



Grouper Moon brightens up Little Cayman

Conservationists are gathered in Little Cayman to monitor the annual Grouper Moon, when thousands of Nassau groupers congregate to spawn. It has fascinated scientists and oceanographers for decades.

Researchers are surveying the spawning at the aggregate sites where the ritual always starts around this time of year for up to ten days. They are filming and researching from Tuesday until Thursday or Friday this week.

The Grouper Moon Project is a collaboration between the DoE, Reef Environment Education Foundation (REEF) and

other members of the Caribbean marine scientific community. Todd Bohannon is an educational volunteer with REEF. He said: "This is my tenth year of coming and probably the highlight of my year. I missed coming last year because of Covid and I'm super-excited to be back." One of the scientists observing is marine biologist Brice Semmens, a professor at the Institution of Oceanography in San Diego. He said: "I've been part of this project for almost 20 years and almost every year we get to come down and help the Cayman Islands Government carry out the science they do to under-

stand and monitor the population of Nassau Grouper. It's a real privilege and honour to be part of that group for that length of time."

The project is so popular with the visiting scientists that Bohannon revealed many researchers bring their offspring to help out with research, equipment and data analysis. In fact, Semmens has brought his 13-year-old son this time.

Despite his expert knowledge on the topic, Semmens admits that they still don't fully know why the groupers start spawning exactly when they do, although a full

moon is the main reason. Semmens said: "That's totally true but in a year like this year when there is what we call a 'split moon', the challenge is when a full moon happens in the middle of January and a full moon in the middle of February, that's when we have a really hard time to predict when the fish will be spawning." He added that it happens around this time of year because it's when the ocean is at its coldest.

The actual spawning process is spectacular with hundreds of male groupers pursuing the lone female who releases her eggs.

12 Graduates receive Home Care Aide Certificates

Twelve adults received their Home Care Aide Certificate from The Pines Retirement Home (PRH) Tuesday, 16th November 2021. The students completed an 11-week Vocational Course in Home Care Aide and an additional Ten (10) Hours of Practical Training.

Infants, and Children, Care for Clients with Mental Illness and at the End of Life, and How to Get and Keep a Job.

Lynda Mitchell, The PRH CEO, and one of the facilitators said "the main purpose for designing and teaching this course is to equip individuals, who have a desire to assist the elderly with the proper knowledge to do so. Caring for an aging populace isn't as simple as one might think, and the students will attest to that. Although the course is quite intense, the participants enjoyed their lessons as well as learning from each other. With Cayman's aging population increasing steadily, having the right personnel in place will certainly help." Thanks to Nurse Jusene Brown, the Pines

Nurse Supervisor and facilitator, for her ongoing support with teaching this course.

Since the inception of the Home Care Aide Course at the PRH, 97 students have received their Home Care Aide Certificates. Pay Parking at Grand Cayman Airport Resumes, Cards Accepted

The Cayman Islands Airports Authority (CIAA), which operates the Owen Roberts International Airport (ORIA) on Grand Cayman and the Charles Kirk-

connell International Airport (CKIA) on Cayman Brac, announced today that an upgrade to the 'pay parking' system at ORIA has been implemented to provide

an improved airport experience to the traveling public.

Airport customers exiting the Short-Term or Long-Term parking lots at Owen

Roberts International Airport will now have the added convenience of being able to pay their parking fees by credit or debit card at the exit machines. The exit machines accept Mastercard and Visa cards and are equipped with an intercom help button should customers require assistance from an Airport Ground Transportation Officer. Customers may also pay their parking fees by cash at any one of the pay stations located inside the main airport terminal.

A drop-off zone in the Short-Term parking lot has been allocated for those persons dropping off departing passengers. Drivers who are picking up arriving passengers must also park in the Short-term parking lot. Parking is free for up to five minutes after which time the standard parking rates apply, which come into effect from 1 February 2022.

The standard parking rates at Owen Roberts International Airport are:

- Short-Term Parking:
 - * 0-5 minutes free
 - * Daily rate – CI\$48.00
 - * Over 5 minutes – CI\$2.00 per hour (or part thereof)
- Long-Term Parking: CI\$7.00 per day (or part thereof)

Only authorised public transportation and tour operators are permitted to drop off or pick up passengers at curbside in front of the main terminal.



