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FOOD SECURITY: FROM TALK TO ACTION – BASIL SPRINGER COLUMN

“This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoreth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me.” – Matthew 15:8:

St. Lucian Nobel Prize winner Sir Arthur Lewis posited (circa 1950) that “... in the West Indies islands, it is not the case that agriculture cannot continue to develop if industry is developed, indeed they reinforce each other.”

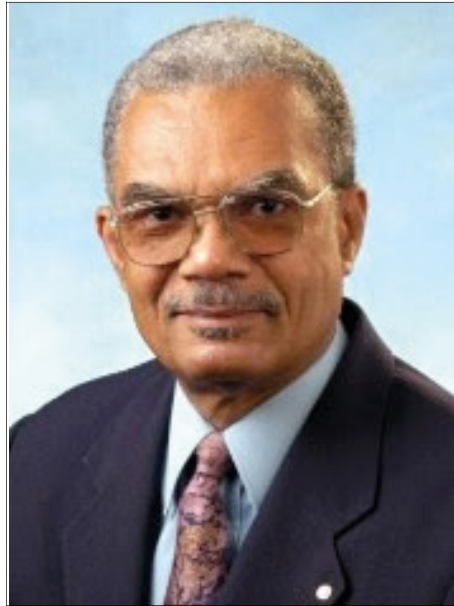
By extension, 72 years later we can further posit that in CARICOM, it is not the case that agriculture and industry cannot continue to develop if digitization is developed, indeed they reinforce each other.

In CARICOM countries we are faced with feeding local populations, our visitors, and we can exploit the export market for exotic Caribbean foods.

Food security, timely food supply and delivery to all markets, is facilitated by agricultural development.

The basic resources of arable land, sea and technology are available in CARICOM even though climate change, the COVID-19 pandemic and more recently the Russia-Ukraine war are external threats which have and will inhibit progress on the path towards food security.

In response to major labor protests and rebellions which swept across the Caribbean between 1934 and 1938, The Moyne Report was published by the

United Kingdom at the end of the Second World War and addressed many issues, including agricultural development.

Why then do we not have a comprehensive coordinated program for agricultural development in the Caribbean rather than a piecemeal approach by territory? The answer is that lip service only is paid to the issue of food security.

There have been no sustainable solutions for agricultural development in the

past 77 years and many billions of dollars of national and donor funds have been wasted.

I reflect on a company called the Global Business Innovation Corporation (GBIC), registered in the U.S. in 2015.

The principals who organized around this endeavor included Guyanese-American Dr. Owen Carryl (an Open Innovation Expert); Caribbean-American communicator Bevan Springer (Public Relations and Marketing); Brazilian Diego Bolson Ruzzarin (a Food Design Expert); and me (Shepherding for MSMEs).

The establishment of GBIC resulted in the birth of the Caribbean Food Business Innovation Revolution (CFBIR), a market-pull initiative. It was launched in Trinidad and Tobago in 2015 to a packed house. The presentations captured the interest of the audience as to how food and beverage manufacturers could quickly gain access to the U.S. market, in particular, with products which were appropriately developed to satisfy the needs of U.S. consumers.

I was privileged to have been the official observer for Marketplace Excellence (MPE), on behalf of Caribbean Media Partners (CMP), at the launch of Caribbean Export Development Agency's 2021

Annual Results Report at the Barbados Hilton Hotel earlier this month.

MPE and CMP were responsible for sharing the news from this event to regional and global audiences. CARICOM Secretary General, Dr. Carla Barnett, congratulated Caribbean Export – the agency tasked with supporting private sector development in the Caribbean – for focusing on delivering practical results.

She saluted pioneers working across the green economy, creative industries, and agriculture, which she described as a critical area where investment is needed to build food security.

It was my first appearance at an official in-person event for the two years of restrictions due to COVID-19 and I was very happy to be reacting once again with the Caribbean Export hierarchy.

There resides great partnership potential between the above-mentioned entities to help revive food security throughout CARICOM, CARIFORUM, the OECS, and elsewhere across the region.

I shall remain inspired by the late Reverend Martin Luther King Jr., who once stated that “change does not roll in on the wheels of inevitability, but comes through continuous struggle.”

Let's focus on action.

TAG Aviation currently operates fourteen aircraft on the Cayman Islands Aircraft Registry including a Gulfstream 650 to be operated by Tag Aviation (Cayman) under the SEZ AOC.

