Celebrity Edge to St. Thomas in July," he recalled.

"What we have on the books for this year is obviously better than when we were at zero, but next year we expect to have significantly more calls," an optimistic Commissioner Boschulte noted.

During the gathering of cruise industry stakeholders, the U.S. Virgin Islands Port Authority (VIPA) and Royal Caribbean signed a Memorandum of Understanding for the development of the cruise industry in the Territory. "Partnerships are critical to our development and this agreement is a good sign for our cruise business and tourism development overall," said the Territory's tourism leader as he underscored the importance of the Miami conference in revitalizing the sector.

The USVI delegation to Seatrade included representatives of the

Department of Tourism, VIPA, The West Indian Company Limited, and members of the Virgin Islands Legislature.

The team showcased the Territory's culture with the sounds of steelpan music accompanied by mocko jumbie and Carnival dance performances. Visitors to the booth received locally produced tarts as well as Virgin Islands-made hand sanitizers and US-VI-branded face masks.

Statement from HE the Governor

I am aware that the passing of the Customs and Border Control (Amendment) Bill and the Immigration (Transition) (Amendment) Bill is an emotive issue for some in our community. My office has received correspondence from a number of people about it. This statement is a response to those letters.

As Governor, I support the Bills passed in Parliament. We are currently dealing with a public health emergency and the Government is doing everything it can to protect the community of Cayman, ensuring it can manage any pressures on our health services. Pushing vaccination rates even higher is an important tool in our armoury.

As the Honourable Attorney-General said, the Bills passed by Parliament

this week are in line with our Constitution and Bill of Rights. They are reasonable, rational and proportionate. If individuals wish to enjoy privileges under the Immigration law and apply for a work permit, or renewal of a work permit, one of the conditions they have to meet is to demonstrate that they are vaccinated or can't take the vaccine due to medical reasons or another exemption permitted under the law. There is no right under the law to a work permit and there is no legitimate expectation for renewal. Government's policy is that if you wish to be employed in the Cayman Islands, and you require a work permit, then you are obliged to demonstrate a number of things. This will now include that you are vaccinated against COVID-19.

The Cayman Islands benefits from an independent judicial system that allows members of the public to air their grievances in court. The ability to challenge compatibility of legislation through the courts exists for all. This is how our democracy works. If there is a legal challenge, the Government will have to justify the legislation and the judiciary will determine its compatibility with our Constitution and Bill of Rights.

The Government's concern, which I share, is to do everything to support the health and well-being of everyone on Island so we can safely re-open the border. We all have to live with Covid in the future. These Bills will support that outcome and my hope is that the community can come together to help achieve it.



CUC donates Smart Thermostats to the NCVO

Caribbean Utilities Company, Ltd. ("CUC") has donated and installed four Ecobee Smart Thermostats at the National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCVO) Children Services.

CUC recently launched the Smart Thermostat Pilot Programme and is looking for 200 households to participate. The thermostats are available to the first 175 participants at no charge.

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Statement from the Chief Medical Officer, Dr. John Lee On COVID-19 Vaccination and Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS)

There have been several questions raised regarding a potential link between the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine against COVID-19 disease and the diagnosis of Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS) in a resident of the Cayman Islands.

A number of serious medical conditions have developed in people who have received vaccinations against COVID-19 disease in these islands, but it is exceedingly difficult to prove cause and effect as other issues may be involved with each individual patient.

The good news is that these people are either fully recovered or are improving. There have been a dozen of these cases, all of which have been recorded and some of which have been discussed with the UK Health Security

Agency (formerly known as Public Health England).

There is currently no evidence of a causative link between the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine and the diagnosis of GBS.

As of 11 August 2021, in the UK there were 42 reports of GBS following Pfizer-BioNTech vaccination. Over this time period, 21.0 million first doses and 24.7 million second doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine were administered.

The UK Health Security Agency, in its guidance to healthcare professionals on the occurrence of GBS following COVID-19 vaccination, has noted that a causal link between COVID-19 vaccination and GBS has not been proven and there is no evidence of a higher rate of reporting of GBS following COVID-19 vaccination.

In fact, the number of cases in the UK reported to the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) following vaccination are less than the number expected to occur by chance.

