When the going gets tough, the Regiment gets going

A major disaster causes massive adjustment to living, particularly in the aftermath, when access to electricity and water is cut. The Cayman Islands Regiment has been learning how to live without the comforts of life we take for granted during a recent nine-day deployment in West Bay which took them on a mission to Barefoot Beach at East End

Regiment Commander Simon Watson confirmed: "We've done a march this morning, five kilometres with approximately 50 to 55 pounds of kit per person. It's everything they need for 24 hours. They are carrying two litres of water and their sleeping systems and all their food and a change of clothes. They've done that in about 50 minutes, which is a really good effort."

Commander Watson advised that the event was their big annual deployment exercise training men and women to be able to live outside buildings or in tents or personal shelters, as they might need to do if the Cay-

man Islands Regiment was to be deployed by air to the Sister Islands, or after a disaster such as a hurricane or an earthquake.

"Tomorrow is a big exercise for the guys themselves, to test their limits," Commander Watson said. "We are going to simulate a medivac where someone needs to be airlifted from a location five kilometres from here, so they will be leaving here with stretchers. It encourages team building against the clock."

Strategies were taught in sections, with one involving learning how quickly to set up a shelter, including a body-length mosquito net. Another section was on personal hygiene.

"A lot of us neglect simple things like our feet and if we have blisters it slows us down, so that can have an effect on everybody else down the line," said Captain Gabe Rabess. "The last section is about hand signals which are very important, especially far away when you are guiding vehicles in without shouting,"

Leonard Ebanks Jr. had learned a great deal, not just about the dos and don'ts they were being told, but about himself.



"I've learned it is important to be tougher, not just physically, but also mentally, because as a regiment we need to be tough and that starts from the ground up," he said. "The Regiment is all about being tough and doing life-saving work which helps the country get back on its feet when maybe nobody else can help, and for that they need to be physically and mentally prepared for every eventuality."

Hazard Management's Director Danielle Coleman praised the Regiment and

was very impressed by what she had already seen.

"They really do assist disaster response immeasurably, so we've seen in the last couple of years that the Regiment is a massive asset to the Cayman Islands. We've been working very closely with the Regiment in exercises and we do some of the training together to make sure we're all on the same page, so that every response that we do is in line with each other."

Tree Trimming near Power Lines

Through our focus on effective vegetation management, which includes periodic inspections of power lines and information from customers, we can identify trees that are growing too close to power lines and thus, cause concern for public safety and reliability.

Government Participates in 2022 Cayman Islands Digital Economy Conference (CYDEC)

The Cayman Islands Digital Economy Conference (CYDEC - <http://www.cydec.ky>) was held on Tuesday 21 June, 2022, at the Westin Grand Cayman, and the Ministry of Investment, Innovation and Social Development (IISD) provided key sponsorship for the event.

The Hon. André Ebanks, Minister for Financial Services, Commerce, Investment, Innovation and Social Development, is away from the Cayman Islands this week representing the Cayman Islands Government in a global forum on fin-tech, innovation and governance.

Acting Minister Kathryn Ebanks-Wilks delivered opening remarks to conference participants. "Government's vision is for technology to be a driver for a better quality of life across all spectrums of society," she said. "The future of the Cayman Islands is one where citizens can see technology allow for efficient access to important public services. At present, a number of initiatives are under way to get us closer to that reality."

In her remarks, Ebanks-Wilks highlighted a transformational initiative that took place within the Ministry of IISD (MIISD) during the past year, a secure and comprehensive online interface for the Government's Needs Assessment Unit (NAU).

Developed jointly between the Ministry's eGovernment Unit and Computer Services Department, this new system has provided the ability for vulnerable Caymanians who need to apply Government's financial assistance to utilise any Internet-enabled device - including mobile phones - to complete and submit an application to the NAU (press release <<https://www.gov.ky/news/press-release-details/new-nau-online-application-2021>>). Previously, NAU applicants had no option but to visit the office and apply in person.

