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Can the property boom continue?

The recent RICS Cayman Islands Property & Construction Conference held at the end of April at The Ritz-Carlton Grand Cayman looked at assessing the question that is on most home-owners' and would-be buyers' minds right now – can the property boom continue?

RICS is the global professional body promoting and enforcing the highest international standards in the valuation, management and development of land, real estate, construction and infrastructure. The organisation works at a cross-governmental level, delivering a single, international standard that supports a safe and vibrant marketplace in land, real estate, construction and infrastructure, for the benefit of all. This is the fifth year of the Cayman conference, with the topic this year: Building a sustainable and climate resilient future for the Cayman Islands.

Conference committee member Stephen Still, MRICS, a Senior Valuation Surveyor with BCQS International, said that, as they outlined in their Valuation Uncertainty and ESG (Environmental, Social, and Governance) breakout session, they believed that the fundamentals that drove the local market appeared to be strong at the moment.

Moderated by Uche Obi, the government's Chief Valuation Officer, the session saw Eric Allen, RICS Americas Board Member, Chair of the RICS Caribbean

Advisory Group, James Andrews, Senior Managing Director, Integra Realty Resources and Mr Still discuss issues such as global valuation uncertainty, focusing on the Caribbean.

With regard to the Cayman Islands, Mr Still said: "The employment market is strong and there is available credit with local mortgage lenders having good liquidity. The Cayman property market is complex, with many different bands or levels – some of which will be more sensitive to external factors than others. Increasing inflation, supply chain issues and the purported series of rises to the US prime rate will likely have an effect on some areas of the local market."

The pandemic definitely made an impact on Cayman's property market, but that was short-lived and Cayman has seen a rally in property prices like never before.

"The property market was initially impacted by the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic. But high demand, low supply, increased liquidity due to the inability to travel and the government pension release scheme perpetuated a rapid recovery," Mr Still confirmed.

Cayman was now seeing unprecedented prices being achieved across all levels of the residential property market.

Affordable property for all

However, while the boom in property prices might be great for owners, the downside is of course that it makes it prohibitively difficult for people to get on



the property ladder in the first place. At the conference, there was discussion on whether Cayman might introduce some type of restriction on foreign ownership, which may thereby free up more property for the local market.

"The idea that foreign money has helped push up prices in the local market has been around for some time and has become a hot topic of debate among local residents," Mr Still said. "In our view, the main issue is supply across all levels of the property market and restricting a

particular profile of buyer will only have a nominal if any effect on property prices. In any case any such a rule would go against what we stand for as country by discriminating against people on the basis of nationality."

Mr Still said in order to make homes affordable in this current market they believed there needed to be a joint effort from government and local developers to reach a solution on affordable housing.


However, he warned: "This is not likely to be achieved in the short term."

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Commemorating Red Cross Day - Around the Corner and Across the World

Around the world on May 8th, Red Cross, Red Crescent and Red Crystal Societies are celebrating World Red Cross Day. The day, which marks the birthday of the Movement's Founder and winner of the first Nobel Peace Prize- Henri Dunant- has been observed annually throughout the world since 1948. There are almost 97 million members and also many Volunteers which are of the Red Crescent as well as Red Cross. They are honored to do every task for the humans for providing them relief to the Worldwide which consists of the 170 Nations.

Here in Cayman, the month of May is observed as Red Cross Month and the Cayman Islands Red Cross (CIRC) commemorates this feat by enhancing its programme activities throughout our community. The Red Cross programmes are grouped into four main core areas: promoting humanitarian principles and values, disaster response, disaster preparedness, health and care in the community.

This year, we dedicate this day to the hundreds of Cayman Island Red Cross volunteers who are assisted the community during the COVID-19 pandemic and Hurricane season.

The resurgence of community transmission of COVID-19 took hold in October 2021, Red Cross volunteers were deployed to assist in the delivery of food and other groceries to households that suddenly were placed in quarantine due to coming in contact with a COVID-positive case or because a member of the household had tested positive.

This service became a lifeline for families who found themselves under quarantine/isolation orders with empty fridges and cupboards as they had no prior notice in light of the sudden news. Until this service was established, those short of money, or with no credit cards or internet access, who were unable to order food and groceries online had no option but to turn to neighbours, family members, colleagues and elected officials to assist them.

117 CIRC volunteers have supported the project, and between October 20,

2021 and November 30, 2021 these volunteers made an average of three deliveries per day, assisting 442 households.

In 2021, The CIRC shelter, the first shelter to open in localized and national emergencies, was activated a total of four (4) times. The shelter was activate in response to the fires in the Windsor Park community and the landfill, as well as Tropical Storms Grace and Ida. Over 20 persons sought refuge at the CIRC shelter, and 36 CIRC volunteers were deployed to assist in all of the government shelters.