"We are pleased to issue Tag Aviation (Cayman) SEZC with a Cayman Islands Air Operator Certificate. TAG has been a longstanding operator of Cayman Islands' registered aircraft for private owners and we are delighted that they will now provide commercial air transport services under this new AOC. This addition to commercial operations demonstrates mutual confidence held by our respective organisations in assuring safe and compliant operations. We look forward to their continued growth and success as they serve the needs of this dynamic industry.

We also want to acknowledge the strategic partnership between the Civil Aviation Authority of the Cayman Islands (CAACI) and Cayman Enterprise City (CEC) that provides key elements required for the jurisdictional establishment for operators engaged in commercial operations offshore" said Director-General of Civil Aviation, Mr. Richard Smith.

Receiving the Cayman AOC will further enhance TAG Aviation's aircraft management options and charter service portfolio activities. The company also holds AOCs from San Marino, Malta and UK and currently manages a fleet of 80 business jets.

The Cayman Islands Aquatic Sports Association (CIASA) announced that sibling swimmers and regional powerhouses - Jordan Crooks and Jillian Crooks - have been selected to represent the Cayman Islands at the 19th FINA World Championships taking place in Budapest, 18 June – 25 June 2022.

Jordan, 20 and Jillian, 15 grew up training here in Cayman in a 25m pool – both now train predominantly in the US with access to both short course (25m) and long course (50m) pools.

A rising Sophomore at the University of Tennessee, Jordan made a big splash in both the SEC Championships, and then the NCAA Division I Swimming and Diving Championships (SCY) in his freshman year, placing third in the 50 free. Jordan achieved a FINA World Championships qualifying B time in the 100 Freestyle with the time of 50.25 (B time is 50:48). “I am excited to represent my country,” said Jordan about his first FINA World Championships event.

Meanwhile sister Jillian – who is home schooled and currently training in Florida – made a statement at the recent CARIFTA Swimming Championships with a haul of

seven medals, three Cayman Islands CIASA and three Cayman Islands National records and one CARIFTA relay record: “I shall proudly represent my country. I am honoured to be a Cayman Islands Swim Team member for the 19th FINA World Championships in Budapest, Hungary – and it is an honour to be on the same team as my brother Jordan.”

Technical Director Coach Jacky Pellerin is accompanying the swimmers as

head coach and is looking forward to working with the brother and sister swimmers.

“It will be interesting to accompany Jordan and Jillian to the next long course world championships (50m). I’m curious to see where Jordan will be in the world rankings. After his fantastic results in the NCAA Finals, I will not be surprised if he makes it to the 50m freestyle semi-finals, and then... who knows

what happens next. Jillian proved at the CARIFTA Swimming championships that hard work pays off. I look forward to seeing how she will swim when racing the best swimmers in the world. The competition should help her lower some of the CIASA and National records she set at CARIFTA.

The Budapest swimming pool, which hosted the 2017 World Championships, is a modern and fast swimming pool which should allow our swimmers to compete in the best conditions.”

CIASA President, Steve Broadbelt will virtually attend the FINA Congress being held in conjunction with the championships.

CIASA is the recognised national governing body of all Aquatic Sports (comprised of competitive swimming, open water swimming, diving, high diving, water polo and synchronised swimming) in the Cayman Islands and is an affiliated member of FINA, PanAm Aquatics, CCCAN, Island Games Association of the Cayman Islands, CARIFTA and the Cayman Islands Olympic Committee. Everything they make they get to take home, and this genuinely is a great opportunity. We encourage students to apply early and we hope to inspire the next generation of Cayman's STEM experts.

During the camp, the students will be given a welcome package, activity kits, lunch, snacks, certification of participation and a pass to the upcoming STEM Carib conference, which takes place in November 2022. The STEM Carib conference is always a highlight on the Cayman community calendar and sees thousands of community members and students attend to learn about current trends in STEM fields and related industries and interact with some local and international STEM experts.

The STEM summer camp will begin on August 8-12, 2022, from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm.

HSA invests in EMT training for Caymanians

Eight Caymanians with varying backgrounds are training to help save lives by becoming Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) through the Health Services Authority's (HSA's) fully funded EMT Training Programme.

The trainees were among 73 applicants who registered for the programme by completing a competitive process for admission, including a written exam, a physical assessment, and a panel interview.

The programme is accredited in the United States by the Commission on Accreditation for Prehospital Continuing Education (CAPCE), enabling students to sit for the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT) exam. This credentialing allows students greater mobility to progress clinically to the Advanced EMT or Paramedic level.