The annual incidence of GBS in the UK population is estimated at 2 per 100,000 per year with similar numbers in other western countries. In the USA, the incidence is similar and between 3,000 and 6,000 people develop GBS each year.

To date there have been no deaths in the Cayman Islands linked to the vaccine. It is continually encouraged that individuals talk with their healthcare provider about vaccination to ensure they have all the best information needed to educate themselves.

Lateral Flow Tests Introduced for Next Steps in COVID-19 Strategy

As the Cayman Islands continues to adapt and respond to living with COVID-19 in the community, Chief Medical Officer, Dr. John Lee OBE, has endorsed lateral flow tests for fast identification of positive cases. These specific tests play an integral role in the Government's overall management strategy by empowering people to proactively stay aware of their COVID-19 status via these testing kits and reducing the need for persons to attend a health care facility for initial testing.

"The SARS CoV-2 rapid test kits, also known as lateral flow tests or antigen tests, are a positive step for the country", shared Dr. Lee. "There have been significant improvements in the sensitivity and specificity of lateral flow tests, and we have seen that they can successfully assist in quickly identifying potential positives in the community. While PCR tests remain the highest standard for accuracy and confidence, lateral flow tests provide the confidence to allow us to safely and successfully resume many activities that are impacted by the current Regulations. I am therefore happy to recommend to the Government that we formally introduce lateral flow tests as part of our control and management of COVID-19 strategy."

Guidance for purchasing lateral flow tests has been issued by the CMO and sets out the criteria for tests to be used in the Cayman Islands. The Government intends to introduce Regulations under the Public Health Act (2021 Revision) to the same end.

Three lateral flow tests have been initially identified for use by the HSA and were selected based on recommendations and proven outcomes as noted by the regulatory bodies at World Health Organization (WHO) and the UK Health Security Agency (formerly known as Public Health England). These three kits are:

- ACON Biotech Flowflex SARS-CoV-2 Antigen Rapid Test
- Bioperfectus Technologies Novel Corona Virus Ag Rapid Test kit
- Hughes Veritas Rapid Antigen Test for SARS-CoV-2



Dr. Delroy Jefferson, Medical Director of the Cayman Islands Health Services Authority (HSA) notes that the HSA will incorporate lateral flow testing as part of the testing regime and will also provide validation for tests beyond the three kits identified.

Vendors who are interested in having other kits considered for use by the HSA must liaise with the HSA to have the test kits reviewed by HSA's accredited laboratory for validation.

"Our strategy for the Cayman Islands remains the same—putting the health and safety of all people in our country as the highest priority. The rapid test kits will help to provide a level of reassurance for individuals as they go about their daily lives but also provides additional information to guide the policies this government is putting in place to protect us all. I encourage all persons to familiarize yourselves with the personal safety steps and ensure that you have a preparedness plan in the event the virus reaches your household," said Premier Hon. Wayne Panton.

"Throughout the pandemic, personal responsibility has been a key factor in the suppression of COVID in our community. As we slowly resume travel and further open our borders, it is even more important for us to recommit to our individual responsibility to ensure the safety of ourselves and those we interact with through our daily lives."

Guidance for purchasing Lateral Flow Tests

According to the WHO, care must be taken when selecting rapid testing products while keeping in mind the national testing strategy and resources. It must be noted that the marketplace

is replete with various brands of rapid testing kits but there are variations in testing accuracy, quality and intended use claims.

The CMO, in recognising the need for local medical facilities, pharmacies, medical suppliers and businesses to acquire lateral flow tests is issuing guidance to assist those seeking to import them for distribution. The Government intends to introduce Regulations under the Public Health Act (2021 Revision) to the same end.

Criteria for selection of test kits

For SARS-CoV-2 rapid testing kits to be considered for local testing the following criteria should be met:

- Test kits should ideally have proof of certification;

- Test kits must be approved or authorised by at least one of the following bodies:
 - UK Health Security Agency (formerly known as Public Health England)
 - World Health Organisation
 - MHRA - Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency
 - Food and Drug Administration (USA)

- Test kits must have a sensitivity of greater than or equal to 80% and a specificity of greater than or equal to 97%;

- Care must be taken to ensure that Lateral Flow tests designed for clinical use only are distributed to medical professionals and/or facilities. This is because these are designed to be handled by a trained professional;

- Lateral Flow tests which are to be sold to the general public should clearly indicate that they have the ability to be self-administered. These self-administered or home-kits would be appropriate for personal usage, schools, gyms, entertainment venues, and employers wishing to regularly screen their employees; and

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UCCI Awards Scholarships

Over the past week, the University College of the Cayman Islands has presented over \$100,000 in scholarships to 81 students.