Rise in COVID cases causing major headache

More PCR testing sites to ease severe congestion

The Chief Medical Officer (Interim) Dr Autilia Newton reporting on Monday that there had been 843 new positive results for Covid-19 since the last report on Friday, 14 January, which means there are approximately 4,000 current cases of Covid in Cayman, or about one in 18 people with the illness.

With the high volumes of people getting Covid causing major headaches all round, Public Health has now announced that they are offering additional clinics in the districts to conduct confirmation PCR testing for people testing positive on rapid antigen lateral flows.

The following clinics will now be open daily:

- Ed Bush Sports Complex, West Bay 1 – 2pm
- Bodden Town Civic centre 1 – 2pm
- South Sound Community Centre 1 – 3pm.

Up until now, the South Sound Community Centre had been the only place where people who had tested positive on a rapid antigen lateral flow could then get the required PCR test to con-



firm their Covid status. The location was only open for a short time each day over lunchtime, so the increasing numbers of people trying to get a PCR test there caused authorities to have to divert traffic from South Sound in a bid to contain the traffic congestion in that highly built-up residential area. An area that has

little in the way of parking facilities.

People were also frustrated over the weekend, with few private clinics open on a Sunday to accommodate rapid antigen lateral flow testing for those with symptoms or those required to take a day 2, day 5 or day 10 test following a return to the island

after travel. On Sunday, hundreds were at the HSA's walk-in clinic at 131 MacLendon Drive (behind Fosters Airport, next to DHL), as a result. Similar volumes will no doubt be expected this coming weekend and Monday, when Cayman has a bank holiday and private clinics will be closed in observance of National Heroes Day.

Omicron – the Covid variant that is reportedly a milder form of Covid (in vaccinated people, at least) – appears to be becoming the dominant variant in Cayman. While the number of confirmed cases of the Omicron variant in the Cayman Islands remains at 132, the number of probable Omicron cases reached 2,836 during the reporting period, the interim CMO said.

Fifteen Covid-19 patients were hospitalised in the Cayman Islands as at midnight (12am) on Monday, 17 January. Seven new admissions were included in this number.

Meanwhile 11 new cases of Covid were reported in the Sister Islands.

As a reminder, anyone testing positive on a rapid antigen lateral flow test must receive a confirmation PCR test from the Health Services Authority from one of the above-mentioned clinics only. If they test positive on an LFT, they must immediately isolate, report the result on www.explore.gov.ky and attend the next available designated HSA clinic for their PCR test.

Quarantine time reduced for Covid positives

Anyone quarantining due to a positive Covid test and any of their contacts will now see their quarantine period in which they must remain in isolation reduced, as from Wednesday 19 January.

Vaccinated people with a positive test will now have to isolate for six days and become eligible for an exit PCR test on Day 7, while unvaccinated people will now have to isolate for nine days and become eligible for an exit PCR test on Day 10. It should be remembered that the day of the original positive PCR test is considered Day 0.

If people are currently in quarantine because they are positive for Covid and are eligible for early release (along with their unvaccinated (18+) household members), they can attend a special drive-through testing clinic at Truman Bodden Sports Complex parking lot (opposite John Gray High School walking track) on Wednesday 19 January and Thursday 20 January. The visits are split alphabetically, with regards to surname, as follows:

- 7am – 8am – Surname A – D
- 8am – 9am – Surname E – K
- 9am – 10am – Surname L – R
- 10am – 11am – Surname S – Z

People attending the exit testing drive-through should enter Olympus Way via Walker's Road, and should wear a face-mask and bring government photo ID showing date of birth.


After testing, people need to return directly home without making stops, until their PCR test results have been received with further instructions. Public Health aims to have these early release exit tests resulted within 48 hours.

Minister of Health & Wellness Sabrina Turner said she welcomed the introduction of these reduced isolation periods as announced by Public Health.

"We understand the difficulties many families have faced because of the Covid-19 restrictions. Currently, we know that there is a large number of persons in isolation and quarantine and this new policy will allow many of them to rejoin the community sooner and safely," she said.