The programme's curriculum includes anatomy and

physiology, oxygen therapy, basic life support (BLS) management, patient assessments, airway management, paediatric and obstetrical emergencies, and trauma assessment, safe handling and moving, and emergency response driving.

"The HSA's EMT Training Programme is a great opportunity for us to invest locally, providing an avenue for our Caymanians to join the profession of EMS and change lives together as a community," noted EMS Manager Stephen Duval.

Mr Duval also noted that the service demands of our EMS system continue to increase with diverse needs. In 2021 EMS responded to over 8,000 911 calls for service compared to 6,714 in 2019. "Building the capacity to meet the needs of our patients is essential," he said. "Equipping our people with the necessary skills and knowledge in emergency care through this training will fur-

ther support the HSA's plans to expand our EMS services to the eastern districts to significantly improve response time of our ambulance in critical life-saving situations."

The trainees are expected to complete the programme in August 2022.

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

Cayman Islands COVID-19 Situational Report (SitRep)



International Situation

According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), COVID-19 cases increased in two of the six world regions, the Americas (6.9 per cent) and the West Pacific (5.6 per cent) while cases decreased in the remaining four regions.

Deaths attributed to COVID-19 decreased in four regions, including the Americas but increased in Europe (30.1 per cent) and the West Pacific (0.6 per cent).

Local Trends

There was a slight decrease in Epi. Week 20, the first since the current wave

began in mid-March 2022.

There were 833 new positive cases in Epi. Week 20 compared to 895 in Epi Week 19; and the test positivity rate fell from 35 per cent to 31 per cent.

More PCR tests were conducted in Epi. Week 20 at 2,691 versus 2,585 in Epi. Week 19.

Hospital Admissions

Five new patients tested positive for COVID-19 (one less than the previous week); of these admissions, only one was in an inpatient with COVID-19 related pa-

thology. The remaining four were patients admitted for other reasons and found to be positive on routine screening.

Vaccination

Children's (age 5-11) vaccination restarted this week, with 12 first doses and 45 second doses administered during one session on May 21.

Key Messages

While the number of new positive PCR results remains high in Cayman during the current wave, hospital admissions

have remained low. This is due to the epidemiological status (high vaccination) we are now in compared to the pre-vaccine period in the early stage of the pandemic.

As new public health challenges appear in our global community , such as Monkeypox, it is vital that we continue to strengthen our local surveillance system and preparedness status while maintaining prevention measures, such as frequent handwashing and maskwearing inside public spaces, which offer protection for more than just COVID-19.