This is the first time in the university's history that it has been able to distribute more than a handful of such scholarships and marks a significant turning point in financial support for students, particularly those with financial need.

UCCI President and CEO Stacy McAfee said the awards have been possible thanks to a growing number of community donors who are interested in investing in Cayman's youth in order to build the next generation of leaders for the nation.

"So many times in my career, I have watched students either delay or abandon their dreams of higher education because they simply couldn't afford the cost of college," McAfee said. "These are exactly the kinds of students who are benefitting from the scholarships we are now able to provide. It is so gratifying to know we are giving them the chance to reach for the future they have envisioned for themselves."



McAfee said she expects this is just the start.

"We really hope to see new partners join us in the coming year," she said, "so that this time next fall, we'll be able to help even more students have access to UCCI."

On Tuesday, Oct. 5, 13 students received scholarships from RBC Royal Bank (Cayman). The bank created a fund of \$20,000 in recent months to help Caymanian students.

Last Wednesday, Sept. 29, the school presented privately funded, largely needs-based scholarships to 68 students at two afternoon events. One was dedicated to recipients of Community Engagement Program scholarships.

McAfee called the events a "celebration of the generosity of our community partners."

Such organizations as those within Enterprise Cayman, Sterling Security Solutions, Cayman Water Authority, Cisco and Progressive Distributors, along with donors Beverley and Thomas Simpson, presented students with scholarship awards.

Many of these new scholarships take into account a student's financial situation. McAfee said the support is reaching students who might not otherwise have a chance at higher education. Government funded scholarships, as well as many from the private sector, are performance based, awarding students with the highest GPAs.

Thomas Simpson, a former member of the UCCI Board of Governors, said he and his wife, Beverley, provided \$50,000 annually, for an initial four years, to establish the Community Engagement Programme, which is designed to reach students who may not meet those GPA requirements but



still have a desire to continue their educations.

"When I came here and became part of the board, I said, 'Where is the needs-based scholarship program?'" he recalled. "It didn't exist."

The Simpsons' hope is that they will be the first of many who will give to the programme.

"Anybody who wants to go to university should have access," Tom Simpson said. "That's why we're quite happy to provide this money."

McAfee said needs-based support is crucial for college students and UCCI is no exception.

"I am proud to stand with the Simpsons today and thank them for helping us to remove one of the obstacles that exists for

many," she said. "We hope together that we will build contributions to this programme so that financial need won't be an issue anymore and that anyone who wants to can attend UCCI."

McAfee told the honourees their awards came with certain responsibilities.

"Your actions will inspire others to give through this programme so that more students like yourselves have a means to succeed at UCCI," she said. "Your job today is the help spread the word, that if you have a way to give, give to UCCI. We hope together we will build a better Cayman."

ReGen project shifts to Premier's Ministry

The newly created Ministry of Sustainability and Climate Resiliency now has responsibility for the ReGen Cayman's Energy and Recycling Centre.

"Given the national importance of the ReGen project and its intended benefits of creating a more sustainable waste management system for the Cayman Islands, I believe the Ministry of Sustainability and Climate Resiliency is well-positioned to take the project forward and ensure the intended sustainability benefits. Additionally, Ministry Chief Officer Jennifer Ahearn has considerable experience with the project," Mr. Panton said. "This transition also allows Hon. Minister Sabrina Turner and her team at the Ministry of Health and Wellness to continue prioritizing the country's response to the COVID-19 pandemic."

At the time of the agreement, the 30 September date gave the parties six months to continue their negotiations around the various conditions precedent and reach financial close.

"Having recently received a more detailed briefing regarding the project, I am of the view that the six month timeline that was agreed previously was, at best, an ambitious target," Mr. Panton said. "The details of the outstanding conditions precedent are obviously not something that can be shared, as the negotiations have not been concluded; however I believe it is sufficient to note that there are a number of conditions precedent that were outstanding at the time of the project agreement signing, several of which remain outstanding currently and their complexity reflects the complexity of the project."