First Aid volunteers covered 29 community events over the course of 2021, with 180 CIRC volunteers deployed to ensure the health and safety of attendees. Disaster Management volunteers were able to, once again, support the Cayman Islands Airport Authority (CIAA) in completing

their annual airport emergency exercise. A total of 35 CIRC volunteers participated in two key roles, as victims of the exercise as well as first aid responders supporting emergency response personnel.

The CIRC's "Support Our Seniors" project focused on identifying, vetting, training, and deploying volunteers to assist Cayman's vulnerable elderly population. In 2021, 64 CIRC volunteers supported a total of 30 vulnerable elderly residents in all districts of Grand Cayman for the duration of the initiative. 114 client requests for services were completed with services provided such as transportation to medical appointments and pickup and delivery of groceries and medication.

"Around the world there are over 115 million people who give their time, skills, blood, sweat and tears to help assist the

most vulnerable and empower their community", explains Jondo Obi, CIRC Director. "We are a voluntary service humanitarian organization unlike any other, and everything that we do, here and abroad, is because everyday citizens believe in the power of humanity and act on that belief", she adds.

"Our volunteers are the heart and soul of the Red Cross, both here in Cayman and across the globe. With endless compassion and dedication, Red Cross volunteers give of themselves selflessly as they respond to natural and man-made disasters in their communities".

No let-up in Covid increase

As at the end of April there was a continuing upward trend in the number of Covid cases being reported in the Cayman Islands.


During the last week in April (to 30 April) there were a total of 604 new cases of Covid-19 reported by Public Health, an increase of 144 cases over what was reported in the previous week.

Officials noted that 1,897 tests were conducted in the last week of April, compared to 1,419 tests the previous week and 1,427 tests the week before that. Out of all the tests that were conduct-

ed in the last week of April, 32 per cent were positive.

People are continuing to need hospitalisation because of the effects of Covid, with nine in-patients admitted to hospital in the last week of April. Of these, 60 per cent were vaccinated. There have been 267 COVID-19 patients admitted since March 2020 to 30 April 2022.

As at May 4th The number of deaths in the Cayman Islands from Covid related causes remains at 28 deaths since the beginning of the pandemic.

Cita President Worried Over Risk To Recovery From Remaining Covid Regulations



Cayman does not require a tourism czar at present but a government-led collaborative effort to further relax the remaining COVID-19 regulations and restore the industry to growth.

The point is made by Marc Langevin, president of the Cayman Islands Tourism Association (CITA) and general manager of the Ritz-Carlton during an appearance on the new Caymanian Times multi-platform programme Cayman Conversations with Ralph Lewis.

In a wide-ranging discussion looking at various aspects of issues impacting the sector, Mr Langevin expressed concern about the continuing challenges facing Cayman's return to the 2019 pre-Covid levels of visitors and tourism business activity.

In his view, the destination risks being stifled by overcautiousness with the remaining Covid regulations which he worries could inadvertently undermine tourism and economic recovery.

"It's got to be ensuring that we put our best foot forward and we create the business whether that's going to allow anybody to think but now we get to look at the bigger picture. When I talk to different politicians I believe there is a certain expectation from everybody in the business that we will be back to a certain level. It's not going to be 100 per cent but I truly believe that we could be to the 80-90 per cent depending on the industry, Mr Langevin said.

But he added: "I'm not hearing 'let's do it!'"



According to the CITA president, the ripple effect of tourism throughout the economy and society requires now a more focused and dynamic response especially from government to revitalise the industry.

"I think we have shown in the last two years that tourism is not just narrow, it's very broad. It's an industry that might only represent 25 per cent of the finances of the island and the government, but the reality is a much deeper ramification in the society and especially (for the) small entrepreneurs, families and so on."

It is for that reason, the CITA president said that a collaborative approach is needed to speed-up the recovery.

"It's not that we need a czar. That is the government and what they are paid for. But it's the leadership that I would like to see apply the decision to bring the island back to its best. So it has to have a collaborative approach because everybody has a part; the Minister (of finance), the tourism department has to be aligned, the commerce has to be in line, health has to be in line and education has to be in line. The same way that it was done last year, let's

do it again. Let's get everybody working together, believe in that vision and make it happen."

Known for his insightful observations of trends in the sector, Mr Langevin also noted that despite Cayman's enduring attraction as a preferred tourist destination, other islands which opened earlier, have forged ahead with their economic recovery efforts - even though some had suffered some setbacks in some instances for moving too quickly.

"A lot of other destinations are really making their regulations a lot easier..but we are still one of the hardest right now. I can tell you there are some people who, just the fact that they have to fill out the form, they stop. They don't even want to go through it because for them it's too complicated already."