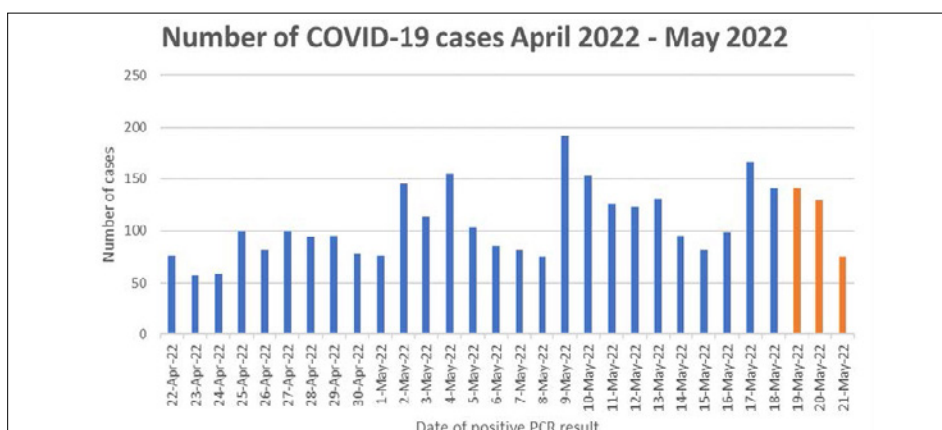

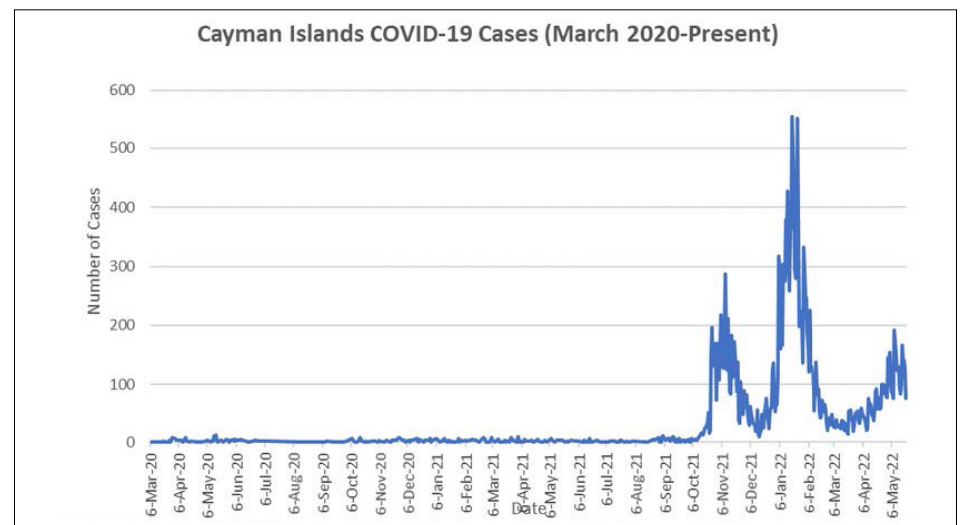

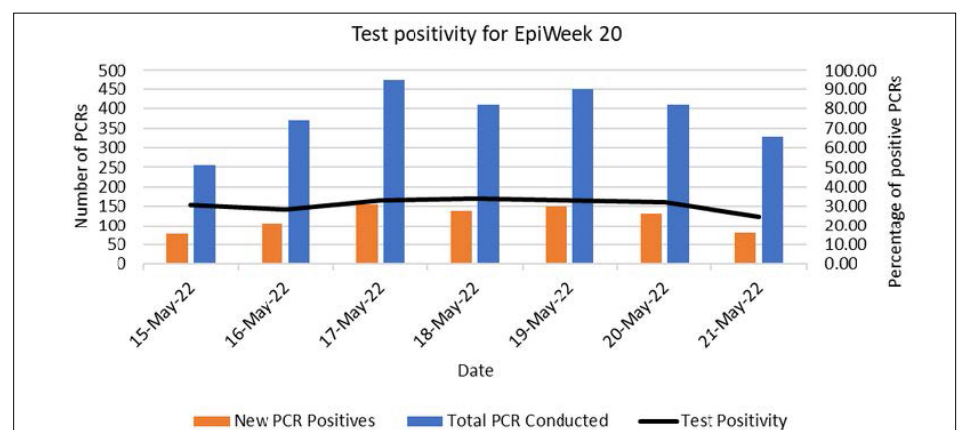
► COVID-19 case numbers (15 - 21 May)