The Cayman Islands Government, under the previous administration, and Dart became contractually committed to implementing the project after signing the project contract in March 2021.

Mr. Panton assures the people of the Cayman Islands that the project will continue as the project team continues to progress strategic elements of the project, including the Environmental Impact

Assessment and capping the main mound at the George Town Landfill.

The crossing of the 30 September without satisfying the conditions precedent does not mean that the project is dead, but it does mean that Government has not rushed blindly to sign off on the project.

"This project is simply far too important in addition to being very complex, to make any hasty or half-informed decisions," Mr. Panton said.

Since taking office, in addition to the usual time required for familiarisation by a new administration, the Government has had to deal with many urgent and complex issues.

"This has necessitated that we adopt a triage type of approach, where we have had to place greater focus on those issues that were both critically urgent and important. In addition the intention of the Government is to bring a greater focus on sustainability, which requires ensuring that assessments and conclusions are reviewed to ensure they remain consistent with these objectives," Mr. Panton said.

"I want to assure the public that this Government recognizes the need to have an integrated solid waste management system that delivers a long-term, sustainable solution for all three of our beloved Cayman Islands," he said. "I also want to assure everyone that we will



be striving to deliver an integrated solid waste management system that achieves the appropriate balance across the sustainable development triple bottom lines of people, planet, and profits – balancing social, environmental, and economic benefits."

Dart President Development Delivery and Infrastructure Cameron Graham said, "Dart understands responsibility for the continued progress of the ReGen project is being transferred to the Ministry of Sustainability & Climate Resiliency. ReGen will deliver a number of sustainability benefits for the country, from reducing greenhouse gas emissions to improving recycling performance and diverting up to 95% of our waste from being landfilled. We look forward to working with Chief Officer Jennifer Ahearn once again to move the project forward and achieve the environmental, social and economic benefits of ReGen."



Opposition leader calls for the City Dump plan update

Worried that the Government has not moved forward with the plan to deal with Cayman's waste problem (called Project ReGen), the Leader of the Opposition Roy McTaggart wrote to Premier Wayne Panton to see if the Premier would advise exactly where the project currently stood at Monday's special meeting of Parliament.

Mr McTaggart said that a crucial date for the project seemed to be missed and, as a result, the Opposition were concerned that this would jeopardise the entire project.

In the letter to the Premier, which was sent on 29th September, Mr McTaggart said that the project agreement signed with DECCO was heading to the crucial date of 30th September, at which time the "financial close" of the project should have taken place.

"There are potentially dire consequences if financial close is not achieved. Most obviously, unless an extension is put in place, the project fails. The immediate consequence of that would be that the

Government would become liable for millions of dollars of abortive costs but, more significantly, it would leave Cayman with no solution for its waste problem with the available space at George Town landfill fast running out. That would clearly be an untenable position. Therefore, I would hope that if, as I suspect, financial close is not achieved by 30th September, the Government has reached agreement with DECCO on a suitable extension," Mr McTaggart wrote in his letter.

However the Government did not give an update on the project at this week's meeting of Parliament.

Mr McTaggart said that since coming to office, the Government had made no meaningful reference to the ReGen project that he could find.

"This causes the Opposition much concern given the importance of the ReGen project to our Islands," he stated.

Mr McTaggart remained hopeful that an extension to the financial close deadline date had been agreed with DECCO, but said he felt the Government had missed a

timely opportunity to update the country on this important project.

"The Opposition, therefore, are calling for full transparency from the Govern-

ment with regards to the future of the ReGen project and the closure of the environmental hazard known as the George Town landfill," they asked.

Premier outlines priorities to reopening

No Reopening date given yet

“Cayman needs to pave a way for a safe and continuous opening of its borders whereby vaccinated visitors could come without the need for quarantine, while at the same time trying to ensure that people are not made seriously ill or die with Covid,” said Premier Wayne Panton. This position was made clear during the Parliamentary debate on two Bills at the beginning of the week which saw new laws brought in to mandate vaccinations for certain categories of people.

To that end, the Premier said Government would be rolling out a plan explaining how this would be done, but he ruled out giving a specific date on which the borders would reopen.

Some of the areas to be addressed in the reopening plan included the Public Health system, social practices, testing and reporting, isolation regimes, vaccination levels, immigration and entry requirements, employment and labour matters, travel, data and analytics, law enforcement,

emergency response, and information sharing and communications.