At the same time, the private sector has made a significant contribution to Caymanians in need by removing a potential hurdle to their use of the digital interface. In February 2022, telecoms provider Digicel made it possible for anyone with an active Digi-

cel SIM card (even without account credit) to utilise the NAU's online functionality. (Announced in February 2022 - press release <<https://www.gov.ky/news/press-release-details/ministry-iisd-announces-partnership-with-digicelcayman>>)

Acting Minister Ebanks-Wilks provided an overview of pertinent legislation and initiatives within the Ministry of Financial Services and Commerce, stating that the Ministry's objective is "to help shape the Cayman Islands into a jurisdiction that features the type of innovation that positively impacts our financial services industry and overall reputation."

She explained the legal and regulatory regime around Virtual Asset Service Providers (VASPs) - persons and entities whose businesses (on behalf of another person or entity) provide certain services that use or rely on virtual assets, stating "The founda-

tion for progress in the virtual assets space is a legislative framework that meets client needs and adapts to regulatory changes. Our VASPs framework is built on a comprehensive base of legislation which has been in place since 2020 and features our principal law, the Virtual Asset (Service Providers) Act. Our framework also empowers the Cayman Islands Monetary Authority (CIMA) to act as the regulator for local VASP activity, and has amendments to our securities, mutual funds and anti-money laundering regimes."

Following Acting Minister Ebanks-Wilks, the conference featured a speech by Mr. Ian Tibbetts, Director of the Cayman Islands Government's eGovernment Unit in the Ministry of IISD.

Mr. Tibbetts explained the structure and design of his department's initiatives to streamline digital systems, to make it eas-

ier for residents and businesses to carry out transactions with the Cayman Islands Government - referred to as "Imagine eCayman".

Tibbetts said that subsequent to a consultation on the proposed legislation that underpins the system and then adoption of the legislation by the Cayman Islands Parliament, residents and businesses of the Cayman Islands will benefit from a truly streamlined system of digital governance - made possible with a digital identity.

"Digital systems will virtually eliminate the requirement for individuals repeatedly having to present documents and information to different Government entities, while Government stores the same information in numerous locations," said Mr. Tibbetts.

He continued, "Digital identification will be pivotal in a wide range of digital interactions between individuals, the Cayman Islands Government and other non-government institutions. It will enable secure, verifiable and efficient exchange of information between and within Government's information systems - based on the context. 'Imagine eCayman' will benefit individuals and the wider society by facilitating sharing of reliable digital identity information and verification."

The Ministry of Investment, Innovation and Social Development's Acting Deputy Chief Officer Mr. Rayle Roberts participated in a panel discussion - "Where do technology and social development intersect?" - along with other conference speakers. Mr. Roberts discussed the Ministry's broad approach of integrating social development with innovation - both wholesale and incremental. He covered numerous Ministry initiatives including cyber education for the elderly, and insights as to designing innovative systems for Government's clients that enhance service delivery.





International Situation

Internationally, case detection continues to decline since the peak of new cases reported at the beginning of the year. However, for the first week in over a month, the weekly number of COVID-19 deaths has slightly increased by 4%. An increase in deaths occurred in the Region of the Americas and Western Pacific Region.

age of new positives from 67 to 53. The test positivity has slightly decreased from 28% to 26%, however, the number of PCR tests conducted has continued to decline by 12% to 1,467 from 1,659.

Regarding mortality, the Cayman Islands has still the lowest cumulative fatality rate among the Caribbean UKOTs and is among the lowest of all Caribbean countries.

The role played by vaccination, which has been successfully implemented in Cayman, needs to be recognised when looking at the low cumulative mortality rate in Cayman.

Reviewing epidemiological data throughout the pandemic and analysing among cases that were hospitalised, sta-

tistically, 56 hospitalised cases would have died if they had not been vaccinated.

dren received the paediatric COVID-19 vaccine (16 first dose and 37 second dose), bringing the total of vaccines administered to children over the last two weeks to 114.

There were 19 adults (aged 12 and older) who received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine in Epi.

Week 24, and 35 adults who received their second dose.

Hospital Admissions

Five new admissions were registered during Epi. Week 24, a decrease from the previous reporting week where ten new admissions were reported. Of the five admissions, one was specifically caused by COVID-19 morbidity, with four patients detected on screening. A total of 9 patients required inpatient treatment, which decreased from 12 patients in the previous week.

Key Message

Key metrics have started to improve again and the declining trend in cases noted prior to last week has since continued. Vaccination continues to be the key protective tool against COVID.