While Cayman has been credited for its robust response to the pandemic, especially with its vaccination programme, Mr Langevin however feels that some of the current remaining regulations, especially for travellers, need to be reviewed.

He urges a reassessment of the balance

between business risks and health risks at this stage of the pandemic.

"There is always a risk that when you start to open more...and my argument is that we have done everything to prepare for that. I think we need to shift the conversation from what is the health risk to the population to what is the economic risk to the businesses, and then businesses make decisions based on that, not the government," the CITA president suggested.

"I think now we need to also evolve with regulations and letting the citizen make (more of) the decision...We need to move from those regulations and just like the rest of the world, learn how to manage our own expectations."




Commenting on the latest stamp issue, the Postmaster General, Ms Sheena Glasgow acknowledged The Cabinet's wish to celebrate this iconic member of the Cayman Islands community and commemorate him in this stamp issue. She said: "What is truly inspiring were his enduring humility, joy for living, love for God and his family and his enthusiasm for staying active, including in the community, right until his passing - without allowing the progressing years to slow or limit him in these areas."

Ms Glasgow continued, "Equally motivating was his passion for maintaining high standards and ethics in all the work he did and the fact that he trained many Caymanians in the shoe repair trade. Through his long and abiding love for dominoes, which he even played competitively by representing the Cayman Islands in overseas tournaments, Mr. Howell Snr. also displayed another highpoint of his personality."

She concluded, "We thank the members of his family for sharing photos and details of his life which helps us depict Mr. Howell in the stamp issue and I encourage customers, especially collectors, to avail of this opportunity to obtain a bit of local history."

In its latest release this year, the Cayman Islands Postal Service (CIPS) celebrates with a special stamp issue, a senior citizen who was a beloved and long-lived icon of the local community.

At a marvellous 106 years, the late Mr. Wellesley Howell was a well-known musician, notably a saxophonist, who also ran a shoe making and repair shop of long-standing repute in George Town. He was the well-loved father of Cayman Islands' Supervisor of Elections and Chief Officer in the Ministry of Border Control and Labour, Mr. Wesley Howell, and Deputy Chief Officer in the Ministry of Education, Ms. Lyneth Monteith.

Mr. Howell Snr. was born in Jamaica on 7 January 1915, one year into World War I,


and was the longest known surviving person in the Cayman Islands at the time of his passing on 22 July 2021.

The stamp issue was requested by members of The Cabinet in tribute to Mr. Howell Snr.'s years, accomplishments, values and his life, both in Jamaica and in the Cayman Islands, to which he moved in 1958.

The stamp issue includes a set of two stamps in denominations of 25 cents and \$2 as well as a First Day Cover (FDC) for collectors. The images depict Mr. Howell's prowess as a shoemaker standing the doorway of his well-known shop on Shedden Road and as a musician, playing his saxophone solo and also in a group on the FDC.

The stamps went out for sale on Thursday, 21 April 2022 and the FDCs will do so



UCCI launching a ground-breaking project for Caymanians

Following the receipt of a grant to help unemployed Caymanians train in the much-needed area of sustainability, the UCCI speaks with Caymanian Times publisher Ralph Lewis about what opportunities this creates for young Caymanians.

The UCCI has just received the first tranche of a grant totalling €432,000 (CI\$405,000) from the EU's RESEMBID Programme to help train 50 unemployed students in trades that are sustainable (both environmentally and economically). RESEMBID, funded by the European Union and implemented by Expertise France - the development cooperation agency of the Government of France, supports sustainable human development efforts in 12 Caribbean Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) - Aruba, Anguilla, Bonaire, British Virgin Islands, the Cayman Islands, Curaçao, Montserrat, Saba, Sint Eustatius, Saint Barthélemy, Sint Maarten and Turks and Caicos.

The UCCI's Cleveland Julien, Project Officer, Profession & Technical Education & Training, and Paul Puckerin, Dean of the Professional and Technical Education and Training Division, are spearheading this exciting new project which, it is anticipated, will give the 50 Caymanians the chance to take their first steps onto a prosperous and rewarding career within the realms of sustainable energy.

Perfect timing

Cayman's involvement with the project began in 2019, Mr Puckerin explained, when the idea was first circulated. After Covid and

the subsequent surge in unemployment due to tourism reaching a standstill, the invite for Cayman to present a project on resilience to the RESEMBID programme could not have come at a better time.

In November 2021 they received the unofficial confirmation that the project was approved which was then officially signed off in February this year. The intention is to begin training in May, in four broad areas: renewable energy, sustainable construction, ICT, and tourism management.

Mr Julien said there was ample choice when it came to choosing the 50 students so they did not anticipate a challenge. Their goal was to find the students and then ensure that, once they had undertaken the training, the young people could move to placement.