However, Premier Panton said it was impossible for Government to randomly pick a date for full reopening of the border because the decision needed to be based on science.

One tool in the battle was the use of lateral flow Covid tests which had recently been proved for use, which provide fast identification of positive cases. These tests play an integral role in the Government’s overall management strategy by empowering people to proactively stay aware of their Covid-19 status by self-testing while reducing the need to attend a healthcare facility for initial testing. The tests have been ordered and are expected on Island in the coming weeks.

“Many of these tests can be self-administered and have the potential to eliminate the challenges presently faced by employers, patrons, customers, students and those wanting to go to the gym,” Mr. Panton said. “Living with Covid means that we will try to keep our unvaccinated

children in school using regular lateral flow testing and the isolation only of those who have tested positive rather than the whole class.”

Lateral flow testing will be used when students return to classes after mid-term break on 25th October.

The Premier also called on employers to do their part in helping the Government safely reopen borders while managing Covid.

“Employers will have to do their part if we are to safely control Covid and manage it. We can’t have employees feeling as if they have to choose between their job and their health or that of their children,” he said. “So, while we look to make practical adjustments to quarantine periods for those who are vaccinated, we can’t allow Covid-positive employees to simply continue to go to work without isolation. That’s not safe, not healthy or wise.”

The Premier said Government’s vision was to get the country to a point where they could continue the reopening programme and remain open in a responsible way.



“...not just trying to stay open, not just fighting against the odds to stay open, but doing it in a safe way where people are not suffering to any large extent,” Mr. Panton said.



'REOPEN CAYMAN' SETS NOVEMBER 22nd DATE

By midday Monday over 1,300 people had signed on to support the November 22nd reopening call.

The surprise announcement with its suggested date comes just days after Hon. Premier Wayne Panton said he would give the business community and the public a month's notice ahead of a new reopening target date set by the government.

According to a government release then, Mr Panton had said it is impossible for Government to randomly pick a date for full reopening of the border because the decision needs to be based on science.

"It means we rely on the advice and recommendations in an updated plan, which has had the input of experts in the Public Service and the Public Health so that we can evaluate the country's readiness to not only open but very importantly to remain open safely without having lockdown scenarios; without having to contemplate shutting down," he said.

In the past few weeks, Cayman has been grappling with an outbreak of community spread COVID-19 cases with over 100 cases mainly affecting students at several schools forcing officials to close all schools by bringing forward the autumn half-term break.

But in making its case for a November 22nd reopening, Reopen Cayman argues that several key objectives have been met.

Among them, it lists: "We've kept Cayman healthy, but the time has come to safely reopen our Islands. Caymanian businesses need a plan to reopen for their sur-

vival. Vaccination is strongly recommended for the safety of our community."

In a previous statement, Reopen Cayman had said that "to support the government and help the community prepare for this next phase of the pandemic, the group plans to launch a public education campaign which highlights how "getting ready" can vary from person to person, and for different organisations, depending on the situation."

On its website urging people to pledge their support for a November 22nd reopening, the group which is endorsed by the Cayman Islands Tourism Association (CITA) and the Chamber of Commerce, says: "The Cayman Islands border has now been closed for over 18 months. It is important that we use this time to prepare ourselves as we look to follow in the footsteps of other countries around the world and learn to co-exist with COVID-19 in the community."

It also says: "To support the government in readying the Cayman Islands community for a safe reopening, we have launched The Pledge to demonstrate the number of Cayman's residents that are Ready to Reopen."

Central to the Government's reopening strategy has been the ongoing vaccination programme.

Cayman has one of the highest vaccination rates in the world, but a new debate has erupted around specific vaccine



your voice heard...We believe we are ready to fully reopen our borders; for local businesses to thrive again, to welcome back visitors and to reconnect with loved ones overseas."

Meanwhile, in his statement last week, Premier Panton had indicated that a comprehensive plan was being developed for managing the COVID-19 pandemic going forward in Cayman and had also called on employers to do their part in helping the Government safely reopen borders.

"Government will shortly roll out a Cabinet-approved plan that provides predictability, accountability and transparency that can be shared with everyone," he said.