During Epi. Week 24, a total of 53 chil-






► COVID-19 case numbers and number of PCR tests conducted

► Number of COVID-19 cases for the last 30 days. Orange bars indicate PCR results are pending thus figures may change.




► Test Positivity Rate for the last thirty days. Data refers to the percentage of patients who tested positive via PCR in the prior 7-days.



► Vaccine Coverage total population





Monkeypox

Overview

Across countries which are not endemic for monkeypox virus, there have been 2,103 laboratory confirmed cases and one probable case of monkeypox reported to WHO since the beginning of 2022 (data as of 15 June). This includes 42 Member States across five WHO regions. One death has been reported in Australia. The highest number of cases reported in a non-endemic country is the UK, and as of 15 June 524 cases have been reported there.

Cases which report a travel history have mostly travelled to countries in Europe and North America, therefore not acquiring infection from a country in West or Central Africa where the virus is endemic. Such cases have been reported unexpectedly at a similar time across several regions, which suggests that transmission may have been occurring for several weeks and gone undetected.

The global risk level assessed by WHO is moderate.

Cayman Islands

There are no known cases of monkeypox virus detected in Cayman Islands.

The Cayman Islands now have the capacity to diagnose Monkeypox at the Cayman Molecular Laboratory. This means that the laboratory was able to confirm a negative diagnosis for Monkey pox for the case of the young, male patient, who came to the attention of the Health Services a couple of weeks ago. This negative laboratory result, further supports the clinical diagnosis of Chicken pox for this individual.

Hypertension

In the body's arteries, the force of the circulating blood against the arteries walls is called blood pressure. When the blood pressure is too high this is referred to as hypertension, which can often go undiagnosed as symptoms may not be noticeable. Globally, an estimated

46% of adults with hypertension are unaware. The only way to detect hypertension is to have a blood pressure test.

High blood pressure can put strain on your blood vessel, heart and other organs including the brain, kidneys and eyes. If hypertension persists, it can increase the risk of serious and potentially life-threatening conditions including:

- Strokes
- Heart failure
- Heart disease
- Heart attacks
- Kidney disease
- Peripheral arterial disease
- Aortic aneurysms
- Vascular dementia

Hypertension (continued)

There are several modifiable risk factors for hypertension, including consumption of tobacco and alcohol, physical inactivity, being overweight and obese and unhealthy diets. Addressing these risk factors with lifestyle chang-


es can help to prevent and lower high blood pressure.

During 2021 in the Cayman Islands, provisional data indicates a total of 5,787 patients were seen at HSA with hypertension, which equates to 8.3% of the population. Of those patients with hypertension, 60% (3,474 patients) were female and the highest proportion of patients were aged 50-59 years (25%, n=1,442) and 60-69 years (25%, n=1,474). However, as this information is only relating to HSA, this does not indicate national prevalence of hypertension in Cayman Islands, and strengthening of surveillance nationally to include both public and private facilities would be beneficial to enable this.

June is Skin Cancer Awareness Month



In the Cayman Islands we are blessed with sunshine and enjoy an outdoor lifestyle. It is, therefore, important to understand both the risk factors for skin cancer and how to reduce our risks.

Skin cancers develop when mutations or errors occur in the DNA of skin cells.

These grow unchecked and may develop into tumours. Ultraviolet radiation from sunlight is one of the major causes of damage to skin cell DNA. However, other factors also play a role such as genetic predisposition and underlying medical conditions.

There are two main types of skin cancer: **non-melanoma skin cancers** such as squamous cell carcinoma and basal cell carcinoma and **melanoma skin cancers**, which are less common but more dangerous.

Although skin cancers commonly occur on sun-exposed areas, they can also occur on non sun-exposed areas such as groin, scalp, soles of feet and under nails.

MELANOMA

These are the less common of the skin cancers but are the **most dangerous**.

These can occur as a new brown spot on the skin or develop within an existing mole.

Factors which may contribute to the development of skin cancer include:

1. Excessive sun exposure. E.g., people working outdoors without appropriate sunscreen and sun protective clothing are more susceptible.
2. History of multiple sunburns. Many blistering sunburns in childhood significantly increases skin cancer risk in adulthood.
3. Family history of melanoma and a large number of moles increases risk.
4. Fair skin that easily sunburns is at higher risk. However, people with darker skin types can also develop skin cancer and these tend to occur at higher rates in non-sun-exposed areas such as the palms and soles and under nails.