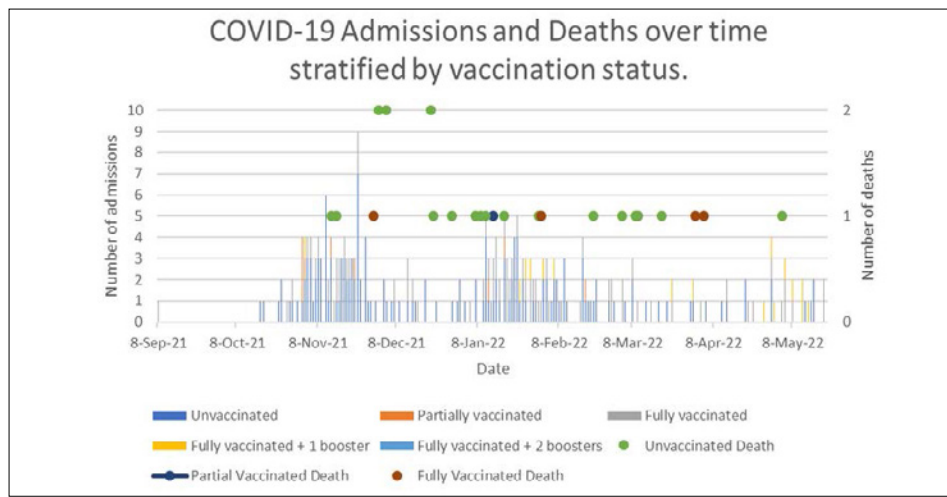

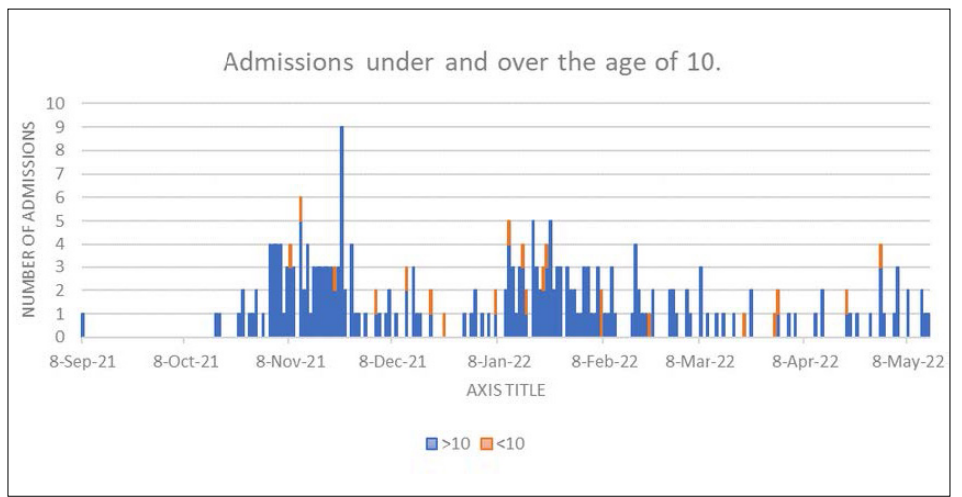

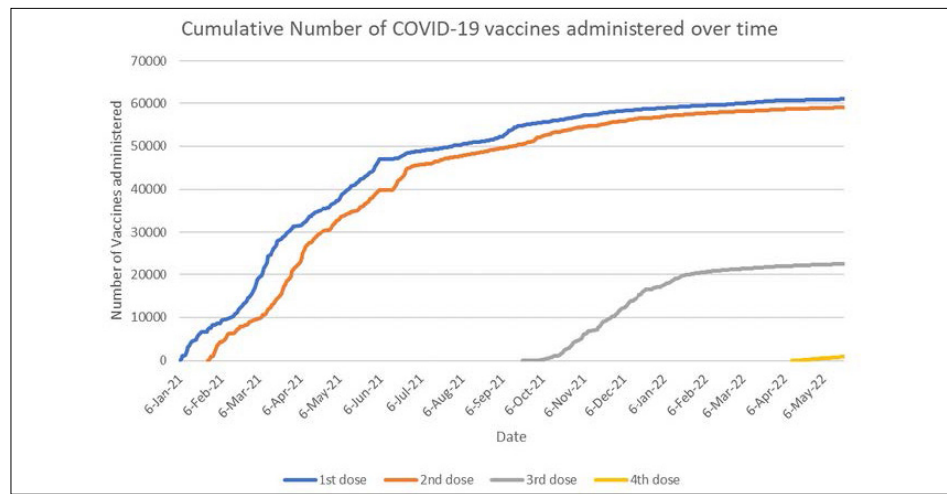


► Current hospitalisations (since 8 September 2021 to 21 May 2022)

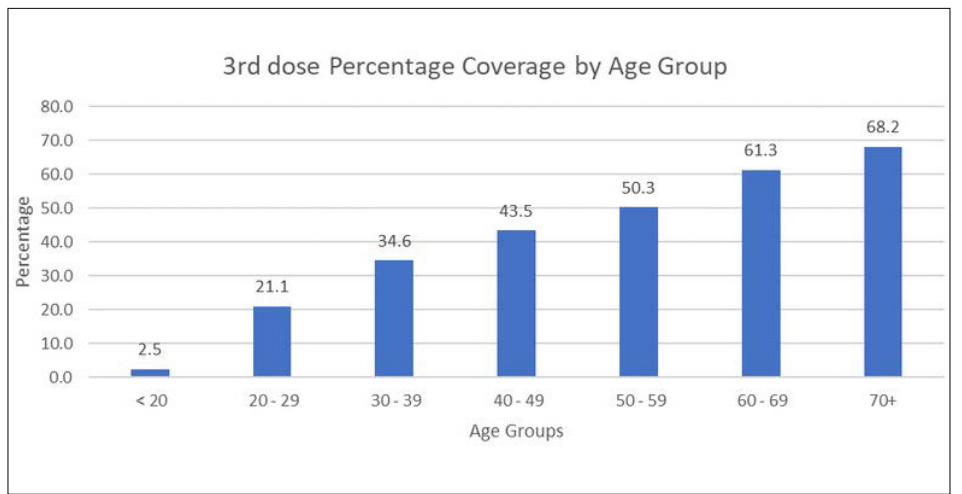


► Admissions stratified by age (since 08-09-2021)