According to Mr Panton some of the areas to be addressed include "the Public Health system, social practices, testing and reporting, isolation regimes, vaccination levels, immigration and entry requirements, employment and labour matters, travel, data and analytics, law enforcement, emergency response, and information sharing and communications."

It's expected that that plan will be rolled out shortly although it could not be determined if it will be published before or after the Government sets the official date for the deferred reopening, or whether it would be before, after on the same date that Reopen Cayman is lobbying for.

mandates passed into law by the PACT coalition during last week's meeting of Parliament but voted against by the Progressives-led opposition.

The controversial move has divided opinions not only between Government and Opposition but in the wider community.

Reopen Cayman says with border reopening currently on pause, public and private sectors have additional time to work together and ensure appropriate policies and procedures are in place for international travel to resume safely.

It also states that once borders reopen, the community's readiness to safely coexist with the virus will be vital to protect lives and livelihoods.

"We understand that "ready" will look and feel different for everyone, but we're asking you to make the pledge and have

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

The work was carried out by Botanic Park staff in conjunction with the Cayman Islands Regiment, the Department of Environmental Health, Robson Construction, Rotary Club Central, Garden Club Grand Cayman members, Tony’s Toys, Genesis Trust, the Filipino community, and countless more dedicated volunteers.

“We are very grateful to all our staff, the support of the TAB and for the major contributions of assistance from the community after Tropical Storm Grace did some major damage, but in time the shade and full beauty of our gardens will return,” said QEIBP General Manager John Lawrus.

To ensure all was in order before welcoming back visitors, final inspections of the park were completed late last week by Mr. Lawrus and the QEIBP Horticultural Manager Nick Johnson.

Coinciding with mid-term break, the Children’s Garden and its popular Splash Pad will open this weekend between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. and will remain open throughout the week.

“I am very happy to have the Park open to the public again. There could not be a better place to enjoy a peaceful walk and recharge your batteries than at the Botanic Park. We will have a volunteer on hand at the Children’s Garden to ensure safety but ask that parents remain with their children as we will be adhering to all current COVID-19 Regulations,” said Mr. Lawrus.

Police Investigate Three Consecutive Firearm Incidents

Just after 1:10AM on Monday morning 11 October the RCIPS Firearms Response Unit responded to a 911-Emergency dispatch to a report of shots being fired in the area of Finch Drive, West Bay.


When officers arrived at the location, two unattended vehicles were found with what appeared to be bullet holes. One of the vehicles petrol tank was damaged and the Fire Services responded and safely prevented any further damage to the vehicle or threat to public safety.

Shortly thereafter, two subsequent reports of shots fired at two separate locations in George Town were received and responded to by the police.

The second incident occurred just after 1:50AM at Pedestrian Plaza on Shedden Road in the vicinity of Printers Way.

The third incident was reported to the police just before 2:15AM and took place at The Strand off Canal Point Road.

Both scenes were held by the police and certain articles of evidence were collected by the Crime Scene Investigating Officer processing the scenes.



The alleged person or persons involved in both shootings had left the scenes before the police arrived. Police believe these incidents are contained to a specific group of individuals. There is a possibility these incidents may be linked, however we are keeping an open mind at this early stage of the investigation.

Investigations into these incidents are underway and the police are appealing to anyone with information that might assist in these investigations to call the Major Incident Room at 649-2930.

RCIPS Financial Crimes Investigation Unit Investigates Forged Bank Notes

The RCIPS Financial Crimes Investigations Unit, have received two separate reports of forged notes that were turned over by two separate financial institutions in the Cayman Islands. From the reports, a forged KYD \$100 note was turned over and from the other was a forged KYD \$1 note. The serial number on the forged KYD \$100 note, matched that of a previous note that was handed in to the police.

Financial crime investigators are asking the public to be vigilant when exchanging money. Some ways that the public may be able to identify genuine notes are to compare the feel of the notes you receive with ones that they already have and to look for the unique details on KYD genuine bank notes such as the security thread, watermarks and serial numbers.

If you believe that you have been given a forged note, please do not attempt to spend the note, but instead report the matter to the police by calling the Financial Crimes Investigations Unit at 949-8797.

The RCIPS is reminding the public that knowingly uttering a forged note is an offense in the Cayman Islands, which on conviction, carries a sentence of imprisonment for 7 years.