5. Conditions which lower the immune system, certain medications taken for lupus or organ transplants, and exposure to toxic substances may increase risk.

The following **ABCD-Easy rules** help to identify the brown spots or moles that may be suspicious for melanoma:

Asymmetry – two halves of the area may differ in shape.

Border – edges of the area may be irregular or blurred or notched.

Colour – may be two-toned. Different shades of black, brown and red may be seen.

Diameter – moles increasing in size. Report any change in size, shape or diameter to your doctor.

Expert – Appearance of skin cancers vary. Tell your dermatologist about any changes on your skin.

NON-MELANOMA SKIN CANCERS

These can occur on any part of the body but are most common on areas of skin often exposed to the sun such as the head and neck, including lips, ears and backs of hands. They can also appear where skin has been damaged by x-ray therapy, in old scars, ulcers, burns and non-healing wounds.

• Basal cell carcinomas

The most common skin cancers, which vary greatly in appearance. Can present as:

1. Slowly enlarging flesh-coloured lump.
2. A scabbed, scaly patch that will not heal and occasionally bleeds.

• Squamous cell carcinomas

More aggressive than basal cell carcinomas. May appear as:

1. A rapidly growing red lump.
2. A scaly red flat patch.

HOW TO REDUCE RISK:

1. Seek shade during the hottest part of the day, usually between 11am and 4pm.

2. Use physical sun protection such as hats, Ultraviolet protective (UPF) clothing and sunglasses when outdoors. Remember that sunburn can occur even when it is cloudy.
3. Liberal use of high SPF factor 30 and above with broad spectrum protection on the skin applied 30 minutes before sun exposure. Reapply every two hours and top up after swimming.
4. Perform regular self-skin examinations to look for new skin lesions and to identify changing spots. Visit the dermatologist for regular skin screenings so that any changes which may signify the development of skin cancer can be detected and treated at an early stage to ensure a great prognosis.

Early detection saves lives!

SKIN CANCER TREATMENT

Options are determined by size, location, type and stage of the skin cancer and include:

Cryotherapy: Freezing spray which can destroy cancer cells.

Surgical excision and in some cases **MOHS surgery:** skin cancer is cut out with the removal of some normal skin around the tumour to ensure that all abnormal cells are removed.

Chemotherapy and immune modifying creams: can also be applied to the skin to clear skin cancer cells, usually with minimal scarring.

Light therapy such as **PDT** and **radiotherapy** are also used to destroy skin cancer cells.

Chemotherapy and immunotherapy drugs: can be taken orally or intravenously to treat skin cancers that have extended beyond the skin into the lymph nodes and other organs.

OfReg fines Rubis \$225,000 for 2019 Jackson Point Terminal tank leak



Fuel sector regulator, OfReg, has fined the operator Rubis a total of \$225,000 for operational failures that led to a fuel tank leak at the Jackson Point Terminal in November 2019.

The discovery of the leak at the time, led to immediate action by Rubis and OfReg to minimise the risk to the public. OfReg's following investigation established the causes of the incident and included an assessment carried out by Water Authority Cayman which found no significant impact

on the surrounding environment despite the quantity of diesel released from the tank.

The investigation found sufficient grounds to file charges against Rubis earlier this year in March 2022. Following initial legal proceedings brought before the courts, Rubis has now agreed to settle the matter and accept an administrative fine including investigative and related costs.

OfReg CEO, Mr. Peter Gough, said: "As the regulator for the fuel sector, OfReg

has a legal duty to ensure all operators operate and maintain critical national infrastructure to the highest standard, in order to deliver the required benefits to consumers and the jurisdiction. This particular incident, thankfully, has not had a significant impact on our environment but as our investigation has determined, had the operator adhered to the codes, standards and their own operational procedures, the leak could have been prevented.

The decision to prosecute and the amount in which Rubis has been fined, reflects the seriousness of the offence and OfReg's commitment to holding licensed operators accountable for their actions. The matter is now closed, and we are clear in our mandate to ensure that this should not happen again and that there will be severe consequences for those that fail to meet the requirements and terms of their permits and licenses."