Weekly Newsletter to replace situational report; Decline in cases reported

This is the final situational report, as the Ministry of Health and Wellness will transition to a weekly newsletter on communicable and non-communicable diseases effective 1 June. Daily COVID-19 updates will continue, and the newsletter will also include epidemiological information on COVID-19. During Epi. Week 20, there were a total of 833 new cases of COVID-19 reported by Public Health. This was 62 cases less than what was reported in the previous Epi. Week (8 - 14 May 2022), and the first decrease in cases since the current wave of infections began in mid-March. More tests were conducted in Epi. Week 20 at 2,691 compared to 2,585 tests in Epi. Week 19,

and to 2,185 tests in Epi. Week 18. The test positivity rate was at 31 percent for Epi. Week 20. During Epi. Week 20, there were 15 inpatients admitted to hospital. Of these, 60 percent were vaccinated (two doses) and 20 percent had received third doses/boosters. Five patients were admitted to hospital during this Epi. Week, but it is important to note only one of five arrived to hospital for symptoms of COVID-19. The remaining four came for other medical reasons and were discovered to be COVID-19 positive during routine screening. There have been 284 COVID-19 patients admitted since March 2020 to 21 May 2022.

Cayman Broadens List of Agricultural Imports from Jamaica

Under a new import export arrangement between the Cayman Islands and Jamaica, the Ministry of Agriculture has approved a broadened list of agricultural produce that can be imported to the Cayman Islands, effective May 23.

The produce that have been added to the list are plantain, breadfruit, soursop as well as blanched and frozen ackees.

Minister of Agriculture Hon. Jay Ebanks, who recently visited Jamaica and held bilateral meetings with his counterpart in an effort to strengthen local food security, said the new arrangement will allow the Cayman Islands direct access to high quality and fresh produce from Jamaica. "With the ongoing and increasing threats to global food supplies from climate change to the war in Europe, expanding intra-regional trade within the Caribbean is critical to our food security and economic stability," he stated.

Minister Ebanks further commented, "The demand for some of these newly added produce have exceeded what we grow locally. Until sufficient supply is produced locally, Jamaica offers a good alternative as it is closer than other countries from which we import similar items. In the meantime, we will continue to provide our farmers with the resources needed to strengthen their resilience

to boost the Islands food and nutrition security".

Under the agreed import conditions, all exporters from Jamaica must have a valid import permit from the Department of Agriculture to Jamaica's Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries' Plant Quarantine's produce inspection officers.

Additionally, the produce must be sourced from farms registered and certified by Jamaica's Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

All commodities intended for entry into the Cayman Islands must be inspected and certified to be of good quality, clean, free of pests, soil and foreign matter by authorised officers from Jamaica's Produce Inspection Division at approved packing houses or at designated export complex.

Consignments must be accompanied by a valid phytosanitary certificate that is issued and signed by an officer of the National Plant Protection Organisation of Jamaica and are subject to inspection on arrival by officers in the Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Health Inspection Services Unit.

The Cayman Islands and Jamaica have a long standing trading relationship spanning over 20 years, facilitating the export of agricultural commodities from Jamaica to the Cayman Islands in accordance with international standards.

Man Injured and Two Arrested as Police Investigate Stabbing and Firearm Incident

Shortly after 12:30AM today, Sunday, 29 May, officers responded to a report of a stabbing incident, involving a firearm, at a residence in the Prospect area of George Town. It was reported that three persons, two men and a woman, all known to each other, were involved in an altercation at a residence on Domino Street. The woman brandished a firearm at one of the men, who grabbed it from her and made to leave the location. As he did so he was stabbed by the second man.

The injured man left the residence and sought help from persons nearby. He was assisted by the occupants of a nearby residence on Satinwood Street, where he remained until the arrival of the police.


Officers of the Firearms Response Unit attended the location and recovered the firearm, which contained one round of ammunition. Emergency services also attended and the man was transported to the Cayman Islands Hospital for treatment for his wound, and subsequently released.

The two other persons involved in the altercation, a man age 28 and a woman age 20, both of George Town, turned themselves into police and were both arrested on suspicion of possession of an unlicensed firearm and wounding. They remain in custody as investigations continue.