"The goal is to find what partners exist in the marketplace to make that happen," he advised.

To that end, they are working with WORC to ensure employers are on board so that once students have completed the programme, they are then able to be hired. They are also working with the Chamber of Commerce. A labour market assessment will help them identify not only how the courses should be shaped, but also, most importantly, how to fulfil the needs of government and industry.

Getting up to speed

The UCCI leaders said they had had to work quickly to get up-to-speed, following the receipt of the first tranche of funding.

"We had to hit the ground running over the last couple of weeks. We have con-



tracted a qualified consultant who will lead the process of developing the market assessment," Mr Julien advised.

Mr Puckerin said that students should understand that gender was not a barrier to entry to any of the courses.

"We want to see females as installers and males getting involved in tourism at the management level. We don't want to see any gender disparity and we want good unity across the agenda," he advised.

Collaboration is key

Mr Julien was keen to stress that collaboration made up an essential part of the programme.

"From the very beginning, the motive is collaboration," he advised. "Students will be learning in an environment where they will interact with all four components of the programme via interactive sessions

with guest speakers from Solar, Construction, ICT and Tourism"

He also said that they were going to bring in these industry experts over the year so that the students were able to continually make these connections so they understood what role elements for example their studies in electrical played in the whole conversation of sustainability and its connection with solar.

In addition to the cost of training personnel and the labour market assessment, the grant will pay for tools and equipment, curriculum development, an after-programme assessment, and a graduation ceremony.

Tourists die at Sandals, Bahamas

Three tourists have died at a luxury Sandals resort in the Bahamas after falling ill on Friday, officials said.

An American couple staying at the five-star Sandals Emerald Bay resort in Exuma

suffered convulsions and complained of feeling ill before their death, detectives said.

After being alerted to the death of a man in a luxury villa, police discovered the

bodies of the couple in a second villa, the police statement says.

A fourth American, a woman, was airlifted to hospital in Nassau, according to Exuma MP and Minister of Tourism Chester Cooper.

A police statement read: "Our initial investigations revealed that the couple found in the second villa complained of illness the previous evening. They attended the local medical facility and on completion of receiving treatment, they returned to their lodging.

"The coroner was appraised of the facts surrounding both scenes. The police will await an autopsy report to determine the exact cause of death."

The cause of the deaths has not been confirmed but a guest at the hotel suspected an air conditioning fault had caused a "toxic coolant leak".

Some guests had been treated at a clinic

for nausea and vomiting the day before the deaths, health minister Dr Michael Darville said.


One of the victims was named as Vincent Chiarella, from Birmingham, Alabama, who had been celebrating an anniversary with his wife Donnis.

Their son Austin told ABC News he had been contacted by the US Embassy and he was able to speak with his mother, who was airlifted to a hospital in Florida.



Cuban explosion kills at least 25

The latest death toll has risen to 32 and 19 remain missing following a powerful gas explosion at Hotel Saratoga in Havana, Cuba on Friday morning. The state-run company Gaviota that manages the hotel said 11 workers died in the blast and 13 remain missing.

Police and fire rescuers are combing through rubble for survivors after the explosion destroyed the famous hotel, right beside the Capitol. Any Cayman Islands residents who have visited Havana are likely to have passed Hotel Saratoga, right in the heart of Havana.

A gas leak is thought to be the cause of the explosion, according to the Cuban Presidential Office. Havana governor, Rinaldo Garcia Zapata, said the hotel was in the process of renovations and no tourists were staying there, the Communist Party newspaper Granma reported.

According to preliminary data, a child and a pregnant woman were among those who died, it said. The presidency also said 64 people have been hospitalized for injuries, including 14 minors. Cuban state TV said there are potential survivors trapped in the basement of the destroyed hotel.

Photos from the scene show severe

damage to the multi-storey hotel, with much of the walls blown away exposing interior rooms and clouds of dust billowing into the sky.

Yazira de la Caridad, said the explosion shook her home a block from the hotel. "The whole building moved. I thought it was an earthquake. I've still got my heart in my hand," the mother-of-two said.

Police cordoned off the area as firefighters and ambulance crews worked inside and a school next door was evacuated.

The 96-room four-star hotel is located in the historic centre of Old Havana and was remodelled by a British company after the fall of the Soviet Union.

It had become a popular venue for visiting government officials and celebrities and contains bars, restaurants, a spa, gym and rooftop pool.

Hotel Saratoga was built at the end of the 19th century and, by the 1930s, it was one of the most important hotels of the city.

Celebrities such as the writer Rafael Alberti have passed through Hotel Saratoga, whose visit is framed in a commemorative plaque of the building, which was reopened as a hotel in 2005.