New regulations ease Covid restrictions



As from 30 June, the requirement to wear a face mask in line with Covid regulations will be lifted, which means people will not be required to wear a face mask in a public place, unless those running places such as restaurants and shops require their customers to do so. In addition, people arriving into the Cayman Islands from that date onwards do not have to provide proof of a negative Covid test in order to enter the country.

On Friday the government issued three new regulations which come into effect on 30 June: one that lifts the requirement to wear a facemask; one that stops the need for a negative Covid test to enter Cayman; and one that continues the pension holiday.

Masks will not be mandatory in schools and restaurant servers will not be required to wear face masks. Mask-wearing for people using public



transport will be up to the bus or taxi driver themselves.

In addition, unvaccinated Caymanians and residents will not need to quarantine for seven days upon arrival into the Cayman Islands and instead need to apply to Travel Cayman for a travel authorisation no less than five days before leaving for Cayman. And while travellers won't need to get a negative Covid test prior to travel to Cayman on or after 30 June, they will still need to complete a travel declaration form on the Travel Cayman website.

Cruise ship passengers must still have to undergo an approved vaccine course at least 14 days prior to joining on a cruise ship bound for Cayman.

Speaking to the Caymanian Times last week, Tourism and Travel Minister Kenneth Bryan said that he was happy with these new changes to the regulations, hav-

ing stated that it was important for Cayman to stay in line with Cayman's main source market, the United States.

"We can't be seen as continuing to have these hurdles in the way for the freedom of travel," he had said. "We have to continuously monitor the freedom of travel to make sure that we stay ahead of the game from a tourism perspective."

These new regulations expire on 31 August 2022.

Pension holiday stays

In addition to Covid restrictions easing, government also issued new regulations as they relate to the paying of pensions, extending the pension holiday until 30 September, one of a raft of requests made by the Opposition Leader Roy McTaggart to the Premier last week in order to help ease the burden of the cost-of-living increase.



Government's year-to-date surplus above budget

Coming in at \$30 million over budget, government's unaudited results for the first five months of 2022 show a \$179.5 million operating surplus for the entire public sector, with total operating revenues of core government exceeding half a billion dollars by the end of April alone. This is a record for government, which has never seen its revenues go above a half a billion in the first four months of a financial year.

Government has said that they were going to put 20% of that \$30 million surplus towards the energy assistance programme announced a few weeks ago, which will help people who are struggling to pay their energy bills.

In presenting the figures to Cabinet, Deputy Premier and Minister for Finance & Economic Development Chris Saunders said the May numbers followed a similar trend as prior months, with higher than budgeted revenues and surpluses.

"I maintain a cautious optimism as most of the government revenue collected in any given year comes in the first half of the year due to various financial services fee structures. However, the May year-to-date numbers shore

up our positive position heading into the historically leaner second half of the year," he stated.

The main reason for a higher than anticipated budget surplus came from better-than-expected performance in a several areas, the main ones coming from the real estate and financial services industries, along with higher-than-expected work permit fees.

Land and holding companies share transfer charges were \$2.2 million better than budget, relating to higher volumes of property transfer. Stamp duty on land transfers amounted to \$13.2 million more than projected, as there continued to be higher than expected volumes of property transactions coupled with high property values.

Mutual fund administrators licence fees surpassed projections by \$3.9 million due to an increase in the volume of funds registered, and partnership fees were \$4.1 million better than budget, due to the level of registration outperforming the anticipated increase. Private fund fees were \$3.5 million over projections, due to a higher number of private funds being registered than anticipated.

Work permit fees were \$5.5 million more than anticipated, representing an upturn in demand for workers as the economy moved into phase five of the post-pandemic border reopening.

Deputy Premier Saunders said the May year-to-date figures continued to show improvement when compared to previous years' monthly YTD results, which "showed strong confidence and

performance in our financial services sector, a high volume of sales in our real estate sector combined with high property values, and steady growth in work permit fees as the hospitality industry and the Islands continue to re-strengthen post-Covid."

There were, however, areas still performing below expected projections. These included 'Other Import Duty' which came in at \$11.2 million less than expected but compared to actual results from the same period in the prior year, there was a \$10.9 million favourable variance, government acknowledged. In addition, expenses were on-budget but above the prior year, with actual expenses amounting to \$381.7 million with \$381.6 million being budgeted. However, compared to the prior year-to-date actuals, the 2022 total expenses were \$31.3 million higher.