Police Investigate Wounding Incident in Bodden Town

Shortly before 4:40PM on Friday, 8 October, officers responded to a report of a wounding at a business plaza on Bodden Town Road, east of Lake Destiny Drive. It was reported that at least two men were involved in an altercation which became physical, and one of the men stabbed another multiple times. The victim was transported to hospital via private vehicle to be treated for non-life-threatening

injuries and subsequently discharged. Officers attended the location and arrested a man, age 29 of East End, on suspicion of Assault GBH. He has been granted bail as investigations continue.

The matter is currently under police investigation and anyone who may have witnessed the incident or may have any information is asked to contact Bodden Town CID at 947-2220.

Bodden Town Man Charged with Aggravated Burglary

On Wednesday 6 October police formally charged a 43-year-old man of Bodden Town with Aggravated Burglary following his arrest in relation to an incident that took place just before 5:50PM on 3 October, at a residence in Birchwood Road, George Town.

The Bodden Town man was arrested by officers at the scene of the incident with weapons in his possession that were used to assault another man, after forcibly entering the premise. The injured party was transported by ambulance to the Cayman Islands Hospital by ambulance where he was treated for serious



but non-life-threatening injuries and later released.


The Bodden Town man appeared in court on Wednesday and was subsequently bailed to return on 27 October 2021.

RCIPS Reminds Motorists to Avoid Mobile Phone Usage and Illegal Tint

The RCIPS continues its efforts to ensure road safety through enforcement. Since 11 August, officers have been targeting motorists using mobile phones while driving, and in the month of September issued over 150 tickets for this offense.

However, despite enforcement efforts, officers continue to see a large number of people using phones while driving. Officers have also noticed a significant increase in the number of vehicles with what appears to be illegal tint, which also poses a safety concern around visibility, particularly at night. Checks will be made on any vehicle that appears to be in contravention of the law will be ticketed.

The RCIPS would like to remind motorists that the legal tint limits are 35% on the two front windows and 15% on all other windows with the exception of the front windscreen which should have only a six-inch strip, at the top (at any percentage). Tickets for tint violation start at \$150 and repeat offenders will be warned for intended prosecution and sent to court where, on conviction, are liable to a greater fine.



“Over October we will continue to focus on mobile phone usage while driving, while also targeting persons with illegal tint,” says Acting Superintendent Brad Ebanks. “We continue to encourage all road users to drive safely and avoid unnecessary fines by ensuring their vehicles are roadworthy. It’s not only your safety but the safety of other road users that is at stake every time you operate your vehicle in an unsafe manner. We thank all those members of the public who prioritise safe driving behaviours every time they get behind the wheel of their vehicle”.

RCIPS Advises the Public of Increase in Theft of Construction & Maintenance Equipment

Over the past three months, since early July, there has been an increase in reports of thefts from construction sites and from vehicles involved in construction, maintenance and gardening work. The items taken have included both building materials and tools.

As such, the RCIPS is advising persons involved in these businesses of precautions they can take against such thefts:

Consider implementing increased lighting on job sites, and potentially hiring on-site security. You should also keep track of who attends the site during the

day and make note of any suspicious or unauthorized persons. Vehicles carrying equipment should be secured when left unattended, and materials should not be left out in the open if possible. Additionally, it is best to record serial numbers of equipment and to mark items, so that they can be identified more easily if a theft does occur.

Persons working in these businesses are also encouraged to report any instances of unusual attempts to sell them tools or equipment, as these goods may have been stolen.

2nd Cayman Boxer Heads To Ireland



This decision was also in part related to the heightened regulations imposed in Cayman preventing the spread of Covid-19 preventing adequate competition preparation. Coach Brereton remains a staunch supporter of the Cayman Islands Boxing Association, and both females will be returning to Irish camp after the Christmas break.

Jamaica targets 1 million jabs

The Jamaican government is hoping to deliver one million COVID-19 jabs by the end of November, Prime Minister Andrew Holness said.

"That is not impossible and not necessarily a very difficult task," Holness said of the target. "It just requires greater focus, and so the government will be redoubling its effort right throughout the country."

Jamaicans have been reluctant to take the vaccine for a variety of reasons including fear of side effects and feeling taking the vaccine is unnecessary.