Daily exit PCR testing clinics for Covid-19 positives individuals will continue 10am – 12pm Friday 21 January at the following locations:

- Ed Bush Sports Complex
- Bodden Town Civic Centre
- South Sound Community Centre



Interim Chief Medical Officer Dr Autilia Newton said: "The continuous evolution of the Covid-19 pandemic requires us to consistently assess how we manage the spread of the virus, while ensuring conti-

nunity for our economy. This change to the isolation and quarantine requirements is a step towards us improving the management of Covid-19 to best suit the needs of the Cayman community."

COVID ISOLATION - NO LONGER AN ISOLATED COST

The cost of COVID-19 is increasingly being measured not just in lives lost (the ultimate cost), but in the impact on economies.

Whereas over the past 18 months since the pandemic broke the impact has been on recession-inducing lockdowns and their consequential effect on business activity and the wider economy, another cost implication is now spiking.

This is being noticed just as there are now tentative indications that the latest phase of the economically stagnating pandemic could be slowing down.

The fast-spreading Omicron variant, the most recent iteration of the constantly-mutating COVID-19 virus, has triggered a downturn which many of the world's leading economies are only now trying to come to terms with.

A spate of stimulus measures are being unleashed, following massive support packages of various forms of financing to save businesses from succumbing, although many have been forced to close - or divert into other areas.

Compounding the challenge of kickstarting COVID-hit economies is the increasing challenge of labour shortages, in this case, workers forced to isolate due to contracting the virus or for simply being around someone who has.



This is putting a severe strain on businesses and by extension, the wider economy, causing many governments to rethink their COVID-isolation policies, resulting in a review of their protocols and opting for shorter isolation periods.

One growing area of concern is the how COVID-19 isolation impacts mental health.

In several instances, the scale of the issue has also put health experts and policymakers at opposite ends of the spectrum in a

debate over balancing safeguarding public health and keeping economies afloat.

This has a ripple effect throughout the economy and the society especially where essential service staff and even those in normally readily-available ancillary services are off the job for any extended period.

Particularly vulnerable to this is the hospitality sector, a key component of the tourism industry.

But it's also felt in other particularly labour-intensive indus-

tries, or where staff work in close proximity to each other, or highly specialised sectors.

It's also noted that figures for the number of people in isolation, once a key statistics in the daily reporting of COVID-19 by various governments, is now noticeably absent from many dashboards...or the information is said to be pending but never seems to materialise.

One of the critical aspects of managing and counting the cost of COVID, is knowing who is

available to work and how much of the workforce is at least 'temporarily unavailable'.

Governments are under pressure to continue supporting businesses through costly lockdowns or where workers are due sick pay for having to isolate in compliance with national protocols.

They are also increasingly reluctant to impose further lockdowns citing that it's costly to the state and the economy, plus it has also become a political minefield.

Adding to the political dilemma is rebalancing national budgets and somehow finding the funds to pay for grants, soft loans, and other means of business and family support.

Concern is also mounting in several countries over many of the goodwill support payments which have been obtained fraudulently and the growing number of instances where governments (meaning the tax-paying public) have had to absorb those losses being unable to track down the culprits.

Some experts suggest that the pandemic, or at least this phase of it, might be waning. But it's leaving in its wake considerable turmoil in the economy and society as the world seeks to adjust to the now oft-referred 'new normal'.

Health experts remind that vaccinations are not a panacea against COVID-19, but they argue persuasively that it's a vital buffer between the crippling effect of the disease on health and its equally crippling effect on the economy and society.

COVID affects National Heroes Day 2022

Pared Down Invitation-Only Ceremony, Award Ceremonies Postponed

National Heroes Day 2022 observations will involve far fewer participants than usual in keeping with current COVID-19 protocols, according to the Protocol Office.

Preparations are now well in hand to hold a by-invitation-only National Heroes Day ceremony in Heroes Square, George Town on Monday, 24 January 2022, 9-11 a.m.

The proceedings on National Heroes Day will feature the unveiling of the bust of the newest national hero - Ms Leila Elberta Ross-Shier, Cert. Hon., and wreath-laying to recognise the outstanding contributions of our 10 national heroes and other nation builders. Due to public gathering limitations, there will be a combined parade contingent comprising four representatives from each of the seven uniformed services agencies.