The government's cash position at 31 May 2022 was \$469.4 million. This amount is represented as operating cash of \$304.5 million, \$284.2 million of which is held in the form of fixed deposits, and reserves and restricted cash (all held in the form of fixed deposits) of \$164.9 million.

Police Investigate Stabbing Incident on West Bay Road

Shortly after 12:40AM today, 24 June, officers responded to a report of a stabbing incident outside a bar in Seven Mile Shops on West Bay Road. It was reported that there had been an altercation at the location during which one man brandished a knife and stabbed two other men. One of the men received a stab wound to his eye, while the other received a stab wound to his abdomen. The man with the knife left the location prior to the arrival of police. Emergency services attended the location and the two other men were transported to hospital to be treated for what appear to be serious and life-changing injuries.

"We know that there were a number of people at the location at the time of the incident and are appealing for witnesses to come forward," says Superintendent Pete Lansdown. "The only way to end this type of violence is for the public to stand up against it. When offenders know their actions will not be tolerated by the community as a whole, they will think twice about committing violent acts."

Opposition wants government to go further to ease hardship

While commending the government on its recent move to extend the pension holiday until the end of September, Opposition Leader Roy McTaggart has called on government to do much more to ease the hardship facing many Caymanians due to the cost-of-living spike, starting with extending the pension holiday even further.

"I had said that the pension holiday would be needed for at least the next six months – the government has decided to continue it for three months. I suspect that in the end, it will be continued to at least the end of the year," he said. "But I congratulate them on their willingness to listen to us and the small businesses and families still suffering from a slow tourism sector as well as from rising prices."

Mr McTaggart said the continuation of the pension holiday would not be enough to stave off hardship for many people.

"Again, I appeal to the government to put in place the other measures we have called for, namely: advise the government-owned Water Authority not to in-

crease water rates for at least six months; speak with executives at Cayman Water and persuade them to do likewise; discuss with CUC the possibility to minimise increases in electricity costs to families and businesses; remove the import duty on gasoline and diesel for six months and

ensure gas stations pass on the savings; and continue the Covid tourism stipends."

He also called for government to increase the stipend to retired seamen, veterans, and those entirely dependent on financial assistance from government, including those civil service pensioners with pensions below what is provided to individuals receiving social assistance.

"These are some of the most vulnerable in our communities and will need the help to ensure they can keep their head above water financially," he stated.

The Opposition also felt that the civil service would have ideas as to how the public could save money and ought to be consulted on this.

"I have said before, this cost-of-living crisis is not caused by the government. Still, the government must do what it can to help ease the burden that everyday people are facing. Individually, none of these recommendations will solve the problem – but collectively, they can help our people survive what is still an unknown storm," he stated.

Mr McTaggart said the government has the reserves in place to help ease the financial burden for people living in Cayman as they had recently fully drawn down on the US\$400M emergency line of credit that the last government put in place.

"That line of credit was intended to be used for just such a situation. In addition, the Government recently announced record government revenues of about \$447M in the first three months of the year," he said.

Government's recent announcement that the entire public sector had a surplus of about \$180 million, or \$30 million more than they had planned for, was another indication that government had plenty of funds available to them.

"It cannot be right that Government benefits from the rising prices while the people suffer," he said. "So, funding the relief measures I have recommended should not be an issue," the Opposition Leader said, urging Premier Wayne Panton to "listen and act".

Dart to take over Brac power production



The Cayman Brac Power and Light Company, situated at Stake Bay Cayman Brac, has been bought by Dart in a move that will see Cayman's largest landowner acquire the Brac power company's assets and its electricity generation and transmission and distribution licenses. The purchase still needs to be given the go-ahead by the Utility Competition and

Regulation Office (OfReg).

Dart said the acquisition marked a new chapter for power generation on the Sister Islands and its community, which would allow investment in new technology and equipment at the plants and reduce the risk in the event of natural disasters and disruption to fuel supply.

Dart explained that Brac Power and Light approached Dart in line with their ongoing strategy to find a successor to innovate and invest in the existing infrastructure and sustainable future of the Sister Islands.