Over 810,000 doses have so far been administered. Over 513,000 first doses and 265,000 second shots, and 32,000 jabs of the one-shot Johnson & Johnson vaccine have been administered. Approximately 10 percent of the Jamaican population is fully vaccinated – one of the

lowest rates of per capita take-up in the Caribbean.

Citing the importance of leveraging churches and trade unions as key influencers, Holness said the government would be ramping up strategies to stave off the dumping of vaccines because they are reaching expiry dates. Vaccines expire roughly six months after their manufacture.

Guyana new oil source multiplies riches

Guyana's oil wealth got a massive boost after a discovery of a new source of approximately 10 billion barrels.

ExxonMobil made the new discovery announcement at the Cataback-1 well for the Stabroek Block in offshore Guyana. Cataback-1 brings the total significant discoveries to more than 20 within the Stabroek Block.

Alistair Routledge, president of ExxonMobil Guyana, said recent discoveries and ongoing projects will significantly enhance Guyana's economy. He said that "since that first discovery, more than US\$500 million have been spent with local companies; more than 800 local businesses, companies are involved in the supply chain for our business."

Nevertheless, Guyanese groups continue to pressure the government to review and revise the contract with Exxon to ensure a better deal on investment for

all Guyanese as the country could become one of the world's richest.

By around 2026, Guyana is projected to have the highest per capita oil production of any country in the world. Previous forecasts issued by the IMF put Guyana's economy at \$14.1 billion by 2025, almost three times the 2019 figure.

The Guyana economy grew by 14.5 percent during the first six months of this year, according to the Ministry of Finance.

Next Cuban protest blocked by army

Cuba has announced it will conduct annual military exercises on the date of planned human rights protests around the country.

Armed forces will conduct annual military exercises on Nov. 18-19, leading up to a day of civilian defence preparedness on Nov. 20.

That is the same date dissident groups are planning nationwide demonstrations calling for civil liberties, including the right to peaceful protest and an amnesty for imprisoned government opponents.

The largest protests the island had seen in decades broke out for two days in July, resulting in hundreds of arrests, one death

and calls for US intervention by some Cuban Americans.

Well-known government opponents are among those who remain behind bars following the unrest, with some facing long sentences.

The upcoming protests are being planned on Facebook by the Archipelago group, which says it has some 20,000 members, many of whom live outside the country.

The government's defence preparations are part of a military doctrine known as the 'War of the Whole People' designed to respond to a US invasion.

The last day features thousands of civilians conducting exercises including evac-

uating work centres, tending to the wounded, engaging in weapons training, and training in logistical support such as making bullets and cooking.

Playwright Yuni Garcia, administrator of Archipelago and leader of the planned protests, tweeted that the date of the military exercises showed the government intended to "to further militarise the country" on Nov. 20.

Unlike during the July unrest, which was largely spontaneous, the group has requested permission for

marches in various cities on that date, which the government has yet to respond.

Antigua opens new medical school

Antigua and Barbuda will soon produce medical professionals after opening a new university that will facilitate medical studies.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne was at the opening ceremony last week for the Western Imperial Medical University at Crabb's Peninsula where the YIDA Special Economic Zone (SEZ) is located.

Browne said that this major educational institution will make a positive impact on Antigua and Barbuda's economy and the university will contribute "around five percent of our GDP".

Minister of Education Daryll Matthew believes that this "historic" occasion will

deliver high quality education, provide great economic development and will make Antigua and Barbuda stand out as an academic centre of excellence.

Trinidad upgrades its robotics service

Trinidad and Tobago may soon see the waiting time for surgical procedures reduced, thanks to the introduction of robotics.

Four robotic-assisted surgeries were done at the Port of Spain General Hospital in September using the Freehand Panorama CoBot (a robotic surgical assistant).

A group of six surgeons did a series of three "co-ordinated, keyhole surgeries" with the assistance of a surgical robot. One of the surgeons and lecturer in surgery UWI, Dr Yardesh Singh, gave a demonstration of

the robotic assistant at a press conference.

One of the problems medical professionals faced during the pandemic was that resources were stretched, as these were moved away from all other hospital services, said Prof Shamir Cawich of Port of Spain General Hospital. The robotics will allow more patients to get much-needed operations and it will allow the teams to operate in much more trimmed and efficient fashion and will also aid in the development of medical tourism in TT and the region, he added.