"In the interest of safeguarding our honourees, and to keep within the 250-person limit for outside gatherings at this time, it has been decided to pare down this year's ceremony," said Chief of Protocol, Ms Meloney Syms.

"Even though this year's theme for National Heroes Day recognises our uniformed services, it is not possible for the

approx. 500 honourees and their loved ones to be present on the day - as is the long-established tradition. The planned award ceremonies in Cayman Brac and Grand Cayman have been postponed. We will hold ceremonies that remain within public gathering limits at a later date to ac-

Monday's event will be live-streamed on CIGTV, and Government's Facebook and YouTube pages, as well as broadcast live on Radio Cayman, beginning at 9 a.m.

JAMAICA LEADS WITH ITS TOURISM TURNAROUND

Jamaica is bucking the trend and showing encouraging results from its key tourism industry despite suffering setbacks from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Appearing on the top-rated UK business programme, Ian King Live on Sky News, Jamaica's tourism minister Ed Bartlett said the country is anticipating a continued strong rebound from the pandemic.

Reporting that air arrivals are already at 60 per cent of the 2019 level, Mr Bartlett said: "We are expecting that by the end of (20)23 to be back to 2019 levels and then go beyond that into reaching the target we had set ourselves for 5 million visitors and to earn 5 billion dollars."

The country's cruise return strategy is also well underway for the sector that has been among those hardest by the outbreak of the pandemic.

Numerous cruise lines had been forced to curtail operations under the perception of being 'petri-dishes' where the COVID-19 virus flourished in several high profile incidents.

But the Jamaican tourism minister said they have put a rigorous strategy in place to minimise the risk of any cruise-related outbreak in Jamaica which is already battling large numbers of COVID cases.

With the country's economy taking a battering due to the pandemic Mr Bartlett told Sky's Ian King that getting tourism up and running safely again for both visitors and residents is key and that includes the cruise sector.

"The cruise market has responded, not as strongly as the air (arrivals) of course, but the fact is that it has returned and it has returned with jobs," he stated.

"Immediately as the ship docks, the dollar flows into the hands of the ordinary man and that's the power I think of cruise

tourism. It does provide, I believe, the fastest way of transferring wealth..because the jobs that are required are pretty much basic and that's important. It touches the lives of the ordinary person and that's critical in terms of wellbeing, especially of small communities," Mr Bartlett explained.

Like Jamaica, many Caribbean destinations have been investing in luring cruise lines back to their ports, while others like the Cayman islands have been more cautious.

The cruise lines have also been aggressively doing their own promotions.

The main challenge for cruise destinations especially has been how strict to make their individual national COVID protocols at a time when the Omicron variant is still surging.

This is resulting in illnesses (though less severe than previous variants) but more significantly forcing huge swathes of

the workforce into isolation for either testing positive or coming into contact with others who have contracted the virus.

According to Mr Bartlett, the system which Jamaica has put in place, especially to manage its cruise visits, is robust and has been working to the benefit of the cruise lines and the country.

"We are excited that cruise is back," he said, but admitted "it is highly challenged."

Noting that "cruise represents an ecosystem that is susceptible to any kind of shocks", tourism minister Bartlett said that the pandemic represents "a huge challenge" for the sector - both the cruise lines, their passengers and the destinations they visit.

Jamaica still has a curfew in place as part of a package of measures it has deployed to fight back against COVID-19.

Mr Bartlett outlined that parallel to that the country has cre-

ated a special transit "corridor" for cruise visitors among other steps to safeguard both visitors and residents.

He described it as "a bubble that enables the visitors to enjoy the full extent of the experiences that they seek while preventing them from becoming involved in wider community activities."

That falls under the Jamaica Cares Programme, Mr Bartlett told Ian King Live, which he said "provides an end-to-end security arrangement for the protection of the visitors and of our locals."

Calling their protocols "envious", the Jamaica tourism minister said the strategy has been recognised by the World Travel and Tourism Council, earning his country the organisation's 'safe travel approval', becoming only the third country to have earned that accolade as global efforts to revive the global tourism industry continue.