General Manager, Jonathan Tibbetts, will continue to oversee the company's day-to-day operations and all employ-

ees were expected to transition to the new company, and receive training opportunities in new technologies as they are adopted.

Moses Kirkconnell is a Director of The Brac Power and Light Company. He said the shareholders of Brac Power and Light had shared the ambition for some time to grow the plant's capabilities and keep pace with the energy revolution, which ultimately would benefit customers.

"Dart's acquisition of the assets of Brac Power and Light will provide much needed investment in the current infrastructure and we hope, lead to a more sustainable future for the Sister Islands," he said.

Dart said it was committed to sustainable growth in the Cayman Islands, taking guidance from the United Nation's Sustainability Development Goals and supporting the Cayman Islands' National Energy policy target to reach 70% renewable energy by 2037, and to reduce per capita emissions from 12.3 to 4.8 by 2030.

Mark VanDevelde, CEO of Dart Enterprises, said: "We are committed to Cayman and its sustainable future and by working together we can make an impact to mitigate climate change; we currently produce around 3% of the country's power through our solar capabilities and this new venture offers a significant opportunity for us to increase that output and decrease the Islands' dependence on fossil fuels and reduce carbon emissions. We're looking forward to building on the success of Brac Power and Light over time and exploring the opportunity to develop renewable energy capabilities in the Sister Islands in the future."

Abortion ruling shocks the US

The Supreme Court overturning of the landmark Roe vs Wade ruling that made abortion legal has divided the opinions of millions of Americans. Many are dismayed by the ruling but anti-abortionists are celebrating what looks like a draconian decision.

In a narrow vote, five Supreme Court judges to three voted to overturn the ruling on Friday.

The landmark 1973 Roe v Wade case saw the Supreme Court rule by seven to two that a woman's right to terminate her pregnancy was protected by the US constitution.

The ruling gave American women an absolute right to an abortion in the first three months (trimester) of pregnancy, but allowed for restrictions in the second trimester and for prohibitions in the third.

But in the decades since, anti-abortion rulings have gradually pared back access in more than a dozen states.

Apparently, terminations will almost instantly be banned in 13 US States, sparking widespread outrage. Arkansas, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, and Wyoming all have trigger laws in place.

It now looks as if 26 States in total are either eventually certain or likely to ban abortion outright.

The decision is seen as a "constitutional earthquake" that will reverberate across America for decades. It means abortion access will be cut off for about 36 million women of reproductive age.

Widespread protest and civil unrest around the US was seen after the announcement. Demonstrators from both sides had gathered outside the court in Washington DC, with police keeping them apart. Abortion is seen by many as a necessary option for many viable reasons, including rape, incest, life-threatening cases and where the fetus is severely handicapped. Most of the

laws make exceptions only in cases where pregnancy is the result of rape or incest, or if an abortion is necessary to save a patient's life

US President Joe Biden called the ruling a "sad day for the court and for the country". He described it as "a tragic error" and urged states to enact laws to allow the procedure. Former US President Barack Obama said:

"That's a result none of us should want.

"The consequences of this decision would be a blow not just to women, but to all of us who believe that in a free society, there are limits to how much the government can encroach on our personal lives.

The new laws in Kentucky, Louisiana and South Dakota are expected to go into effect immediately.

Allison, Frederick-Westerborg, Barrowman, Jackson and Rabess will be racing in the pool while Lambert-Wragg is competing in open water. Pool swimming takes place from 30 June - 3 July at the Inter-municipal Pool in Abymes and the open water takes place at the Anise Tabarin beach in Gosier.

"We are delighted that Cayman swimming is a part of team Cayman Islands at this historic first Caribbean Games," said Steve Broadbelt, CIASA President. "The swimming takes place in a 50m pool which means that, in the future when Cayman's 50m pool is completed we will be able to host the Caribbean Games here in Cayman. We look forward to partnering with the Cayman Islands Olympic Committee (CIOC) for this and other events in the competition schedule - with the 2022 Commonwealth Games being next on the calendar."

Note - CIASA currently has two swimmers (Jordan Crooks and Jillian Crooks) competing at the FINA World Championships in Budapest, is sending a team to CCCAN in Barbados and will be announcing that team shortly. More information on schedules and events will be posted on CIASA's website shortly.

This important study by a highly respected organisation which will analyse the various benefits and costs and