Antigua's unique farm thrives

Antigua and Barbuda has developed a revolutionary way of combining aquaculture and hydroponics to produce fish and vegetables at the same time. In the quiet residential area of Upper Renfrew, St. John's is Indies Greens, the island's only aquaponics farm and training centre.

This unique farm and training facility was established in 2016, to tackle the growing demand there for fish products, healthier diets and lifestyles. The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) supported the development of training facilities on the Indies Greens Farm and funded the building of a training facility.

Not only does the farm produce vegetables such as lettuce and spinach, and herbs

such as chives and mint, as well as tilapia fish for sale; it also serves as a facility for long-term training opportunities for locals as well as the entire Caribbean region.

Aquaponics is becoming increasingly popular, because it can be set up in a wide range of sizes, from large-scale production that requires public and private investments to much smaller-sized ventures, making it an attractive opportunity for young farmers in Antigua and Barbuda, who may have limited financial resources.

The Antigua and Barbuda government made the development of the aquaponics sector a priority and sought technical assistance to grow and advance the sector from FAO.

The farm is a training facility for people from the Bahamas, Barbados and St Kitts and Nevis, while the Climate Change Adaptation in the Eastern Caribbean Fisheries Sector (CC4FISH) project trained participants from Grenada and Saint Lucia which brings some extra benefits to people in the region. The investment in Indies Greens is reaping benefits as the aquaponics farm is pro-

ducing approximately 24,000lbs of tilapia annually and 3,500 heads of lettuce per month.

The enviable title of 'master trainer' was earned by those farmers who completed the training and who can now train other farmers themselves, both in Antigua and Barbuda and across the Caribbean. Some master trainers have also been able

to design and build their own aquaponics systems, through public-private partnerships some of which are generating over US\$1,000 per month.

Antigua and Barbuda has not only increased its production of healthy food, it has also strengthened the livelihood of farmers through innovation, knowledge and technology transfer.

Jamaican tourism workers get pension

Jamaica's tourism industry workers are celebrating a unique first; a comprehensive tourism workers' pension plan.

At the official launch of the Tourism Workers Pension Scheme (TWPS) at the Montego Bay Convention Centre, Minister of Tourism Edmund Bartlett said that it was a first for Jamaica and in the whole world. While most other pension plans relate to different companies or entities, the TWPS embraces all workers, entrepreneurs, and stakeholders and will benefit hundreds of thousands of people, directly and indirectly, employed in the industry.

Bartlett said: "This is more than just a game changer; it is in fact a life-changer, as it gives our tourism workers something to look forward to that will supplement their savings going into the twilight

years of their life. The scheme has been 14 years in the making and fulfils a commitment I made, but more than anything else it really underscores our commitment to improving the welfare of workers in the industry while developing the human capital and our recognition and appreciation that our people, with one of the most amazing cultures in the Caribbean, are the backbone of our very important tourism industry."

He added that it would be a huge mistake to undervalue or trivialise the role of tourism industry workers, who contribute to a huge percentage of national income. Recipients of the pension plan are immensely grateful, especially after the disruption of the last two years because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Trinidad delays vaccination deadline

The Trinidad and Tobago government has delayed enforcing its controversial vaccination policy for public sector workers until mid-February.

Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley made the announcement on Saturday. The policy was originally slated to come into effect on 17 January, however, Rowley said the deadline will be extended to 17 February.

He said: "I am very pleased from some of the reports I got from the public sector that we have improved some of our vaccination." Rowley also announced the establishment of a team to investigate the factors contributing to the clinical outcomes of COVID-19 patients.

Rowley said: "I found five of our best and most appropriate people who have

agreed to go into the hospitals across the board and look at what is going on there, talk to the staff, look at their data, look at it with a professional eye and come back and tell the country."

It follows calls by the Joint Trade Union Movement for a panel of independent experts to be appointed to assess the veracity of the statistics emanating from the state.

The team, he said, will provide a report at the end of the week, and the findings will be made public. There is much scepticism and opposition to this policy despite Covid cases and deaths in T&T rising alarmingly. Trinidad and Tobago has recorded over 3,100 Covid deaths and more than 100,000 positive cases.




